## Road fund request

Santa Fe—Representative Ben Hall (R-Lincoln, Sierra, Chavez), has introduced legislation which would provide the necessary funds to repair Lincoln County roads and bridges destroyed by recent flooding.

HB 485 authorizes the sale of severance tax bonds to repair Carrizo and Gavilan roads in Lincoln County decimated by spring flooding, and HB 484 will provide the funds which were to repair two bridges within the city of Ruidoso which have also been destroyed by flood waters. The bridge repairs will eliminate flooding of homes which has occurred following the bridge destruction.

"I have been working closely with the Lincoln County Commission and Ruidoso City Council on these projects," said Hall. "We suffered two 50 year floods this past fall, and these projects are top priorities in the Ruidoso area."

Hall also introduced a bill providing counties with the option of levying a .03 per gallon gasoline tax.

"During my service on the Lincoln County Commission we never had enough money for the road department, and the present County Commission has the same problem," commented Hall. "We feel that this is the most realistic way to provide the necessary funds for road repairs and other services."

If HB 504 becomes law two-thirds of the money raised by the tax would be allocated to counties, with one-third available to municipalities. The bill also provides a negative referendum on any taxes levied under the bill's provisions.

## Aggies sign Stearns

Stevie Stearns, son of Bob and Sue Stearns, has received a scholarship to play football for the New Mexico State University football squad.

Dr. James Halligan, President of NMSU, and his NMSU staff were in Carrizozo on Feb. 13 when Stevie signed his national letter of intent to play for the Aggies.

Stearns was a running back for the Carrizozo Grizzlies and led the state in rushing last year with 1,953 yards in 10 games. He was named to all-district and the Associated Press Class "A" All-State Football team, being named to the first unit offensive team for the second straight year. The Grizzlies made it to the state finals last fall.

The 5-foot 8, 165 pound, 17 year old senior will graduate this spring and major in Ag-business at NMSU.

Coach Dennis Sidebottom said of Stearns, "I feel he has been the most dedicated athlete to the off-season weight training program." Sidebottom stressed that conditioning is important in sports.

## Belco work force reduced to ten

Belco Industries provided jobs for 63 people in the Carrizozo area at one time. Now Belco has ten employees.

Jim and Carolyn Cantrell, owners and managers of Belco, have moved the sales office and repair facility to Las Cruces.

Jim Cantrell told the News, "We never closed operation in

Carrizozo and we never intended to." Cantrell went on to say, "The manufacturing plant is still here. We own the office building and the manufacturing building and the lot behind it." Belco also rents the city building for \$100 a month for storage.

Cantrell said that the loss of a large contract last summer coupled with a large inventory made it necessary to cut

production. Lay-offs resulted in only four or five people working for the company in Carrizozo. A twin plant in Mexico is now closed.

Belco started in Carrizozo in 1973 with three employees. Steady growth and sales of the portable engine-driven DC arc welders to foreign countries earned Belco the President's "E" award for exports last year.

Foreign sales have dropped from 78 percent to five percent Cantrell says. "The high price of the dollar makes American made goods more expensive overseas." He explained that the cost to the customer raised dramatically but that, "We don't get the raise."

Even though total sales are down, sales within the United States have increased to 95 percent. At the present, production is less than sales and as a result, the inventory is being reduced.

"Eventually, if sales stay up," Cantrell said, "We can hire more people."

## NMSU president explains Ruidoso Airport position

New Mexico State University President James Halligan and NMSU staff were in Carrizozo Feb. 13 to meet with students - past, present, and future and to become familiar with the area. The visit was hosted by the Lincoln County NMSU Alumni, the Carrizozo FFA Chapter, and the Carrizozo Schools.

Halligan and the staff arrived in Carrizozo by airplane at the Carrizozo Municipal Airport. Meeting with community leaders, Halligan discussed the NMSU campus, recruiting of students and the school's position on the planned Ruidoso Regional Airport possibly being located on Fort Stanton Mesa.

There are 12,000 students on

the main campus and 16,500 total with all branches, Halligan said. "A good faculty is the heart of a university." He explained that NMSU tries to provide a good wholesome environment for students. He said NMSU wants students to learn how to make a living and learn to make a life for themselves. This included studies in art, music, and other things to help the student lead a richer, fuller life.

The staff agreed with Halligan that, "Children are our most precious asset."

When asked about the school's position on the possible placing of the Ruidoso Regional Airport on the Fort Stanton Mesa where NMSU has had range studies for years, Halligan said,


"We went to Washington and opened our books. We explained that we want a fair and just compensation for any of our land if they want us to move."

Halligan said he explained to them, "We spent your tax dollars to be there." He added, "If the Department of Transportation, or the Village of Ruidoso or whoever wants to pay us back, our books are open for an equitable settlement."

He said the discussion continues with no solution.

### BUSY PUBLIC SERVANTS

The Town Dads (and one Mom) each deserve a pat on the back for their serious examination of the town's dog and cat portion of the animal control ordinance. The council filled in the blanks during their Feb. 12 town meeting. Final public input and adoption of the whole ordinance will be on the agenda at a Feb. 26 meeting.

The town's public servants (Trustees Bob Hemphill, Patsy Sanchez, Eddie O'Brien and Mayor Harold Garcia) carefully reviewed and clarified the wording of the ordinance. Lincoln County animal control officer Duane Vinson was present to give his expert opinion on the subject.

Garcia said that the problem was one shared with other municipalities. (The Ruidoso Village Council adopted a leash law this month by passing a reworked animal control ordinance.)

Forty-six dog licenses were sold in Carrizozo during rabies clinic this month. Some animal owners refused to purchase licenses because they felt the animal control law was "vague and unenforceable." Garcia added that others did not buy the tags because their pet did not roam out of the yard.

By the way...only one cat in Carrizozo is sporting a town license tag.

### AMONG PROTESTORS

I was among those who refused to buy a license for those two reasons. I will be in line at the town hall to buy a license when the new ordinance becomes effective. Proof of rabies shot is required. We had our dog vaccinated for rabies because our neighborhood is full of skunks during certain times of the year. I don't know where the skunks hide out but their smell tells us they are out roaming. Skunks can be rabid.

Those who did not take advantage of the rabies clinic can get shots for their pets at the office of Dr. Willard who comes to Carrizozo each Tuesday from Ruidoso.

### MARK YOUR CALENDAR

Responsible animal owners may want to be present at the town's Tuesday, Feb. 26 meeting

to learn first hand how the dog and cat ordinance will be handled. The re-worded ordinance re-defines procedure for rabies control, license required, impoundment and kennels. (Some people keep several dogs or cats?) The meeting begins at 8:00 p.m.

Is your pet a wild and exotic animal? There is a section on this.

Prohibited activities includes animals running at large, nuisance, physical abuse, poisoning, abandonment, care and maintenance, animal fights, vicious animals and confinement during estrus (stage of heat) to prevent contact with male of the species, except for intentional breeding purposes. The council discussed a reduction rate for neutered and spayed animals.

Our dog's barking when he sees stray dogs on the street can be a nuisance to our neighbors. Fred English shares our dog's barking with us and he shares the leaves of his generous trees with us.

### GET TOUGH

Garcia said that after passage of the ordinance, "We will convey our (the town's) policy to the chief and tell him to get tough."

The leash law of the Ruidoso Village Council passed by a vote of 5-1. The dissenting councillor noted that his disagreement with the ordinance centered on the provision to require an animal beyond the boundaries of an owner's property to be on a leash no more than six feet in length.

He proposed that the wording be changed to read "or on a lead of appropriate length." His proposal drew little support from fellow councillors, who insisted that the length of leash in the ordinance be specific to ensure the law's enforceability.

One Ruidoso councillor explained that sometimes laws have to be made because of a few "bad dogs," which also places controls on the majority of "good" dogs.

### SILLY LAWS

Audience discussion during Ruidoso's public hearing on the ordinance included the issue of animals riding in the backs of trucks.

"It's just a pretty silly law," a resident said. "Our officers need to be out doing drug busts. Pretty soon you're going to say, 'If you're not wearing deodorant, it's a fifty dollar fine.'"

Which brings to mind the attention that Carrizozo's council gave to the wording of the animal control ordinance. A trustee who is a Language Arts specialist would be handy when time comes to write ordinances. It is interesting to listen to the trustees come up with the 'verbage' (as the mayor called it) when the correct words for the ordinance were put together.

Silly laws from 50 states made humorous copy for a book, 'It's Against the Law' by Dick Hyman. The writer researched hundreds of crazy laws from cities, towns and villages around the US.

### DORMANT AND INEFFECTIVE

Some of the laws go back to the horse and buggy days, but no one ever bothered to erase them from the books. A few have been cancelled out by the state, but many remained dormant and ineffective according to Hyman.

A sampling of laws that pertain to people: In Wyoming women are required to stand five feet away from bars when drinking in public...Ohio law does not permit sticking your feet out of your automobile door to enjoy

balmy breezes...It is against the law in Omaha for a policeman to appear in uniform with his hands in his pockets...In Wessington, South Dakota, no ungentlemanly or personally offensive language shall be used to the mayor.

### OBSOLETE LAWS

In keeping with the theme of the column the following are some of Hyman's collection of obsolete laws that refer to hoofed, furred, gilled or feathered citizenry:

In McDonald, Ohio, it is unlawful to march your goose down the main street...It is illegal to hunt or shoot camels in Arizona...In Norfolk, Virginia, horses may not be ridden in the waters of Chesapeake Bay...In Key West, Florida, turtle racing is prohibited within the city limits...A Lakefield, Ontario, law allows birds to sing only 30 minutes in the daytime and 15 minutes during the night...The law in Denver states that it is unlawful to shoot jackrabbits from the rear window of a streetcar.

It's illegal to lasso a fish in Knoxville, Tennessee...In

Houston, Texas, dogcatchers are required to be psychoanalyzed by a psychiatrist to determine if they are qualified to chase stray mutts...In Tuscumbia, Alabama, it is illegal for more than eight rabbits to reside on the same block...It is illegal in Virginia for any person to willfully and negligently permit any unaltered horse of the age of one year or more to go at large or to take such a horse to any place of public worship.

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
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## TIP CLIPS

- COOL BAKING SHEETS**  
Cool baking sheets before placing unbaked cookies on it. Hot baking sheets melt margerine or shortening in the dough causing the cookies to spread too much during baking.
- COLORED SUGARS**  
Decorative colored sugars can be made very economically at home by adding a few drops of food coloring to a small amount of granulated sugar and working it with the finger tips.
- HOMEMADE SOUR MILK**  
One cup sour milk can be made by using 1 1/2 to 2 tablespoons vinegar or lemon juice and enough milk to measure 1 cup. Let stand 5 minutes.
- EASIER AND NEATER**  
To make the job easier and neatly, use a potato masher to mark and flatten peanut butter cookies.
- TOASTED COCONUT**  
Toast coconut by baking at 375 degree for 5 to 7 minutes, stirring occasionally until golden brown.
- MOCK FORTUNE COOKIES**  
Make your version of Chinese fortune cookies to liven up a party. Cover each cookie in foil or plastic wrap. On the outside tape a funny or other appropriate message for the occasion.

# Embassy protection hypocrisy

WASHINGTON — The Honorable Walter Fauntroy, Congressional Delegate from the District of Columbia, has reintroduced his perennial bill to turn our nation's capital into America's first city-state with the proposed name of "New Columbia."

A proposed Constitution is presently undergoing massive revisions after some of its wilder provisions made the Central African Empire under Emperor Bokassa appear reasonable by comparison.

Mr. Fauntroy's bill — which should really be entitled "The Fauntroy For Senate Bill" — deserves as much support as proposed statehood for Long Island, Manhattan — or even Coney Island. The residents of DC should be represented in the Senate by Maryland's two US Senators, while Fauntroy or his successors should be given a vote. But the statehood scheme is an absurdity. DC government is wretched enough to suggest a repeal of all home rule. And for a prime example, we offer DC Corporation counsel Inez Smith Reid.

Counsel Reid ruled last week that "no significant District of Columbia interest would be served by prosecuting five persons arrested in a recent demonstration at the South African Embassy."

But reporter Bill Kling of The Washington Times has discovered that when two young conservatives demonstrated in front of the Soviet Embassy last year, and burned a Soviet flag, they were convicted and sent to jail for five days — with the strong support of this same DC Corporation Counsel Inez Smith Reid, who wrote such things as:

"It is necessary to ensure that all foreign embassies and other foreign government buildings be protected from potentially violent and unruly demonstrations. Even activities intended to be peaceful can easily result in confrontation and violence where firmly held ideals and views are being expressed."

"The residents of a foreign facility are quite likely to perceive a demonstration in opposition to their government as a confrontation of sorts between their nation and the people of this country; and the physical reactions are easily provoked under such circumstances."

"Foreign representatives have no way of accurately anticipating the extent to which demonstrators are willing to go in expressing their critical views."

This list of very good reasons why embassies should not be picketed was seconded by several State Department people and Deputy DC Police Chief John C. Connor.

What DC Corporate Counsel Reid meant, of course, is every embassy except South Africa's — where the DC police, courts and the US Attorney are allowing all this law to be ceremonially violated.

But if two demonstrators burn a flag in front of the embassy of that Great Bastion of Liberty and Justice called the Soviet Union, "off to jail with them!"

We have a much better name for this proposed state of New Columbia: Call it the State of Hypocrisy.

At the State Department, deputy spokesman Alan Romberg was asked about the laws protecting embassies from being subjected to front door demonstrations.

"We do think it is important to afford protection to diplomatic premises, and there are rules and regulations which exist to do that," replied Romberg. "Obviously, we are concerned about our embassies overseas."

So we asked: "Then the State Department approves of the arrest, and will support prosecution to the fullest extent of the law, of Sen. (Lowell) Welker (R., Conn.), who as a lawmaker should have known better? Or are some embassies entitled to such protection while others are not?"

DEPARTMENT OF STATE: I don't think that's a question for the State Department. I think that's up to the law enforcement authorities.

Q: You said that you support the law. Do you feel that Sen. Welker should have been arrested, or do you not?

DEPARTMENT OF STATE: I think that's a matter that would properly justify court authorities.

In the case of the two who demonstrated in front of the Soviet Embassy, the State Department spoke out and endorsed. In the case of Congressmen and this Senator, who deliberately broke the Embassy Protection Law (and appeared on TV), the State Department reaction was the Alan Romberg cop-out.

Two weeks later, 28 peaceful anti-abortion demonstrators knelt in prayer on the steps of the United States Supreme Court. There, under the portico which proclaims "EQUAL JUSTICE UNDER LAW," they were arrested. And the Reagan Administration's US Attorney for the District of Columbia, Joseph DeGenova, prosecuted these

demonstrators, just as the demonstrators at the Soviet Embassy were prosecuted — but not the demonstrators at the South African Embassy.

DeGenova refused to answer any questions about the inconsistency of law enforcement in his decision to prosecute two groups of demonstrators but not

a third — for the same offense. Spokesmen for the Reagan Administration at the Pentagon and at the State Department also declined comment — right after declaring that their respective bosses, Secretaries Caspar Weinberger and George Shultz, fully support the concept of equal justice under law.

They are intent, for reasons of their own, on getting rid of the Legislative Education Study Committee, which has served well for many years. They were even ready to go without passing a "feed bill," which pays their own expenses while they serve, if that had to be done to rid them of the LESC.

They want a temporary interim committee to work for six months after this session ends, studying education once again. (Has any subject ever been more studied?)

They already know what they want that study to show. You can be sure, well in advance, that it will "prove" unions are not beneficial to the educational process and tenure

for teachers must be abolished. Then they will establish a permanent interim committee which will be the equivalent of the LESC they have just abolished, leaving one to wonder what has really been accomplished by these machinations.

THE OTHER SIDE: Once all that became clear, another voice was suddenly raised on behalf of education. It was that of Toney Anaya, who had been badly bruised when he tried to ride that topic to permanent glory in 1984. He convened a special news conference to unveil for us what was obviously a proposal that had been hastily cobbled together. It wasn't even available to the media in typed form till long after he had explained it to us. And it was clear that even his closest staff members had been


surprised by his sudden decision to return to this field of battle. He might have been well advised to stand mute. His plan has little chance of passage.

For one thing, it calls for shifting revenues generated by the severance tax (which goes into the severance tax permanent fund where no governor can get his hands on it) to those generated by the emergency school tax (which goes into the general fund where any governor can control their expenditure). Legislators are not likely to go for that idea in a big way.

And he has a wild new proposal on how to put together the Board of Educational Finance, which oversees money for higher education. He wants that group to be made up of the president of the boards of regents of the universities, a notion that

won't fly at all. Legislators created the BEF to be an objective body dealing with money for the big schools. They won't think those people are at all objective about the school on whose board they serve.

the Legislature exerts its control over that topic.







# Killings in Lincoln County

KILLINGS (cont. from last week)

On the night of June 10 Dewitt C. Johnson, only recently released from the Las Cruces jail after serving a term for robbery, and Earnest G. "Dutchy" Greves (Greaves, Greeves, Graves), attempted to rob Alfred H. Howe, who operated a store in Tularosa Canyon, Howe a very powerful man, grappled with them, threw them outside, and locked the door. Johnson fired through it, the ball striking Howe in the lungs and coming out his back. Although fatally wounded, he seized his shotgun and fired back, some of the pellets then striking Greves in the neck. Indian trailers were soon put on the murderers' trail and the two men were soon captured.

Greves was sentenced to 10 years imprisonment. The charges against Good were dismissed with leave to reinstate. To have done so might have saved his life. Good's body was found in the White Sands in September, 1888, allegedly murdered by Jim Cooper, Oliver Lee, Tom Tucker, and Cherokee Bill Kellam during the Cooper-Good feud.

In mid-October Reyes, Rico, Anastacio Delphine and another man were having "a good time generally" in Lincoln. Delphine drew a revolver, Rico grabbed it, the weapon went off and Delphine fell, mortally wounded.

In 1907 the Pacific States Publishing Com-

pany, of Los Angeles, California published a work entitled History of New Mexico its Resources and People. On page 227 of Volume I there is a list of "The names of men who died in the Pecos Valley since 1877 'with their boots on.'" Many of these were individuals involved in the Lincoln County War and hence well known to those who have read one or more of the numerous books on the subject. Others are obscure. As a minor hobby the writer has tried to identify them as he did his own research on the troubles in Lincoln County.

His work has been hampered by the fact that certain vital records have been removed from the files at Carrizozo. If they were available, perhaps further identifications could have been made. The list and the writer's comments follow. Any additional information will be gratefully received.

John Tunstall. John H. Tunstall was a young English rancher who settled in Lincoln in 1876. His avowed intentions to get half of every dollar that is made in the county by anyone brought him into direct conflict with the dominant political and financial power in the county, the Murphy-Dolan-Riley concern. Tunstall allied himself with Alexander A. McSween and John S. Chisum. In February, 1878 his property was attached in connection with certain debts owned by McSween. On February 18 Tunstall attempted to drive some of his horses to Lincoln. He was overtaken by some members of the sheriff's posse and killed. There is strong evidence that the murderers were William Morton and Tom Hill. The efforts of the Tunstall adherents to exact vengeance for his murder brought on the Lincoln County War.

McCloskey. Wm. McCloskey was one of the constable's posse who arrested William Morton and Frank Baker for the murder of Tunstall. The possemen later reported that at Agua Negra on March 9, 1878 Morton had seized McCloskey's gun and shot him, whereupon the party had shot the two prisoners while they were attempting to escape. McCloskey is known to have been a good friend of Morton's, and when the body of the two prisoners were found it was observed that each had been shot in the chest eleven times. There were eleven men in the posse, which strongly suggested an execution. Neither was there any reason for the party to have been at Agua Negra if they were actually taking the two men to Lincoln for trial, as this is to one side of the direct route.

Frank Baker. Baker was an alias for one Hart. He was a member of The Boys, a group of horse and cattle thieves led by Jessie J. Evans. He as described by Ash Upson as resembling a gorilla, brutish alike in feature and expression.

William (Charles?) "Buck" Morton was in charge of the Murphy-Dolan cow camp on the Pecos. He is said to have killed four men. Morton was from Charlotte County, Virginia.

Frank McNab. Francis McNab was a Chisum cowboy, who became leader of the

McSween fighting men following the death of Richard Brewer. He made a fatal mistake of sending word to Seven Rivers that he intended to clean up all the cattle thieves in that area. This brought the formidable Seven Rivers Warriors into the fight. A posse led by William H. Johnson started for Lincoln to offer their services to the sheriff to aid in arresting McSween's Regulators. En route they encountered McNab, Frank Coe, and James A. Saunders at Charles Fritz's Spring Ranch on the evening of April 29, 1878. McNab was killed. Coe captured and Saunders seriously wounded.

Johnson. William H. Johnson married Camelia Beckwith over the violent objections of her father, Hugh M. Beckwith. On August 17, 1878 Johnson was walking to his house. As he passed the Beckwith home, Hugh came out with a double barreled shot gun and fired one barrel into Johnson, killing him instantly. He then aimed the gun at Wallace Olinger, but Olinger got in the first shot, seriously wounding the murderer. Beckwith was disarmed and sent to Fort Stanton. After recovering in the hospital there, he was released, since the county had not jail in which to hold him. Beckwith rode off to Texas. There is a story to the effect that in 1882 his body was found in his store at Presidio, where he had apparently been beaten to death during a robbery.

John Jones. Three days after killing John Beckwith Jones rode up to Milo L. Pierce's dugout. When Jones first threatened to kill Beckwith, Pierce warned him "Well, John, you know that if you do that you will have to kill me too, don't you?" As Jones made his appearance Pierce remarked to Bob Olinger, "He's coming to kill me and I will have to kill him." Olinger who was an employee and perhaps a cousin of Beckwith, replied, "I'll do it. Just lie still." As Jones entered the building Olinger grabbed for his rifle, it went off, striking Pierce in the hip, but Olinger killed Jones. It is said that Billy the Kid promised the Jones family that he would kill Olinger and that this was the source of the bitterness between the two men.

John Beckwith. After the five day battle John M. Beckwith went into partnership in a cattle ranch with Jones, but had the partnership brand registered in his own name. Furious, Jones charged him with stealing his cattle. The men met near the mouth of Pierce Canyon on August 26, 1879. Both went for their guns; Jones was the faster.

Johnson confessed that he, Greves, and Walter Good had all plotted the robbery. Good furnishing the horses and six-shooters for the purpose. The loot was to be split three ways. It took the jury only 10 minutes to find him guilty. Johnson, aged 18, was hung by Sheriff Brent on Nov. 19, 1886. The Santa Fe Daily New Mexican noted, "He delivered a long address of warning to wild young men and died game."

Curiously, some of the Territorial papers reported that Howe had been hung. So far as the writer is aware, this was the last legal hanging in Lincoln County.







## Ask Doctor Dan . . .

My doctor recommended that I cut down the amount of cholesterol in my diet even though the blood test showed my cholesterol level to be in the normal range. Is this really necessary? H. C.

Cholesterol is present in animal foods only - including meat, lard, eggs, milk and cheese. Cholesterol is a vital part of animal cell membranes and we could not survive without any cholesterol in our bodies. The typical American diet is high in intake of animal foods. This leads to an elevation of the statistical average for the cholesterol level. Medical researchers have known for a long time that population groups with a low level of cholesterol also have a low level of heart attacks and strokes. This was indirect evidence that higher levels of cholesterol caused more hardening of the arteries. A recent major clinical research trial has shown conclusively that lowering cholesterol will also lower the number of heart attacks. Since heart disease is the number one killer in our society, this was a very important finding.

Although your cholesterol level falls within the normal range for Americans, it can still increase your risk of heart disease several times over a low level. This is why your doctor has advised you to lower your cholesterol level.

Usually the level can be lowered by dietary means. Avoid fried foods (if lard was used), bacon, fatty meats (sausage, bologna, etc.), butter, whole milk and eggs. Milk and cheese products are the main source of calcium so don't cut these out entirely. Consult a dietician or your doctor if you have special dietary needs.

Exercise helps lower cholesterol by burning it for energy. If you are overweight, try to lose weight. This often will lower cholesterol levels.

Some types of elevated cholesterol are inherited and may require drugs to be lowered. If you have a family history of early heart disease (before age

60), you should consider a blood test to check your cholesterol level. This test should be drawn in the morning after an overnight fast.

Other risk factors for heart disease include cigarette smoking, diabetes, stress, alcoholism and sedentary lifestyle. These risks can all be lowered by changes in life style.

If you want to improve your sense of well being and increase your chances of a long, disease-free life, modify your risk factors to a low level. Your doctor can help with this if you have any problems in how to go about it. Send questions to Dr. Dan, Box 8, Carrizozo, NM 88301.
