

# September meeting date changed

Lincoln County Commissioners met in regular session Aug. 28. Commissioners agreed to change the September meeting date from Tuesday, September 18 to Thursday, September 20. The meeting had to be changed because of the special primary election being held on Tuesday, September 18 for New Mexico State House of Representatives in districts 52 and 57.

Lincoln County Commissioners are the County Canvassing Board and are required by law to meet and canvass the Special Primary election results no later than Thursday, September 20. Capitan residents asked that something be done about the two big culverts that had washed away on school bus routes. Commissioners agreed that culverts would be best instead of

bridges over the arroyos.

County Manager Suzanne Cox said on Wednesday, "The County Engineer will be inspecting the arroyos today, and will draw up plans for the installation of the new culverts."

A joint powers agreement between the commissioners and the Village of Ruidoso was approved for Gavilan Canyon road. The county will be recycling the surface and underlying materials

to form an improved sub-grade. Additional work will be longitudinal and transverse drainage provisions including 18 inch and 24 inch culvert and the placement of base course.

The Village will be applying some course, prime coat and hot mix. The parties agree to build the road in accordance to the New Mexico State Highway Department. Specifications and accordance with the quality

control of the project engineer.

The Department of Finance and Administration gave final approval to the 1984-84 fiscal year budget. This is the 73rd fiscal year for Lincoln County. The official census is 10,997.

Approval was given for final plat review of Los Chozas Community Subdivision and the replat of lot 6, Edelweiss Subdivision, replat of lots 1 & 2, Block 20, Rancho Ruidoso Valley

Estates, and replat of lot 6, Block 3, Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates.

A petition with 30 signatures was presented to request the county replace a bridge on county road B-018. Commissioners will instruct the county road department to keep the bridge in repair as best they can and the bridge will be put on the bridge replacement program.

Resolution No. 73-1 was

signed. The resolution is a request to the director of the Local Government Division to increase the budget to pay prior year bills. Any bill dated before June 30, 1984 and received after that date is a prior year bill. Special permission must be obtained to increase the budget to pay the bills. The fund balance is adequate.

Mabel G. "Belle" Pelto requested a letter of support for the Lincoln County Alcoholism Association. Approval was given to send the letter.

Los Chozas Corporation petitioned the commissioners to close county road B-022. Request was denied because of the bridge over the arroyo.

All bids were rejected for purchase and installation of encoders and decoders due to price variations.

Bid opening for reroofing New Horizon's building was postponed until Sept. 20.

Bid opening for solid waste transfer site was tabled to do more research.

Collins Ambulance had the low bid of \$30,167 for a type II ambulance.

No changes will be made for quarters for the District Court, Twelfth Judicial District, Division III, until a new judge is elected.

Corona Municipal School Superintendent Dr. John Clem requested road work be done on a cattle guard and three roads. The roads are to be maintained as soon as possible.

The Board of Directors of the Sun Valley Sanitation District certified a levy of twenty mills of all taxable property within the boundaries of the Sun Valley Sanitation District. Revenue will be used for improvements in the Sun Valley Sanitation District.

Mayor David Cummins requested that part of the 4.25 mill levy go to provide Capitan with a clinic. It was explained that one mill of the 4.25 is for the Carrizozo clinic, which it provides service for this part of the county and it includes Capitan.

NM State Highway Co-op agreement and school bus route agreement was signed for Loma Grande school bus route, with the state paying 100 percent and for a 60-40 match on Fawn Ridge, Agua Fria, and Palo Verde Slopes with the state paying 60 percent.

Mayor Day of Ruidoso Downs requested that the \$20 a day fee the county charges for prisoners be reduced to \$10 a day. Sheriff Tom Sullivan explained that money received by the county from the racing commission goes into the general fund, and not the sheriff's fund. Commissioners left the fee at \$20 a day. It was noted that most places charge \$38 a day.

Volunteer firemen can qualify for retirement after five years of service. Papers are being sent to Santa Fe for Fort Stanton Fire Department Fire Chief Barney Mancha.

Approval was given to accept the road in Deer Park Woods, Units 1 through 5, subdivision. Commissioners held an executive session personnel.

## Mary Spencer elected 'foundation' president

Mary Spencer was elected President of the new Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital Foundation on August 21, 1984, at an Organizational Dinner Meeting held at the Inn of the Mountain Gods and attended by over 140 citizens of our area.

The Foundation, as an autonomous, nongovernmental, nonprofit corporation was created to assure the independent financial security of the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital. Through the Foundation, there will be built up, from year to year, a fund which would be continuously available for essential capital and other developmental needs of the Hospital.

Elected along with Spencer as first Officers of the Foundation were: Jack Foster, Vice President; Cathy Annala, Secretary; and Gail McIntosh, Treasurer.

Sherman indicated that members of the Board of Directors will be organized into working committees including the Executive Committee, Nominating and Membership Committee, Development and

Finance Committee, Public Relations Committee, and Investments Committee.

Ken Moore, Administrator of Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital, presented a brief history of the hospital, explaining its beginning, the many changes and improvements over the years, the current programs and plans for the future.

Mary Spencer, in accepting the Presidency, told the Board that she appreciated their confidence and called upon the directors to join with her in support of the projects of the Foundation. "The cost of offering the finest medical care and treatment is ever increasing. Supplemental income provided by contributions through our Foundation will assist in keeping costs down and allow for the Hospital's development with a minimum of debt", Spencer said.

## Special primary election in parts of Lincoln County

A special primary election for the purpose of permitting the Democratic Party and the Republican Party to nominate candidates for the legislative office of New Mexico State House of Representatives will be held September 18.

The special primary election is necessary due to the redistricting. The changes in Lincoln County are: District 52 had been only the two Carrizozo precincts. Now, District 52 will be Nogal precinct 2, Carrizozo precincts 3 and 4, Corona precinct 5, and Angus precinct 12. The Angus and Nogal precincts had been in District 51 which has been eliminated. Capitan precinct 1 had been in District 56 but is now in District 57. Corona had been in District 57 and is now District 52.

Filing date for the special primary election was Aug. 28. Only two of the three Lincoln County Districts will be voting. Candidates that did file are: District 57; Republican, Richard T. Knowles, (unopposed); District 52; Democrats, Reynaldo S. Cordova, Neil R. Baird, Sr., and Noel B. Mauldin. Republican Maurice Hobson, (incumbent).

District 56 will not have the special election. The only change

to 56 was that Capitan precinct was moved from District 56 to District 57. District 56 is Ruidoso precincts 11, 13, and 14; Ruidoso Downs precinct 15; San Patricio precinct 16; and Hondo precinct 17.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Secretary of State Clara Jones did not request the Lincoln County News to print the Special Primary Election Proclamation in the legal section. It would seem that since The Lincoln County News is

located in the County Seat, and circulates the entire voting districts in Lincoln County, that

the legal should have been in the News for the best coverage to voters.

## Lincoln County Sheriff's report for month of July

Lincoln County Sheriff's Department totals for the month of July include 23 arrests, 27 citations, 82 traffic stops, 250 calls handled, 66 civil papers served, 52 offense reports, 26,928 miles in county, 408 miles out of county, 2,090 gallons gas in county, 13 average miles per gallon, 19 cases cleared, 8 cases active, 20 traffic accidents, 18 animal calls, 4 crime prevention program contacts, 15 meetings, 9 training sessions, seven and one half hours in court, and total vehicle expense was \$4,158.

The dispatcher's monthly log for July included no fatal wrecks, five wrecks with injuries, 11 wrecks with no injuries, 35 ambulance calls, 14 wrecker calls, 10 fire calls, 12 prisoners, one juvenile, no aliens, one Camp

Sierra Blanca prisoner, no federal prisoners, 3,239 phone calls, 6,834 radio calls, 5,419 teletype messages, 302 walk-ins, 48 hours of training, and three schools attended.

that 1,266 meals were served, total man days were 422, there were eight Camp Sierra Blanca prisoners, one juvenile prisoner, one alien prisoner, 50 local prisoners, no hours of training, and no schools attended.

The amount of stolen property in July totaled \$11,500. Recovered stolen property was valued at \$4,681 for a recovery rate of 41 percent. There was one search and rescue mission in July.

Trains operate over SP lines at very high speeds, and the possibility of striking people standing on or next to the track is a constant fear among their train crews.

It takes well over a mile to bring a speeding freight to a stop, so there is little a train crew can do if they suddenly come upon someone on the track - except blow the whistle and pray. You may think that you could see and hear a train in plenty of time to get out of the way, but hundreds of people die in the US each year because of the same mistaken assumption.

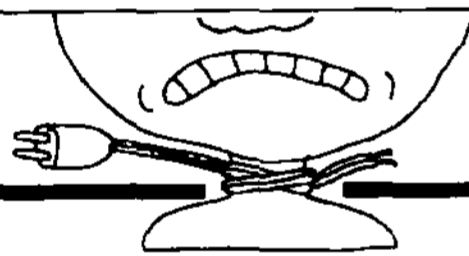

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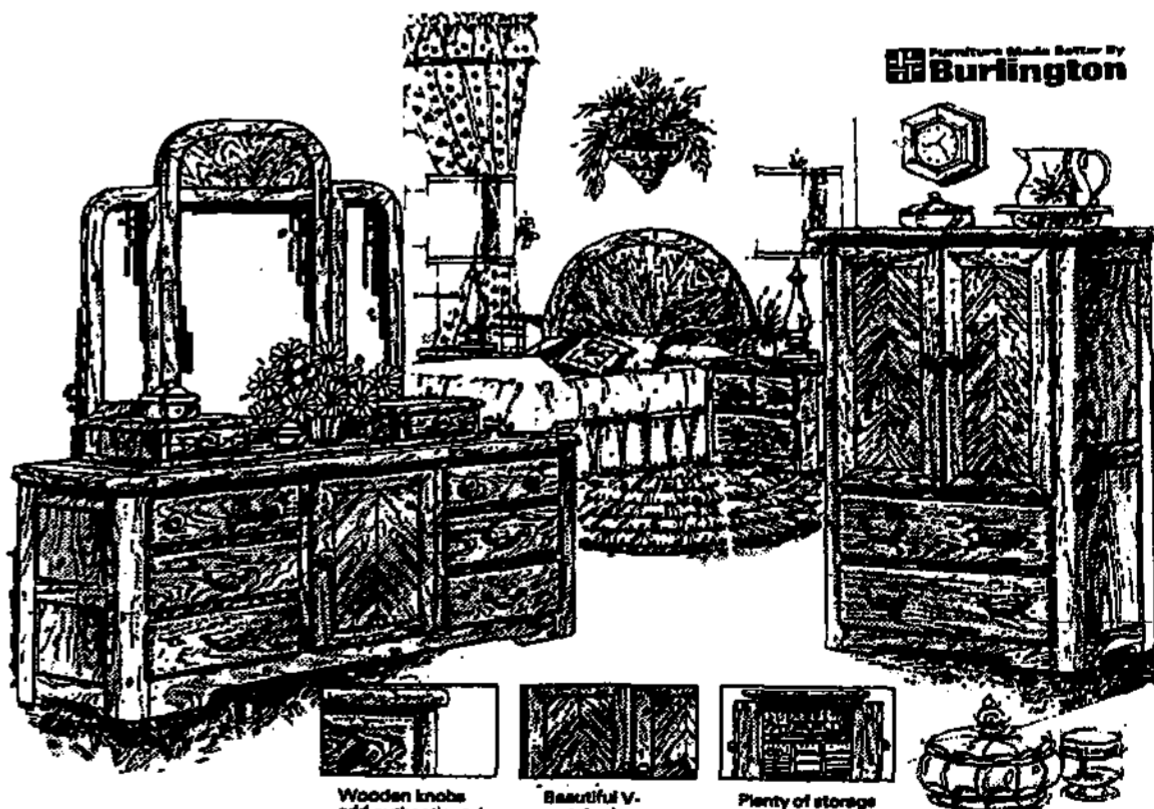
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# Proctor-Shelley wed In outdoor ceremony

● A FEW days ago President Reagan, a man with an engaging sense of humor, was at a microphone testing the recording level before making a radio address. Knowing he was off the air, and still trusting the ever-present media had a sense of humor, he joked into the mike: "My fellow Americans, I'm pleased to tell you today that I've signed legislation that will outlaw Russia forever. We begin bombing in five minutes."

● THE world recoiled in horror when the media took advantage of this opportunity to embarrass the President by going public with his little joke. Brethren of the Queasy Stomach were aghast. The Perpetually Perturbed wrung their hands. Jesse Jackson pleaded with the President to apologize before it was too late. "What," wailed the nuclearphobians "with their irrational fear of nuclear destruction, will the Russians think?" The same people who have predicted the President is pushing for a war with the Soviet Union now know for a fact their President is pushing for a war with the Soviet Union! # Over Washington

## THE RACIALLY COPYRIGHT WORD

SAN FRANCISCO — Black nightclub comedian Dick Gregory has written a book with a one-word title: Nigger.

In Philadelphia, black radio talk show host Mary Mason, a top Pennsylvania leader of the Jesse Jackson campaign, in a petition filed with the FCC by the Philadelphia Lesbian-Gay Task Force, has been charged with referring to homosexuals as "faggots" and blacks as "know-nothing niggers."

Here, California state legislature leader Willie Brown, the city's powerful black Speaker of the Assembly, in 1983 told a predominantly black audience at a hotel party:

"I want you niggers to know I've got my million!"

This was greeted with laughter and applause, since Willie is black. The outspoken Speaker later announced to the State of California that he personally has the power to pass or kill any piece of legislation he chooses.

This and a considerable overload of additional Willie Brown arrogance attracted the editorial interest of one Ernest V. Joiner, editor and publisher of The Sebastopol Times. The Times is a Northern California periodical that is published once a week—but never, ever weakly. For Joiner is a Texas version of the late H. L. Mencken. He is one of the world's most uninhibited practitioners of marvelously crafted vulgar journalism. His paper has subscribers in 40 states and is regularly quoted at length on the air on KGO radio, the ABC affiliate that booms talk shows into homes and cars from Los Angeles to Eureka.

On April 26, Editor Joiner's Opinion column described Speaker Brown as a "pompous bullyragging fanfaron," elected because of California legislators "guilt obsession for having been born white." Joiner further observed: "By creating this dictator, a blow has been dealt to the shoeshine business, which strongly suggests that the use of the term 'nigger,' in special cases, has lost neither its credence nor its justification."

Five of Brown's political colleagues in Sacramento issued an open letter which furiously denounced Joiner. But the embattled editor received 500 other letters—one fifth of them ordering subscriptions to The Sebastopol Times and only 10 percent critical.

Joiner, 71, is a journalistic combat veteran of legendary caliber. He first attracted national attention in a full page feature in Time magazine in 1968 as publisher-editor of The Rails Banner, a small but editorially electrifying weekly in West Texas near Lubbock.

Among other paint-peeling editorials, Joiner noted, on one occasion, that when he "printed the honor roll of the local colored school, a couple of bigoted Ku Kluckers gave birth to two-headed calves, sideways, by the way of reaction. If anyone agrees with their sick stupidity, they are cordially invited to get the hell off our subscription list."

Editor Joiner was boycotted by 75 percent of the Rails advertisers. But he was read, avidly, by everybody in town, as well as by editors all over Texas.

He was also sued by a local TV repairman, whom The Banner had identified on page one as "a son of a bitch." The plaintiff appeared in court with his birth certificate. Joiner presented so much evidence of this man's fraudulent character that the judge issued an epochal ruling:

"I find no libel in calling a son of a bitch a son of a bitch when he IS a son of a bitch. Case dismissed."

There was also Joiner's classic conflict with the local sheriff. On occasion, this man would demonstrate his

displeasure with Ernie by cruising his patrol car through an alley in order to fire his .45 through Joiner's office. Joiner, who believes in gun control—by gun owners—always fired back.

The citizens of Ralls circulated a petition to impeach this sheriff—not for this illegal shooting at the editor—but because he missed.

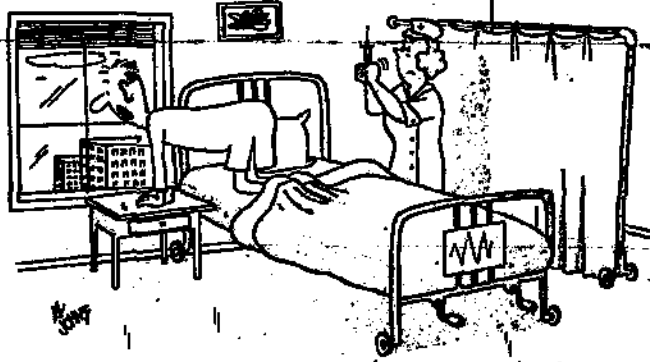
The irrepressible Joiner is currently riding the waves of another ad boycott in Sebastopol. He shows no more sign of being overawed by the Ayatollah of the California Assembly than he was by the shooting sheriff or the suing TV repairman. For Joiner had his cartoonist draw Willie Brown as a huge idol being worshipped by assorted California legislative toadies.

Joiner also took editorial note of the amazing lack of any similar concern by outraged legislators or media people when Willie Brown denounced UPI reporter Rebecca La Vally as a mother-fornicating female canine (or words to that precise effect). Brown has never apologized for this obscene slur. Instead his press secretary, Bobby Metzger, told Jack Ryan of Sacramento's Capital News Service:

"I call people 'bitch' all the time, and I'm the biggest feminist around."

EDITOR'S NOTE: Lester Kinsolving notes that for many years he has written for Ernest Joiner—and vice versa. He regards Joiner as a cherished friend. This relationship acknowledged, Kinsolving contends that this should not preclude a columnist's dealing with one of journalism's 20th Century landmarks.

# INSIDE THE CAPITOL

SANTA FE—The state's bank balances are in puny shape. During the fiscal year that ended on June 30, we spent \$47.8 million more than we took in.

One thing that means is that some of that unappropriated surplus with which we began that fiscal year (it stood then at \$53.7 million, a tidy sum to have in reserve) will have to be drawn down. It looks as though, once we get all the figures in and the books closed, that unappropriated surplus will have dwindled to a paltry \$2.7 million.

That ought to bring worried frowns to the brows of all thinking citizens.

And when you consider that appropriations in the fiscal year which has now begun will exceed expected revenue by \$45.2 million, you can see that things don't look good.

The 1984 legislative sessions gave permission to transfer \$15 million from the operating reserve to help make-up some of that deficit, but it's clear the 1985 60-day session will have to take drastic action of a kind many of us may not welcome.

We will have to have a rise in taxes or some broadening of the base of those who pay in order to assure more return.

TOUGH QUESTIONS: That may be one of the reasons that Interim Tax Study Committee is turning out to be something other than a lot of legislative pussycats.

Most such committees skirt the important issues and appear intent on embarrassing no one. The theory seems to be that the Legislative Finance Committee is supposed to do all the tough work, because it has a com-

petent, full-time staff to back it up. Other committees, some believe, are only supposed to skim the surface.

But this group, chaired by Santa Fe's Senator Eddie Lopez, is tough. They're putting their witnesses, most of them either taxpayers or representatives of taxing entities, on the grid-iron, with tough and penetrating questioning.

That's a good trend, which may have good results.

SEPARATION OF POWERS: Both executive and legislative branches, of course, may make suggestions on how tax yields are to be increased—though a governor has the added burden of finding somebody to introduce the bills to implement his plans.

Major reason why the 1984 legislative sessions did nothing

about tax increases we all knew we needed was that this is an election year. A secondary cause, however, was that nobody on the legislative side had such a program to propose.

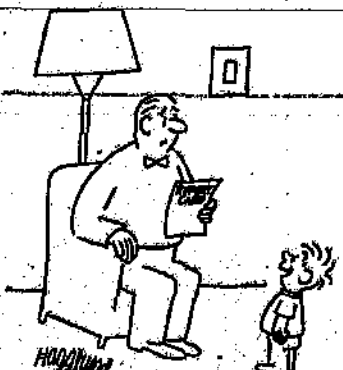
Legislators tend to support measures which originate in their own bodies, not those which are handed down from the fourth floor—and that's even more strikingly true when the man on that floor is not universally loved, as at present.

That's why it's good to see the lawmakers doing the arduous work of preparing such a menu of tax proposals. It's their measures which are most likely to be enacted into law, not those of the Governor, whose recommendations you will read on the front page.

Keep your eyes on the Lopez committee. They will have lots

to say about whether or not the state gets its hands even more deeply into our pocketbooks.

Predictions here have it that they are likely to treat taxpayers more gently than Governor Anaya is inclined to do.

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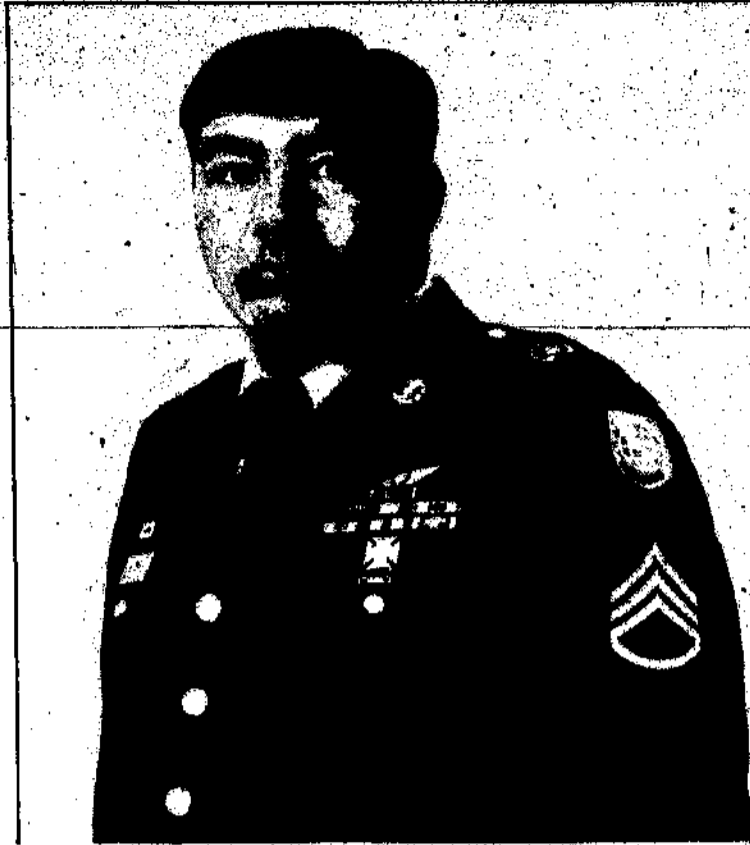
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## Second tour in Germany

## Ask Dr. Dan —

### CHILD ABUSE

Over ninety percent of violent felons were themselves the victims of child abuse, according to Michael Francke, New Mexico Secretary of the Departments of Corrections. This statistic should be engraved on our collective conscience - not because it is dismal and disheartening, and certainly not because being abused as a child excuses committing violent crimes as an adult - but rather because it points out an incredible opportunity to dramatically change our lives, our children's lives and our community for the better.

Our laws define child abuse as "causing or permitting a child to be placed in a situation that might endanger the child's life or health, or to be tortured, cruelly confined or cruelly punished, or to be exposed to the inclemency of weather". New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 30-6-1 (1978 Comp.)

in death or "great bodily harm", the first offense is a fourth degree felony and subsequent offenses are second degree felonies. If the abuse does result in death or great bodily harm, the first offense is a second degree felony and subsequent offenses are first degree felonies. The basic sentence for a fourth degree felony is eighteen months imprisonment and a possible fine of \$5,000.00. For a second degree felony, the jail term is nine years imprisonment and a possible fine of \$10,000. A first degree felony carries a basic sentence of eighteen years and a possible fine of \$15,000.

Anyone knowing or even suspecting child abuse or neglect has a legal duty to report the matter immediately to the district attorney, the social services office or the probation services office. If someone knows or suspects child abuse and does not report it, he or she is guilty of a misdemeanor.

Although the statute applies to everyone, it also specifically applies to doctors, nurses, social workers and teachers. Although it is a good idea to notify supervisors when reporting a suspected child abuse, advising a supervisor or a principal does not relieve one of the obligation to report the matter to the proper authorities.

Anyone who reports suspected child abuse in good faith is immune from any civil or criminal liability, and the report can be anonymous. You do not have to give your name.

The legal response to a child abuse case can be anywhere from imprisoning the offending party to providing supervised counseling for the family involved. The main goal is to provide the child with a safe and healthy environment, in their own home if possible.

The experience of agencies dealing with child abuse is that most offenders are not vicious monsters. Most abusers love their children and lash out because they have not had any adequate parental models themselves and don't know how to handle stress. These are the parents that can be helped by counseling and education.

Social Services encourages parents who feel they may have a problem to ask for help before the law becomes involved. If you want more information about the non-legal aspects of child abuse, call the New Mexico Human Services Department at their toll-free number: 1-800-432-6217.

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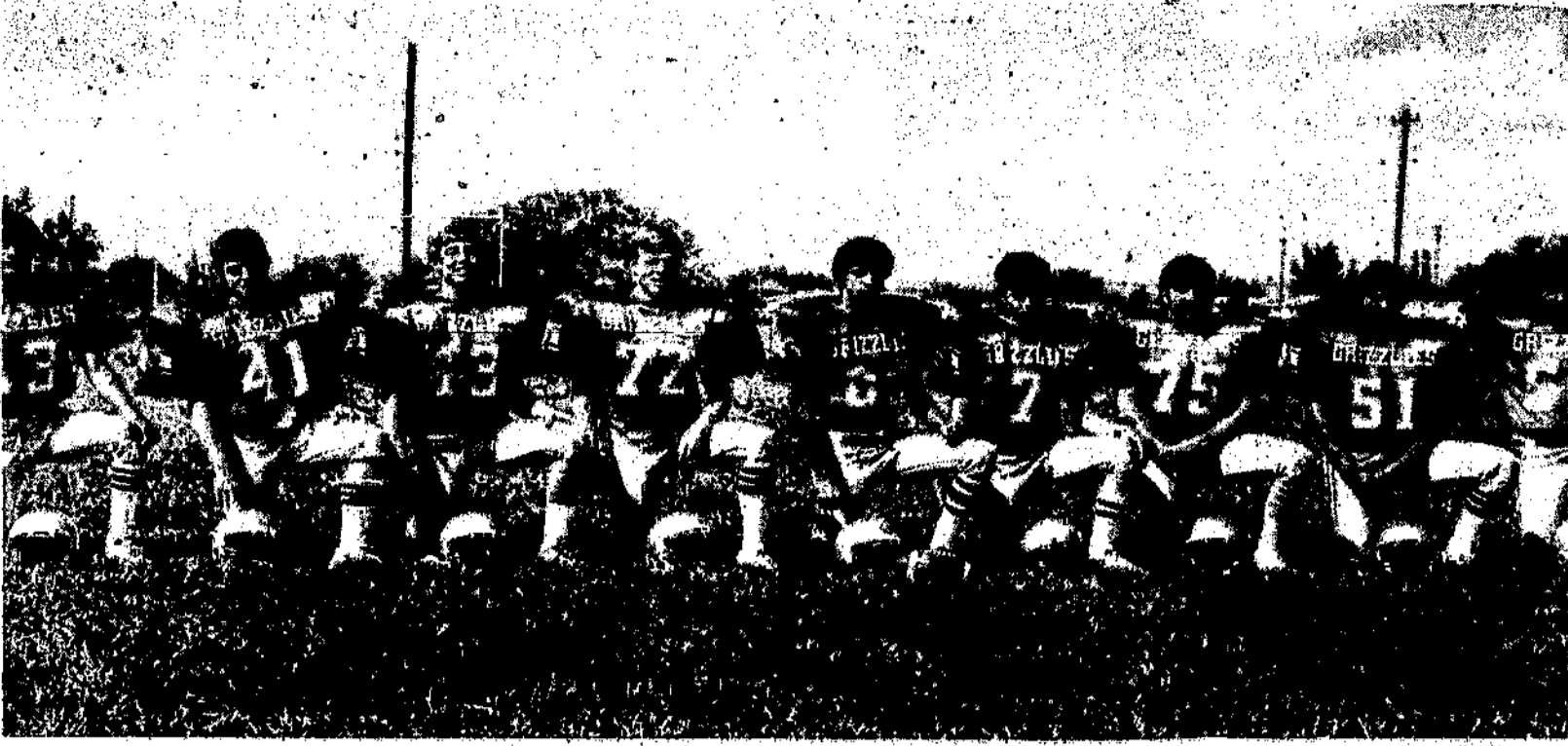

**Extension agents receive awards at National meeting**

LAS CRUCES — County Extension agents for New Mexico State University recently received awards at the National Association of County Agricultural Agents (NACAA) annual meeting in New Orleans, LA. The meeting took place Aug. 19-24.

Orion Utton, San Juan County Extension agent, was the recipient of the New Mexico Distinguished Service Award.

Gerald Chacon was elected second vice president. He was secretary-treasurer last year.

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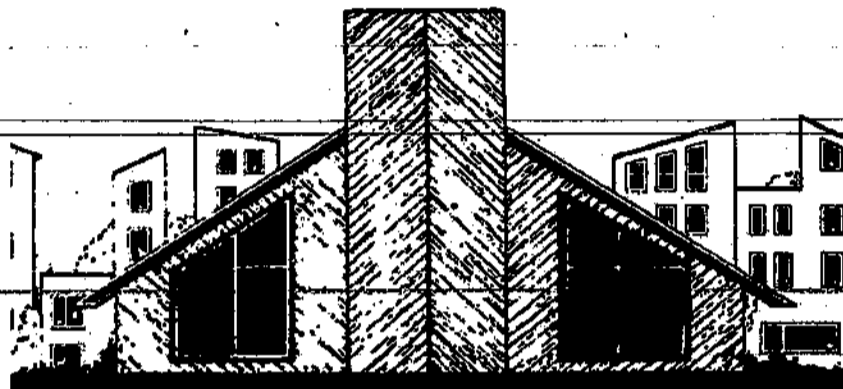
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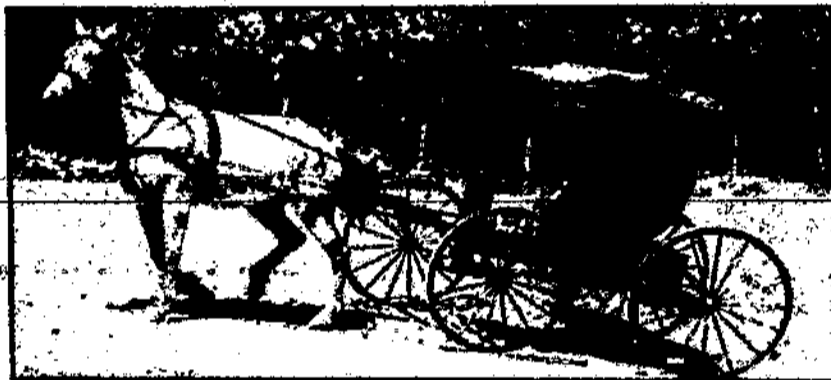
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# Corona Area News
