C'zozo to polls Mar. 4

Residents of Carrizozo will have the opportunity on March 4, 1986, to vote for the candidate of their choice for Mayor, Municipal Judge, and two trustee positions.

The two trustee seats that will be up for election will be the seats now being held by Bob Hemphill and James Payne. (The unofficial word is that Hemphill will be running for Mayor.)

Persons wishing to vote must be registered with the County Clerk not later than Tuesday, January 21 at 5 p.m. After that date, the County clerk will close the registration books for this election.

All 'Declarations of Candidacy' are to be filed with the town clerk on Tuesday, January 7, 1986 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Special meeting called

A special meeting of the Capitan City Council was held, Sunday evening, Nov. 24.

This special meeting was called as a public hearing for the CDBG (Community Development Block Grant) application for \$25,000 to be used to prepare a master plan for the Capitan Water System.

Resolution No. 85-19, filing of application and technical workshop assistance. After reading the resolution Trustee Beavers moved to approve the resolution. This was seconded by Trustee Renfro. Upon a roll call vote Trustees Beavers, Coker, and Renfro all voted aye. The application was reviewed and Mayor Cummins will hand carry it to Santa Fe prior to Nov. 27, 1985, when the hearings will be held.

Maintenance contract on computers costly

The Carrizozo Board of Education accepted resignations from two teachers at the Nov. 19 meeting. Joelyn Pafford, 4th grade teacher, half time, and Sidney Hammontree, mid-high science teacher, resigned.

After an executive session, the board agreed to hire Jan Barham as 4th grade teacher half time and for one 5th grade science class. A special meeting will be held at 7 p.m. Nov. 26 to consider employing a mid-school science teacher.

Superintendent Dennis Sidebottom told the board that a teacher had not been found for the Adult Basic Education class.

Sidebottom and administrative aide Peggy Frazier attended the state accounting workshop. They were told that the state is \$120 million short in meeting commitments and a tough year is coming up.

Maniere roof work has been completed by Foam America. The high school roof is under warranty and will need repairs by All American Enterprises of Albuquerque.

The auditor found a mistake of \$70,000 in the building fund budget from last year when former school superintendent Jim Miller requested a budget

increase for the same amount. The mistake was not caught by Santa Fe. This money had already been budgeted as revenues in the final approved budget, and therefore was not available to be budgeted again. Actual expenditures were much less than the budgeted amount and there were sufficient cash and revenues to fund the actual level of expenditures. Sidebottom said luckily the money had not been spent.

Vo-Ag teacher Mike Gaines spoke about the trip to Kansas City by the Meats team. The Carrizozo team finished 18 out of 37 and brought home a silver emblem plaque.

Board members were surprised when Sidebottom told them that the computer the school bought last year for use in the administrator's office at a

cost of \$46,000 was no longer under warranty. A maintenance contract will cost approximately \$4,900 a year compared to the cost of repairs and replacement on components if there is a breakdown with the computer. Replacement cost of the main frame would be \$13,000 and replacement cost of each terminal would be \$2,000.

With a maintenance contract, the company guarantees to have someone on the site in eight hours and to have the unit repaired in 24 hours. Without the maintenance contract, repairs will cost \$80 an hour plus parts.

The board will consider the maintenance contract at the special meeting of Nov. 26. They will also have to find the money in the budget to pay for it if they do decide to enter into the contract.

Order lifted

NOTICE was given by James W. Edwards, Environmental supervisor on November 20 that the boil water order pertaining to the water supply systems in Capitan, Nogal, and Ft. Stanton Hospital and Training School, which was issued by the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) of the New Mexico Health and Environment Department on October 17, 1985, has been terminated, except for Nogal, where the limit for turbidity is still being exceeded.

The turbidity of the filtered water supplied by the other two systems (Capitan and Ft. Stanton) is now below the established limit, and coliform bacteria were not present in any of the bacteriological samples collected during November by both the EID and the water supply systems. Therefore, it appears that the water supplied by these two systems is again safe to drink without boiling it first. Residents of these communities will be notified immediately if their drinking water again becomes unsafe.

Residents of Nogal should continue boiling drinking water until further notice.

County lacks continuity

Lincoln County Manager Suzanne Cox was the guest speaker for the Lincoln County Democrat Women's Club at a covered dish dinner held Nov. 19 in the courthouse. Mrs. Cox explained county government and the duties of elected officials. She began with the structure of county government and went on to things the county is now doing and future plans for the county. Counties were first established under the Spanish-Mexican Administration and were recognized by the United

States when they took over jurisdiction in 1846. Lincoln County was established on January 16, 1869. County boundaries have changed drastically since then. The form and organization of county government in New Mexico is established by the State Constitution and Statutory Law. Mrs. Cox told the audience, "County government is unique and in my opinion, one of the best structured types of governments for the protection of the taxpayer." She went on to say, "One of the reasons is that county government can never go into the

"red", therefore preventing a deficit that many of our cities and the federal government has." After telling of the various elected officials such as county commissioners, assessor, clerk, sheriff, probate judge, and treasurer, she explained some of the reasons the duties of the county keep growing each year, such as subdivisions, ambulance system, roads, and landfills. Lincoln County has 135 approved subdivisions which means the county is becoming more involved with land use planning. Two years ago the county formed an extraterritorial zone, with

Ruidoso which is a one mile radius around Ruidoso, and the purpose of this zone is to provide for a more orderly growth in the area. The county accepted the responsibility for the operation of the ambulance in 1973 when the county was faced with the possibility of not having any ambulance service. After starting with one ambulance and one EMT (emergency medical technician), the county now has seven ambulances and 85 EMT's. (Con't on P. 6)

Police Report

The Carrizozo Police Department investigated 29 complaint reports during the month of October. There are four cases active and 25 cases are closed.

The four active cases are: missing or stolen poly kart, truck went through yard, reimbursement and stolen pottery, flower pot and plant. The 25 closed cases include accident, slash tires, disturbance (3), nuisance pick-up truck on school grounds, subject was sick, gas skip, subject disorderly, bomb

threat-false alarm, subject was having a hard time breathing, argument, harassment, theft, turned over to J. P. O., felony arrest, livestock, son, dog, broken light, subject too loud, vagrant, assistance, hit stop sign - accident, family disturbance and van on golf course by lake.

One criminal complaint, seven traffic citations, and two parking violations were issued in October. Five speeding citations were issued, one parked wrong way, one right of way, one wrong direction, one display of current ref. sticker, and one disorderly conduct.

Police vehicles were driven 3,427 miles and used 347 gallons of gas. Total of calls for the month - 84, total of case assignments - 53, with 45 cases cleared, seven moving citations, 16 verbal warnings, and one arrest. There were six non-injury accidents, three parking violations, four quarts of oil used, and 193 public appearances. All commercial buildings were checked and most houses were checked. One door was found open.

Bernard Garland (Bernie) Laabs

Bernard G. Laabs, 64, of Minocqua died Wednesday, October 30, at the Howard Young Medical Center in Woodruff. Mr. Laabs was born December 10, 1900, in Wausau, son of the late Bernard F. and Emma Laabs. He married the former Edna Thalheim, who survives.

Surviving besides his wife are three sons: Bernard E. of Willow Brook, Ill.; Quinten W. of Freeburg, Ill. and David P. of Milwaukee; eight grandchildren; one great-granddaughter; and one sister, Valeria Wadzinski, of Wausau.

Mr. Laabs was a retired athletic coach, having served in that position in Minocqua, Mosinee and Carrizozo, New Mexico, where the present football facility, Laabs Field is dedicated in his name. Mr. Laabs also is the former coach of the Wausau Muskies Semi-Professional football team.

He was a member of the Masonic Lodge, Tripoli Shrine of Milwaukee and the Eau Claire Consistory. He also was a member of the United Methodist Church of Minocqua.

Funeral services were Friday, Nov. 1, at 11 a.m. at the Bolger Funeral Home in Minocqua. The Rev. Raymond Robinson officiated. Interment was at Pine Grove Cemetery in Wausau. Friends called Thursday, Oct. 31, at the funeral home, where a Masonic service was held at 8 p.m.

Bernie's record while at Carrizozo:

—Started coaching Grizzly varsity football in '59-'60 school

year and led his team to a 4-0 regular season record and to the Class 'C' championship game against Menaul of Albuquerque. Menaul won this one 33-7.

—Present football field hosted it's first game in season opener of '80-'81 campaign on September 3, 1960 against the Tularosa Wildcats . . . Bernie's

team lost season open to Tularosa 7-6 . . . then rolled over their next 10 opponents . . . including Estancia 57-0 for their second state championship.

—The '62-'63 season saw Carrizozo lose its first district game in three years to Melrose 21-14 and missed going to the championship game for the first

championship game.

—1963-'64 season saw Carrizozo losing only one game (the season opener to Hatch 25-14) and going undefeated the rest of the season, and culminating it with a 26-7 win over Roy in the state finals.

—Laabs closed out his Grizzly coaching career in the

team won 13-12. This team went on to win the first championship in Carrizozo history by trouncing Chama 24-0 in the championship game and finish the season with a perfect 10-0 mark.

—In '61-'62 campaign Laabs'

time in four years . . . this squad finished 5-3-1 on the season.

—Bernie's team returned to its winning ways in the '62-'63 season . . . losing only one game (13-7 to Espanola) and beating McCurdy Mission 40-6 in the state

'64-'65 campaign with a 7-2 record. Laabs Field was dedicated in his name during that year. Bernie finished his tenure at Carrizozo with 52 wins and 6 losses . . . five trips to the state finals . . . and four championships.

● **PEACE, sweet peace!** If we're lucky, nothing will happen at the Summit in Geneva this week. I wish the liberal media had not forced President Reagan into meeting with Gorbachev; for there is no way, I believe, that Reagan can return to America as a hero without having surrendered at least part of this country's ability to defend itself against Soviet intentions.

● **TO make sure that Reagan gives the store away,** governors of 12 states have called upon their citizens to leave their lights on for peace. Porch lights or candles are to be glowing all day and night, Nov. 19 and 20. This spectacular is the brainchild of Cong. Les AuCoin and Sen. Mark Hatfield, both of Oregon. Since California is not involved, I have decided that, rather than smoke up my quarters, I will demonstrate to all the world my desire for peace by retiring to Don's Bar and hoisting a "Jack Daniels for peace." Then I will return to my office and bang hell out of this typewriter for peace, have lunch for peace, go to the bathroom for peace, go home for peace, dine for peace, and go to bed for peace. If that doesn't drive Gorbachev to tears, I give up. In which case I fall back on T.B. Macaulay: "No combination of statesmen is a match for a general combination of fools."

● **BEEMAN Precision Arms, Inc.,** maker of air guns, is moving to Santa Rosa. Beeman also makes automatic pistols, match rifles and sniper weapons for police and the military. For peace, of course. Sonoma County's Peace Network, and its 1,978 local affiliate groups, are not expected to take Beeman lying down, peace or no peace.

● **THERE'S peace in Antarctica.** Walter Vennum, professor of geology, Sonoma State College, spoke and showed slides of his latest expedition to South Pole country at a recent meeting of the Rotary Club. The US has a permanent base there, a large complex installation where scientific research and experiments are performed. Peace went out the window when the professor revealed that this entire complex is heated by a nuclear power plant. He did not comment on anybody's glowing in the dark, having their genes screwed up or suffering radiation poison — oddities always cropping up among people in the vicinity of a nuclear power plant in the US. Dogsleds of peaceful picketers are en route.

● **DR. Petr Beckmann,** energy scientist at the University of Colorado, recently disturbed the peace: "Every time the anti-nuclear fanatics hold a meeting they receive more radiation from each other than they would living near a nuclear power plant." It took Dr. Edward Teller, who knows a thing or two about things nuclear, to put a cap on the bottle with this: "In sleeping with a woman, one gets just slightly less radioactivity than from a nuclear reactor; but to sleep with two women is very, very dangerous." Take that wisdom to your next peaceful, anti-nuke barbecue.

● **AMERICAN pockets were peacefully plundered last week** when Congress raised the debt limit by still another trillion dollars to cover such incidentals as a pay raise for Members of Congress, this time from \$75,100 per year to \$78,855. Congressmen, unable to balance the national budget, held that more spending is the solution. How else could they finance the following: \$80,000 for an exhibit on social significance of making shoes in Lynn, MA; a grant of \$13,968 to LSU to study taste and tactile responses of the facial taste system in the Japanese catfish; \$60,000 to find out why Southerners talk with a Southern accent; \$135,000 to see if chimpanzees can talk; and \$84,000 for a study of why people fall in love. Peace on all of them.

● **IT'S tough trying to do a little good in a world held together by bureaucratic absurdity.** In September, I reported that a 60-foot fishing boat will be pulling out of Sausalito into the Pacific Ocean to launch 42,000 beer bottles, called Current Riders, into the Japanese Current. These tightly corked bottles carry Christian literature, gospel tracts and religious literature to be picked off the beaches of remote countries and islands where few Christian missionaries ever go. This project has been the ministry of the Rev. Craig Rice of Lodi and Cloverdale. For 18 years Rev. Rice has been, in his words, "sharing God's word with those less fortunate, especially in Russia, to win them to Christ." His ministry is paying off. Hundreds of letters have been received from almost every country touched by the Japanese Current, letters expressing gratitude for the word of God they found inside these bottles on beaches of the world.

● **TO quote from the Sept. 26 OPINION column:** "Anything good, noble and spiritually uplifting is bound to have detractors. Radical environmentalists, who believe that nothing should happen, are grumbling that Rev. Rice's Current Rider program is polluting the pristine waters of the Pacific. He may be slapped with a cease-and-desist order at any time..."

● **IT happened Friday.** As Capt. Isaac Williams of the Lorraine W was taking on board 34,400 Current Rider bottles to be launched into the Japanese Current 100 miles offshore, he was confronted by The Bureaucracy, personified by Phil Oshida of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), San Francisco; and Lt. Michael Moore of the US Coast Guard at Alameda. They told the captain and representatives of the Current Evangelism Ministries they were forbidden to "dump" the bottles in the Pacific. Craig explained they would be launched 100 to 200 miles at sea, not within the three or 12 mile limits. "We have jurisdiction over all the ocean!" Lt. Moore shouted (and I'll bet none of you knew that before). Oshida was concerned that small children might break bottles on the beach and cut some feet! It never got through to him that the bottles would land on beaches thousands of miles away from the US, where EPA regulations don't apply. No matter, Capt. Williams, a Graton resident, was threatened with bureaucratic hellfire if he left the dock at Sausalito with the bottles aboard. After 18 years of outstanding ministry, the current Evangelism Ministries came to an end, thanks to the US government.

● **JUST about every refuse is legally dumped into the oceans,** from raw sewage to nuclear wastes to garbage. But it is illegal to launch bottles containing Christian literature. Rev. Rice explained to the Government Gentlemen that the United States Government has dumped 60,000 drift bottles into the same ocean to test its currents. When Rev. The rise of black conservatives

WASHINGTON — The State of Virginia has elected its first black Lieutenant Governor since Reconstruction. State Sen. Douglas Wilder of Richmond won 44 percent of the white vote — and, as he noted, retiring Gov. Chuck Robb only attracted 46 percent of the white vote.

Sen. Wilder did two significantly sensible things. He concentrated his campaigning on all areas of the state rather than in black churches and heavily black districts.

The majority of Virginia's registered voters were offered not a black who happens to be a candidate — but a candidate who happens to be black — an even more brilliant — if somewhat risky — decision was made by Senator Wilder. For his long-time friend and fraternity brother, the Rev. Jesse Jackson, offered to come to Virginia and campaign for him.

In nearby North Carolina during last fall's red hot Senate race, where the liberals were desperately trying to defeat the nation's other best known Jesse (Helms by name), Jesse Jackson came in and campaigned against Sen. Helms — to the absolute delight of Helms and his whole campaign organization. For Jesse Jackson is such an irresponsible racist hustler that he helped Helms win by a quarter of a million votes!

When Jesse Jackson offered to lend this same invaluable assistance to the Wilder campaign in Virginia, Clever Doug replied with signal brilliance:

"We rejected all offers from outside the state to come in. We wanted to have a Virginia race on Virginia values between two Virginians."

In other words: "Jesse baby, I watched your incredible performance in San Francisco, and you would be as welcome in most of Virginia as General Sheridan with an advanced case of AIDS. But I am grateful for your presidential campaign as every black candidate should be — because the voters can say without a doubt: He may be black, but he is sure better than Jesse Jackson!"

Lt. Gov-elect Wilder didn't say such a thing out loud, but it is a truth that the age of such race hustlers as Jesse Jackson is an idea whose time has come — and gone.

There is in this nation a growing crop of real black leaders — as distinct from so many of the demagogues and pigment-promoters who are black office holders simply because they have name recognition from the days they were marching in the streets and sitting in lunch counters.

And many of these people have been capitalizing on this ever since — suggesting that if you dare contend Jesse Jackson is irresponsible, you are opposed to civil rights. Civil rights is a noble idea, which such hustlers have utilized as a cloak to disguise civil wrongs. But to paraphrase Mr. Lincoln, you can fool some of the black people all of the time; and all of the black people some of the time; but you can't fool all the black people all of the time.

Among the blacks who are no longer fooled are real leaders. They are brilliant and unusually gutsy — which they have to be, because the hustlers who make big money on pigment protestation, like columnist Carl Rowan, react furiously. Carl Rowan described black economist Thomas Sowell of Stanford's Hoover Institute as a "Quisling," after Norway's Nazi puppet. Benjamin Hooks of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has called black political economist Glenn Lowry of Harvard "treasonous."

But such exhortations are losing their effectiveness because the public in general — including a growing number of blacks — recognize such maledictions by Carl Rowan and Benjamin Hooks as something on the order of the last anguished bleat of the old bull as the new bulls move in and take over the harem of cows.

That's an analogy which is only half good — because the new black leaders don't want to grab anybody else's harem — any more than they want that kiss-of-death called affirmative action which is a euphemism for racial quotas.

Time magazine has a two-page feature on these new and effective black leaders like Lowry, Sowell, Walter Williams

of Temple University, Martin Killson of Harvard, Robert Woodson of the National Center for Neighborhood Enterprise and William Wilson of the University of Chicago. And Time summarized their general position as follows:

"Affirmative action is a failure. It allows many blacks to gain jobs and admission to schools for which they are underqualified, while cheapening the achievements of those who could have succeeded without preferential treatment. Social programs pushed by the civil rights establishment often aggravate the problems they are supposed to solve. The crises of the ghetto — rampant crime, wanton violence, the high school dropout rate, illegitimate births — can no longer be attributed simply to white racism, nor can they be solved simply with more money from Washington. Blacks must take primary responsibility for the 'social pathologies' that all their communities.

"Such opinions are commonly voiced in the Reagan era. What is surprising is that the voices often belong to a growing number of influential black thinkers who are vigorously challenging the liberal notion of their intellectual forebears, the black sociologists who dominated the civil rights era."

'Son of Miranda'

WASHINGTON, VIRGINIA — When Attorney General Edwin Meese calls Miranda "infamous," he is savaged by commentators who have never bothered to read the decision itself. He is called a fool for attacking the decision, even though it was likewise attacked by four of the nine justices on the Supreme Court when it was announced in 1966.

In Miranda, the Supreme Court under Chief Justice Earl Warren declared that confessions could not be used in court unless the suspect had been "read his rights" before he confessed. Justice John Harlan denounced that rule as "dangerous experimentation... don't be fooled by it." Justice Tom Clark at-

tacked the decision for pulling the rug out from under law enforcement agencies by changing interrogation policies overnight.

Today the rationale behind Miranda has been discredited. Even those who supported it as a temporary measure to educate the public about their rights now acknowledge that time's up: Anybody who's ever seen "Hill Street Blues" knows what his rights are, and even John Hinchley was rational enough to clam up and ask for his lawyer after he was arrested for shooting the President. Repeat after me: "You have the right to remain silent etc., etc." Third-graders know their rights by heart, so is it really necessary to remind street-smart criminals to

shut up? The most important effect of Miranda is that it has added uncertainty to the criminal justice system. In the old days, a freely-given confession virtually ended the proceedings; the criminal had no choice but to plead guilty. Because of Miranda, he can still bargain, reminding prosecutors that maybe, just maybe, he'll get lucky like the rapist Ernesto Miranda and his confession will be thrown out. In California, the ratio of convictions on original-charge to plea bargains fell by 50 percent in one year after the Miranda ruling.

After all these years, why does Miranda survive? Because judges are reluctant to admit their own mistakes or even the mistakes of other judges. They believe that to overturn previous error is to undermine the authority of all judges, present and future.

Thus, when the Court finally weakened Miranda in 1984 by making an absurd exception (though any exception is better than none), Justice O'Connor dissented. "Were the Court writing from a clean slate, I could agree (with the majority)," she wrote. "But Miranda is now the law and... the Court has not provided sufficient justification for departing from it or for blurring its now clear strictures."

shall, and Stevens made the point even clearer: "In a chimerical quest for public safety, the majority has abandoned the rule that brought 18 years of doctrinal tranquility to the field of custodial interrogations." In other words, it is better to reaffirm wrong decisions than to upset the status quo.

And there are other considerations having to do with the way power is distributed in Washington. As long ago as 1877, Newsweek reported: "There is no doubt that five votes would be available to overturn Miranda, suggests someone in a position to know, 'but the Court feels that this would not be wise...' (If Miranda were overturned,) civil libertarians and the press would surely attack the Court for turning its back on individual rights." So much for the independence of the judiciary!

In defense of the original decision by the Warren Court, some commentators claim that Miranda was a case of individual rights conflicting with the rights of society, and that individual rights prevailed. But it is the Miranda decision itself that has the effect of violating individual rights.

Remember when it was open season on civil rights workers in parts of the South, when bigots could commit murder and no jury would convict them? In what

SANTA FE—Listen to the words they speak, and you can't avoid the impression that those who influence events in New Mexico don't know what to do about conditions in our schools.

Here's Senator William Valentine, a power in the body in which he serves, making a prediction for a gathering of teachers that we will see "a pretty extensive educational reform bill introduced in this next legislative session."

And here's Alan Morgan, state superintendent of public education, on the same topic and to the same audience: "We will not see a massive educational reform bill in 1986."

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When two such people, looking at the same evidence and talking on the same topic, reach opposite conclusions, is there any wonder the rest of us are confused?

HEDGING: Maybe the key to their differences of opinion lies in a single word. The Senator spoke of such a bill being "introduced." Perhaps Morgan was limiting his prediction to whether such a bill will be passed. If their approaches are that different, of course, both could be right.

Valentine took no chances of

being wrong when he told these educators the kind of measure he was thinking of "is not going to be 100 percent to my liking or 100 percent to your liking." Considering the divergence of his views from those held by most teachers, that opinion is totally safe.

For instance, he got a rudely loud negative response from this same audience to his statement that "when you annualize teacher salaries in New Mexico, you find that teachers are not underpaid compared with people with similar amounts of education."

Morgan was more warmly received when he warned that we don't need to "adopt laws that tell you how many times a day the public-address system may interrupt the classroom teacher." He got cheers and applause when he said, "In fact, I hope we do not see a House Bill 72—Texas style."

UPBEAT: Governor Anaya chooses at the amount to strike an optimistic note. "Public support for educational funding is there," he says, without going into any details to show how he reached that conclusion.

On more than one occasion, the Governor has made frank references to the fact that financial problems are likely to pressure some legislators who would like to improve the schools to abandon that position now. He also suggests that lower than expected revenues will be used by other more meanspirited lawmakers as an excuse to avoid action on the topic altogether. But he adds, "I would hope it would be tougher for a legislator to vote against good schools than to vote for a tax increase."

Those last two words are the

key to the dilemma. The Governor enunciates them clearly ("tax increase"), while legislators blanch at the thought. Maybe Alan Morgan, when he predicts no passage of major reform measures, has that fact in mind; there is no way to fund reform except by increasing revenues, and lawmakers may be unwilling to do that.

At any rate, Morgan doesn't appear to be so hopeful about the willingness of New Mexicans to take on that burden as the Governor is.

case, the issue was not the individual rights of the racists, but the rights of the civil rights workers. The same principle holds true today. When robbery and rape and murder can be committed with impunity, the government has failed in its primary function — to protect people from violence.

Justice Byron White wrote this about the Miranda decision: "In some unknown number of cases the Court's rule will return a killer, a rapist, or other criminal to the streets and to the

environment that produced him, to repeat his crime whenever it pleases him. As a consequence, there will be not a gain, but a loss of human dignity. The real concern is . . . the impact (of this decision) on those who rely on the public authority for protection and who without it can only engage in violent self-help with guns, knives, and the help of their neighbors similarly inclined."

And that's how Ernesto Miranda and Earl Warren begat Bernard Goetz.

amount is set by the NM legislature. The county also has a special assessment of ten cents per front foot in subdivisions because it is more expensive to maintain subdivision roads.

All the roads are being listed on the computer which will make it possible for the road superintendent to see where the money is being spent and to develop priorities for maintenance for the county roads.

The county has also made progress in providing landfills for the public. Recently dumpsters were placed in various parts of the county. The dumpsters are being picked up on a schedule and hauled to the landfill at Ft. Stanton.

Lincoln County has grown; the tax evaluation in 1967 was almost 22 million, in 1975 it was almost 60 million, in 1983 it was 112 million, and in 1984 it was almost 125 million. The un-certified evaluation for 1985 is 140 million.

There were 13 subdivisions in 1960 and 85 subdivisions in 1977, compared to the 135 approved subdivisions now with several more in the process to be approved. This number does not include the subdivisions that are within a city limits.

Mrs. Cox ended her speech with a personal opinion about something that she feels would help improve county government. She said, "The thing lacking is continuity. Our elected officials are allowed to serve two-year terms and then cannot run again for another two years. We are one of the three states left that has this limit on the number of terms an official can seek."

"If an elected official is doing a good job, he should be allowed to run as long as he can be elected. We would attract better qualified candidates because they would look at running for office not as a dead end street of four years but it would be possible to serve much longer." Mrs. Cox said that she spoke about this because she had served as an elected official. Before a change of this sort can come about, the voters will be asked to decide.

"NEW MEXICO'S HERITAGE" "Hidden Canyon"

For so small a canyon it is remarkably isolated, especially since Rio Rancho lies only several miles away. Hidden Canyon is a short, nasty gash in the black basalt mesa west of Albuquerque. An eerily quiet place, it is both mysterious and unpredictable.

When the canyon's mood is right it radiates that kind of primitive power which can draw children outside to sit and shiver in the chaos of a summer's lightning storm. Today I have brought my friend Julia with me. She's twelve and I am her tutor. She doesn't need one, but is tolerant and enjoys field trips to ancient places, so it has been a pleasant association.

I never really understood my fascination with Hidden Canyon until I brought Julia with me. As we stood looking down into the canyon, she became instantly alert and cautious. The canyon's steep walls are a treacherous jumble of boulders, sagebrush, and loose sand. Rattlesnakes live in a hundred crevices.

The canyon's east wall is covered with ancient petroglyphs, or rock engravings. Most of them were carved between A.D. 1300 and 1800, but the canyon has drawn humans to it for thousands of years. A decade ago I found a giant bison's tooth on its rugged floor. Nearby lay the broken base of a Folsom lancehead, nearly 10,000 years old.

Both could have been washed into Hidden Canyon from anywhere atop the mesa, which slopes upward toward the volcanic cones a mile or so distant. But Paleo-Indian peoples could also have ambushed the herds of giant bison then living on the West Mesa's lush grasses. Driven to the edge of Hidden Canyon, shaggy, two-ton beasts would have fallen into the bone-shattering abyss of sand and black boulders below the mesa's rim.

Gradually the climate became drier and hotter, so the giant bison disappeared. By 5000 B.C. the Paleo-Indian hunters

had gone and "Archaic" peoples, who relied more heavily on vegetal foods and small game, wandered the area. Between 3000 and 5000 B. C. most of the local lanceheads were made from modules of fine-grained black basalt found right on the mesa's edge.

Julia and I have maneuvered partway down into the canyon where it is blistering hot. I look under every bush for coiled prairie rattlers, and test the stability of each boulder before turning to pull her to the next rocky perch where she can photograph the ancient carvings.

The most spectacular petroglyphs lie across the canyon, halfway up the cliff face. As we make our way toward them, a young coyote, bush-tailed and burnt orange in color, glides away, pauses to watch us, then disappears over the mesa's black volcanic rim. Lush patches of dense, green bushes line a moist seep in the canyon floor.

Coyote tracks are everywhere. Finally we reach a huge engraved shield. As I hold Julia steady on a narrow, angular boulder she meticulously photographs the carvings from several angles. Julia wants several shots good enough to publish in my next book and is willing to work for just the right one.

The photographs taken, she hands her camera, then edges down from her perch—still cautious; still alert. Our job done we move slowly, boulder-to-boulder, feeling out each step as we cross the canyon once again.

I am fascinated by all of this. Julia is young, strong, and fearless. She jumps horses over fences—it is her special passion. The very thought scares me witless. Yet she treats this canyon with mature respect. So gradually I came to un-

derstand Hidden-Canyon and to recognize my own obsession with it. This is a powerful, unforgiving place, capable of grinding up stronger and wiser folks than either of us are likely ever to meet.

Once out of the canyon we look back. Only the east wall is carved. The west face is untouched—an eerie contrast. Julia wants to know why. I have no answer.

Two days later the Albuquerque Tribune carries an unpleasant story of a man's body found among Hidden Canyon's dark boulders. For 100 centuries this place has drawn the young, the strong, the brave to it—and taught them about mortality.

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BASIC RULES OF SAFE GUN HANDLING BEING VIOLATED

While patrolling the first deer season for rifle hunters this past weekend, I noticed many things about the people out in the field. The one thing though that stuck in my mind the most was the number of people that were violating the basic rules of safe gun handling.

I stopped one vehicle to check hunting licenses, walked over by the driver's door, looked

in, and found a loaded firearm laying across the driver's lap pointed right at my navel. This is not a particularly pleasing sight. As a matter of fact it absolutely scared me. The driver and passenger were struggling to get their licenses out of their back pockets and jostling the loaded firearm. Needless to say I quickly stepped out of the line of fire.

I approached a second vehicle, a pickup with two hunters in the front and four hunters in the bed of the pickup. The driver and front passenger had two loaded firearms leaning upright between them. The four youngsters riding in the back of the pickup also had loaded firearms. In order to get to their licenses, the youngsters laid their firearms down in the bed of the

pickup with the muzzles pointed toward the cab.

Another time, a vehicle approached me as I was checking licenses along the roadway. There was a man standing in the bed of the pickup and resting a loaded rifle on the top of the cab. Once again, I found myself staring into the business end of a loaded firearm. As a matter of fact, I would hesitate to even estimate the number of hunters I checked who had a loaded firearm in their vehicle. Having a loaded firearm in a vehicle is not a violation of state law. However, it is a very unsafe practice, not only for the sake of the conservation officer checking the vehicle, but also for the hunter and his companions. A loaded firearm in a vehicle is an accident just waiting to happen.

were not the only safety violations I noticed. As I walked into one camp, I looked around and saw six firearms leaning against the truck bumpers, rocks and trees. If one of the firearms in this insecure position happened to fall over there is a good possibility for an accidental discharge. Even if the firearm isn't loaded, just think of the damage that could occur to an expensive rifle or scope if this happened.

I would like to suggest that all hunters unload their firearms and place them in a secure area either when in a vehicle or hunting camp. With the number of violations I saw this weekend, I'm amazed that there were only

two accidents. For your safety remember and follow the rules of and that of other people's safe gun handling.

An incident occurred in the Sacramento Mountains this weekend which brings this point across. Two companions were talking to a hunter sitting in his vehicle. They saw his rifle laying on the seat on the passenger side. It is a .30-06 caliber Colt-Sauer, an unusual firearm. The hunter in the vehicle decided to show them the rifle. He reached over, grasped the firearm by the muzzle, and pulled it toward him. The trigger caught on the seat and the rifle discharged. The bullet went through both legs of the hunter driving the vehicle, struck the door, fragmented and injured both the hunters standing outside the vehicle. Although the bullet did shatter a bone in the man's thigh, none of the injuries proved to be fatal.

Another accident occurred in the Guadalupe Mountains this weekend. In this incident, a woman had just bagged a deer. She got back into the vehicle before she remembered to unload the firearm. While she was unloading the firearm inside the vehicle, it discharged striking her in the foot. Once again this injury was not fatal, but it was extremely painful.

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
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

It has put our associations closer to the district board and management in Spokane. We're stronger and better than before."

"I've been a PCA member and Oregon rancher for 20 years. The districtwide PCA concept was strongly supported by Spokane District PCA members, who voted for consolidation last August because the PCA capital needed to be pooled to assure continued viability. It's been good for our borrowers. Our new structure provides borrowers with more direct access to the banks and district board through regular meetings with the associations' boards. Joint PCA/FLBA management will reduce costs and increase efficiency. It makes good sense to pool our resources and consolidate into an efficient structure for these troubled times in agriculture."

The day after Thanksgiving at the historic inns of Williamsburg, Virginia, old fashioned turkey soup is featured. Making turkey soup is as American today as it was in colonial times — an economical way to extend the goodness of the holiday bird.

CREAMY TURKEY SOUP

- 2 tablespoons corn oil
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 2 1/2 cups turkey broth
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced carrots
- 1/4 cup thinly sliced celery
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 cups cubed cooked turkey
- 1/4 cup Kingsford's corn starch
- 3 cups milk
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley

In 4-quart saucepan, melt margarine over medium heat. Add onion. Stirring frequently, cook 2 minutes or until tender. Stir in broth, carrots, celery, salt and pepper. Bring to boil. Reduce heat and simmer 5 minutes or until vegetables are tender-crisp. Add turkey. In medium bowl, stir together corn starch and milk until smooth. Add to turkey mixture. Stirring constantly, bring to boil over medium heat and boil 1 minute. Stir in parsley. Makes 7 cups.
