## Big stink brewing over liquor

The Carrizozo board of trustees decided at the July 9 meeting to hold a special meeting on Wednesday, July 24, at 2 p.m. for the final budget hearing and revenue sharing for the 1985-86 fiscal year.

The public has the right to provide oral and written comments and ask questions concerning the entire budget and the relationship of entitlement funds to the entire budget.

In other business, a prolonged discussion was held concerning the municipal liquor license. The annual fee of \$400 was due July 1. The three liquor dealers had paid the fee but asked that the money be held under a 30 day protest.

Mayor Harold Garcia, speaking from the mayor's chair, said, "I speak now as a liquor dealer, with Jackie Martin. Mr. Silva is not here. Our intention to begin with is to ask you people to

review the ordinance and to assess it. We are asking you to change the ordinance for reasons we felt were valid. The request still stands."

Garcia owns the Outpost, Martin owns Jackies and Silva owns the Four Winds.

In response to Garcia's statement that Capitan did away with their liquor ordinance, Councillor Bob Hemphill said, "I can give you some figures of towns near us. Corona's is \$300 general and \$200 for beer and wine for restaurants. Tularosa is \$800, it doesn't matter whether it is retail or beer and wine for a restaurant. The Tularosa fee is paid semi-annually, with \$400 due July 1, and \$400 due Jan 1. Socorro fee is \$400 general and \$200 for beer and wine for restaurant. Ruidoso fee is \$900 dispenser, \$500 package store, and \$300 for beer and wine for restaurant. Ruidoso Downs is a straight \$500."

Garcia, speaking again from the mayor's chair, said "I don't believe it's ever been our contention that as compared to any other dealers how ours matched up. What our contention is this, to impose this licensing fee on just the people that hold state licenses in the alcoholic industry, we feel that's discriminatory."

Garcia went on, "We would gladly share any type of fiduciary responsibility to the town with anybody that held a state license, the barbers, the beauticians, the general contractors, the electricians, the plumbers, the lawyers, the doctors, the real estate agents, the nurses, anyone else that had a state license if it was in actually a fee upon their license, we would gladly share the responsibility with anyone. But to single just the liquor industry out has to have some merit to it and if the merit isn't there, either just assess our fee the same as

everyone else's that holds a state license. If everyone pays \$400, we will gladly pay \$400."

Later Garcia said, "There are a lot of people that hold state licenses that I think ought to share at least the responsibility to the town for a licensing fee and not just the liquor industry. So it has never been an actual comparison to other towns as it is to treat us all the same."

Hemphill suggested a committee of Carrizozo retail liquor association be formed and present a sample ordinance and let the council go from there.

He also mentioned that the town had just told the people they had to pay more on their water and sewer to help pay city bills.

Garcia contended that if the revenue was needed for a certain area to earmark fit for that.

Money was involved in another issue when Carrizozo

## Murder charges against Rison

The Grand Jury met Monday and returned two criminal indictments against Bill Rison aka Loyed White of Lincoln County.

Rison was indicted for murder and aggravated arson in the June 26 death of Mattie West, 71, of Roswell.

Rison has been accused of setting the fire that engulfed the camping trailer that was parked at the Baca campsite in Lincoln National Forest. Mrs. West died at the University of New Mexico Hospital in Albuquerque after suffering burns over 90 percent of her body. Her husband, Lee West, was hospitalized in serious condition with burns over 20 percent of his body. He was released earlier this month.

Rison had been arraigned in Magistrate Court on June 27 and was held without bond on an open count of murder and aggravated arson.

Apparently Rison and the Wests had a disagreement over cutting wood.

Also indicted by the Grand Jury was Ronnie Claridge.

Crime Aggravated Battery (Great Bodily Harm) or in the alternative Aggravated Battery (Deadly Weapon), a third degree

## SUSPICIOUS CHARACTER

What would you do if you discovered that a strange man, a recent patient at a mental institution, was in the road in front of your house - reading a bible, staggering and rumored to have muttered that he was going to kill some children?

I was on the way to the news office to develop our week's film and print pictures when I had to make that decision. With the children around me, I dialed the Sheriff's Office, who dispatched the town police. They interrogated the stocky built subject wearing a blue shirt and jeans. Following the investigation I learned that the man had been institutionalized since age 16. According to the

doctor contacted at Las Vegas the man no longer needed treatment and had been released.

The man had gotten off at the Four Winds with other passengers and the bus left without him after the short stop over. He wandered all over town overnight hoping to catch another bus next day.

That next morning the man had been reported by another citizen and the police had been looking for him when I made my call. When the town police arrived at the scene in front of my house, the sleepy man was reading a poem from a publication he had obtained at the Four Winds. (One of my kids thought he was reading a Bible.) Apparently the man was 'killing time' until he could catch another bus out of town.

## DETER CRIME

July's State Law Enforcement Reporter had an article, "Be a Crime Fighter." I read the issue the same day following the suspicious character incident.

Following is part of what the article said:

"You don't have a proper and healthy perspective of our society today if you think that the law enforcement sector is totally responsible for the eradication of crime. Each and every person who can differentiate between right and wrong can serve to assist police when they observe situations which might be unlawful. Do not hesitate about calling the police because your involvement may protect your own life or property or save a neighbor from harm or loss."

## Drug Free Day in the Elderly.

A few years ago while working as a director of a nursing home in Canada, I decided to start a drug free day for the residents. They, of course, were free to join or reject the program. Similar programs had already been tried in this country with good results.

In practice it means not taking any medications one day per week excepting such life sustaining drugs as insulin, oral hypoglycemics and anti-convulsants, etc. In case you decide to start this routine, it is very important that you discuss with your own physician in detail. For example, important drugs such as digoxin and diuretics usually are not taken.

Some of the benefits noted at the nursing home were (1) drug toxicity problem was much reduced, (2) side effects due to therapy eg. dehydration, drowsiness, and lack of alertness were greatly diminished.

# Dr. Jain says —

Ear problems in childhood which are usually diagnosed as "ear infections" are quite common. A child may become fussy, and complain of pain deep in the ear, which may be associated with hearing loss. Fever or chills usually do not accompany the above symptoms, which really indicates an absence of infection in most cases. Antibiotics in such situations may provide little relief.

Causes (1) It may start with a viral infection; (2) but much more common cause is allergy, especially to certain foods quite commonly eaten.

Treatment (1) Decongestants taken orally may provide some relief; (2) Vitamin C in high dosage; (3) elimination of certain foods as indicated by

# State award to Hemphill

CARRIZOZO—Robert Hemphill, Carrizozo Mid-school math teacher is one of six New Mexico teachers selected for state level awards in the 1985 Presidential Awards for Excellence in Science and Mathematics Teaching Program.

The other five teachers awarded this recognition were from Eldorado in Albuquerque, two from Los Alamos, Las Cruces and Clovis.

In response to a nationwide urgency to upgrade teaching in mathematics and science, the National Science Foundation (NSF) began the Presidential Awards Program in 1983. Since then a total of fourteen (14) outstanding New Mexico mathematics and science teachers have been recognized for their extraordinary dedication and teaching skills.


Eligible teachers have spent five (5) or more years teaching mathematics or science at the seventh through twelfth grade levels in a public or private school. Teachers who accept

nomination for the state-level Presidential Award are evaluated by a selection committee chaired by the SDE.

The recipients are offered an opportunity to apply for national recognition. If they are accepted as national exemplars, their programs will appear in the NSTA series "Focus on Excellence."

A FULL moon has unleashed the theatrical loonies, this time at Camp Meeker, CA. This community is now a nuclear-free zone, thanks to the foresight of Mary K. All of which forced the cost of the plant to 10 times its original estimate. ## Watch Over Washington

### President Reagan's lately qualified promise

WASHINGTON — The second question at President Reagan's internationally televised news conference on June 18 was asked by Mike Putzel of the Associated Press.

"Can you tell us, sir, what happened to the policy of 'swift and effective retribution' that you announced four and a half years ago to deal with international terrorism such as that we've seen?"

THE PRESIDENT: Well, when I was speaking about that, I was talking about a situation in which a government on the other side was involved, so there was a direct source for the evil.

The official White House transcript for January 27, 1981, at the welcoming ceremonies for the return of the hostages from Iran, includes the following statement by the President:

"Let terrorists be aware that when the rules of international behavior are violated, our policy will be one of swift and effective retribution."

Nowhere in this five-page transcript is there any qualification whatsoever of his word "terrorist." The President did not say: "Let terrorists — who are involved with a government..." Nor did the President say: "Let terrorists — whose identities we can ascertain..."

No such qualification whatsoever. His warning was therefore to all terrorists, whether involved or uninvolved with a government; whether they are known or unidentified. And regarding any such terrorists, he made what was surely a promise of "swift and effective retribution."

How can this promise be kept if the terrorists are unidentified?

Ask the Israelis. For they didn't know the identities of those masked and cowardly Arab murderers who machine-gunned most of the Israeli Olympic Team at Munich. But Mossad, Israel's CIA, hunted down and killed every one of these creatures who were responsible for this atrocity.

That Arab terrorists, specialize in kidnapping, bombing or otherwise murdering American civilians instead of Israelis is due to the fact that such killers know that if they do such things to an Israeli, they will be hunted down; there will be what Ronald Reagan promised the American people; swift and effective retribution.

At his June 1985 news conference, President Reagan was misleading about what he had promised in January of 1981. He really ought to look over the transcript and admit that in 1981 he promised swift and effective retribution for all terrorists of the American people.

Mr. Reagan ought then to apologize and to ask for a copy of the speech made last October by the highest ranking member of his Cabinet, Secretary of State George Shultz. For Mr. Shultz provided an answer to the problem, which should have been implemented last year. In this speech, Secretary Shultz said, among other things:

"We must reach a consensus

in this country that our response should go beyond passive defense, to consider means of active prevention, preemption and retaliation."

Secretary Shultz went on to note that US intelligence services "must be given the mandate and the flexibility to develop techniques of detection and contribute to deterrence and response." Moreover, the public must understand "before the fact, the risks involved in combating terrorism with overt power."

These risks, said Shultz, include "loss of life of some of our fighting men and the loss of life of some innocent people... Occasions will come when their government must act before each and every fact is known... We may never have the kind of evidence that can stand up in an American court of law... Support for US military actions to stop terrorists before they commit some hideous act, or are in retaliation for an attack on our people, is crucial if we are to deal with this challenge... There will not be time for a renewed national debate after every terrorist attack... But we cannot allow ourselves to become the Hamlet of nations, worrying endlessly over whether and how to respond. A great nation cannot afford to be hamstrung by confusion and indecisiveness."

While Vice President George Bush initially — and very ineptly — opposed this, President

#### IN CHALLENGER FLIGHT—

### WSMR to play active role

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, NM, July 12 — During the space shuttle Challenger's mission next week, White Sands Missile Range will play an active role with its payload - Spacelab 2.

The missile range's Naval Ordnance Missile Test Station, along with NASA, will conduct an underflight with the shuttle using two upper atmospheric sounding rockets for an experiment in solar physics. This is the second time in the shuttle program's history that NOMTS has conducted an underflight. However, it is the first time two rockets have been used.

The two underflights are slated for launch on July 17. Each will contain a scientific payload. The first rocket is scheduled for a 7:30 a.m. launch, the second will be launched at 4:30 p.m.

The first rocket will be a Nike Black Brant containing a Lockheed experiment package. According to Lockheed project scientist, Dr. Marilyn Bruner, the experiment is designed to capture high resolution ultraviolet and X-ray pictures of the sun and look at other solar phenomena. The 650-pound payload, which has been developed over the past 11 years, contains four instruments: an ultraviolet camera, television camera, a soft X-ray spec-

tragraph, and a newly designed soft X-ray camera.

Bruner said her experiment will be conducted in unison with another solar package on board Spacelab 2 during the six to seven minute flight of the rocket. When Spacelab 2 returns to Earth the ultraviolet and X-ray images from the rocket instruments will be compared with Spacelab measurements of magnetic fields in the sun's atmosphere, in an attempt to understand the physical processes taking place in the sun. The package aboard the rocket is in collaboration with the Laboratory for Stellar & Planetary Physics in France.

With communications slated to be open between Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center in Houston and the missile range, Bruner said, "We are going to be calling the shots as to what we want the mission specialists on the Challenger to do with this particular experiment."

The American Science & Engineering Group will have a solar experiment aboard the afternoon rocket. It will contain an X-ray telescope which will operate simultaneously with the Spacelab 2 specialists.

Dr. John Davis, AS&E project scientist, says the purpose of this mission will be to take a picture of the sun in the soft X-ray spectrum. Of special

## Ethiopia (part I): Let them eat sand

WASHINGTON, VIRGINIA — Shouts of "Revolutionary motherland or death!" echoed through the square and tanks and rocket launchers rumbled down the street, and 15,000 soldiers marched past huge posters of Marx, Lenin, and Lt. Colonel Mengistu Haile Mariam. Ten thousand schoolchildren carried cards that spelled out slogans like "Long live proletarian internationalism," while others demonstrated North Korean-style gymnastics.

Mengistu, live and in person, stood on the reviewing stand with his two guests of honor: the communist boss of East Germany and a member of the Soviet Politburo. Behind them, mortars blasted hundreds of little parachutes into the sky, each carrying a communist flag. In front of them, a paper-mache model of a government-owned Hilton Hotel wheeled past.

Earlier, a mile down the road, a 20-ton bronze statue of Lenin had been unveiled near the entrance to Addis Ababa University.

Yes, when they celebrate the anniversary of their 1974 communist revolution, Ethiopians really know how to party. The whole shebang cost only \$200 million or so, well worth it for the Mengistu government to show its best face to diplomats from around the world. (The extravaganza took place last September, more than a month before the first American TV pictures of the pitiful victims of Ethiopia's famine.)

Even today, months after the celebration, there are still posters plastered everywhere — mostly pictures of the communist "gods," Marx, Engels, and Lenin, whom the people lampoon as "the Marx Brothers." Of course, the people must be careful when they make fun of the communists; the government has many informers and tolerates no dissent. In 1977, tens of thousands of dissidents were killed in what is known (officially) as The Red Campaign of Terror.

In the Soviet colony of Ethiopia, Comrade Mengistu presides over the government

like a latter-day Stalin. His rule is absolute in most of the country, although rebels control 80 percent of the provinces of Eritrea and Tigre. Just as Stalin starved the Ukrainians into submission, killing seven million of them in the process, Mengistu hopes to starve people in the rebel-occupied areas until they give up. And if a million Ethiopians die, well, that's just the price of revolution, isn't it?

It is easy to see Mengistu's hand in the suffering of the Ethiopian people. There have been many shortages of food over the country's 2,000-year history — a famine helped bring down the government of Emperor Haile Selassie in 1974 — but it's never been this bad.

Mengistu wants people to believe that the severity of the famine is a fluke of nature; the evidence suggests otherwise. The chief assessor of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration reported in March that there were no weather-related reasons for the magnitude of the Ethiopian famine. In most of Ethiopia, rainfall is normal or only slightly below normal; the one area of severe drought accounts for only 15 percent of the nation's agriculture. Indeed, some areas of Ethiopia had surpluses last year!

Cruel weather alone would not be enough to produce a famine like this anyway. A study by the International Disaster Institute indicates that mass starvations are rarely the result of drought, because people in drought-prone areas have, over thousands of years, developed elaborate strategies for coping with a food shortage. They hoard their surplus in times of plenty, or invest it in jewelry and other items that can be sold for food imported from elsewhere, or send their children to the cities to work, or move to areas where food is available. Kenya has been hit with the worst drought of the century, and food is short, but there is no mass starvation.

Why has Ethiopia been hit so hard? The answer is Comrade Mengistu. How he did it is the subject of my next column.

The joint powers agreement with the sheriff's office was brought before the board. No decision was made.



**EDITOR**—A 304 page bombshell book has just been published by French author Eric Laurent which is called "The Rope With Which To Hang Them." It details the crucial American role in building Soviet industrial might. Laurent's main target is Occidental Petroleum boss and longtime Soviet friend Armand Hammer.

This study shows that Soviet economic development was almost entirely the result of American technological and financial assistance, even to the extent that 85 percent of Moscow's industrial infrastructure was acquired from the country which the Kremlin has vowed to destroy. The one man most responsible for this on-going scandal is the 87 year old Armand Hammer who has amassed a vast fortune from strategic aid and trade with the Soviet Union.

The story of how Armand Hammer became the privileged spokesman of the Secretary General of the Soviet Communist Party in its dealings with the West, and of why the man enjoys a luxurious apartment facing the Kremlin and permission to land his private plane anywhere in the Soviet Union actually starts with Armand's father, who in 1874 left his native Odessa in the Crimea and became a Communist in 1907 on the day he formed a friendship with Lenin. Julius Hammer bankrolled the founding of the Communist Party of the USA but never let his Communist convictions stand in the way of making a profit.

Laurent tells that one of Armand Hammer's proudest achievements was to provide heavy financial support to Franklin Roosevelt's first Presidential campaign. Hammer used his close friendship with FDR's wife Eleanor who always had a soft spot in her heart for Communists, in order to persuade the President to establish diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union that was then on the verge of collapse. This move by FDR opened the floodgates of American aid and enabled the Reds to stay in control.

eclipse. The soft X-rays detected in the sun's corona are not visible from the Earth because they are blocked by the atmosphere.

The purpose of Davis's experiment is to learn more about the connections between the sun and the Earth. "One of these connections is through the solar wind," says Davis. "The solar wind is ionized gas which originates on the sun and travels about 300 kilometers per second."

By examining what Davis terms "X-ray bright points" in the sun's corona, a correlation can be made between the points and the solar wind. Davis says his experiment is planned to look at the sun simultaneously with an NRL investigation on board the Spacelab 2 to see if both experiments measuring different aspects of the solar corona detect the same phenomena.

Data gathered during the two underflights will hopefully lend itself to a better understanding of how the sun works and its affects on Earth.

### FISH HOOKS.

To keep fish hooks from rusting when not in use, stick them in a cork. Store the cork in an empty baby food jar to which you add baking soda.

### EGG WHITES

An easy way to separate an egg is to break the egg into your cupped hand and let the white slide through your fingers into a bowl. The yolk will remain in your hand. Messy but effective.

### PREVENT FOOD POISONING

Don't risk poisoning caused by improper storage of food. A few simple precautions follow: Never let food cool to room temperature before putting it in the refrigerator. Do not thaw frozen foods for hours at room temperature. Allow them to thaw slowly in the refrigerator or wrap them in plastic and soak in cold water. Bacteria in raw poultry, fish or meat could contaminate your cutting board. Scrub it after each use.

# 'Lincoln County Long Ago'

The Captain Progress, A Journal Devoted to the Interests of Lincoln County, Fri., Jan. 4, 1901.

Captain-Future Pittsburg of the Southwest, The Great Captain coal fields have already become famous, although on railroad only since October 1st, 1899, and with its other great resources iron, coke, timber, precious metals, farming, grazing and its beautiful climate, recognized by the government in the establishing the United States Marine Hospital at Fort Stanton, five miles distant, must make Captain one of the most important cities of the Southwest.

Local and Personal  
Officers of the White Oaks

locality had a brush with a party of suspected horse thieves in the Captain mountains one day last week, in which several shots were fired. It is said that Claude Doane, who is known in this section, is the leader of the suspected party.

There are now ten prisoners in the county jail at Lincoln waiting trial, some for murder and some for other offenses. This does not sound so bad for the county when it is learned that we have not had a term of district court in the county since October 1899.

The Southwestern Mercantile Company are having a fire and damp proof powder house erected northeast of town. The magazine will have a capacity for storing a car load of powder at a time. It will be constructed of fire proof brick.

M. G. O'Neil will do the work of construction.

Work will begin in Carrizozo next Monday on the material yards, and necessary siding required for the construction of the extension of the El Paso & Northeastern to a junction with the Rock Island.

Work on the material yards at Carrizozo began last Monday. There will be eight miles of side track constructed for the E. P. & N. E. extension. A large number of the ties used will come from Lincoln county forests in the Giliina country.

Mrs. Pflingston of Bonita and her daughter, Miss Agnes are stopping with the family of A. May. Miss Agnes is suffering from injuries of the head received from a fall, some two years ago and came here to receive treatment from Dr. Gillett.

A sad accident which resulted in the killing of one man

and the injury of two others, occurred at the Homestake mine at Schelerville the other day. Some powder in the shaft house exploded and blew the building up with the above results.

The Progress is now located in its new building on Lincoln avenue, opposite Sanger & Prude's store. We invite our friends and patrons to call and see us in our new home. The latch string hangs on the outside of the door.

It may be possible that our opinion of the Captain diamonds is wrong. Specimens of these so-called diamonds have been sent east and pronounced genuine. An expert direct from the South African diamond fields is expected in a few days. Numbers of claims are being located southwest of Captain for prospecting purposes. ## Notes on nutrition

Question: Are between-meal snacks harmful?


Answer: They don't have to be. For instance, it's been shown that eating six small meals a day rather than our traditional three

meals leads to less of a weight problem — and better control of blood fat levels. The problem is that people tend to eat snack "Meals" as well as their three big meals. That obviously brings in too many calories—and people start to gain weight. The other problem is that people make some poor nutritional choices for snacks, aren't hungry at their regular mealtime—then get cravings because they haven't satisfied their nutritional needs. It becomes a vicious cycle.

If you can select good snacks and you don't get too many calories—then snacking is fine. But if you can't, then you can't. Snacking is a major problem with many people who have difficulty controlling their weight.





AN EXERCISE YARD for Lincoln County jail prisoners has been completed across the street from the jail. The 59 by 195 foot fenced area cost \$4,552. This money came from a special fund derived from the \$5 per county citation that can only be used for jail improvements. Having the exercise yard lessens the potential for a lawsuit against the county since jail standards require that prisoners receive sunlight every day and a certain amount of physical exercise. The exercise yard can also be used for a holding facility for persons charged with non-violent crimes, such as aliens. Recently 26 aliens were held in the exercise yard until the border patrol arrived.

miles in June and used 362.2 gallons of gas. They made or answered 73 calls. Total of case assignments was 20, 19 cases were cleared, there were 14 moving citations, 56 verbal warnings, and five arrests. Four parking citations were issued, all commercial buildings were checked, most houses were checked, and they made 203 public appearances. Three non-injury accidents were investigated and two officers had court cases.

Complaint reports that were investigated in June totaled 19, with 15 closed and four active.

Four of the 19 complaint reports remained active; vandalism, breaking into vacant home, prowler, and breaking and entering. Among the 15 closed were broken windows, disturbance, battery, curfew violation, illegal aliens, coin container open, arrest, family dispute, dogs killing,

family fight, horse's, open door, disturbance and missing person.

There were 17 citations issued, and four parking violations. Of these 12 were for speeding, three were stop sign violations, one wide turn at intersection, one failed to stop, one was parked in the wrong direction, two were parked in a prohibited area, and one double parking citation was issued.

Memorial services were held in Alamogordo on Monday, July 1, at the Kingdom Hall of Jehovah's Witnesses. Mr. Haley's ashes were spread over the Jicarilla Mountains.
