## Third man in custody, waivers extradition

As a result of a Crime Stoppers anonymous tip a 28-year-old man wanted in connection with the January 1 beating and shooting of five people has been apprehended.

Larry Patrick Herrera, 28, Hondo Valley, was arrested May 4 without incident by El Paso, TX police authorities. Herrera signed a waiver of extradition and will be picked up by sheriff's deputies this week.

Herrera faces five counts of aggravated assault and five counts of aggravated battery. He is also wanted for violation of parole terms, according to Chief Deputy Sheriff Charles Cox. A district court trial is

pending for two other men, Antonio Ramirez and Juan Herrera, in connection with the New Year's day incident which occurred on Highway 37 near Nogal. The trio fled the scene after they allegedly forced a van off the road and confronted the driver and passengers. Ramirez turned himself in the following day to Ruidoso Downs Police. Juan Herrera, hiding out in a residence in the Valley, surrendered to county

police, on Jan 5.

Four of five yearling crossbreed heifers belonging to Jim Kerley of San Patricio have been recovered in Littlefield, TX. The livestock taken April 10

have been returned to the owner. Tim Campbell, formerly of San Patricio and living in Littlefield at the time of his arrest was charged with larceny of livestock, a third degree felony. He is out on bond in Texas and will be extradited.

The Sheriff's Department was pleased to learn that their grant application to the Law Enforcement Protection Fund was approved. The department will receive \$9,918.00 to be used in the '84-'85 fiscal year.

The state legislature created the Law Enforcement Protection Fund and appropriated \$1,200,000 to municipal and county police and sheriff departments in order to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of law enforcement services. Sheriff Tom Sullivan plans to use the department's grant for advance training of his deputies.

The Sheriff's Department will provide classroom facilities and provide other assistance for the introduction of the Traffic Safety Bureau's Direct Breath Testing Equipment Expansion Program, a computerized system (Auto-I) for detection of alcohol levels.

An Auto-I will be installed in the booking room of the county jail for the use of all area law enforcement officers. Sullivan has ordered all his deputies to attend a May 15 class for Auto-I for DWI testing. He has contacted Carrizozo Town Police, Capitan Town Police and local State Police to tell them of the class for Auto-I certification.

Magistrate, municipal and district judges and the district attorney have been invited to the class to observe how the new system will function.

State laboratory representatives will be on hand May 15 to train personnel on the instrument in both operator and key operator skills and install the Auto-I, an improvement over the SM-7 (balloon test) method currently in use for DWI cases.

## Funk, Harris resignations accepted

The special meeting of the Board of Education May 3 included a closed session for 40 minutes to discuss hiring of personnel, accepting the resignation of Tom Funk and John Harris, and a budget session for the 1984-85 school year.

Board members reviewed the estimated 1983-84 budget and the proposed 1984-85 budget. Estimated revenue is figured on

an estimated enrollment of 330 students for next year. The state equalization guarantee will be raised from \$1486 to \$1583 per unit for this coming year.

Discussion of non-instructional student support and the estimated expenditures for the 1983-84 school year of \$10,000 for athletics and \$2,000 for other activity expense brought comments from board members. Hoot Gibson said, "I personally

feel we should support other activities than athletics."

Estimated costs for 1983-84 activity increment schedule was \$15,000. A breakdown of the costs is: varsity cheerleader sponsor \$500, cheerleader sponsor (Jr. high) \$400, senior class sponsor \$150, junior class sponsor \$150, AV coordinator \$400, student council sponsor \$250, athletic director \$1,200, driver's education instructor \$500, special education coordinator \$200, computer instruction coordinator \$200, football head varsity \$1,200, football assistant varsity \$700, football junior high \$500, volleyball head varsity \$800, volleyball junior high \$700, basketball head varsity boys \$1,200, basketball assistant varsity boys \$300, basketball junior high-5th and 6th boys \$500, basketball head varsity girls

\$1,200, basketball assistant varsity girls \$300, track head varsity boys and girls \$800, track assistant varsity boys and girls \$500, and summer weight training \$150.

These activity increments are in addition to a teacher's regular salary. P.E. instructor Ron Becker is athletic director for \$1,200, head varsity volleyball for \$800, head varsity boys basketball for \$1,200, and head varsity girls basketball for \$1,200.

All these positions are available to any teacher willing to take them.

Another budget session will be held May 14 at 7:30 in the library. The next regular meeting of the school board is May 15. The planned program on sex education will not be presented until a later date.

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
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## Low-rent housing project update

In response to the many calls about the low rent housing project, News staff called the Region VI Housing Authority Roswell.

Region VI Housing Authority will manage the rentals under the Low Rent Public Housing Program. They will begin taking applications for occupancy 90 days before they are ready to be occupied. The exact time for taking applications will be published before the day the Authority will be here to take applications. The eighteen rental

units in Carrizozo should be finished in about four months.

Region VI Housing Authority first applied for the project to HUD in March 1980. The project was approved in June 1980, and it took until September 1983 to complete the government paperwork process, select a developer-builder, and negotiate a contract to build the project.

Joseph R. Ortega, Executive Director, stated that "the units will be an asset to the community and will provide needed housing for lower income families and the elderly in the area."




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# IT'S THE LAW New Mexico State Police

## 88-7-318: NO PASSING ZONES:

A: The state highway commission and local authorities may determine those portions of any highway, under their respective jurisdictions, where overtaking and passing or driving on the left of the roadway would be especially hazardous and may, by appropriate signs and markings on the roadway, indicate the beginning and end of such zones. When the signs and markings are in place and clearly visible to an ordinarily observant person, every driver of a vehicle shall obey the direction thereof.

B. Where signs or markings are in place to define a no-passing zone as set forth in SUBSECTION A of this section, no driver shall at any time drive on the left side of the roadway within the no-passing zone, or on the left side of any pavement striping designed to mark the no-passing zone, throughout the length of the zone.

Remember you can not pass another vehicle when there is a solid yellow line in your lane, or when there are two solid yellow lines on the roadway.

## 88-7-318: FOLLOWING TOO CLOSELY:

A. The driver of a motor vehicle shall not follow another vehicle more closely than is reasonable and prudent, having due regard for the speed of such vehicles and the traffic upon, and the conditions of the highway.

B. The driver of a truck or vehicle that is towing another vehicle when outside a business or residence district shall not follow another vehicle that is towing another vehicle, within three hundred feet (300'), except that this shall not prevent a vehicle towing another vehicle, from overtaking or passing by any like vehicle or other vehicle.

C. Vehicles being driven upon any roadway outside a business or residence district, in a caravan or motorcade, whether

or not towing other vehicles shall not follow the preceding vehicle closer than three hundred feet (300'). This provision shall not apply to funeral processions, nor shall it apply to vehicle escort vehicles, or a vehicle escort service, which may, if necessary to maintain the continuity of the

escorted unit or units, follow at a distance closer than three hundred feet (300') to the escorted unit or units.

Another good thing to remember is to use the two second rule when following another vehicle. That is always to

stay two to three seconds behind the vehicle that is in front of you. Following too closely always causes needless accidents so be careful.

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# INSIDE THE CAPITOL

**SANTA FE**—With one-third of the Anaya years in office over, his administration is still in its shakedown phase.

That's the longest "honeymoon" any governor in recent history has required before settling down to ordinary life.

Why is that? Conversations with the smart folks lead to three factors, each of which gets severe blame.

**THE MAN AND THE TEAM:** First element, almost everyone agrees, is a Governor who is not an administrator by temperament or experience. He does not organize and delegate; in fact, he wants all ultimate authority right there on his desk. It may have worked in the Attorney General's office. It sure doesn't work when you have to run a whole state.

In addition, the man has no legislative experience. Nowhere

in the Constitution does it say that is required, but it sure helps as governor, as Bruce King and Jack Campbell and a host of others can assert.

Then we have to look at his major agency heads. The problem there is that they were mostly chosen by the wrong criteria.

It's okay to be all for advancing women, but you shouldn't say firmly that you will give four of 12 Cabinet posts to them. Gender has nothing to do with the ability to be a Cabinet member; and all 12 should be chosen for their ability to do that specific job, not because they are men or women.

In only two cases, the Highway Department and the Department of Agriculture, did we get people with experience in the department they now head—and the Ag man is chosen by somebody other than the

Governor.

**PHILOSOPHY:** In addition, Governor Anaya took office at a time when the philosophical split between the administration and the Legislature is as deep as anyone remembers seeing. Anaya and those he appointed are, almost without exception, old liberals of the Americans for Democratic Action stripe. Legislators, generally closer to the grass roots and the people, are conservatives.

So wide is the division that it is hard to bridge. Legislators saw no reason to bridge it. Anaya didn't try. Result: stalemate and almost total paralysis.

**PROGNOSIS:** With the shakedown period end with the results it is supposed to bring—discovery of the soft spots and their correction?

There are a couple of healthy signs. Some of those Anaya put in top jobs have learned well and quickly. Joe Goldberg, now at Health and Environment, can get along with legislators, which nobody expected when he started. Denise Fort, boss of Finance and Administration as this is

written, at least has learned enough to suggest she may be liability in that job. Judy Espinosa, who had no experience which would make you think she could be a good Transportation Secretary, turned out to be a relatively good one.

Those are good signs, and they cause one to hope.


The two worst signs are these: Our Governor does not want to take responsibility for his own failings; he blames others. "It's your fault," he tells Cabinet members, when the foul-ups are

his. And he is obtuse about firing those closest to him who have demonstrated by much proof that their advice is detrimental.

Loyalty's good—but not when it hurts us all.

**MARSHMALLOW STORAGE**  
Keep marshmallows before and after opening the package in the bread box. They will be just as fresh as the day you brought them.

**PREVENTS STICKING**

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

EACH Sunday I arrive at the newspaper office to sift through hundreds of accumulated "press releases" and tidbits of information, seeking to separate news from advertising, trash from trivia, the inflammatory from the inflammatory, and news from nonsense. Some goes into print; most goes into the garbage. What goes in the garbage includes publicity pleas from two dozen or more radical groups all of which are anti-nuclear, anti-defense, pro-abortion and anti-Reagan. They appear to operate under the umbrella of an outfit called Peace Network. They disseminate tales of horror depicting the horrors of US mining of Nicaraguan harbors, right-wing death squads (there is no such thing as a left-wing death squad), and the unjust and unconstitutional conduct of the US in aiding anti-Marxist takeovers anywhere on earth. Strangely, they never criticize Soviet takeovers, as in Afghanistan. All this goes into the trash can. Perhaps you'd like to tag along on this weekly romp through the malodorous piles of perfidy by which the perpetrators hope to bend your wills to theirs.

HERE is a laudatory article on Louis Farrakhan, leader of the terrorist Black Muslim wing of certified nuts, who announced last week that if the Rev. His peace props include an assortment of tee shirts inscribed with the lofty and inspiring legend, "Apples, Not Bombs." The tee shirts, plus a round of flesh-pressing and hugs, are calculated to inspire the Russian people to advise their "elected representatives" in the Kremlin to beat their missiles into tee shirts and join in an international orgy of fraternalism. Newspapers ran a photo of Dr. Davis and his associates on page one last week. It may become a collector's item in case they attempt to traverse the Bridge of Understanding by way of Korean Airlines. Ah, to be a child again.

HERE'S a press release from California Sen. Jim Nielsen dealing with the type of justice being meted out to criminals by sex pervers, thieves and dopeheads elevated to the judiciary by Jerry Brown. 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**WATCH OVER WASHINGTON**  
**How the Wall Street Journal knifed Louisiana**

NEW ORLEANS — "What in the world can we do about that? Shall we really put braisieres on mermaids?"

Jeanne Nathan, Director of Public Relations for the 1984 Louisiana World Exposition (LWE), had just been asked about a page-one article published four days earlier by The Wall Street Journal. As one of nearly two dozen searing criticisms (and hardly anything positive) Journal writer Mark Ziemann reported: "Some New Orleans women are fighting another feminist cause. They want to clothe the bare-breasted mermaids atop the Fair's entrance gates. The breasts, described in a newspaper (unidentified) as 'four feet wide with nipples the size of dinner plates' are obscene according to many (no mention of how many) outraged citizens (unidentified)."

In reading this, one wonders if writer Ziemann has ever heard of a New Orleans landmark called Bourbon Street, where Le Jazz Hot is mingled with all manner of mammary manipulation. And this evokes no more manifestation of municipal outrage than that occasion some years ago up in New York City, when a hypermammary young secretary in a tight sweater caused traffic and pedestrian jams all over Wall Street. Legions of brokers — and presumably staffers from The Wall Street Journal — emptied offices and crowded sidewalks, in order to ogle.

The media's function in providing reviews of assorted commercial entertainment must include the right to warn the public if the production is either mediocre or putrid. But this responsibility to inform includes the obligation to balanced, objective and equitably accurate writing.

Writer Ziemann quotes 81-year-old architect Nathaniel Owings — who helped design the 1933 Chicago World's Fair — but who was not invited to do so in 1984 by New Orleans. Not unexpectedly, Mr. Owings is hardly a fan of what he was not invited to design:

"It's a sideshow, a country fair, a chamber of commerce idea to boost business...It's pathetic that they're even calling it a World's fair."

In point of fact — which Owings and The Journal both ignore — they are not "calling it a world's fair." It is an exposition, and there is an important difference. For an exposition focuses on a single theme, such as energy at the 1982 Knoxville Exposition, and water this year at the LWE.

World's Fairs have always been considerably larger than expositions, which fact writer Ziemann neglected to include in his entirely negative comparison of the Louisiana Exposition to the Chicago World's Fair. Ziemann also failed to include a number of pertinent qualifications in his assorted sidewipes at this \$350 million effort of Louisiana:

—In reporting the Rev. Jesse Jackson's demand, two years ago, that blacks get their share of contracts and jobs at the Fair, Ziemann neglected to report Nathan's notation that 42 percent of the Exposition's employees are from minority groups. "Ziemann

didn't even ask me about this," recalls Nathan.

—In reporting that "the decision to keep the Fair's finances under wraps in another break with the past," Ziemann neglected, according to Nathan, to point out that the Exposition's management committee — which has full access to the finances of this private corporation — includes six members who are public officials in Louisiana and who are not at all reluctant to blow the whistle on any financial mismanagement.

—In reporting that "A federal employee working on the project pleaded guilty to charges that he had embezzled \$12,700 from the Knoxville and New Orleans Fairs," Ziemann resorted to clever, if questionable, word selection. For in point of fact, the embezzlement was done on the United States pavilion in both expositions, not on the expositions themselves.

—In reporting that "Corporations aren't spending much this time for world's fair exhibits," Ziemann neglects to report that among 62 corporate participants are Amoco, Exxon, Coca Cola, Chrysler, Conoco, Getty, Gulf, IBM, Kodak, Miller Brewing, Mobil, Motorola, Phillips Petroleum and Shell. There are also 23 countries, even though eight of them are combined in the European Community exhibit. There are also nine states which are along the Mississippi, plus the Canadian provinces of Ontario and Manitoba.

—Ziemann reported that "A dozen environmental and municipal agencies halted construction in the state pavilion for four days, after workmen dug up seven rusty barrels of combustible phosphorus. The city's powerful Dock Board also stopped construction after Fair workers presumed to dig a small ditch without permission."

But Ziemann neglected to report that the \$4 acres where the Exposition is now being built was a widely abandoned area of old warehouses and decaying wharves. PR Director Nathan, a veteran of writing for The Village Voice and reporting news for a New Orleans TV station, is a native of The Bronx, New York. And she asks: "What on earth is so wrong about our restoring what was once one of the most beautiful river fronts in the country?"

Writer Ziemann also points with alarm to the admission price of \$15 — which he contrasts to the Chicago admission price of 50 cents (during the Depression in 1934). But he also makes no mention of the LWE plans for 22 stages with almost continuous entertainment — free. Nor does he mention that also gratis will be the two daily parades, which will give visitors a touch of the Mardi Gras.

The LWE has 25,000 hotel rooms within walking distance — with the New Orleans Hilton so close as to resemble one of the exhibits. While Bourbon Street, in the French Quarter, is a 15-minute walk away, one need not even leave the Hilton to savor New Orleans at its best. There is, in the Winston Restaurant, such food as would almost make heaven constitute a threat — and this writer is a veteran of both Brennan's and Antoine's, two of the city's better known

restaurants. There is also a wide variety of music, from jazz to harp and violin to country-western. This is part of a full measure of the atmosphere which led the late Tennessee Williams to refer to New Orleans as one of the two most romantic cities in the United States (the other: San Francisco).

The Exposition's theme will provide the visitor with all he ever needs to know about "Fresh Water As A Source Of Life: The World Of Rivers." This will focus on the necessity of water to civilization, commerce, industry, recreation and the giant fishing industry. The whole layout of the LWE will simulate the flow of water there at the banks of the nation's mightiest river.

A "Wonderwall" of architectural phantasmagoria will weave its way through the Exposition, in order to transport visitors from one of the parking areas, which have space for 7,500 cars. A fleet of tall ships will add to the excitement of the second largest seaport in the world. And the LWE will also feature the first aquacade since Billy Rose's at the 1939 New York World's Fair.

This Exposition is not only restoring 84 acres of waterfront but will provide New Orleans with one of the nation's largest new convention centers. Will the LWE make a profit? Or will it be a financial loser like the Knoxville Exposition, which reportedly helped bankrupt the Butcher banking empire?

The Wall Street Journal's Mark Ziemann's hatchet job (Did anybody edit this malediction?) may, with The Journal's national circulation, have tipped the scales. But then again, The Wall Street Journal is currently going through a king-size credibility gap.

In January, The Village Voice, which has hardly established any reputation for either restraint or journalistic ethics, fired its press critic, Alexander Cockburn. Cockburn, a furious critic of other journalists, had been caught by an alternative paper in Boston, having accepted \$10,000 from a leader of the PLO to do a book on the Israeli invasion of Lebanon — which Cockburn failed to write. But Cockburn retains his once-a-month job as a columnist for The Wall Street Journal. Two months later, The Journal management were confronted with a scandal that was even greater. For Journal writer R. Foster Winans is being investigated by the Security and Exchange Commission for allegedly having leaked information about what The Journal intended to publish in a column entitled "Heard On The Street." That this information was being fed to Winans, in advance, through his homosexual lover (a former Journal clerk) was enough to motivate The Journal to fire Winans. (Cockburn had married the daughter of a high-ranking former Journal editor.)

Readers of The Journal are also becoming increasingly aware of the bitter rivalry between the basically conservative editorial page and a small legion of left-wing Big Media types, who have gotten control of the paper's news columns. (Which rivalry reportedly came close to a mass

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





ALAMOGORDO, NM—Traditionally, convenience stores have always been the favorite targets of armed robbers.

But as more convenience stores take greater security measures such as timed release safes, security cameras and alarms, robbers have had to look elsewhere for victims.

Recently an elderly man was the victim of a strong-armed robbery outside an Alamogordo bank. Investigators say that on April 3 at about 10:45 a.m., the victim cashed a check for \$200.

As he was walking out of the bank with the cash still in his hand, a black male in his early 20s grabbed the money and ran away. The offender was described as having a slender build and was wearing a blue and white short-sleeved shirt, dark brown or black vest and a brown short bill cap. Crime Stoppers of Otero County, at 437-2000, is offering a reward from \$500 to \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the offender.

There have been at least four reported robberies of citizens who have attempted to make night deposit drops at various banks in the Albuquerque area.

Three of the robberies occurred to people making deposits at branches of First National Bank in Albuquerque's Northeast Heights. In each case the offender, a black male, was armed with a revolver and was wearing a mask. No arrests have been

made in the cases. The most serious incident occurred on February 28th, when a 25-year-old woman was robbed by two men after she had used an automated teller at the First National Bank branch in Corrales.

One of the offenders grabbed the woman's purse, but she resisted and managed to get both herself and the purse inside her vehicle. The two men dragged the victim out of her car and stabbed her several times before she was able to finally get back into her vehicle and escape.

The offenders were described as hispanic males, possibly Mexican Nationals. One offender was about 27 years of age, 5-7 to 5-9, with a slim build, dark complexion, and dark hair over his ears. The second suspect was about 30 years old, 5-5 to 5-6, with a small build. He was dark complected with dark hair and might have had a moustache.

Albuquerque Crime Stoppers, at 842-8000, and First National Bank are offering rewards up to \$1,000 in connection with the crime.

Of course, some armed robbers even practice their trade inside banks during normal office hours.

On March 11, a hispanic male in his mid-20s, 5-8 to 6-0, with a medium build, collar-length hair and a moustache entered the Northgate branch of Carlsbad National Bank and proceeded to rob it. The offender took an undetermined amount of cash and fled the area. Eddy County Crime Stoppers, at 887-1888, has offered a \$250 reward in

the case. The robbery was one of three to New Mexico banks in the past six weeks.

This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering rewards of up to \$1,000 for information leading to the solution of any bank-related, armed

robberies. Anyone with information about these types of crimes, or about any serious crime committed throughout New Mexico, is encouraged to call State Crime Stoppers toll-free at 1-800-432-6933.

In all cases callers do not have to reveal their identities.

## ASK DR. DAN

**Q:** I am a teenager 16 years old and have started to get bad acne. What can I do that will prevent this? **P.T.**  
**A:** Acne is a chronic skin disease caused by excessive oil gland production. These glands are most numerous on the face, neck and upper back. Teenagers are especially prone to acne because of their high sex hormones levels. Most foods do not have any effect on acne but certain individuals do seem to get worse after eating some foods, so these should be avoided.  
Frequent cleansing of the face with mild soap will help keep oil from building up. Topical (applied to the skin) benzoyl peroxide lotions, creams or gels can be used daily to help remove oil, clogged skin pores and to decrease oil gland production. If
