accidents caused by careless excavation. careless "We're

aus patural gas acirly all the New Mexico in recent years have been the result of people hitting underground gas lines while digging. Commigsion estimates that there may oe as many as 1,000 incavators hitting gas lines," the company official said. "We've been just plain fortunate so far hat so few have resulted in serious accidents."

Vallejos added, however, that leaks may occur far in the minor damage to gas lines. He explained that damage to pipe wrapping or coating can concentrate corrosive energy in a ingle spot and, in efrect, drill a hole right through the pipe. apparently minor dent can cause stresses that will crack a pipe in time.
