## B. Zamora arrested on possession

A Carrizozo man was released from Lincoln County Jail Saturday, Feb. 8, after posting a \$100 bond.

Bernie V. Zamora, 18, was arrested earlier that evening by town policeman Adam Montes. Zamora was booked for possession of less than one ounce of marijuana.

The charge stems from an investigation by Montes and two Lincoln County Sheriff's deputies following a report that Zamora and a companion had allegedly given a 14-year-old juvenile female an unknown hallucinogen.

Montes and Deputies Max Watson and Duane Vinson, responded to the complaint and attempted to interview the girl at her home. The girl's mother had earlier taken her daughter to Carrizozo Health Center where she was treated and released.

According to information gathered by the investigating officers, the girl was apparently picked up at her home by Zamora and his riding companion. The girl stated that she was offered a liquid contained in a Pepsi can. She later got off the vehicle in the vicinity of the Rec Center and found her way to a residence on H Avenue. The occupant there called the girl's home and advised a relative about the girl's disoriented appearance.

Officers were told that Zamora and his companion could be located at a residence at D Avenue.

Zamora's companion, a 14-year-old juvenile male, was questioned concerning the apparent drug-related incident. The juvenile was not apprehended or detained.

Zamora, upon asked if the '77 Chevrolet Camaro he was operating could be inspected, denied the request. The officers were about to start obtaining search warrant rights procedures when Zamora consented to the search, officers said.

A roach (remains of a smoked joint or marijuana cigarette) was found in the vehicle's ash tray. A chemical test on loose substance found elsewhere in the vehicle revealed that it was marijuana.

Zamora is scheduled to appear on the possession charge, a petty misdemeanor, in municipal court, Thursday evening Feb. 13. Court is in session at 6 p.m.

According to the town's Criminal Code Ordinance on General offenses, it is unlawful for any person intentionally to possess marijuana unless it was obtained pursuant to a valid prescription or order of a practitioner while acting in the course of his professional practice, or except as otherwise authorized by law.

Any person found guilty of violation with respect to one ounce or less of marijuana faces a punishment of a fine not less than \$50 nor more than \$100 and by imprisonment for not more than 15 days.

## Zoning ordinance questioned

The Carrizozo Board of Trustees met in regular session Feb. 11 and were told at that time that the D7 Caterpillar and the Galion road grader need more work.

Lacee Lamphere of H & B Supply in Alamogordo told trustees that the work recently completed on the two units did not correct the problems and both units are still inoperable.

Lamphere did say that cost over-runs of \$1219.17 would not be charged to the town and that H & B would honor the original bid quoted. Cost over-runs were for batteries at \$300 each, oil, filters, and miscellaneous items.

Lamphere said, "We (H & B Supply) completed all our work as agreed plus extra work." He noted that his company would stand with the original bid in hopes that the town would remember and consider them for further work when needed.

Trustees agreed to have Ted Ewert of Industrial Parts Depot disassemble both units and give quotes for repairs after the problems are found. The cost for the "exploratory surgery" will be \$600 for each unit.

The Caterpillar is needed for work at the dump site and the road grader is needed for street repair. The town has spent more than \$6000 on labor and parts in an effort to get the equipment running. Trustees decided that the units are worth little as scrap but could be sold when quoted. Ewert said he should have quotes at the next meeting on Feb. 25.

In other business, trustees discussed zoning ordinances with Eugene Baker Jr. Baker has a mobile home parked on his property that is zoned C1 and excludes mobile homes.

Baker told the board that he would like to set the mobile home on a foundation and stucco the outside and make it into a residence. He was given 60 days in which to apply for a variance to the zoning ordinance. Once the application is received, the town will advertise for a public hearing for 15 days before the hearing is held. Anyone may attend the public hearing to voice their opinion about the mobile home being placed permanently in the C1 area.

Action on the lease contract with Mr. Ortiz was tabled for further study.

Trustees agreed to reimburse Ralph and Dorothy Forsythe, Carrizozo Municipal Airport Managers, for registration and mileage to attend the Airport Managers Association Meeting in Albuquerque.

The computer at city hall is out of service until Monday, Feb. 17.

Holiday compensation for police officers was discussed.

## Mayor's term ends

The Capitan City Council met in regular session Monday evening with Mayor David Cummins presiding over his last stated meeting. Mayor Cummins was given a nice hand for his six years of service to the Village. He stated he would be keeping an eye on the council and hoped it would continue projects begun in his administration.

A bill from the Atkins Landfair Engineering Firm of Roswell was questioned.

Concerning federal revenue sharing - Capitan received \$2,473

Trustees decided a bonus day would be given for holidays worked.

The board will meet Feb. 25 at 6 p.m. in City Hall.

in January and will receive a like amount in April. This will go into the general fund.

The council learned that it must select an auditor and a village attorney.

Water Superintendent Terry Cox was given a \$25 raise. His certification level now stands at Level II.

## Winter visits county

North Lincoln County residents continue to dig out from last week's major snow storms that punctuated a previously unusually mild winter. According to Robert Williams, Senior Weather Observer at El Paso Natural Gas Lincoln Station, official snowfall measured 22" (using National Weather Service measurement formulas) with moisture content at 1.32 inches.

As snow continued to fall throughout the week, some school buses were unable to run Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday causing lower attendance on those days. Corona Schools were closed on Monday in hopes that snow accumulations around the school and in the parking lot could be cleared.

Corona Mayor Ernest Lueras reported that Village employee Mike Alirez worked all week attempting to keep roads passable in town. "We don't have the equipment to move that much snow, so we just try to get as much as possible out of the

middle of the roads." In addition, Alirez was kept busy clearing the school parking lot and road to the water well.

Byron Yancey, Highway Maintenance Foreman 1, estimated a total of 35" fell on the roadways around Corona. He rated the snowfall with that of a 1962 storm, then recalled the greatest accumulation in memory when snow began falling on Dec. 14, 1959 and continued to pile up 74" by Jan. 1.

In last week's storms, Mr. Yancey's patrol of six men spent long hours attempting to keep their 135 miles of highway clear. "We worked from 10 to midnight, then went out at 5 a.m. the next day. We worked all night Thursday 'til 10 Friday night and Saturday from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m." Admitting that the weary workers just could not keep up with the steady snowfall, the Highway Department requested that roads through Corona be closed on Sunday. They were not, but workers were able to make

## Corona grocery store closing

Corona Trading Company will close after 83 years of conducting business if a buyer cannot soon be found according to store owner Tim Cancilla. Cancilla has owned the company for the last five years and cites personal reasons for needing to sell the only grocery store in Corona. The business has been listed with a national real estate agency for about 18 months, and even though Cancilla is currently talking to a couple of possible buyers, no deal had been struck as of last Monday.

The store originally opened in the spring of 1903 as a need developed from railroad workers. That first enterprise was part of the Charles Ilfeld Company of Albuquerque. W. S. Dishan was assistant manager of the general mercantile from 1915 until 1958, and his son Ernest fondly recalls those days. "We carried 'em right on through from diaper pins to caskets." He can remember the machine at the store that cleaned locally grown beans. "We could clean

21,000 pounds of beans each year, and they were 100 wis. too." The machine ran for the last time in 1943.

There was also a scale for wool sellers to use in negotiating deals with Boston buyers, and ranchers would sell their sheep - some 65,000 of them in the 1920s - to the store, which would ship them by rail to markets.

In 1958, the mercantile was sold to Kimbell's of Ft. Worth as part of a real estate package of Ilfeld holdings.

Sometime around 1960 the store was purchased by A. C. Thompson who moved the merchandise more exclusively toward groceries. Roy Cason bought the business and ran it for a few years before Tim and Linda (Cancilla purchased it in 1980).

Cancilla said that all merchandise will be at 20 percent off until everything is sold.

Corona Town Council is to consider the matter at its regular meeting Thursday evening. "We have to have a grocery store here," commented Mayor Ernest Lueras. The council may consider contacting convenience store chains such as 7-Eleven or Allsup's in hopes that they will be interested in putting a store in Corona.

Second and subsequent offenses, and possession of more than one ounce of marijuana is turned over to a higher jurisdiction.

Also appearing before Municipal Judge Bill Payne on Feb. 13, Robert Gano, 48, on charges of Driving While Under the Influence of Drugs or Alcohol (DWI).

Montes arrested Gano on Feb. 8. Gano, who gave a Carrizozo address, refused to submit to a breath test.

Bond was set at \$300 and Gano was released from jail an hour later.

Montes also cited Gano for driving without a license.

### NANCY'S DRUG WAR

Nancy Reagan took her drug abuse campaign worldwide on October 21, 1985 with a second "mother-to-mother" summit for first ladies - this one at the United Nations.

"It's the global PTA in action," said Keith Schuchard, who founded Parents' Resource Institute for Drug Education (PRIDE). "The difficulties in raising teenagers are universal."

Schuchard was one of four speakers who addressed the 30 first ladies that Nancy Reagan gathered as an extension of her April 1985 First Ladies Conference on Drug Abuse. Seven

teen first ladies flew to Atlanta for the PRIDE-sponsored program.

The 2 1/2 hour meeting included an overview of the world drug problem presented by Jon Thomas, an assistant secretary of state for international narcotics matters. Three young adults told their stories of chemical abuse.

Schuchard said the number of parents' groups has increased "tremendously" since Nancy Reagan brought attention to the problem.

A drug-free Anita Jones, sat next to Nancy Reagan at the first Lady's international drug abuse conference. Jones was one of three former addicts to tell their stories.

Anita's story: On Christmas Eve 1984, she blacked out after smoking a marijuana cigarette laced with PCP, a powerful animal tranquilizer. She came to in an abandoned Bronx

tenement, where three men attempted to rape her.

### PEOPLE FOR KIDS

For their regular monthly meeting, Carrizozo's People For Kids (PFK) group sponsored a drug awareness program presented by the staff of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Dept.

Barbara Langley narrated and showed a slide program, Drugs and their effects on the body was the subject of the presentation. Following the program, Chief Deputy Charlie Cox and Deputy Sheriff Chuck Flanagan conducted a question and answer session.

**SANTA FE, NM**—New Mexico may be the first state to break the stranglehold on public education held for many years by the National Education Association. Senate Bill 106 puts an end to teacher tenure and allows teachers to appeal a firing only if their constitutional rights are violated. The powerful NEA-New Mexico has dragged up its big guns to preserve its most cherished weapon—tenure. Republicans control the legislature now for the first time in 55 years, and they seem determined to break the monopoly of the NEA on public schools. Jude Mason, president of the state NEA, anguishes that teacher right to due process is being voided and that teachers will have no opportunity to collective bargaining for salaries and working conditions. The bill will be voted on this week.

**MASON'S attack on the bill is traditional NEA:** "There is no effective school research to support the abolition of tenure as an element that will increase teaching or learning outcomes. Thus, one can only assume that eliminating a teacher's right to be told why he or she is being fired, to get a hearing before a local school board, and a final option of a hearing at the State Board of Education level is intended to punish teachers rather than make them partners in the pursuit of education excellence." Glory be!

**FIRST, the NEA is primarily a political organization** dedicated to total control of education in America. In 1972, NEA president Catherine Barrett said, "We are the biggest potential political striking force in this country, and we are determined to control the direction of education." No subsequent president of NEA has altered or refuted that policy, the aim of which is to eliminate parental and local control of any phase of public education.

**EXCELLENCE in education? Hear NEA President Mary Futrell:** "When we are nice and polite, we didn't get anywhere. There's no alternative to political action. Instruction and professional development have been on the back burner for us, compared to political action." Obviously, from these remarks, Futrell admits NEA is more concerned about politics than education of young people, or of the welfare of its members. NEA is interested in a wide range of social and political activity. In New York's Solidarity Day peace demonstration in 1982, sponsored by the US Communist Party and its many allied organizations, Mary Futrell was among those marching with leftist groups demanding nuclear freeze, disarmament, socialism and world government. In 1981 at the NEA national convention, a reporter for the Communist Daily Worker wrote: "Nowhere in the basic documents of NEA, in their resolutions or new business items, are there any anti-Soviet or anti-socialist positions." Does this tell you something about the NEA?


**MONEY is the NEA's first consideration.** Without it, no power to pursue political goals. Psychologist Barbara Lerner in an article in "The Public Interest" notes that the US spends twice as much as the Japanese do on education, but Japanese students tend to do better than ours. Money appears to have little to do with quality education. Sally Reed in her book, "NEA: Propaganda Front of the Radical Left," cites a New York Times story during the New Hampshire primaries. That state is in the bottom 10 states in spending on education. But its students in the past 10 years have scored higher on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) than those of all the other states. New Hampshire teachers salaries average \$16,549, a dismal 44th among the states.

**FOR years NEA has argued that "more kids cost less money" but cannot accept a reasonable corollary, "fewer kids cost less money."** Example: public schools now employ 177,000 more teachers than in 1969-70 to teach 2.7 million fewer pupils, with the quality of education declining. What the New Mexico Legislature seems to be saying in SB 106 is that the "more money" clamor has little to do with public school education. It doesn't cost a penny more, one legislator said, for teachers to assign homework, enforce discipline in classrooms, and submit to evaluation to hold them to high academic standards.

**WHY do teachers join the NEA? The National Council for Better Education recently publicized results of a nationwide poll of classroom teachers.** The survey was made by a private, well-established, independent polling firm. The poll revealed that 76 percent of teachers consider themselves politically moderate to conservative. Sixteen percent said they joined NEA because they were required to do so as a condition of employment. Only 6 percent of NEA members said they joined because the NEA represented their views on the issues—fewer than one out of every 16 polled. NEA supports federal funding of abortion, yet the poll showed that 87 percent of members disapprove of such federal funding, and 75 percent opposed the NEA's spending of their dues money to support abortion. Yet, the NEA sent this telegram to every member of the US Senate: "On behalf of NEA's 1.7 million members, I urge you to oppose SJ Res. 3, a constitutional amendment to ban abortions." The NEA takes an aggressive stand in favor of "gay rights." But members opposed this concept by a vote of 69 to 27 percent margin. The union hierarchy is clearly out of step with teachers, parents, and taxpayers in general.

**SHOULD New Mexico pass SB 104 which, among other things, abolishes teacher tenure, it will herald a public revolt against NEA.** Without tenure, only dedicated teachers will elect to enter or remain in the profession. The rest are motivated by money and power, and have no place in the classroom. The idea that teachers are somehow immune to firing is repugnant. Bad doctors don't have tenure, and are drummed out of practice or forced to relocate when they do a bad job. Lawyers, accountants and other professionals don't hold their jobs "for life." They are evaluated by their clients and customers every day, and the bad ones move to another location. Why can't teachers, when found to be incompetent, seek employment elsewhere? Where is it written, outside the protocols of the NEA, that a teacher can't be fired for just cause—not in the eyes of NEA but in the eyes of local school boards, before which they always have a right to be heard?

**MORE than 9,000 residents of Cong. Joe Skeen's 2nd Congressional Dist. returned his 1985 questionnaire giving their views on current national issues.** The results are interesting. Some 83 percent of his constituents would tie farm price supports more to the market and less to political action; 88 percent oppose a tax increase to reduce the federal budget deficit; 84 percent would establish a minimum wage for teenagers to allow them to work during certain months; and 71 percent support US military retaliatory action against terrorism—even if it might lead to war.

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—It's good to see innovative ideas come up during a legislative session—but not if they're negative ones.

It's good for a governor to be willing to take historic new steps without a moment's hesitation—as long as they're not destructive.

Unfortunately, for Governor Anaya to veto House Bill 2 would not only be innovative and historic, but it would also be negative and destructive.

**THE CONTENTS:** This bill is the one that traditionally appropriates money from the state's general fund to support the various agencies of state government during the fiscal year just ahead. In other words, in this one measure you have almost every dollar that will be spent through regular channels for the maintenance of government services for 365 days starting next July 1. Without this bill, or something that takes its place completely, government would effectively shut down.

Yet at the time this is written, Governor Anaya is still avowing himself willing to kill that bill when it gets to his desk.

When this reporter asked him last week if his historical research showed that any of his predecessors had been so bold as to veto the year's whole set of dollar expenditures, he said he didn't know whether any have. (They haven't.)

Anaya went on to add that he had been responsible for many "firsts" in his term to date, and suggested that this action would just be another in that series.

That isn't quite true. This would be a "first" of such sweeping proportions that nothing he has so far done would possibly compare with it.

**THE RESULT:** To do that to this bill, which, according to joint rules of our House and Senate, must go to his desk by the time three-quarters of this 30-day session is done, would be an act of war on lawmakers unlike any heretofore seen in our 74 years of history.

This, after all, is not just A bill; it is THE bill, and in even-numbered years it is about the only one a Legislature is really required to complete.

What galls Anaya, as you no doubt know, is that the bill as lawmakers passed it does not call for the expenditure of as much money as the governor thinks is needed to maintain government for a year.

It was the idea of the House committee that annually prepares this measure that it would pass this bill as it is, one that calls for spending a few dollars less than we expect to

take in during the year under present tax laws. Then, after seeing what new taxes are called for in a second bill, the leadership would send up to the governor still a third measure that appropriates that "new" money on top of what has been passed out in House Bill 2.

That plan didn't please the governor, and at that point he started making threats to take

the unique action of killing HB2 entirely.

Is he serious? It's just possible we may know that by the time you read these words. If not by then, we should discover the answer to that question soon.

If he is, look for all hell to break out—and a war to start the like of which New Mexico has not so far seen.

# Cashiered captain glorified by Philadelphia inquirer

**PHILADELPHIA** — In October 1984, the merchant ship Mormac Star, a tanker, was in the Indian Ocean with a particularly important mission.

It was leased by its owners, Moore McCormack Lines, to the United States Military Sealift Command. And this ship was filled with fresh water. This was a vital supply for our Rapid Deployment Force, comprised of units of US Army, Air Force and Marine Corps.

Had our young men been ordered into battle, this ship would have been vital in keeping them supplied with water in the searing heat of desert combat.

Captain Paul Giachetti of Springfield, PA, was well aware of the military significance of his vessel to the armed forces of the United States. He was fully aware of his company's having leased the ship to our armed forces.

Despite this, Captain Giachetti refused a US Navy order to sail this ship, because his labor union informed him the ship was subject to strike.

In addition to refusing to obey the order to sail, Captain Giachetti has been found guilty of having sent classified information — details of all ship movements — by Telex to his labor union, the Masters, Mates and Pilots.

Had Capt. Giachetti been the master (captain) of a Soviet tanker carrying water for the troops, and had he refused to sail and compromised security by broadcasting details of ship movements, it is not hard to imagine him in a slave labor camp — or being rapidly buried

alive at sea with no ceremony. In the United States, however, Giachetti was simply stripped of his license to captain ocean-going vessels. He has been beached.

Enter the Philadelphia Inquirer, in the person of a male sob sister by the name of Frump — Robert R.

Reporter Frump arranged for the cashiered captain to pose in his uniform with the four-striped epaulets of the very same captaincy that had just been confiscated.

The Frump lead made no mention of Giachetti's putting his labor union's orders up against those of the United States — at the risk of depriving American soldiers and Marines of water on a desert battlefield. There was no mention of this until the second column of the story. Reporter Frump carefully designed this story to suggest, an allegedly bizarre anachronism called barratry, dredged up to try to smear the last voyage of a venerable and heroic 67-year-old sea captain.

Frump noted in the lead paragraph that during World War II, Giachetti served on a Liberty ship carrying gasoline — which ship was neither torpedoed nor sunk.

Neither was Giachetti's ship at Inchon landing in Korea sunk or damaged — although his ship was mined and damaged while tied up at a port in Vietnam.

Not a great deal of heroics in all this, especially if anyone compared the pay of World War II, Korean and Vietnam War merchant seamen with the pay of the US Navy or Coast Guard.

"At the age of 67, Giachetti last year was charged with barratry — an ancient maritime crime, in which officers use a ship against an owner's interests," wrote Frump.

Mutiny as also "an ancient maritime crime." So is murder,


Visual demonstrations included how to brush and take home coloring papers on eating

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
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




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## RLT play next week

## Bowling







## C'zozo boosters make plans


