Carrizozo to host youth rally

groups. The rally on Sunday, December 16 will begin with registration from noon to 1:00 p.m. and will be held at the Santa Rita Parish Hall in Carrizozo. The 1:00 p.m. afternoon

workshop for the junior and senior high school students will be on how to do an intervention when ones friends are on drugs. The speakers will explain that the loving response to a friend on

drugs is to enable the person to get help and to know where that help is available and how to get help.

A workshop for adult leaders will also take place at the rally

with James Miller, superintendent of the Carrizozo Schools leading a discussion on How to Find Leaders to Work with Youth Programs. Who to Look For and How to Attract Them to Working

with Youth.

Following the afternoon workshops which begin at 1:00 p.m. there will be time for students to talk with various experts and youth leaders about

the presentations. A special youth mass will be held at 3:00 p.m. at Santa Rita Church which will feature the youth choir from Immaculate Heart Catholic Church in Alamogordo.

The day will conclude with a pot luck and dance time before the students return home. Youth groups participating in the youth rally will be from: Carrizozo, Capitan, Alamogordo, Tularosa, Holloman AFB, La Luz, Cloudercroft, Ruidoso, and the Hondo Valley. Well over 100 students have been pre-registered.

There is no admission charge for the youth rally and is open to any junior and senior high student of the area. Each student is asked to bring an item for the pot luck supper at the end of the day.

AT C'ZOZO PUBLIC HEARING—

Animal ordinance topic

The board of trustees held a public hearing for input into an animal ordinance on Tuesday. Fourteen people attended to voice their opinions that domestic livestock should be allowed inside the city limits.

The mayor and trustees said that individuals had told them that they believed that livestock should not be allowed in town. Not one person was present at the meeting to say this.

After considerable discussion, the permit fee for keeping animals in town was set at \$10 for the physical premises. The \$10 fee would cover all species and numbers of animals.

Marvin Rowin told councilors that he would butcher his animals before he would pay the \$10 permit fee. Rowin had earlier told the council that when he bought his property it was outside the city limits and the town had annexed his property to get more taxes.

Rowin said, "I can't eat processed meat. I have two sheep and a calf on five acres. I will butcher them before I pay \$10 for the permit to keep them."

Clovis Perry told the trustees, "Animals are not offensive. We paid for our land at the edge of town so we could have animals. Now we are being penalized."

City Attorney Don Dutton said the present ordinance was too unclear and vague. Before it was decided to have one permit for all livestock, Dutton said the trustees needed to break each species down.

Mayor Harold Garcia said the cost of the permit was not to raise revenue but to cover the costs of the permit and enforcement.

There will be a public hearing before the resolution is adopted. The proposed ordinance retains the restriction that cows or horses over six months of age will be kept on an area not less

than one-third acre for each equine or bovine.

The restriction that domestic livestock would be kept not less than one hundred yard from churches, schools, food services establishments, and inhabited dwellings was removed from the ordinance.

Suggested fines for livestock running at large were, \$25 for the first offense, \$100 for the second offense, \$150 for the third offense, and after that no permit would be issued for livestock in town.

Trustees also decided that disposition of unredeemed animals after five days of impoundment would be to turn them over to the state livestock board.

Several men at the meeting said there is not much of a way you can keep animals from getting out.

In other business, Trustees accepted the bid for airport fuel from Pride Marketing of Abilene, Texas. The bid for \$1.50 a gallon with a two cent discount if the bill is paid in

ten days, is for 100 octane low lead fuel. Federal taxes of 9 cents a gallon and state taxes of eleven cents a gallon are included in the bid for 2,000 gallon delivery to be split with Ruidoso.

The proposed resolution on a safe and unhampered overpass was tabled.

Lincoln County Animal Control officer Duane Vinson attended the meeting in addition to having written a letter to the council. Vinson told trustees that he could not enforce the municipal animal ordinance but that he could assist city police.

Vinson is currently helping police chief C. A. Morales trap cats.

Vinson said the adoption rate for dogs is two out of 25. State law says that dogs over 14 months of age are not adoptable because of habits that have been formed.

There will be no meeting Dec. 25. The next regular meeting of the board of trustees will be January 8, 1985.

Local board election slated for February

School Board elections for the Carrizozo District will be held Tuesday, February 5, 1985, according to information released recently by the New Mexico School Boards Association.

Citizens interested in filing for office may do so between December 18, 1984 and January 2, 1985, 5:00 p.m. at the Superintendent's office. The office will not be open for declaration of candidacy on December 25 and January 1, but will be open 8:00-5:00 p.m. otherwise.

Position One (a six year position) and Position 5 (a two year position) will be vacant. Voters in the election are eligible if registered in the Carrizozo (Precincts 3 and 4), Nogal,

Ancho, or Claunch precincts.

The consolidated voting location will be at the office of the Superintendent of Schools on February 5 between 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. Newly elected Board members will take office in March, 1985.

Deadline for voter registration at the County Clerk's office is Wednesday, December 26, 1984 at 5:00 p.m. An information session for Board candidates has been scheduled early in January, and local-state level training for newly elected Board members will take place in March.

FAMILIAR NAMES

The display at the school library of county school records from one room school houses dating from 1922 to 1938 have drawn the attention of history buffs.

A few of the names which I picked at random included:

1923-24 Sylvester Baca, Geronimo Beltran, Brack Cornett, Leo Sanchez, Marcelina Beltran.

1925-26 Frank English, Juan Jaurqui, Antonio Navarro, Tranquilino Silva, Johnson Stearns, Thelma Shaver, Cecilia Vidaurri, Ruben Chavez.

1927-28 George Cooter, Manuel Chavez, Gene Dow, Fay Harkey, Florentino Lopez, William Nickels, Otto Prehm, Marvin Roberts, Preciliano Pino, Tennis Bigelow, Bobbie Crenshaw, Nellie Gallegos, Beatrice Tino.

Most of the classes were comprised of students from all grades. The teacher's daily register and class books belonged to teachers Annie McDonald (Bogle); Mrs. E. Dorsey (Rabenton); Mrs. S. H. Nickels (Carrizozo); Elva S. Wilson (Ancho) Rafaelita Salazar (Jack's Peak); Olive A. Smithson (Oscuro); Marie Merchant (White Oaks).

PARENTAGE

It was interesting to read the information filled in by the teachers concerning the students' nationality. 'English' or 'Spanish' was the nationality logged for most of the pupils.

Did that mean that the pupil's parents originally came from England or Spain? Beats me. Variations on nationality included 'English American', 'Anglo American' or 'Spanish American'. There was only one

listing of 'German' and that was the Degner family.

The all-grades class of teacher Rafaelita Salazar included only 'Spanish' students. The teacher's home was in Lincoln and she taught at Jack's Peak. Her students were taught reading, arithmetic, spelling, geography, history, health, English and agriculture. The occupation listed for all the students' head of household was farming.

VARIED OCCUPATIONS

Occupations of other fathers were many and varied. Very few mothers in Lincoln County listed an occupation. The daily register had a place for telephone numbers. Apparently no one had a phone. One pupil's father was J. H. Fulmer, telephone manager. He had no phone according to the record.

Other occupations listed from 1922 through to 1938 included mining, cooking, ranching, merchant, cowboy, housekeeper, railroader, section foreman, mechanic, pumper, cattleman, farmer, janitor, laborer, mining engineer, coal hauler, dry cleaning, road work, telegraphy, mail carrier and sheepherding.

Mother's Helper - This job includes doing some light housework. Boys can be companions to small boys who do not have older brothers. Other work can include running errands, lawn work, helping with the dishes and story telling.

Pet Sitting - A good service to offer business people who are

away from home all day and don't have a chance to exercise their pets.

Home-made candy - If you make a special kind that is a family favorite you can probably sell it.

Laundromat Service - Pick up, wash, dry and fold laundry for people who cannot get away to handle the job. They supply money for machines and detergent.



IN a rare burst of loquaciousness Calvin Coolidge once remarked: "Work is not a curse, it is a prerogative of intelligence, the only means to manhood, and the measure of civilization. Savages do not work." Join me in applying this standard to the gentleman who sauntered into the office one day last week with a stimple, direct question: "Are you hiring?" Our indomitable Donna Sterner, who polices the front office, waited for a recitation of his skills. When none was forthcoming, she replied, "No." He turned to leave, reached the door, turned around and inquired, "By the way, what is this place, anyway?"

PEOPLE such as the above deserve to be unemployed. I have often complained that US unemployment figures are grossly inaccurate. Reasons: Many people are between jobs at any given time; that is, they are out of work and will remain so until their unemployment compensation payments cease. Millions are mentally or physically incapable of working at any job. Others have an aversion to work and find it neither embarrassing nor inconvenient to live off taxpayers. Then there are others listed as officially unemployed, not because they can't find some kind of work, but because they haven't found the kind of work they prefer. Strip these people from US unemployment statistics and we probably have "honest unemployment" of about 2 percent. What we have is a nation where a small percentage of adults are really unemployed, mostly from choice.

EVEN as Western nations, such as the US, are sending vast quantities of food to Africa to prevent mass starvation, Julius Nyerere, socialist president of Tanzania and chairman of the Organization of African Unity, was addressing a group of African leaders in Addis Ababa. He urged them to use their \$150 billion collective foreign debt as a political weapon against the West. Hear him out: "We have this debt power and we simply do not use it. I believe now the poor countries of the world have this power, and, oh boy, if my country owed \$100 billion we would simply refuse to pay it back." At the risk of appearing insensitive to the monetary needs of African dictators or to belittle the generosity of Western peoples, I am reminded of an old Arab proverb: "Do no good, and you will suffer no ingratitude."

CRIME, of course, does pay. Sacramento County Sheriff Robbie Waters was convicted of drunk driving. Later, on Nov. 14, Superior Court Judge Benjamin Diaz, Sacramento, was convicted of soliciting and engaging in an act of prostitution. His Honor was fined and sentenced to repairing toys for two days and kept right on rousting drunk drivers. San Diego Mayor Roger Hedgecock was re-elected Nov. 6 in the midst of his own trial on civil and criminal charges arising from alleged illegal campaign contributions and 12 counts of perjury. Elsewhere on the Moral Liberated Front, Democrat Gerry Studts, who achieved wide acclaim for having engaged in sexual relations with a page boy, was re-elected to the US Congress by all those nice folks in Massachusetts who also brought us Tipsey O'Neill and the Kennedys, ad nauseum. Worse, the California legislature reconvened. This country better have a sense of humor.



Reagan administration on abortion clinic bombings and embassy invasions

WASHINGTON — The Reagan White House is on record as opposing the bombing of abortion clinics. When asked about two such atrocities in Maryland, White House deputy spokesman Marlin Fitzwater replied: "They are an outrage. They must be stopped. Whoever did it should be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law. I don't think there's ever been any question of our abhorrence for that kind of bombing activity."

Chief White House Spokesman Larry Speakes was, however, nowhere near as precise or straightforward in condemning the non-lethal and non-violent, but internationally outrageous sport of Congressional Embassy In-vading.

This new recreation is the brainchild of the Rev. and Hon. Walter Fauntroy, the Congressional Delegate of the District of Columbia, black activist Mary Berry, holdover member of the US Civil Rights Commission, and Randall Robinson, chief lobbyist for the Black African Dictators Front called "TransAfrica." The three visited the South African Embassy and sat in at it until they were arrested and hauled out by the police.

Spokesman Robinson and others say that the daily invasion of the South African Embassy by members like Reps. Charles Hayes, John Conyers and others from the segregated Congressional Black Caucus will continue until they get their way. They promise that they will be joined by other civil rights militants — except for the Rev. Jesse Jackson. He says he backs their effort but won't participate, because he is going to South Africa and engage in "personal diplomacy" to end apartheid there.

These Congressmen and activists are getting themselves a lot of headlines. And when Presidential Spokesman Speakes was asked about how the White House looks on this, he spoke as if he had misplaced his tongue. Speakes mumbled something about the Embassy being foreign territory and that therefore we were simply providing police assistance at the Ambassador's request.

This type of pass-the-buck reaction to the Congressional violation of an embassy hardly breeds respect for President Reagan's expressed concern for the protection of US embassies overseas. And it inevitably raises the question as to whether the White House Spokesman would provide such a milquetoast reaction if, for example, a dozen or so of the huskiest and most militant members of the Jewish Defense League were to engage in a similar invasion of the Soviet Embassy.

The Washington Post published an incredible editorial actually commending Fauntroy's internationally outrageous political grandstanding. But it failed to raise the question as to why, if Fauntroy is sincerely devoted to freedom's cause, he hasn't invaded the Soviet Embassy or the embassies of a number of black African dictators.

photographs of starving Ethiopians, consider the reports only the beginning. UNICEF editor John Richardson writes that "similar patterns are taking place in Chad... and in varying degrees in Mali, Mauritania, Senegal, Somalia, Kenya, Tanzania, Mozambique, Zambia, Botswana and Zimbabwe."

Those are all nations run by black governments, in some cases black Marxist governments, like Zimbabwe's comrade Robert Mugabe. So how do Congressmen Fauntroy, Mayes, Conyers and the others react? Do they protest Marxism? Do they speak out against the lethal effect of black dictatorships or black one-party systems on African agriculture?

They do not. Instead, this stable of political demagogues race to break police lines and get themselves arrested for invading the Embassy of South Africa, which nation is feeding starving blacks all over Africa. The next time you see one of those photographs of a starving black Madonna, think of Marxism; think of black power; and think of the priorities of black politicians, who'd rather try to embarrass a white government which is feeding blacks than try to induce self-serving black dictators to feed the starving millions of black babies, women and elderly facing death in their own countries.

The badly divided 1984 Legislature, rather than raise taxes as Gov. Toney Anaya suggested, or cut spending as others urged, ended up spending \$30 million more than projected revenues.

In an apparent response to this pressing problem, a so-called Citizens' Tax Study Committee was formed.

It was not truly a citizens' committee since half of its members were either on state or local government payrolls.

It recently made a series of recommendations for changes in the tax laws to the Legislature. This included some rather innocuous recommendations such as requiring corporations to make quarterly estimated state tax payments and changing the child care tax credit.

Other recommendations are more serious and could have an extremely negative effect on the state, particularly on public schools and universities.

The proposals include imposing a gross receipts tax on gasoline in addition to the present 11 cents per gallon tax; more than doubling the excise tax on automobiles, airplanes and off-road vehicles; and taxing sales of newspapers and certain real estate commissions.

It includes increasing the tax on insurance premiums by more than 40 percent for out-of-state companies and nearly fivefold for in-state companies.

It requires an addback of state income tax when calculating your state taxable income. This has the effect of double taxation on those who pay income tax.

While all these recommendations for tax increases may alarm the populace, they are not nearly as dangerous or destructive to the funding of state government, particularly education, as are the changes in distribution of state revenues.

In spite of the fact that cities have more than doubled their revenues in the past five years, this plan gives them 15 percent of

the state income tax and the right to impose an additional 20 percent income surtax.

The amazing part of the plan is that after funds are transferred to local government and the road fund, the state's general fund ends up with \$26.6 million less.

If this is added to the current \$30 million general fund shortfall, drastic reductions in education and vital state services or large increases in taxes will be required to balance the budget.

The long-term implications of this plan are as bad for the people of the state as the fact that they are paying more taxes.

First, New Mexico would be leaving a policy with general public acceptance of spending all monies collected from road taxes on highway construction.

Local governments would be collecting 45 percent of revenues from any gross receipts tax imposed on gasoline, with no guarantee that these monies would be spent on roads.

New Mexico's highways are heading for trouble in future years without additional sources of funding.


To give local government nearly half of the revenues from any additional road tax is to guarantee deterioration of our highways.

To give municipalities 15 percent of the income tax and the power to impose another 20 percent income surtax makes no sense.

Municipalities were just given the right last year to impose another one-half cent gross receipt tax. None have used this authority yet.

There is some reason to believe that the Citizen's Tax Study Committee was designed to give Gov. Anaya the results he wants: More and more taxes without regards for results.

Let's hope that the newly elected Legislature will give this committee and its report a brief funeral and will look to other sources when it faces the problems of taxation in the 1985 session.

—And, as one might suspect, there are clear indications that the two who have been arrested (and whose subsequent careers may be ruined by that fact) are not the only ones involved. The affidavit from FBI man Thomas Gillespie speaks of a meeting with "others" last July to plan

this attempt at political arm-twisting.

Again, do you think you can find any New Mexican who will not suspect that those "others" are the superiors of Troutman and Johnson?

PSYCHOLOGY: If you are asking how two supposedly intelligent individuals could do something so dumb, you might want to consider two conditions which prevail.

One is the "climate" in which any administration operates. That, of course, is set by the people at the top. If they give off the message, even implicitly, that conduct of this kind is expected and rewarded, this is the

kind of conduct we will get.

And there's an additional element which applies here. People hired to handle great quantities of money, as these two were, sometimes begin almost imperceptibly to believe that the power, the mana, all those dollars have in our society has been transferred to them personally. They get a heady sense of potency, which is not really there. Put simply, they sometimes grow too big for their britches and believe they cannot take a fall.

Think of the shock they suffer when the men knock on the door and say, "We are from the FBI."





Ask Dr. Dan—

What is hypothermia and how do you treat it? T. C.

Hypothermia is a lowering of the body temperature. This is brought on by heat loss from the body by various means. These include conduction (lying on the cold ground), convection (a cold wind and radiation of heat into the air). The body protects itself by first reducing blood flow to the arms, legs and skin.

Shivering is an attempt by the muscles to generate more heat to raise body temperature. If heat loss continues, the core temperature will begin to drop. Symptoms will appear, which may include clumsiness, intense shivering, confusion, loss of judgement, drowsiness, lethargy, coma and death.

The best treatment of hypothermia is to know the early symptoms and to start treatment at the earliest possible time. When in the outdoors, get a

weather forecast and plan your itinerary and clothing accordingly. Keep clothing dry if at all possible. Get out of high winds. Insulate the body from the ground. Eat warm foods and drink for the heat and energy. Do not exercise to the point of exhaustion.

If somebody has signs of hypothermia, wrap them in warmed blankets if possible. Warmed objects may be placed next to the trunk but be sure they are not hot enough to burn the victim. Immersion in a tub of warm (102 degrees F) water is very effective but can cause

dangerous heartbeat irregularities. Do so only if no medical help is available or if a doctor advises this by phone or radio. Prevention is the best treatment of hypothermia.

New Mexico Heritage

"Lonely La Bajada Mesa was once a gardenspot"

From the jagged tongue of La Bajada Mesa overlooking Interstate 25 one can watch winter's neatly layered storm clouds glide placidly across the Rio Grande Valley. Atop the mesa earth and sky meet unwillingly. Grey clouds churn just beyond arm's reach and rushing winds drag horizontal sheets of snow across the empty hillside.

Below, orange trucks inch up the steep grade, spraying fans of black cinder onto newly fallen snow. Lines of commuters follow cautiously, then hurry on to Santa Fe once the bleak summit has been safely crossed.

For nearly four centuries New Mexicans have avoided La Bajada as an inhospitable and forbidding landmark. Yet it was not always that way. Recently, Santa Fe archeologist Rory Gauthier discovered that there was once a vast patchwork of prehistoric garden plots on the mesa's top.

From the ground, one now sees only small rock piles spaced about six feet apart in neatly laid out grids. But the enormity of the original gardening project is easy to see in aerial photographs—row after row of miniature stone cairns terrace a gently sloping area measuring hundreds of acres.

In some areas individual garden plots are marked by larger cairns and rows of cobbles. Laid out in neat rectangles,

these almost certainly once marked family holdings. However inhospitable the mesa seems today, it has always been first to catch any rain or snow storms penetrating the Santa Fe district.

Storms moistened the mesa's thin soil. Low rock terraces then slowed run-off, preventing erosion, and smooth cobbles protected the soil's moisture from drying winds. To see this for yourself walk on the mesa after

two or three dry, windy weeks, gently turn over a cobble laid there 700 years ago and you can see, feel, even smell the precious moisture trapped underneath.

Corn, beans, and squash may have been planted directly in the modest stone cairns, much as some of Arizona's Hopi farmers continue to do. But the rock piles might also have acted as wind-breaks, protecting young stalks planted on the exposed summit.

No major prehistoric village

is to be found on the mesa's top, so ancient artifacts are very rare. Only a few thumbnail sized pottery fragments have been found. These scant clues suggest that the first cobbled gardens were laid out in the late A.D. 1200's—a time of extended drought in many parts of the southwest.

The gardens were likely tended well into the A.D. 1400's, and may have been afterwards re-used in times of drought. Yet the precise details may now be impossible to determine since, in prehistoric times, farmers carried few personal effects to distant gardens and archeologists rely on datable artifacts.

Men often lived near distant fields during the agricultural seasons while women brought occasional provisions from home villages. Small brush shelters, or ramadas, provided the men temporary living quarters. These are quite like some lean-to "fry bread" stands still seen along the road near Jemez Pueblo. However, such fragile structures don't generally withstand the ravages of time and no certain traces of them

have yet been found on the windswept mesa top.

Just who farmed La Bajada Mesa? Again, we can only guess, but the valley areas immediately below were heavily populated by Keresan language speakers after the A.D. 1300's. So farmers related to modern Cochiti and Santo Domingo Pueblos may once have climbed the forbidding mesa each spring to plant seed, weed, and neat the many rows of small stone cairns.

On your next winter's drive to Santa Fe, steal a glance to the west as you grind up La Bajada. Watch the clouds churn across the summit, leaving precious moisture in their wake.

Nowadays it is desolate, but 700 years ago, despite its appearance, similar storms allowed pueblo farmers to create an impressive gardenspot on the high, wind washed slope.






