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## Nevarez bound over

Tommy Nevarez, the past president of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners Union which represents a number of workers at the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School, was arrested in November 1985 and charged with embezzlement of over \$2,500. He was released on a \$10,000 property bond. According to Assistant District Attorney Harry G. Wilcox, Jr., the case of the state vs Nevarez was presented before Magistrate Judge S. M. Ortiz for a preliminary hearing on Jan. 9, 1986.

The state presented numerous witnesses along with items into evidence during a lengthy hearing which concluded at 7:30 p.m.

The case was bound over to district court on the charges which were alleged in the complaint.

Wilcox stated that a 'Criminal Information' will be filed alleging the crime of embezzlement over \$2,500. The defendant's bond was continued.

# Pot farmers busted

Five persons were arrested by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department in connection with the seizure of 20 marijuana plants in a home in Ruidoso Downs on January 9.

The plants, some as tall as eight feet, were being 'hydroponically grown' with the use of a sun lamp, reflectors of aluminum foil and mirrors, nutrient solutions, a drip system,

and a fan to circulate the air. Chief Deputy Charlie Cox said, "It is the most sophisticated operation I've ever seen." The sun lamp was mounted on a track to move back and forth across the room over the plants and the system was monitored by a timer and a pump to dispense the nutrients to the plants.

Cox placed the value of the plants at \$1,000 each, making the haul worth \$20,000. Another two pounds of marijuana that was

dried and bagged was seized, value \$2,000.

Arrested were Carl Lee Freeman, 24, Ruidoso Downs, charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute; Wanda Krieger aka Punky Krieger, 25, charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute; Mitchell Hinsz, 25, charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute; Dolly Curtis, 22, charged with possession of

marijuana with intent to distribute and a second charge of Distribution-Sales; and Elmata J. Welch, 44, charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute.

Assistant District Attorney Harry G. Wilcox, Jr., stated that felony charges have been filed against the defendants.

## Furrs takes over local supermarket

Furr's Inc. recently acquired a controlling interest in Shop Rite Foods Inc. of Albuquerque, according to Blaine L. Kocoloski, Shop Rite's president.

The Lubbock, Texas, corporation purchased approximately 78 percent of the outstanding common stock of Shop Rite for \$4.75 a share in private transactions.

Shop Rite has one store in Carrizozo, six convenience stores in the Brownsville, Texas, area and a supermarket in Floydada, Texas.

The Carrizozo store is one of two groceries in the central New Mexico town of about 1,700 residents.

"It has served the community for a number of years," Kocoloski said. "And continues to play an important part in the community."

Shop Rite will remain the name of the Carrizozo store, little will change in the day-to-day operation of the store which has seven employees.

The merger will help Shop Rite of Carrizozo in several ways.

Besides being served by Furr's full-service warehouse, Kocoloski said being affiliated with the organization the size of Furr's could certainly offer some enhancements down the line as far as the individual store is concerned.

Shop Rite Inc. was established in 1953. At one time, Shop Rite owned Piggly Wiggly stores in Texas and New Mexico, including five in Albuquerque. During 1979 and 1980, Shop Rite Inc.'s Piggly Wiggly stores changed their name to Shop Rite. Kocoloski became Shop Rite's president in 1980.

Shop Rite phased out of the Albuquerque and New Mexico market during the late '70s and 1980s, leaving only the Carrizozo store.

Furr's now has approximately 100 stores in New Mexico and Texas, according to Clyde C. Waddell Jr., Furr's vice president of finance in Lubbock.

The last major purchase by Furr's was New Mexico Bag & Save Warehouse Foods in 1983. "This is a small acquisition compared to Bag & Save," Waddell said of the Shop Rite deal.

In connection with the transactions, Heard Crouch, George H. Fox and Robert R. Kreis resigned as directors of Shop Rite and three designees of Furr's — Jan U. Friederich, Larry Schoenbrun and Waddell — were elected Shop Rite directors.

## Capitan discusses water problems

The Capitan City Council met in regular session Tuesday night with water once again coming in for much discussion.

Engineer Ted Asbury was present. He was concerned that a Capitan might come up with "a whole bunch of nothing" in reference to the water situation. Asbury feels that the new well east of Capitan should be evaluated in light of what we have at hand. Asbury asked the question what happens if we get into the new well and it costs more than Capitan can pay for. With the \$593,000 in grant money plus the proposed \$600,000 bond issue - Asbury: "I would think you should have a good system."

Asbury's report is 80 percent complete. He will do his best to complete this report (the new well included) by the March election.

Councilman Benny Coker: The new well should be the first priority - then we should go back and redesign the filter plant. It is "naive to think that the filter plant will solve all our problems."

There will be a special meeting of the Capitan City Council, Thursday, Jan. 16 - 7 p.m., to consider engineering proposals.

The election board - March 4 election - judge precinct 1 - Margaret Rench. The clerks will be Barbara Sanchez and Linda Wright. Judge - absentee precinct - Margaret Rench. The clerk will be Barbara Sanchez.

The Village is applying for a grant for Emergency Medical Services in the amount of \$1,037.00.

Ralph Dunlap was present - The county will put in a 6 foot chain length fence (spending up to \$1,500) at the fair grounds to help prevent individuals from slipping in without paying. The council approved this.

The council placed its stamp of approval on the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission Budget.

Guy Henley was appointed to the C-C Natural Gas Board.

There will be a final setting, Feb. 10 at the village hall concerning planning and platting - subdivision rules and regulations. This meeting is set for 7 p.m. There will be a public hearing at 5:30 p.m.

# 'Women of the Month'

The Carrizozo Woman's Club selected Margaret "Maggie" Lane and her sister Alma Sherrill as the "Women of the Month". They are retired teachers.

Maggie and Alma have lived in Carrizozo since September 1, 1945 when they bought and operated a ladies ready to wear store in Carrizozo. The dress shop called "The Lane Sisters" was a joint venture with another sister, Ora Moore. They also owned and operated the Taste Freez for 10 years.

Maggie taught 28 years in elementary schools and managed the New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped for four

years. Her last four years as a teacher were in the Carrizozo school system.

Maggie said she is one of the few persons that have three high school diplomas. She received her first diploma in Texas when she finished 10th grade. Her second diploma was presented when she completed the 12th grade in New Mexico and then she earned another one when she went to Silver City to take college courses to become a teacher.

Alma taught second grade 30 years with nine of those being in Hope and 13 being in Carrizozo. She received her degree at the age of 60. When she began

teaching a degree was not required but college courses were required.

Alma went with her husband to Chicago and helped drive back the new fire truck for Carrizozo when it was bought in the 50s. She was told that she was the first woman to help deliver a fire truck.

Maggie and Alma first came to New Mexico in a covered wagon with their family in 1917. It took them three weeks to travel the 500 miles from Texas and their meals were cooked over a campfire.

They were both active in the Carrizozo Woman's Club,

Eastern Star, and the Methodist Church. They have been known in the community for taking baked goods to shut-ins and people alone.

The Carrizozo Women's Club feels it is important to focus attention on positive role models who will inspire other women and encourage all individuals to promote excellence for women. By tradition, girls and women have not been encouraged in the serious pursuit of excellence in every field of endeavor. However, many exceptionally talented women have defied tradition and proven their ability to make major contributions.

## Registration closes

Residents of Lincoln County municipalities will have the opportunity to vote for the candidates of their choice at the March 4 municipal elections but only if they are properly registered.

Lincoln County Clerk Fran Siddens has requested that all voters in the county contact her office to update their registration, especially if the voter has been registered for longer than three years. The clerk's office needs to determine if voters who have registered with a box number actually live inside or outside a municipality.

Registration files must also be updated if a voter has married or re-married or changed their address or changed their name or changed their party affiliation or had a change of physical address.

Voter registration for the municipal election will close at 5 p.m. on January 21. In the event a voter needs to update their registration and is unable to come to the clerk's office, there are deputy registrars at all village halls and other places in the county. Siddens said a deputy registrar will be sent to assist any voter who will call her office and request that one be sent.

Any voter registration affidavits for residents of municipalities that are signed after January 21 will be held until after the municipal election on March 4. County residents not living in a municipality will not be affected and their affidavits will be processed as usual.

Remember you need to vote to help decide the new office holders and you can't vote unless you are properly registered.

## CAPITAN SCHOOL BOARD—

# Superintendent re-hired

The Capitan Board of Education met Jan. 9 and approved a contract for Superintendent Leonard Hays for the 1986-87 school year. Board member Preston Stone, a man with many interests, decided not to serve as board secretary and was replaced in this position by Tom Trost.

Contractor Ray Hodge and architect French discussed problems related to the new library. Structure support modifications will be made. The

defrost cycle in a refrigeration unit is thought now to be corrected. Three days of good weather and the roof ought to be finished. Frost in the morning has prevented work. Library furniture should arrive momentarily.

Al Clemmons of Quinn and Company was present. The board decided to wait until August to sell the rest of the bonds. The land trade with the Forest Service is moving along nicely - this takes time. Work on a new track

and football field cannot begin until this trade is completed.

Medical insurance for school employees was discussed. Delta Dental and the EDS plan are the dental options. A vision package was turned down.

Financial aspects of the Smokey Bear Classic Basketball Tournament were discussed. It was learned that next year all games must start after 3 p.m. if they are on a school day. The board will take another look at this tournament at its February

meeting.

Superintendent Hays discussed the real possibility that the state might reduce present school budgets by 2 percent retroactive to last July. This would add another strain on an already tight situation.

The Capitan Board of Education meets on the second Thursday of the month in the old elementary school building. The winter meeting time is 7 p.m. These meetings are open to the public.

## GAS ASS'N. ASKS—

The Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Assn. is appealing to the public to help prevent serious accidents caused by careless excavation.

"We're asking people not only to find out where the lines are before they dig, but to let us know of anyone digging in their area who might not have the lines located," company spokesman Neo Vallejos said.

Vallejos said nearly all the serious natural gas accidents in New Mexico in recent years have been the result of people hitting underground gas lines while digging.

"The State Corporation Commission estimates that there may be as many as 1,000 incidents a year statewide of excavators hitting gas lines," the company official said. "We've been just plain fortunate so far that so few have resulted in serious accidents."

Vallejos added, however, that leaks may occur far in the future as a result of seemingly minor damage to gas lines. He explained that damage to pipe wrapping or coating can concentrate corrosive energy in a single spot and, in effect, drill a hole right through the pipe.

Moreover, he continued, an apparently minor dent can cause stresses that will crack a pipe in time. He cited a recent case in which a pipe cracked nearly 20 years after it was hit and the

leaking gas "migrated" and exploded, injuring several people and demolishing a building.

Vallejos said anyone planning on digging anywhere in the area — whether for major construction or just to plant a fence post — should call the Capitan-Carrizozo Gas Office at 354-2260

at least two days in advance. In most cases, only a single call is necessary to locate all buried facilities in the area, including pipes and electric cables.

Once a line is "spotted," he added, the excavator should not use mechanical equipment within 18 inches of the line's

expected location. And any damage, however minor, should be reported to the gas company.

Vallejos said care in excavating is not only a matter of common sense, but is mandated in a state law which is enforced by the State Corporation Commission.

● IT'S a terrible thing to have to begin every new year with the celebration of Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday, but it's a cross of our own making and bear it we must. In San Francisco, the annual adulation of the martyred King will last four days—Jan. 15, 17, 18 and 19. The ill-starred cast includes Assembly Speaker Willie Brown, MC, and Bishop Desmond M. Tutu, principal speaker, who has taken time off from subverting the government of South Africa. The theme: "We still have a dream: from Selma to Soweto."

● AMERICANS honor only the birth of three men with national holidays—Jesus Christ, George Washington and Martin Luther King. Abraham Lincoln, Thomas Jefferson, Booker T. Washington, Benjamin Franklin and Patrick Henry have never even been considered for a national holiday, probably because none of them met the new standards for heroism—hypocrisy, immorality and insurrection.

● WHILE the nation (and parts of the world) dance in the streets during this Celebration of Darkness, it is time to recall again that Martin Luther King Jr. gave his full support to the North Vietnamese communists throughout the Vietnam War. He called the US the "greatest purveyor of violence in the world," and likened the US to Hitler's Germany. He praised Ho Chi Minh and called him the only true leader of the Vietnamese people. Posing as a man of peace, he provoked and promoted violence, worked for and with identified communists, and urged obedience of only those laws with which he agreed. His hypocrisy and demagoguery were recognized by many of his own race, including Louis Waldman, a prominent labor lawyer in Chicago, who once responded to King's violent tactics this way:

● "THE philosophy and purpose of Dr. King's program ... is to produce 'crisis-packed' situations and 'tension.' Such a purpose is the very opposite of nonviolence, for the atmosphere of crisis policy leads to violence by provoking violence. And the provocation of violence is violence. To describe such provocation as 'nonviolent' is to trifle with the plain meaning of words."

● THE FBI wiretapped King because, among other things, he consorted with known communists and employed them on his staff (such as Hunter O'Dell, who later showed up as a honcho for Jesse Jackson). These tapes were so damning that pressure was brought upon US District Judge John Lewis Smith in January 1977 to seal them. He did. They are now in the National Archives, sealed for 50 years. Instead of disclosing the content of these tapes so that Americans can judge King on his own words and actions, the government has chosen to honor and glorify Martin Luther King with a national holiday and with periodic paeons of praise of one of this nation's most celebrated scoundrels. Have fun on Jan. 15.

● POVERTY is a terrible thing. Every president since FDR has tried to end it and failed. Now we have a president who is not dedicated to abolishing poverty by government fiat, and things are coming along very well. In the current issue of US News & World Report is an analysis by market researchers which predicts that in 1986 there will be one million people in the US worth \$1 million. That translates into one millionaire for every 100 households in America. The report says that 15 percent of the new millionaires will have left school before the 12th grade; only 63 percent will have attended college for at least one year. Most of these millionaires will be ordinary Americans, working long and hard hours at their self-made businesses that cater to the ordinary needs of Americans. Thomas Stanley, marketing professor at Georgia State University, said it best: "The real way people make money is by hard work for 30 years, six days a week." On the other hand, there's the lottery.

● BLOVIATING demagogues in the women's liberation movement (not to be confused with the Palestine Liberation Organization) encountered tough luck on the road to a matriarchal republic. According to the Detroit News, "Since the dreaded Mr. Reagan came to power in 1980 the country has created 7,087,000 jobs, and women took 5,540,000 or 78.4 percent" of them. The editorialist, Lisa Schiffren, also observed that about "65 percent of all the wage and salary growth since 1980 has gone to women, not men." These jobs were not created and handed out by government. They were secured by women through their individual effort—of which yelling at President Reagan as a chauvinist pig was not one. It is hoped that in 1986 we can hear a little less about the inequity of women and women's pay in the workplace.

● AT THE beginning of 1986 we know what causes AIDS; a virus. But if you read Pravda you already know that the disease stems from Central Intelligence Agency experimentation with biological and chemical warfare. If you are a fan of the Health & Energy Institute presided over by Helen Caldwell and Sister Bertell, professional antinukes, you have already been advised that AIDS derives from nuclear radiation. Speaking before the Australian Disarmament Conference last August, Sister Bertell proved the point by pointing out that the epidemic is worse in those countries using nuclear power. On the other hand, if you read an interview with a Greek professor of classics in "Le Nouvel Observateur," you will learn the real, absolutely real, source of AIDS: "Do you know where AIDS comes from? The media keep it from being known, but it has been spread voluntarily by the Jews in order to destabilize the world."

● PROVING that ignorance of the law excuses no person from practicing it, Rose Bird's social scientists on the California Supreme Court have ruled that if you are up in the sky you may not look down without first having obtained a search warrant. If there had been a law requiring a warrant to seek out growers of marijuana from the sky, it would have been passed by the California Legislature and not by the court. At issue in this astounding case is aerial surveillance by law enforcement officers to spot marijuana crops. In one of the biggest boosts to pot growers, the court has now banned such surveillance. You can now understand why the Trial Lawyers Association is rabid in support of Rose Bird. Consider what new avenues this most recent idiocy opens for voracious lawyers: an airplane pilot at 5,000 feet spots a nude sun-bathing beauty in her back yard, and is arrested for invasion of privacy; a commercial airliner flies over a "posted" and "no trespass" piece of private property and its passengers are arrested for trespass.

# Accuracy in academia terrifies big media and big education

WASHINGTON — Rarely in modern American history has any new organization attracted as much major media coverage as Accuracy in Academia (AIA). This Washington-based organization, founded by Reed Irvine of Accuracy in Media, has been excoriated on CBS and in The New York Times (thrice); The Washington Post (thrice — plus a Herb Blockhead Cartoon); Time; The New Republic; — and Ivestia.

On October 22, this Soviet newspaper's front page featured a denunciation of AIA, which was remarkably similar to the US Big Media blasts:

"By the look of things, henceforth students, with the start of their activities, will take out fountain pens (Editor's Note: When was the last time you saw a fountain pen rather than a ball point pen?) and tape recorders. Teachers at universities are quivering with fear. (1) They tremble at the utterance of each word. (2) For who knows? Are the students taking notes on the lectures for their own purposes, or are they listening for the purpose of reporting what the teacher says to the ultra-right organization, Accuracy in Academia?"

"The reactionary newspaper, The Washington Times, crows over the report that Accuracy in Academia, which has existed for only a few days, already has gathered voluntary informants on 110 university campuses throughout the United States. At the call of their spiritual mentor, worshippers and apprentices of

McCarthy hunt for teachers who have the courage to adhere to liberal convictions. By such measures, these teachers are labeled 'Marxists,' which in contemporary America is pregnant with the most serious consequences."

Ivestia cites the case of Bertell Ollman, who was denied appointment as head of the University of Maryland's Political Science Department, "because he dared admit that he was actually on the side of Marxism." But this Kremlin house organ (whose name is translated "News" — like Pravda is translated "Truth"), neglected to mention Ollman's admission that "the purpose of my course is to convert students to socialism." Ivestia also neglected to report that Ollman continues to head New York University's School of Marxism Studies — and his (capitalist) marketing of a game called "Class Struggle." Ivestia also neglected to mention Business Week's 1980 report of 10,000 Marxists on US campuses, which in 1982, U. S. News and World Report increased to 12,000.

In addition to Ivestia's scorn, a Democrat state legislator in Wisconsin, Martin Schneider, has introduced a bill which he said "is a direct response to the threats to academic freedom posed by self-righteous organizations like the so-called Accuracy in Academia crowd."

Democrat Schneider's bill provides that anyone (other than registered students) attending classes for the "malicious

purpose of 'ferreting out professors they regard as leftists' shall be imprisoned for two years.

This wonderfully Democratic corollary to the First Amendment's provisions of freedom of the press and assembly suggests that the University of Wisconsin's classes are classified as Top Secret there in Darkest Wisconsin; that any Wisconsin taxpayer who tries to find out what kind of teaching he is paying for shall be regarded as a felon if he dares to visit the alleged "free market place of ideas" at Madison.

As for Ivestia's claim that "teachers at universities are quivering with fear" and that they "tremble at the utterance of each word, one American university non-quaker is Boston University's President, Dr. John Silber. In an appearance on CBS, Dr. Silber declared:

"I think any professor who believes that what he says in the classroom is a matter of privacy doesn't understand his job... If a professor is ashamed to be caught at his work, he shouldn't be a professor."

"I think that teaching is like publication. Suppose a professor writes a book, and then he says, 'But I don't want somebody who I don't know reading my book and then filing a criticism of that book.'"

"Teaching is not a mystery religion. It's not something that goes on in secret. When a person teaches, they proclaim to the public what they know about a subject. To the

extent that Accuracy in Academia is concerned simply in pointing out errors, in argument or fact, I don't know why any honest professor would worry about it."

"I don't think that anything serious is going to happen to the professors, beyond the fact that it may become a matter of broad public knowledge that they don't know what they are talking about. If a professor cannot stand the simple exposure of his ignorance to the general public, he should get into a different line of work... If a professor gets his facts wrong and somebody spots the inaccuracy and makes it public, how is this a disservice to the university or the pursuit of truth?"

"Anybody who wants to turn teaching into a sacred communication between a

lawyer and his client, or a priest and his penitent, is talking nonsense. What a professor professes in class is a matter for public knowledge. And he has up more right to prevent the public from knowing what he said in class than he does to prevent the public from reading one of his books."

"If a student lies about what the professor said, he discredits himself. But if he reports truthfully that an astronomy professor says that there are only eight planets, or that two plus two is three, I don't see any reason why that level of ignorance should not be known. And I think it is the right of an American to report it if he wants to."

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
