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Commissioners Bid Farewell at Final Meeting

Lincoln County Commissioners met in regular session on Dec. 23 to conduct the last business for the year and the last business for their terms of office. Newly elected officials will be sworn in on Jan. 2 in the district courtroom in the Lin-

coln County Courthouse. Business conducted at the Dec. 23 meeting included announcing that certificates of appreciation will be given to county employees. These certificates were to be in with the regular paychecks. In other business, the low bid was accepted from LaMay Distributing of Carrizozo for the annual fuel supply for the

county. —The bid for the Alto paving was awarded to Bill McCarty Construction Company, Inc., of Ruidoso. McCarty submitted the low bid of \$2,330,290. The bid was low enough to allow the county engineer to make the following revisions and additions; double penetration surface treatment to be replaced by two in-

ches of hot mix and other additive items included to modify the low bid to \$2,836,563. The engineer's estimate was \$3,380,000. The additions and changes to the contract were made at the request of the residents of the Alto paving district as they requested asphalt. Commissioner Kenneth Nosker asked that the street by the Bonito

Volunteer Fire Department also be paved. —Joint powers agreement with the village of Ruidoso Downs was approved for the county to pay \$16,543.79 for paving the portion of Spring Road that is located in Lincoln County and for Ruidoso Downs to accept and maintain this portion of the road from this day forward.

—David Lee and Leota Pffingsten were reappointed to the Lincoln Historic Review Board. —The bid for lease on a loader and water truck was awarded to Rust Tractor. —Five bids were opened for emergency fire equipment for the Fort Stanton Fire Department. Each of the five bidders will get part of the bid

for the equipment. —District Judge Richard A. Parsons wrote a letter requesting the board of county commissioners to consider additional courtroom facilities. In his request for one additional small courtroom, Judge Parsons said that it would be a long range goal. The matter was tabled for the new commissioners to make a decision.

—A joint powers agreement with the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission was tabled. Administrator Fred Heckman requested that the county commissioners reconsider and sign the agreement, saying it must be changed from the former agreement because of rules of the FAA. Commissioner Gnatkowski and commissioner Elliott said they had not had enough time to study the new joint powers agreement and even if they were going to be in office for another two years they would not make a decision at this time.

—Commissioner Kenneth Nosker resigned as a member of the SBAC effective when the new commissioners appoint a representative. Nosker offered his services in any capacity as might be needed by the county commissioners in the future.

—Commissioners conducted a mid-year budget review and approved a resolution for budget increases to bring line items up to 50 percent. Line items included were a general fund increase of \$20,876 for the county attorney for litigation. The El Paso water lawsuit is now in court and the county has spent \$21,922 on this lawsuit and another \$3,237 on various other lawsuits.

The county road fund was increased \$400,000, the Health Center fund was increased \$20,075 which included part-time salaries, dental supplies and professional services, and a transfer from the senior citizens fund no 530 to the general fund in the amount of \$4,944 was made for repayment of loan for 1986 Renault Alliance vehicle.

Line items that had spent more than 50 percent were: equipment maintenance and repair for the manager's office, assessor's office, treasurer's office and maintenance with the explanation that some maintenance contracts are paid monthly, quarterly or annually. The annual contract caused the line item to go over 50 percent.

Other items were audit for Carrizozo Health Center 100 percent, lights 63 percent (electric bills are higher during the months of July, August, September and October) dues and subscriptions 85 percent, bureau of elections 69 percent, postage for the treasurer 55 percent (tax bills were mailed in October, this will be the majority of the treasurer's mailing,) binders for tax schedules, etc. for the year 52 percent, purchase computer ribbons for year 60 percent, and printing and publishing for assessor and treasurer were above 50 percent because of tax bills and notices of value that are ordered for the entire year.

Purchased vehicles for various departments brought capital outlay above 50 percent as did the line item for insurance. —A request by Tom Sullivan to have Sullivan Security Service put on the county radio frequency was approved.

—An executive session was held for litigation.

Cost Overruns Plague County Road Projects

Lincoln County Commissioners discussed the costs incurred to date on the work on Cedar Creek Road and Eagle Creek Road. The discussion was held during the Dec. 23 county commission meeting. An estimate of the costs was made and submitted to the commissioners on Sept. 30. The estimate stated the cost for Cedar Creek would be \$110,000 and the cost for Eagle Creek would be \$165,000. The estimates were made by Jack LaMay, who had been employed by the county on Sept. 9 to work with the county road department on a tem-

porary basis. The amount spent to date has been \$172,976.59 with outstanding bills amounting to \$117,466.30 for the two projects. This brings the total spent so far to be \$290,442.89 which is \$15,442.89 above the estimate. The project is far from complete, with a small amount of base course being put on Cedar Creek Road, no base course applied to Eagle Creek Road to date, and trees being removed. Commissioners stated that the scope of work had changed and caused the price to increase. The new scope included drainage, more culverts, and the tree removal. While there was no break-

down of costs, LaMay told the NEWS that the Eagle Creek Road should be completed at the estimated cost of \$165,000. He said that he and his crew of nine temporary employees have worked on Eagle Creek Road for ten days and had brought the culverts to the locations where they are to be installed. Commissioners explained that the county is leasing the equipment and LaMay and his temporary crew are doing the work. It was during this discussion about the county having hired a crew to do the work that Bill McCarty of Bill McCarty Construction Company, Inc. said that he thought

the county should maintain the roads and leave the building of the roads up to contractors. Commissioner-elect John Hightower asked if there was time to bid out the work. He said that putting the projects out for bid would tie the price down and there would be no cost overruns. The commissioners decided to terminate the leases for the equipment at this time. The temporary crew will not be working until after the new commission is sworn in Jan. 2. The work on Eagle Creek Road is to be completed by June 15 and the work on Cedar Creek is to be completed by Dec. 31, 1987. Cost overruns included (to date) \$13,886.68 for tree removal with only \$5,000 being allowed on the project; \$33,251.09 for culverts with \$9,040 being allowed; and costs for pit run and base course were not complete.



LEE PAYNE OF CAPITAN made excellent use of a once in a lifetime hunting opportunity when he shot this oryx on Monday. Water Changes Made

JJ's Companies, Inc. of Ruidoso was the low bidder to construct the new water system from the well site approximately four miles east of Capitan. The bid of \$498,382.92 was approved Monday evening at a special meeting of the Capitan Village Council called by Mayor Benny Coker. Trustee Dave Strickland stated that this allows us to stay within our budget and keeps the money in Lincoln County. Six firms bid on the project. The contractor's time begins 15 days after he is notified. The company has 180 days to complete the project. Airport administrator Fred Heckman appeared before the council. After his presentation the village trustees voted unanimously to approve the joint powers agreement with the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission. This agreement has been approved by the Village of Ruidoso, the Village of Ruidoso Downs, the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, and now the Village of Capitan. It was tabled by the Lincoln County Commis-

sioners on Dec. 23. The proposed amendment to the water ordinance was approved by the trustees. Mayor Coker stated that this will make the water department effective. Portions of the amendment read as follows: "All charges imposed in this Article shall be the responsibility of the owner of the property to which the service is provided regardless of whether occupied by tenants. The person (s) in whose name the water service is ordered shall post a deposit of fifty dollars prior to the installation of water service by the Village." "Should the bill for services provided become delinquent and remain unpaid for a period of three months, then the Village may file a lien against the property served, said lien to include all past-due charges authorized by this Article, reasonable attorney fees, and costs incurred by the Village in enforcing the provisions of the Article." "Water meters shall be read monthly; and, if need be, statements for service may be billed in pre-arranged monthly customer cycles to expedite billing and payment. All water bills shall be and become due and payable fifteen days after the mailing of a statement thereof on the respective billing cycle date. Should payment not be received with fifteen days of the due date, the Village Clerk shall, in the normal course of business, have the water meter turned off. The meter shall thereafter be checked periodically; and, should it show water usage,

said meter shall be removed forthwith by the Village; and a charge of fifty dollars shall be levied for said removal. A fee of \$75 shall be charged by the Village for replacing any meter removed, pursuant to this Article." A penalty of \$5 shall be charged each month until said bill is paid in full. The next stated meeting of the Capitan Village Council is January 12 at city hall. The time is 7 p.m.

Sullivan Commended for High Jail Standards

Lincoln County Commissioners conducted a regular jail inspection on Dec. 23. The inspection, a duty commissioners must perform, was held during the last scheduled meeting of the year and also the last meeting for the outgoing commissioners. The report issued by Commissioners Bill Elliott, Kenneth Nosker and A.W. Gnatkowski concerning the jail inspection commended Sheriff Tom Sullivan and his staff for maintaining high standards in the jail. The report further stated:

- (1) The jail facility was very clean and is currently run very efficiently.
- (2) The kitchen crew has been greatly improved with the new cabinets, stove, hood and plumbing.
- (3) The meals served are nutritious.
- (4) Personal hygiene

items are furnished to the inmates. (5) The installation of floor tile has improved the floor area in appearance and makes for easier and better maintenance. (6) New light fixtures have been installed. (7) The morale of the inmates was very high. A copy of the report by the commissioners was sent to the Honorable Richard A. Parsons, District Judge, Division III.

More than 25 lawsuits have been filed against John Connally and partner, charging non-payment of debts or failure to meet contractual obligations. Connally, former Texas governor auctioned horses one weekend in November and hoped to take in

\$600,000.

Key moments in Connally's career: 1963 - Riding with President John F. Kennedy, Connally was badly wounded in Kennedy assassination. 1973 - He switched political allegiance, from Democrat to Republican. 1974 - Grand Jury indicted him on bribery charges. While Treasury secretary under President Nixon, he was accused of taking \$10,000 in bribes. 1975 - Washington, DC, jury acquitted him. 1980 - He spent \$12 million in an unsuccessful bid for Republican presidential nomination.

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Behind the Headlines

Keeping the Mobs on the Run

Not since Al Capone was indicted for income-tax evasion in 1931 and sent to prison for eight years has the underworld been so shaken. With eight of the Mafia's top leaders convicted on racketeering charges and facing years in federal penitentiaries, the nation's crime families are in disarray.

John L. Hogan, head of the FBI's New York office, said the next stage in the government's war on organized crime will be to "hit these people in the pocketbook, to take businesses away from them. That's the way to really hurt them." For years, the Mafia families have used legitimate businesses as fronts for their criminal activities and to "launder" their ill-gotten gains. The most effective weapon against the Mafia has been the Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act, or RICO, which enables prosecutors to go after not only the crime bosses but the Mafia itself. "Today," said Hogan, "we don't just investigate one person but the enterprise. It would be like taking on a company and indicting and convicting the chairman of the board, the CEO, a couple of senior vice presidents and a couple of branch managers, all of which would have a long term effect on that company."

Until the RICO act was fully understood and utilized, said Hogan, "law enforcement authorities were 50 years behind the times in attacking the problem of traditional, organized crime. They got footholds throughout this country, but we're now on the offensive. What we now have to do is to identify emerging new groups and nip them in the bud before they, too, get the foothold that the older established crime groups got."

Among the criminal newcomers is United Bamboo, an organization that originated in Taiwan and now claims to have 15,000 members and branches in New York, Texas, California and a number of foreign countries. Eleven of its leaders were indicted and convicted of racketeering by a federal jury in New York last September. According to federal prosecutor, Anne Vitale, United Bamboo "deals with murder, guns and narcotics."

According to a 1986 report by the President's Commission on Organized Crime, United Bamboo is only one of several ethnic organized criminal groups to have emerged recently in this country, among them about a dozen gangs of immigrants from the Soviet Union. The New York City police department has assigned five detectives to what's called the "Russian desk" to deal with the problem. Says Joel Campanella, of the department's intelligence division, "There is a parallel to the Mariel boat lift when Castro sent over some of his criminals. Not all of the people allowed to leave by the Soviet government were persecuted Jews."

Law enforcement authorities also have their eye on labor racketeering. Hogan said the FBI will continue its investigation into a number of unions, "not because we are anti-labor but because we want to return the unions to the union members and rid the unions of organized crime control. We really believe this will have a positive impact on the nation's economy."

How a Talk Show Conned a Big Media Publisher and a Congressman

WASHINGTON — For 13 weeks this fall, the sidewalk in front of *The Washington Post* has been littered every Sunday with hundreds of returned copies of the newly designed *Washington Post Magazine*.

This campaign has now been concluded as one of America's most spectacular hustles, in which one black female radio station owner and talk show host has managed to con both her Congressman as well as the publisher of *The Washington Post*.

The *Post* authorities, led by publisher Donald Graham, refused to call the police and bring an end to this massive littering in our nation's capital, which had been organized by Cathy Hughes of radio station WOL. For Hughes' "The Washington Post Magazine Recall Committee" had hit a sensitive nerve. Although *The Post* has five times as much circulation in the predominantly white suburbs of Maryland and Virginia as it does in the District of Columbia, this newspaper's masthead, as well as its editorial offices, are in Washington, where the population is 70 percent black.

As overwhelming majority of *The Post's* editors, columnists and reporters are white. Its board of directors (who are paid \$25,000 a year to attend six meetings) was comprised, until this year, entirely of white males except for Board Chairman Katherine Graham, known widely as "The Most

Powerful Woman in the World." Then this year, the Board of Directors of the Washington Post Company desegregated, with the election of a black woman, attorney Barbara Scott Prieskel of New York.

The newly designed *Washington Post Magazine's* first issue had a cover story about a black musician who murdered a black dope pedler. There was also an unusually foolish column by Richard Cohen, in which he stated with Washington shopkeepers who, he reported, are either excluding from or putting under heavy surveillance all black males who come into their stores.

This and the absence of black males in the magazine's ads led radio's Hughes to organize the weekly "Take It Back" campaign. This was not a protest for a retraction, a correction or for equal space. This was a demand for the ultimate in prior restraint—a campaign to foid the magazine altogether, after *The Post* had spent millions of dollars in promotion and new staffing.

This campaign attracted the attention of the District of Columbia's Congressman, the Rev. and Hon. Delegate Walter Fauntroy. Mr. Fauntroy not only supported this demand for the ultimate in censorship, but he also favored a compromise settlement. This proposal included the following:

*One issue of *The Washington*

Post Magazine must be devoted to "negative coverage of blacks" (or, specifically, the exposure thereof — not more of, allegedly, the same.)

*Establishment of an external monitoring process of *Post* coverage.

*Submission of all of *The Post's* "sensitive items" about blacks to black *Post* staff members for their review before publication.

This alternate plan for racist prior restraint of anything the *Post* planned to publish about any blacks amounted to seizure of editorial control over everything that newspaper planned to publish about an entire race, by one of the nation's largest newspapers, which feeds news to 500 other media subscribers to its news service.

This was, among other things, the result of this campaign's having frightened even legendarily macho executive editor Ben Bradley, who apologized, for the first time in his journalistic life, to these demonstrators.

This spectacular coup, however, came somewhat a cropper. For there have been acrimonious denunciations of radio's Cathy Hughes for calling off the campaign after she obtained *Post* publisher Don Graham for three appearances on her talk show.

Graham's secretary, Pam Gazinski, confirms the fact that Don Graham rarely, if

ever, appears on talk shows. (He is liable to be kept very busy appearing on all of Washington's other black radio stations, who might organize a campaign to TAKE IT ALL BACK — and litter the *Post* sidewalks with the entire Sunday paper, unless Poor Don is willing to appear on their stations, too.)

Congressman Fauntroy took such a dim view of this that he resigned from Cathy's committee. As for her calling off the campaign (having snared Poor Don Graham), Fauntroy announced that this "fails to adequately respond to a collective sense of outrage in this community about negative depiction of black life and values."

Ronald Walters, Professor of Political Sciences at Howard University, denounced Mrs. Hughes for what he termed "a sellout." Walters also noted:

"There are people who will say that the committee operated in a loose fashion; but it was not so loose that someone could take it upon themselves to end the demonstrations."

There is currently a hot debate among members of the Hughes committee as to whether any vote was actually taken to approve her announcing the end of the campaign. Professor Walters said that many committee members were "shocked, surprised and confused" by the Hughes settlement. But Florida Marshall of the National Black Media Coalition and Joslyn Williams of the Metropolitan Washington AFL-CIO both supported Hughes.

So has *Post* publisher Don Graham — who may be just naive enough to think that this will be the final demand on *The Post* by clever black hustlers like Cathy Hughes.

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

Reagan had gone back to his days as a football player in the Middle West, where the team you play against is much like your own. It is as though he did not discern where the world of diplomatic dealing is lightyears away from that kind of approach to life.

BOSSISM: With Toney Anaya, it is more like a re-enactment of some of the governors of our state in the old days when simply the ability to get one's self elected conferred upon that person powers whose use the ordinary citizen would not challenge.

There has been, during the past four years, a strong feeling here that Anaya thought; simply because he had become our governor with wide support at the polls, that he was entitled to almost anything he wanted once he took office. If he hadn't thought that, he would not have been so amazed at the stir certain of his activities generated. He frequently appeared baffled by the reaction he caused, as though he felt the ordinary citizen had no say in the matter.

EDUCATION: To speak as delicately as possible, it is hard to believe either of these two gentlemen ever earned much of a real education.

Each seems to have been touched about as lightly by such efforts as it is possible to be while still holding college degrees. In the long haul, it is the citizens who paid the price for their lack of knowledge of the past.

The fact that it isn't college which makes the difference, in and of itself, is made clear by one man—Harry Truman. He didn't have much formal education, but he was well read. He knew his history—not just of the nation over which he ruled, but of the ancient and modern world as well. That stood him in good stead; in fact, it probably did more than anything else to keep him from being a disaster when he assumed the presidency.

It isn't clear that the word "disaster" applies directly and literally to either Reagan and Anaya, but even the most hopeful observer will admit it seems to fit them better than Harry Truman.

If we could have anything we want in the new governor of our state, some of us here would choose a depth of knowledge and appreciation of New Mexico's history, to use the past to help avoid problems in the present and future.
