CARRIZOZO—

Municipal elections will be held March 4. Carrizozo voters will be asked if the town should adopt a special gross receipts tax ordinance of one-fourth of one percent of the gross receipts with the money to be used for streets and alleys.

Carrizozo voters will also decide who will fill the positions of mayor, municipal judge, and two trustee positions.

Candidates for the positions:
Mayor: Robert E. Hemphill and Harold Glen Garcia.

Municipal Judge: S. M. Ortiz and William L. Hasenbuhler.

Trustee, position one: Linda A. Haller and James W. Silva.

Trustee, position three: Albert N. Baca.

CORONA—

Incumbents have declared their candidacy for the positions to be filled at the Corona municipal election to be held March 4. Two council seats and the mayoral positions are to be filled because the present terms are expiring.

The present mayor, Ernest Luercas, has filed for the mayor position and present council members Earl Coy Roper and Janetta Beth Foster have filed for the two at-large council seats.

SIDDENS OWN . . .

A lot of bull

The 'Grand Champion Bull' of the Simbrah breed at the Arizona National Stock Show in Phoenix on Jan. 5 is V. F. El Jefe, owned by Ed and Fran Siddens of Carrizozo.

El Jefe was calved and raised on the Valley of Fires Ranch west of Carrizozo. The Siddens had purchased the recipient cow that had been implanted with an embryo transplant and produced El Jefe. A recipient cow is a surrogate mother with the embryo being obtained from another cow.

When El Jefe was calved, he was weighed and ear tagged. Three months later he was branded, and began a series of daily grooming, halter breaking, and his ewekly weights were recorded.

El Jefe is 20 months old. He weighs 1,750 pounds. His top award of "Grand Champion Bull" and his other awards at the show of 1st in his class and 'Best Bred and Fed SW Bull' were won at his second showing. He had placed 2nd in his class at the Texas State Fair in Dallas.

El Jefe will be entered in another show Feb. 14 in San Antonio, Texas.

Valley of Fires Ranch entered three Simbrahs in the Arizona National Stock Show. V. F. Rose was "Grand Champion Female" and 1st in her class. V. F. Miss Josephine took 1st in her

class and "Best Bred and Fed SW Female."

Simbrah is a relatively new breed, having been started eight years ago. Simbrahs are ¾ Brahma and ¼ Simmental. The Simmental breed comes from Germany, Switzerland and France.

The purpose of starting the breed was to improve cattle that commercial cowmen can use. They produce more pounds per animal, a higher yield and a leaner beef.

Siddens had a herd of commercial cattle on the Valley of Fires Ranch before he decided to get in a registered herd three years ago. He also wanted to get into embryo transfer. He is in the process of developing a breeding program and has two different lines to utilize for the breeding program. He now has 27 Simbrahs.

John Paul Ventura works with Siddens and together they perform the daily chores of halter breaking and handling the Simbrahs.

Ed is vice-president of the Southwest Simmental Simbrah Association that was formed in September 1985. The association covers the five states of Arizona, California, Utah, Nevada and New Mexico. The purpose of the association is to promote the Arizona National Stock Show, the Arizona National Bull Sale, and to try and market cattle and work with ranchers with Simbrah and Simmental breeds.

El Jefe has less than four months left to be shown. There is no class for bulls after they are two years old. His top award of "Grand Champion Bull" when he weighed 1,750 pounds is proof that he is "A Lot of Bull".

No smoking law passed

The 1985 legislature passed New Mexico's first 'Clean Indoor Air Act'. The Act requires all state, county and city government buildings to develop smoking policies relevant to both the public who use the buildings and employees who work there.

On August 5, 1985, Governor Toney Anaya signed a Proclamation that required each branch of state government to adopt, implement and maintain, effective Jan. 1, 1986, a written smoking policy in compliance with the clean indoor act.

The Act provides that non-smoking areas be designated for public meetings (any meeting required by law to be an open meeting). A public meeting place may be declared entirely non-smoking or at least half of the public meeting area must be designated non-smoking.

In compliance with the Clean

Indoor Air Act, the Carrizozo Board of Trustees adopted a smoking policy at the December 10 meeting. Smoking permitted areas at City Hall will be the City Hall office, the town clerk's office, and the police office. There will be no smoking allowed in the conference room during town council meetings. Signs have been posted in city hall designating the no smoking areas.

Also during the December 10 town council meeting, trustees discussed revisions for the Community Development Block Grant application. Other subjects discussed were engineering consultants, lease of the old dump site, the firehouse roof, and papers for the volunteer fire department.

A request by Marianna Vega for the town to vacate 15th street was denied with the reason being 'future expansion requires 15th street.'

LOSING THEIR NOSES

Coke, toot, flake, snow, leaf, C, blow, freeze, happy dust, nose candy - slang terms for cocaine, derived from the leaves of the coca plant, cultivated in the Andes Mountains in South America.

Sunday evening those who attended a drug and alcohol program at the First Baptist Church learned the health hazards suffered by cocaine users. The program was presented by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

Cocaine is sold in powder form. For use it is usually put on a smooth surface, such as a mirror and cut with a razor blade, fluffing up the powder as well as providing a means of dividing out amounts. "Lines" of cocaine are measured out and each line is then snuffed into a nostril with the aid of a makeshift straw, usually a bill tightly rolled up. This process of "snorting" is the most widespread method of consuming cocaine even though it is sometimes injected directly into the system.

The addicted user will experience a crash of headaches, depression, nausea or disturbed sleeping patterns. Other effects are anxiety, restlessness, irritability, paranoia, seizures and in some cases convulsions and death. Consistent use of cocaine terribly drains financial resources and leads into alternate, often illegal, means of obtaining money.

Frequent users of cocaine also risk literally losing their nose. Cocaine constricts blood vessels which dries up with repeated exposure. This eventually exposes the cartilage and the nasal septum begins to dissolve. If caught in time, surgery can repair the damage. If not, the user risks the collapse of the nose.

MAGIC BROWNIES

The slide presentation was not only about "nose candy" hazards but also health hazards related to users and abusers of alcohol, marijuana (wacky

tabacco), amphetamines and many other substances.

Barbara Langley, administrative secretary at the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office narrated the slide presentation. She told how chemical use damages veins, lungs, heart, nose, skin, pancreas, esophagus, liver and stomach.

Marijuana is smoked in a variety of ways, but users also are known to add marijuana to food - substances such as brownies, called "magic brownies." Abusers who eat marijuana suffer stomach ulcers.

The unseen danger of marijuana is the possibility of substances being sprayed or sprinkled on the leaves (such as PCP, heroin, or cocaine) to enhance the marijuana high or obtain another type of high. This represents untold effects and dangers.

BIG BUSINESS

The man who insisted Americans face up to the devastating effects of cigarettes has issued a similar plea with regard to drug abuse. "Addiction is America's number-one health problem," former Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, Joseph Califano, told the first national conference of Americans for Substance Abuse Prevention in Washington, DC this past year.

"The number of Americans in servitude to drugs and alcohol is frightening," he said, giving the following numbers:

+Fifty million Americans (15 million of whom are under age 15) are hooked on cigarettes.

+Thirteen million are ad-

dicted to or abuse alcohol.

+Half a million are addicted to heroin.

+At least one million abuse barbiturates and other sedative-hypnotic drugs.

+Fifty-three million have tried marijuana.

+Twenty-five million have tried cocaine.

"Addiction may also be America's biggest business," Califano said. In 1984, alcohol and cigarette sales alone topped \$75 billion.

"The economic cost of addiction - health care, days away from work, lost productivity - is more than \$125 billion. The human costs can't be calculated...there's no price tag on sorrow and family tragedy or on life itself," he said.

Califano noted that the gap between what we can do and what we have actually done is far too wide. He said that we must mount "saturation health education and drug abuse prevention programs" to teach ourselves and our children about the dangers of drugs.

COMBAT DRUG ABUSE

At the drug and alcohol presentation at the First Baptist Church booklets were distributed. The publication, "Let's All Work - to fight drug abuse", was made possible by the donations of concerned merchants in Carrizozo, Capitan and Ruidoso. The booklet is meant to serve as a guide for parents, teachers, and young people to help them understand and identify drugs, and to enhance their education in the dangers of drug abuse.

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom

Sullivan states in the booklet: "Our community has not been spared by the widespread use and abuse of drugs. This problem affects us all and we must realize it will not resolve itself, even though we wish it would. We must confront the drug problem through a cooperative effort of law enforcement and community education."

LET'S ALL WORK

Over the years there have been some changes in the drug scene. Due to increased awareness by both children and adults, not all children are experimenting with drugs, but the education must not stop. There are still millions of children drinking and "doing" drugs. Every year, something new comes on the drug scene. See articles on Designer Drugs and Ecstasy in the booklet, which is updated every year to give the most current information.

Charles Cox, Lincoln County Chief Deputy told the audience at the church that he and his staff will present the slide program to any church group, club or organization.

Cox said that, "...we are in a second generation of marijuana smokers" and that Highway 54 is a "main artery out of Mexico."

If this program saves one life, it makes all the effort worthwhile.

LC Sheriff's Report

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department recovered \$99,547 in stolen property in October 1985. The amount of stolen property was \$118,519. This gave a recovery rate of 84 percent. Narcotics seized during the month was valued at \$20, and \$7,158.44 in checks was collected.

October totals: 17 arrests, 12 citations, 137 traffic stops, 159 calls handled, 93 civil papers served, 77 offense reports, 27 cases cleared, 41 cases active, 12 traffic accidents, 34 animal calls, four crime prevention contacts, 24 meetings, nine training

sessions, 34 hours in court, one narcotics case, \$20 in narcotics seized, 2,731 gallons of gas used, and 36,620 miles driven. Dispatcher's monthly log: six wrecks with injuries, seven wrecks with no injuries, 25 ambulance calls, nine wrecker calls, three fire calls, 3,172 phone

calls, 5,736 radio calls, 1,304 teletype messages, 738 walk-ins, 32 hours of training, and three schools attended. Monthly jail log: 489 man days, 1,497 meals served, five Camp Sierra Blanca prisoners, three juvenile prisoners, two alien prisoners, seven local prisoners, and two extraditions.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR—

The deal with Water Canyon--on the table !!

Many people have asked me just what is the issue in the Water Canyon controversy. I have taken a considerable amount of time to research the records and herein is a summary of the information available. There is a copy of the documents supporting this presentation obtainable at the counter at the Lincoln County News. Anyone who wishes to see it, add to it, or question a part of it is welcome to do so. In this article I intend to be objective and fair, in respect to all the people who have been fair and listened to my requests.

It seems that in the Public Highways Act, 67-5-3 and 4, and 17, a five step procedure is set out for opening or closing a road. In this case it would be: 1) request from ranch requesting closure of the road, 2) a review committee is appointed, 3) the committee reports, 4) public notice is posted for public input and notification, 5) the County takes action.

Following is the action taken concerning the Water Canyon road.

Step 1. October 10, 1973, the County Commissioners of Lincoln County received a letter "a formal request to the Court for the abandonment of County Road No. 89".

Step 2. A road review committee was appointed and instructed.

Step 3. The road review

committee recommended closing the road.

Step 4. A public hearing was held January 7, 1974. There was much protest against the recommendation.

Step 5. The County Commission turned down the recommendation of the road review committee and made a page full of recommendations concerning the road and a campground.

A year went by and then on April 17, 1975, the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Lincoln, New Mexico vs. The Stephenson Ranch Inc., was filed in district court and given the number 9620.

Paragraph 5 reads: "The said Defendant, acting through its agents, has unlawfully and wrongfully altered the course of travel of the said road, without the permission, express or implied, of the Plaintiff or its agents." And paragraph 6 reads: "That the Defendant is wrongfully asserting title by claim of right to possess the land in the said road, and is denying the legal rights of the Plaintiff and the Public at large therein."

This case rocked along for seems like two years with a lot of maneuvering for position and presentation.

In a letter dated May 24, 1977, from Frank K. Wilson, Assistant District Attorney, to Les Olsen,

Lincoln County Manager. It begins: "Re: Board of County Commissioners vs. Stephenson Ranch, Inc." Paragraph 2 reads: "Basically the agreement provides limited access in exchange for County recognition that it is a private road. Both of the parties seem to bear some responsibility toward the road, although I would point out that the County is not responsible for maintenance of the road." In the third paragraph he finishes with: "I heartily recommend acceptance of this proposed agreement."

The agreement referred to in the letter is a 4 page unit titled "Agreement for Controlled Use of Road". Paragraph 2 reads: "Whereas the parties hereto agree and stipulate, each with the other, that this is a private way, limited to such restrictive use as may be permitted by the present owner thereof, Stephenson Ranch, Inc., and its subsequent successors and assigns, and..." Paragraph 8 of same states: "This agreement shall be in effect for a period of one year from the effective date hereof, and shall be automatically extended for additional periods of one year, continuing on from year to year unless and until one of the parties gives written notice to the others, at least 90 days prior to expiration, that the same shall terminate upon the expiration of that current year's term. Such notice shall be given by letter, register or certified mail." Then the paper finished with this last paragraph: "Until terminated, this agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of the parties hereto." The agreement was made and entered into August 15, 1977, and is a part of the County Commission Meetings Record.

On Sept. 27, 1977 a "motion to Dismiss" was filed in District

Court regarding case 9620. It reads: "Come now the parties hereto and move to dismiss this action, with prejudice, on the grounds that the parties have amicably settled their dispute". Signed by proper authorities.

In an action taken Sept. 27, 1977 regarding court case 9620 Judge Zimmerman signed the "Order of Dismissal" which in part reads: "It is, therefore, ordered that this action be, and the same hereby is, dismissed with prejudice."

Now it seems the 4 page agreement was in effect until October 22, 1985 at which time a "Letter of Cancellation" is presented, it reads in part: "be cancelled, declared null and void and of no further effect". This letter was signed and dated 11-12-85 by Bill Elliott and A. W. Gnatkowski with Kenneth Nosker abstaining. B. K. Stephenson signed for Stephenson Ranch, Inc.

At the December meeting of the County Commissioners a motion was made and passed to rescind the action voiding the contract. So it seems the County is back in the agreement.

This is not a complete record of the issue, but it is an objective presentation of the papers on file as those I find most pertinent.

At the close of the discussion December 31, Chairman Elliott asked Attorney Sanders: "Where does this leave us" to which Mr. Sanders replied: "I really don't know..." I believe those were the words.

The perplexing problems are these: Why isn't the 4 page agreement a part of court case 9620 since it states: "Re: Board of County Commission vs. Stephenson Ranch, Inc." in the letter introducing it.

Another question, from the motion to dismiss: "with prejudice on the grounds that the parties have amicably settled their dispute." Does this con-

stitute legal action, or does the five step procedure apply.

One more question, on the final paragraph of the 4 page agreement, "Until terminated, this agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of the parties hereto." This question: can a government body legally bind future government bodies without a vote of the public...

These are some of the questions being asked. This seems to be evident, the County Commission of '73 and '74 did go through the legal procedure and voted against closing the road. They took their case to court to keep it open. We're told Court Case 9620 cannot be reopened...is this true? Is the "Agreement For Controlled Use of Road" legal and binding?

At this point I would like to make a subjective observation: I believe the County wished to be as cooperative with the ranch as possible. I believe they wanted to retain for us our access to the Water Canyon Road, County road No. 89, road to the wilderness or whatever it may be called. In the "horse-trading" process I'm afraid we got left out somewhere. That one went by us sorta like the roadrunner goes by the coyote and I feel like he looks dumb and bewildered.

The ranch seems sure of its position. Certainly they have

gone to a lot of trouble and probably considerable money. The County seems to have lost all the money and time it put up on Court Case 9620. In class now and then I was accused of being somewhat dense but I was willing to admit that if in the final analysis I understand. This one I don't understand.

I would like to close with some humor. In a poker game once in a while a player gets four hearts and a diamond. He bets high and draws one card. If he gets another heart he has what is called a flush. It beats an ace high, a pair, two pair, three of a kind and a straight. If the card he draws is a diamond, club, or spade he ain't got much. But to save what he has bet he again bets high. Another player in the game may pay his money just to

see what the bettor has. When you call the bet he has to show his hand, if you don't it goes in the discard pile and no one gets to see. If there is a call and the bettor is found to have the four hearts and say a diamond, he is called a four-flusher. What I mean to say is that us folks who are watching this game would like to see all the cards face up on the table before the winner is declared. I'm probably the four-flusher with a one-eyed Jack for a high card.

One of the great ranches in Texas is said to have been won on 4 sixes. Maybe in this case the ranch has four aces and the Joker. Certainly the stakes are awfully awfully high.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—If there's one subject you can always get a fight about, it's education.

That's one reason we may rest content in our belief that the legislative session that starts here on January 21 will be a double-dyed doozie. Not only do these folks have to face up to the howls that are going to rise once they tell us which of our taxes they're going to increase sharply, but after that they have to consider what to do about our schools.

Exactly why they have to get into that latter topic is not especially clear, except that we are constantly being assured that "everybody is dissatisfied with the state of our schools."

That may be so. Then again, it is clearly possible that most of the dissatisfaction on that subject has been voiced by people who wanted to get elected to something, who then, once they are elected, respond to their own complaints by believing they must make changes.

PROGNOSIS: Anyone who has studied the level of sensibility and efficiency in the Legislature which will be back here in less than two weeks has to admit that any changes it is likely to espouse will almost certainly be ones we do not need, while the ones that would help improve education get passed over entirely.

You want proof of that statement? Just remember how these same "leaders" carried on last year.

Had this writer been asked to advise the educators in the state on how to act during late 1985 and early 1986, he would have said: "Dig yourselves trenches and hunker down in them. The less cooperation you provide these

folks and the less attention you call to yourselves the better. If you can just hold on long enough, these terrible people will have to go away."

Well, it's too late now, and the battle has already been joined.

MISSING ELEMENT: What's sad, in light of all the words that are going to get spilled when everybody and his brother insists on expostulating about schools and how to run them, is that the heart of the matter will almost surely be overlooked.

There will be an almost infinite number of flights about salary levels for teachers and administrators; in fact, that is the aspect of the discussion which will excite almost all the attention.

Then when it comes to the public-school level, there will be an inordinate amount of yammering about something called "tenure"—whether we should have it or not, and whether we should call what we have by that name or by another one.

What you are bound to hear almost nothing about is those who should be the true subjects of any discussion on this topic, the students. Listen to nobody but lawmakers and educational professionals and you'd get the idea that no such people as these have anything to do with education. Listen to the self-styled professionals and you have to believe that schools do not exist for pupils (often called schools).

Oh, well. All that's nothing new. If there's one thing we can be sure of about our present state government, it's that those who run it will get everything topsy-turvy.

coaches will also select the outstanding tournament official who will receive a plaque.







Computer usage

Eight new Apple IIc computers with color monitors recently arrived for use in various classes in Corona Schools. The computers were obtained with monies appropriated by the New Mexico State Legislature for use in the computer field.

According to computer instructor, Mrs. Virginia Clem, the school district submitted a proposal to the State Department of Education stating the need and applicability of computers in the schools. Based on that proposal, the Corona District was awarded \$10,000 to be used for computer-assisted instruction in the regular classrooms. As a result, each elementary room received a computer as well as high school English, math, and Vocational Agriculture classrooms.

Among the many programs that will be used in the classrooms are basic sight recognition of letters and numbers, beginning math, math drills, spelling, review and practice in secondary math problems, language arts, agriculture, and geography.

The new computers will complement the computer instruction program begun two years ago in the district. Twelve

computers are used daily in the laboratory where Mrs. Clem teaches general computer classes to grades 4 through 6. In addition, computer literacy and computer programming are offered to high school students.

Mrs. Clem commented that several teachers provided input

in the formulation of the proposal, and she feels that the new computers will be of great value in each classroom. "The students enjoy learning on a computer and think of it as 'play' rather than hard work. That attitude certainly aids in the learning process."
