# Judge over-rules

On Friday, April 26, 1985, in Alamogordo, NM, District Court Judge Sandra A. Grisham ruled that there was sufficient evidence to support a preliminary injunction preventing the Capitan School Board from suspending athletes from participating in track meets until a hearing on a permanent injunction could be held.

The athlete Dewey Keller was represented by James R. Askew Jr. of Carrizozo, NM. The School District was represented by John Kennedy.

The incident in question resulted from the athlete being suspended for drinking a beer on the way home from a track meet. The beer was furnished by the coach, and the Capitan School **Regulations prohibited an athlete** from the illegal use, transportation, or possession of alcoholic beverages.

Keller, had previously broke the 1-A High School Record for the State of New Mexico and was hoping to receive a scholarship from his continuing participation in track and field.



Note: The following is Part I of an article written by Carol" Wilson, editor of Livestock Market Digest. The informative write up may be of interest to meat consumers.

My bill at the grocery store last week was \$137.00. If I had five kids and a hungry husband at will complain about paying eight home, that wouldn't have been cents an ounce for round steak too bad. But I thought it was a and turn right around and buy terrible price to pay for food for Stove Top stuffing for 16 cents an

piqued my interest. Her opinion is a popular one. Most people blame their high grocery bills on the "high" cost of meat.

I decided to do some comparative pricing next time I went shopping. I found that the same grocery store that sells beef loins for 16 cents an ounce charges 31 cents an ounce for halibut steak and \$7 cents an ounce for lobster. Something was starting to smell

a little fishy. like. good, home grilled hamburgers, so I decided to find out what they were really costing. Ground beef was a bargain at seven cents an ounce. But the accompanying catsup, mustard and mayonnaise retail for six, 16 and nine cents an المرابعة المتراج والمتراجع المتراجع ounce. Ouch!"

In the next aisle, peanut butter was selling for 13 cents an ounce...and an ounce of crackers to go with it cost 25 cents. Thenew sugar-free Jello is selling like hotcakes, at the prohibitive price of \$1.36 an ounce. And corn up quickly! At those prices, I didn't think eight cent an ounce was too much to pay for a pot

TOBST. Prepared breakfast cereal" was selling for 18 cents an ounce, four cents more than the cost for an ounce of Choice Sirloin steak. Beef was looking like a better buy all the time. I was glad I didn't like steak sauce when I found it. would cost 23 cents an ounce to put sauce on my 14 cent steak. I found that a quarter would purchase an ounce of toothpaste or shampoo and razors retailed for 30 cents apiece. Light bulbs go for a dollar apiece. Deodorant costs 30 cents an ounce. And you can take a porterhouse steak

home for 20 cents an ounce, a nickel less than it takes to buy a roll of toilet paper. And the list continues. One

ounce of tea bags sells for 89 cents, but we haven't seen a reenaciment of the Boston Tea Party. An ounce of Kool-Aid costs 75 cents and coffee goes for 27 cents an ounce, But boneless hams are sold for nine cents per-







SMUGGLING aliens into the United States is a felony offense punishable by a fine of up to \$5,000 and or five years in prison-per illegal alien smuggled, All nations protect their borders with such laws. It is one of the first duties of a nation to protect its borders against persons whose presence in the country would tend to disrupt the economic and political life. Most nations accept refugees and extend asylum to deserving refugees who follow precedures laid down by the host government.

SANCTUARY and asylum is available to all legitimate refugees. The US Immigration and Naturalization Service has adopted guidelines for those who can show that they have a wellfounded fear of persecution for such reasons as race, religion. nationality, membership in social groups, or because of political opinion. However, just wanting to come to the US for a better life, or for propaganda purposes, or to set up a "terrorist" cadre inside our borders to work for a foreign power, are not grounds for asylum.

● ABOUT 200 US churches and synagogues are violating federal law, deliberately, by providing Central American "refugees" with sanctuary inside US borders. This Sanctuary Movement, by violating the law, hopes to convince Congress to halt all anti-Communist support in Central America. This would make it easier for Soviet-backed guerillas to take over Central American nations, thus undermining the security of our own borders.

THERE are between 300,000 and 500,000 Salvadorans already in the US illegally. The Sanctuary Movement leadership has not used the legal avenues available to any of them to gain official asylum status. The US State Department, after an 18month study, has found none of them in danger of persecution by the El Salvador government should they be returned. There has not been one appeal to the US Supreme Court for asylum, even though this machinery exists. In fact, El Salvador is not being consumed by violence at this time, nor has it in the recent past. It is not that the US has closed its doors to legitimate refugees, or that it has failed to "show compassion." The US admits more refugees and immigrants each year than all the other nations of the world combined.

IN spite of all this, leftists and activists, working through churches, religious and educational institutions, are breaking the law because, as their spokesmen say, sheltering and aiding illegal aliens is a "matter of conscience." Churchmen declare they violate the law because of a Higher Law than ours, God's. In doing so, they are putting themselves above law created by the American people. Recently, the cities of Berkeley, CA and Cambridge, MA have flouted federal law by making their jurisdictions "sanctuaries" for illegal aliens. It makes one wonder why these same people have not used normal channels to achieve their ends.

THE clergy take the position that they are bound by God's law to provide sanctuary, no matter what US law says. In the Bible, upon which most rely for guidance, Jesus recognized the necessity of obeying laws of the state: "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's." This admonishment appears wasted on his priests.

NOT long ago I was discussing with a Protestant minister the problems of church and state separation. Where, I asked, does God's law end and the state's begin? "Anything," he replied, "that affects the life of a person is the concern of the church." Assuming that to be so, there appears no valid reason for civil law at all, except to provide enforcement support for church policy. Nothing supports this thesis more than the much-publicized Letters of the US Catholic Bishops. In this document the Bisbops all but assert dominion over mankind's total welfare-social, cultural, economic and political.

GOD'S law, it appears, is what the clergy says it is. Then why do we bother with Congresses and Legislatures? Why not turn the business of governance over to the clergy and let them administer the Higher Law they happily trot out when it meets their needs? I cannot conceive of a more resounding slap in the face to democratic tradition and representative government than these self-anointed holies who seek to substitute Higher Law for those we have enacted and under which we have prospered.

MARTIN Luther King set the stage for this type of insurrection when he established that people should obey only those laws of which they approve. Not long ago draft dodgers were hiding out in churches that believed their Higher Law supercedes federal law. Before that, law-breakers were sheltered in churches in the name of "civil rights," Today, supporters of the Soviet Union's surrogate forces in Central America have this "moral obligation" to stop President Reagan's support for anti-Communist forces in Central America.



Infants will grow and develop normally if fed only breast milk for 12 months, However, most authorities in the field of pediatrics recommend that solid foods be introduced at about 6 months of age. The initial food

McSween and Tunstall commenced to "butter up" John Chisum, for financial connections with the west's biggest cattle king.

"Honest John," as Chisum was often called, took no active part in the heated rival that was rapidly mounting in Lincoln, and all over the county, which had been fired by rapid riches that resulted from daring ventures and big investments.

The story goes that the Murphy Dolan interest became hell-bent to get rid of McSween and Tunstall.

With soaring development, money poured in from everywhere, Lincoln County boasted a rich economy as well as a peak society. Then Billy the Kid came along, already with a "rep" for outlawry unparalleled in the West. He was not old, either,

They say he was hired by Tunstall, to work on the Rio Feliz Ranch. Soon the Kid and Tunstall became steadfast friends.

Tunstall has been quoted as saying, "That's the finest lad I ever met ..., I'm going to make a man out of him yet. He has it in him."

The fast-moving circumstances broke that fired the range war, almost as though the eruption of the powder keg only awaited the arrival of the Kid from a rendezvous of renegade activities in parts west of Lincoln County.

Writer Fergusson has most adequately described the touch off of the blast fuse, saying that it all commenced "... because an insurance company in Philadelphia disputed payment of a policy. Colonel Emil Fritz had left Lincoln and returned to Germany. There he died, leaving in-surance of \$10,000 to his sister and other relatives in Lincoln. The company refused payment on the plea that Fritz had not admitted that he had tuberculosis, and Alexander McSween, as attorney for the Fritz estate, went east to collect."


Erna Fergusson went on to write: "Mr. McSween left his wife in peaceful Lincoln Plaza, comfortable in her adobe house of eight well-furnshised rooms, with her sister for company, books and plano for diversion, and everybody in town as her friends. She had two Negro servants, George Washington and Seburn Bates, and doubtless Mexican girls to help with the housework, Bates is best remembered

because this big hands brought the sweetest notes out of his guitar.<sup>1</sup> Often Frank Coe, fiddler with dash and style, dropped in to play with them. And when John Tunstall and his cowboys were in town, they called on Mrs. McSween too. The Kid had a sweet thin tenor and he loved to sing, especially over the river, a mournful ballad about he would never see his lover again. Who Billy's true love was not certain'; gossip hints that he loved unrequitedly, at least two Lincoln girls whose families were too correct to permit more than dancing at the bailes.

### NEW MEXICO INSIGHT-**Major skirmish is brewing** ice study and Congress is already

This year you'll be hearing a lot about what ranchers pay the government to graze cattle on public lands. The current fee system expires at year's end and already a major skirmish is brewing between livestock producers, federal bureaucrats and so-called environmentalists. The Bureau of Land Management and the US Forest. Service have just released a report listing six possible methods for determing grazing fees and recently presented this seven-year study to New Mexico. ranchers. Judging by the totally negative industry reaction to these costly proposals, it appears this multi-megabuck stack of paper is just another senseless waste of taxpayer money.
