Toney Anaya signed Toney Anaya signed a Proclamation that required each adopt, implement and maintain effective Jan. 1, 1986, a written smoking policy in compliance with the clean indoor act. The Act provides that no
moking areas be designated for public meetings (any meetin required by law to be an open meeting ). A public meeting place may be declared entirely non smoking or at least half of the public meeting area mu

LOSING THEIR NOSES Coke, trot, flake, snow, leaf,
C,"blow, freeze, happy dust, nose candy - slang terms for cocaine. derived from the leaves of the coca plant, cultivated in the Andes Mountains in South Amerlica.
Sunday evening those who attended a drug and alcohol Church learned the health hazards suffered by cocalne users. The program was presented by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department. Cocaine is sold in powder
form. For use it is usually put on form. For use it is usually put on a smooth surface, such as a
mirror and cut with a ravor blade, .- fluffing up the powder as well as providing a means of dividing out amoumts. "Lines" of cocaine are measured out and each line is then sniffed
tnto a nostril with the aid of a tnto a nostril with the aid of a
makeshift straw, usually a bill tightly rolled up. This process of "snorting" is the most widespread method of consuming cocaine even though it is sometimes injected directly into the system.

The addicted user will experience a crash of headaches, sleeping patterns or disturbed are anxiety. Other effects irritability, paranoia, seizures and in some cases convulsions and death. Consistent use of cocaine terribly drains financtal resources and leads into alter-
nate, often illegal, means of obtaining money.
Frequent users of cocaine also risk literally losing their
nose. Cocaine constricts blood vessels which dries up with repeated exposure. This eventually exposes the cartilage and the nasal septum begins to dissolve. If caught in time, If not, the user risks the collapse. of the nose.

MAGIC BROWNIES
The slide presentation was not only about 'nose candy' hazards but also health hazards related to users and abusers of
alcohol, marijuana (wacky

tabaccy), amphetamines and many other substances.
Barbara Langley inistrative secretary at adLincoln County Sheriff's Office narrated the slide presentation. She told how chemical use damages velns, lungs, heart, nose, skin, pancreas

dangers.
Big business
The man who insisted Americans face up to the devastating effects of cigarettes has issued a simizar plea with re-
gard to drug abuse. "Addiction is America's number-one health problem," former Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, Joseph Califano, told the first national conference of Americans for Substance Abuse this past year. his "The numb in servitude to drugs and alcohol is frightening," he said, giving the following numbers: +Fifty million. Americans (15 million of whom are under age 15) are hooked on cigarettes
+Thirteen million are ad-
dicted to or abuse alcohol. +Half a million are addicted to heroin.

+ At +At least one million abuse hypriotic drugs.
+FIfty-three million have tried marijuana.
+Twenty-ive million have tried cocaine.
"Addiction may also be America's biggest business,'
Califano said. In 1884 , alcohol and cigarette sales slone topped $\$ 75$ blllion."

more than $\$ 125$ bililion. The muman costs can't be calculated...there's no price tag on sorrow and family tragedy or on life itself," he said.
Califano noted that the gap between what we can do and
