# Carrizozo Grizzlies to regionals

Zozo ended regular season play on Monday, Mar. 4 by dropping Magdalena by score of 57-50 - using the younger players and resting starters. Win gave

Grizzlies regular season record of 14-5. On Tuesday coach Ron Becker's crew opened district tourney play by romping over

district foe Mountainair by score of 70-42. Crenshaw had hot hand with 26 points, Dominic Vega chipped in with 14. The win advanced Carrizozo to semi-finals

on Thursday against Vaughn. On Thursday, Grizzlies turned in their finest defensive performance of the year and waltzed past the cold shooting

Eagles by the count of 45-35. Carrizozo held a 22-10 advantage at halftime and were never headed as Crenshaw pumped in 18 points and Tommy Escamilla

helped out with 13 points. Coach Ron Becker and crew traveled to Ft. Sumner on Saturday to meet the Ft. Sumner Foxes to decide district cham-

ampionship. Carrizozo gave Foxes all they wanted in the first half which ended in a one point advantage for the host team 25-24. Ft. Sumner had a good third quarter and outscored Carrizozo by 19-10 count to race to a final of 65-50. Crenshaw again led scoring output for Grizzlies with 19 points. Dominic Vega also had a good game with 16 markers.

The combination of Ft. Sumner's two tallest players (Harrelson & Tinkle) tacked on 43 of Ft. Sumner's 65 points. Harrelson was unstoppable with 30 points.

With their second place finish in district play the Grizzlies now advance to the regional play-offs in Cloudcroft which begin today. This is the first time since 1972 that Carrizozo has made it out of district play and advanced on to regional competition...and one more win will send the local squad on to the state play-offs...for the first time since 1941.

First round action will find Carrizozo will take on host Cloudcroft in the nightcap at 7:45 p.m. Winners will meet for state seeding purposes the following night with the Region D title at stake. Both of these teams will advance to state tournament.

Second year coach Ron Becker expects a tough game from an improved Cloudcroft team (from early season), and expects the Bears to come at the Grizzlies with a full-court press but says his squad has had a good work week of preparation and should go into today's game with a positive attitude.

## Taxes, bids & bonds

Taxes, hospital bond election, road closing, and bid opening were on the agenda for the March 5 Lincoln County Commission meeting.

Commissioners approved a two percent lodgers tax that will go in effect July 1, 1985. No public objections were presented at the hearings held concerning the lodger's tax.

The tax is imposed on revenues received from lodging within Lincoln County outside the incorporated limits of any municipality. One thing the taxes are to be used for is advertising, publicizing and promoting tourist attractions and facilities within the county.

Commissioners tabled consideration of adopting a county gross receipts tax of one eighth of one percent. Commissioner Kenneth Nosker was not in favor of imposing the tax at this time.

County Manager Suzanne Cox told the Commission that Lincoln County does not qualify for some funds from the state if the gross receipts tax is not imposed.

Lane Plumbing Co. of Alamogordo presented the low bid of \$142,344.20, subject to complying with the procurement act, for water system improvements in Nogal. Funds for the project are part from a Community Development Block Grant, and part from a Water Construction Act Grant.

Ken Moore Rudson-Hondo Valley Hospital administrator requested a resolution for a bond election for hospital construction. Moore said that property had

been purchased in Gavilan Canyon for the new hospital site. The property cost close to one half million dollars. Plans are to sell the existing hospital site and apply half the money received to the new hospital site. Moore is to bring the necessary information to the commission before a decision will be made if a bond election is needed.

Hap Canning, a Capitan rancher, discussed county road B-027 with commissioners, and Steve Sams, Lincoln National Forest district ranger. The road

known as North Gap Road was closed temporarily last year. Commissioners asked Canning and the Forestry to renegotiate and the road closing will be reviewed in three or six months.

The state will provide 100 percent funding for State Road 42, a Corona school bus route. The \$116,130 project for 1.8 miles of gravel road will put out for bid.

A one year contract with Steve Sanders for legal services was signed.

Personnel was discussed in an executive session.

"We have 200,000 gallon storage, we use

180,000 gallons a day," Councilman Coker.

Dorothy Smith feels that priorities must be set. She felt we are hearing the same thing we have heard for the last ten years.

A proposed bond issue came in for much discussion. \$600,000 seemed to be the popular figure.

# County wide 'animal control ordinance'

Lincoln County has an animal control ordinance which provides the County powers over animals running at large, enforcement, seizure and impoundment, redemption, fees, vaccinations, prohibiting of dumping of live animals, and imposing the penalty for violations of the ordinance.

The Sheriff of Lincoln County is responsible for the enforcement of the ordinance and he may designate a part-time or full-time animal control officer to be deputized to enforce animal control laws, orders, ordinances and regulations. Duane Vinson is the animal control officer for Lincoln County.

Vinson says, "The purpose of an animal control ordinance is to protect humans and animals from rabies and the plague." Another purpose of the ordinance is to protect humans and livestock from dog bites by controlling animals running at large and by providing for the licensure of dogs, impoundment of animals and confinement or destruction of vicious dogs.

Vinson also says that residents of the county believe they are not required to obey any animal control ordinance because they live outside of any town.

Included in the Animal Control Ordinance:

—Dogs, cats, domesticated fowls, and birds are personal property. Any person who owns or keeps a dog or cat over the age of three months in New Mexico is required to have the animal vaccinated against rabies as prescribed by regulation of the health and environment department. All antirabies vaccine shall be administered by or under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian who shall issue a serially numbered certificate and tag for each administration.

—Dogs and cats are not allowed to "Run at Large." "Running at Large" means to be free of physical restraint beyond the premises of the owner or keeper. The key words here are 'physical restraint'. Voice command is not physical restraint.

—Any peace officer may impound any dog found running at large and the peace officer

shall destroy the dog if it is in the act of pursuing or wounding livestock or wounding and killing

poultry or attacking humans. There shall be no liability of the peace officer in damages or

otherwise for such killing. It is unlawful to keep such a dog after it is known that the dog is liable to kill livestock.

—It is also unlawful for any person to keep any animal known to be vicious and liable to attack or injure humans unless such animal is securely kept to prevent injury to any person. It is unlawful to keep any unvaccinated dog or cat or any animal with any symptom of rabies. In addition, it is unlawful to fail to or to refuse to destroy vicious animals or unvaccinated dogs or cats with symptoms of rabies for the protection of public health and safety.


—Rabies-suspect animals will be impounded for a ten day confinement and observation period or it shall be destroyed and the head sent to the laboratory for rabies testing.

—It is the duty of any person bitten by an animal to immediately notify the animal control officer or the field office of the Health Services Division.

Animal control officer Vinson was provided with proper training to apprehend, handle and care for animals. He represents the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office and the citizens of Lincoln County. Other duties: to work with citizens who are having problems with animals in certain areas, and to enforce the animal control ordinance.

NOTE: Officer Vinson regularly has animals available for adoption. If you are interested, call him at 648-2342.

The Sheriff's Office is not responsible for animal control within the city limits of Carrizozo.



LINCOLN COUNTY has an animal control ordinance to protect humans and animals from rabies and the plague, as well as to protect humans and livestock from dog bites by controlling animals running at large. Dogs found running at large in the county will be impounded in these kennels. County residents are required to obey the animal control ordinance.

# By the way

## MOLD AND MORE MOLD

By the looks of exhibits at the school science fair quite a number of households had budding scientists preparing for the big day. Three professors from Socorro's New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology were on hand to judge the exhibits of students in grades 5 through 12 who participated in the competition.

I read most of the abstracts (reports) accompanying the exhibits. I am now aware how long it takes bread to mold; why people faint and much more.

## BLONDES AND BLEACH

Exhibits that caught my attention included a doll that was used to demonstrate how muscles work. Clay was shaped and attached to form the muscles. Seventh grader, Suzanne Saucedo, received honorable mention with her experiment on how different types of bleach effects different colors of hair. Classmate Cindy Silva researched how a person becomes an adult.

Can water make music? A music scale was made using drinking glasses filled with water. I read how noses affects

our taste; what smoking does to the unborn; how a solar hot water heater works; which style of car goes faster; how a light bulb works.

Is calcium necessary to bones? Cheryl Hightower was awarded a first place trophy for her observations on the subject. The effect of household cleaners on plants won Raphael Chavez the second place trophy. The two students are fifth graders.

## ELUSIVE WORM

Behavior of an earth worm was the subject chosen by Ron G. Serna, a 7th grader. Evidence indicated that a worm had been on display. Earth worms are shy.

Two cakes baked by Denise Hill, a 7th grader, demonstrated baking results with a conventional oven and a microwave oven. Perhaps the worms found their way into the cakes which were exhibited nearby.

Exhibit subject included photography, measuring lung capacity, vitamins and fruit juices, soundproofing, a car's ignition system, computers, laser beam, geothermal energy, soil permeability, yeast cells, relative humidity of Carrizozo, aircraft and would you believe... John Maxwell, 8th grader, displayed a jar of Mt. St. Helen's volcanic ash as part of his project?

Jonna Gibson, mid-high student placed 2nd overall with her experiment: Illusions - determining perception of abstract concepts. Linda Silva brought up the question: Is cancer any reason to give up cigarette smoking?

## COFFIN NAILS

Many smokers automatically reach for a cigarette. Heavy smokers light a second cigarette before finishing the first one. Smokers develop a physical desire for the nicotine in tobacco. These were the findings of Mark Guevara, a seventh grader. His goal was to determine which cigarette has the most tar and nicotine.

He conducted his experiment with two funnels, filter papers, and a plastic pipe with a bulb pump. (Smart boy.) He tested Kent, Fall Mall, Winston, Merit, Marlboro, Marlboro Light, Kool, Quality Brand and other brand of cigarettes.

He determined that smoking is harmful and that all kinds of brands of cigarettes can cause cancer.

## STACKING Z's

Ben Brumlow, a sixth grader, conducted a very interesting experiment on my favorite subject - sleeping. His purpose was to find out preferred sleeping positions. His hypothesis: Most people prefer to sleep on their left side.

In the course of his studies he researched books on insomnia, sleeping sickness and REM (rapid eye movement beneath closed eyelids). He prepared a questionnaire for fellow

classmates. Among his questions: preferred sleeping position; position on retiring; position upon awaking; active or calm sleep; awake when moving to another position.

The results revealed that the 7 of 15 people preferred to sleep on their left side.

He admits his hypothesis was wrong. His personal conclusion written on his report: "This project was not very interesting. I found I didn't like sleep very much."

## VERY GOOD YEARS

It's not just old cowboys who remember a good spring, according to the experiment conducted by Richard Guevara, a ninth grader. He placed third in his botany entry which determined the weather of past years by observing the rings within a tree. He had on display a cross section of a tree from the school grounds. He obtained the

weather reports and matched them with the rings on the tree section which was 35 years old. The best years on the tree ring were 1978, 1980 and 1983.

"Hey, Mom, is it alright to mix these?"

The mother of Harold Burch must be pleased that her son knows first hand what household cleaners he must not mix. Harold, a junior, solved the answer by using bleach, Lime Away, ammonia and Windex. His mixture were allowed to sit and develop gas, if any, then tested for pH levels to determine acidic content. He also recorded any strong odors. Two of six mixtures - Windex and Lime Away, as well as Windex and bleach were "not deadly" when mixed.

His conclusion: "From my experiment I have concluded that it is best not to mix ANY household cleaners." Harold placed first with his chemistry entry.

Mike Curtiss, a senior, sought to find out if music affects the mind. And if so, how? Several types of music were played during class research and the student's behavior was observed. He found out that the faster the music, the more restless the students were. He concluded that country music should be played in the classroom.

## TEENS AND ALCOHOL

Next week I will find out from other science competitors what causes vibrations in Carrizozo and what sixth graders worry about most. There will be something on hard water,

## Fishing season opens April 1

**SANTA FE, NM** - A new fishing season opens April 1 in New Mexico, with some changes in previous regulations. The season also requires new fishing licenses for anglers over 12 years of age.

Changes in regulations for April 1, 1985, through March 31, 1987, include:

- (1) a one-mile extension of the trophy section of the San Juan River, to include 3.75 miles downstream from Navajo Dam, where only barbless artificial flies and lures may be used;
- (2) an increase in the minimum size of keeper trout (to 20 inches) in the 3.5 mile stretch of the San Juan river downstream from the cable crossing one-fourth mile below the dam. The quarter-mile section between the dam and the cable crossing remains catch-and-release.
- (3) additional catch-and-release waters, including Peralta Creek and short stretches of the Cimarron, Pecos, Red River, Rio las Vacas and Rio San Antonio, where only artificial flies and lures may be used;
- (4) a decreased bag limit for bass to eight largemouth, smallmouth or spotted bass;
- (5) removal of special trout bag limits on the Rio Chiquito, Frijoles Creek and the Little Rio Grande;
- (6) opening Nabor lake and creek on the Sargent Wildlife Area (the waters had been closed for restoration of the native Rio Grande cutthroat trout);
- (7) year-round fishing at Maloya, Alice and Springer lakes;
- (8) a \$10 user fee for all licensed anglers on the Valle Vidal addition to the Carson National Forest; and
- (9) closing of Big Dry Creek in Catron County.

Several fishing areas will reopen with the new season April 1. Those areas are Bernardo and La Joya waterfowl areas, Bonito Lake in Lincoln County, Burns Canyon Lake at Parkview, and Santa Cruz lake and river.

Fishing licenses and proclamations governing regulations for the two-year period are being distributed and will soon be available at game department offices and from approximately 350 vendors statewide.

Restrictions on certain waters are detailed in the new proclamation.

Resident fishing licenses, with trout validations, are \$14 for the season, and \$4.50 for junior-senior or handicapped anglers. Nonresident licenses, with trout validations, are \$18.50 for the season. Short-term licenses with trout validations are \$8.50 for one day and \$15 for five days, residents and nonresidents alike. There are no nonresident licenses for junior-senior or handicapped anglers.

## FmHA districts reduced

Jim Hudson, New Mexico State Director, Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) announced today the reorganization of the District structure of FmHA. Effective March 31, 1985, the number of districts in New Mexico will be reduced to four (4) from the present five (5). "Under the old structure, FmHA was able to support the District Offices with only minimal staff but with the new structure and some additional staffing overall, we will be able to staff each District Office at more appropriate levels," Hudson said.

Added staffing will allow FmHA to better assist its County Office structure, farm borrowers, and local governments in need of water, sewer, and community facility loans.

Although the Roswell District Office will be closed, the two employees will be reassigned to other FmHA positions in Roswell. FmHA District Offices will be located in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Las Cruces, and Clovis.

It was stressed that the District office realignment would not affect the loan making activity in FmHA County Offices where all of the farm and rural housing loans are processed. "The Roswell FmHA County Office will be as active as ever," Hudson said.

# WATCH OVER WASHINGTON

## NY Times pushes ban on handguns . . . and its publisher packs a pistol

WASHINGTON — In its editorial horror at Bernhard Goetz and the enormous national support for his well-justified gunfire on the New York subway, The New York Times noted:

"When guns are outlawed, only outlaws will have guns. But that is better than everyone having them."

Indeed, yes, Times. Not just everybody should be given a gun permit. Only certain people.

Bernhard Goetz being denied a pistol permit after he was mugged and badly beaten in 1981 did not arouse very much indignation at all from the New York Times — whose publisher does have a permit to pack a pistol.

One day in the spring of 1980, The New York Post reported its discovery that Times owner-publisher Arthur ("Punch") Sulzberger keeps a loaded .38 Smith and Wesson in his desk.

The enterprising Post quoted Sulzberger's secretary as saying: "He's never had to shoot anybody, but I think he has practiced firing it."

Reflecting on this information, The Post report included the question: "If he never carries this gun, where does he practice? In his office?"

When we reached Mr. Sulzberger's secretary, Ms Finn explained that he has had this gun permit ever since she began working for him, more than 20 years ago.

So we asked, "Does Mr. Sulzberger ride the New York subways?"

"Yes," she replied. "I'm sure he has been on the subway."

"How often?"  
"I really don't know."  
We bet that Punch does not ride the subway very often at all. In fact, we would speculate hardly ever.

So why was he given a gun permit that Goetz was denied?

Lt. William Plackemeyer of the Pistol License Division of the NY Police Department explained that until 13 years ago, issuing of pistol permits was left to the discretion of individual precinct commanders.

Unless one of the permit recipients under this system has moved to a different area, or gotten new employment, renewal of the permit is granted on application. But new applicants must show "a compelling need" — which is more than being a likely victim. The need is based on the business cash flow, frequency of banking and area of business.

In 1984, explained Lt. Plackemeyer, 6,470 people applied for pistol permits — 81 percent of which were approved. The applicant is fingerprinted, and a check is made to determine whether he has ever been held in a state mental institution. There are different types of permits, including those which confine the pistol to the home, to place of business, to target practice, to guard work or to be carried in the course of business.

The New York Times editorial department's horror at the idea of most law-abiding citizens carrying a gun for

protection (like their publisher does) seems to be one of that newspaper's liberal shibboleths whose time has come and gone.

For Switzerland has 625,000 military reservists, whom it can mobilize in 48 hours. As it was in early America, where every able-bodied man was a member of the militia, every one of these Swiss reservists (from the age of 18 to 53) keeps his regulation assault rifle (or officer's pistol) at home — along with ammunition. And while regulations prohibit use of these military arms except in military service, still they have on occasion been used to repel burglars. Moreover, Lt. Col. Ernst Bartlome of the Swiss Embassy notes that target shooting and skiing are Switzerland's two top national sports.

Interestingly, the Demography Year Book of the UN reported in 1980 that Switzerland had a homicide rate of 1.8 per 100,000, while the US has a rate of 9.1 per 100,000 — and Mexico, with stringent gun control laws, has a rate of 49.4 per 100,000.

There was also the plummet in subway robberies that followed the Goetz shooting. And when, several years ago, the town of Kennesaw, GA, did the opposite of Morton Grove, IL — by requiring that all house have guns — the burglaries dropped 89 percent in 10 months.

In early January, perhaps in needed contrast to The New York Times' editorial (but not its publisher's) position, The Wall Street Journal published an article by former law school professor Don Kates, now practicing law in San Francisco, and Ruth Silver, a San Francisco supervisor.

"In New York," they observed, "a citizen carrying a gun without a permit is subject to a mandatory jail term longer than a first-time mugger."


Kates and Silver also reported data from studies conducted by the St. Louis University School of Law:  
+ In killing, wounding or warding off criminals, private and armed citizens succeeded in 83 percent of opportunities; police in 68 percent;  
+ Police were killed or wounded in 21 percent of such exchanges, while armed citizens were killed or wounded in 17.8 percent of such cases;  
+ In cities and urban areas, armed citizens killed three times as many violent felons as police.

Yet the gun control lobbyists continue campaigning — in a process which suggests: "Stop Forest Fires — Ban Matches."

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## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Conservatives are all for business. So how come the government agency taking the biggest fall from conservative New Mexico legislators this year is the Department of Economic Development?

That's easy to explain. These business-oriented men and women, who profess to make something of a god of laissez faire capitalism, aren't opposed to economic development in the abstract; what they dislike is its current form, in the agency put together by Toney Anaya.

Their distaste for that particular operation probably goes all the way back to its beginning, when Alex Mercure was chosen to run it.

PERSONALITIES: Somehow, Mercure just isn't the man who can convince a legislative committee he is good about details. That may be because he isn't—a fact the Governor could probably have ascertained by asking questions

at UNM or the Department of Agriculture, where Alex worked before coming to state government.

What's more, Mercure continued to run his private cable television business while attempting to boss a state agency that had more on its plate than it could say grace over.

The latter problem was the legacy of the King administration, which, before slipping quietly away, prepared a vastly expanded budget and new responsibilities for an organization not doing notably well with the money and the jobs it already had.

COMPLICATIONS: Mercure proceeded to make his life more nervewracking than it needed to be by inventing, and insisting he could run, a complex promotional campaign that involved seven or eight advertising agencies, working for what turned out to be hundreds of bosses. The whole program was so mixed

up Mercure could never satisfactorily describe it, much less make it work.

Meanwhile, from the Governor's office came orders to employ certain people, not always because of demonstrated ability. For example, a Native American industrial development director, who seemed to be hired more for reasons of his Indianness than for his ability to do the job to which he was assigned.

Tim Kraft, who ran Anaya's gubernatorial election campaign, had to be rewarded with contracts from this agency; as did Fred Mondragon, who had been state chairman of the Democratic party.

And so it went—till the end result was chaos. The purchasing laws got broken here more often than the Ten Commandments.

COPPING A PLEA: And when a few sharp-eyed auditors spotted some of the weaknesses,

all Mercure could do was throw up his hands and say, "Hey, we did it."

That gave those who want to hammer Toney a lot of good material. Since that particular effort was the major aim of most 1985 legislators, who got themselves elected by promising to dump on the Governor, they had a field day.

Thus the unexpected picture: Men and women who are all for expanding the state's economic base were dancing around a potful of fresh missionaries.

A paradox and an anomaly—but maybe symptomatic of how things were in Santa Fe in the early months of 1985. They couldn't have been crazier.

There might be trouble selling bonds in excess of this figure. The revenue from said bond issue would be used on the water system. Voting would take place either in April or May.

Some problems, transmission line from well to town, a treatment plant (the village does have \$583,000 for this purpose, the cost could be more) - storage, finding a well with good water - sewer system needs much improvement, funding, other problems. The last bond issue concerning water was in 1974.

Those present felt an informed public would pass such a bond issue. Capitan doesn't have any choice.

In other business: The annexation of 5.3 acres of land belonging to Tom Sullivan was turned down by the council. A moratorium on annexation was set in 1982. This moratorium was reaffirmed by the council.


revolving door policy in hiring." The police department has had several officers in a short time.





## Ask Doctor Dan . . .

How can tattoos be removed? At home?

Tattoos are made by putting

various pigments (colors) deep into the skin. An experienced dermatologist (skin specialist) or plastic surgeon can remove the tattoos. One method involves tattooing the skin with a flesh colored pigment to cover up the old tattoo. Another method is called dermabrasion and this removes the pigmented skin cells by a high speed drill.

I do not know of any home removal methods. Even in expert hands, the above methods do not always provide a perfect result. The specialists able to perform this procedure are located in the major cities of the state.

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# Billings in Lincoln County

D.D. Adams, Dwight Adams, a cowboy, was killed by Bennett Howell, superintendent of the Chisum ranch, at Roswell on August, 1884. The jury considered the act self-defense.

Jack Finan, John Finan was murdered at Black Plaza, Colfax County, by Francisco Chavez in February 1881. The details are unknown to the writer.

George Parker. About 1893 some trouble arose between George Parker and George Musgrave, which resulted in the latter leaving the country. About nine thirty a.m. on October 28, 1896 Musgrave and Bob Hayes rode up to the Circle Diamond wagon. When Parker came in Musgrave walked up to him and said, "Hello, George. I have come all the way across the territory to kill you and I am going to do it." With that he shot four times, while

Hayes warned the other cowboys, "The first man that makes a flash dies." Thirteen years later Musgrave was captured by Sheriff Charles Ballard, of Chavez County, but was acquitted.

J.W. Spurlock went insane and started shooting up the Chisum ranch. He was killed by Fred Roth, storekeeper for the ranch, in May, 1885.

Manwell Maxwell. Unidentified. Probably the first name should be Manuel.

Henry Byers, proprietor of a saloon and billiard hall at Roswell, was shot by a Texas cowboy named Chambers on November 9, 1888 after he refuse to serve him liquor on credit.

John Champlin committed suicide at Jicarilla on April 14, 1905.

Will-Turk. Unidentified. Johnson. May refer to Charles Snow, a

rustler killed by Mexicans in Guadalupe Canyon August 13, 1881.

Sheriff Brady (of Lincoln County). About 9 a.m. April 1, 1878 Sheriff William Brady and Deputies Jacob B. Mathews, George Hindman, George W. Peppin, and Jack Long started down Lincoln's main street to the courthouse. Through a clerk's error notice had been given that court would open the first Monday in April; Brady's mission was to inform the citizens that it would actually open on the second Monday. The group stopped for a moment to speak with three members of the grand jury, Timeoto Analla, Ignacio Torres, and Navor Chavez, and then strolled on. As they passed the walls of a corral which extended east from the rear of the Tumstall store, they were ambushed by Billy the Kid, Henry Brown, Fred Waite, Rancis

MacNab, Bob Widenman, John Middleton, Jim French and perhaps others hidden in the Corral. Brady was killed instantly, 16 shots afterwards being found in his body.

Hindman. George Hindman was fatally wounded by a single shot, traditionally said to have been fired by MacNab. After being shot, he called for water, Ike Stockton, later a participant in the Farmington Feud but then a saloonkeeper in Lincoln, brought him some in his hat.

Newt Higgins. A Chisum cowboy killed by Apaches in July, 1873, at Higgins Arroyo.

John Griffing and cousin. In September, 1890 Deputy U.S. Marshal Charles C. Ferry attempted to arrest George Griffin and his brother on a charge of disturbing

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

the peace in Roswell. He overtook them at the Hondo bridge. In the duel that followed Perry killed both of the brothers.

**Spence, Unidentified.**  
**Sears, Unidentified.**  
**Joe Harris, Unidentified.**

**Eusavio Ruiz.** A Chisum cowboy who broke through the ice while crossing the Hondo River and was drowned. Date unknown.

**George Peacock.** On October 16, 1886, Peacock was engaged in a roundup for J.J. Cox. He got into a dispute with James C. White over a maverick. When Peacock rode into the herd to separate the animal, White rode up behind him and emptied his pistol into the unarmed man. He then drew out another pistol and fired three or four more shots, after which he rode off to Texas. Peacock was buried at Fort Sumner.

**G. Baker.** Accidentally shot at Cabra Springs in May, 1886.

**Bennett Howell.** (John) was fatally injured when run over by a wagon on October 27, 1895.

**Bill Milligan.** Unidentified.

**George Nesmet.** This probably refers to George Nesmith. He, his wife, and child were murdered in August, 1882 by Ruperto Lara and Maximo Apodaca.

**Soapsticks** (real name not known). This probably refers to Morris J. Bernstein, who was designated as "Soapweed" in the code used by Murphy partners. He was killed on the Mescalero Apache Reservation by Isaac Sanchez on August 5, 1878 while attempting to prevent some of the McSween partisans from stealing horses belonging to the Indians.

**Carlisle.** James Carlyle was killed by Billy the Kid, Dave Rudabaugh and-or Billy Watson at the Greathouse-Kuch ranch on November 27, 1880. Carlyle had entered the house to try to persuade the outlaws to surrender and was killed by them when he jumped out of the window in an attempt to escape.

This is by no means the whole story of nplay in Lincoln County. "Many

names," says the author of History of New Mexico "are omitted as the men killed were not known to the authors of the information." Some of those not mentioned are known to the writer, but it is unlikely that the complete list will ever be compiled.

On April 18, 1881 a posse from Tularosa attempted to stop the employees on the James Ranch from using more water than was agreeable to the villagers. The employees in question, John Copeland (not the ex-sheriff of Lincoln County, Charles Wall, Alexander Nunnally, Marejildo Torres, and Augustin A. Balos - resisted so forcibly that deputy sheriff Cruz Padilla, Martin Gonzalez, Olojino Alijo and Ruperto paid the entire posse were wiped out. The James employees surrendered to Deputy Sheriff William L. Goodlett and were in time taken to Lincoln, where they underwent normal confinement. It was these prisoners whom Bob Olinger escorted to the Wortley Hotel for dinner just moments before he was killed by Billy the Kid about 6 p.m. on April 28, 1881.

On the 8th of May Deputy Sheriff Tom McKinney killed Joseph M. "Bob" Edwards, a notorious horse thief, at Hank Harrison's ranch at Rattlesnake Springs, some 25 miles west of present day Carlsbad. Bob ran into Harrison's corn patch and exchanged shots with the officer. When the deputy ordered the farmer to go into the patch after Edwards, he replied, "Hell, no. You shot him; you go after him." McKinney finally did so and found the outlaw with a bullet through his forehead.

About August 14, 1881 the body of Dan Dow was found on the road between Lincoln and Las Tablas. He was supposed to have been murdered by someone "who had more affection for Dow's wife than was proper in the premises."
