

County turns road project over

The job of rebuilding Gavilan Canyon Road will be turned over to the Village of Ruidoso. County Commissioners Kenneth Nosker and Bill Elliott voted to have Ruidoso complete the project and Commission Chairman John Hightower opposed it at a special meeting held Friday at the Lincoln County Sub-Office in Ruidoso.

This surprise move came a

week after county engineer Joe Shain resigned from the project. Shain had resigned when he said he felt his professional ethics were being questioned.

The original plans were to rebuild the road over a three year period because the county did not have the funds to do the rebuilding correctly in one year. Tests had shown there was no base course under the old pa-

vement and up to ten inches of base course was needed before an overlay could be done. Ten inches of base course was required so that the road would be able to withstand the freezing temperatures in winter.

Plans for the first year were to provide a good driving surface by eliminating the potholes and putting down a double penetration chip seal. Second

year plans were to correct and provide good drainage, add base course up to ten inches and another double penetration chip seal to protect the new base course and provide a good driving surface. A two inch overlay was planned for the third year. The estimated life expectancy of the road after completion was 20 years.

Cost of the rebuilding the

first year was to be shared with the county furnishing \$104,271 and the state furnishing \$150,000 for their share. The county planned to spend \$50,000 in cash and the remaining \$54,000 would be in 'in kind service'. The 'in kind service' was to be the labor provided.

Nosker said on Friday, '\$33,000 is gone and we still don't have a road. I don't see the

progress that we should have."

A joint powers agreement is being drawn up by the Village of Ruidoso. It will be presented to the county commissioners for their approval before it is signed.

Louis J. Medrano, district engineer with the New Mexico State Highway Department said they will see how much of the \$33,000 already spent will be allowed for the county's share on

the project. It is not known at this time if the county will assist the Village for the remaining \$54,000 that had been budgeted as 'in kind service'. If not, the county will have to come up with the money.

Medrano also said the road built by the Village should last, unless the area suffers unusual winters. In either case, all maintenance will fall back on the county.

After a closed session, commissioners announced they had hired a new county road superintendent. Earl Krieg of Ruidoso was hired for the position. Krieg has been a blademaster with the county since April of 1981 and has former experience with the Texas Highway Department.

According to District Attorney Mario Torres, embezzlement charges have been filed against former Lincoln County Road Superintendent Guy Henley.

A preliminary hearing will be held Friday, Sept. 14 in connection with the charges for making or permitting a false public voucher.

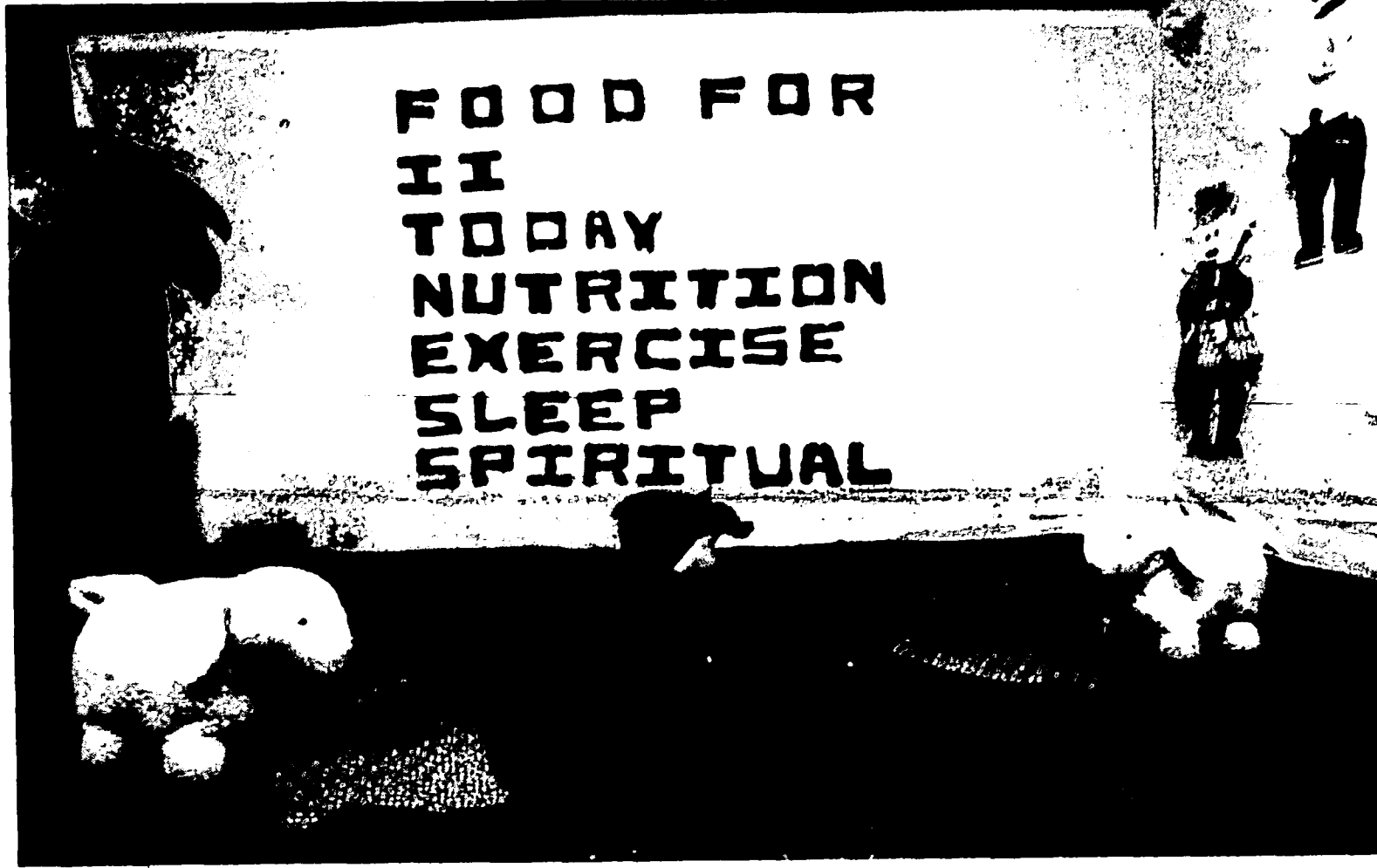

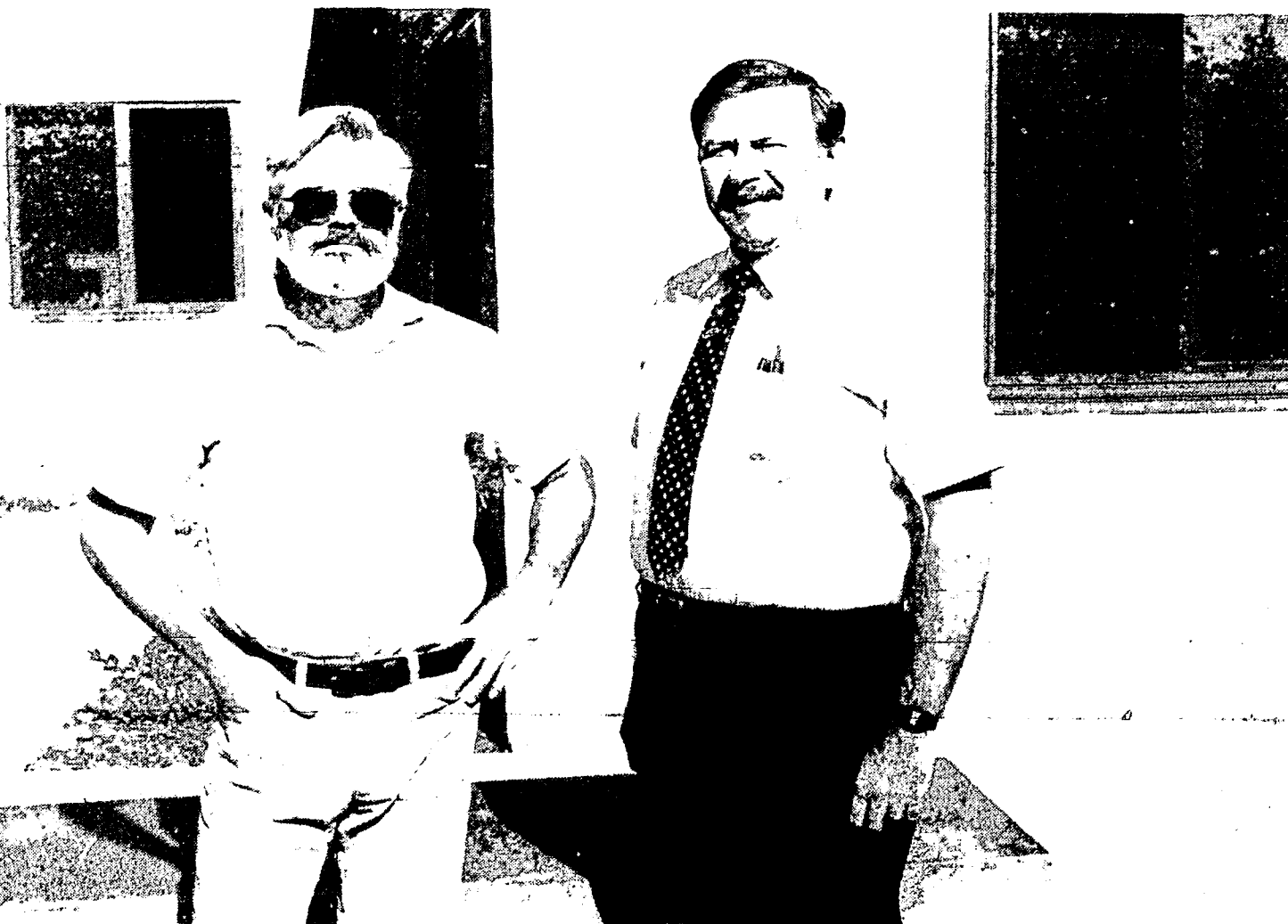

Chip seal to delay traffic on US 285

This week, a crew from the state Highway Department will begin resurfacing a 40 mile stretch of US 285 south of Vaughn in Guadalupe, Lincoln and DeBaca counties, District 2 maintenance engineer Worth Smelser said.

A chip seal will be used to resurface the area between US 60 and State Road 42, he said. The District 2 sealing crew will spread liquid asphalt on the existing road surface, cover it with gravel chips and roll them into the asphalt to form a new riding surface.

Weather permitting, the work should begin on Thursday, September 6 and be completed by Friday, September 21. The project will cost approximately \$260,000.

marked with warning and directional signs, he said. One lane will be closed throughout the three-mile long work area.

A pilot vehicle will be used to guide traffic through the single open lane. Motorists can expect a 15 minute delay when traveling this part of the road.

Smelser stressed the need for caution. Excessive speed and failure to follow signs can result in broken windshields and vehicles being sprayed with unset liquid asphalt.

The newly resurfaced road cannot be restriped until two weeks after the chip seal is completed. During that time, there will be no center line or shoulder stripe. Those driving through the project area at night should be particularly careful, he said.

SEEKS RECIPE

A column reader who misplaced an apple strudel recipe she had wanted to try out suggested that I locate a good, tried-and-true recipe for the German type pastry dish. She thought perhaps readers may have such a recipe and send one to me to feature in this column. I'm getting kind of tired of plain apple pie myself. If you have an apple strudel recipe send it to:

Meanwhile I attempted to find an apple strudel recipe through the extension office. Charlotte Hill went through the office files and found all kinds of apple recipes - except the strudel. She and secretary Rachel Rominger have tried the following recipe for apple-mince dumplings:

Ingredients needed are pastry for two 9 inch pie crusts or 1 (11 ounce) package pie crust mix; 1 cup finely shredded cheddar cheese; 6 medium apples for baking; three-fourths to 1 cup mincemeat; 2 tablespoons sugar; 1 tablespoon lemon juice.

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Combine pie crust mix and cheese, prepare according to package directions. Roll out on lightly floured board to 3/8 inch thickness. Cut into 6 (6-inch) circles. Wash and core apples; peel. Combine mincemeat, sugar and lemon juice; fill apple centers with mincemeat. Wrap apples in prepared pastry pinching edges to seal. Trim with leaves cut from any excess pastry. Prick pastry in several places. Place dumplings in greased baking dish. Bake 40

minutes or until apples are tender.

APPLE APPEAL

While on the subject of apples, Charlotte came across all sorts of facts on apples, plentiful during the fall and winter. The apple is believed to have originated in the region south of the Caucasus between the Caspian and Black seas. Classified by some botanists as belonging to a family of plants of which the rose is a member, the apple was first cultivated at the very beginning of agriculture in Europe.

Apples came into New Mexico with the Franciscan fathers while Spain still ruled the area. Near the town of Manzano (which means 'apple' in Spanish) in Torrance County, the fathers built a mission church about 1629 and planted an apple orchard nearby.

By the way, Charlotte Hill, who resides in Ruidoso has been 4-H Home Economist for the county since January. She has been busy helping 4-H'ers prepare for the fairs - county fair at Capitan; Eastern New Mexico fair in Roswell and the state fair in Albuquerque. Ask Dr. Dan

I received the flu vaccine last year and wondered if I need it again this year? A.B.

The answer is yes. The flu virus has undergone major changes in the past year and last years vaccine will not provide protection against it. High risk populations who should receive vaccination include 1) people with chronic heart and lung disease which requires regular medical care. 2) residents of nursing homes 3) medical personnel with extensive contact with people in the high risk group 4) people over 65 with chronic diseases (especially diabetes, anemia, kidney disease and cancer).

The best time to give vaccine is September through November. Only people with severe egg allergy should not receive the vaccine. No further cases of Guillain-Barre syndrome have been associated with flu vaccination since 1976.

Minor side effects include soreness and swelling at the vaccine site, low fever, muscles aches and feeling tired.

The vaccine is available at the Carrizozo Health Center and at the Lincoln County Health Department.

Social Services have reminded schools throughout New Mexico to report any case of child abuse or neglect.

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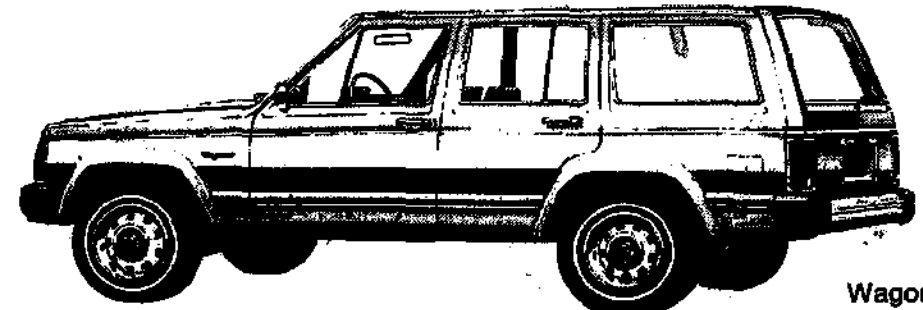


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Capitan News

WHAT IS PROBATE?

A lot of people worry about probate. Many have heard a number of "horror stories" concerning families and probate. Probate is a court proceeding to determine whether or not a person who died had a will. If the person had a will then probate will distribute the property according

to the will. If a person died without a will the Court will distribute the property according to the statutes for people who die without a will (see my column on "Do I Need a Will?").

In 1975 New Mexico adopted what is known as the Uniform Probate Code. This statute greatly simplified probate and made probate a quicker process.

If an estate has a value of less than \$20,000.00 and no real estate it is now possible to transfer the personal property without even having to go to court. If the estate has real estate that needs to be transferred to a survivor, then normally a probate proceeding must be done to ensure that the proper person receives the real estate and the real estate is free and clear of all debts of the estate. Normally a simple probate takes approximately 3 1/2 months to complete. Before an estate can be closed the Personal Representative (the term means executor, executrix, administrator, etc.) must publish in the newspaper a notice to creditors for them to present their bills against the estate. If the creditors do not present their claims within two months, then the claims are barred and the Personal Representative can distribute the property free and clear of creditors.

A lot of people fear probate because they think that a surviving spouse will be left destitute while the probate is in Court. This simply is not true. A surviving spouse or dependent children have a family allowance of \$10,000.00 and a personal property allowance of \$3,500.00 which is exempt from the creditors of the estate. A personal representative can be appointed one hundred-twenty hours after the death of the decedent or sooner if necessary.

The personal representative can immediately make distribution of the family and personal property allowance to the surviving spouse or dependent children.

There are ways to avoid probate. One way is to hold property in "joint tenancy". This means that the surviving tenant automatically owns the property upon the death of the joint tenant. However, there can be adverse income tax consequences for property held as joint tenancy and you should consult your attorney or accountant before deciding to use this device.

Another way to avoid probate is to use a trust. This is what Deacy advocates in his popular book, "How to Avoid Probate". I have found that the use of trusts have been very appropriate in some cir-

cumstances, but in others the cure (trust) is often more painful than the illness (probate). Again, you should contact your attorney before using this probate-avoiding device.

Probate serves a useful purpose. If it is necessary, it cuts off creditors against the estate. It allows for the inventory and orderly payment of debts of the estate and orderly distribution of the assets of the estate.

OPINION...

THE failure of President John F. Kennedy to liberate Cuba in 1961 set the stage for the present conflict in Central America where the Cuban- and Soviet-backed regime in Nicaragua alone threatens to topple El Salvador, Honduras, Costa Rica, Guatemala and neighboring nations into the communist community.

IT MAY take tens of millions of refugees crossing the Rio Grande to take American jobs, and the fall of the Panama Canal and oil fields of Latin America into Marxist hands to convince Sen. Kennedy and his "peace pals" in Congress to dig out Public Law 97-723 and give it a good reading.

IT SHOULD be of some embarrassment to Sen. Kennedy that Public Law 97-723 was passed by Congress and signed into law by his brother, President John F. Kennedy, on Oct. 3, 1962. This law binds the President:

"(a) to prevent by whatever means may be necessary, including the use of arms, the Marxist-Leninist regime in Cuba from extending, by force or the threat of force, its aggressive or subversive activities to any part of this hemisphere;

"(b) to prevent in Cuba the creation or use of an externally supported military capability endangering the security of the United States; and

"(c) to work with the Organization of American States and with freedom-loving Cubans to support the aspirations of the Cuban people for self-determination."

THE Cuban- and Soviet-backed regime in Nicaragua has the largest standing army in Central America, with more than 102,000 men in uniform. Cuba has 9,000 "advisers" there. Cong. Dante B. Fascell (D-FL), chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, says of this: "There is no question that the existence of Cuba as a Communist state backed by the Soviet Union is a political and a military problem for all the countries of this hemisphere."

THERE is it. The danger is real. President Reagan needs no approval vote in Congress to send money, material or even a full army into Central America. Congress has already "mandated" that he do so through PL 97-723, and issued a blank check to finance it. So why is the President pleading with Congress for the military aid Congress has already approved? Why is Congress refusing to permit the President to implement the law that has been in effect since 1962? And why don't the President and Members of Congress read their own law books? Does Speaker Tip O'Neill know about PL 97-723; and if not, why not?

SEVERAL years ago this column pointed out to startled readers that there is already in existence a federal law, passed by both branches of Congress and signed by President Jimmy Carter, requiring a balanced federal budget. A flurry of inquiries hit Washington and evoked this response: Yes, such a bill was passed and signed into law, but it doesn't mean anything because Congress never "really intended" to abide by its terms! Has Congress learned something from its Soviet counterparts—that it enact and enforce only those laws with which it happens to find useful at any given time?

OF WHAT value is the training, education and experience required to make a person an expert in his field? Do experts know what they're talking about? Does anyone believe me?

WHAT brings this up is the case of the ubiquitous Dr. Helen Caldicott, an Australian physician who specializes in pediatrics and may be presumed to be an expert in that field by virtue of education, training and experience. However, she is widely accepted as an "expert" in nuclear physics. On the other hand, there are many recognized experts in nuclear physics, such as Drs. Edward Teller and Peter Beckmann, neither of whom have credibility among followers of Dr. Caldicott. To enhance their credibility as nuclear experts perhaps Beckmann and Teller should start doctoring babies.

STRANGE how widespread is the notion that an expert in one's chosen field is only an expert in another. Eisenhower was an expert general so we made him an expert in running the country. Tom Hayden was such an expert as a terrorist that we put him in charge of running California. His wife was such a good actress she became an expert on Vietnam. Barry Keene was such an expert at nothing that he became an expert at being a state senator.

WE HAVE in Sonoma County more than 40 organizations dedicated to nuclear disarmament and to the abolition of all things nuclear. Not a member of any of these groups, I hazard, know the slightest thing about nuclear physics. But they consulted a pediatrician and got enough answers to make nucleomilitaphobics of them all. And not one of them, I also hazard, has ever asked Drs. Beckmann or Teller for their expert opinion on nuclear safety. Thanks to Caldicott & Co., the poor wretches probably won't even be asked how to treat diaper rash.

HERE'S just a partial listing of organizations operating here whose only knowledge of nuclear physics is that they fear it: The Campus Peace Action Coalition at SSU, Stop the War Machine at SRJC, Women's Action for Nuclear Disarmament, United Nations Assn. of Sonoma County, Sonoma County Life Coalition, Beyond War, Campus Coalition for Peace, Catholic Worker, Commitment Against Registration for the Draft, Citizens for Social Responsibility, Common Cause, Educators for Social Responsibility, Gray Panthers, Friends Peace & Social Order Committee, H.O.P.E., Human Service Workers for Peace, Lawyers for Reduction of Nuclear Arms, Nuclear Free Society, Nuclear Freeze of Sonoma County, Occidental Nuclear Education, Peacekeepers, Peace Network, People for Peace in Central America, Physicians for Social Responsibility, Sonoma Action for Nuclear Disarmament, SANE, Sonoma County Taxes for Peace, Peace Center of Sonoma County, Peace Network, Freeze Voter, World Federalists, Community Resources for Independence, Flower of the Dragon, Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, Audubon Society, etc.

NOTE how often the word "peace" crops up in the names of these organizations. This is to impress the impressionable that peace and anti-nuclearism are inseparable; that peace can only be gained by foregoing nuclear power. While peace movements are popular in the US, they are prohibited in the Soviet Union. Ironically, the modern US peace movement was conceived and financed in Moscow and exported to the US. Now why would the Soviet do this? If you don't know the answer, forget the question.



HERE'S A SMALL MATTER OF A \$65,000 GOAL... AND YOUR PART THAT MAKES IT WORK.

Editorial . . .

Lincoln County Commissioners held a special meeting on Friday. It was at this meeting that it was decided to let the Village of Ruidoso take over the work on Gavilan Canyon Road. We must note that Commissioners Kenneth Nosker and Bill Elliott were in favor and Commission Chairman John Hightower was opposed.

After being convinced that the best way to rebuild Gavilan Canyon Road was over a three year period to give the road a life expectancy of 20 years, it makes us wonder why the change in opinion to have the road finished as soon as possible. It also makes us raise the question of whether we want to have someone else do the job with no type of guarantee as to how long it will last.

The Lincoln County Road Department has worked on the Gavilan Canyon Road project 13 days and has already eliminated dangerous potholes and has provided a good driving surface until the overlay is applied. The original plans by the county were to spend two years working on the needed ten inches of base course. This much base course is required so that the road will be able to withstand the freezing temperatures in winter.

Louis J. Medrano, district engineer with the NM State Highway Department, said the road put in by the Village should last unless unusual winters cause damage to the road. We thought the idea of taking three years to do the road properly was to help the road withstand freezing temperatures.

Testing of work already completed on Gavilan Canyon Road show the county crews are getting 100 percent compaction. This is higher than average. According to the Encyclopedia Americana, "Highway surfaces wear out and must be replaced, but grading has permanent value and drainage structures last for a long time. When a surface is worn out, it still has value as a base for a new surface. One third or more of the cost of a new highway may be for improvements that will be of value for many years after the original surface is replaced." At this time the county has spent \$33,000 in cash and labor toward improvements that it was hoped would be of value for many years.

Specifications and standards need to be followed for the road improvements to meet the needs of the county. It is unclear at this time if Ruidoso will be required to meet the specifications and standards needed by the county on Gavilan Canyon Road. The difference between the streets built by the Village for residential use and a road that will receive heavy truck traffic also means a difference in specifications and standards.

It is clear that Lincoln County will be responsible for the maintenance and on-going repairs on Gavilan Canyon Road. It would seem that with the county being responsible for the road that the county would have a stipulation in the joint powers agreement that regular inspections will be made by the county. It would also seem that the county would oversee the work to assure that the work is done to county specifications.

Until the joint powers agreement is presented to the county it is not known if the \$54,000 may be paid by 'in kind service', which is labor by the county, or if the \$54,000 will have to be additional cash. It might be wise for Lincoln County taxpayers to attend the next commissioners meeting on September 20 to ask these questions.

If 'in kind service' is used, then what is the advantage of having Ruidoso do the work? If 'in kind service' is not used, then where will the money come from for the additional \$54,000?

We were convinced that the three year plan was the best way to get the work done efficiently and effectively. Now we are told that the county does not have the expertise to do it.

One thing is certain. When a skyscraper is being built, the workers do not start with the top floor. They start at the foundation and build it the best they can to hold up the weight and stress that will be required.

A road should receive the same type of planning. A good foundation is needed for the weight and stress that will be put on it. Testing has shown that county crews have been doing a good job. Why change direction now?

Most people think all you have to do is grade the ground and blacktop over it and you have a perfectly good road. This is not true. A good compacted road base is 99 percent of a good road job.

Lincoln County taxpayers should attend the Commissioner's meeting on Thursday, September 20 and ask if the road put in by Ruidoso will last 20 years as was planned when the county crews were doing the work. They also should ask if it doesn't, just how much extra it will cost in taxpayers dollars to rebuild the road in a few years.

The object should be to continue with a good working force and know what is under the road instead of taking the chance that new Commissioners a few years from now will have to rebuild the road again.

Pennsylvania Delegates: Bush should debate Ferraro

DALLAS — A poll of 41 of the 98 Pennsylvania delegates to the Republican National Convention here reveals that nearly twice as many of them want Vice President Bush to debate Democratic nominee Geraldine Ferraro as oppose such a debate.

The poll, conducted by this writer for WWDB in Philadelphia, had 20 delegates in favor of such a Bush-Ferraro debate with 11 opposed and 9 delegates who replied: "That's up to George."

One of the delegates — Governor Richard Thornburgh — replied: "That depends on a lot of things: time, place, conditions, negotiations, etcetera, etcetera, etcetera."

Another delegate asked: "How do you know it will be Geraldine?"

As a second question, the delegates were asked about the Presidential and Vice Presidential debates: Should the agenda in effect be set, in that the questions are all asked by the media? Or instead, should the candidates themselves raise the questions, under a moderator? Seventeen of these delegates expressed a preference for a moderator instead of the media; fifteen delegates expressed a preference for a combination, media as well as moderator; six delegates preferred the media, while three declined comment.

One delegate said: "The media are tainted; they are slanted toward the Democrats."

A final question in this poll concerned Pennsylvania delegate Paul Zimmerman of Bucks County.

Zimmerman was one of only two delegates to the convention who refused to vote for anybody during the roll call of nominations for President and Vice President. This attracted considerable media attention. He explained to reporters that his action was motivated by what he contended was the convention's refusal to allow debate on his cause of nuclear freeze (which had been discussed at length during the platform hearings.)

Zimmerman also identified himself as a screenwriter who wrote "The King of Comedy," starring Robert deNiro and Jerry Lewis.

The front page of The Dallas Morning News — which used to be a conservative newspaper — included a story by reporter Carl Leubsdorf which identified Zimmerman as a "party moderate." When asked if they agree with this description of Zimmerman, four of the Pennsylvania delegates agreed — even though they, and all but one other convention delegate (from Illinois) voted for Ronald Reagan. (Delegates from Nebraska and Georgia also broke ranks for the Vice Presidential nomination in favor of voting for Rep. Jack Kemp and U.N. Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick.)

Several of the Pennsylvania delegates said that they did not know Zimmerman and would therefore find it difficult to judge the man and that in any case he has a right to his opinions. Ten delegates declined to comment. But among 27 delegates who disagreed with the Dallas newspaper's description of Zimmerman as a "party moderate," several of them

exercised their right to express an opinion in describing this screenwriter as:

"The left fringe...Goofy...Rather extreme...A party nothing...A party idiot...A one-issue man... Completely out of the party... He acted out of personal gain to attract media attention to himself."

On the issue of whether Vice President Bush will ever debate his rival nominee, Ferraro, Mr. Bush himself held a news conference during the convention, where 500 reporters who attended were instructed that the only questions they would be allowed to ask must be on foreign policy.

So, when recognized for a question by Mr. Bush, I asked:

"Mr. Vice President, how can the Reagan Administration reasonably expect the government of El Salvador to maintain the ideal of Equal Justice Under Law, if, in our own country, Rep. George Hansen of Idaho is allowed to go to prison for having done essentially the same things as Nominee Ferraro in failing to report spouse's income? And why are you unwilling to accept Ferraro's challenge to debate as the President has accepted Mr. Mondale's challenge — as foreign governments are surely wondering?"

The Vice President joined the laughter and then added: "Only Lester Kinsolving could come up with such a twist of a foreign policy question — just as we were about to get out the hook for you."

Bush then began a discussion of El Salvador — which had no mention whatever about Congressman Hansen, his fellow Republican. The Vice President

finally got back to the question of why he is ducking the opportunity to debate Nominee Ferraro. He did not offer any explanation whatever as to why he continues to run in the opposite direction. He simply explained that this has nothing to do with foreign policy. (Why not? Aren't Vice Presidents supposed to be informed about foreign policy? Or is their expertise in this area supposed to be confined to funeral etiquette?) He said that he would deal with this question at another news conference that is not devoted to foreign policy.

Sure. He may deal with this issue on Wednesday, November 7 — if the media let him get away with it.

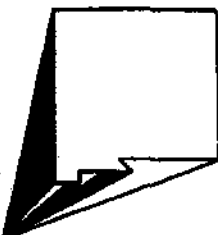
The Conventional Wisdom is that he has nothing to gain and everything to lose, since she is a former prosecuting attorney, who is both eloquent and tough. If Bush were to be as firm with her as with a male rival, he would be regarded as a brute. If he were to be gentle, he would be regarded as patronizing — and she would react with well-honed ferocity.

But the process of government in this country is determined by debate. And the public has understandably valued the opportunity to watch rival candidates for high public office go at each other — in providing an inimitable contrast by which voters can evaluate those competitors, under fire from each other.

Bush may be able to run — but he can't hide. If he tries, the ridicule will very probably grow worse than whatever could result from his taking her on.

SANTA FE — The most important aspect of a political action is often its side effects. We in the media don't always do a good job of reporting on those.

It's what comes of our fascination with "the big picture" and the pressure of frequent deadlines. Because of those, we sometimes miss what may be the main story. Take that war over choosing a new president for the University of New Mexico. We miss a lot if we only concentrate on the fate of some man invited out here to be interviewed for the job: or the picture of a petulant Governor stamping his foot and demanding — his way — or the ineptness at public relations of the regents on one side of the issue or the other.

Those are all discouraging enough, but the real harm may lie elsewhere.

WOUNDS: It's hard to keep a university community together in the first place. Built into any family of intellectual strivers is a kind of centrifugal force which tends to send the parts flying off in all directions even when they are expected to be at rest.

Complicate that with an emotion-filled issue like the one which swept over the folks at UNM during the past few weeks and you can end up generating chaos.

Chaos, it hardly needs saying, is not the preferred atmosphere in which to educate, and that, when all is said and done, is still the major function of a university.

But the ripple effect goes even further.

FUND-RAISERS: Just at this particular moment, a collection of some of the state's more productive citizens has been working out strategy for raising the money for an exceptional educational effort.

This would be a kind of Institute for Advanced Study, specializing in the sciences and engineering and located in New Mexico. To bring it into being, these people who care about the future of the state have begun the arduous task of collecting about \$200 million, all of it to come from private sources, to serve as an endowment for this institution.

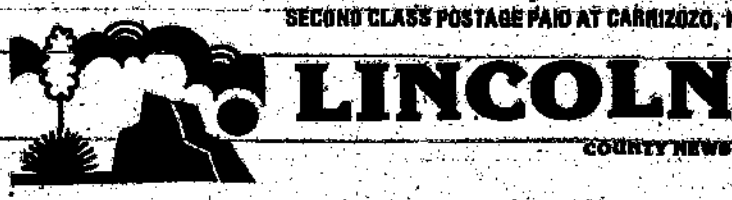

'NOTHING USEFUL'

We send Red China the most modern steel-producing technology, on "free" credit, and they send us knit shirts and wicker baskets that can be bought cheaply by unemployed US steel workers. Never let it be said that America gets nothing useful from the Communist nations.

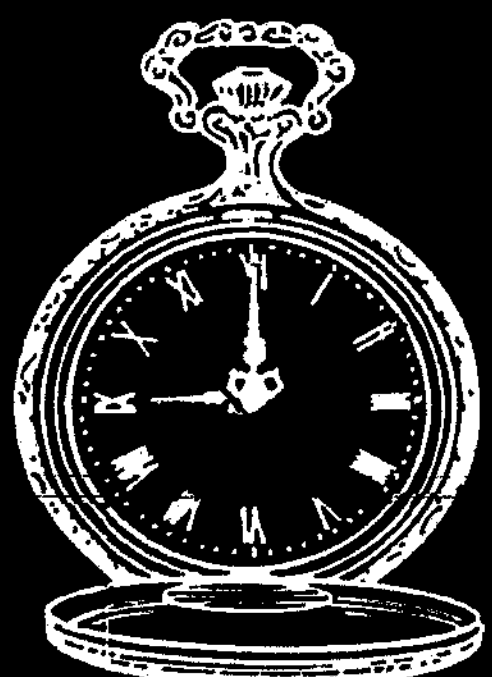

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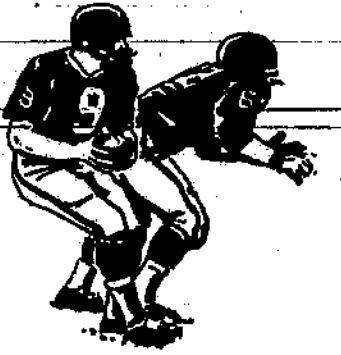

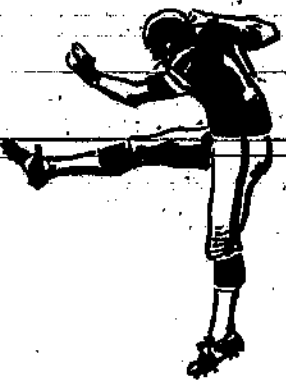

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Carrizozo Grizzlies open season with 43-6 rout of Hatch Bears

Carrizozo opened its 1984 football campaign with a mid-season performance and rolled to an easy 43-6 victory over out-classed "AA" Hatch Friday night. Senior running back Steve Stearns got out of the starting blocks by hustling open a 70-yard scamper on the second play from scrimmage to start the Grizzlies rolling in the first quarter. Kenneth Crenshaw ran over the two-point conversion—and the rest was downhill for the local team.

linebacker Daniel Zamora forced Hatch to punt on fourth down and Stearns returned it back 50-yards to the Hatch 20-yard line. On second down (QB) Dominic Vega found wide-receiver Joseph Candelaria at the 2-yard line. On the next play Stearns found the end-zone for his second TD of the quarter. PAT kick attempt was no good and Carrizozo had a 14-0 lead with 7:17 still left in the opening period.

Hatch's next attempt to get a drive mounted

was thwarted when Grizzly defensive lineman Mike Grant intercepted a tipped pass at the line of scrimmage and ran it in for an apparent 55-yard touchdown—only to have it called back on a clipping penalty.

After gaining a first down C'zozo faced a fourth-down and nine on Hatch's 34-yard line. Stearns hustled loose on a 25-yard scamper and the Grizzlies were in business at the Hatch 9-yard line. Two plays later found Junior running-back Kenneth Crenshaw

powering his way into the end-zone to put the Carrizozo team up by the count of 20-0. A pass from Vega to (20) Hal Roueche for the PAT made it 22-0 early in the second period.

Carrizozo started their next scoring march on their next possession at the Hatch 45-yard line. Dominic Vega then hit (43) Gray Gallacher on a pass which carried to the Hatch 10-yard line. On fourth-down and-goal at the 2-yard line Crenshaw rambled in for his second 6-pointer of the night—4:55 to go in first-half and Grizzlies up by 28-0 after PAT failed.

Stearns capped the Grizzly first-half scoring spree at the 0:41 mark of the second period with a 1-yard TD plunge for his third score of the night. Crenshaw added the 2 point PAT for a 36-0 advantage.

The Grizzlies began the second-half by scoring on their fifth play after receiving the kick-off. (QB) Dominic Vega scampering in from the 15-yard line. (34) Tommy Escamilla kicked for the PAT and C'zozo was up by 43-0.

Grizzly coach Dennis Siedbottom started substituting freely after that and Hatch finally managed to get on the scoreboard with 6:42 left in the final period—making the final score 43-6.

Siedbottom praised his offensive line of Mike Curtiss, Donald Zamora, Grey Gallacher, Benny Zamora, Charles Zamora and Robert Connors for dominating the line of scrimmage.

On the stat side the Grizzlies managed 344 total yards—with Stearns rushing for 145 yards, Crenshaw added 45 yards and Vega chipped in with 35. Vega also completed 5-of-10 passes for 119 yards. Joseph-Candelaria caught 3 passes for 56-yards while Grey Gallacher and Tommy Escamilla caught one each.

Siedbottom was pleased with his improving defense and singled out linebackers Daniel Zamora and Charles Zamora for a great game.

This Friday the Grizzlies will host the Ft. Sumner Foxes at Laabs Field (game time 7:30 p.m.). Ft. Sumner opened their season by romping over the Moriarty JV by the count of 40-0.

Other area football action saw Tatum beating Capitan by a 40-0 score. In what was a bit of a surprise saw Texico escaping from Cloudercroft with a close 7-6 decision over the Bears. Either the Wolverines aren't that strong—the Bears are stronger than we thought—or Texico got off to their usual slow start like they have in the last 4 or 5 years. We'll go with the latter. Capitan with a tough schedule will entertain the Wolverines this Friday (game time 7:30 p.m.).

Following the Tatum game the Tigers went through a tough practice Saturday morning and enter the Wolverine contest with no injuries.

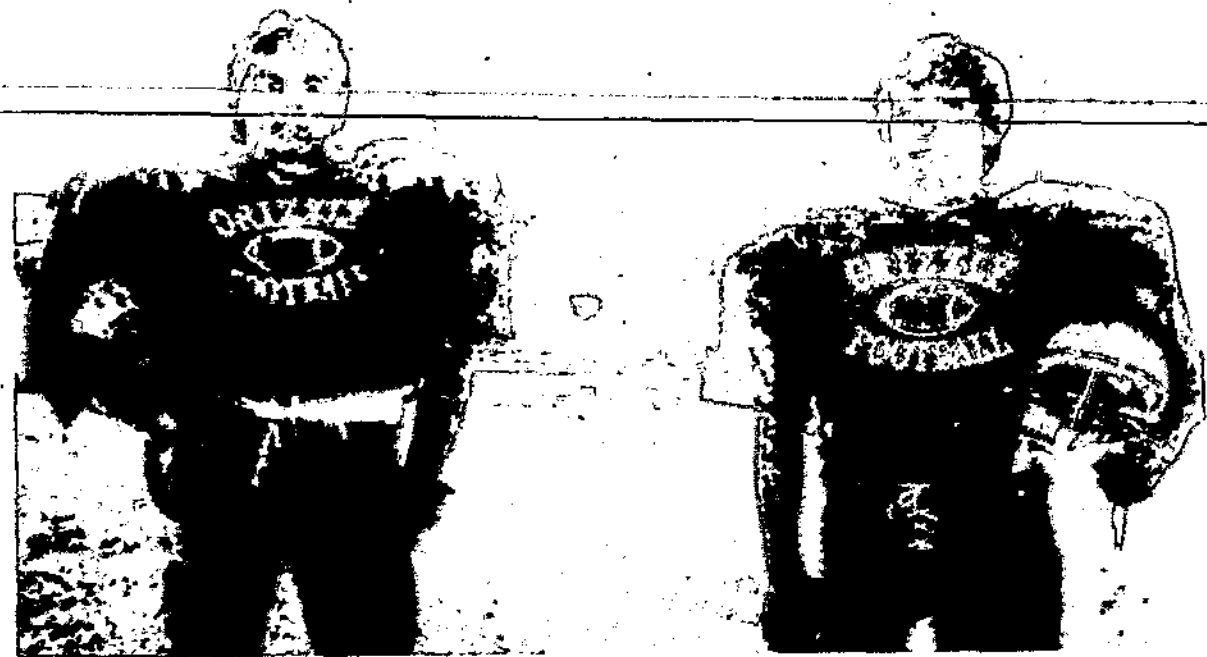
The junior high football boys have a game scheduled Sept. 20 in Hagerman. Game time is 6 p.m.

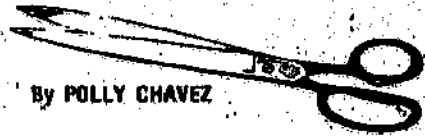

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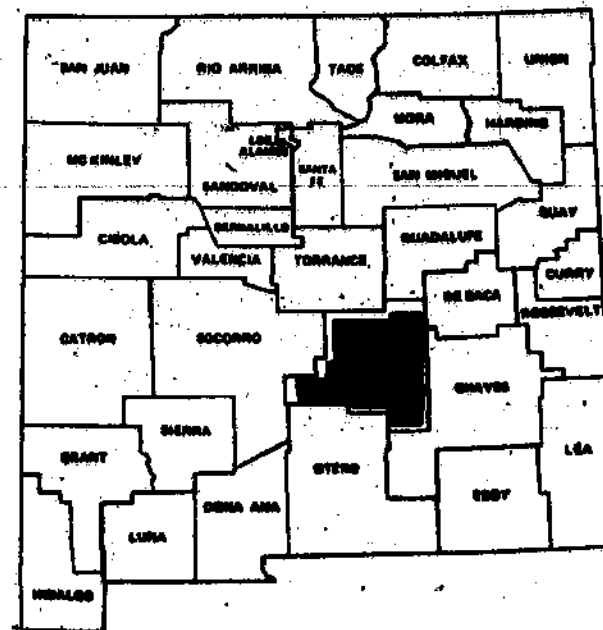



RESOLUTION
WHEREAS, the 1974 Session of the New Mexico State Legislature adopted House Bill 63 which was subsequently signed by the Governor and became Chapter 91, Laws of New Mexico, 1974, and,

WHEREAS, Chapter 91 requires that "all meetings of a quorum of members of any board, commission, or other policy making body of any state agency, or any agency or authority of any county, municipality, district or any political subdivision held for the purpose of formulating public policy, discussing public business or for the purpose of taking any action...are declared to be public meetings open to the public at all times..." and,

WHEREAS, Chapter 91 also provides that "no resolution, rule, regulation, ordinance or action of any board, commission, committee or other policy making body shall be valid unless taken or made at a meeting held in accordance with the requirements of S-1 of this Act." and,

WHEREAS, Chapter 91 provides that any person violating any of the above cited provisions is guilty of a misdemeanor and may be punished by fine of one-hundred dollars (\$100) for each offense.

BE IT RESOLVED by the governing body of the TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO, that:

1. Notice shall be given at least 5 days in advance of any meeting of a quorum of the members of the Governing body or any board, commission,
