County Fair draws near

The 1984 edition of the Lincoln County Fair has been scheduled for August 15-18 in Capitan.

Competition will be limited to Lincoln County residents and in the Junior Division will be restricted to bona-fide members or 4-H clubs, FFA, Girls Scout

and Boy Scouts.

All entries (except livestock), will be taken Wednesday, August 15 from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m., and Thursday, August 16, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Livestock entries will be accepted Thursday, August 16, from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Entries for livestock will close on Thursday, August 16 at 2:00 p.m. Entries for all Home Economics Classes will close at 12:00 noon. Livestock entries will close at 2:00 p.m. on Thursday also.

The Fair Building will be open for public viewing of the exhibits on Friday the 17th at 8:00

a.m.

All the Junior, Home Economics, Horticulture, and Flower exhibits will remain in place until 3:00 p.m. August 16.

Ribbons only will be awarded unless otherwise specified. Premiums will be awarded on the first three places and ribbons on

the first places in the Junior Division. No more than two premiums will be awarded to a single exhibit in any one class.

The Junior Livestock Sale this year will be held Saturday and is scheduled to start at 10:15 a.m. Chairman of the sale this year will be Pete Gnatkowski and

will be assisted by Scott Shafer. Charles Dickerson will be the auctioneer.

The Sales Committee would like to encourage exhibitors to sell their Grand Champion and Reserve Champion, (First and Second place animals) in the Junior Livestock Sale. The

buyers have given super support to the sale in the past and the committee feels the sale of these animals would encourage the buyers to continue their support.

Any junior livestock other than 4-H or FFA will be shown under a separate division and will not be eligible for junior livestock sale. Exhibitors will be allowed to sell only two market animals. For example: one calf and one lamb, one calf and one pig, one calf and one pen of rabbits, one lamb and one capon, one lamb and one pen of rabbits, one pig and one pen of rabbits, two lambs - two pigs. Under no circumstances will any individual be allowed to sell more than one calf.

Howard Shanks will be the official weight master for the fair and for the Junior Livestock Sale.

Linda Ponder will serve as 'general superintendent' for both the Open and Junior division exhibits. Firemen have open house

"We want to show off our facility and equipment, particularly our new trucks," said Howard Puckett, Chief. "And at the same time we want to thank

ASK DR. DAN

Q: I am 62 years old and am in good health except for high blood pressure. Last week I had some bright red blood in my bowel movement. Should I see my doctor about this? R. B.

A: Yes, rectal bleeding should always be investigated by a physician in order to find out the cause. There are many causes of bleeding from the gastrointestinal tract, some are serious and some are not. The most common cause is hemorrhoids. These can be removed surgically if bleeding persists or if they become symptomatic.

The most serious cause of such bleeding is cancer of the colon and rectum. About 60,000 people a year die from this cancer, ranking it second to lung cancer as the leading cause of cancer-related deaths. Fortunately, early detection and treatment of colon cancer will cure up to 75 percent of people, while late diagnosis will lead to a very low cure rate.

Improved methods of detection of this cancer allow earlier, cheaper and improved diagnosis. The simplest method is to test stools for blood which is invisible to the eye. This can be done at home by collecting stool and putting a small amount on a chemically treated card. Flexible tubes with lights and biopsy forceps have been developed which makes it quick, safe and comfortable to look into the colon and sample any suspicious areas. Barium x-rays of colon can be used to outline suspicious areas for further evaluation.

without symptoms in the early stages. Suspicious signs include unexplained weight loss, fatigue, pain in the rectal area, blood in your stools, black stools, and a change in the character or pattern of your bowel movements. People over the age of 50 are at higher risk for getting this cancer. Other risk factors include a family history of colon cancer, a history of colon polyps, familial polyposis (a genetic disease), and inflammatory bowel diseases such as ulcerative colitis or Crohn's disease.

The fact that early detection of this common and highly fatal cancer can lead to surgical cure has led to recommendations for screening. The American Cancer Society guidelines are yearly tests for occult (invisible) blood in the stool, starting at age 50. In addition, a screening sigmoidoscope exam (looking into the colon with a lighted tube) is recommended at age 50 and every 5 years thereafter. IT'S THE LAW New Mexico State Police compiled by officer randy rhue

The laws this week are some that are disregarded alot by almost everyone. They are laws that cause accidents if not obeyed at all times. So please pay good attention to the following laws.

66-7-331: VEHICLE ENTERING HIGHWAY FROM PRIVATE ROAD OR DRIVEWAY:

The driver of a vehicle about to enter of (or) cross a highway from a private road or driveway shall at all times yield the right-of-way to all vehicles approaching on said highway.

This law applies anytime you enter a highway from any road, driveway, or parking lot, even if there aren't any signs or markers telling you to yield or stop.

66-7-332: OPERATION OF VEHICLES ON APPROACH OF AUTHORIZED EMERGENCY VEHICLES:

A.) Upon the immediate approach of an authorized emergency vehicle, equipped with at least one lighted lamp exhibiting RED light visible under normal atmospheric conditions from a distance of five hundred (500) feet to the front of such vehicle other than a police vehicle when operated as an authorized emergency vehicle, and when the driver is giving audible signal by siren, exhaust whistle, or bell, the driver of every other vehicle shall yield the right-of-way and shall immediately drive to the position parallel to, and as close as possible to the right-hand edge or curb of the roadway, clear of any intersection and shall stop and remain in such position until the authorized emergency vehicle has passed, except when

otherwise directed by a police officer.

B.) This section shall not operate to relieve the driver of an authorized emergency vehicle from the duty to drive with due regard for the safety of all persons using the highway.

So any time you see a police vehicle, ambulance, or firetruck with at least one red light flashing to the front and hear a siren, whistle, or bell sounding, you must pull your vehicle as far to the right-hand side as possible, and stop until the emergency vehicle has gone by you. (no matter which direction

the emergency vehicle is coming from). Always remember that if you see an emergency vehicle approaching with it's emergency equipment on it is because someone's property or someone's life may be in grave danger.

66-7-333: PEDESTRIANS SUBJECT TO TRAFFIC REGULATIONS:

A.) Pedestrians shall be subject to traffic control signals at intersections, unless required by local ordinance to comply strictly with such signals but at all other places pedestrians shall be accorded the privileges and shall be subject to the restric-

tions stated in section 66-7-333 through 66-7-340 in the motor vehicle code book.

B.) Local authorities are hereby empowered by ordinance to require that pedestrians shall strictly comply with the directions of any official traffic-control signal and may by ordinance prohibit pedestrians from crossing any roadway in a business district or any designated highway except in a crosswalk.

I will continue with the rest of the pedestrian laws over the next three weeks.

They will attend classes of their choice. Some of those classes are computers, sports, karate, and public speaking. There will also be banquets and dances.

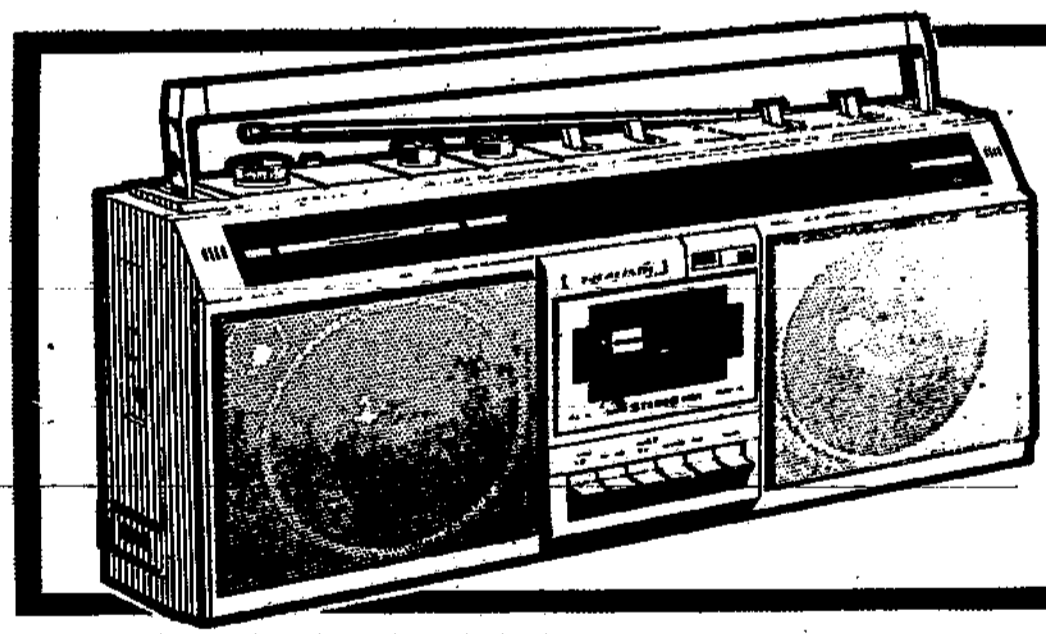

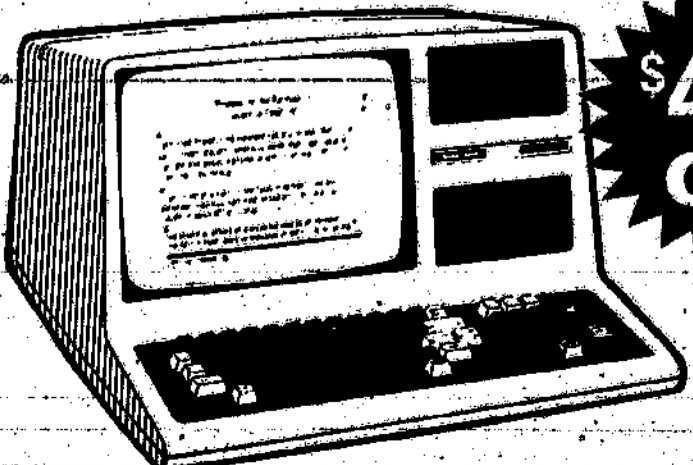

Mr. and Mrs. Lee (Pam)

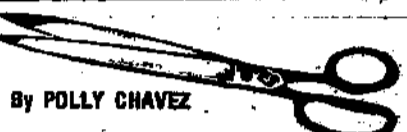

for District Judge,

I'm Sandra Grisham, a candidate for District Judge, Division I. I view the position of judge as an opportunity to make a contribution to our community, and I intend for my campaign to make a contribution as well.

For a campaign to be a contribution it should inform the community not only about the candidate but about the position as well. To achieve that goal, I will be writing this column between now and November. Through sharing some of my knowledge of the law with you along with some of my thoughts about how our legal system could serve us better, I hope to let you know who I am and what you can expect from me as a judge.

My family moved from Colorado to Albuquerque when I was five, and I have been a New Mexico resident ever since. I graduated from UNM Law School in 1973, a class that produced over twelve percent of the present state district judges in New Mexico, including our own Judge Doughty. I am admitted to all state courts, our federal district and appellate court, and the U.S. Supreme Court.

I have been in private practice representing a broad range of clients and concentrating on the area of "people law" - representing individuals, families, and owner-operated businesses. I was also a special assistant district attorney for three years, and I served as chair for the Alamogordo City Charter Commission. I was the New Mexico member on the Steering Committee for the Regional Resource Center on Child Abuse and Neglect in Austin, Texas, and presently chair the Mayor's Committee on DWI.

I wanted to let you know a few things about myself today, but future topics will be on various aspects of the law, including wills and probate, the Children's Code, child custody, DWI laws, community property, and our court system. I also want to discuss some of the latest developments in criminal law, including alternative sentencing, restitution, and the new Supreme Court case on the exclusionary rule.
