The Association for Retarded Citizens (ARC) of Lincoln County has been in existence since 1983 and works to increase awareness, public knowledge and understanding of mental retardation.

Retardation is not a disease, nor should it be confused with mental illness. By definition, a person with mental retardation is one who develops at a below average rate and experiences difficulty in learning, social adjustment and economic productivity. In terms of tested IQ, the person scores below 70.

Mental retardation can be caused by any condition which impairs development of the brain before birth, during birth or in the early years. All individuals who are mentally retarded have the capacity to learn, develop and grow.

The month of March has been proclaimed Mental Retardation Month by President Reagan and locally by the Lincoln County Commissioners and Carrizozo Mayor Bob Hemphill.

During March, the ARC of Lincoln County has launched an awareness campaign to call attention to the needs and abilities of children and adults with mental retardation.

ARC of Lincoln County President Phyllis Schlegel noted that approximately 300 people in Lincoln County have some degree of mental retardation. The local chapter of ARC attempts to assist all ages of people with mental retardation and their families, according to Mrs. Schlegel.

ARC of Lincoln County meets quarterly, with the next meeting scheduled for April 27 at 7 p.m. at New Horizons Development Center in Carrizozo. Timely programs with updated information are presented at these meetings. Parents, family members and interested citizens are invited to attend.

Other activities conducted by ARC of Lincoln County are the sale of ARC greeting cards and calendars with proceeds being used for retarded citizens, donations of books to libraries in Lincoln County to help with the awareness campaign, and a bowling tournament scheduled for March 22 at the Carrizozo Rec Center with proceeds to go to ARC of Lincoln County.

Committee chairman Hal Sims unveiled a plan that calls for everyone projecting the same image. He said this is the most important phase of the plan, and will show that "we care" in the effort to entice industries and business to Carrizozo.

The master plan includes the cooperation of the town council, chamber of commerce, the economic development committee, civic groups and citizens. It will put each group or individual on the same organized path to set the destiny of Carrizozo to be bright and positive.

Reunion Plans Started

The program begins with defining assets to develop new industry and to improve the established assets. Also included are plans to improve relations with Santa Fe and the state economic development committee, correspondence with other states and foreign countries, and bringing information between all involved parties.

Solutions to problems of breakdowns in communications are presented such as: eliminate weeds in cracks of sidewalks and around signs, breaking the image of a dusty little town going nowhere, informing citizens of what is being done, obtaining a positive attitude from citizens, and developing and improving programs.

Federal regulations governing family planning projects require that fees be assessed for services rendered to patients with incomes above a certain level. The charges for various services are based on the actual cost of providing those services.

Fees will be assessed on a sliding scale bases on a patient's ability to pay. Both family size and gross annual family income will be used to determine the percentage of actual costs that a patient will be assessed. No one will be denied services because of inability to pay.

Sims told members that if the consolidation bill did pass that it would affect the economy of Carrizozo. He stressed that members contact Senator James Martin and

voice their opinions on the matter.

Dr. Dale Goad was appointed public relations chairman of the Carrizozo Economic Development Committee.

A discussion was held about People's Market that is held each year that last Sunday in July. Several options to increase interest and attendance were presented with one being to change the date with the Alumni Weekend the last weekend in June. A decision will be made at the April chamber meeting.

Capitan School Board Business

Funds available from all sources for the new football field and track total \$813,743.00. This was overbid by approximately \$139,000.

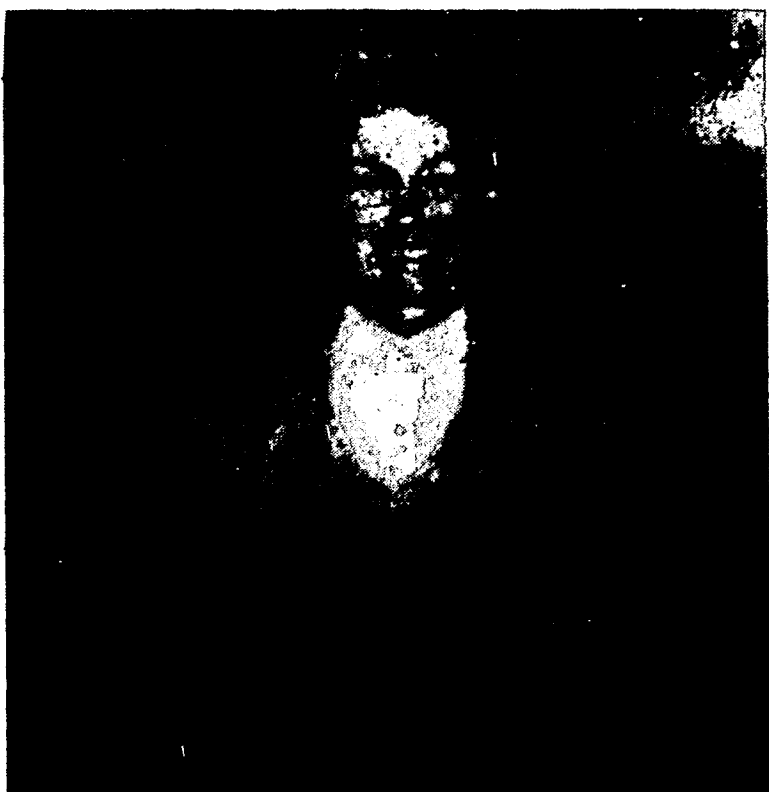
23-27, will be observed as originally planned.

WAKING UP

This week's column includes suggestions on what we (parents) can do concerning teen drug use. Parents all over the country - of every race, ethnic background, and social class, in cities and suburbs and small towns - are waking up to the dangers of marijuana and alcohol.

Marijuana, in particular, is of concern to many parents because of its widespread use and acceptance by many young people. Parents should educate themselves about marijuana, learn why and how it is used.

Some parents may become defensive and insist that marijuana use is not a problem in their families. This is a natural reaction for people who are frightened and confused. For many, a mark of disgrace is still attached to marijuana use. Some parents believe that the drug is used only by "bad" children of "unfit" parents.

MIND-ALTERING

What exactly is marijuana? Marijuana (also called

pot, grass, reefer, or weed) comes from a plant with the botanical name of Cannabis sativa, that grows wild and is cultivated in many parts of the world. Containing over 400 chemicals, this plant has the ability to intoxicate its users, primarily because of the psychoactive or mind-altering ingredient called delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol (THC).

It is the THC content found at various concentrations in different parts of the plant, which determines the potency. And the THC content is controlled by plant strain, climate, soil conditions and harvesting.

Typically, the marijuana used in cigarettes (joints) is made from dried particles of the whole plant except the main stem and roots.

In addition to harmful physical effects, scientists also believe that the drug may encourage a kind of psychological escapism. Young people need to learn how to make decisions, to handle success, to cope with failure, and to form their own

beliefs and values. By providing an escape from "growing pains," drugs can prevent young people from learning to become mature, independent, and responsible.

MARIJUANA JARGON

As parents we are not only trying to cope with marijuana but also with the drug's vocabulary. While drug terms are continually changing and are often different in various parts of the country, the following list may help us translate some marijuana jargon:

Acapulco Gold - a potent strain of marijuana with gold or yellow highlights.

Burnout - a slang term for a state of apathy and deadened senses which can result from habitual use of marijuana.

Buzz - slang term for a high or drug-induced sense of health and well-being.

Colombian - a potent strain of marijuana.

Dime - a quantity of drugs which sells on the streets for \$10.

Duster - cigarette made of tobacco, mint leaves, marijuana, or parsley sprinkled with phencyclidine (PCP), also known as angel dust.

Ganja - a potent form of Cannabis obtained from the flowering tops and leaves of the plant. It may also be used to refer to marijuana in general.

Killer weed - slang term for PCP-treated parsley or marijuana.

Nickel - a quantity of marijuana which sells on the street for \$5.

Ounce - a standard unit of measurement for marijuana.

Paraphernalia - drug equipment or gadgets usually sold in head shops.

Roach - the small end of a marijuana joint which remains after most of the cigarette is smoked.

Roach clip - a device used to hold the roach or the tail end of a marijuana joint.

Rolling papers - cigarette papers used to make a marijuana joint (cigarette.)

Space cadet - slang term for a habitual marijuana user whose senses have become dulled.

Spaced out - slang term for a drug-induced state of being lost or out of touch with surroundings.

Stash - any container or place used to store marijuana or other drug.

Toke - slang term for an inhalation of marijuana or hashish smoke.

Water pipe - paraphernalia used to smoke marijuana or hashish which filters the smoke through water. (Hashish is green, dark brown, or black resin extracted from the Cannabis sativa plant and smoked to produce a high.)

PEER PRESSURE

Most people are introduced to marijuana by their peers, that is, by people their own age, usually acquaintances, friends or even brothers and sisters. Pushers are rarely involved when a person first smokes marijuana. Peer group pressure is often strong enough to override the best parental influences.

A closer look may reveal that a child smokes marijuana to avoid rejection by others their age, to overcome shyness, or to cope with boredom or feelings of failure.

Do not condemn, judge or criticize - remember that chemical dependency is a disease. With the correct help a child can overcome this problem and live a healthy life.

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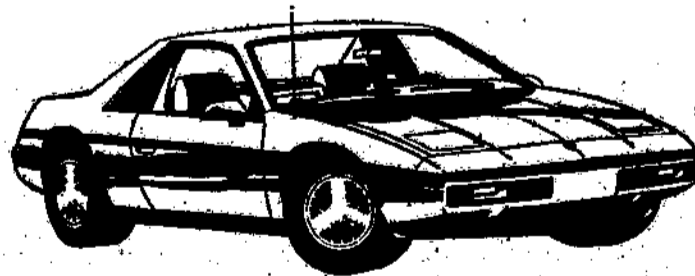
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Makes sense

A NEWS EDITORIAL

The proposed bill now in the New Mexico Senate Finance Committee calling for the consolidation of all schools with less than 500 average daily membership is causing concern for schools in Lincoln County. The bill, which was introduced by state senators from Santa Fe, Grants and Albuquerque will supposedly save the state \$16 million.

While the saving of state money is most important, the legislators who will be called upon to make a decision and vote on this proposed bill need to consider that the cost involved in transporting students the tremendous distances that would be required will reduce that saving to nothing and will probably cost the state more in the final reckoning. Costs involved in consolidation will not only include transportation costs, they will include building costs for bringing buildings in compliance with state regulations for the increased student load in the schools that will be teaching the students and will also include the loss of the use of the existing school buildings. These unused buildings will deteriorate to the stage they will need to be condemned and will become eyesores to the communities.

Another and perhaps even more important matter to be considered is the effect the proposed consolidation bill will have on the economy of the communities. Without the school systems, many small communities will wither and as teachers move away, the small community as we know it now will cease to exist. This proposed bill, if passed, will be the death knell to small communities.

Also to be considered is the effect it will have on students. Many of our students now have a bus ride of more than an hour each day to get to school and another hour to get home. If the consolidation bill is passed, these students will be required to be on the school bus more hours each day than they will spend in the classrooms.

Early comments about the proposed consolidation bill were not taken seriously but we have it from a state official that this bill should be taken very seriously. Any proposed bill that has five state senators pushing it through stands a good chance of being passed or so we have been told. Our only hope is to try and contact the necessary people and voice our objections to the bill and hope it will die before it becomes a law.

SB568 has now passed the Senate Education Committee and is in the Senate Finance Committee. Senator Morgan, head of the Senate Finance Committee, would be one person to contact. Another person to contact would be your local Senator and Representative. The number for the switchboard in Santa Fe is 984-9300. This number will put you in contact with access to any of the Senator's offices or the Representative's offices.

The entire matter is in the hands of the voters of New Mexico. Getting in touch with your elected officials is one way we can help save our schools, our student's futures, our communities, and possibly our way of life. It is up to you.

"The Trillion-Dollar Question": How to Restore America's Competitiveness

How to restore America's competitiveness in world trade and technology is the trillion-dollar question these days. Some experts argue that we need a cheaper dollar in order to lower the price of American goods. Others insist Japan and West Germany should stimulate their economies so they can buy more from us and reduce our huge trade deficit. In Congress, there are demands for legislation to protect US jobs and industry from unfair foreign competition. And so it goes. But a growing number of Americans are coming to realize that to do better in the world we also must do better at home.

Take education. Testifying before the Senate recently, Secretary of Labor William Brock said hundreds of thousands of our high school graduates cannot even read their diplomas! Admiral James Watkins, Chief of Naval Operations, has reported that 24,000 Navy enlistees each year - all with high school diplomas - read below the 10th grade level. And service manuals they need to understand require a 12th- to 14th- grade reading level. Meantime, the business branch of the Education Commission of the States has reported that in 1984, 700,000 students dropped out of school and 300,000 more were chronic truants. According to Donald Mathis, Executive Director of the National Youth Employment Coalition, "restoring America's competitiveness rests, to a large degree, on major investment in and restructuring of our education, employment and training systems."

Many educators keep insisting what's needed is greater emphasis on basics in the classroom. According to Lewis Branscomb, a Harvard University professor and former chief scientist for IBM, America's colleges and universities are "the best in the world. It's in primary and secondary education where we find our most serious competitiveness problem. Japanese eighth-graders, for example, know more math than most of our MBAs. And Japan graduates 85 percent of its students from high school, while the United States graduates less than 75 percent."

The business community also bears a responsibility in solving our competitiveness problem. A recent survey in Indiana found that fewer than 20 percent of the business respondents sold abroad. And when asked what percentage of their revenues they would like to be derived from exports, 63 percent answered "none." And Indiana is one of the Midwest's leading export states! Leonard Goldstein, president of Midland, Inc. of Fort Wayne, an Indiana concern that does stress exports, believes competitiveness requires more than better management. "The real problem," he says, "lies in our inability to interest US manufacturers, particularly small businessmen, in export markets. And those who do participate are unwilling to adjust their pricing and products to the needs and demands of their foreign customers."

Businessmen, therefore, know what should be done to compete. What remains is to do it!

No Time to Be Nice

SANTA FE—How come the media didn't give Garrey Carruthers the courtesy of the regular "honeymoon" most elected officials are accorded?

Or, as a longtime political observer asked me last week, "Why did even those of you who descended on Toney Anaya like so many vultures wait till after his first legislative session to make your voices heard, while this new guy has been reeling from the blows since the day he took office?"

The answer's very simple. This year, we don't have time to be nice.

STORM WARNINGS: To understand what that means, go back in memory to conditions at the time Toney Anaya was sworn in. If you remember how things were at that point, you know why some of us gave Toney a few more weeks grace than have been accorded Carruthers. To put it simply, we thought Toney had been bushwhacked.

While he ran for the top-most elected office in our state, Anaya had no reason to believe there was going to be a shortage of money at the time he took over. Only after the election-day votes had been counted did Bruce King, Toney's predecessor, give us a glimpse of the books, which showed how low the coffers were running.

That's tough on the man at the top. After making lots of plans and promises, he is

abruptly told that he had better change directions. He can't be a spender; and must suddenly change himself into a saver.

Watching that happen to Anaya created at least a twinge of sympathy in the hearts of those of us who observe things here, though that warm feeling was quickly dissipated by his subsequent performance.

THE NEW BOY: Carruthers, on the other hand, had no such experience. He knew from the very day he started his quest for the Republican nomination for governor that the state was in a money-short position. Though his constant smiles during the long campaign might have struck some of us as being less than appropriate for conditions, we knew prevailed in the exchequer, we took it for granted he was making plans in his head for how to deal with tough times.

So when he struck town after the votes had been counted and quickly began to give off messages that he had no more notion of how to solve the state's money problems than the next man, we were less than enchanted with him. That's when we started jumping on his back—because we thought he richly deserved that for going through a whole run for the job without preparing himself to take it over when the campaign ended.

The Meaning of Roald's Freedom

Roald Zeltichonok stepped off a train this month in Moscow, after serving 17 months in a Soviet labor camp. He still wore his prison shirt, and press accounts reported that he arrived looking dazed, perhaps as if he still could not believe he was free.

Zeltichonok was among 43 or so prisoners of conscience released from Soviet camps by a governmental decree. The announcement came suddenly and without fanfare, much as their arrests had months or years before. I celebrate the freedom of them all, but Zeltichonok's emancipation has special significance for me. Although I have never met him, I truly feel as though I know him.

I first heard of his case when I visited the Soviet Union in August, 1985. During my trip, I met informally with about a dozen people active in the Soviet Jewry movement, among them Galina Zeltichonok, Roald's wife. She told me, through tears, that Roald had been sentenced the night before to serve three years in a labor camp in the North. He was convicted of slander against the Soviet state, but his real "crime" was teaching Hebrew and wanting to emigrate.

I raised Zeltichonok's case repeatedly with Soviet officials and scientists whom I met on each leg of my eight-day trip. The responses were universally negative, reflecting the communist party-line that human rights issues are not an appropriate issue in U.S.-U.S.S.R. relations.

I continued to press high Soviet officials about Zeltichonok after I returned to the United States. Over the past year and a half, I have written to Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev and Soviet Ambassador to the United States Dobrynin repeatedly, asking clemency for Zeltichonok. They have never replied in writing. However, I cannot envision a more appropriate response than Zeltichonok's actual liberation.

Gorbachev's release of this recent wave of Soviet political prisoners indicates a realization that human rights will remain at the center of U.S.-U.S.S.R. relations, and will continue to affect the arms control, trade, and scientific and technological ex-

change facets of our relationship. Perhaps he has also begun to realize the futility of repressing his own people, the weakness inherent in suppressing cultural and religious differences.

While we should look on these events with some skepticism, we cannot afford to overlook the opportunity they also present. We should reward such Soviet actions with public praise and consider tangible ways by which we can encourage further human rights advances.

Roald Zeltichonok still faces problems. He still must treat his several serious illnesses in a society in which medical care is scarce and, often, of poor quality. Further, his release is apparently "conditional," implying that he will be closely watched by the authorities. He and his family still cannot immigrate to Israel, as they have sought to do for the past nine years. He is, however, reunited with his wife.

When I first met Galina Zeltichonok in Leningrad in 1985, she and friends spoke to me of the significance of Roald's arrest and sentencing. Because the authorities had singled out a relatively low-profile and mainstream dissident, these people told me, the Soviet officials are telling us to watch out, telling us that no one is safe from persecution. They referred to him as a symbol of just how far the Soviets would go to crush dissidence. Today, a year and a half later, Roald Zeltichonok is a different kind of symbol, one of possibility and hope.

As the most famous Soviet dissident, Dr. Andrei D. Sakharov, has said about the recent release of the political prisoners, including Zeltichonok: "It's not right to say that it's only propaganda or window-dressing...objectively, something real is happening. How far it's going to go is a complicated question." But it is a question in which U.S. government and public reaction can and should play a role in answering.

We cannot shrink from our responsibility to play such a role, not when there are as many as 1600 political prisoners still languishing in Soviet camps. The stakes are simply too high for the remaining Roalds and Galinas.

Close Loopholes! Urge proponents

The New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau is urging the state's Congressional delegation to close some loopholes in the new Immigration Reform and Control Act to avoid a labor shortage for some producers.

As the law is currently written agricultural workers who provided labor in the US during the period May 1, 1985 to May 1, 1986 will be eligible for the Special Agricultural Workers (SAW) program for documentation if they worked in the production and harvesting of certain perishable commodities for 90 man days.

However, several commodity groups are not eligible under provisions for the SAW program including livestock, meat, dairy, poultry and lumber operations.

Farm Bureau president, William McIlhenny, said the new immigration legislation will have a number of negative effects on agriculture in New Mexico and other border states if not amended. "We are asking our representatives in Washington to change the law to include workers in livestock, dairy and poultry operations in

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NEW MEXICO ROUND-UP

A memorial service was held Wednesday at the Holloman Air Force Base Chapel for the F-15 pilot who crashed in the desert three miles south of Holloman Air Force Base Monday morning.

The pilot, who died upon impact according to reports, was Lt. Col. Gene E. Jackson, 40, the chief of safety for the 833rd Air Division.

Jackson was flying a routine mission when he went down with his jet under some electrical power lines on Bureau of Land Management land. Fragmented remains of the \$20 million 1977 F-15 were strewn over hundreds of yards.

Four young men, allegedly out on a jaunt to poach antelope, traveled into tragedy last week in a remote area south of Clines Corners.

Ronnie Michael Martinez, 20, of Santa Fe, froze to death during the night of Wednesday, Feb. 25, after trying to walk for help from the men's stranded vehicle.

According to statements made to State Police by the survivors, the four Santa Fe men left US-285 in their large, 4-wheel-drive vehicle and traveled on and off the snow covered and muddy ranch roads west of the highway near North Lucy, looking for antelope.

After some time, the vehicle became stuck or wouldn't start. At about 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday evening, Martinez and one companion, Orlando Maez, left the truck to walk for help. The other two men, Anthony George, 20, and a 17-year-old minor, stayed behind.

At about 7:30 the next morning, Maez returned to the truck and told the other two men that Martinez had frozen to death. Maez himself was suffering from hypothermia, so the other two men walked to the highway, hitchhiked to Santa Fe laundromat attendant Mary Ann Romero.

The plea came at a hastily called hearing one week after District Judge Bruce Kaufman refused to move the 16-year-old's trial from Santa Fe because of pre-trial publicity.

Roybal, in accepting the plea agreement, could receive minimum sentence of 14 years and a maximum of 30 years in prison. Roybal also may be called on by prosecutors to testify against his mother, Gloria Bustos, in Romero's slaying. Her trial is set tentatively for June in Albuquerque.

Development of a new campground and facilities at Elephant Butte State Park will help alleviate overcrowding and overflow conditions during peak usage periods at the park, according to a recent study by the state and federal governments.

Los Alamos National Laboratory paid a private law firm nearly \$600,000 of taxpayers' money to negotiate a \$500,000 out-of-court settlement with four Rio Arriba county men whose supervisor at the lab smeared himself with plutonium in 1982 and then tried to blame the four.

The lab announced the settlement in December but refused to say how much it spent on legal fees.

The US Department of Energy (DOE) admitted last week that the Montgomery and Andrews law firm of Albuquerque and Santa collected \$772,451.55 to prepare the case for trial and negotiate the settlement. That figure doesn't include salaries and expenses for the lab's own lawyers to work on the case.

Espanola teenager Greg Roybal pleaded guilty Thursday to second-degree murder in the April shooting death of Interior's Bureau of Reclamation for the Southwest Region recently released its Draft Environmental Assessment that calls for "proposed upgrading, replacement and expansion of recreation facilities at the state park."

the SAW program," McIlhenny said. "Whether this was an oversight or an error we need to fix it before many of our producers find themselves without adequate labor."

Under the SAW program, aliens who have been living in the US and working in production agriculture are eligible for citizenship provided they meet certain qualifications.

"This is where we run into problems. Livestock and dairy operations, among others, are not included in this program and we need to change that before this measure adversely affects a large segment of the industry," McIlhenny said.

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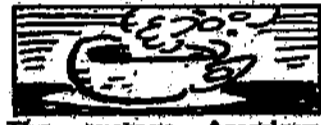

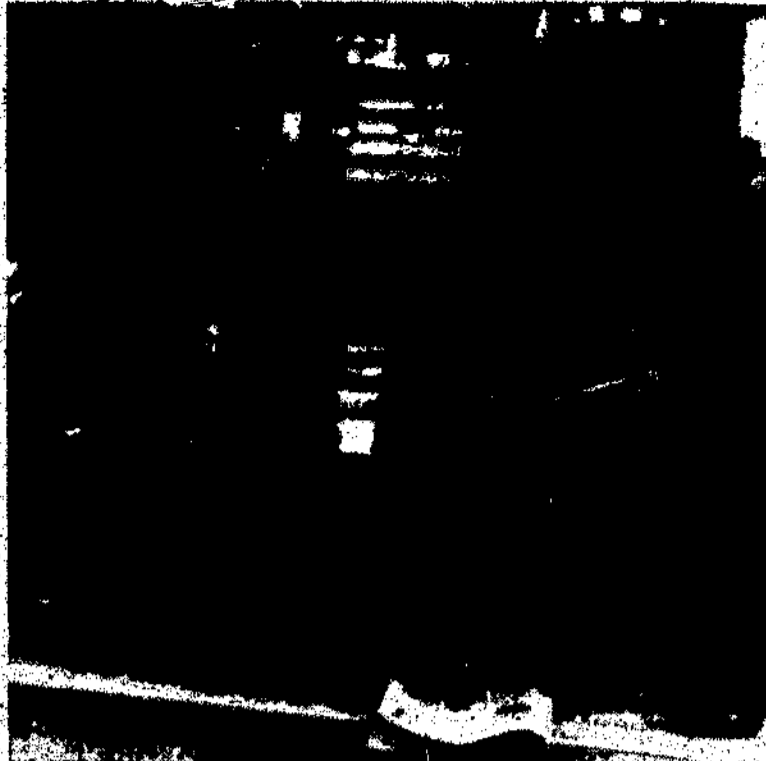
My wild violets are blooming, and I am reminded of my mother's love for picking them this time of year in Arkansas when she was a young girl.

Students in need of supplemental financial aid for college were urged today to write for a free copy of "How to Play Grantsmanship", distributed by The Scholarship Bank. Additionally, each booklet will be accompanied by an application for a five hundred dollar scholarship.

According to the director of this nationwide non-profit foundation, over half a billion dollars is available to high school and college students, and in many cases can cover up to twenty-five percent of a student's academic year expenses. These funds are contributed by corporations, trade, civic and non-profit foundations and are normally awarded on non-traditional basis such as academic merit, anticipated college major, geographic preferences, and even on the student's ability to consider a special research project or entering a contest.

Parental factors, such as union, employer or past military experience are also considered by some donors.

The Scholarship Bank works with financial aids offices in high schools and colleges around the country to distribute information on the over 3,000 different programs in its computer bank. Each student receives a personalized print-out based on his or her individual needs. Each scholarship has a value of at least one thousand dollars, and many are renewable yearly. According to the director, graduate level grants with awards in excess of \$25,000 are also available. All applicants receive up to 65 different aid sources.

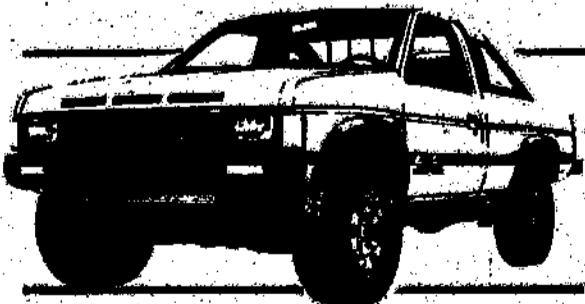
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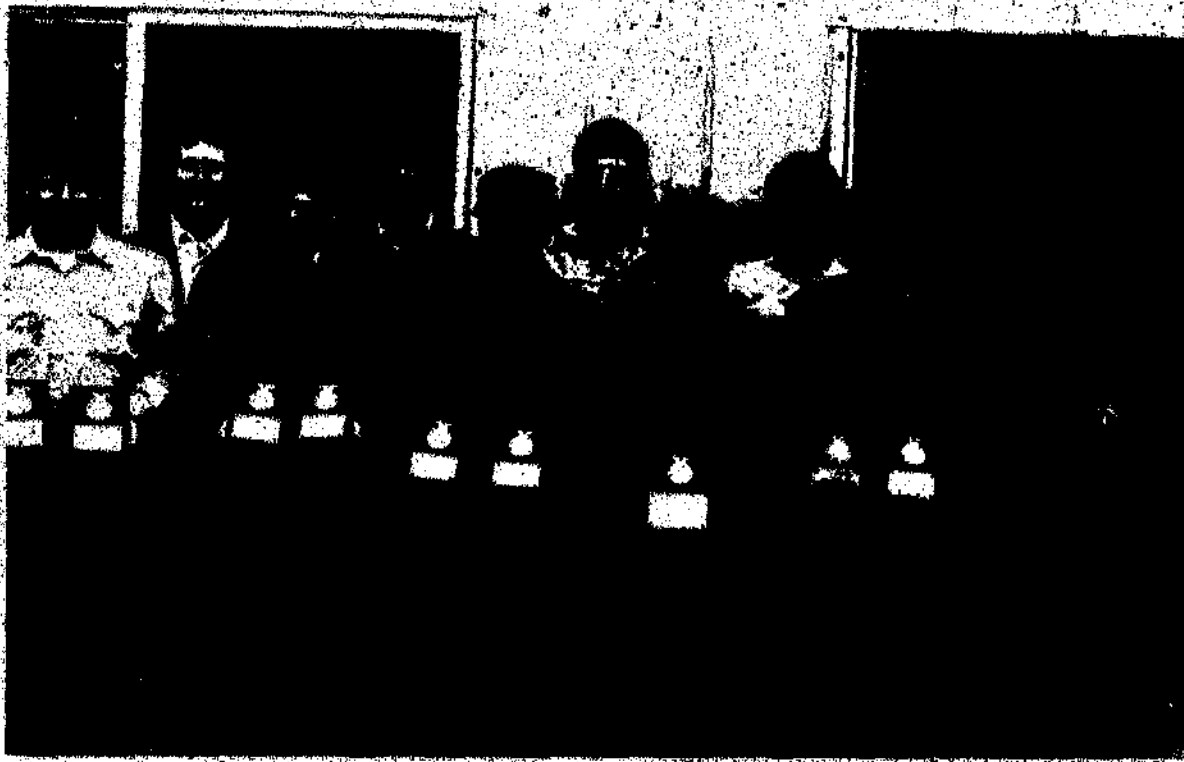

Attach All Documents To Returns

Before you mail your federal tax return, be sure you have attached all supporting documents and schedules, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) says.

Documents such as earning statements, schedules, statements verifying deductions, or other pertinent information should be securely attached to the tax form. Taxpayers must include W-2 forms from all employers, regardless of the amount of earnings.

Missing documents can cause processing errors, refund delays, and create confusion and inconvenience for the taxpayers, the IRS says. In most instances when a required form or schedule is not with the tax return, the IRS must contact the taxpayer to request the missing item before continuing to process the return.
