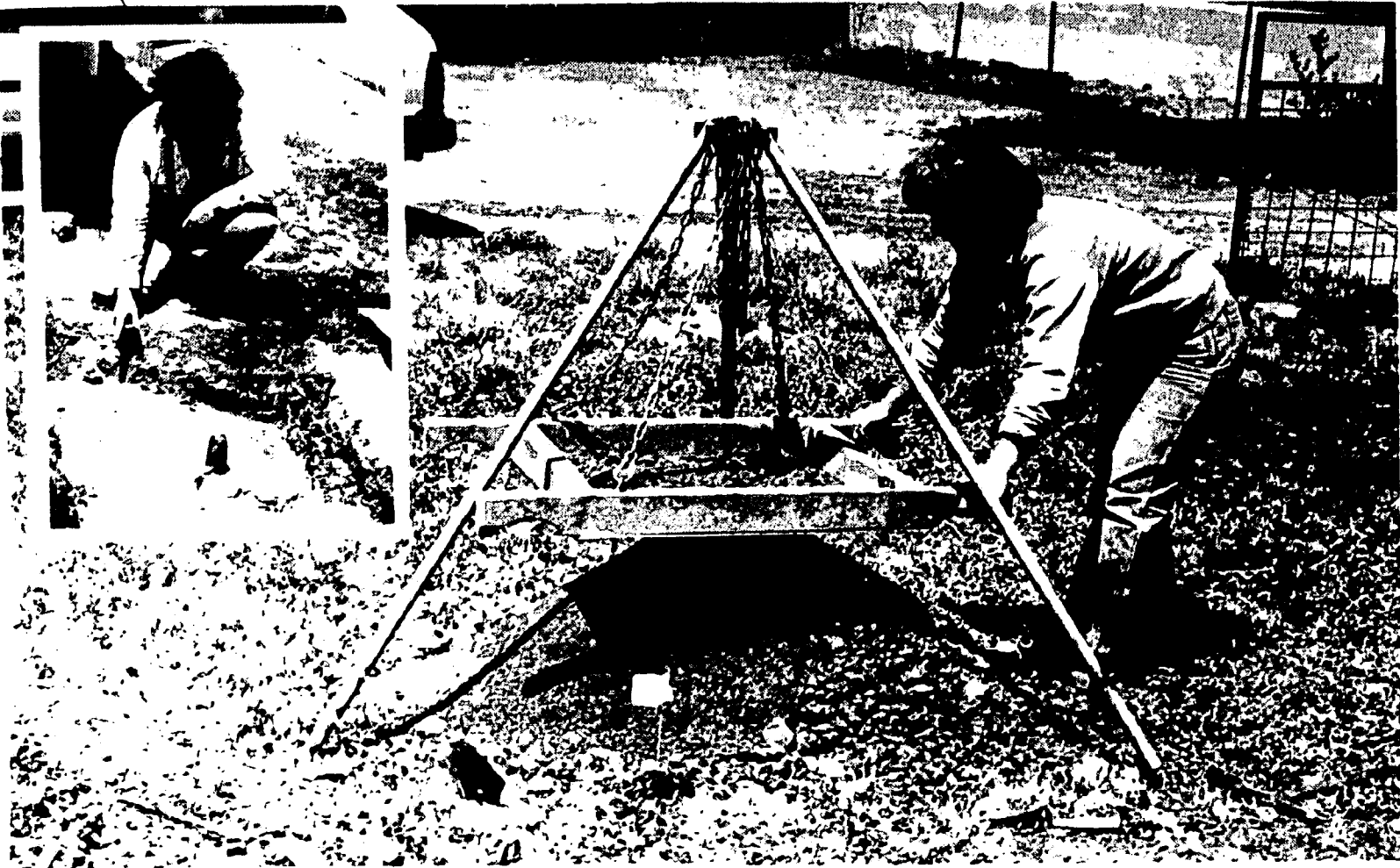

## Capitan coach is suspended

A special meeting was held Tuesday evening, April 23, by the Capitan Board of Education to consider the suspension of track athlete from further participation in track events for the rest of this school year. The meeting was called at the request of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Wheeler, parents of the athlete. The Wheelers were represented by Attorney James R. Aske, Jr. of Carrizozo. Attorney John Kennedy of Santa Fe, legal council for the New Mexico School Board Association, represented the Capitan Board of Education.

This meeting was held before a large crowd in the Multipurpose Building. The meeting, conducted by Mark Delgado, president of the Board of Education, lasted 56 minutes.

At the onset of the meeting Coach John Blea was suspended immediately without pay for the rest of the school year. Blea was

accused of buying a six pack of beer for five Capitan track boys after a track meet in Dexter April 13. The alleged incident took place in Roswell.

Three of the track boys admitted drinking the beer. They have been suspended from track for the rest of the school year. The two boys who did not drink beer were suspended from the Carrizozo Relays only. The above mentioned athlete was the only one of the five boys to be represented by legal council. He (by his council) asked to be punished in some way other than being suspended from track.

After input from local school patrons the Board of Education decided to uphold school policy and the suspension decision.

This policy reads "The use of intoxicants or illegal drugs of any kind will result in the immediate dismissal of the athlete from the squad."

Saturday is the big clean-up day for Carrizozo. Volunteers are asked to meet at the school cafeteria at 8 a.m. before beginning the work.

Commercial and residential property owners are urged to clean their own properties including vacant lots. Large items should be placed on the curb before Saturday morning to be picked up by the town crew. The town crew will assist in the clean-up with garbage trucks and large trucks.

Various youth groups have volunteered to help with the clean-up. More adult volunteers are needed to help supervise and transport the younger volunteers. Adults with pickups are also needed for Saturday morning.

Headquarters for the clean-up activities will be the school cafeteria. Local civic groups have been asked to provide refreshments.

A grand prize will be awarded to the team that brings in the most sacks filled with trash. Participation prizes will be awarded these include swimming pool passes and ice cream cones.

Jim Miller has agreed to be chairman of the clean-up activities. Miller said, "The emphasis this year on the clean up is to get more Carrizozo adults involved in improving the appearance of their town."

## Jr. deputies number nineteen in Corona

The Corona branch of the Lincoln County Junior Deputy Sheriff's was formed in November 1984 and is the second such branch formed in Lincoln County.

Currently there are 19 members enrolled in the program. Meetings are held every third Thursday of the month in room 117 at the Corona High School. Meetings start at 4 p.m. and usually last about one hour. Parents of members are invited to attend the meetings.

The Corona Jr. Deputies have toured the local jail, radio dispatch room, and booking facilities of the Lincoln County Jail in addition to having heard

several guest speakers so far. Duties of the Sheriff's office and officers and basic law enforcement have been covered to this point.

Future plans are for more field trips with speakers and demonstrations on investigation techniques, first aid, gun safety, animal control, alcohol abuse information, hunter safety, automobile safety, traffic control, drug abuse information, criminal and civil law, and numerous other items will be covered as the program proceeds.

All children age 6 through 17 are invited to attend. Badges and

patches are issued to Jr. Deputies.

SP to pave 'E' street pedestrian crossing

A special meeting of the Town of Carrizozo Board of Trustees was held Tuesday afternoon to discuss the pedestrian

overpass. Mayor Harold Garcia conducted the meeting with Trustees Bob Hemphill and Eddie O'Brien in attendance.

Garcia read a proposed resolution that stated that the Southern Pacific Railroad has significantly increased rail traffic through and the number and length of stops in the town, and at the at-grade-crossing on "E" Street is the only approved, maintained, and safe crossing for pedestrian traffic. Many residents must walk across the railroad tracks, emergency vehicles are at times required to use the "E" Street crossing, the "E" Street crossing is an approved school bus route, and traffic hazards are created when trains block the crossing was also part of the resolution.

Railroad, State, and County officials were present at the meeting, to discuss options with local residents and the Board.

John J. Tierney, Special Assistant-Government Relations, Southern Pacific Transportation Company, Larry Phipps, Division Superintendent, Southern Pacific, Fred Friedman, NM Department of Transportation, Lou Medrano, District Engineer, State Highway Department, Roswell, John

Cochran, South Eastern New Mexico Economic Development District, and Lincoln County Manager Suzanne Cox were present.

Tierney told the Board that the railroad can alleviate the situation and let traffic through while the crews are being changed. Trains coming from El Paso will stop before the "E" Street crossing to change engine crews and then move on and stop the end of the train at the depot to change the other crew. Trains coming from Tucumcari will also stop so as to not block the crossing while changing crews.

Medrano agreed with Phipps and Tierney that people will not use an overpass even when a ramp is provided for wheelchairs and bicycles. Medrano said, "People will climb fences rather than use the overpass."

It was also mentioned that for those restricted in walking, the stairs are an additional strain.

"No Trespassing" signs have been posted and torn down and will probably be put up again along the railroad tracks. When asked about putting a pedestrian walkway across the middle of the train yards, Tierney said, "A walkway across the middle of the

yard is inviting people to come across our yard and then we are liable."

Phipps said, "We don't want people to cross there."

The alternative that was agreed upon was for the railroad to put in a five foot wide pedestrian crossing at the "E" Street crossing. The pedestrian crossing will be only for the use of pedestrians, wheelchairs, and bicycles. It will be smoother than the vehicle crossing.

O'Brien told those present that people are going to use the shortest route.

The question then was, "Which is more important, to be safe or take a shortcut?"

Scott Shafer said that a sidewalk would be needed from the residential area to the pedestrian crossing on "E" Street. People will not walk in the road or through the yuccas and dust to use the crossing.

It is encouraged that people use the new crossing when it is completed. Tierney estimated that the walkway would be ready in 30 days.

The meeting was adjourned for an inspection of the crossing.

## N H staff receives inservice training

The staff at New Horizons Development Center received inservice training on Behavior Management Methods this week.

Dr. Dan Blodgett presented 'When a resident has seizures.' Blodgett explained the different types of seizures, how to care for a person having a seizure, medication used to control seizures, and the side effects from the medications.

The Behavior Management training was conducted by Birgit LaMothe Ph. D., counselor from the Capitan Counseling and Consulting Services.

The Behavior Management program introduced the concept of behavior management to direct care employees of residential facilities for developmentally disabled persons. It taught four basic behavior management techniques: Positive Reinforcement, Instructional Control, Graduated Guidance, and Different Reinforcement of Incompatible Behavior.

Objectives of the program

were to know what behavior management is and ways in which it is part of the duties of the staff, describing how behavior management techniques provide advantages to residents and staff, positive reinforcers to change behavior, and describing the key operations in instructional control, graduated guidance, and differential reinforcement of incompatible behavior techniques of behavior control.

Birgit LaMothe, Ph.D., provides counseling services for individuals, couples, families, and school referrals. Consulting services include speakers for events, workshop programs, inservice training, and courses in the areas of parenting, self-improvement, and stress management.

Some goals of the Capitan Counseling and Consulting Service are fostering self-reliance, becoming encouraged and encouraging, conquering fear of failure, skill in making

decisions, and self determination rather than victimization.

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# WATCH OVER WASHINGTON

## How about a Reagan newspaper?

WASHINGTON — Across the nation, Conservatives are having a hard time with a new malady; B. W. S., or Buchanan Withdrawal Syndrome.

They very much miss the newspaper, radio and television output of President Reagan's new Director of Communications, Patrick J. Buchanan. For Mr. Buchanan is the Grand Master of the Meat Axe School of Political Commentary.

Buchanan's replacement on radio and TV is Robert Novak. Mr. Novak is good as a columnist. But he is comparatively tepid when it comes to emulating Buchanan's joyful relish in regularly wiping the floor with liberal foil Tom Braden. And Braden is currently looking more and more like the lead role in The Mummy's Curse.

Meanwhile, across town, the eminently readable and growingly feisty Washington Times is almost devoid of advertising. But, at long last, it is becoming honorable. Under the new management of Arnaud de Borchgrave, it has finally reported a circulation audit. And by striking contrast to the 120,000 reported by ex-editor James Whelan, its circulation is a mere 72,000.

This lack of both ads and subscribers is primarily because it is owned by companies controlled by that brainwashing demigod, Sun Myung Moon. Mr. Moon is soon to be released from federal prison. He is therefore deluging thousands of local clergy with expensive TV video tapes which attempt to explain "the Truth" about his Unification Church.

Having spent more than a hundred million to provide Washington with a badly needed alternate voice, Moon might well consider donating The Washington Times to a non-profit, non-sectarian foundation, whose directors could be appointed by President Reagan. Something on the order of The Foundation For An Alternate Media In Washington could continue The Times. But it would have a new lease on life, having jettisoned the Moon albatross.

The new part-time editor-in-chief could be Pat Buchanan, with Arnaud de Borchgrave continuing as editor. The Washington Times could become the first presidential daily — the first major newspaper to be published by somebody that the public had some choice in selecting. (If the Big Media autocrats who control accrediting reporters to Congress were to try to discriminate against Times reporters — as they have against the Voice of America — the White House, State Department and Pentagon press passes and free facilities of such Big Media reporters could be lifted until they decided to be as tolerant of a US government media as they are of TASS news agency and the BBC.)

The equipment is all there at The Washington Times, whose facility on New York Avenue is so resplendent that it is known as "Xanadu."

Buchanan has enough experience in journalism and enough common sense to make The Times a daily newspaper which would not only allow dissent — but would drive The Washington Post straight up the wall.

It wouldn't be too difficult for The Times to drive most of the

Big Media wild. Buchanan could provide an almost daily complement of exclusive news releases to The Times, which could copyright them, so that the Big Media in reporting this news would always have to mention the paper which had it first. Exclusive interviews — not only throughout the Administration but, in time, by most of Mr. Reagan's loyal fellow Party members on Capitol Hill — would no longer be given to The Post and The Timeses of New York and Los Angeles. They would be given to The Times of Washington.

Under Buchanan's direction, the daily Big Media savaging of the President would be answered in print (and eventually, most probably, on a new electronic network) right along with the latest news which The Washington Times would always have first.

Without the Moon connection, and with the Buchanan flair previously unknown in government handouts, the new Washington Times as America's first administration-administered newspaper could take off. If anything as drag-looking as 67 The Wall Street Journal, or a calico-quilt like USA Today, can sell nationally, so could The Washington Times. It would feature two veteran media stars, like Pat Buchanan and Ron Reagan, who is already performing as a weekly radio commentator.

The very idea of a government-owned daily would be regarded as foul heresy by Big Media. But within the free world, there is at least one precedent in the century. In 1926, when Britain's labor baron Ernest Bevin managed to set off a general strike, the newspapers were obliged to close down along with most everything else.

William Manchester's most recent biography tells of one publisher, H. A. Gwynne of The Morning Post, who approached the government of Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin. Gwynne offered, if his premises were protected, to put his presses at the disposal of the government. And he predicted he could build a circulation as high as 400,000.

Prime Minister Baldwin readily accepted. But instead of Gwynne, the PM chose to put this project in the hands of his Chancellor of the Exchequer, a vastly experienced author, columnist and war correspondent named Winston Churchill.

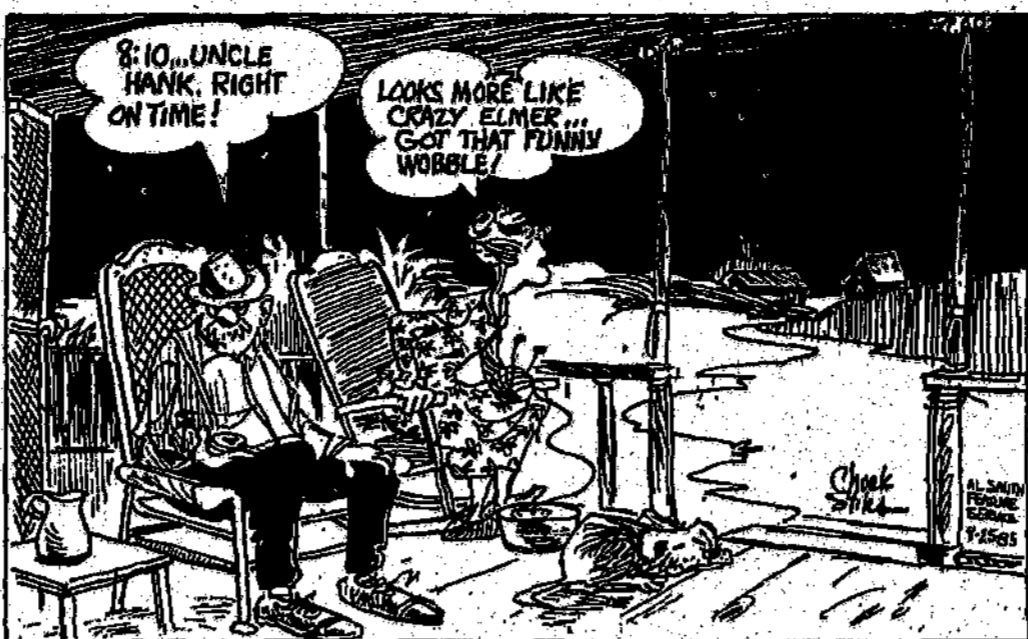
In one week, the circulation of emergency editor Churchill's British Gazette rose from 232,000 to 2,209,000.

When excoriated by Labour Members of Parliament for his fiery (but widely and avidly read) editorials denouncing the general strike, Churchill retorted: "I decline utterly to be impartial between the fire brigade and the fire... In nine days, the general strike had capitulated. Churchill headlined this: "SURRENDER RECEIVED BY PREMIER IN DOWNING STREET." And he wrote in a final editorial:

"The British Gazette may have had a short life, but it has fulfilled the purpose of living. It becomes a memory; but it remains a monument."

SANTA FE—Sure, you're tired of hearing about our state's current political fiasco—but that doesn't make it go away, does it?

So let's change the focus just a little bit. Instead of repeating endlessly what the problem is and how we got into the mess, let's see what we can determine about some underlying causes.

We know we've got a Governor who has managed to reduce himself to almost total irrelevance. The proper answer to any question about "What does Toney Anaya think?" is probably "Who cares?"

We also have in our Legislature a group of dedicated conservatives, intent on stopping government expansion (a point that gains them the support of most New Mexicans), but obviously unable to use their power for any constructive purpose. Liberal legislators, on the other hand, seem paralyzed by

inability to believe times have changed; they appear to spend all their time handwringing and crybabbling about the loss of their former glory.

They all sound like a bunch of political amateurs—and that may be just the problem.

CAMPAIGNER: People coming on this theory for the first time say, "Toney Anaya can't be called a political amateur. Look at that campaign he ran to get himself elected Governor."

True, he is a pro at campaigning, and deserves full credit for that. It's just that he turned out to be an amateur at governing once he got himself elected.

You don't have to go into details to demonstrate that. Just his disastrous appointments to top jobs or his evident inability to understand how the system operates prove the statement.

In two years plus, he has

shown us that he has no philosophy of government, and therefore no criteria by which to judge the value of actions; that he acts on impulse rather than as a result of careful thinking; and that he tends to make things complex when they are totally simple.

What he fails at is being a successful practicing politician.

THE OTHER SIDE: How about the conservatives, who got swept into office on a tide toward their end of the political spectrum which didn't run quite strong enough to give them total control?

The way the Republican Senators sold out to Les Houston, a member of the opposite party, who used them to get him to his personal aim, becoming President Pro Tem of the Senate, shows how callow and non-

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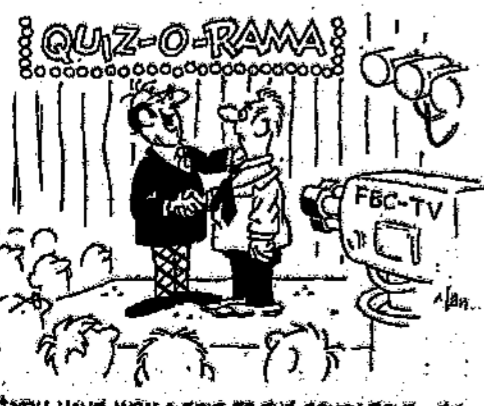
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**BOARD OF DIRECTORS ELECTION SCHEDULED**

**EOB declared candidacy deadline is May 3rd**

The Albuquerque-Bernalillo County Economic Opportunity Board will be electing new representatives to the board of directors. The Economic Opportunity Board is comprised

equally of representatives of the poor, the public and private sectors of the community. Representatives of the public and private sectors are appointed to the board. Poor sector

representatives are elected from the area they are eligible to represent for a two year term. One candidate from each of the following five areas will be elected to the EOB governing board: Santa Fe County, Lincoln County, Mountain Communities (Bernalillo County) and Torrance County. The fourth one is Bernalillo County South and Bernalillo County North.

25 residents of the geographic area which the candidate is eligible to represent. No write-in candidates will be eligible for election to the board. Declarations of candidacy must be received on or before May 3, 1985 at 5 p.m.

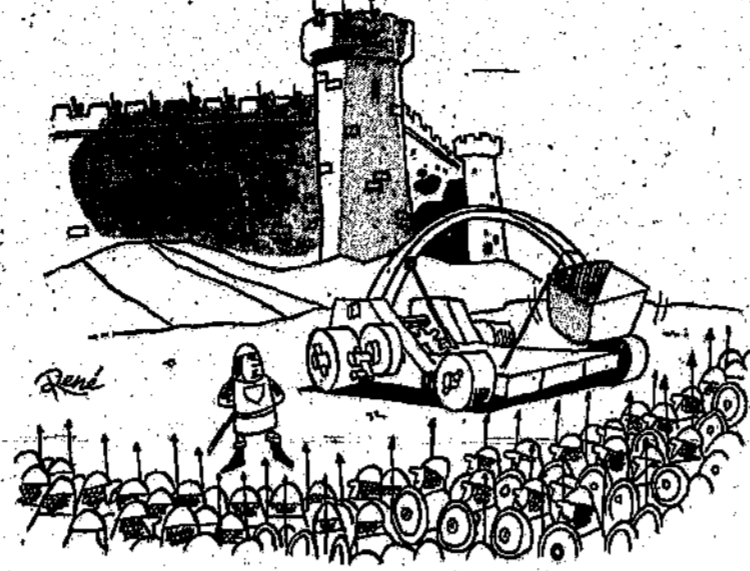
Declarations of candidacy may be submitted through the Economic Opportunity Board Offices in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Carrizozo, Estancia, or the Mountain Communities. Additional information may be obtained through the EOB Central Office in Albuquerque at 786-7221.

Candidates for board membership must meet the following criteria: 1) Candidates must be over the age of 18, 2) Relatives of EOB staff members are not eligible for election to the board, 3) Candidates must be bonified residents of the area they are seeking to represent.

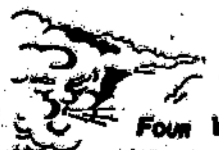
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CAPITAN FFA DOES WELL -- These Capitan ag students are shown exhibiting various awards earned in the areas of horses, livestock, and wool during the year.

### VITAL LINK

If an emergency arises a person can get very excited and scared, especially a child. A loved one or a friend has been hurt or is seriously ill. It could be a neighbor or a stranger has been in an accident.

In Carrizozo, youth who joined the Junior Deputy Sheriffs program were recently instructed on how to call an ambulance by dialing '911'.

The links in the chain of human safety include the public, the dispatcher, first responders, emergency medical technicians, and the medical staff.

You, the public, are the first link in that chain when you make an emergency call. Relate the following information to the dispatcher at the Sheriff's Department, where the '911' call is received.

Speak clearly and calmly. Tell the nature of the emergency (accident, illness). Name and age of sick or injured person. Patient's exact location. Tell dispatcher your name and what number you are calling from. Do not hang up first, let the dispatcher hang up first, the dispatcher may have another question to ask you. If possible have someone outside of residence or near scene of accident to direct ambulance when it arrives (use a flashlight at night). Be precise, give good directions, those directions can save a life!

# VIOLENT LINCOLN COUNTY WAR

There's a question about the turbulent frontier days of Lincoln County, New Mexico, that might interest lots of people: Would there have been a Lincoln County Range War, 1878-1881, had not Billy the Kid come along?

This question somewhat abrupt, could be just as controversial as many other matters connected with Billy the Kid subject, and the Lincoln County War!

Regardless of what the answer might be, Billy the Kid did come along. And there certainly was a violent range war in Lincoln County, all during the stirring frontier days of the New Mexico Territory's largest county, which was Lincoln. And also the largest in the United States!

Billy the Kid had to travel a long way to participate in the fight. But he did. He started out from New York as William H. Bonney, then only a small boy, and went overland with his father and mother to Kansas.

In Kansas his father died. The frontiers had little medication, and flying lead was poison. The widow for reasons which don't concern this subject traveled deeper into the Western frontiers. She landed in Colorado. In a short time she arrived in Santa Fe, spending only short sojourns in these places.

assassination of the Nation's President, Abe Lincoln, which had occurred only a few years earlier.



In 1877, after various renegade episodes, Billy the Kid rode into the Lincoln County War with which his name had become permanently fixed, and into a situation that was exactly suited to his talents, as narrated by the late famous New Mexico writer, Erna Fergusson, who, in the author's opinion, wrote one of the best reports on Billy the Kid's life and the Lincoln County War - if not indeed the most accurate.

The Lincoln County War, in all its furor, involved a hundred civilians and a troop of colored soldiers, to say nothing of the Federal services of Gen. Lew Wallace who was dispatched to the bloody fight. His tour of duty extended from 1878 until 1881. During this time the genius finished writing the immortal Ben Hur: A Tale of Christ, a literary classic that was finished in the most part during the heated Lincoln County War from his quarters in the Old Ellis Ranch Headquarters then situated just east of Lincoln, where the heat of the fight occurred.

In those "free and easy days" even "wild and woolly" as these were when there wasn't a "barbed wire" fence bet-

ween the Rio Grande and the Canadian line, Lincoln County became prime attraction to the "free grass" cattle barons and merchant tycoons.

John Chisum came along, who was probably the King of all early west cattlemen. He claimed headquarters in Roswell, and recognized no perimeters. Fritz and Murphy, who owned the biggest store in the Lincoln Plaza, became stiff competition for Chisum on the range. Col. Fritz has been described as "a German who retired from the U.S. Army."



His partner, Lawrence G. Murphy had been trained for priesthood. "He was a jovial Irishman who often rode over to Fort Stanton for long nights of poker and whiskey with the officers who bought supplies (from his Lincoln store)."

Fritz and Murphy's power extended to and included the Territory capital, Santa Fe, and was undisputed in most all matters.

Law had not yet arrived in Lincoln County; that is with a winning force! Guns constituted the power.

Along about this time, 1875, Alexander A. McSween came to Lincoln County. He

had brought his young wife in an ox-cart to the west! They had decided to pitch in their lot in the promising land, and fight Indians if necessary.

The young couple stopped at the only two-story house in Lincoln, the Fritz-Murphy store.

McSween, a lawyer by schooling, began to counsel the thrifty merchants. His attractive wife attained prominence for them in the frontier social circles, which were sophisticated in Lincoln at the time. Lincoln shortly witnessed the arrival of another individual, a figure who was to play a major role in the Lincoln County War. He was John H. Tunstall.

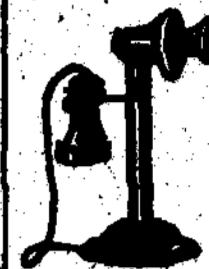


Tunstall had money to invest - lots of it. And this he did. He purchased a lot of land on the Rio Pecos, stocked it with cattle. Not stopping at this, he built a fine adobe store in Lincoln.

McSween changed his arrival plans, and became a partner to Tunstall. And fast friends!

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The year of 1873 found Billy the Kid with a brand - new step father, and a residence in Silver City, New Mexico. Here the mother operated a boarding house which catered to the rowdy miners of the booming mine fields.

One day not long after the Kid moved - with his mother to Silver City, he then only 12 years old, and his mother were walking down the dirt street, to do some shopping for the boarding house.

A loafer on the street, probably three or four sheets in the wind, made a hasty remark about the Kid's mother. History says she was a beautiful woman, and her picture bears this out.

The curt remark didn't go over so well with the mother's little son. A fight ensued. Billy was about to be mauled.

Another man on street stepped up and did the thrashing for the losing lad, a job that Billy would have done all by himself had it occurred only a few months later, after he had become seasoned by participation in nefarious range deals in the Arizona Territory.

What happened resulted in a killing. Some say this was not a murder. But reliable sources confirm that it was. Not long after the street incident, the Kid's defender got tangled up in a serious fracas in a Silver City saloon.

The Kid was in the saloon, where he had become accustomed to spending lots of time with barroom patrons.



When the fight reached the point that town bully had the upper - hand of the Kid's friend, little Billy quickly whipped out his knife, and put a quietus to the whole thing, by laying the bully dead on the floor, with his life's blood pouring all over the place.

Billy the Kid had killed the first of 21 men that soon became accredited to him, before Sheriff Pat Garrett gunned him to death at the age of 21, in Fort Sumner, when the Kid was unarmed.

Frightened, the lad fled the saloon. He stopped by the boarding house only long enough to explain to his mother what had happened, and kiss her good bye.

Then he lit a shuck for parts that in a few turbulent months developed from a smoldering matter into violent action that was never paralleled during the days of the Old West, a subject that in time demanded printed matter which far surpassed that used to account the grisly

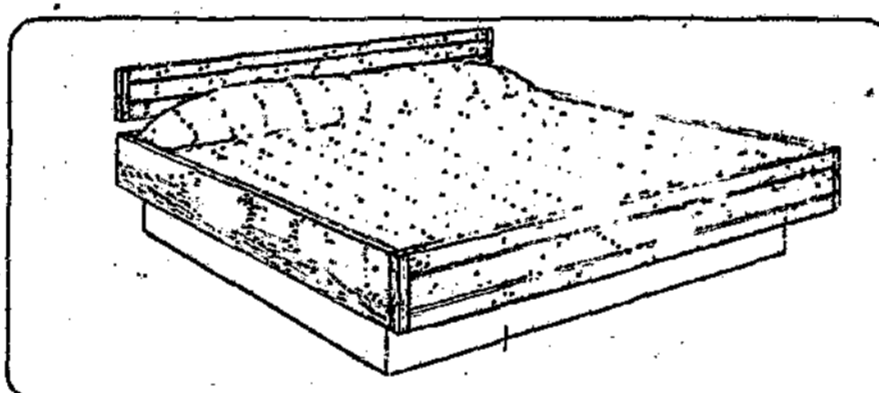


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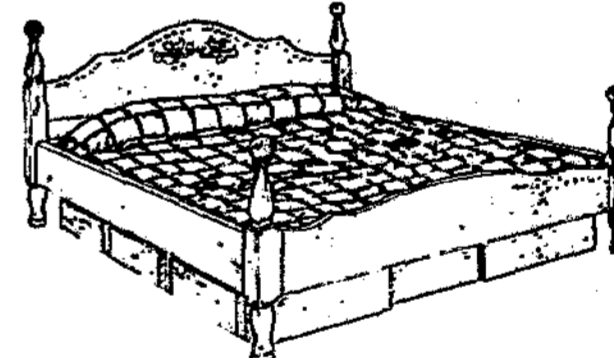
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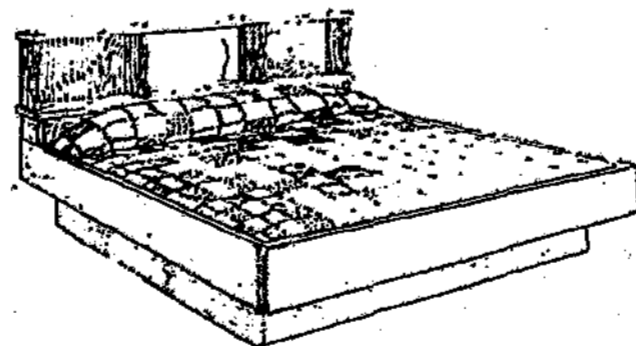
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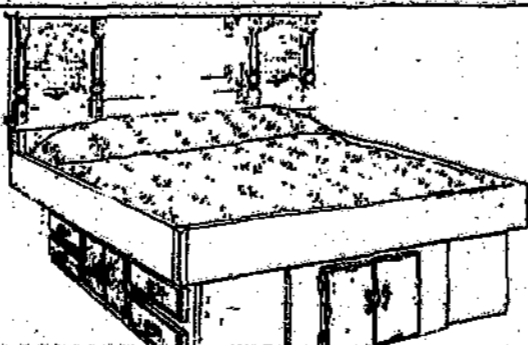

NOTICE OF A FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT OF THE SGT. YORK AND CHAPARRAL TEST AND EVALUATION PROGRAMS WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, NEW MEXICO

TO ALL INTERESTED AGENCIES, GROUPS, AND PERSONS:

PROPOSED ACTION: The US Army proposes to conduct live fire test and evaluation programs of the SGT. YORK and CHAPARRAL air defense weapons systems. The programs would be conducted at Red Rio Range, White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico during May 1985. The proposed action involves firing at full scale aerial and ground targets. The targets would be remote controlled. A total of approximately 14,000 rounds would be fired; munitions consist of proximity fuse, point detonating and target practice tracer rounds. Approximately 350 personnel would be involved; the test and evaluation would require approximately three weeks.

PURPOSE OF THE ACTION: The purpose of the test and evaluation programs is to determine the effectiveness of the two systems to defend against attack helicopters, high performance fixed wing aircraft, and various ground weapons systems during combat situations. The results of the program will facilitate the determination of the need for subsequent funding for further research and development of the two systems.

ALTERNATIVES CONSIDERED: Alternative locations and schedules were considered

during the preparation of the EA, as well as the no action alternative. These are described below.

1. Location. Seven Army installations were evaluated as potential sites of the programs. Evaluation criteria included aerial firing and drone control, tactical employability, and terrain. WSMR ranked first among all seven installations for the sum of these criteria. Other sites on WSMR were also evaluated; Red Rio Range was selected since it met the criteria and was previously contaminated with high explosive (HE) ordnance.

2. Schedule. Numerous schedules were considered; however the proposed schedule is the only one which coincides with both the production phase of the SGT. YORK system and the available schedules at other installations which are supporting other phases of the SGT. YORK test and evaluation program (i.e., force-on-force maneuvers at Ft. Hunter Liggett, California).

3. No Action. The no action alternative would preclude all impacts. However, the project's purpose and need would not be satisfied. This alternative is still viable.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONSEQUENCES: Potential environmental consequences are briefly discussed, by category, in the following paragraphs.

1. Water Quality and Supply. Water supplies will be trucked in from Stallion Range Camp. Due to the short time frame and limited personnel, no significant impacts to the area's ground water supply is expected. Portable latrines and solid waste dumpsters will be maintained by an approved and licensed contractor (s). Two fueling points will be established; each will have a 2.0 foot dike constructed around the site to contain any accidental spills. Therefore, no significant impacts to the area's water quality would be anticipated.

2. Geology and Soils. Limited construction activities would disturb soils at tracking, maintenance, and firing sites. These sites will be revegetated at the conclusion of the program to avoid excessive erosion and runoff rates. Offroad activities will primarily include drone recovery and fire suppression teams; these activities will be localized and should not result in significant impacts to the area's geological or soil formations.

3. Air Quality. Air pollutants expected to be produced include suspended particulates (i.e., dust) carbon monoxide, hydrocarbons and nitrogen oxides. These emissions are not expected to cause significant adverse effects due to the relatively small amounts of emissions, the limited time frame, the remoteness of the project area, and the prevailing winds which will allow for rapid dispersal.

4. Ecological Resources. Limited vegetation communities will be altered or destroyed as a result of construction activities, offroad vehicle traffic, and fires. The magnitude of the latter two impacts are undetermined; construction activities will destroy only about six acres. No fish populations occur in the project area. Wildlife populations possibly would be adversely affected by increased noise levels which may disrupt breeding and courtship rituals and/or fracture eggs of birds which may be

nesting in the area. Laser targeting systems on the SGT. YORK may be hazardous to wildlife; the magnitude of these effects have not been identified. Fires would affect wildlife both directly and indirectly by destroying valuable habitat. The magnitude of these impacts would depend upon the location and time of the fire, current weather conditions, and the response time and efficiency of the fire suppression team. No impacts should occur to Federally listed endangered and threatened species. Swainson's hawk, a New Mexico protected species, may nest in the area.

5. Cultural Resources. No significant impact to the area's cultural resources which have been identified are anticipated. There is a potential for adverse impacts to cultural sites that were not identified in the unsurveyed sample areas. One historical site (Withers Tank) is located about 1.25 miles from the firing sites. This property is presently under litigation and should be protected from all possible impacts.

6. Socioeconomic Resources. Slight beneficial economic impacts are expected to occur due to lodging and per diem allowances that will be expended at private hotels-motels and restaurants in the area. Other expenditures, such as solid waste contractors, will also result in slight short term benefits. US Highway 380 will be closed for a brief period for one day only during the CHAPARRAL test firing; no other effects to the area's transportation systems are expected. A portion of WSMR's special oryx and mule deer hunt areas may be lost; no other recreational facilities or activities would be affected. Holloman Air Force Base, which normally uses the Red Rio Range on a daily basis, would be required to reschedule training activities during the test and evaluation programs. Provided that proximity fuse duds become nonhazardous within seven days after the completion of the tests, no long term effects to Holloman and, consequently WSMR, would be expected.

CONCLUSION: The aforementioned analyses demonstrate the conclusion of the Environmental Assessment (EA) that the proposed action would not cause significant impact upon the area's environment. Accordingly, the US Army White Sands Missile Range has determined that an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (PL 91-190) is not required. All interested agencies, groups, and persons not in agreement with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration of the Commander, White Sands Missile Range, within 15 days of this notice. The proposed action will not be implemented prior to the expiration of the specified comment period. Address all correspondence in reference to this notice to:
