## 5th annual S.B. Run June 29

The 5th Annual Smokey the Bear Run sponsored by the Happy Hoofers' Running Club will be held at 8 a.m. June 29 in Capitan. Race-day registration will be from 6:30 to 7:30 in the parking lot by the Rudoso State Bank, Capitan Branch.

T-shirts will be awarded to all entrants in the 10K (6.2 mi.) and the 2-mile Fun Run. Trophies will be awarded to the 1st place overall male and female and also to the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd in each age group in the 10K. Prizes from area merchants will be awarded in the 2-mile Fun Run.

In addition, prizes will be awarded for the most patriotic running outfit, the youngest runner, the oldest runner, and the runner who traveled farthest to run.

Runners will be transported by bus to the starting lines, 6.2 miles north of Capitan for the 10K Run and 2 miles for the Fun Run. An aid station will be at the 3 mile mark. The majority of the course will be downhill.

Winners will be awarded prizes at the finish line in the parking lot.

## Eight bus loads view ranches

The 6th Annual Lincoln County Ranch Tour was held June 8 in the Carrizozo area. The day began with registration at the Valley of Fires State Park. From there, the people boarded buses for the tour to get first hand experience of ranching in Lincoln County.

One stop on the tour was the Shafer Ranch where Scott Shafer explained the every day working on a cattle ranch and how ranches maintain the operation. Scott also held a weight guessing contest with cattle on the hoof being the subjects. He also told about soil conservation and how ranchers are good stewards of the land.

Another stop on the tour was the Barham Ranch R C and Gordon Barham demonstrated the training of quarter horses and how they are trained for use on a ranch.

The eight bus loads of people included a charter bus filled with 42 senior citizens from Albuquerque. The buses met at the White Oaks school where a barbecue lunch for 286 people was prepared and served by the Carrizozo Woman's Club. Entertainment was provided by the Flying J during lunch.

Among those attending were four members from Pete Domenici's office in Roswell, State Cowbelle President Debbie Sauble from Maxwell, and 20 exchange students from all over the world that are attending NMSU. Professor Wilmer Harper and his family accompanied the

exchange students. One student was from Uganda.

The tour then progressed to the vo-ag farm in Carrizozo where Pete and Sarah Gnatkowski demonstrated sheep shearing, spinning of the wool and weaving. Vo-Ag instructor Mike Gaines gave a meat cutting demonstration. There were animals for the children to pet and hogs were on display.

## SHELBY WITHDRAWS BID—

# Rec Center closed

The Recreation Center in Carrizozo is closed. The move came during the regular meeting of the Carrizozo Board of Trustees on Tuesday when Harold Shelby withdrew his bid to lease the rec center.

Shelby told the council that the video machines had been removed from the rec center and with no summer leagues there was no way he could afford to lease the rec center now.

Mayor Harold Garcia instructed town foreman Gallegos to change the locks on the doors at the rec center and to take an inventory of everything in the rec. Private citizens who have bowling equipment in the rec should

contact City Hall to make arrangements to get their things.

Action was tabled on the request from Doyle Wood for reimbursement of \$625.97 for air conditioners for the rec center.

Action on adopting the ordinance to increase water and sewer rates was also tabled because of the lack of a proper quorum. Mayor Harold Garcia and Trustees Patsy Sanchez and Eddie O'Brien attended the meeting but another member was needed to act on an ordinance.

Also tabled was action on a request from the Carrizozo liquor dealers to amend the town ordinance that assesses a supplemental fee of \$400 per year

against liquor dealers in the municipality.

The letter was signed by James W. Silva, owner of Four Winds, Jackie Martin, owner of Jackies, and Harold Garcia, owner of the Outpost. Silva read the letter which states: "We the Carrizozo liquor dealers would request of the Carrizozo town council that they amend the town ordinance which in our opinion blatantly discriminates against the liquor dealers in Carrizozo by assessing a supplemental fee of \$400 per year only against liquor dealers in the municipality."

Reasons given for the request were: (1) Long ago this fee was imposed upon the liquor dealers in lieu of an ad valorem

tax that has since been cancelled by the NM state legislature in 1981. (2) There is no other business in Carrizozo that is required to pay more than \$25 to conduct business within the municipality. (3) We believe there is no reasonable argument to show why a business should pay a supplemental fee just because they deal in selling alcohol. (4) To continue this practice of a supplemental charge for liquor dealers would be discriminatory thus violating our civil rights.

The letter also asked that if the council felt that they could not make a decision Tuesday night that the charging of the supplemental fee be held in abeyance until a decision is made.

In other business

Sandy Baca was granted a variance to put a 14 x 60 mobile home on lots 1 and 2 on McDonald Addition. The 1985 mobile home will be on the lot next to her house.

Monthly expenditures were approved except for a bill received from Lincoln County in the amount of \$4,250 for housing and care of prisoners. A letter received from the attorney general's office gives the council reason to believe the town does not have to pay the bill.

One week a year will be designated as "Shop locally week". The dates will be set later. The need for people to shop locally is to help the town with gross receipts taxes to pay for paving our streets instead of another town's streets. The tax money is used for street maintenance, repair and paving.

All bids received for paving of 3rd Street were rejected. The bids were much higher than estimates.

The pedestrian walk that was to be paved on E Street will be paved after SP completes other work, possibly at the end of July.

### PERFECT LIKENESS

### TYPESETTER'S NIGHTMARE

The longest placename in the British Isles and possibly on Earth is a town in northern Wales. The town's name is a mouthful. Anne Collins, typesetter at the Lincoln County News may hate me for sharing this tidbit with column readers.

The town's full name is, "llanfairpwllgwyngyllgogerychwymdrobwillandysillogogoch," which means "Church of Mary in a hollow near the white hazel near to the rapid whirlpool of St. Tysil by the red cave."

### HABLA SPANGLISH?

In our state, Spanish has been spoken since the Conquistadores first followed the Rio Grande north. A mixture of Spanish and English is the language I am familiar with. When I read an article in the Hobbs Flare written by Jim Segel, I picked up a few more words to add to my vocabulary. Segel is a bilingual author and freelance writer from Espanola.

### HISPANIC AND ANGLO

The article was headlined, "Stop Saying 'Brecas' Before It's Too Late." Read on:

Que agüta! Los profesores are at it otra vez.

Ustedes que hablan half-English and half Spanish are illiterate in both languages, they pronounce from their torreonos de ivory. This "Spanglish" they cry, will be the death of both languages. Stop saying "brecas" before it's too late.

What these linguistic purists fail to comprehend is that we bilinguos have a legitimate reason for applying the "brecas" in our vehicles, instead of los frenos.

El freno is what we put in our horse's mouth and, though it stops the caballo pretty efficiently, we have a difficult time imagining how it could hold back our trocas. We need our brecas for that, and though a lot of us 61-Ford owners have to pump esas brecas pretty hard, they haven't failed yet for not appearing in the Velasquez Dictionary.

The point is that language is not, and never has been a static phenomenon. Si no fuera verdad eso, we'd all still be speaking Latin.

But we're not.

We're speaking hundreds of languages and dialects in the Western World, each one with its legitimate grammar and its oral, if not written, literature.

Como es, entonces, that a number of scholars and self-

appointed experts decry the use of what they pejoratively term "Spanglish." Why are they telling hundreds of thousands of code-switching speakers that they speak "incorrectly"? Why do these experts ignore the fact that there is already a developing oral literature in this bilingual dialect and a written literature not too far around the vuela?

Hay dos razones, it seems to me. The first is built into the very nature of the academic pursuit. Once one has invested so much time and sudor to become an expert in a certain field, one hardly wants that field to undergo constant change.

Yet, language is quicksilver, a barometer of our shifting vidas. The only way to remain an expert on it is to keep up with it, but there are some who lack the energy and desire to do so. Estos expertos would rather remain where they are and label what

they don't like or refuse to comprehend as "wrong."

But they might just as well call the eruption of Mt. St. Helens an impossibility. The declaration still won't stop the lava from



**CAN** you imagine an entire school district going to jail? It probably won't happen, but it would if state law is enforced. California law requires that public school students receive instruction in their primary language. Finding teaching materials written in Spanish is one thing. Vietnamese, Cantonese, Armenian, Arabic, Swahili and Punjabi are something else. But the capper is in Fresno where more than 10,000 Hmong refugees live. Hmong are from a mountainous region in Laos. They have no written language, so it is impossible to teach Hmong children to read and write Hmong. Neither can math, history, sex education or folk dancing be taught to these students. Consequently, Fresno schools are breaking the law. Foolish thinking produces foolish laws. Unenforced laws breed disrespect for all law. And when there is widespread disrespect for the law we have, well... what we have now.

**WHICH** brings us to California State Supreme Court Justice Rose Bird. She recently told Golden Gate University Law School graduates that they should "do what is right, even though it may be unpopular." It would have been nice if, just once, she had admonished these graduates to uphold and defend the laws that people enact.

**TO** her credit, she practices what she preaches. Recently, she overturned California law that prohibits state and local government employees from striking. In doing so, she ignored 25 years of case law and assumed the duties of the legislature. She presides over the chipping away of Prop. 13, a people's initiative that passed by a landslide vote in June 1978. In another example of "doing what is right" rather than following the law is her bias against the death penalty. Voters have repeatedly voiced approval of capital punishment, with 83 percent favoring it. Today, more than 170 inmates await execution on San Quentin's Death Row. There hasn't been an execution in this state since 1967. In 30 out of 33 death penalty cases that have come before the Rose Bird Court since 1978, the death sentence has been reversed. Since that last execution in 1967, approximately 40,000 people have been murdered in California. Their murderers still live.

**FORGET THE LAW:** "do what (in your opinion) is right." In *People vs. Coleman* (1985) Chief Justice Rose Bird, in doing what she thought was right, argued that aliens and ex-felons should be included on California criminal juries. To exclude aliens and criminals from juries would deprive the jury of "complete representativeness."

**ROSE** Bird will be up for voter confirmation next year. We should be looking about for some alien or ex-felon to take her place.

**REPUBLICANS** are not usually regarded as humorous people. They are likely seen as sour people obsessed with exploiting labor and jerking homes from under widows and orphans. Or of starting wars somewhere. However, the GOP Congressional Committee has introduced the "Quantum Theory of Automatic Legislative Multiplication," which attempts to explain some of the unexplained things that have happened during the past 30 years. It goes this way.

**APPROXIMATELY 25,000** bills are introduced into each Congress. Fortunately, few become law. But those that do produce other laws. Once enacted, these laws have more progeny than the fabled Father Abraham: Laws beget law—and changes, modifications, amendments, extensions, clarifications and interpretations. Rarely is an original law repealed outright.

**LET** us suppose that some underworked liberal decided that the horse is an overlooked, overworked, underadvantaged segment of the American scene. First comes a pressure group, such as Help Our Sturdy Steeds (HOSS). The next step is to nag Congress. After a lot of horse maneuvers, let's say a bill is introduced: "The Horses Aspiration Act."

**AFTER** due Committee remination and lengthy debate, opponents would bridle at the suggestion that horses need federal aid or protection, and suggest that such an act would be putting the cart before the horse. Proponents would be only grazed by this criticism, and claim the bill would stabilize the economy. The bill finally passes after Amy Carter (with father Jimmy's approval) enters a tearful plea on behalf of a vanishing chunk of Americana. Then what?

**CIVIL** rights folks would demand an amendment banning discrimination against race, plow, livery, trotter, pacer or hobby horses—or horses of a different color. Environmentalists would call for a Horse Waste Act, and demand impact statements, particularly for merry-go-rounds. Senior citizens would lobby for greener pastures for old mags, and a law prohibiting sending Old Dobbin to the glue factory.

**THE** Equine Footgear Assn. would try to nail down legislation establishing Federal standards for horseshoes, and a bill would be introduced to impose stiff tariffs on imported footgear for ponies. Proponents would point out that the domestic horseshoeing industry has declined 78.3 percent since 1887 with a corresponding loss of jobs. This will be blamed on multinational corporations horsing around with apartheid in Africa.

**LABOR** groups would demand laws mandating barn-to-barn pay, more oats for weekends, holidays and overtime—and the right to buck off riders or kick the whiffletree. Women's rights groups would demand that female horses no longer be called mares or fillies, but be designated as Hs. The education lobby would ask for a bill that requires all country horses to be trucked in to the city so they could be exposed to the benefits of dealing with urban traffic.

**ANTI-WAR** groups would wrap the Pentagon with ribbon in demanding that the government draft beer, not horses. OSHA would want horses licensed, equipped with seat belts and air bags; and require that they wear hard hats at work and display tail lights at night.

**AFTER** all these special interests have done their worst, the Gallup, Totter and Roper polls would reveal that 90 percent of the horses of America believe they are saddled with too much Federal regulation, and will file a class-action suit complaining that they are being hobbled in their private lives.

**DON'T** tell me Republicans can't be humorous—and prophetic.

## WATCH OVER WASHINGTON

### The Arkansas Teachers Association travesty

**WASHINGTON** — Despite changes of heart at the National Education Association, where President Mary H. Futrell has done an about-face to come out in favor of a national test for new teachers, teachers groups should be judged by their deeds, not their words. This applies equally to the American Federation of Teachers, AFL-CIO, whose head, Albert Shanker, has for some time endorsed a national sentry test for would-be teachers.

Says a familiar bumper sticker: "IF YOU CAN READ THIS, THANK A TEACHER." Maybe it's time for a new bumper sticker: "BE THANKFUL IF YOUR TEACHER CAN READ!"

Particularly in Arkansas! When they conducted a field test of a reading examination for a sampling of Arkansas teachers, the Associated Press reported that 26 percent of the whites and 56 percent of the blacks failed. In math, 13 percent of the whites and 53 percent of the blacks failed.

We're sorry that the AP reported this racial breakdown. But the 17,000 member Arkansas Education Association, an affiliate of the NEA, which opposed such testing has contended that this test will strip classrooms of black teachers.

What the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People should have done is to declare loudly, and go to court promptly to assure, that such black teachers be stripped out of classrooms just as soon as possible — along with all such white teachers.

Or is it possible that any black parents want their children taught by teachers who can't pass a reading test?

Maybe there are some black parents who just don't give a damn about this — but there are white parents like that, too. Fortunately, there are not many such parents of either race.

The Arkansas teachers' exam was hardly any kind of brainbuster. It required that teachers demonstrate their ability to write as well as read — a hardly unreasonable requirement for a school teacher. Reading, "ritin", and "rithmetic" — such as one of the questions, which required subtraction of 240 folding chairs from 1,200 folding chairs. This quiz even offered multiple choice! Is the answer (A) 950 (B) 960 (C) 1,060 or (D) 1,440?

If a teacher in Arkansas is unable to read, write or subtract properly, shouldn't this teacher be subtracted?

Where are you NAACP? Or is it "racist" to suggest that most black parents want their children

taught by teachers who can read, write and do arithmetic — whatever the shade of their skin pigment?

This Arkansas teachers' test was also opposed by those two giant teachers organizations, the NEA and the AFT. These organizations argue that no other professions are required by law to undergo such testing. Well, there is no other profession to which all our children are required by law to be turned over for so many years.

Would the leaders of these teachers organizations want their own children cared for by a physician who couldn't manage a blood count and who had trouble reading the prescribed dosage and content of the latest miracle drug?

Would they want their children's rights defended by lawyers whose ability to read, write and subtract was such that they couldn't subtract 240 from 1,200?

The AFT and the NEA ought to be ashamed of themselves both for this position and for their opposition to merit pay.

As for the Arkansas Education Association, this organization's call for a boycott was a gigantic bust. For all but a tiny minority showed up to take the test. Those who deliberately refused to show up ought to be fired forthwith — and regarded as valuable subtractions.

This same firing should be applied to any and all cheats, in view of a Little Rock TV station's report that exams were taken from sealed boxes, copied and returned, in transit between the warehouse and the testing sites.

Incredibly, the head of the Arkansas Education Association's general education section, Tommy Venters, declared that any such cheats who are discovered, will be retested!

These cheats deserve firing even more than the poor performers.

The Arkansas Legislature and Gov. Bill Clinton deserve national acclaim for their standing up to these teachers organizations whose position have been the antithesis of professional.

### What it takes to embarrass Tip . . .

**WASHINGTON, VIRGINIA** — Hours after the US House of Representatives voted to cut off aid to the contras, Nicaraguan strongman Daniel Ortega hopped on a plane for points east. He visited communist Poland and communist Yugoslavia and addressed a Communist Party rally in France. He had his picture taken with Soviet honcho Mikhail Gorbachev. During his stop at the Kremlin, he asked the USSR for \$200 million and he offered to put Soviet missiles in Nicaraguan silos.

Missiles aimed at the United States.

"He embarrassed us, to be quite truthful," said House Speaker "Tip" O'Neill (D-Massachusetts). The House Democratic Leader, Congressman Jim Wright of Texas, said, "People are displeased with him that he would go to Russia and flaunt the fact the Congress refused to send military aid to the contras."

"Displeased with him?" The Democrats were downright shocked! Congressman Mario Biaggi (D-New York) commented, "It is said that a picture is worth a thousand words. What is a picture of Ortega smiling and shaking hands with Gorbachev worth?" Ike Skelton (D-Missouri) lamented, "We're losing the public relations battle."

Who could have guessed that Ortega would want to aim missiles at us? Yes, the Sandinistas have signed political, economic, and military agreements with all the Soviet-bloc nations, and there are several thousand Cubans, East Germans, Bulgarians, and

members of the PLO running around the country giving instruction in how to run a police state. Yes, Ortega and his brother Humberto (the defense minister) were trained in Cuba, and Humberto said in 1981 that "our doctrine is Marxism-Leninism." Yes, the national seal of Nicaragua shows a US Marine being beheaded, and the national anthem refers to Americans as "the enemies of mankind." But there's no reason to think the Sandinistas hate us — right?

Everybody admits that they aren't perfect. Under their regime, strikes are illegal and union meetings are strictly controlled. Nicaragua's one remaining independent newspaper is heavily censored. The government has murdered tens of thousands of Miskito Indians — driving men, women, and children from their homeland in forced marches, bombing their homes, burying them alive, forcing them at gunpoint to work in the sugarcane fields until they drop. There is a universal draft for men age 18 to 24, but boys as young as 13 are kidnapped for military service. As many as 1,000 people a day flee government prosecution.

Local Sandinista organizations dispense ration coupons for soap, toilet paper, gasoline, and food — coupons that are denied to people who criticize the regime. Members of these "Committees for the Defense of the Revolution" watch people's homes to see who comes and goes — one reason for their effectiveness is that many of them did similar work for Somoza, the dictator the Sandinistas overthrew.

Nonetheless, most

**SANTA FE**—As someone here said last week, "Thank God we don't live in Louisiana. Their governor has literally been indicted."

That's not true here at home, of course. The chief elected official in New Mexico has merely been reduced to something approaching irrelevance, thanks to a set of strange circumstances.

A major one of those, of course, is the fact that legislators opposed to our Governor and almost everything he stands for tightly control both houses of our lawmaking assembly. That reduces the chief executives power of leadership to close to zero, as long as what he is trying to accomplish must be done by statute. (That includes almost everything of importance, since most things take money, and the Governor can't touch state funds without authorization to do that from the lawmakers.)

**THE FLIP SIDE:** There's a corollary to that fact about legislators being able to frustrate the Governor's will. It is that he can also frustrate theirs.

While anti-Anaya lawmakers have majorities, they don't have in their ranks enough votes to overturn gubernatorial vetoes. As a consequence, anything they propose that the Governor doesn't approve of, he can veto.

That means he simply has to hang tough and nothing they want gets done either.

As should be clear, such conditions are not good for the state as a whole, partly because they tempt both Governor and inimical lawmakers to power play after power play.

Like little boys making a muscle at one another, these two sides get almost nothing else done. As a consequence, the whole state suffers.

**THE CLOWNS:** Those lawmakers, as became increasingly clear as we made our

perilous way through three legislative sessions so far this year, have demonstrated more ability as squabblers than as reasonable parliamentarians. They take themselves with extreme seriousness, apparently lacking even the most fundamental of senses of humor; and puff themselves up with rhetoric and wind. It would be hard to find a Legislature in any previous year of the state's history which has accomplished so little for each of many days they have been in session.

Any group that has to meet three times to get things right must be made up of a lot of slow learners.

**DEJECTION:** One consequence of all this is to reduce the state's employees to a deeper than ordinary amount of despondence. Sadly enough, the best of them, those who really bear the burden of on-going government, are the most downhearted. They feel that their talents go unused, while the elected officials work out some personal agendas of their own that have little or nothing to do with good governance.

As always, employees hesitate to speak up, since the people they would inevitably have to criticize are in fact their true bosses. Rather than face continuing unpleasantness, many of them give up and go away.

That isn't possible for our citizens. We are here because we want to be here, and we can't just pack it in. Discouraged as we are, and discouraged by the example set us by those we chose in free elections, we have to slog on.

But those who cause these problems — and we know pretty well exactly who they are — should be careful of our wrath the next time they stand before us for election to anything.

design of the filter system being responsive to the needs of the Village and recommended that further tests be made on the well water. John Burkstaller (E.I.D.) recommended investigation of water rights and return flow credits from lagoon.

Trustee Coker discussed the possible need of a separate line for Eagle Creek water to cut the treatments costs. Asbury explained the filter pressures and estimated costs for a parallel line including costs of filtering and treatment at one to two million dollars.

There was a discussion on the use of well water without treatment. It was decided to consult the State Engineer on availability of water rights before proceeding with the design of a filter plant. A second look will be taken at the new well site.

The water situation will be

put on hold for about two weeks. This time will be used by Trustee Coker to check on availability of water rights with the State Engineer.

The main idea is to cut down the cost on the filtering plant and use the savings to further progress on the new well.

The machinery for the July 29 election was set up. The judge will be Margaret Rench. The clerks will be Barbara Sanchez and Linda Wright. The judge for the absentee balloting will be Virginia Spall. Her clerk will be Lois Aldrich. The alternates will be Frank Miller and Lydia Hall.

concerning the Smokey Bear Museum. This lease expires August 15.


A call for bids will be made on a new 2,000 gallon fire truck. This will be done under a lease-purchase agreement.

## Notes on nutrition

Editor's note: Dr. Diane Wakat is Associate Professor, Department of Health Education at the University of Virginia at Charlottesville, and holds a Ph.D. and M.S. in Human Physiology from the University of Illinois. Dr. Wakat will answer questions concerning nutrition. Send any written questions to the Lincoln County News, P.O. Drawer 459, Carrizozo, NM 88301, to be forwarded to Dr. Wakat, for answer.

Question: There are some people who think that for health reasons we should eliminate red meat from our diet. Is this true?

Answer: Let's make sure the person who asked this question means the same thing by "red meat" as we do. One person in the audience of a lecture I gave thought it meant NOT COOKED. Not quite. Red meat is generally used to mean beef or pork, versus chicken and turkey. A phrase we

use often is 'Moderation, not deprivation'. The nutritional concern about red meat consumption is that it is generally high in fat that cannot be removed before cooking because it is engrained in the meat itself. It is also a definite source of saturated fat, the type that has been implicated in heart disease.

My advice here is that people eat red meat no more than 3-4 times per week, and that they eat a portion or serving of meat each of those 3-4 times, rather than a HELPING. A serving is 3 1/2 ounces of meat. A helping is whatever you put on your plate. Other meals can use chicken, turkey, fish, low-calorie cheese, or legumes (such as beans) as a good, low-fat energy source.





RESOLUTION NO. 85-8 (BOND ELECTION RESOLUTION AND NOTICE OF BOARD MEETING)

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Capitan (herein the "Board" and "Village", respectively) in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, has determined to submit to a vote the question of the issuance of its general obligation bonds in the maximum amount and for the purpose hereinafter specified, as permitted by Chapter 3, Article 30, NMSA 1978, and the Bond Election Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY (I.E., THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES) OF THE VILLAGE OF CAPITAN, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. A special election shall be held in the Village on Monday, July 30, 1985, at which there shall be submitted to the qualified registered electors of the Village and to the qualified, registered nonresident municipal electors as hereinafter defined, the following question:

Shall the Village of Capitan, New Mexico, be authorized to issue its general obligation bonds, in one series or more, in an amount of not exceeding \$600,000 for the purpose of constructing and purchasing a system for supplying water for the Village, said bonds to be payable from general (ad valorem) taxes (except to the extent other moneys are available therefor), and to bear interest and mature and to be issued upon such terms and conditions as the Board of Trustees may determine?

Section 2. The polls for said election will be opened at 8:00 a.m. on the day of said election and will be closed at 7:00 p.m. the entire Village constitutes a single general election precinct and electors (except absentee voters) shall vote at the Lincoln County Fair Building, in Capitan, New Mexico. Nonresident municipal electors shall vote at a separate polling place which shall also be located at the Lincoln County Fair Building, Capitan, New Mexico.

Section 3. No ballot on the general obligation bond question shall be received by any precinct board unless the person offering to vote is a registered, qualified elector of the Village or a registered, qualified nonresident municipal elector as herein provided. A registered, nonresident municipal elector means any person who, on the day of election, is a qualified, registered elector of Lincoln County, but who is a resident of that portion of Lincoln County which is outside of the Capitan village limits, who has paid a property tax on property located

within the Village of Capitan during the year preceding the election, and has filed with the office of the Village Clerk of Capitan a certificate of eligibility announcing such person's intention to vote at such election on the question of creating municipal debt. A nonresident municipal elector also must file a certificate of eligibility, with the Village Clerk not more than 60 nor less than 15 days before the date of the election, i.e., on or after May 30, 1985 but no later than July 15, 1985.

Section 4. The registration books of Lincoln County shall be closed by the County Clerk at 5 p.m. on June 17, 1985. Any person otherwise eligible to vote as a qualified elector or qualified nonresident municipal elector and not currently registered, may register prior to such time at the office of the County Clerk, Lincoln County Courthouse, Carrizozo, New Mexico, or at the office of any deputy registration officer appointed by the County Board of Registration.

Section 5. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner authorized by Section 3-9-1 through 3-9-16, NMSA 1978. Applications for absentee ballots may be obtained from the office of the Capitan City Clerk, City Hall, Capitan, NM; but at 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, July 25, 1985, the Clerk is required to destroy unused absentee ballots; so that, completed applications must be returned to the Clerk prior to such time. The absentee voters' polling place will be located at the Office of the Village Clerk at the Capitan City Hall, Highway 380 in the Village.

Section 6. Voting machines shall be used for this special election except for the absentee voters' precinct polling place at which paper ballots shall be used.

Section 7. NOTICE HEREBY IS ALSO GIVEN that the Board of Trustees will meet in open, special session at the City Hall, in Capitan, New Mexico, at 6:00 p.m. on July 5, 1985, to formally adopt the certificate of results of such election and take other action relating thereto.

Seccion 2. Los sitios para votar en dicha eleccion se abran a las 8:00 A.M. el dia de dicha eleccion y se cerraran a las 7:00 P.M. La Aldea entera constituye un solo recinto de eleccion general y los electores (excepto los votantes absentistas) votaran en el Lincoln County Fair Building (Edificio de la Feria del Condado de Lincoln), en Capitan, Nuevo Mexico. Electores municipales no residentes votaran en un sitio separado que tambien estara situado en el Lincoln County Fair Building, Capitan, Nuevo Mexico.

Seccion 3. No se recibira ninguna balota sobre la cuestion del bono de obligacion general por cualquier junta de recinto a menos que la persona ofreciendo votar es un votante calificado, registrado de la Aldea o un votante calificado no residente registrado como se provee aqui dentro. Un elector municipal no residente tambien tiene que archivar un certificado de elegibilidad con la Escribana Municipal no mas de 60 ni menos de 15 dias antes de la fecha de la eleccion, es decir en o despues del 30 de mayo de 1985, pero no despues del 15 de julio de 1985.

Seccion 4. Los libros de registro del Condado de Lincoln se cerraran por la Escribana del Condado a las 5:00 P.M. el 17 de junio de 1985. "NEW MEXICO'S HERITAGE" by Dr. David Stuart

## "Forty thousand archeological sites"

It boggles the mind to realize that New Mexico has 40,000 archeological sites and is still counting! Just over half a century ago LA 1, Pindi Pueblo near Santa Fe, was the first ruin entered into the records of the Museum of New Mexico's Laboratory of Anthropology.

It has taken survey archeologists more than five decades to painstakingly record New Mexico's enormous number of known archeological sites. Forty thousand prehistoric ruins is an impressive number, and today local archeologists know a great deal more about our state's past than did our colleagues who walked survey so long ago. But much work still remains to be done, for only a small portion of New Mexico has been walked foot by foot.

New Mexico is a vast domain. It contains over 121,000 square miles, nearly 80 million acres. It is larger than Maine, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Vermont, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, New York, New Jersey, and Delaware combined! If 100 top-notch survey teams of four archeologists each started tomorrow, we would know how many sites there were in all of New Mexico by about the middle of the next century.

I doubt that the job will ever be done because New Mexico does not have 400 trained archeologists. Then, too, a top-notch crew of four only find and properly record archeological materials found in about 160 acres per day. About two days of laboratory analysis and write-up are required for every day spent in the field. In the decade from 1970 to 1980, an annual average of 120,000 acres was surveyed in New Mexico, and 2,000 sites per year were entered into the files at the State Museum—one site for every 60 acres covered!

The 40,000 archeological sites currently recorded at the State Museum represent the finds from two and one-half million acres of survey coverage in half a century—less than one thirtieth of the State of New Mexico. It has taken 50 years to do a mere three percent of the job of rediscovering New Mexico's past! At that rate, it would take nearly 2,000 years to find and record the rest. Actually, this is overly pessimistic, for only an average of 200 sites per year were recorded in Santa Fe in the 40 years from 1930 to 1970—the equivalent of 1,200 acres surveyed per year. At the 1970's rate of 120,000 acres per year, we

could get the job done in just another 620 years!

How many archeological sites would we find if every square inch of New Mexico were surveyed? A conservative estimate would be 500,000 and by no means were all the large "important" sites discovered long ago. As recently as 1979, major Chacoan sites, some with partially standing walls, were being discovered within sight of Interstate 40!

True, many of the 40,000 odd sites that have been recorded are not very impressive. Most people would not recognize half of them to be much of anything at all. Hundreds of these might consist of only half a dozen fragments of pottery scattered about. At hundreds more there would be a few flakes of chert or basalt, struck from stone cores long ago, or an ancient hearth of fire-cracked rock eroding from a sand dune.

But others are quite grand. Ruins like those in Chaco Canyon, in Bandelier Monument and the great stone missions at Salinas National Monument (between Mountainair and Carrizozo) do capture the imagination. Perhaps for this reason, the general public is familiar with just the few dozen very impressive sites that have been excavated and restored for visitors.

However, there are thousands of other archeological sites that can impress you, too, when you stumble across them unexpectedly, if you learn to understand what they mean. That is what survey archeology is about: thousands of archeological sites—both the great

and the small—and what they mean. Often one obscure little site doesn't yield much information. But when one learns a small fiber of fact from 100 or 1,000 similar ones, a great bundle of scientific threads is slowly piled up. These bundles are the unique creation of the survey archeologist. When they are added to the in-depth information from New Mexico's 300 excavated sites, they create a very special brush—one that can be used to paint a vivid picture of New Mexico's past.

So, the important treasures of New Mexico's archeology are by no means limited to the small number of sites familiar to the public. How many realize that the Galisteo Basin District, just to the southeast of Santa Fe, contains more than a dozen grand pueblos which were founded after the decline of Chaco Canyon? The masonry Pueblo of She, with 1,543 ground floor rooms, positively dwarfs the 332 rooms and kivas of the more famous Pueblo Bonito at Chaco Canyon. Nearly as impressive are the ruins of Pueblo Colorado and San Cristobal, not far from Pueblo She.

Though not all important sites are so large, New Mexico's collection of archeological treasures is both immense and stunning. And thousands more will be found as survey archeologists continue to walk New Mexico's "back country", foot-by-foot.
