## CAPITAN CITY COUNCIL—

### Little accomplished in stormy water session

The Capitan City Council met in regular session Monday night with Mayor Pro Tem Benny Coker presiding. This was a 4 hour 20 minute meeting punctuated at various points with occasional input from the public.

Bids for a backhoe-loader were read. After a discussion which included a dealer from Albuquerque this business was tabled.

The fire department has a leak in the roof. The department will "get back" to the council with recommendations at a later date.

Councilman Bill Allred will represent Capitan at the April 17 District Meeting of the Municipal League in Tularosa.

The old coop building west of the Smokey Bear Motel was rented to Dave Merrill for 1 year at \$100 a month. Merrill plans to use the building as a wood shop. This agreement can be terminated by either party with 30 days notice.

The council went through the first budget hearing. There will be two more such hearings. \$5,000 budgeted for 2 revenue sharing payments was transferred to the general fund to be used for highways and streets.

The council will work with the Hall brothers in their effort to tie 43 lots on the Capitan sewer system. Hall stated that he would do various items in order to justify such a tie-on. This proposal will be discussed again at a later date.

And now the water problem! A resolution calling for general obligation bonds was passed by the council. Part of this resolution reads: "WHEREAS, a General Obligation Bond in the amount of six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000) should be authorized for issuance of these bonds specifically as priorities listed: 1) Water storage tanks 2) Acquisition of new water sources including transmission 3) Distribution lines if funds are not available from water revenues.

Members of the audience learned that it will be known within 2 weeks whether the well being drilled east of Capitan will do the job. Members then persuaded the council to retract this resolution. THE RESOLUTION WAS RETRACTED. The end result points toward a longer waiting period, "before the ball gets rolling."

Village engineer Ted Asbury was present. Asbury has known

Capitan water problems for the past 15 years and it is he who will design the system.

A few of Asbury's observations are as follows: Capitan has outgrown its water system and the solution will require a long term commitment.

"There are no surprises out there that we can't properly address." "Designs for water treatment are slow and tedious."

There will be no immediate solution to this summer's water problems. Asbury stated that, "we will get the basic system in. There will be deductible alternatives to allow for cost overruns."

"Capitan actual water supply is half the run-off from Eagle Creek. We could get more water out of Eagle Creek if we had more storage. More storage is extremely important. A long range goal should be a 55,000,000 gallon closed reservoir."

The city engineer went on to state that, "We do not have enough water in the present system to fight a large fire for more than an hour."

The village has \$593,000 available for a new treatment plant. This plant will cost something like \$600,000. This plant among other things would take out the manganese and iron which has been known to turn certain laundry items dark.

Many other observations were made. The general consensus was that something concrete should be done soon or face the possibility of some dry water faucets.

### Couple pleads guilty to drug charges

## Convictions send 4 to state pen

Israel Stephens aka Steve Stephens was convicted of the crime of Criminal Sexual Contact Minor (3 counts) and sentenced to imprisonment in the Penitentiary of New Mexico for the term of three years each count to run concurrent (Defendant given credit for pre-sentence confinement 52 days) beginning with the 11th day of April 1985.

Mark S. Wilson was convicted of the crime of Attempted Armed Robbery and sentenced to imprisonment in the Penitentiary of New Mexico for the term of three years with mandatory two year parole (credit for four days confinement).

David Hungerford was convicted of the crime of Probation Violation and sentenced to imprisonment in the Penitentiary of New Mexico for the term of thirty-six (36) months with credit 578 days.

Elmo Silva was convicted of the crime of Possession of Marijuana with intent to distribute and sentenced to imprisonment in the Penitentiary of New Mexico for the term of eighteen (18) months with a mandatory one year parole following release from the New Mexico State Penitentiary.

## Tax tip

The Internal Revenue Service says you may receive an automatic 4-month extension of time to file your 1984 federal tax return. The application for the extension, Form 4868, must be filed by April 15.

The IRS stresses that this is an extension of time to file your return-not an extension of time for payment of taxes due. When filing for the extension, the taxpayer must estimate their tax owed for 1984 and send that amount with the Form 4868 to avoid interest and late payment penalties.

The IRS notes that a deduction for an IRA contribution can be claimed on a 1984 tax return only if the contribution is made on or before April 15, even for those electing an extension to file.

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## Ask Doctor Dan . . .

My brother drinks a six pack of beer every day and I worry about him. He says he doesn't have a drinking problem. I noticed that he became very shaky once when he couldn't drink due to being in the hospital for 3 days. What can I do to help? C.S.

A daily six pack of beer is a significant amount of alcohol and might indicate a problem exists. Your observation of his shakiness indicates he was suffering from alcohol withdrawal while off the beer. The symptoms of withdrawal usually start within 12 hours after the last drink and may last for 5 or 6 days. Shakiness, nervousness, sweating, nausea, stomach cramps, headache, dizziness, rapid heart rate, elevated blood

pressure, hallucinations, seizures, collapse and death have all been seen during withdrawal.

Severe withdrawal is known as D.T.'s (delirium tremens) and is fatal in about 10 percent of cases if not treated. Hospitalization or admission to an inpatient alcohol detoxification unit is recommended for all severe cases of withdrawal. The longer and heavier a drinker a person is, the more likely that withdrawal will occur.

I urge you to enlist the help of other family members to confront your brother with his drinking problem and get him to accept help. Alcoholism is a disease and can be treated.

## Regulations set for 1985-86 'big game' seasons

The State Game Commission met last week in Santa Fe and set the regulations for the 1985-86 big game seasons. Here is a brief outline of the upcoming seasons.

Spring turkey season will begin on April 20 and run through May 5 with a bag limit of one turkey with a beard extending at least two inches past the breast feathers. In Units 42, 43, 45, 46, 49, 54, 55 and 57 there is a two turkey bag limit and the season has been extended to May 12 in Units 57 and 58. The fall turkey season will coincide with the deer hunt periods with a bag limit of one turkey.

The spring bear season will begin on May 10 and end on June 16 statewide with a bag limit of one bear except any female followed by cubs or any cub less than one year old. Bears must be tagged with both the bear tag from the hunting license and a fide tag which is available from Game Department personnel. This year hunters who bag a bear in the spring season must present proof of sex on harvested bears to obtain a hide

tag. The fall bear season will be held from August 15 through December 15 with the same bag limit as the spring season.

The deer bow hunt will be held statewide on September 7 through September 20 and December 29 through January 5, 1986. The bag limit for the bow hunt will be one antlered deer. There is a special bow season in Unit 57 (Sugarite Canyon) near Raton that will begin on September 7 and end on January 5, 1986 with a bag limit of one deer of either sex.

The deer muzzle-loader hunt will begin on September 21 and run through September 29 statewide. The bag limit for the muzzle-loader hunt will be one antlered deer.

For rifle deer hunters there will be three different hunt periods statewide. These periods will be, D-1 November 9 and 10, D-2 November 13 through 17, and D-3 November 20 through 25. The bag limit for the rifle deer hunt is one antlered deer.

The cougar season will begin on December 1 and run through March 31, 1986 statewide. The

bag limit is one cougar except any female accompanied by kittens or any kitten less than one year old.

There will be six special

entry permit deer hunts this year. These will be held at the Sargent Wildlife Area, the Humphries Wildlife Area, the Rio Chama Wildlife Area, the Urraca

Wildlife Area, the Zuni Mountains and McGregor Range. These special hunts will have a bag limit of one antlered deer except the Zuni Mountain hunt.

In this hunt, the bag limit will be one deer with at least three points.

This year the antelope and elk seasons are set up much the

same as last year. These seasons are too numerous to mention here, so if you want further in-

formation contact a Game Department office.

# Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Are they taking good care of our money?

It's worth asking, because the various investment portfolios of the state of New Mexico have a value of more than \$5.8 billion.

But "investment portfolios" makes the whole relationship sound too cool and distant. Better, "our money," as used above, because every cent of it belongs to the people of New Mexico.

As far as can be seen, the folks in charge aren't doing too good a job of handling it.

A preliminary report of a major audit of all these funds, prepared by a national accounting firm, Touche Ross & Co., found that the procedures established by those whose assignment this is are far from optimum ("confusing" is the way they described them, politely). They also said the whole procedure is governed by statutes which (again, note the courtesy) "lag behind modern practices."

**DRAMATIS PERSONAE:** The people this first investigation looked at are largely in the office of the Investment Council and the State Treasurer.

It is no coincidence that these two shops were singled out for attention. The boss at the Investment Council, Phil Troutman, and the second in command at the Treasurer's office, Ken Johnson, have recently been indicted.

That sends a little shiver up the spine.

Though there has been no suggestion that either was involved in any hanky-panky with our funds, the Attorney General suggested an audit might not be a bad idea—just, you might say, to be on the safe side.

Sadly, as things stand as this is written, it does not look like the other two phases of the audit will be completed. Thus we could end up knowing only that certain things need improvement, without finding out what the outside advisors suggest as cures.

All that is true because this investigation was being paid for by the Legislative Finance Committee, which got caught in the middle of that Star Wars drama between Governor and legislators. Without an appropriation for next year, the LFC will wither and blow away, taking the rest of this badly needed analysis with it.

**SIGNPOSTS:** One direction those asking these questions need to be pointed is toward the office of the state Cash Manager.

When Toney Anaya took office, that post was held by a professional at that esoteric trade, whom we had imported from Alaska for just that purpose. Toney quickly found reason to give him the sack.

In that person's place, Anaya named Harvey Fruman, whose only reason for filling the job appeared to be the fact that he is very tight with Toney, with whom he formerly practiced law.

Fruman seldom bothered to enter the office set aside for the cash manager's use, because Anaya wanted him always at hand to answer legal questions for the Governor. (One doesn't begrudge Anaya that advice, which was clearly needed badly. It's just that this wasn't what

Fruman's paycheck was supposed to cover.)

Now we've admitted all that openly, given the job to somebody else and officially named Fruman the Governor's counsel.

But can't help wondering what might have happened to our cash during all those months when Fruman at Anaya's order, was neglecting to mind the store.

## WATCH OVER WASHINGTON

### The strange anti-Hispanic Leach-Levine Contra-Contribution Prohibition Bill

WASHINGTON — Two members of the House of Representatives, Republican Jim Leach of Iowa and Democrat Mel Levine of California, are so opposed to any funding of Hispanic freedom that they have introduced legislation to prohibit even PRIVATE groups from doing so.

They have introduced a proposed amendment to the Neutrality Act of 1794 in order to: "Prohibit assistance for military or paramilitary groups in any foreign country, if the Congress has prohibited the use of covert aid for such operation."

But Representative Levine, who is perhaps best known as Tom Hayden's Congressman, added the following statement with regard to the Neutrality Act itself:

"The Neutrality Act prohibits support of participation in military expeditions against foreign governments that are at peace with the United States. The intent of the Act is that the US not be the site of conspiracies and preparations for attack against foreign governments with whom the United States is at peace."

Since Mr. Levine is a federal officer and a lawmaker, as well as an attorney, we were impressed with this interpretation of the Neutrality Act.

The Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles has for years been contributing church offerings to that denomination's headquarters in New York. This headquarters has forwarded such financial support to the Diocese of Jerusalem. The incumbent bishop of Amman, in this Arab diocese, helped blow up a Jerusalem supermarket before he became a leader of the PLO. The PLO is sworn to the destruction of Israel and frequently conspires against and attacks Israel, a nation with which the US is at peace.

Other churches all over Southern California financially support the World Council of Churches, which has subsidized such black terrorist military and paramilitary organizations as SWAPO, ZANU and ZAPU, whose troops have attacked Rhodesia, Namibia and South Africa, with whom we are not at war.

None of the church officials responsible for these apparent violations of the Neutrality Act have been arrested.

During a telephone in-

terview, we asked Mr. Levine if, as a Congressman, he would ask the FBI to investigate these churches in Los Angeles, which are violating the Neutrality Act by financing those organizations which have conspired and have mounted attacks against such governments as Rhodesia and South Africa.

"I have no interest in enacting legislation against those organizations," replied Mr. Levine. "Our bill is narrowly applied to a specific case in which the Congress has acted in cutting off aid to the Contras. It does not apply to ambiguous situations."

Like "Northern Aid's" funding of the bombers of the IRA?

How about a much more deserving group, the Afghanistan Resistance?

"Our bill refers only to the specific case which Congress has enacted," replied Levine.

"Well, why?" we asked. "The Neutrality Act as you stated it does not confine its enforcement to Hispanics. It applies to ANY conspiracy or preparation of invasion of any country not at war with the United States."

"Well, our bill is very narrow," he replied.

Indeed it is. The Levine-Leach Bill might be called "The Suppression of Guerilla Aid — If They're Hispanic — Bill."

It's surprising that this sort of selective righteousness should come from any member of Congress who is from southern California.

The editorial pages of THE WASHINGTON TIMES explains this very discriminating concern

about Hispanic Freedom Fighters as due to "what comes of reading Mary McGrory's column while Congress is in session. For like Representatives Levine and Leach, Ms. McGrory is a nut on the subject of the Contras."

Miss Mary McGrory, known in some quarters as "Mary McGooGoo, the Lizzie Borden of the Left," is undeniably clever with words. She has become one of the stars of THE WASHINGTON POST, which publishes her widely syndicated column.

But in New York, where there is a POST with wider circulation, there is an equally gifted lady word merchant named Dorothy Rabinowitz. She is fully able to write about male Kennedy's, for example, without quivering.

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# Killings in Lincoln County

Philip J. Rusch



Frank Freeman, a noted desperado, became drunk in Aug., 1877 and commenced shooting up the town of Lincoln. After firing a number of shots into the McSween home, he was arrested by Sheriff William Brady. Justice Wilson ordered him held in default of \$1,000 bail. En route to Fort Stanton he escaped from his guards. A few days later he was killed by a posse. Some accounts say that he was accompanied by a man named Armstrong, who was also killed.

J. M. Franklin, a Chisum cowboy, was shot in the back near Dowlin's Mill about August 23, 1877, by Ramon Garcia, who was crazy drunk. A number of the cowboys started for Fort Stanton to turn the murderer over to the authorities. For some reason he never reached their destination.

About midnight on July 15, 1878 Dan Huff died in agony, despite the administrations of Dr. Ealy. Mrs. McSween later claimed that Mrs. Huff had poisoned him because of his attentions to her.

Thomas Cullins was one of the McSween henchmen. He was killed on July 18, 1878, during the Five Days Battle, and buried in the cellar of the McSween house.

Vincente Romero and Francisco Zamora were killed at the climax of the Five Days Battle on July 19, 1878. The evidence suggests that they had tried to escape from the burning McSween house via the north gate, but the concentrated fire of the sheriff's posse drove them to take refuge in a chicken house. When Robert Beckwith stepped forward to accept McSween's surrender, the two men cut him down. Joe Nash and Andy Boyle got a log poked a hole in the structure, and Boyle killed the two murderers.

Admittedly this is a reconstruction from rather guarded material, but the writer believes that it is probably accurate.

After the Five Days Battle a gang of thieves, largely from Texas, looted, burned and raped their way through Lincoln County. A contest for leadership of the 'thieves' developed between John Selman and Edward 'Little Hart'. One story is that Selman shot Hart without warning while they were sitting at the dinner table. The date appears to have been some time in September, 1878.

The bodies of James Irwin and Reese Gobly, members of the Selman gang, were found in a drift on the Pecos. 'Bustling' Bob, another of the rustlers, was also found dead on the Pecos. According to Billy the Kid, he had been killed by his own party. The dates of these affairs is indefinite, but would seem to be about September, 1878.

east of the White Sands. Irving had been shot in the neck and breast; Moore in the left eye and breast. Tracks indicated that two men on barefooted ponies had shot them without warning, stolen their horses, weapons, clothes, money and Moore's boots and ridden off toward Dog Canyon.

The same day that Irving and Moore were released, a Mexican, named unrecorded was killed about a mile from the Fritz home.

Houston I. (J?) Chapman was Mrs. McSween's lawyer. He arrived in Lincoln on business on the night of March 3, 1879 and went to a neighbor's home to obtain a bread poultice for an aching tooth. While returning he met a number of the Dolan Faction.

One of them, William Campbell, demanded that he dance for them. When Chapman indignantly refused, Campbell

parently baseless - folklore insisted that Campbell was actually Jess James. Chapman's death marked the official end of the Lincoln County War.

In July one of the rustlers, William 'Babe' Grosz, stole a number of horses from the Casad family. There are conflicting reports about the consequences. On version is that Frank Wheeler killed 'Babe', for which he was shot by Sam Perry. Whatever the facts, the Las Cruces Thirty-Four unfeelingy suggested that honest folks would sleep more soundly if Perry would now die of remorse.

On November 22 a party of men spent the night carousing in Lincoln. All departed the next morning except Dick Hardman, (Hardeman), Alias Dick Turpin who shattered the Sunday quiet by firing his pistol promiscuously and by pointing it at objecting citizens. When the disturber of the peace was arrested, he became abusive and made loud threats about what he would do when released. Since Lincoln had no jail, he was locked up in the back room of the Patton building, under the custody of Deputy Sheriff Tom Longworth. Sometime during the night a band of men rushed into the building and fired five or six shots into the prisoner, killing him instantly.

## FEATURE ABOUT LINCOLN COUNTY NEW MEXICO IN THE DAYS WHEN VIOLENCE WAS A WAY OF LIFE

Some time in October, 1878 a number of Mexicans living at Black River, New Mexico, harvested their crops and set out to sell them in Texas. Apparently en route they killed a young man named Hart, who had been raised in the Jones Family, John, Jim, Tom, and Bill Jones and Sam Collins (Caleb Hall) overtook the Mexicans and allegedly killed nine of the men. Their names are unknown, although they were referred to as the Felz family in contemporary reports.

John W. Irving was one of the Selman gang. In November, 1878 Pat Coughlin secured the help of the Army in capturing some rustlers who had stolen a bunch of his cattle. 10. That the Defendants Morales are indebted to the Defendant Stanley's in the amount of \$1,900.00 which amount is subject to a Claim of Lien filed for record on November 9, 1982, in Book V of the Lien Records, Page 1027 and 1028, of the records of Lincoln County, New Mexico.

11. That the amount of the indebtedness owed to Defendant Stanley's by Defendants Morales as more particularly described above, is the amount of \$8,492.14 interest of \$619.53 and attorneys' fees of \$475.00, which amount bears interest at the per diem rate of \$2.01 after December 4, 1984.

12. That the order of priority with respect to the Plaintiff Citicorp, Defendant Pioneer and Defendant Stanley's is as follows:

1. Citicorp Person to Person Financial Center, Inc.;
2. Pioneer Savings & Trust,

F. A.; and  
3. Stanley's, a partnership.  
**CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**

A. That the Court has jurisdiction over the subject matter and the parties to this action.

B. That the Defendants Morales are wholly in default on the Promissory Note and Mortgage payable to the Plaintiff Citicorp; on the Promissory Note and Mortgage payable to Defendant Pioneer and on the indebtedness to the Defendant Stanley's.

C. That the Plaintiff and Defendants, Pioneer and Stanley's, have the legal right to accelerate the Notes and obligations and to declare the entire unpaid principal balance immediately due and payable in accordance with the terms and conditions contained in the respective Notes, together with accrued interest, costs and reasonable attorneys' fees.

D. That the order of priority with respect to the Mortgages and other encumbrances of record are as follows:

1. Citicorp Person-to-Person Financial Center, Inc.;
2. Pioneer Savings & Trust, F.A.; and
3. Stanley's, a partnership.

**IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED** that:

A. Judgment is awarded as follows:

1. To the holder of the first mortgage Plaintiff Citicorp against the real property

described above in the amount of \$36,685.92, which figure includes interest through February 15, 1985, plus accruing interest after that at the rate of \$6.99 per day, plus reasonable attorneys' fees in the amount of \$2,378.68, which the Court finds to be reasonable, and costs of this action in the amount of \$75.93.

2. To the holder of the second mortgage Pioneer, against the real property described above, in the amount of \$5,267.88 including interest through November 20, 1984, plus accruing interest thereafter at the rate of \$1.16 per day, plus reasonable attorneys' fees in the amount of \$869.43, which the Court finds to be reasonable, and costs of this action in the amount of \$130.84.

3. To the Defendant Stanley's in the amount of \$1,900.00

4. That the monetary judgments awarded the Plaintiff Citicorp, Defendant Pioneer and Defendant Stanley's may be satisfied only from the sale of the real property described above belonging to the Defendants Morales by reason of the bankruptcy of the Defendants Morales. In the event the bankruptcy of the Defendants Morales is dismissed, then said parties are not limited to the source of collection of the judgments awarded each of them.

B. That the liens of all parties to this action are hereby foreclosed and that the real property described herein which

is the subject of this action shall be sold at public auction according to the law and practice of this Court. Said sale shall be held on the 10th day of May, 1985, at the hour of 1:00 P.M., in the Lincoln County Courthouse, Carrizozo, New Mexico, and that notice of said sale shall be given as required by law.

C. That Patricia M. Marsh is hereby appointed as Special Master to sell at public auction for cash, the right, title and interest of all parties to this action in and to the subject real property.

D. That the Plaintiff Citicorp and the Defendants, Pioneer and Stanley's, are hereby allowed to bid the respective amounts of the respective monetary judgments to be applied toward the purchase price of the subject real property.

E. That upon the sale of the subject real property, the proceeds shall be distributed as follows:

1. The costs and expenses of foreclosure, including Special Master's fees and expenses of sale.
2. To the Lincoln County Treasurer for unpaid property taxes on the subject real property, if any.
3. To the Plaintiff Citicorp in the amount shown in A (1) above.
4. To the Defendant Pioneer in the amount shown in A (2) above.
5. To the Defendant Stanley's in the amount shown in A (3) above.
6. In the event any proceeds

remain after the payment of the above; any remaining proceeds shall be paid to the Bankruptcy Trustee of the Defendants Morales.

F. That the Defendants Morales shall, after the foreclosure sale and by May 22, 1985, vacate the subject real property and if they do not do so, then a Writ of Assistance shall be forthwith be issued, directing the Sheriff of Lincoln County, New Mexico to use reasonable force to effect the recovery of the subject real property and deliver possession of the party bidding the highest amount at the foreclosure sale.

G. That upon the sale of the subject real property, the purchaser shall be vested with paramount title to the real property, free and clear of all rights of any of the parties to this action or any person claiming by, under or through them, subject only to the right of redemption provided in the mortgage to the Plaintiff, which period is one month.




