Republicans win big

Lincoln County joined the rest of the nation in the Republican sweep by voting

mostly Republican. Only two contests in the county were won by Democrats and one of these was overturned in another

county. Sheriff Tom Sullivan took the race for County Sheriff by 67 percent. Wilton Howell was the

winner in Lincoln County for State Senator - District 39 with a margin of 343 votes over opponent James Lee Martin but

Martin gained enough in Socorro County to come out the winner. The excitement of watching the returns was evident in the

courthouse when the positions of County Commissioner District 1 and 2 were back and forth between the opponents as each

precinct reported results.

A total of 5,285 votes were cast from an eligible 6,662 for an unusual 79.3 percent for the county. County results were:

President Reagan won over opponent Mondale with 77 percent.

US Senator Pete Domenici took 85.3 percent of the votes over Judith Pratt.

US Representative Joe Skeen netted 85 percent of the votes over Peter R. York.

Maurice Hobson will continue as State Representative - District 52. Reynaldo Cordova was unsuccessful in his attempt to unseat Hobson.

Other District winners, Sandra A. Grisham, District Judge - Division I; Robert M. Doughty II, District Judge - Division II; Richard A. Parsons, Sr., District Judge - Division III, and James J. Weldon, District Attorney.

Kenneth Nosker will continue as County Commissioner - District 1 with 47 percent of the votes. Ralph Dunlap brought in 43.5 percent and write-in Pat Ward had 9.5 percent.

A. W. Gnatkowski had 51.1 percent of the votes to win the position of County Commissioner - District 2 over Frankie Silva.

Bill Elliot was unopposed for County Commissioner-District 3.

Fran Siddens had 68.2 percent of the vote for County Clerk.

Special vote questions on the ballot were decided. The Hospital Mill Levy passed with 68.5 percent. The Educational Bond Act (Cont'd on P 2)

COMMISSIONERS PROCLAIM

EMT Week November 10-17

The week of Nov. 10 through Nov. 17 has been proclaimed as Emergency Medical Technicians Week in honor and appreciation of the contributions made by the volunteer Emergency Medical Technicians.

The EMT's contribute much to the safety and welfare of the people residing in and passing through Lincoln County and this was the reason given by county commissioners at their Oct. 30 meeting for designating EMT Week.

Commissioners also gave final approval to the Subdivision Regulation Amendments. The Planning and Zoning committee has worked on the amendments for several months before the final public hearing was held by

commissioners.

Sections affected by the subdivision amendments were: definitions, advertising standards, commission review conference plat, street design, road dedication, preliminary road acceptance, final road acceptance, road design, road requirements, urban residential density, mobile homes, and lot design.

The amendments had come before commissioners a few months ago and several people attended the public hearing and objected to changes. This time there was no public input and the amendments passed.

Other business:

—Commissioners appointed Modesto Chavez to the Planning and Zoning Commission to take

the place of Wes Grigsby.

—Joint powers agreement was signed with the Village of Ruidoso for work on Gavilan Canyon Road.

—Medical practice agreement was signed with Dr. Dale Goad. The contract providing dental services includes an increase of less than five percent.

—Data processing agreement with Triadic Enterprises, Inc. was signed for a three year term with prices to be reviewed every year.

—County Manager Suzanne Cox said the legislative Council wants to use the Lincoln County Ambulance system as a model.

—Cox had received a letter from the New Mexico Legislative Council saying they were im-

pressed with their tour of the courthouse "from the computer system to the jail."

—Rhoda Gutschke of White Oaks, requested drainage be provided for her washed out

driveway. A culvert has been ordered and she wanted a temporary fix until it gets here.

—A workshop was held with new county road superintendent Bob Harcrow. Harcrow is retired

from 30 years with the highway department in Roswell. Harcrow was hired for the road superintendent position when Earl Kreig resigned to return to being a blade operator.

\$576.82 for CF

A total of \$576.82 was raised by 7 bikers who participated in the Carrizozo Bike-A-Thon. Carol Schlarb, Chairperson of the Bike-A-Thon offered her sincere thanks to area citizens for their generosity.

Governor tours Fort

Governor Toney Anaya made an official visit to Fort Stanton last Friday. The purpose of his visit was to assure employees they would continue to have a job, even if the facility was no longer being used for developmentally disabled persons.

Anaya had been at Fort Stanton just over two years ago as a candidate but this was the first time that Fort Stanton has hosted a Governor.

Anaya toured the hospital and state training school before meeting with the employees.

When the Governor saw some of the work the patients do and some of the products that are offered for sale, he asked if the Fort gets complaints from private businessmen about the competition.

Fort Stanton Administrator Mark Delgado answered, "To the contrary. The local business people offer an outlet to sell the items."

In addition to seeing the clients in the workshops doing slow and tedious work, Anaya visited a cottage that houses the profoundly retarded. From there he went to the education hall where students are taught self help skills and gross motor skills.

At the conference, the Governor told the employees, "I made a pledge to visit our various institutions." He went on to say, "I am here as a continuing pledge to you to try to determine what it is we need to do."

He said the second reason he was there was to discuss the future of Fort Stanton, whether it would continue to provide the same type care or different.

For the foreseeable future, he told them, the work they are now doing is not in jeopardy.

Employees have been concerned about their jobs for more than a year now. It was announced last year that Fort Stanton would close and the facility was to be turned into an

alcohol abuse center.

Legislators objected to the closing and agreed to fund Health and Development budgets. ONLY if Fort Stanton was to remain as it was.

According to Anaya, the Fort is basically out of compliance with federal codes and our own state code. Court settings mandate that clients be placed in the least restrictive environment.

Even though courts mandate the placement of clients, Delgado told the Governor that 52 of the last 125 clients have been recommitted to Fort Stanton as being the least restrictive en-

vironment.

The patient load at Fort Stanton has increased from 110 to 127. The formerly unmet social needs are being met at the Fort with the majority of the clients being recommitted to Fort Stanton.

The Governor did say a federal accreditation team would be visiting Fort Stanton in an attempt to accredit the institution. He went on to say that if we are going to have less demand for the present use of the Fort that it is wiser to make plans to accommodate the employees skills in whatever alternative use might be continued.

STAND-IN FOR LEJ
A controversial portrait of the late President Lyndon B. Johnson, which brought artist Peter Hurd into the national spotlight two decades ago, might not have been possible without retired rancher J. O. "Bud" Payne of Carrizozo.

For it was Payne who spent the better part of 12 days in 1964 posing in Hurd's studio as the "body and hand" for the presidential painting.

"In fact, the whole bit except the head on the shoulders is mine," Payne said.

Now retired, Payne, 65, lived in the Hondo Valley for many years just down the road from the Hurd family.

"I was a good friend of Peter Hurd's," Payne said. "He had painted me before for a cover of 'Country Gentleman,' which ran

in 1963, I believe. I was standing out in the field with a shovel, working on an irrigation ditch."

When Payne returned to the Valley in 1964 to help clean up the Hurd Ranch after a flood, the artist asked him to pose for the soon-to-be famous portrait of the president.

Payne said he is not sure why he was chosen, except that "I'm a big man, 6 feet, 4 inches."

"He had me stand there with that book in my arm off and on for 12 days. It looks easy to stand there and hold a book for an hour or two, but I'd move my arm just a little bit and he'd have to come and reset it."

Payne believes the finished product "was excellent."

"The reason Johnson didn't like it was that it looked too much like him," Payne said. "It was the best picture that was ever done of him... It even gave him an intelligent look."

The portrait made national headlines when Johnson called it "the ugliest thing I ever saw," and refused to have it hung in the White House.

The White House Historical Association had commissioned Hurd to do the portrait at Johnson's request, but Payne contends Hurd "never got his money out of it."

After all the publicity over the painting, offers came in from across the country, including one of \$16,000 from a Hobbs bartender, but Hurd refused to sell, Payne said.

Today, the portrait is in the permanent collection of the National Portrait Gallery of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, DC.

Payne said he enjoyed many years of freindship with Hurd and said the artist had "a great sense of humor. I never saw a man with such a sense of humor. He could always find something funny about anything." —Roswell (AP) By Betty Williamson, Roswell Daily Record.

ANOTHER ARTIST
Two letters in the Lincoln County News, October 21, 1976 tell how Bud Payne was inspired to try his hand at painting by watching Peter Hurd at work. (Hurd passed away earlier this year. Hurd was afflicted with Alzheimer's disease in 1977 and had resided in a Roswell nursing home.)

A painting, 'Trinity Site', by Payne found a new home after being on display at the courthouse. Payne, a Lincoln County Commissioner at the time was sent a personal thank you from the executive director of the International Hall of Fame, where Payne sent the painting.

Payne said in his reply to the director: "Just watching Pete Hurd, a great artist and friend inspired me to try my hand at painting. Pete Hurd asked me if I would stand in for a painting he was doing of Lyndon Baines Johnson when he was president. I accepted and was well awarded with a painting of my old ranch home north of Capitan where I lived when the first "A" bomb was exploded."

HONDO VALLEY ARTIST

School librarian Julia Hollis, aware that I am always interested in reading about art and artists, informed me that the library has a new book - 'My Land is the Southwest' (Peter Hurd letters and journals). The book, which spans 50 years of Hurd's life, is edited by Robert Metzger. For his work on the book Metzger made research trips to Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania, Texas and New

Mexico, where he lived for a time on the Hurd's Ranch.

The letters and journals reveal the experiences that led Hurd to art and fame as a painter of the Southwest, where he built his own ranch in San Patricio and raised a family. His wife, Henriette, is herself a distinguished painter and daughter of N. C. Wyeth. Hurd studied painting in Chadds Ford, PA under Wyeth.

The letters trace Hurd's

apprenticeship under Wyeth; his romance with Henriette; the Hurd's family life in both Pennsylvania and New Mexico; Hurd's love for the Southwest;

and his philosophy of art. The book describe his famous portraits of King Faisal of Saudi Arabia and of President Lyndon Johnson.

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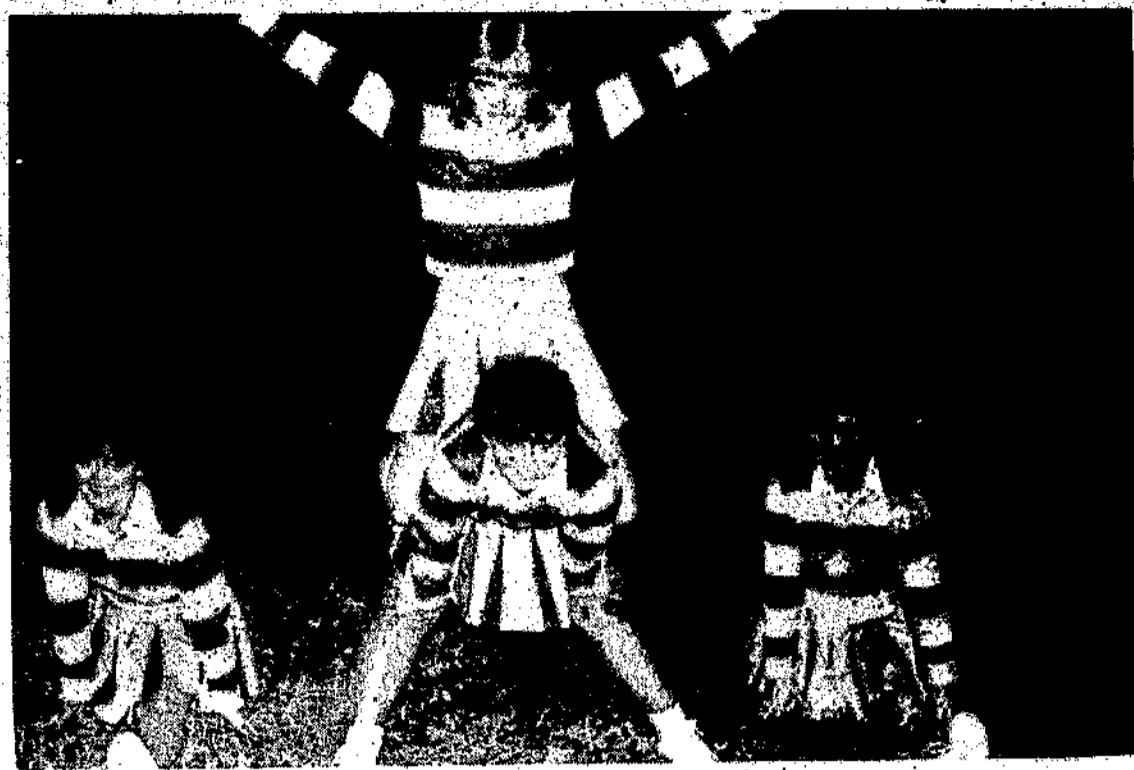

Use a salad plate instead of a dinner plate. It will make your food portions seem larger. Cut food into small pieces and eat very slowly. It will make your food last longer.

MAKESHIFT FUNNEL
Remove the bottom of an empty plastic liquid detergent bottle. The funnel is handy for pouring liquids from one container into another one.

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Some of the nutrients in canned vegetables are in the liquid, so be sure to use it to heat the vegetables. Save any excess liquid to use for making gravy or sauce.

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'The hunter & the landowner'

Every year during the hunting seasons, there are confrontations between landowners and hunters on the issue of trespass rights, and this year will be no exception. The seriousness of this issue has risen to such a degree that it has become a real problem and dangerous situations have occurred as a result of hunter-landowner confrontations. Let's take a look at this problem.

In the first place, a little over 60 percent or almost 47 million acres of land in this state is privately owned. The landowner has the right to control access and the use of their private land the same as you as a homeowner have the right to say who can come into your house. In the past, much of this land was open to hunting, but each year more and more "No Hunting" and "No Trespassing" signs are appearing on private land. Why? Because the landowners have encountered problems with hunters in the past. Hunters have not closed gates, shot signs, windmills and livestock, and left litter behind. In addition, there is

an increasing economic value in hunting. Trespass rights for hunting on private land can be worth anywhere from \$200 to \$5000. This extra income has caused many landowners to control access on their private lands.

The decreasing amount of private land open to hunting has resulted in more hunters utilizing state and federal lands within New Mexico. There are over 31 million acres of state and federal lands, most of which are open to hunting, fishing and other recreational uses. These lands are intermingled with privately owned land and this often leads to some confusion. People trying to find new hunting areas often have difficulty in determining land ownership and public access to state and federal lands. Some of these lands are completely surrounded by private lands and no public access exists so they are unavailable to hunters. Also, in some cases landowners and grazing lessees have illegally posted or denied access on public roads to these lands. All this has resulted in hunter-landowner confrontations each year. What is the solution to this problem?

agencies will be cooperating to assist both the sportsman and the landowner. Maps showing both land status and public access routes have been printed and are available at Bureau of Land Management offices in Carlsbad and Roswell and at the Game Department office in Roswell. There are five maps covering much of the southeastern part of the state at a cost of \$2.00 each. Also, contact stations will be set up at Hamilton Station, Hope and Dunken to answer questions and respond to problems. In addition, there will be county law enforcement officers, conservation officers and Bureau of Land Management personnel patrolling all areas to try to reduce game violations and hunter-landowner confrontations. Anyone who does have a problem during this year's hunting seasons needs to

contact the Game Department, Bureau of Land Management or a county sheriff's office. This year, make the seasons run smoothly, respect the land, other people and wildlife to help insure hunting for future generations.

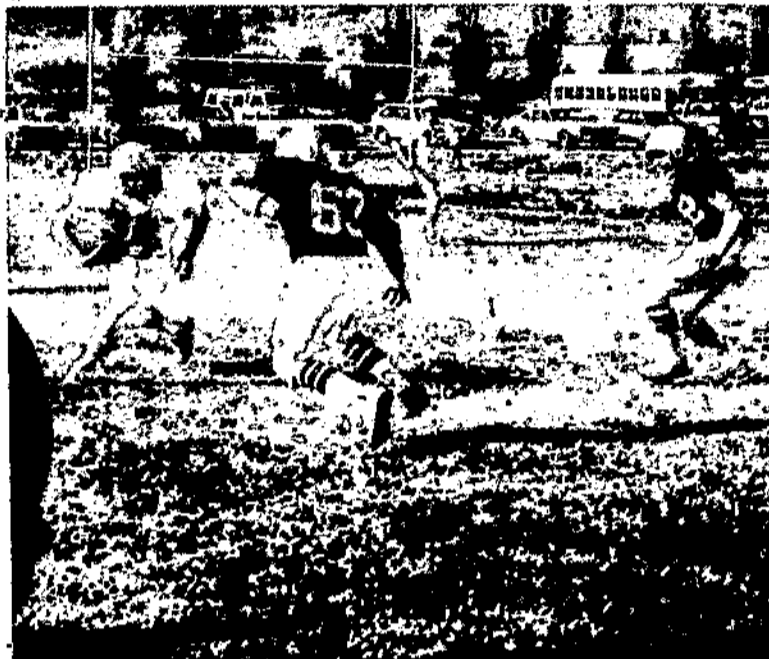

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Pershing missiles to be fired

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, NM, Nov. 5—Officials at White Sands Missile Range have announced the firing of four Pershing 1A missiles on November 13. The missiles will be fired from McGregor Range, Fort Bliss, Texas, by the Federal Republic of Germany Air Force and will impact on the Missile Range. Support will be provided by artillery troops from Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

The first two missiles are scheduled to be fired at 8:30 and 9 a.m. Safety roadblocks on US Highway 54 will be set at 7:50 a.m. at Newman, Texas and Orogrande, New Mexico. The

roadblocks will be lifted following the flight of the second missile.

Plans call for the other two missiles to be fired at 11 and 11:30 a.m. The safety roadblocks on US Highway 54 will be set at 10:20 a.m. in the same locations. They will be lifted after the second firing.

The purpose of the firings is to provide troop training.

Development of the Pershing missile began in 1959 and the first missile was fired from Cape Canaveral in 1960. The Pershing was deployed in Europe in 1964 and was replaced by the improved Pershing 1A in the late 60's. Since the first firing in 1960 over 400 Pershing missiles have been fired at various locations in the United States.

If the four Pershings cannot be fired on November 13 the test will be rescheduled for November 15. If this is necessary, traditional deer hunting areas outside the west and north sides of the range will be closed and evacuated for safety reasons. The areas would be opened as soon as the fourth missile was fired. SANTA FE, NM—Department of Game and Fish officers will be available in the northern part of the state Nov. 7 and in the south Nov. 14 to change licenses of deer hunters who want a hunt period different from the one they originally chose.

Hunters with licenses validated for rifle may choose

any one of five hunt periods—two in the south and three in the north. Seasons are Nov. 16-18 and Nov. 24-30 in the south; Nov. 10-11, Nov. 16-20 and Nov. 24-30 in the north.

Final deadline for changing validations is the day before opening of the hunt period for

which the license is validated, and only department personnel may make the changes. Officers are often difficult to reach just before and during hunting seasons, when they are typically in the field, so hunters are urged to take advantage of the Nov. 7 and Nov. 14 change dates if possible.

License changes may be made at Department of Game

and Fish offices in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Raton, Roswell and Las Cruces during regular office hours (8 a.m. to 5 p.m.) until deadline date. On Nov. 7, changes may be made at the Santa Fe and Albuquerque game department offices from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. and at the Raton office from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. On Nov. 14, changes may be made at the Las Cruces and Roswell offices from

8 a.m. to 5 p.m. In the southeast area on Nov. 14: True Value Hardware in Fort Sumner, Fortales City Hall, police departments in Ruidoso, Lovington and Artesia; sheriff's office in Carrizozo, and State Police offices in Clovis, Alamogordo, Carlsbad and Hobbs, all noon to 6 p.m.; Rock Lake Rearing Station in Santa Rosa, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

I have noticed a small white patch inside my mouth for several months. It does not bother me any. I am 45 and smoke 2 packs of cigarettes daily. Should I have this checked out? O.C.

The most likely explanation of this white patch is the abnormal growth of the skin cells due to chemical irritation from the cigarette smoke. The medical term for this is leukoplakia. This can be pre-cancerous and should be examined by your physician. Smokers are much more likely to develop oral cancers. This increased risk of cancer includes pipe smokers, cigar smokers, snuff dippers and tobacco chewers. The only treatment for leukoplakia is to stop the use of tobacco and any other oral irritants. (such as poor fitting dentures).

A vasectomy is a relatively simple outpatient surgery done under a local anesthetic. The small cord which carries sperm from the testicles into the base of the penis is tied off and divided into two. This prevents sperm from being ejected and makes the man sterile (unable to make babies). However, no effect on sexual drive or ability to have an erection is caused by this simple procedure.

Complications may include infection or bleeding. The operation is very effective and tests of the ejaculate after several months can tell if it was successful. A full discussion of the details of the surgery and the familial implications of becoming sterile should be undertaken before having the operation. Urologists, general surgeons and many family practitioners can do this operation. Consult your family doctor for a referral if he does not do the operation.
