## ‘Buckle up’ . . . now !!

The 'Safety Bell Use Act' will into effect January 1, 1986.

Each front seat occupant of passenger car manufacture with safety belts shall have a
safety belt properly fastened about his body at all times when he vehicle is in motion, unless all seating positions with safety beits are occupied.
"Safer New Mexico Now" eleased the figures for deaths in vehicles from January through deaths while persons were usin seat belts and 154 deaths wher persons were not using seat belts.
People who cannot wear a safety belt for medical reasons
should see their licensed physician and be issued a medical exemption.

Volation of the safety belt use act shall be a fine of not les

The child passenger restrain law went into effect July 1, 1985 All children under eleven years of age must be properly restrained in a child passenger restraint device (car seat) or by safety belt unless all seating belts are occupied.

## Inside the Outdoors

whether or not it is legal to keep awks as pets or to possess their eathers. The answer to thesp In New Moxt
In New Maxico, a state law take, possess, trap or ensnare, or in any manner to injure, maim or destroy hawks, owls and vultures. It is also illegal to urchase, sell or trade, or to. orsess for the purpose of selling birds of prey. Federal laws
protect golden a Similar questions come up in regard to songbirds, and the answers are similar. State law mares it ilegal to choot, or trap fongbirds or birds of killing cipal food consists of insects, The families of birds covered by this law include bluebirds, bobolinks, catbirds, chickadees, cuckoos (including the roadrunner) fickers, flycatchers, grosbeaks, hummingbirds, kinglets, mar tins, meadowlarks, nighthawks,
nuthatches, orioles, robins

shrikes, swallows, swifts canagers, thrushes, vireos warblers, waxwings, wood peckersing wrens, and all othe

In addition to these laws, all migratory birds are protect by Federal laws and treaties. In our state, the Departmen Game and Fish makes some and yultures are hawks, owk rector of the Gare concerned. Th may issue special permits may issue ,special permits to trap or destroy any hawk, owl o vulture for the following pur poses: Indian religious purposes, scientific purposes, or falconry purposeses, Permits to possess, give, purchase, sell or trade, any also be tissued for these reason Also, any person engaged in e commercial raising of poultry or game birds may take, capture, or kill any hawk, owl or vulture that has killed poultry or commercially reared game
birds. Anyone who takes such action must report the action to the Department of Game and Fish, which will verify the need for it. of prey anden questions about birds of prey and songbirds come up because someone finds a dead or
injured hawk on a highway or injured hawk on a highway or
because the nelghbor's ktd has been shooting robins with a BB gun. If you should find an injured hawk, leave it whiere it is, note the exact location, and then report it to a game warden. In the case of dead hawks, lea
them where you find them. If you have a problem with neighbortiood children shooting songbirds report it to the nearest Game Department office or warden. A cilation or a stern - warning from an officer should
go a long way to curb such go a lone
mischief.

Several of us at the coffee shop were saddened recently with the death of New Mexico pioneer Bin Gallacher. At :8, he was the oldest living graduate of
New Mexica State University and the last living member from the class of 1908.

Few people have ever witnessed the change-in this state he live in white the days when he lived in White Oaks before the ainn of the century and before the landing of the space shutrie Columbia some 60 miles from his ranch. He was also just 35 miles away from the first atomic momb blast at Trinity Stite, July
16, 1945. And on February 16, 1945, And on February 29,
1008, while he was at college, ust 1908, while he was at college, just four milles away from the campus the era of early New Mexico.
of course he was also one of the very few of us that could recently loox up in the sky and say, "Halley's Comet, what do As we were talking about Biil, I recalled for those in the coffee shop the time that'I drove out to his' ranch to ask him about New Mexico becoming a state. Statehood begañ January 6, 1912. Eight years ago I was writing a story about the first statehood wonder what it was like the day we became a state. Since Bill was fouryears out of college by then I thought he would be a perfect person to interview.

1 intended to write a story about people firing guns in the air, firecrackers going off, dogs
barking, people toasting statehogd at people local bast, and speeches being made by politicians about "Our date with destiny and our place in the sun., ${ }^{\text {th }}$ New Mexico speít 60 years rying to become a state with one chances. There were close to fifty different Congressional acts introduced calling for our statehood between 1049 and 1910. But each time something hap Like
Like one time one of our Territiorial delegates to walked onto the flocr of the House just after another congressman had given a speech. Elkins didn' know what the other had jus spoken about but people were shaking his hand so to be in the
spirit of good will, Elkins walked up to him and shook his hand warmly. The rest of the congressmen took that to mean Elkins agreed_with the speech, which wasn't necessarily true The speech given by a Nor therner in 1885, condemned the
South for starting the Civil War

McDonald-New Mexico's first goyernor and awner of the famous Bar On the drive out Gallieherer's ranch I visualized this scene of joyous celebration. Bill greeted me warmly and we sat over coffee at the kitchen table. He was the kind of person
to always look right at you when he spolke. You knew right awh what he thought about you. He was also very direct with his thoueghts which was why I valued We started highly.

We started off discussing the happenings of the day, Bill was like , that, more interested in
today than yesterday, when I finally got a chance to ask about statehood .and my perceptions about the celebrations on January $\dot{y}$, 1912, In fact I told him that I felt sure that there must. have been real big celebrations in
Lincoln County since the first elected govemornor of. New Mexico was his neighbor from the Bar W, McDonald.

He thought for a moment and then leaned closer as a school master, would a student who was slow learner, "Celebrations?" years. "The truth" is we never ears. The trulh is we never first 25 years or so, Most of us were too busy just trying'to stay alive, to feed ourselves and to carve ont a place that would secome our home to notice.
