# McKnight Grand Jury: No True Bills

The special grand jury called to investigate the McKnight homicides has been dismissed after three months. The final report of the special grand jury was presented to District Judge Richard Par-

sons and he released it on Nov. 28.

The report states: The grand jury was convened on Aug. 25 upon verification of a petition of Lincoln County citizens, and the grand jury was impaneled and sworn to investigate all matters pertaining to the "McKnight

Homicides," being the homicides of Thomas P. "Cotton" and Judy McKnight in Lincoln County on or about Nov. 13, 1984.

The report further states that the grand jury met on 13 occasions during the three months it was in session, took oral testimony from 39

witnesses and reviewed and examined 94 exhibits of physical and documentary evidence connected to the matter.

The grand jury returned no true or no-true bills during its three month term. The official statement: There has not been established that there is

probable cause to charge any person with the murders of the decedents.

The grand jury did recommend that the matter continue in active investigation by responsible and good faith means by any proper law enforcement agency including the attorney general of New

Mexico, the New Mexico state police and the Lincoln County Sheriff's office.

The grand jury also recommended that the notes, minutes and tape recordings of its business be preserved and retained for such beneficial and lawful use as appropriate agencies may determine in fur-

thering the investigation.

Parsons released the information during a press conference in the district courtroom in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. He explained part of what he charged the grand jury with when they took their oath. It is:

It is for you to decide whether the witnesses know what they are talking about and whether they are being truthful. You may give the testimony of any witnesses whatever weight you believe it merits.

You must decide the case solely upon the evidence received during these proceedings. It is for you to decide whether the evidence presented is true or false. You may give the evidence whatever weight you believe it merits. You must not consider anything you may have read or heard about the case except as a part of your inquiry as members of the grand jury.

In the course of your investigation, it is your duty to protect citizens against unfounded accusations whether they come from the government or others, and to prevent any one from being indicted through malice, hatred or ill will.

**PROBABLE CAUSE.** For you to return an indictment, you must find probable cause. "Probable cause" means the evidence presented would cause a reasonable person to believe that an offense has been committed and that the accused committed the offense. Probable cause does not require proof beyond a reasonable doubt.

**LIMITS OF INVESTIGATION.** the indiscriminate summoning of witnesses, on the mere chance that some crime may be discovered, is forbidden. The grand jury has no right to conduct an investigation into the personal affairs of citizens. It may not investigate the function, operation and housekeeping of any branch of government, except the jails or prisons within the county. It is not a function of the grand jury to criticize or regulate agencies of government or private persons or institutions except jails or prisons.

Parsons praised the work of the grand jury and said one member was 87 years old. There was a panel of 12 members and four alternate jurors.

He explained that the attorney general's office has possession of the physical evidence at this time and that if new evidence is discovered that a new grand jury can be called to review the new evidence along with the old evidence.

After the press conference, Terri Bussey, sister of the slain Judy McKnight, stated that she felt that there were more witnesses who could have been called in for testimony. She said that during her appearance before the grand jury that the questions did not include anything about her sister or brother-in-law. She said that the questions asked by the attorney general were about her nephew (referring to Judy McKnight's son.) Bussey also said that any time she would try to volunteer the information to the grand jury, the attorney general's representative would "cut her off," and not let her finish what she had started to say.

The murder investigation will continue with little more evidence than was available two years ago when the grisly murders were discovered in the remote area near Picacho where the McKnights lived.

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan said that there are witnesses who need to come forward with more information. He said that his office will continue the investigation until the end of his term on Jan. 1, 1987.

## Paging Volunteer Firemen

Carrizozo volunteer firemen will be able to respond to fires even when they can't hear the fire whistle because of winds or for any other reason. The department received six new pagers (or beepers) that will be used to notify the volunteers of fire calls.

Carrizozo fire chief Albert Najar told the NEWS that each pager comes with an electrical

charger. They cost \$319 each. The pagers were bought with money from the state fire fund. Najar has a two-way pager that he received three weeks ago that were purchased from the same fund.

The chargers have a built in frequency to match with the Lincoln County Sheriff's department. When a fire is reported, and the fire whistle is sounded, the pagers will also

be activated. This will enable the volunteers to be able to respond faster to fire or emergency calls.

Najar cautioned everyone to be careful with fire, make sure chimneys are cleaned and said he wants everyone to have a safe holiday season.

The volunteer fire department is accepting donations for the annual Christmas fund for "Candy for Kids."

precipitation record for November. A total of 3.14 inches was measured breaking the old mark of 2.00 inches set in 1983 according to Tom Guck of the US Forest Service.



# Hints for Buying the Perfect Tree

**LAS CRUCES**—Buy early and buy locally-cut for a Christmas tree that will stay fresh through the holiday season.

According to Dr. John Mexal, a New Mexico State University Agricultural Experiment Station tree researcher, shoppers should select their Christmas trees as soon as the first lots appear.

Tree lots are likely to get only one or two shipments in through the season, he explains. Consequently, shoppers wait until closer to Christmas day to buy are likely to end up with a tree that is dried out from too much sun and too little water.

A tree bought too early to decorate can be stored in a garage or any shelter that protects it from heat and sun, Mexal says.

One of the advantages of buying a locally-cut tree is that it is likely to stay fresh longer than a tree from another state.

According to Mexal, most out-of-state trees are shipped to New Mexico from Washington and Oregon, and some from as far away as Michigan. Tree growers in these states begin to cut Christmas trees as early as October to fill orders from around the country. The trees are not acclimated to the arid climate in New Mexico and are likely to dry out quickly.

Mexal advises shoppers buying out-of-state trees to try to find out when the trees were cut and to buy those cut no longer than one week before shipping.

Better yet, buy native, he says. New Mexico has a fledgling Christmas tree industry. Researchers with the NMSU Agricultural Experiment Station are making selections and developing cultural techniques to help New Mexico growers produce top quality Christmas trees. New Mexico growers are producing Afghan pine, Scots pine, and a variety of firs, and buying from them helps sup-

port this new industry.

Ironically, some of the major Christmas tree producing states use New Mexico seed sources to produce their quality Christmas trees—Douglas-fir, white fir and southwestern white pine. Then those growers ship the trees to New Mexico buyers, Mexal points out.

At the tree lot, choose among species carefully, he advises. Douglas-fir is an all around good choice for shape, color and aroma.

Scots pine is the least expensive tree because it can be grown more rapidly than other species. However, a Scots pine does not have a strong aroma.

Firs have the best aroma, but the needles are sensitive and tend to drop quickly.

Spruces and some pines have stiff foliage. Care should be taken to prevent eye injuries when setting up and decorating these trees, Mexal advises.

A good-looking tree with a hole or two need not be discarded. Holes can be patched with lower branches or extra branches purchased from the seller. Merely drill a hole through the woody branch stem and wire it into place, Mexal says.

Freshness is as important as looks. A fresh Christmas tree has springy branches and good needle color. The needles should not break when pressed between the thumb and forefingers and should withstand a gentle shake of the tree. There should be beads of sap on the tree base.

Some people prefer to purchase permits to cut their trees from the forest. This can be an exhilarating way to start the holiday season, but Mexal advises do-it-yourselfers to be conscious of what they are doing to the forests.

Over time, people could take out the best seedlings and

saplings, he says, and slowly kill nature's Christmas tree industry. This problem is already evident at lower elevations in some forests.

Choose an area for cutting a Christmas tree carefully; do not cut large trees; and do not cut the tops out of trees, Mexal advises.

Another option for those who want to cut their own trees is a tree farm. While more expensive, a tree farm does allow do-it-yourselfers to cut the tree of their choice while also saving forest trees and supporting a new industry in New Mexico.

## Christmas and Respect for Others; Decorations and Vandalism

Christmas is three weeks from today. This is no surprise to any of us. We all know that Christmas arrives yearly on December 25, and in case you don't know, that is the day after many of us think of shopping for Christmas gifts. But Christmas shopping and the traditional Christmas fare is not uppermost in the minds of many people in Carrizozo this year. Respect for others is on the minds of many of us who are proud of the Christmas decorations being installed in Carrizozo.

The decorations being installed on telephone poles in Carrizozo are the result of many years of work, much interest and nearly three thousand dollars in hard cash. Local businesses have donated more than \$1,700 or two-thirds of the cost of the decorations. These decorations should last for several years if they are not vandalized.

Donating money for the decorations shows that business people in Carrizozo do care and are making the necessary effort to improve the looks of the town. And many of us (not just business people) do like the feeling we get when we see the colorful bedecking of the corridors of Carrizozo.

In addition to the newly purchased decorations for the town, the Lincoln County Courthouse is being trimmed with a multitude of polychromatic adornments. These lovely decorations have resulted from numerous hours of hard work coupled with artistic talent and imagination. The time, effort, thought, innate ability, care and love that went into the construction of these decorations is evident when the power pulsates through the decorations and they come to life with color.

The decorations at the courthouse this year are being moved from the lower level to the roof. This move is necessary because vandals struck the decorations last year and many of the decorations had to be rebuilt or replaced. County officials are hoping that installing the decorations on the roof will discourage the destruction that is not only needless but takes away from the enjoyment others receive from the decorations.

Why should anyone be deprived of their right to enjoy Christmas decorations just because some unconscionable underling undertakes to destroy not only the decorations but to destroy our rights as citizens? These underlings are probably not aware that Christmas has not always been remembered with happiness. They are probably unaware that Christmas celebrations were banned by the Puritans in England as evidences of antireligious, Royalist sentiment. Penalties at that time were assessed for celebrating Christmas celebrations between the years of 1642 and 1856. While we may be wrong, we doubt that the underlings guilty of the vandalism are practicing Puritanism.

The NEWS office is directly across from the courthouse and employees of the NEWS probably see the decorations on the courthouse more times during the season than anyone else in town. We consider it a privilege to be able to enjoy and see the decorations countless times while they are displayed. We feel that anyone who will vandalize the courthouse decorations or the town decorations or any individual's decorations is taking away from our daily dose of delms. And vandals should not have the right to destroy our faith any more than they should have the right to destroy the efforts by workers, citizens, and business people to establish the fact that improvements can and are being made in Carrizozo.

Respect for things, people and beliefs is lacking in the underlings who willfully destroy anything. Self-respect is lacking in any person who has no respect for anyone else. It has been said that we must first love ourselves to love another. It would seem to follow that an individual must have self-respect before that person can respect anyone else. And that person must have self-respect before that person will respect things. We at the NEWS sincerely hope that these poor unfortunate underlings can find what they need and channel their anger in a fashion whereby they will be happier with life and learn to enjoy things like Christmas decorations. All the decorations are for our enjoyment, and that means everyone who will see them or hear about them. We certainly hope the former vandals will join us and enjoy this year.

Christmas is the greatest folk festival in the world. Customs of all lands have been added through the centuries and today our celebrations include the Image of Santa Claus, burning of the Yule Log, singing Christmas carols, the Nativity scene, family get-togethers, exchanging gifts, decorated Christmas trees and gaily lit decorations like in Carrizozo. The tradition of "joy to the world" marks the spirit of Christmas nearly everywhere in the world. Let us hope that this tradition will go on and on and on.



# WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON — West Germany's Chancellor Helmut Kohl wins this month's Mayor Daley Memorial Award for Incredibility in Public Relations.

The late Chicago Mayor, Boss Richard Daley, established this standard when his press secretary once exoriated reporters for reporting what Helzoner SAID, rather than what he MEANT. Chancellor Kohl, in one of his silliest moments in history, went before the Bundestag in Bonn to deplore what he charged was Newsweek magazine's "false impression that I sought to compare Secretary General Gorbachev with Goebbels."

"That was not my intention," explained Kohl. "I regret very much that this impression could arise, and I disassociate myself from it emphatically."

Newsweek, stung by what it termed its "journalistic integrity having been called into question" (especially after its having been embarrassed by the "Hitler Diaries"), issued a tape of the actual words of Helmut Kohl — with which the same Helmut Kohl is now emphatically disassociating himself. They include the following:

"He's a modern communist leader. He was never in California, never in Hollywood, but he knows something about P.R. Goebbels also knew something about P.R. You have to stick to the point that matters..."

"Goebbels, one of those responsible for the crimes of the Hitler era, was an expert in public relations, too."

Newsweek's reporting of this evoked a blast from Comrade Gorbachev's Kremlin house organ, TASS news agency, which accused Kohl of aping American defense and foreign policy. And the Kremlin cancelled planned visits to Moscow by two West German officials.

The New York Times reports that Kohl's foreign minister, Hans-Dietrich Genscher, spent more than half of a two-hour meeting with Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze, "explaining what Mr. Kohl meant."

(Did Foreign Minister Hans ever work for Mayor Daley?)

Meanwhile, in Baltimore, Executive Director Benjamin Hooks of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People issued a withering blast of the new movie "Soul Man."

The plot of this film concerns a young white man who uses tanning pills and curls his hair in order to pose as a black and win a majority scholarship to law school.

"We are not mounting a boycott," declared Hooks.

Of course not. "We are writing a letter to our branches advising them of our opinion about the movie and suggesting that they advise their members not to support it... (because it is a) cheaply made, cynical viewpoint of black involvement in

American life."

In Los Angeles, NAACP Chapter Chairman Willis Edwards blasted the film which, he said, "reveals the racism and sexism of its creators."

Edwards contended that there are "many experienced blacks and other sensitive comedic writers, directors and producers, who might have guided it to the right side of humorous satire. Unfortunately the producers did not feel that this potentially explosive, obviously sensitive subject matter was important enough to seek such good counsel."

In other words, "Soul Man" producer Steve Tisch failed to check in for advance censorship by the NAACP.

And The Villainous Racist Tisch has surely felt the consequences of ignoring the NAACP! For in the first week

it was exhibited in 1,200 theaters, "Soul Man" grossed \$4.4 million, ranking it third in the box office.

This is even better than being Banned in Boston.

Maybe Chairman Hook will call out such Big Black Power Guns as the Reverend Jesse Jackson.

Then again, he may not. For a new book entitled *Beating The Cross: Martin Luther King, Jr., And The Southern Leadership Conference* is heavily documented and rather shattering expose of Jackson's alleged closeness to King. For example:

"Jesse" was viewed as an outsider and an undependable, egotistical self-promoter by many SLC staffers... Much of the distrust stemmed from a distrust of Jackson's personal motives.

### Turning Ruts Into Living History.

Ruts, carved by hundreds of loaded wagons carrying the commercial trade over the Santa Fe Trail, are still visible today in New Mexico.

The depressions made by these wagons bearing people and goods overland from Independence, Missouri, to Santa Fe more than a century ago, have now formed shallow arroyos near Fort Union in Mora County and San Miguel del Vado in San Miguel County.

Though these dim depressions on the prairie land of north-eastern New Mexico are no longer bare and dusty but covered by grass, their historical significance in the expansion of the American West, along with the development of our state, remains important.

American trader William Becknell left Arrow Rock, Missouri, on September 21, 1821, with a few men and pack animals. Becknell, who was to become known as the "father of the Santa Fe Trail," arrived in Santa Fe two months later.

Soon American traders, with wagons piled high with glass, hardware, fine cloth, and other luxuries of the day, were negotiating the hazardous and crude 950-mile route regularly.

On their return trips to the east, the American traders took back mules, pelts, Mexican blankets, wool, and other items. Trade flourished over the trail for the next half century — until 1880. During this time most of the trade was controlled by New Mexicans.

On approaching New Mexico, the trail split into two routes. One, the Raton Pass branch passed through Raton to Cimarron, Fort Union, La Junta (now Watrous), Las Vegas, across the Pecos River through Glorieta Pass and into Santa Fe. In those times, this 25-mile leg of trip

could take a week. Sometimes traders, to avoid the rugged Raton Pass, chose the second route instead, the Cimarron Cutoff, across the barren waterless plains of the Oklahoma panhandle and eastern New Mexico. This route met the trail in the Springer-Wagon Mound area.

Besides being important economically in its heyday, the Santa Fe Trail also changed New Mexico's demographics and its culture forever.

Late in the recently adjourned 99th Congress, Kansas Senator Nancy Kassebaum introduced a bill designating the Santa Fe Trail as an Historic Trail under the National Trails System Act. I became a cosponsor of the legislation along with nine other Senators. A similar bill was introduced in the House by New Mexico Representative Bill Richardson. Although time ran out before it could be passed, those of us backing this legislation will introduce it again in the 100th Congress.

The legislation is carefully crafted so that it will not disturb the land rights of individual owners along the trail's length.

And it should spur tourism in New Mexico and elsewhere. According to the New Mexico Economic Development and Tourism Department, the trail designation would generate an additional \$160,000 annually in tourist dollars in northeastern New Mexico, most of it in economically depressed Colfax, Mora, and San Miguel counties.

With the passage of this designation, the Santa Fe Trail will be more than a fading memory. It will become a permanent historical fixture and symbol for different cultures in five states. The ruts left by the wagons in New Mexico will be preserved as living history.

## Lincoln County 'Long Ago'

The Lincoln County Leader, Devoted to the Best Interests of Lincoln County and the Development of Its Resources, published in White Oaks, Lincoln County, NM, Saturday, August 2, 1890.

Saturday, August 9, 1890

Silver City has been fixed upon as the place and Sept. 3rd, as the day for the holding of the Territorial Democratic Convention, to go through the form of re-nominating Joseph for Congress.

Very few localities are so influenced by an intensely moral tone as this. Even the dogs attend church and are religious in their demeanor.

LOCAL ROUNDUPS

The Lincoln County Democrats will meet in Convention at Lincoln next Thursday. A monkey and parrot time is anticipated.

There is increased activity in all branches of business in White Oaks and vicinity. The late rains have been plentiful and everybody wears a look of encouragement which fits him.

Get ready, citizens of White Oaks. Make haste. Ye politician is about to extend the fraternal hand preliminary to asking for the dear people's vote. It is all for the good of the people, you know.

Laboring men, or men who are willing to work, are getting scarce in this town. A thorough canvas of the place was made one day this week and not a man could be found to fill an important place for a day. This is a pointer for such of our business men as are carrying men who can but won't work.

All the twenty-stamps of the South Homestake Mine are constantly busy in getting ready the material for the golden brick. A brief call at the Mill this week by a representative of the Leader found the

whole institution active as in the palmiest days of White Oaks.

The new mill contractor, W.M. Lane, has the business on his line in good shape now. His new coaches, six in number, have arrived and they are beauties. They are Concord's, not of the old, heavy bus style, but the light improved. The comfort of passengers is now assumed.

Jno. B. Wilson, our pioneer miner and mine owner, made a business trip to Socorro last week and returned Sunday morning. Uncle John is a rustler for one of this age, and richly deserves all the success that is attending his efforts to build up the town.

Recently work was renewed at the bottom of the old shaft, the old shaft located at the south end of the South Homestake Mine, which was abandoned years ago, and this week, at the depth of 990 feet the workmen struck a large body of rich, free milling ore, which does not promise to be, but is in fact, a heavy body of as rich ore as has yet been discovered in Baxter Mountain, which is synonymous to saying, in New Mexico. This will give encouragement to the stockholders and will doubtless give an impetus to the labor and business interests of White Oaks. Oh, yes, the clouds are surely and swiftly rolling by and soon a flood of prosperity will envelop us.

Supt. Frank Lloyd of the North Homestake Mine, reports indications of an ore body in the bottom of the shaft which is now down below the 800 foot level. Baxter Mountain is showing symptoms of being very rich in the yellow metal. Work is progressing finely.

Pearlman has purchased Whiteman's Fairbanks Scales, and is preparing to plant them in front of his hardware store.

2,000 head of steers from the Carrizozo ranch passed through town on Tuesday last en route to Liberal, Kan. The recent rains have vastly improved the stock on look in this region.

Our amiable M.D. and Undertaker look smiling as the watermelons and other mortuary fruits reach town and disappear by the wagon load. Nothing like keeping an eye on business.

Frost and Wixted have just completed assessment work on the Sacramento Mine in Tortalete Canon and they report finding some excellent ore in the tunnel, which indicates a rich lead when it is thoroughly prospected.

The South Homestake is constantly yielding good ore and the mill is kept busy night and day. A clean up is now in progress that promises well for the last run. Work is being pushed to develop this vein and open up the ore deposits.

The North Homestake shaft is now down nearly 82 feet. A drift is being run from the bottom of the shaft, south, which, when completed, work will be resumed on the shaft and only a few weeks will be required to reach the 900 foot level. The indications improve with the increasing depth.

A fine brood of ducks hatched last Saturday night. The variety is not known to science. They do not thrive well and carry their heads rather low. There seems to be something in the climate of this locality which does not agree with them. When their feathers commence to grow they may take a change for the better. A nurse wanted.

## TWENTY-TWO DAYS

Think back to your holiday season last year.

The Christmas holidays are a joyous time but, with all the things to do - presents to get ready and parties to plan - it can become frantic.

One way to avoid this is to start preparing way in advance. Now is the time to leisurely begin to look for recipes for Christmas cookies; After baking the cookies, wrap them well and place in the back of the freezer.

It is very helpful to keep a list of what you have frozen to avoid confusion later on.

Outwit holiday blues and stress with early planning.

## PINATA PARTY

The pinata is an icebreaker. Customarily associated with Mexican Christmas, it is used for other party occasions.

It is more fun to construct than to buy the pinata. Instead of the traditional clay jar, use a cardboard container. An empty oatmeal box will do for a small pinata.

First fill the box of your choice with paper-covered candies, gum, nuts. Then thin strips of crepe paper are layered over the box, as a shape is developed. Curled paper can be used for lion manes, beards, curly hair or just for texture.

At the party blindfold a person, put a sturdy stick in his (her) hand, turn him (her) around three times and allow three chances at hitting the target.

## PINATA PROMISES

Taking a Mexican theme for a Christmas adult party, a California couple give the pinata tradition a new twist. They fill it with promissory notes instead of candy and other sweets.

The party guests think of a gift of future delivery, describe it on a card, and fold up the card to get stuffed into the pinata.

Baked goods are the most popular ideas, but other IOU gifts can include such items as choice of wines or a pound of

homemade fudge. With promises of food, it's a good idea to specify "on one week's notice."

## STOCKING STUFFER

Making gifts rather than buying them is a way to mobilize your creative energy. Most people buy jewelry, paying much more than the costume jewelry materials cost their manufacturers.

Unique earrings can be easily made from ordinary materials and purchased earring backs. Think of the beautiful buttons you've seen on the notions counter of a fabric store - rhinestone buttons, gold buttons, silver buttons, enameled buttons, buttons shaped like flowers, stars, strawberries or ducks.

All you need is two buttons, some clear glue and a pair of earring backs from a craft store (pierced if you know the recipient can use them, otherwise clip-on).

To make button earrings, just pull the button shank off with a pair of pliers, place a bead of glue on the cuplike

depression on the earring-back, and center on the back of the button. Allow to dry thoroughly.

Columnist John Lofton recalls that in 1975, another book, *Jesse Jackson: The Movement, The Myth* was written by Barbara Reynolds, a black woman reporter, who is now the editor of the *Inquiry* page of *USA Today*. This book reported

former Operation Breadbasket leader Ben Branch's statement: "My guess is Jesse smeared the blood (of Dr. King) on his shirt after getting it off the balcony... All I can say is that Jesse didn't touch him."

## Farm Borrowers Need Certification

RUIDOSO, NM, Nov. 11, 1986 - Farmers who apply for loans from the Farmers Home Administration will be able to certify that they are in compliance with certain soil conservation requirements related to highly erodible and wetlands, according to Acting County Supervisor, D. Forrest Peck.

"The 1985 Farm Bill prevents farmers from receiving benefits from USDA programs, including FmHA loans, unless they are in compliance with conservation procedures relating to 'highly erodible' and 'wet' lands," D. Forrest Peck said. "If they are in compliance, they can certify to that effect in the FmHA County Office. If they are not in compliance, they will have to have

a conservation plan developed by the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service and the Soil Conservation Service for the highly erodible land before FmHA can make them a loan."

The certification form to be signed by the applicant asks three basic questions dealing with cultivating highly erodible land not farmed before; wet areas converted for cropland since December 23, 1985; and future plans to convert wetlands. If the answers show that the farmer is in compliance, and he or she signs the "self certification" form, FmHA can process the loan application.

Any resident of the Carrizozo Municipal School District who is a qualified elector of the State of New Mexico who desires to become a candidate for the office of member of Carrizozo Municipal School Board shall file a declaration of candidacy substantially in the form required by Section 1-22-8 NMSA 1978 in the office of the Lincoln County Clerk, Lincoln County Courthouse, Carrizozo, New Mexico, on one day only, December 16, 1986, between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

Section 3. Any resident of the District who is a qualified elector of the State of New Mexico who desires to be a write-in candidate for the office of member of the Board shall file a declaration of intent to be a write-in candidate in the Office of the Lincoln County Clerk, Lincoln County Courthouse, Carrizozo, New Mexico before 5:00 p.m. on December 30, 1986.

Section 4. The Board positions and the length of terms for each position to be voted in this election are as follows:

Section 5. All precincts in the Carrizozo Municipal School District shall be consolidated for this election. The polling place for the single consolidated district shall be at the Office of the Superintendent, 800 D Avenue, Carrizozo, New Mexico. In addition, there will be an Absentee Voter District established, as described in Section 10 herein.

Section 6. The polls for said election will be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

on the day of the election.

Section 7. At such election, the following question shall be submitted to such qualified, registered electors of the District:

**PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TAX QUESTION**

"Shall the Board of Education of Carrizozo Municipal School District No. 7, Counties of Lincoln and Socorro, New Mexico, be authorized to impose a property tax of \$2.00 per \$1,000.00 of net taxable value of the property allocated to such District under the Property Tax Code for the property tax years of 1987, 1988 and 1989 for the purpose of the following capital improvements in the District, i.e., erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for or furnishing school buildings, purchasing or improving public school grounds, and maintenance of public school buildings or public school grounds, exclusive of salary expenses of employees of the District?"

Section 8. The tax contemplated by the capital improvements tax question shall be in addition to any tax imposed to pay debt service on any bonds or for any other purpose. Any qualified elector of the District who is not now registered and wishes to vote at such regular election must register during regular office hours at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County at the County Courthouse in Carrizozo, New Mexico, or at the Office of the County Clerk of Socorro County at the Socorro County Courthouse, Socorro, New Mexico, depending upon the county in which such elector resides, or at the office of any deputy registration officer appointed by the County Clerks of Lincoln or Socorro Counties (including the municipal clerks of all municipalities in Lincoln and Socorro Counties) prior to 5:00 p.m. on December 23, 1986.

Section 10. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner authorized by 1-6-1 NMSA 1978, et seq., provided that qualified electors may also vote absentee in person at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County during the regular hours and days of business from 8:00 a.m., January 8, 1987, being the twenty-fifth day preceding the election, until 5:00 p.m., January 30, 1987, being the Friday immediately prior to the date of the election.

Section 11. Voting shall be by voting machine, except for absentee voting which shall be by paper ballot. At least one voting machine shall be used at the polling place for each precinct.

Section 12. This Resolution and Proclamation shall be filed with the Lincoln County Clerk on or before November 28, 1986, and shall be published in Proclamation form in English and Spanish on the 4th day of December, 1986, in the Lincoln County News, having general circulation within the Carrizozo Municipal School
