Proposed amendments explained

Voters in New Mexico will not only have the opportunity to vote for the candidate of their choice in November, they will also be asked to vote on eleven proposed changes to the state constitution and also decide if property owners should pay more property taxes to help finance \$35 million worth of construction projects for the state's colleges, universities and public schools.

The voters will be asked to vote for or against each proposed amendment. A brief summary of the proposed amendments are:

Constitutional Amendment No. 1 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to establish recall procedures for local school board members. It would remove the school superintendent from the recall process.

Constitutional Amendment No. 2 would prohibit a municipality or county from regulating, in any way, an incident of the right to keep and

bear arms.

Constitutional Amendment No. 3 would permit local governing bodies, counties, school districts and municipalities to elect their board members from single-member districts.

Constitutional Amendment No. 4 would allow the deposit of public money in state and federal credit unions to the extent that the deposits are insured by an agency of the federal government.

Constitutional Amendment No. 5 would change the existing constitutional language to direct forfeitures to the current school fund "unless otherwise provided by law." The major effect of this change is to allow law enforcement agencies to keep property confiscated in drug offenses.

Constitutional Amendment No. 6 would allow the state Senate to designate members of a standing committee to operate as an interim committee during the period between legislative sessions to conduct hearings on gubernatorial appointments with the recommendations of the committee to be submitted to the senate for action at the next succeeding legislative session.

Constitutional No. 7 would expand the control and management functions of the state board of education to include the financial functions. It would provide for staggered four-year terms for the ten elected members and staggered four-year terms for five members appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the senate. It would also transfer the functions relating to the distribution of school funds and financial accounting for the public schools to the state department of education from the office of education of the department of finance and administration.

Constitutional Amendment No. 8 would expand the board of regents of the University of New Mexico from five to seven members. The present members would serve out their terms and the two additional members would be appointed in 1987 for terms of six years.

Constitutional Amendment No. 9 would allow county officials to seek election to four consecutive two-year terms. County officials are now limited to two consecutive two-year terms.

Constitutional Amendment No. 10 would permit the legislature to create a new class of government employee for processing and deciding claims of all citizens injured on the job and would abolish the right of citizens to have job-related injury claims decided by elected judges.

Constitutional Amendment No. 11 would allow state executive officers elected in 1990 and thereafter to serve two consecutive four-year

terms. In addition, it would allow a state executive officer to hold another state office immediately after the term of his original office had expired.

The question calling for \$35 million in construction projects for the state's colleges, universities, and public schools will be a general obligation bond issue proposal. Voters will be asked to vote for the question of or against the question.

The general obligation bond issue proposal would provide \$6 million for the public

school capital outlay fund and the other \$29 million would be used for construction projects for colleges and universities. Voters approved a \$64 million statewide educational bond issue in 1984.

Ruidoso Village Council

Major snag noted

As ground breaking for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport is set for Friday, Ruidoso Village Councilors learned Tuesday that there may be a major snag in their borrowing money to purchase the current site of the Ruidoso airport.

Village attorney John Underwood said he and the attorney for the Sierra Blanca airport Commission (SBAC) had met with representatives of the state Department of Finance and Administration and had been told that the Attorney General would have to approve the agreement to transfer the 160-acre airport site to the SBAC for use as collateral for the loan from the Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA).

"Until we get an opinion from the Attorney General no further action should be taken by the village," Underwood said.

He added that the finance and administration representatives had said that it was very doubtful that the village could transfer title to the land to the SBAC.

"State statutes don't necessarily allow transferring of public lands to a private group for use as collateral for a loan," Underwood told the council.

The council instructed Underwood to go ahead and pursue an opinion from the AG's Office, but to wait on any further action on the airport site, which has been appraised at \$2.6 million.

In other business regarding the airport, the council

heard a report from Ruidoso's representative on the SBAC, Tim Morris. He outlined plans to begin construction in January on the earthwork needed at the Fort Stanton Mesa site.

"The FAA has approved the plans and bids will be advertised this week," Morris said adding that the council is invited to participate in ground breaking ceremonies on Friday.

In other action, the council approved amendments to the village's current sign ordinance. The amendments delete a section of the ordinance calling for a seal of approval on the signs, add a requirement that the front of a business as designated by the owner must be approved by the planning office, allow seasonal businesses to keep their signs up year round and limit the size of free standing signs to 150 square feet.

The council also: —heard from village engineer Mike Davalos that only one bid had been received for bridges and drainage projects in the village. "The bid from Hasse Contracting of Albuquerque is about \$130,000 over the engineer's estimate," Davalos told the council. They authorized him to negotiate with the contractor and see if he could bring the cost of the projects down;

Dear Voters of District 52,

I am committed to working with our city, county and chamber to bring jobs to our county. For far too long, the growth of our county has been neglected by our state. Albuquerque always comes first. Why not have a legislator who will fight for Lincoln and Otero County? I will go to Santa Fe and work with anyone who will help our children and residents secure good jobs here at home. I know it will not be easy, but I believe it can be done.

For too long "BUSINESS" has been a dirty word. My program to encourage new jobs here will include better funding for our schools, concentration on helping our local businesses expand and recruitment of new business to our county. I also intend to work closely with ranchers and farmers who have been hurt so badly in recent years in our state.

SCHOOLS: To improve the education our children receive, we must return control of our schools to our local school boards. We have an obligation to our children at every level to provide them with a quality education. This State's legislature cannot pass laws that restrict the local school board. A law good for Albuquerque can be disastrous in Lincoln and Otero County. This year, my opponent voted to restrict school programs such as vocational agriculture by limiting the right of students to fully participate. Vocational programs should not be restricted but expanded.

The law also takes away incentives of teachers to remain in the profession or become career teachers because it allows a teacher to be fired even when his performance is SATISFACTORY or BETTER THAN SATISFACTORY, if the administration wants a teacher with a "DIFFERENT" background. The background does not have to be better, just different. Thus a teacher with a masters degree and 15 years experience could be fired to get a teacher with either more or LESS education or experience. This is wrong.

Good teachers provide our children with the opportunity for a good education which provides our children with the tools necessary to secure a good job.

STATE GOVERNMENT: We must make state government more responsive to business, farms and ranches. To do this we must first reduce and eliminate unnecessary paperwork, regulations and unfair taxes.

TAXES: We cannot expect economic growth when the legislature's current approach is to try and tax our people and our businesses out of existence. My opponent voted for the largest TAX INCREASE in our State's history. (A 35% tax increase for most taxpayers.) At the same time he voted to double his own legislative retirement. THIS IS WRONG. We do not need to increase taxes, we need to live within our revenues (Which by the way are expanding every year even without the tax increase.)

FARMS AND RANCHES: We must preserve our family farms and ranches. To do this we must not tax them out of existence. We must also strengthen our vocational agriculture programs in our schools and universities. Our universities must be prepared to assist (when requested) our family farms and ranches with advanced techniques and research in water, crop and range management.

GRAZING FEES: We must not unfairly tax our ranches. We must pass a law which limits grazing fees and ties them to the livestock economy.

WATER: Water is one of this State's most precious resources. We must not sell out to El Paso. I will work to make sure that our state has the resources to fight El Paso for the water that is ours and needed for our Farmers and citizens.

ACCESSIBILITY: Clearly your state representative can not help you if he does not take the time to meet with you before, during and after the legislative sessions. I will hold town meetings in each town or area of my district before the session and I will be available in person and by phone to ALL people of my district.

LAKES: I will work to improve our parks with trees, grass, new docks, and roads to help our tourist industry. If we improve our roads in this county and at the lake for our residents and our tourist, we will encourage more jobs.

ANGLE-TULAROSA ROAD: By working to open this road, the people of eastern New Mexico and west Texas will have greater accessibility to our county and its lakes and hopefully will spend more time and money here.


