# Gavilan Canyon Road work begins

County Commissioner Bill Elliott announced at a press conference Tuesday that Lincoln County has started the process of rebuilding Gavilan Canyon Road. Funds received from the New

Mexico State Highway Co-op has helped make this possible. It is necessary to rebuild the road because recent tests have shown that there is no base course under the present pavement. The tests also show

that it will take up to ten inches of base course before an overlay can be done. This much base course is required so that the road will be able to withstand the freezing temperatures in winter. The county does not have the

funds to do the rebuilding correctly in one year. A three year plan has been developed. The first year plans are to prepare sub-grade by use of Bo Mag Machine. The Bo Mag machine will tear up present

pavement, recycle material and lay back recycled pavement. This will be followed by a double penetration chip seal and will provide a good driving surface until next summer. This will be the start of the ten inches of base

course. Plans for the second year are to correct and provide good drainage, recycle material again on road, and add base course, up to ten inches if funds are available. A double penetration

chip seal to protect new base course and provide a good driving surface is the next step. A two inch overlay is planned for the third year. The estimated life expectancy of this road after completion will be 20 years. Cost of rebuilding the first year will be shared with the county furnishing \$104,271 and the state furnishing \$150,000 for their share.


Joe Shain, PAJO Engineering, will be at the job site to supervise. The same type of testing and studies on other county roads have been started and similar plans are being implemented.

County Commissioner Kenneth Nosker and County Manager Suzanne Cox accompanied Elliott to Gavilan Canyon to watch the Bo Mag Machine at work. The machine tears up the present pavement to a depth of four inches, recycles the material, and puts it back down at a rate of 42 feet per minute. The machine only goes four inches because over four inches is not good to mix in the

base. After the mixture is recycled and put back down, a water truck and compactor goes over the surface. It will take about two weeks for the Bo Mag machine to complete the five miles of Gavilan Canyon with the temporary surface.

Elliott said, "We are very proud that we are finally able to start work on Gavilan Canyon Road, as we know how heavily it is used."

County Commissioners have asked the public's indulgence during the construction, which will take about a month.

#### Historical Society welcomes historians

In an historic move forward in its effort to preserve, enhance and encourage a love of history the Executive Committee of the Lincoln County Historical Society worked long hours trying to put together what they felt would be a viable means of leasing the Dr. Woods House from the Lincoln Heritage Trust Friday, July 20, the lease was signed by Gary Miller representing the Trust and Lynda Sanchez, President of the Historical Society.

Dr. Woods House was built in the 1880s and had various tenants over the years but Dr. Woods was perhaps the most well known. As a country doctor he served Lincoln County well during the early years of the 20th Century. Area old timers remember him fondly and enjoy repeating stories of those early days. The house is furnished like a typical doctor's home of that era. Many of his personal belongings are included, especially his medicines, doctors instruments and other items.

As a result of many dedicated volunteers the home will be open five days a week through Labor Day (10-4) or by appointment. Anyone interested in assisting the LCHS through donations or as volunteers are welcome. For additional information call Cleis Jordan (653-4676) or Lynda Sanchez, (654-4821).

The building will also house the Societies collection of photos, oral history interviews, maps, reports and other data pertinent to Lincoln County and Environs.

According to LCHS president, Lynda Sanchez, "It is

a great step forward and we are fortunate to have this opportunity to have a headquarters. It is hoped that this will eventually become a permanent home for the LCHS. We are pleased to have the chance to share a little history with visitors as well as to work with the Lincoln Heritage Trust and the Lincoln State Monuments Working together with these public and private entities we can interpret and preserve regional history. It is a very exciting prospect!"

### C'ZOZO SCHOOL BOARD:

#### Aaron Fleming is new band director

The Carrizozo Board of Education met in regular session July 17. The bid of \$3,700 from Barnett Carpeting of Ruidoso was accepted to carpet the high school hallway. The bid of \$24,987 from Wells Construction of Carrizozo was accepted for building insulation of Clegg Hall, High School, Manire Building, Counselor's office, Vo Ag classroom, and the new gym.

Mr. Aaron Fleming has been hired as band director.

Mrs. Susan King who was hired for the elementary special ed position has declined the position. There have been no new applicants for this position as well as no applicants for the high school special ed position.

Mrs. Pagan Roueche will be attending a two week NASA seminar in Houston, Texas to

study space study. Steve Stearns will be traveling to Washington, DC to attend a computer workshop in Vocational Agriculture.

The completion of the elementary building is on schedule. The wiring of the Vo Ag shop was to have been finished that week. Hail damaged the old gym roof. Repairs will cost an estimated \$6,100. The school must meet the \$1,000 deductible.

A cash balance of \$63,270 was left from the 1983-84 school year. This is \$4,800 above original estimates. The extra funds will be spent on the activity bus purchase, cafeteria tables and maintenance equipment.

The next school board meeting will be held in Nogal at the fire hall.

#### Plane crash kills two near Ruidoso

A plane crash in rugged terrain nine miles northwest of Ruidoso in Lincoln National Forest killed a United States Forest Service Entomologist and his pilot.

According to Wayne Nicolls, information director at the regional Forest Service office in Albuquerque, the two were conducting an annual insect survey and map defoliation to check insects and bugs entry in trees in the Lincoln National Forest and the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

Killed were Forest Service employee William Telfer, 30, of Rio Rancho, and Tom Wilson, 25, a pilot for Flying A Flight Service in Silver City.

The purpose of the flight was to see what

insect activity is moving in and out. Time of the crash has been placed at around noon, July 23. A search began when the plane failed to make contact at about 1 p.m.

The Cessna 337, twin engine plane, owned by Flying A Flight Service, crashed at about the 9,000 foot elevation. The wooded terrain and steep grade of the crash site made removal of the wreckage difficult.

Cause of the crash has not been determined and is under investigation. Nicolls said Tuesday, "We don't know how long the laboratory tests will be."

It has been 12 years since a serious accident involving a Forest Service plane has happened in this region.

6 miles west of Highway 54. The plane had apparently crashed onto the vehicle which contained crash debris. A spokesman from the Sheriff's Dept. said that "the appearance of the operation is consistent with air smuggling of narcotics." The case is under investigation.



### Family Community Leadership Project gets full-time coordinator

LAS CRUCES — Mary Ellen Payne, a New Mexico State University Cooperative Extension Service faculty member, has been appointed full-time state coordinator of the Family Community Leadership (FCL) Project.

The Extension Homemakers project, which began in 1981, is sponsored jointly by the W. K. Kellogg Foundation and the Cooperative Extension Services in New Mexico, Alaska, Colorado, Hawaii, Oregon and Washington.

FCL was designed to help people, particularly women,

identify issues that affect families and develop leadership skills to participate in the political process.

Since 1982 Mrs. Payne, a Carrizozo resident, has been working half time as FCL project director and half time as Extension home economist in Lincoln County. In January, Charolette Hill was hired as temporary Extension home economist in Lincoln County and assumed part of Mrs. Payne's duties. A home economist will now be hired for the county on a permanent basis, announced Dr. John Oren, NMSU Extension

director.

Since the FCL project began in New Mexico, two statewide training meetings for adults and one for young people have been held, Mrs. Payne said. More than 300 people have learned various leadership techniques.

For instance, 4-H members at a senior leadership retreat learned how to write letters on issues to government officials. And a Legislative Day sponsored by FCL drew 150 men and women to Santa Fe in February for meetings with legislators and updates on pending bills.

**The winner is . . .**

**SAN FRANCISCO** — It was a long convention, but now it's time to give out the awards. The envelope, please.

**+ MOST CLEVER USE OF THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE:** Governor Mario Cuomo, in his keynote address on "family values," said that the Democratic Party embraces men and women of "every orientation." A Cuomo aide said that was a reference to homosexuals. Most homosexuals knew what Cuomo meant, but the average viewer didn't — which was the idea, of course.

**+ APPARENTLY THE MOST BITTER:** Gary Hart, upon hearing that Mondale had written his concession speech and was ready to drop out of the race last March, until he eked out victories in the Alabama and Georgia primaries. **RUNNER-UP:** Dianne Feinstein, the mayor of San Francisco, upon hearing the rumors that she was Mondale's choice for VP until his advisers talked him out of it.

**+ MOST UNUSUAL PROMISE:** In the Democratic Platform: "We will assure that sexual orientation per se does not serve as a bar to participation in the military."

**+ MEANEST CHEER:** During the "Gay Rights" march the day before the convention, protesters chanted "1-2-3-4, Reagan thinks we need a war, 5-6-7-8, he also thinks his son is straight." Reagan's younger son, the dancer-turned-writer, was covering the parade as a magazine reporter.

**+ WORST TASTE:** At the "Rock Against Reagan" concert, one of the bands was named The Dead Kennedys. **RUNNER-UP:** Headline in a San Francisco weekly newspaper: "Vote For Mondale and Ferraro (and hope he dies)". **SECOND RUNNER-UP:** San Francisco policemen guarding the convention center held up cards to "rate" passing women on a scale of 1 to 10.

**+ BIGGEST SURPRISE:** Mondale's promise, in his acceptance speech, to raise taxes. **RUNNER-UP:** The fact that many news reports ignored the promise.

**+ MOST CONFUSED:** The airport baggage man who told Tom Brokaw, "Did you hear? Mondale's picked Cristina Ferrare (John DeLorean's wife) for vice president!"

**+ MOST JUNIOR PARTNER:** Geraldine Ferraro, who wasn't told about the appointment of Bert Lance as campaign chairman until "a short time" before the announcement, and whose campaign staff has been taken over by Mondale people. In contrast, Jimmy Carter not only gave Mondale's staff much of the responsibility for the vice-presidential candidate in 1976, but also much of the control over the entire campaign.

**+ STRANGEST REMARK BY A MEMBER OF CONGRESS:** Congresswoman Ferraro told the World Affairs Council of Northern California about her trip to the Holy Land: "We went to a room where they supposedly had the Last Supper. And we had this old, old priest who was like 82 or 83 and I looked at him and said, 'Father, did they allow women at the Passover in biblical times?' He said yes. And then I said, so well, how come none were at the Last Supper? All you see is Jesus and the apostles. The poor priest was devastated." According to The Washington Post, the audience laughed.

**+ WITTIEST SPEECH:** Jim Hightower, the agriculture commissioner in Texas, told delegates that "we've got a guy in the White House who doesn't know a hog from a howitzer. His

idea of a good farm program is 'Hee-Haw.' . . . If you're an international banker who makes some bad loans, no problem — Reagan will just give you a multi-billion-dollar bailout. If you're a military contractor who wants to sell a 37 cent widget to the government, no problem — here's a thousand dollars, keep the change," Reagan, he said has turned the White House "into a private club for a bunch of Gucci-wearing, cabernet-sipping, globe hopping Hollywood plutocrats . . ."

**+BEST PLUTOCRATS:** The 42 percent of the delegates — including more than a third of the Jackson delegates — who had family incomes in excess of \$50,000 a year. About half of the delegates had attended graduate school. Although 26 percent were union members, only three percent were blue-collar workers; 82 percent were "professionals" such as doctors, lawyers, accountants, and professors. Self described liberals outnumbered conservatives about ten-to-one.

**+MOST INTERESTING REPORTING:** A USA Today reporter wrote about the Jesse

Jackson speech: "His message was our dream . . . Jackson affirmed that the struggle for justice will go on. That right is on our side and we are not alone." A San Francisco-Chronicle writer reacted to the speech this way: "You're not supposed to cry in the press gallery. Very bad form. I was very discreet. I wandered around and saw a couple of other people being very discreet too." **RUNNER-UP:** A CBS News correspondent said he saw two campaign workers and two reporters hug each other in joy at the selection of Geraldine Ferraro.

**+ WORST CASTING:** The "widow" of a homosexual San Francisco City official was assigned as the Chief greeter for the Mississippi delegation.

**+ THE HUBERT HORATIO HORNBLLOWER AWARD:** Gary Hart, in his speech to the convention, mispronounced the name Ferraro.

**+ WORST CHOICE OF THEME MUSIC:** At the end of the convention, while Mondale and Ferraro stood in triumph on the platform, the band played the Michael Jackson song "Beat It."

**+ HAPPIEST PERSON IN SAN FRANCISCO:** Considering how many times the liberals shot themselves in the feet, the happiest person there was probably me.

**SANTA FE** — It's too bad that a few cities in the state get almost all the news coverage.

You know the ones we mean. They are, specifically, Albuquerque and Santa Fe, with a smattering of attention paid to half a dozen other locations.

Outside of some sort of disaster, natural or otherwise, it's hard for the rest of the state to generate any interest from the big media in what goes on in their locale.

That's not the way it ought to be.

A state, after all, is a collection of people, who live in a collection of areas. Each is as integral to the whole as all the others, as a hand is as integral to a person as a head.

Attention should be spread around.

**EXAMPLE:** There's nothing strictly political about the writer's choice of an event to illustrate that fact, but it does prove the point.

Lordsburg, down there in the southwestern corner of the state (in case you are a little fuzzy on your geography), is in process of one of those once-in-a-lifetime events which ought to get more attention and praise from the rest

of our citizens. The community has joined hands to raise the funds to pay the way of one of the two New Mexicans who will be participating in the Olympics.

He's Todd Bensley, a marksman representing our nation in the running target competition in Los Angeles.

As Sherri Arredondo put it recently in the Lordsburg Liberal, the chances of having an individual from your own community, especially a small one, excelling at some event to the point of drawing national, not to say international, attention is remote.

When something like that happens, it behooves the whole town to rally round.

Which is just exactly what Lordsburg is doing. Residents

there have been holding events which will raise money to help offset the expenses Bensley has incurred in a year and half of preparation for the Olympics.

That's a concrete expression of their patriotism to their pride in one of their own, and a demonstration of their patriotism to the country he is representing.

Old-fashioned values? Yes, but very good ones all the same. **LEARNING:** And maybe there is a lesson here for the politicians after all.

It is that over half the people of New Mexico live in the small cities and villages where such virtues are still appreciated and practiced.

It is easy to campaign politically only where the mini-

cams are, of course, but those who choose to do that exclusively deserve to be forgotten by those New Mexicans whom they will not even take time to visit.

To those who ask for votes only by going, as they put it, "where the ducks are," some words of advice: There are lots of ducks you miss—and their resentment at being neglected can work to your disadvantage.

If politicians don't care enough about the state's less populous areas to make their appearance there, why should the citizens of those parts wish to be represented by the men and women who hold such attitudes?

You will see resentment at those who are too totally urban expressed dramatically when the votes get counted on the evening of November 6 this year.

**Q:** My two young children get carsick on long drives. What can I do to help them? N. V.

**A:** Motion sickness afflicts up to 80 percent of the population at some point in their life. Women get it more often than men. Children between the ages of 2 and 12 years are most likely to suffer from this ailment. The commonest symptoms include nausea, vomiting, paleness, sweating and less commonly will include sleepiness, headache, dizziness, increased salivation and yawning.

People with defects of the labyrinthine system (balance organ) are immune to motion sickness. The temperature, time of day or time since eating do not seem to influence whether motion sickness occurs. Exposure to a particular motion (Such as a rolling ship at sea) will cause adaptation to occur so that over time, the person will become immune to motion sickness from that particular motion.

## ASK DR. DAN

Prevention is by avoiding motion by traveling on foot. Since this is not practical, various treatments have evolved. Once motion sickness starts, remove the person from the motion if possible. If not, have them lie down. Several medications have been used to try to prevent motion sickness. These include

scopolamine, promethazine, cyclazine, dimenhydrinate and meclizine. These do work for some people but they may have side effects. The most common side effect is drowsiness, as well as blurred vision, dry mouth, dizziness and headache. Consult your doctor or pharmacist about which medication to use.

## 4-Hers improve communities with 'Community Pride' grants

**LAS CRUCES**—Twelve 4-H clubs and councils in New Mexico have received 4-H Community Pride grants to help them carry out local improvement projects. The grants, totalling \$4,575, are the bulk of a \$5,000 contribution to the Community Pride program by Chevron USA Inc. Glenn Bartelt, state 4-H program leader at New Mexico State University and coordinator of the Community Pride program in the state, announced Chevron's grant.

"4-H appreciates Chevron's support," Bartelt said. "The \$5,000 donation will allow 4-H groups around the state to complete projects valued at \$22,351."

Daryl Hagler, Chevron's terminal superintendent in El Paso, Texas, recently presented the contribution check to 4-H

during a luncheon at NMSU.

The 4-H proposals selected for Community Pride grants are a diverse group, Bartelt said.

The Grant County 4-H Council's project, "Building Special Relationships," was awarded \$500. The council proposed a recreation day be held in conjunction with other civic groups to allow clients of Southwest Services for the Handicapped, 4-H families and members of other organizations to join in recreational activities.

The Sierra County 4-H Council was granted \$500 to upgrade a nature trail near the Elephant Butte dam site. The project includes identifying vegetation with signs, construction of benches and area clean-up. In the future the site will be used as an outdoor classroom.

A \$500 grant will allow the San Miguel 4-H Council to construct a small animal building for the county fair. In the past, space has been inadequate and animals have suffered from the heat. The county fair association and other groups are also participating.

The Chaparral 4-H Club was granted \$500 for the renovation of an old fair building to be used as the Quay County Activity Center. Local organizations will meet there. Involved in the project are the fair board, county commissioners, Extension Homemakers Clubs and civic groups.

In Roosevelt County, a \$500 grant was approved for the Floyd 4-H Club's proposal to landscape and repair the Floyd Community Center. The project involves working with the city government and other community clubs to provide a meeting facility to replace the old one which burned down last year.

In Socorro County, County Line 4-H Club was awarded a \$500 Community Pride grant to work with other groups to construct an outdoor amphitheater with a stage and

seating for 350 people. The Gil Sanchez Parent-Teacher Club, Ranger Rick Conservation Club and a Brownie troop are also involved.

Silver "C" 4-H Club in Taos County was awarded \$500 for the addition of a community meeting room to the Cerro Fire Department building. Members of the

fire department, Extension Homemakers Club, VFW and community citizens also pledged their help with the project.

In Valencia County, Roadrunners 4-H Club received a \$250 grant for landscaping at Los Lunas hospital. The project was aimed also at building



## Rural scholarship development drive to begin

LAS CRUCES, NM—A statewide fund drive to raise scholarships for New Mexico's rural students has been started by the New Mexico Center for Rural Education at New Mexico State University.

Center advisory board members will be conducting the fundraising efforts with an initial goal of \$20,000 yielding four scholarships. "If the endowment is increased to \$50,000, we could give five awards, one from each quadrant of the state and one at large," said Clark Gardner, assistant director of the Center

for Rural Education. All but 14 New Mexico Communities are classified as rural, according to Gardner. "It was felt by the center's board that students from the smaller communities need more opportunities for scholarships," he said.

College students from rural communities attending any two or four-year institution in the state will be eligible to apply for grants, which will be awarded particularly to those students who plan to return to the rural area to work. Grades, need and leadership will be considered.

The Center's Advisory Board members, who are rural educators from around the state, wanted to focus on assisting one segment of the population, said Gardner. Board members include Lou Baca, Santa Fe, from the Governor's Office of Education; Al Arellano, Springer, principal; James P. Miller, Carrizozo, school superintendent; Margaret Rutz, Santa Fe, Accreditation Department, State Department of Education; Chon LaBrier, Tierra Amarilla, assistant superintendent in the Chama Valley Schools; Mollie Pressler, Lordsburg; and Carlos Lopez,

Estancia, Estancia Public Schools.

The Center for Rural Education was formed three years ago when some rural education administrators indicated they could benefit from help, according to the center's director Jack Cole.

Until now, the major project of the center has been to arrange an annual conference here, the Southwestern Conference for Rural Education, co-sponsored with the Pima County Office of Education, Tucson, AZ, and Region XIX Service Center, El Paso, TX. This year's conference will take place Nov. 2-3, Cole said. The center has also published three monographs.

The center is a part of the NMSU College of Education. Further information is available at 646-2823, and scholarships donations may be sent to the NM Center for Rural Education, Box 3AP, Las Cruces, NM 88003.

COMMUNITY  
PROPERTY:  
PART ONE

New Mexico is one of nine "community property" states, and bases its property laws on Spanish Civil Law rather than the Common Law of England. Whether or not property is community property or separate property has important legal consequences for married persons. This week and next week we will talk about the difference between community property and separate property and some of the legal effects of holding property in either of these two forms.

There are five categories of separate property: property acquired while single; property divided in a legal separation action; property designated as separate property by a court decree or judgment; property inherited by or given to a spouse; and property designated as separate property by a written agreement between the parties, including property held as joint tenants or tenants in common if specifically designated as separate property.

Community property is all property acquired by a husband and wife which is not separate property, including property held as joint tenants or as tenants in common which is not designated as separate property. Property acquired during marriage is presumed to be community until shown otherwise, unless it was acquired by a married woman in her name alone or in her name and that of another person prior to July 1, 1973, the date of our State Equal Rights Amendment.

The word "property" in our statutes includes all rents, issues and profits. If you owned a home, for instance, before you were married, and rented it out after marriage, the rent would be separate property. If you sold that same house after you had been married, all the profits from the sale would also be separate property. If you owned a herd of mother cows prior to marriage, the calves they produced after marriage would still be separate property. The same reasoning applies to property purchased with separate funds—that property is separate.

Either spouse alone has full power to sell her or his own separate property; however, both husband and wife must sign to either transfer or mortgage community real estate. If one party does not join the deed or mortgage of community real property it is not valid. As to personal property, generally either spouse alone has the full power to sell or encumber community personal property, with a few exceptions.

The most common exceptions are cars and bank accounts. If the car title or bank account shows only one name, only that named spouse can sell the car or write checks on the account. If a car title or bank account has both names on it, and there is an "and" between the names, both spouses must join in transferring the title or signing checks. If there is an "or" or "and/or" between the names, each party has the right to do whatever she or he pleases.
