Big money at stake

Commissioners debate who will locate airport road

A late addition to the agenda caused Lincoln County Commissioners to have a lengthy discussion with members of the audience at the June 17 meeting. The discussion centered around which government entity should be the lead authority in the study to decide where the road should be built from Highway 37 to the as yet un-built Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

The addition to the agenda was made June 16 for state district highway engineer Louis J. Medrano to present a road planning schedule for this district. He said that \$33.8 million has been allocated to be spent in the next five years in this district of 8½ counties.

Medrano and Bill Lee, state highway commission chairman, District 2, had met with the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) on Friday and discussed which government entity should be the lead agency. Medrano said that Lincoln County Commissioner Kenneth Nosker asked him to speak to the Lincoln County Commission at the June 17 meeting.

Medrano said the state highway department has allocated \$600,000 seed money for a preliminary engineering location study and for purchase of right-of-way. He said the county needs a joint powers agreement with SBAC designating which entity will work with the highway department on the study.

Medrano suggested that since SBAC is a government agency that it "take the lead and spearhead" the study.

Lincoln County Commission Chairman Bill Elliott said that his input from the public was that the county should "take the lead in this." It was further suggested that public hearing be held for more public input on the location of the road.

Harvey Foster, a member of the audience, said, "The funds allocated are for location of the road. What about the 1976 study?"

Medrano said the \$600,000 preliminary engineering money is for the start of developing a set of plans. The state has not determined where the road will be, and as soon as the county and SBAC designate a lead authority, the

lead authority will decide where the road will be located.

State Representative Ben Hall was in the audience, and he said, "I want public hearings before right-of-way is bought, etc. We don't need to spend money first and look later. The property owners should have more say." He also said it was his understanding that SBAC had said to go with the 1976 master plan.

Nosker spoke about the master plan and said it had been advertised and updated.

Rosemary Peebles, representing some of the property owners in the area of the new airport, said that she didn't know about the master plan until last December and, "I don't think that many people knew about it or today's meeting." She said that she only learned about the plan to bring it up at the meeting late the night before.

Another member of the audience, John Hall said, "Please hold hearings on where the road will go. Look at all alternatives." Later he said, "I think Sierra Blanca Airport Commission is a representative of the county and should be the one."

When asked why the

change from having the state decide the course of the road to letting the county or SBAC make the decision, Medrano answered, that Larry Larranaga, chief highway administrator, was in agreement with him to leave the location up to the county or SBAC.

Nosker said that an engineer would be needed to help with the study and that SBAC has an engineer on board.

John Hall responded, "I agree with you, Mr. Nosker. I think your engineer should be the one to do it."

Nosker mentioned the five right angle turns on the present road, and they didn't need to get a plane landed safely and then kill the people on the road.

Elliott said, "The recommendation I get is that the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission should build the air-

port and the county should build the road."

Ben Hall asked Medrano how much traffic would be needed on the road before the state would take it over and make it a state highway. Medrano said 700 to 1,000 cars per day.

When the Lincoln County News asked Medrano how many million of dollars in tax money would be used for maintenance of the road before the state would take it over, he answered, "Hopefully, not many."

Medrano also said a public hearing would not be needed if the lead authority should approve an existing roadway.

Commissioner A. W. Gnatkowski made the motion that Lincoln County be the lead agency on the road and accepting the money from the state. The county will select an engineer to lay out plans.

Lee defends \$600,000 grant

Highway commissioner Bill Lee defended a \$600,000 feasibility study grant for an access road to the proposed Sierra Blanca Regional Airport on Ft. Stanton Mesa.

Speaking at a special meeting of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission last week, Lee said the money was granted by the state to show support for the airport project.

"We wanted to make a commitment to the project and the commission. I don't know whether \$600,000 is too much money or not enough to complete design and engineering work," Lee said.

The grant monies had been questioned by Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd Davis Jr. at a recent village council meeting. Davis said he thought the amount of the grant was excessive.

Lee said that if there was money left over after the study was completed, the excess could be transferred for use in other phases of the road construction project.

Lou Medrano, the state's highway engineer for Southeast New Mexico, said that the commission or the county should be the lead agency in preparing the con-

ceptual design, including a good estimate of what the road's final cost will be.

"The reason we'd like to see local officials take the lead is because it would take longer to complete the plans if our design forces get involved," Medrano said, suggesting that a consulting engineer be hired to work on the plans.

Medrano said he'd like to see the study and design work completed in time to make a proposal to the state legislature in January.

Lee noted that road construction in mountainous areas is more expensive than

in flatter locales. "If \$600,000 is not enough to complete the study then we could ask the state legislature to go the severance tax bonding route."

Medrano noted the funds for the feasibility study were the result of a hard fought battle. "The \$600,000 wasn't as easy to come by as some people might have thought."

Lee said that during his tenure on the state highway commission he has not supported new road construction. He said he changed his stance because he believes the new

Dear foreigners:

WASHINGTON—State Department spokesman Bernard Kalb has recognized "without equivocation" that New Mexico really is one of the United States of America.

During a daily news briefing last week (which is radio broadcast throughout Washington and to the United Nations, and telecast nationally by C-Span), Kalb was asked by the Lincoln County News about the State Department's identification of New Mexico as a foreign country.

Mary Ann Hatchitt, press secretary of Senate Budget Committee Chairman Pete Domenici, R-NM, told the Lincoln County News: "I telephoned the State Department to inquire about New Mexico citizens in the Soviet Union at the time of Chernobyl. I was transferred to the Soviet Affairs Desk, which transferred me to the Foreign Desk, who told me, 'We can only keep track of United States citizens.' In other words, not New Mexicans. So I asked her, 'Do you know what is between Texas and Arizona, and south of Colorado?' And she became snip-

py and hung up."

Sen. Domenici's press secretary's experience with the State Department came at the same time that the US Treasury Department wrote former New Mexico Governor David Cargo in Albuquerque to inform him:

"Since your address is in New Mexico, we would be compelled to withhold 30 percent tax from interest payments (on his US Treasury notes). However, it appears that you may be a citizen of the United States residing in New Mexico. . . . However, if you are not a citizen of the United States but

a citizen of New Mexico, please execute both of the enclosed forms W-8. . . ."

Cargo, who is a candidate

for Congress from New Mexico, wrote back to inform the US Treasury Department: "New Mexico in fact, is within the United States and has been since 1912. As a matter of fact, it is located equidistant between Texas and Arizona. Colorado borders it on the north. I would appreciate it if you would not withhold from my treasury notes, because I am not a citizen of a foreign country."

On the floor of the US Senate, Sen. Domenici announced on June 12 that Friday, June 13, would be observed as "New Mexico Is A State Day."

He lamented what he termed "an identity crisis" because "in Washington area drug stores and groceries, they refuse to accept New Mexico driver's licenses because, they say, it is our policy to only cash checks from American citizens."

Domenici went on to announce to a surprised Senate: "You do not have to have a visa to visit New Mexico; nor do

you have to have shots. The water is safe to drink and we use dollars, not pesos. New Mexico is the fifth largest of the United States and is the home, among other things, of the International Hot Air Balloon Festival, as well as of the first atom bomb."

Former Governor Cargo noted that he had received written and telephoned apologies from the US Treasury Department, along with a payment of interest. He expressed gratitude at New Mexico's "being admitted to the Union," and added: "We're thinking of taking

up a collection to bring Mr. W. A. Weatherall (of the treasury department) out here to the Honeymoon Capital of the West, which is Santa Fe. The only problem is that not many people have wanted to contribute so far."

At the State Department, spokesman Kalb is the former diplomatic correspondent for CBS and NBC, who was often a relentless questioner. But when we asked Kalb if Secretary of State George Shultz believes that State Department employees should be acquainted with domestic geography, Kalb grimaced.

Carrizozo gets police officer; eyes special bond election

Chris Gomez has been hired as a temporary relief police officer for Carrizozo. The action to hire Gomez was taken after an executive session during the June 10 Carrizozo Town Council meeting.

Gomez, of Tularosa, will work 32 to 40 hours per week and earn \$5 per hour. As a temporary employee, he will be eligible for insurance but will

not accrue vacation time or sick leave.

Gomez is not certified but "is certifiable" and should receive his certification soon. He graduated from Western New Mexico University in Silver City with a 3.6 GPA and received 79.3 overall on the police officer proficiency exam. He has a current first aid card and a NRA firearms certificate, which are additional requirements for police certification in New Mexico.

Carrizozo police officer Adam Montez left May 17 for the law enforcement academy where he is receiving additional police training. His eight weeks training is provided by the state at no cost to the town, other than his salary.

In other business brought before the council, Kevin Powers of Epper, Guerin and Turner discussed general obligation bonds with the board. Carrizozo has no outstanding debt, the water and sewer debt capacity is unlimited, and the debt capacity of general purposes is 4 percent of the 1985 assessed valuation (\$2,027,270) for a total of \$81,090.

Powers provided information for the board in the event a special general obligation bond election is put to the voters. No municipal election may be held within 42 days

prior to or within 30 days after any statewide special, general or primary election or any regular school district election.

Carrizozo is now collecting \$2.25 per \$1000 of assessed valuation. It is a sanctioned levy and can be levied without an election. A tax levy of more than \$2.25 must be approved by voters. General obligation bonds may be used for general purposes such as streets, parks and building municipal buildings, and are limited to 4 percent of the assessed valuation, which is \$81,090.

The board discussed enforcing the curfew and adopting a new curfew ordinance. The first public hearing for input from the public will be held during the regular June 24 council meeting.

The airport improvement project bid was awarded to Bill McCarty Construction of Ruidoso. The final bid with a revised contract was for \$68,945. The engineer's estimate for the project was \$82,810.

The week of June 22-29 was proclaimed "Alumni Week."

The board approved submitting a bid to United New Mexico Bank for a repossessed pickup. The transaction must be approved by the department of finance and administration before the purchase can be made.

Ruidoso schools can weather budget cuts

Money will be tight for the Ruidoso School District in 1986-87, but an official from the state office of education said the district had fared better than several others because Ruidoso was able to avoid personnel cuts.

"What helped Ruidoso was its cash balance from last year. Without that reserve they probably would have had to cut some personnel," said Rebecca Delgado, deputy director of the Department of Finance and Administration's Office of Education, at a budget hearing Wednesday morning.

She added that Ruidoso will still have to watch its expenditures very closely if the state legislature approves the 2 percent across the board cut in funds next week.

State Rep. Ben Hall told school board members that he did not expect any cut larger than 2 percent. "There hasn't been any mention of a larger reduction at any of the four meetings I've attended recently."

Ruidoso Superintendent Sid Miller said that if additional cuts were needed they would probably have to come from personnel.

The district's budget totaling \$5,875,863 was approved by the school last month, and Wednesday's budget hearing was the last required before the budget is submitted to the state for final approval.

The 1986-87 budget reflects a \$547,365 increase over last year's \$5,328,498 budget.

Associate Superintendent Mike Gladden said several areas had been cut, including allotments for contract maintenance services and maintenance supplies.

The state's new funding formula calls for \$1,631.50 per student unit versus the \$1,608 per student allocation last year. The new formula raises the district's allotment to about \$4.7 million from \$4.4 million in the 1985-86 budget.

Other large budget cuts were made in allotments for utilities. Natural gas expenses were cut \$19,892 from the original \$125,000 proposal. Electricity expenses were also pared down \$19,893 from the \$130,107 first budgeted.

Miller said he had received assurances from Texas-New Mexico Power Co. that electrical rates would not rise this year.

Miller noted that \$71,131 had been spent to heat school buildings this past school year and that relatively low figure had been made possible by a mild winter.

Delgado said the \$50,000 reduction in the maintenance allotment was a point of concern for the state.

State School Board Member Grady Mayfield of Las Cruces echoed that concern. "Many of the districts are cutting their maintenance allotments in order to save money, but I think this could end up costing the state more later when they have to make major repairs because hinges weren't oiled in order to save a little now."

Miller said that part of that cut could be made up by funds from Senate Bill 9, which provides for the use of severance tax monies for school maintenance.

Delgado also said she was not comfortable with the amounts budgeted for utilities and would push for approval of the districts application for \$50,000 in Supplemental Emergency Funds.

She noted that 83 percent of funding for Ruidoso comes from enrollment and that the district had projected an increase of five students next year.

Delgado said if the district does not realize that increase it would lose almost \$2,700 for each student that does not show up.

Delgado also lauded the board on its commitment to teacher salaries. The average Ruidoso teacher will make about \$27,323 next year, while the statewide average will be about \$24,479.

Toby Salas of the state department of education said that as far as his department is concerned Ruidoso is in good shape. "This district is doing well," he said.

Salas did say that the district should look at ways to reduce the dropout rate among minority students.

district are three times more likely to drop out of school than their Anglo counterparts, Salas said. The dropout rate is about 6.4 percent for all students.

Board member Lynn Willard said he didn't like to

see cuts affect programs like student council at Ruidoso Middle School. "These are programs that are not essential, but they're what have made our schools special in the past," he said.

airport is very important economically for this area of the state.

Ken Nosker, SBAC chairman, told Lee and Medrano that although he couldn't speak for the entire Lincoln County Commission, he would support the idea of the county being the agency to see that the road plans are completed.

Airport administrator Fred Heckman said the airport commission also had the powers to be the lead agency.

Nosker suggested that the other representatives on the SBAC talk to their various governments and report their feelings at the meeting scheduled for today (June 19).

Medrano said that whatever was decided he would need to get together with the engineer to make sure that design standards conformed to state regulations.

"There is a possibility, depending on traffic volume, that the state would take over responsibility for the road after it is completed. We would want to make sure now that it's up to standards to make the transfer easier," he said.

Following the meeting, Earl Cook, one of the consulting engineers on the airport's construction, said the water well being drilled at the airport site should be ready to test pump this week. "They're at about 800 feet and are just entering the aquifer," he said.

Agenda items for today's meeting include a presentation of a logo for the engineers by Maggie McNabb, an engineer's report from Cook, a report from Heckman and a slide presentation on the airport at the Grand Canyon by Tim Morris, Ruidoso's representative on the SBAC.

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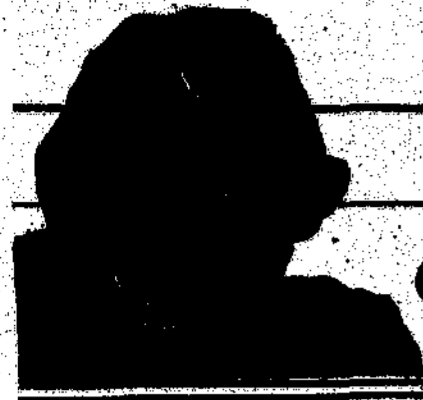

OPINION

●HOW would you like to be charged \$5 by the federal government just for going home at night after a day's work? Silly, you say. Or how would you respond to a \$5 fee to hold a picnic on land that belongs to you? What provokes this prospect is news that the entrance fee is scheduled to go up from \$1 to \$5 at New Mexico's Bandelier National Monument. Similar increases for the use of public parks and monuments all across America are scheduled to go into effect soon. It is the price taxpayers have to pay for the privilege of using facilities that belong to them.

●THE great dream of liberals and conservationists is that every possible acre of land in the United States come under ownership of the government in order to "insure" access to it by the people who would own it. Every year more land disappears into the maw of government ownership on the pretext that it is being "preserved" for the people. Advocates of such programs point out that only in this manner can land be kept from greedy exploitation by insensitive and profit-motivated corporations. Instead, the land would be reserved in pristine condition so that world-weary citizens could repair there to sniff the flowers, breathe the fresh air, drink pure water and enjoy the nostalgia of a romantic wilderness as it once existed. So far so good.

●WHEN acquisition of these lands, bought with taxpayers' money, is being advocated the point is always made that the land so acquired will belong to the people for their enjoyment. But once the land is acquired, fences go up, "US Government Property, Keep Out" signs appear, and admission is charged for those seeking enjoyment of the "people's land." If the parks and monuments belong to the people who bought and paid for them, why should they be charged \$5 for setting foot inside any of them?

●FEDERAL agencies in charge of these lands justify admission charges by pointing out the cost of providing facilities for visitors, maintaining and protecting the property. That's precisely what would happen if the parks were in the hands of private entrepreneurs. The private owners would police and maintain the land, install whatever facilities needed to attract customers, and preserve whatever character the land has as a necessary program to draw visitors. For this, the owner would charge an admission fee, just as the national parks and monument people do. So what have we gained by permitting the government to own these beauty spots in the name of the people? In private hands, the land could generate jobs and yield taxes without destroying its beauty. Look what Walt Disney did to some unattractive real estate!

●YELLOWSTONE National Park's facilities are leased to private companies, who do a good job. Why couldn't the federal government divest itself of the national parks in the same manner it seeks to sell off the postal service, Tennessee Valley Authority, FHA and other departments that could be handled better by private interests? Restrictions on how the land could be used could be implemented to insure the parks would be maintained and used properly and for the benefit of all the people—without having to buy it outright, and without a citizen having to buy part of it again every time he visits one of them.

●THIS isn't going to happen. I just want to make the point that I resent paying tribute to set foot on my own park land as much as I would resent being charged \$5 for going home or paying a fee for having a picnic in my back yard.

●I seldom agree with Sen. Jeff Bingaman, but he won my sympathy when he said, in opposing the hike in admission fees, "This takes away from a long-standing tradition that our parks are public lands and owned by all Americans and should be accessible and affordable." Amen.

●GARY C. Mitchell, one of Ruidoso's bright lawyers, is threatening to seek a writ of mandamus to force District Judge Richard Parsons to convene a grand jury to investigate the McKnight murders. He must think that's the correct way to go. He didn't feel that way on Feb. 24, 1986 when he wrote the clerk of the district court and called the grand jury an "archaic device" and added, "Perhaps one day our legislators, sheriff's departments and district attorney's offices will realize the extreme waste of both money and time which a Grand Jury causes."

●HAVE you so soon forgotten the Live-Aid TV Extravaganza which was to provide food for starving Ethiopians? Ever heard whether the food arrived, or even if it were sent? Some of it did arrive, whereupon the Marxist Ethiopian government used the donated food to "bait" starving peasants into refugee camps where they could be more easily rounded up and forcibly relocated. The same folks who brought us Live-Aid also gave us Hands Across America to help farmers. We are waiting to find out whether any of the millions of dollars raised actually sifted down to farmers. Stay tuned.

●WHEN I lived in West Texas, I found that people spent a large part of their waking hours huddled in storm cellars during the summer tornado season. Now that I'm in New Mexico, I wish I were back underground because this state leads the nation in the number of deaths by lightning, according to the US Weather Service. In the past 27 years, the Albuquerque Journal reports, 63 people have been killed in New Mexico by lightning, and 86 others injured. Best way to avoid electrocution is to (1) stay inside; (2) don't use the telephone; and (3) stay away from glass windows and doors. Caught in the open, don't seek shelter under a tree, stay away from telephone poles, stay away from hilltops, keep dry as possible, and when you feel the hair on the back of your neck rising it is a sure sign lightning is about to strike—so drop to your knees, bend forward, and pray like hell.

Contra-bashing by Big Media

WASHINGTON—In early 1940, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt faced two seemingly insurmountable obstacles.

The first of these problems had been surmounted by none of his presidential predecessors, the unwritten tradition that Presidents of the United States should not seek a third term.

Mr. Roosevelt's second problem was the desperate need for military assistance by the hard pressed and embattled British, who were locked in a struggle for survival with Hitler Germany. And FDR was faced with the problem of how he might help England without providing the large bloc of Congressional isolationists with an opportunity to impeach him.

In addition to the heavy Congressional isolationist influence of such senators as Wheeler, Nye and Borah, there was a national isolationist movement led by a national hero, Charles Lindbergh, whose followers filled Madison Square Garden in New York for rallies.

Since Adolf Hitler had signed a non-aggression pact with Stalin's Soviet Union, the large American Communist Party and a host of fellow travelers were also pushing the isolationist line — including strong opposition to any aid to England. In addition the German-American Bund was having mini-Nuremberg rallies around the US countryside.

Every weekend the airwaves attracted the attention of America's "Radio Priest," the Rev. Charles Coughlin, a Detroit Roman Catholic priest, who attracted audiences of millions as he roasted Roosevelt, an activity in which most of the nation's newspapers also participated in varying degrees. Some of them were willing to publish even top secret plans which anti-British officers in the War Department leaked to *The Chicago Tribune* and *New York Daily News*. President Roosevelt was so incensed when this happened (just before Pearl Harbor) that at his weekly news conference, when *The Chicago Tribune* reporter failed to show up, FDR ordered *The Daily News* reporter to come forward —

where the president reached into his desk and pinned a medal on this reporter's chest — The Iron Cross (of Germany.)

President Roosevelt did, of course, have millions more Americans who supported him — including one young former radio announcer, who was attractive enough to be signed to a Hollywood contract, where later he was elected president of his labor union, the Screen Actors Guild.

Today this former support of Franklin Roosevelt is learning how it is for a president to struggle against a Congress — even when the international stakes are high.

Today they are contending that the "contras" can't win. In 1940, Mr. Roosevelt's Ambassador to the Court of St. James, a strong conservative named Joe Kennedy, was assuring the president that the British hadn't a chance of winning against Hitler's awesome *Wermacht* and *Luftwaffe*. Instead of adhering to this defeatism, FDR arranged to trade 50 US destroyers for bases, at a time when Nazi U-boats had brought Britain to the verge of starvation.

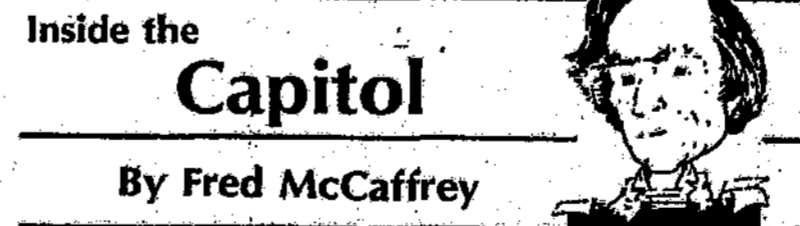
Today in Nicaragua, there is little possibility that the contras could tackle Managua against what has become the largest armed forces in Central America, which are supplied by a seemingly inexhaustible supply of such weaponry from Havana and Moscow as the lethal helicopter gunships. And while the contras fought very effectively against the Nicaraguan Army's advance into Honduras, it is ridiculous to expect that recipients of United States Band-aids ("humanitarian aid") can contend effectively against Marxists with helicopter gunships.

As in 1940, when the largely isolationist national press was bitterly opposing President Roosevelt's efforts to send help to England, today the largely leftwing Big Media are, in general, opposing President Reagan's proposed \$100 million for aid for the contras.

Much of the Big Media are contending that the bulk of the contras leadership is comprised of former officers of Anastasio Somoza, the exiled (and subsequently assassinated) alleged dictator, whose previous rule simply wasn't in the same league of oppression as the tyranny now imposed by Ortega and his fellow Marxists.

In the government or military forces of Comrade Ortega are reportedly a number of Somoza's former National Guardsmen, including: the Minister of the Treasury, Gen. Frederico Prada; Col. Manuel Gomez of the Air Force; Lt. Gen. Modesto Rojas, commander of the Air Force; and Lt. Col. Fulgencio Largalpada, director of the Nicaraguan Navy's submarines.

meeting was for the guest to announce he is again calling for consumers to boycott table grapes. He has said before, and said again this day, that the reason for that cry is the chemical sprays the grapegrowers use, which are so noxious that pickers who work the fields endanger their own health and the health of still-unborn generations.

If that's true, asking us to not to buy these products seems a logical enough thing to do. Governor Anaya issued a proclamation urging us to follow Chavez's advice in the matter—except that, at the very end, he chickened out.

It was as though a thought flashed through his head: "New Mexico is now getting heavily into the winegrape market, and we don't want Chavez or anybody else urging us to boycott that." So the governor tacked on a note that said we should not be mixed up; boycott table grapes, but don't do anything to hurt winegrape growers.

ILLOGIC: That would be fine except for the fact that we all understand that the grape growers we have here almost certainly use the same kinds of sprays on their product, which should then have the same effect on pickers in New Mexico.

When asked about that pointblank, Chavez gave a faint smile and suggested the winegrape people don't use chemicals quite so heavily. That's almost certainly a position he takes only for reasons of politeness, so as not to embarrass Governor Anaya. Catch Chavez by himself, outside the range of those TV cameras, and he'll almost surely tell you our kind of grape growers use almost the same practices as those in California.

Only a politician would make the effort to be 100 percent in support of Cesar Chavez, while being at the same time 100 percent in favor of the growers. Anaya tried it, but it really can't be done.

Late Appointment
Gov. Prince has appointed Geo. B. Barber, a well known lawyer of this place, District Attorney of Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy counties, of the Fifth Judicial District, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of W. A. Hawkins. Mr. Barber has been a citizen of Lincoln county for many years, much of the time living in the town of Lincoln, and this appointment gives great satisfaction.

Railroad News
The surveying party of the A. T. and S. Fe company, coming west from Carthage, were met by two citizens of Nogal, who went out for an interview. The party had reached Red Canon, five miles west of the Mal Pais, where, as the engineer stated, the survey on that line would be abandoned, for the reason that the route through Red Canon is impracticable, owing to the long, heavy grade. According to instructions, they were to go to San Marcial and from there run a preliminary line through the San Andreas mountains, striking the Mal Pais at a point near the Fort Craig crossing.

The news in 1892 was that money was begging in London at 2 1/2 percent, the redwood forests of California are disappearing, and the blacksmith hammer is making music sharpening plows for spring plowing.

Every year a local paper gives \$500 to \$3,000 in free lines for the benefit of the community in which it is located. No other agency can or will do this. The Denver chamber of commerce held a railroad meeting, at which Jefferson Reynolds, of the First National bank of Las Vegas, was present. Mr. Reynolds says it was the feeling that this road must be built, and that Denver will make it the first enterprise which she pushes to the front.

On the night of the 18th, Wm. Hudgens, proprietor of the Long Branch saloon, shot a Mexican named Alfonso Ayon through the head. Ayon died this morning. The cause of the shooting was a party of drunken Mexicans got to quarreling in Mr. Hudgen's saloon, and he put them out of the house. This angered the Mexicans to such an extent that they returned armed with rocks. Mr. Hudgens, seeing the danger he was in, pulled his gun and fired, the bullet entering just over the Mexican's eye. Sympathy is with Mr. Hudgens, who gave himself up immediately after the shooting.

Not only in New Mexico, but throughout the country the prospects for railroad building for this year, and for years to come, are better than they have been at any time during the past decade. In all portions of the country, charters have been taken out to build new, or extend old lines. The rail mills,

Signatures validated in recall petition

Signatures on a petition to recall and increase the number of trustees on the Ruidoso Downs Village Council have been validated by village clerk JoAnn Jenkins. Jenkins said that she had validated 35 signatures, which is the required 5 percent of the voters in the last election. She will present the petitions to the trustees at their meeting on June 23.

The next step will be for the trustees to adopt a resolution for an election to let voters decide whether they want the number of trustees increased to six from the current four. Jenkins said that there had been some question as to the legality of the petition because it also asks for the

recall of Mayor J. C. 'Jake' Harris and there is no provision under state statutes for the recall of the mayor. "I called the (New Mexico) Municipal League attorney in Santa Fe and asked him for an opinion. Hopefully, I'll get that sometime this week so I can submit that opinion along with an opinion from the village attorney and the petition."

Richard Hawthorne, acting Ruidoso Downs village attorney, said that he still believes, as he told the trustees last week, that it's "clearly not a valid petition."

Hawthorne said he will advise the trustees not to validate it by passing a resolution for an election.

"Under New Mexico statutes the reasons a mayor can be recalled are criminal charges or other misconduct," Hawthorne said. "The mayor shouldn't have been included on the petition to increase the number of trustees because he is clearly not a trustee."

Court clerks updated on office procedures

Question: If a citizen goes to the municipal court clerk to sign a complaint and the clerk proceeds to type the statement of facts and about the middle of the report, the complainant says: "The hell with it, I don't want to file a complaint!"

What does the clerk do? Destroy the complaint? Tear it up? File in the trash can?

This was one of many questions that municipal court clerks from around the state were asked in a quiz, part of the clerks' training at a meeting June 10 in Albuquerque.

Among the participants was Rosemary Gallegos, municipal court clerk in Carrizozo.

Lidio Rainaldi, municipal judge at Gallup conducted the session "accepting and processing complaints."

He explained the difference with regard to a complaint filed with the municipal courts when it is a complaint filed by an officer and one filed by a citizen.

What does a clerk do when a complainant changes his (her) mind midway through a

report?

The clerk is advised to keep the complaint for future reference. A note should indicate that the complainant changed his (her) mind and did not want to file. If the complaint is re-filed, the matter will be easier to remember if the clerk retains the first complaint.

Other areas covered included general procedures before trial. The training agenda held at Albuquerque Ramada Classic included a lesson on bonds and appeals with Johnnie Byrd, municipal judge of Farmington, in charge of the presentation. (Byrd was former clerk at Farmington.)

Proper court attire was discussed. The all-female group of clerks were told the mini skirts are no-no's.

Skits were performed to teach telephone etiquette. Clerks were told that they are "civil servants" and given tips on proper language and common courtesy. "Yes," instead of "Yeah," and never put someone on hold without first advising them.

Gallegos, court clerk for Carrizozo the past 10 years, also serves as police clerk.

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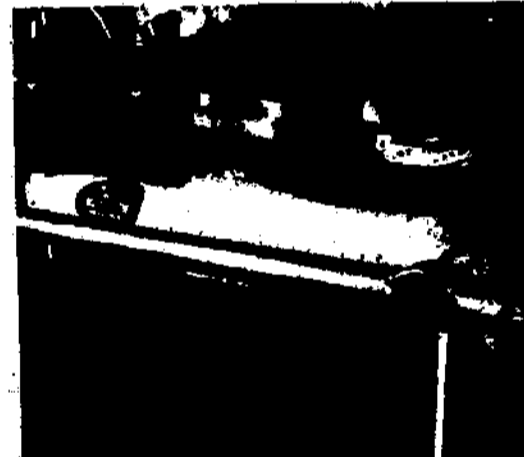
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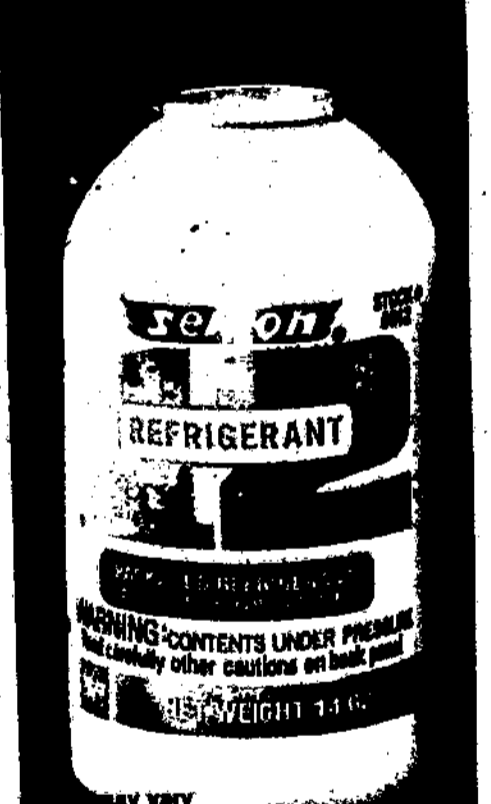
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School moving to improve test scores

Ruidoso High School needs to look at ways of beefing up its language arts program if it is going to raise test scores, a school counselor told Ruidoso School Board members recently.

James Sanchez, who counsels students at Ruidoso High said that results from the Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills showed that high school juniors were not doing as well as the nation as a whole in language mechanics.

Language mechanics includes grammar and capitalization on the standardized test which is administered each year.

Ruidoso students scored at the 48th percentile, 2 points below the national average of 50. Students also fell below the national average in reading vocabulary scoring at 47 percent.

Ruidoso High School Principal Tom Hansen said work was already underway to study what could be done to help the students' test performance.

"I think we should be ready to implement changes by the next school year," Hansen said.

"I think we should be seeing improvements in the language scores relatively soon because of changes already made at the lower grades," said Karen Tillman, principal at White Mountain Elementary School.

"After all, the problems don't begin in high school, they start at the lower grades," Tillman added.

On the brightside of the CTBS scores, Sanchez said

students continued to do well in mathematics, science and social studies. Social studies was the 11th graders strongest area and they scored at the 72nd percentile.

Scores on the New Mexico High School Proficiency Exam also showed Ruidoso students doing well. The test has been required for sophomores since 1978, but students don't have to pass it in order to graduate.

Results of the 1985-86 test show that 94 percent of Ruidoso 10th graders pass the exam, compared to 89 percent statewide.

Students can take the proficiency exam, which tests only very basic reading, writing and problem solving skills, again in their junior and senior years if they fail the first time.

Sanchez presented statistics showing that 86 percent of students who took the test in 1985-86 as juniors passed it and 100 percent of seniors passed. This compares to statewide statistics showing 70 percent of juniors pass and 77 percent of seniors.

Results of students' performance on the American College Test (Act), which is used as an entrance test by most colleges in the West, were also discussed.

Ruidoso composite score on the exam that tests English, math, social science and science skills, was about 17.8 out of a possible 36. This is lower than the national average for 1984-85, which was 18.6, and higher than the state average of 17.5.

Sanchez said that part of the reason that this score was

not higher could be the number of juniors taking the exam. Fifty-eight juniors were tested and 55 seniors.

"At many schools only the top juniors and seniors are encouraged to take the test. Here we encourage all the juniors to take it just so they'll know what it's like when they take it as seniors," Sanchez said.

Supporting our enemies

Editor—Recently President Reagan proposed that we sell Red China \$550 million worth of advanced airborne electronics to upgrade the Communist governments F-8 high-altitude intercepter fighters.

He says the sale would improve relations with Peking and would be in the best interest of US national security. But remember, we're talking about the most repressive Communist tyranny on the face of the earth; one that, by its own admission brutally murdered tens of millions of its own people, helped kill 50,000 US troops in Korea, and perpetrated the recent genocide of three million innocent human beings in Cambodia. Furthermore, that criminal regime has flatly denied the notion that it would be our "ally" against Moscow, repeating instead of its solidarity with the Soviets.

The proposed sale of strategic military electronics is just one more example of the "scissors strategy" described by highly-placed KGB defector Anatoly Golitsin in his book **NEW LIES FOR OLD**.

Golitsin explained that the much publicized Sino-Soviet split is nothing more than a strategic deception. The intended victim — in this case the United States — is cut in half (destroyed) after first being deluded into building up one of the Communist regimes as a supposed buffer against the other. Previous administrations pursued the same policy with the Soviet Union in the name of detente! The result has been to build the Soviet Union into a superpower which now menaces the remaining free world.

The advanced military equipment would permit the Red Chinese to threaten the Republic of China (Taiwan) and other non-Communist nations in Southeast Asia. This suicidal act must be stopped. Peking has just begun to reap the economic and military benefits of contact with the US and the non-Communist world. I recommend that you put your Senators on notice that you expect them to block future sales of high technology to the Communist Chinese, irrespective of the wishes of the Reagan Administration.

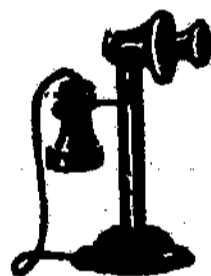

Carrizozo Police Beat

Three illegal aliens were apprehended at 11:15 a.m. June 16 by Chief of Police C. A. Morales and turned over to Border Patrol authorities. Two Mexican nationals were spotted near the David Vega residence and the other near the chief's house, south of town.

June 16, a woman asked Morales how she could go about obtaining a restraining order to keep an 18-year-old man from entering her property. Morales advised the woman to talk to the district or municipal judge regarding the matter.

Morales requested the assistance of Sheriff Deputy Charles Flanagan in reference to a June 16 complain from a mother who reported at 10 p.m. that her son was acting disorderly. The man eluded officers. Deputies Barry Hale and Pete Esquibel joined the search with negative results.

Morales told the mother that if she still wanted the son picked up she would need to sign a complaint next day at the town hall.

Flanagan, on weekend duty for town police, responded to a 4 a.m. June 15 breaking and entering report on a railroad right-of-way, 300 feet south of E Street. On his arrival at the scene the deputy observed a pickup truck. An intoxicated man was some distance away. The man claimed his vehicle was stuck. The man was taken home by the deputy. The report states that canteloupes were discovered along the railroad property and in the man's vehicle. Railroad officials said that the seal had been broken off a refrigerated box car. The case remains active.

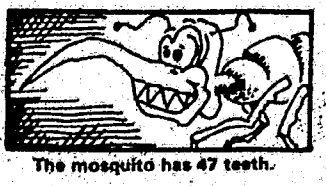
