# Plaques awarded to county officials

County Manager Suzanne Cox presented plaques to elected county officials during the county commissioners meeting Tuesday. Cox said, "County government is unique. All the department heads are elected." She then presented plaques to County Assessor Julia Samora,

County Treasurer Kay Allison, County Clerk Jane McSwane, Sheriff Tom Sullivan, former District Attorney Steve Sanders, County Commissioners John A. Hightower, Bill Elliott, and Kenneth Nosker, Probate Judge John W. Thompson, and District Judge George Zimmerman. District Court Judge Robert

Doughty introduced District Judge-elect Richard Parsons, Court Clerk Margo Lindsay, district attorney-elect James Weldon, and investigators for the district attorney's office John Herrera and Leandro Vega. Doughty told commissioners, "We are proud of the newly created judgeship here." He


went on to say, "I think you will benefit from a resident district judge." Doughty suggested changes for the judge's chambers and asked the county to help with carpet and adequate lighting. Commissioners assured him that the work has been started. In other business:

—Resolution No. 73-15 was signed, asking the Legislature to increase State Emergency Medical Services Funds.  
—Appointed Jerry Locke and David Lee to the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board. The terms for the newly appointed members will be for two years and begin Jan. 1.

—Modesto Chavez petitioned to have a road opened by the county. Appointed to a road review committee were Ralph Dunlap, Frankie Silva and Pat Ward with Emil Strohmeier as alternate.  
—In answer to the Highway Department request for program priorities, commissioners listed

Gavilan Canyon road as number one. Carrizo Canyon road as number two and Cedar Creek and Sun Valley roads as number three.  
School bus routes receiving priority are the 4.1 miles east of White Oaks and two Corona routes.  
—A two year lease was signed with New Horizons Development Center, Inc.  
—Bid for banking services was accepted from Moncor Bank.  
—Bid of \$12,946.24 was accepted from Richardson Ford for a 1985 Ford Bronco four-wheel drive vehicle. The Forest Service will provide \$10,000 toward the purchase of the Bronco. Commissioners agreed to adjust the budget for the additional \$2,946.24. Specifications called for the vehicle to be assembled in North America, according to state statutes. Two bids for Chevrolet Blazers were rejected because they did not meet specifications of at least 350 cubic inch displacement.

—Final plat approval was given to Johnson Stearns for Karrville Subdivision.  
—Final plat approval was given to Cedar Creek Ranchettes Subdivision.  
Letter of appreciation was sent to Christobal B. Zamora for help in getting the fire truck for the Glencoe-Palo Verde fire district.  
Memorandum of Understanding was signed with New Mexico Forestry for the 1961 International Harvester Fire Engine.  
Approval was given for rules of procedures and regulations for the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board. Robert's Rules of Order will be used in conducting LHPB meetings.  
It is the responsibility of each landowner to obtain a copy of the LHPB Ordinance No. 841 and become knowledgeable of its contents. Two or more board members shall conduct an on-site review prior to the issuance of a Certificate of Appropriateness. Once the certificate is issued, the applicant is allowed six months to complete the project. A six month extension may be granted upon request.  
The LHPB is allowed 60 days to act from time of submission of plans. It is recommended that plans be submitted 10 days before a regular meeting. Reasons for granting or refusing a certificate shall be in writing. A certificate may be approved in part and denied in part.  
The committee recommended that a periodic update of rules and procedures be made.  
The 1983-84 fiscal year audit and mid-year budget review was accepted.  
Letter of appreciation was sent to Carrizozo Municipal School to express gratitude for assisting with the Christmas decorations for the Courthouse.  
Commissioners inspected the jail. It is required that the jail be inspected twice a year.  
Residents of the Bonito Fire District requested more equipment and work on the roads. Complaints of large berms in front of side roads, private drives, and the firehouse were voiced. Residents said the snowplows left the berms and it made passage impossible.  
Commissioners agreed berms should not be left in front of the fire department. It was decided that a possible solution would be for the road superintendent to have a map of the location of all Emergency Medical Technicians showing where they live.  
—Bill Karn, Village of Ruidoso, asked that a letter of support be sent to the state. The Village has requested \$750,000 in direct appropriations for Gavilan Canyon Road, Carrizo Canyon Road and other Village roads.  
—An executive session was held with county attorney Steve Sanders on litigation.

LINCOLN, NM — Few crimes are as perplexing to investigators as homicides. And while most murderers are generally brought to justice, the identities of some continue to elude police.  
In the case of a double homicide in Lincoln County, the murderer's identity is still unknown.  
On Tuesday, November 13, 1984 at approximately 6:00 p.m. Thomas P. McKnight and his wife Judy were both shot to death at their residence 20 miles south of Picacho in Lincoln County, NM.  
According to investigators, the victims were last seen alive by a friend at 4:30 p.m. on November 13. On November 15 at approximately 10:00 a.m. the homicide was reported to the

Lincoln County Sheriff's Office by a friend of the McKnights who found their bodies. Both had been shot once in the chest and then each was shot in the back of the head after they fell to the floor. McKnight and his wife were both found lying face down on the kitchen floor.  
This week New Mexico State Crime Stoppers joins with the Carrizozo Crime Stoppers in offering up to \$1,000 for information that can lead to an arrest and indictment of the offender in this case.

## Taxes to change

Combined gross receipts tax rates will increase in a number of locations in the state on January 1, 1985, when local option taxes become effective. Also on January 1, new income tax withholding tables will go into effect.  
The gross receipts tax will rise by 3/4 percent in Bayard, Capitan, Cimarron, Clayton, Fort Sumner, Questa, Red River, Ruidoso Downs and Taos. These municipalities have imposed both a 1/4 percent municipal gross receipts tax and a 1/2 percent special municipal gross receipts tax to become effective January 1.  
The tax rate in Los Lunas will go up by a full percent due to imposition of both a 1/2 percent municipal gross receipts tax and a 1/2 percent special municipal gross receipts tax. The Town of Carrizozo has implemented both taxes by 1/4 percent increments, to increase the combined rate by 1/2 percent on January 1.  
The following municipalities implemented a 1/4 percent municipal gross receipts tax which will go into effect on the first of the year: Alamogordo, Belen, Bloomfield, Carlsbad, Cloudercroft, Cuba, Espanola (in both Santa Fe and Rio Arriba counties), Gallup, Jemez Springs, Las Cruces, Lordsburg, Mosquero, Silver City, Springer and Tularosa.  
The Village of Tatum implemented a 1/2 percent municipal gross receipts tax, and the City of Las Vegas imposed a 1/4 percent special municipal gross receipts tax.

With the exception of Lordsburg and Mosquero, all the municipalities implementing a regular gross receipts tax increase on January 1 are taking advantage of 1983 legislation which raised the limit on that tax from a total of 3/4 percent to 1 percent, to be imposed in 1/4 percent or higher increments. That legislation became effective July 1, 1984, allowing municipalities to adopt ordinances increasing the tax to a total of 1 percent, with an effective date of January 1, 1985.  
With the January 1 increase, Lordsburg and Mosquero impose a total 3/4 percent municipal gross receipts tax.  
Legislation creating the special municipal gross receipts tax was enacted by the 1984 Legislature. Revenue from this tax, which may be imposed in 1/4 percent increments, up to 1/2 percent, must be dedicated for infrastructure improvements.  
In addition to these municipal taxes, a county fire protection excise tax of 1/4 percent becomes effective in Colfax County on January 1. This tax affects only unincorporated areas of the county.  
Revised state income tax withholding tables also will become effective January 1. There has not been a change in the income tax rates, but the withholding formula is being revised because of changes in the federal withholding formula, according to Taxation and Revenue Department Secretary Vickie Fisher. Current state withholding tables are based on

the federal tables, the amount withheld for state tax is a percentage of the amount of federal withholding.  
With the new state tables, withholding is based on wages rather than on federal withholding. This revision was necessary to prevent state withholding tax from being affected by the change in the federal tables, Fisher explained.  
The 1985 tables will be used by employers for payroll periods beginning after January 1. Although the tax rates have not changed, the amount withheld may vary somewhat due to the different method of calculation and to rounding of dollar amounts, said Fisher.  
Employers and employees who have any questions about the new withholding tables may contact the Revenue Division district office nearest them or call toll-free within the state 1-800-432-5511.

## SANTA'S PAST

Today's plump, red-suited Santa Claus is a familiar figure throughout much of the world. But behind this well-loved symbol of the yuletide season is a not-so-familiar story that goes back more than sixteen hundred years to a charitable bishop of Asia Minor.

Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, who was born in the third century, became one of the best-loved saints in all Christendom. He was famous for his generosity, and people came to believe that any surprise gift came from him.

The name 'Santa Claus' developed from a European source. Dutch settlers in New York called St. Nicholas 'Sinter Klaas'. Americans loved this kindly symbol and called him Santa Claus. Many of the habits now connected with him actually come from symbolic characters in Europe.

For example, the belief that Santa Claus enters the house through the chimney developed from an old Norse legend. The Norse believed that the goddess Hertha appeared in the fireplace brought and good luck to the home.

In 1823, an American minister and poet, Clement C. Moore, first described Santa's fur-trimmed suit and his sleigh with reindeer in a poem 'A Visit from St. Nicholas', later called 'The Night Before Christmas'. American children today have no trouble believing that Santa Claus can carry a huge pack of toys down even the smallest chimney.

## ZWIZZLE ZIP

A hot drink hits the spot on a chilly night. Try a mug of Zwizzle Zip with doughnuts or sugar cookies. You'll need: One quart (4 cups) cranberry juice; one large can (12 ounces) frozen lemonade; half a teaspoon ground allspice; 2 cups water; cinnamon sticks.

**DEAR Mr. Santa Claus:** I regret to inform you that your services are no longer needed. Formal dismissal action is being taken, and you will be notified by the appropriate federal agency. I just thought you should hear it from me first.

**THIS is not to denigrate your contribution to human happiness over the past 1600 years.** Let's face it. Times have changed. This wholesale distribution of gifts has, in this country at least, been pre-empted by state and federal governments. You must be aware that for myears Uncle Sam, hereinafter referred to as US, also goes by the name of Santa Claus. Changed conditions and burgeoning population require that Christmas giving be done on each day of the year, something you, your elves and eight reindeer cannot accomplish. Too, your paltry gifts of apples, nuts, neckties, candy and cheap toys are inconsistent with the more sophisticated and extravagant tastes of our 250 million people. Unfortunately for you, your practice of leaving gifts only to good and deserving children is contrary to public policy in that it discriminates against those who, through no fault of their own, are bad. US has determined that it is neither moral nor legal under recently enacted law to so discriminate.

**YOU are also dropping gifts in Rhodesia without government approval, and you have some explaining to do for having supplied that kid in Albuquerque with a copy of "Little Black Sambo."** The EPA's anti-pollution team is investigating the incident or reindeer droppings in the punch bowl at an outdoor Christmas Eve party in Miami last year. Really!

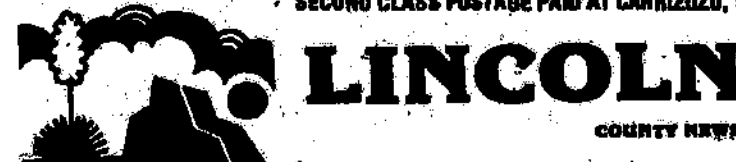
**THE real reasons for discontinuing your services is not only your many infractions. First, the Carter Administration applies its human rights program selectively and elastically. Only your good heart, good intentions and respect for past performance has saved you from condemnation. Second, your operation is antiquated and non-automated. You can no longer meet the competition of federal, state and local governments that "gifted" the American people to the tune of \$286 billion during 1975. By 1976 our Santa Claus-by-Government had more than 1,000 different federal agencies engaged in gifting even more to US's many supplicants. The modus operandi must boggle your mind. The system is called "redistribution" of the entire national wealth. It consists of picking the pockets of working, producing citizens and stuffing the loot into the stockings of the non-producers. It makes your one-man operation look as silly as Littian Gish in the ring with Mohammed Ali.**

**YOU have done the best you could. Your centuries of dispensing joy and happiness to so many is not forgotten. Which is why you are not in jail already. We are not unaware of your early days as Bishop of Myra, in Asia Minor. At that time you solved the murder of three children whose bodies were hidden in barrels of salt. Nor are we insensitive to your kindly intervention in the affairs of a rich man who, through his generosity, lost his fortune and could not provide dowries for his three daughters. Without dowry no girl could marry, and would be forced into a sinful life. Your goodness in restoring the dowries from the coffers of your church is evidence of a good heart. It was also embezzlement, but no matter.**

**THROUGH the years you have served as the special guardian of children, maidens, merchants, sailors—and even thieves; and as patron saint of Russia, Greece and many European cities. One of your great contributions is the three balls that identify pawnshops; symbolic of the three murdered boys and the three rescued maidens. Good work, but you are well past the mandatory retirement age. When we put our most experienced qualified and gifted citizens out to pasture at 65, what excuse do we have for keeping you on at the age of 1600?**

### Homosexual blood donor in Australia kills 4 babies with AIDS

WASHINGTON—From Australia comes the atrocious news that four babies have died after receiving blood transfusions from a bloodbank which has been contaminated.

This terrible news would be a tragedy except that the word atrocity is more apropos. For the Australian authorities learned that in Brisbane a 27-year-old male homosexual has been donating blood. And this creature also donated AIDS — which killed these babies.

Neither the Australian Embassy in Washington nor any of the wire services have been able to identify this man, whose orientation to sodomy led him to contract this lethal disease. But the records show that while he was making himself an available conduit for this killer epidemic, he continued to make blood donations — 15 in the last three years.

Why is there no news from Australia that this sodomist has been arrested and charged with at least manslaughter, if not murder?

The Australian Embassy notes that in view of 18 of the 28 patients with AIDS having died already, there is emergency legislation in progress which forbids donation of blood by any homosexual.

And while this is at least a step in the right direction, why on earth aren't the Australian authorities seeking legislation which allow them to arrest any homosexual who is known to be promiscuous?

We quarantine "Typhoid Marys." And AIDS is deadlier than typhoid fever. How many babies and other innocent people are going to die of AIDS because the Sodomy Lobby insists in the name of "gay rights" on what is in reality monstrously wrong and terribly dangerous to the health and lives of the public: the "cruising" with which homosexuals spread this terrible disease.

In Washington, the Secret Service has just revoked the White House pass of a 31-year-old male stenographer because he is

a security risk. But Killian Brumfield Swift has retained a lawyer to fight this because, he contends, he is not a security risk — since: "I made no secret I was gay."

This is indeed an interesting concept of Presidential security. This sodomist stenographer — in the absence of any reported intention to cease bugging of assorted males — is a prime possibility as a transmitter of AIDS to the White House.

If this isn't a threat to Presidential security, then there is no difference between AIDS and Bandaid.

We have all heard the clamor for alleged homosexual rights. What about these homosexuals wrongs.

Is it possible that the Australian authorities are concealing the identity of this AIDS distributor because they are afraid of his being lynched?

Lynching is an absolute horror. But so are homosexuals who deliberately spread this epidemic because they refuse to stop cruising.

At the State Department — which does not automatically exclude any sexual orientation in its hiring — I asked if they will follow the lead of the White House — "or have you developed some way to protect your personnel from AIDS."

State Department spokesman John Hughes replied: "I'll be glad to look into this."

Last year the State Department had two serious scandals, in which its personnel were involved in homosexuals prostitution.

When will they clean out all sodomists from the State Department? And when will we begin quarantining all homosexuals whose cruising is a transmission belt for this killing epidemic.

In the New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center, Dr. Jeffrey Laurence reported in The New England Journal of Medicine:

—Six newborn infants in New York have contracted AIDS from

their mothers, who were either intravenous drug abusers or had sexual partners who were.

—In New York and New Jersey, forty-two babies have contracted AIDS.

—Nationally, more than six thousand people have contracted AIDS — more than half of whom have already died.

Here, Rep. Jerry Studds (D., Mass.) will continue in office. He was reelected by a three-to-two margin over a Republican candidate who chose during the campaign to avoid mentioning Studds' censure by the House for having seduced one Congressional male page and having attempted to seduce two others.

Steve Schwadron, Rep. Studds' administrative assistant, was asked:

"Has Mr. Studds at any time since his censure stated or indicated that he is giving up his homosexual activity?"

"I don't know," replied Schwadron. "I've never asked him about that. I've never heard him say."

"If the Congressman contracts AIDS, will he resign, or at least stay away from other members of Congress?"

"I think this conversation can end right now!" retorted Schwadron angrily. "Goodbye."

House of Representative Parliamentarian Bill Brown, when asked if the Office of the Attending Physician has the authority to place a Congressman in quarantine if he has a contagious disease, replied: "There is no such rule in the House Rules at present. But the House has the power to legislate with respect to its members and could, in such an instance, adopt a special rule."

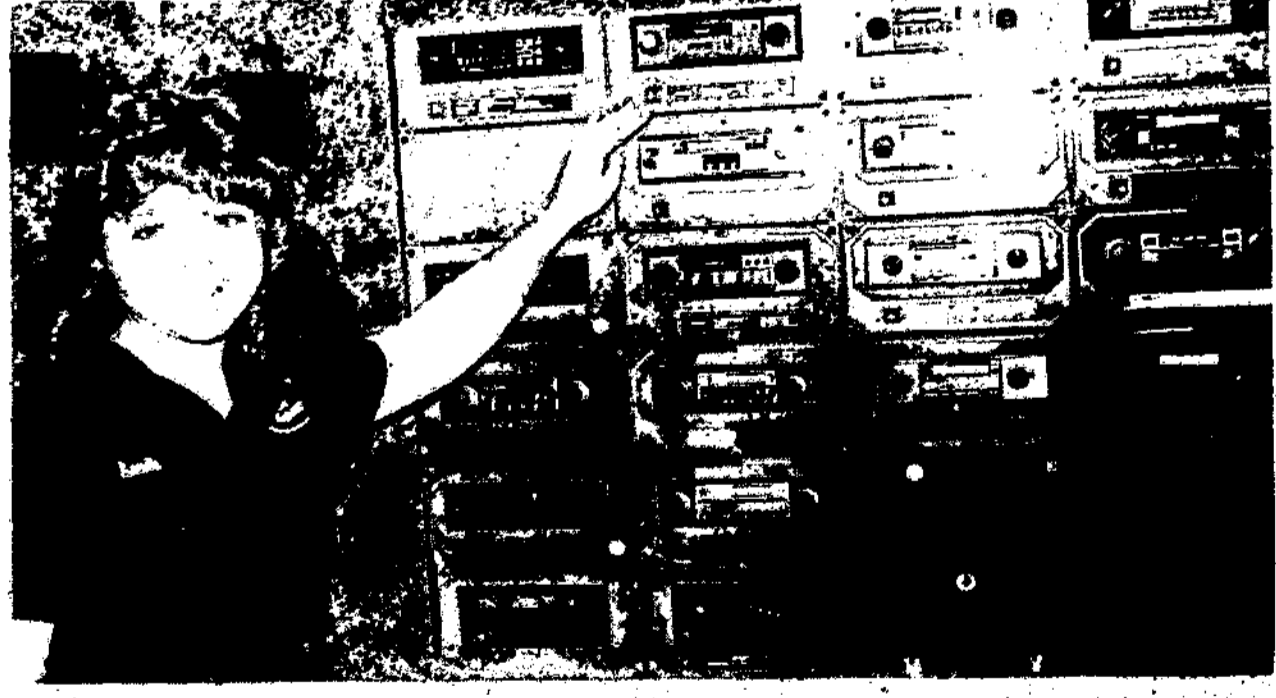

# Ask Dr. Dan—

I have emphysema and would like to stop smoking but can't seem to stop. Could you help me with this problem? N. A. There is no one single answer to the problem of stopping smoking. Smoking related disease is the single largest

preventable cause of early death in America. Some estimates are that 4,000,000 deaths per year are caused by smoking. The primary reason that smoking is so difficult to stop is that the nicotine in tobacco is

extremely addicting. The main factor in successfully stopping this destructive habit is motivation to quit. There are multiple reasons why people smoke, including stimulation, handling, pleasure, a crutch for tension reduction, craving (additional) and habit. Each of these can be dealt with by specific techniques. It is helpful to discuss your smoking habits with your doctor and try to analyze the reasons why you smoke. A smoking diary will often be useful in this record.

Many people rationalize why they can't stop smoking. The damage is already done is a common belief. However, repair of the damage starts as soon as smoking stops. "I'll gain weight" is another common complaint. This can be controlled with stress reduction and substitution of other oral behaviors such as chewing gum.

The positive aspects of stopping smoking are greater than just improved health. Taste and smell will improve and food will be more enjoyable; others will find your breath and clothing to smell fresh rather than like stale cigarette smoke. Your smoker's cough will go away. Ability to exercise will improve and endurance throughout the day will increase.

After understanding your reasons for smoking and making the commitment to stop, there are several steps to take to improve your chances for success. Set a quit date at a time when stress will be low in your life. Cut down the number of cigarettes you smoke. Before lighting up, ask your self

if you really need this cigarette. Draw up and sign a written contract with your doctor or

spouse. List why you want to quit and when you will. Enlist the support of family members and

friends. Start an exercising program before quitting. This will help alleviate stress during the early phase of quitting. Learn some relaxation techniques and practice them. Be aware of the physical symptoms of withdrawal that usually occur during the first 3 to 4 days after quitting.

Keep repeating the positive reasons for quitting to yourself when getting through the first difficult weeks after stopping. If you fall at this time attempt,

don't give up hope. Many ex-smokers failed numerous times before finally succeeding. Avoid the temptations to have just "one" cigarette after quitting. Avoid situations that are likely to tempt you into smoking again such as a party full of smokers.

Always remember that no matter what it takes to accomplish quitting, it will be worth it for your good health.

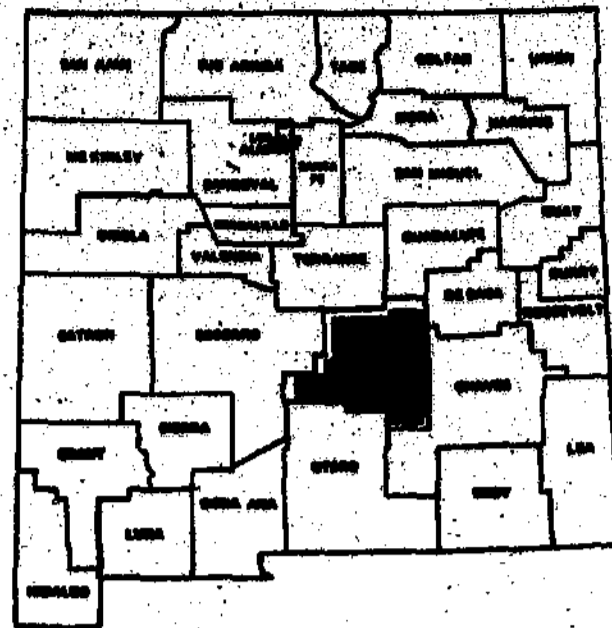

# Inside the Capitol BY FRED McCAFFREY

SANTA FE—Political "taps" are not illegal. It's extortion that is.

It's a point worth making in New Mexico's present political climate.

Many citizens are evidently uncomfortable over the thought that an elected official or his or her delegate would approach any firm doing business with the state to generate a political donation. But that's not against the law, any hue and cry based on that belief is more or less irrelevant.

What is illegal—and what two state officials have been indicted for—is extortion. That's present only when there is a clear offer of a quid pro quo and a threat that unless one party does one thing the other party will not

do the second. You know: "If you don't make this contribution, you won't get the state business promised you."

**BIG COMPANIES.** In addition, it is against the law for corporations to contribute money to individual candidates in political races. Such corporations are, however, allowed to give money to political parties, and that can include group efforts such as, say, the 'Republicans' campaign for all their legislative candidates.

Lobbyists for those corporations, of course, or for trade associations to which the companies belong are free to make contributions to individuals running for office, and they often do so.

Those are not the questions which trouble most people.

From their conversation, most citizens seem to question another point: Isn't there some kind of implied extortion when any state official asks a supplier for a contribution, even when nothing is said about refusal affecting future business with the state?

Most seem to feel such a firm would feel threatened, no matter whether an overt reference to loss of business is made.

If so, can a contribution given under those circumstances be truly termed "voluntary"?

Maybe not. Maybe nobody should ever be put in the position of having to make such a choice. But the fact is that handling the matter in this fashion, absent any real reference to what may happen if the supplier says no, is apparently perfectly legal.

And it has, of course, gone on forever—probably back to the time of the intention of what we know as "political campaigns."

**SEEKING A CURE:** In light of all this, several people have recently called for some kind of legislation to limit the number of such occurrences or to forbid them altogether.

That's not easy to do.

How do you forbid a firm which wants to give a contribution, maybe just on the off chance that it might do some good, from making one without interfering seriously with that company's rights?

One thing which may have become clear in New Mexico recently, if those state officials did in fact make some kind of threat, is that not everyone understands what is allowed and what is forbidden.

As for those who work for him, the Governor ought to see that the limits are made clear in such fashion that we will see no further violations.

Extortion is not only illegal, it's also unforgivable in a public official.

## Deer season results in heavy fines, various violations

SANTA FE, NM—Rifle seasons for deer, which closed Nov. 30, brought a variety of violations and unusual cases.

Seven of those cases resulted in \$12,435 in fines and another \$2,900 in civil assessments.

The seven cases involved 13 individuals, including one juvenile. Animals involved included one elk, two buck deer, 11 does and one fawn. Nine illegally cut Christmas trees were also found, said Jim Vaught, chief of law enforcement for the Department of Game and Fish.

Charges brought against defendants included illegal

killing and possession of deer and elk, criminal trespass, evading an officer, and hunting during two seasons.

Fines and civil damages assessed against individuals ranged up to \$2,420. In all cases, the illegally taken deer, elk and Christmas trees were confiscated. Some of the defendants also face possible revocation of their hunting and fishing privileges for up to three years.

Ray Chavez, 24, Orlando Chavez, 21, Sammy Chavez Jr., 20, and Louie Chavez, 22, all of Cubero and related, were cited by Conservation Officer Herb

Curry for illegal possession of an elk, criminal trespass and evading an officer after they ran from Curry, who had attempted to stop them and check their licenses during the muzzle-loader season for elk. All except Ray Chavez fled on foot. Curry found an illegally taken elk under six Christmas trees, all cut on the department's Water Canyon Wildlife Area. The criminal trespass charges resulted from the trespass on department property.

Ray Chavez was also charged with illegally killing the elk. All pleaded guilty Dec. 3

before Cibola County Magistrate Frank Emerson, in Grants. Ray Chavez was fined \$1,000 for killing the elk; \$1,000 for illegal possession (\$500 was suspended); \$50 for criminal trespass; and \$100 for evading an officer. He also paid \$90 in court costs and was assessed \$300 in civil damages for the state's loss of the animal. The other three defendants were fined \$1,000 each for illegal possession of the elk, plus 10 days of civil service; \$100 for evading an officer; and \$50 for criminal trespass. The judge suspended \$800 of the fines of each. Each also paid \$60 in court costs. Charges are pending against a fifth individual in juvenile court.

John P. Wright, 34, of Casscoe, AK, on Dec. 6 was assessed \$200 in civil damages and forfeited a \$420 bond, set by Sandoval County Magistrate Richard Velarde. Wright was arrested Nov. 8, two days before opening of deer season in New Mexico, by Officer Glenn Holmes. Wright said the buck deer found in his possession had been legally taken by another person during the Colorado season, but the claim could not be substantiated. Wright spent the night of Nov. 8 in Sandoval County jail.

Officer Tod Stevenson cited a Truchas man with three counts of illegally killing three does and one count of illegal possession. Amos Martinez, 33, pleaded guilty Nov. 20 before Taos County Magistrate Ambrose J. Mascarenas in Liano. He was fined \$1,600-\$400 on each charge—plus \$25 in court case. Mascarenas suspended \$825 of the fine. In the same case, Officer Monty Woody cited Larry Archuleta, 27, of Cordova, and Andrew Martinez, 23, of Truchas, with illegal possession of deer. They were fined \$400 each, with \$125 suspended, plus \$25 in court costs.

Civil damages paid by defendants go to the Game Protection Fund, operating budget of the Department of Game and Fish. Fines go to the State School Fund.
