## Bids approved for \$800,000 sports complex at Capitan

Bids were opened March 27 for building construction and site work for the new Capitan sports complex.

The board of education approved the low bid of \$269,541.00 for Item I and \$38,420.00 for Item II. Item I included all buildings with the exception of the weight room. Item II was the bid for the weight room. Pioneer Western Construction Inc. of Ruidoso was the successful bidder. Nine firms submitted bids on the buildings.

The low bid of \$291,076.00 and \$4,100.00 from Ballard and Sons Construction of Carlsbad for the site work was also approved. Four firms bid on this part of the project.

Other bids approved by the school board included: field lighting, Kelly Electric, \$45,960.00; equipment, Vibra-Whirl, \$12,440.25; fencing, American Fence, \$22,894.00; design, \$34,000; Otero Electric, \$100.00. This part of the project totals \$721,531.00.

Other budget items include: track surfacing, \$38,000.00; bleacher end section, \$1,500.00; well and irrigation, \$30,000.00. There is a contingency fund amounting to \$22,343.00. These items total

\$91,843.00. When added to the \$721,531.00 these two figures total \$813,374.00. This is the amount of money available for the project.

Earlier bids exceeded the amount of money available by \$139,000 and were rejected by the board of education.

It was learned Wednesday morning that the last remaining obstacle with reference to the land swap with the US Forestry Service had been approved.

Other school related items: April 4, Tiger track teams to Texico meet. The track teams travel to Tularosa

on April 11. The FFA people will be in Las Cruces April 1-4 for state judging. Math and science teams from grades 7-12 will compete in the Mountain Top Math and Science Bowl April 8. The Mock Trial Team goes to Cloudcroft April 7, and the state competition is in Albuquerque April 10 and 11. High school students are looking forward to the Junior-Senior Prom scheduled for April 25 at Cree Meadow Country Club in Ruidoso. April 8 is the next stated meeting of the Capitan Board of Education. The board meets in the old elementary building at 7 p.m.

## Carrizozo Golf Course Lease Talks Started

The Carrizozo Board of Trustees is considering the possibility of leasing the golf course. Ted Turnbow spoke to the board at the March 24 meeting and discussed terms that might be included in the potential lease.

Turnbow said he would like to get the golf course in shape and gradually take time to open the pro shop. A tentative agreement was reached, pending completion of a formal lease.

In other business, Hal Sims, chairman of the Carrizozo Economic Development Committee, asked for the town to consider adopting Plan A of the Carrizozo Economic Development Projection as submitted at the March 10 meeting.

He asked that the plan be used as a guideline to use with the Economic Development Committee and the city council working together. The plan was formally adopted.

Action was tabled on a business registration application submitted by Woodrow Schlegel for Plains Mobile Home Park at 600 B Avenue, "for rent prepared mobile home spaces to mobile homes on a long-term rental basis."

## Preschool Screening for Corona

Pre-school screening and kindergarten registration will be held Friday, April 10, at Corona Elementary School.

Any child who is presently 3 to 5 years of age is encouraged to come by the school between 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. for hearing, vision, speech, and language screening.

Also, children in the Corona area who will be 5 years old by Sept. 1 should register at the school on April 10.

Trustee Albert Baca reported that the Knights of Columbus will take over the care of Fred Chavez Park, across from the Catholic Church, and he asked that the town get the park in shape before it is turned over to them.

Trustee Patsy Sanchez reported that rose hedges and drip irrigation are to be installed in Fred Chavez Park, using funds from the Beautification Project.

The safety policy was adopted after changes were made for the probation period for employees to coincide with

the personnel policy of six months for the probation period.

A discussion was held concerning usage of city equipment by city employees.

The town will advertise for bids for a new fire truck with state approved specifications. Bids will be accepted until 4:30 p.m., April 28.

The pre-election brochure was discussed for the general obligation bond election scheduled for May 19. Voters will be asked to approve general obligation bonds for the purpose of constructing and purchasing a system for supplying water for the town.

## Mistrial in White case

District Judge Richard Parsons declared a mistrial in the case of the State of New Mexico vs. Connie White. The jury trial began March 23 and lasted four days.

Judge Parsons retained jurisdiction in the case and it must be retried within six months from the order of the mistrial.

Charges filed in the case were for breaking and entering in the Alto area on Ski Run Road on Oct. 28, 1986.

Assistant District Attorney Harry G. Wilcox Jr was unable to comment on the case as the matter is still pending.

## Man jailed, for larceny, burglary

Dan Wienbrenner of Mesalero is in Lincoln County Jail charged with burglary and larceny.

Sheriff Don W. Samuels said the burglary occurred in the Fawn Ridge area and involves the loss of jewelry, of which \$4500 worth has been recovered. He expects to recover more of the stolen jewelry.

Wienbrenner has been formally arraigned before Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr. on the charges.

## Turn Back Clocks on Sunday!

Sunday is the magic day when Daylight Saving Time will begin. The official time to set clocks forward one hour is 2 a.m. on April 5, but many people will change their clocks at bedtime on Saturday.

Daylight Saving Time has been advanced three weeks this year but the ending date will remain the last Sunday in October.

When in doubt, remember to Spring Forward, Fall Back. Clocks should be set one hour ahead on Sunday.

Daylight Saving Time has been in effect in the United States since 1966 and is observed for the six summer months of the year.

## Non-voters may lose their registration

Lincoln County Clerk Fran Siddens announced that voter cancellation notices were mailed on March 19 to persons who did not vote in the 1986 primary election and did not vote in the 1986 general election in November.

Siddens said any person who received a card and wishes to remain on the voter lists should sign the voter cancellation notice and return it to the county clerk's office. The county clerk's office is required by law to purge the names of non-voters from voter lists. Persons receiving the cards have 60 days from the date of mailing to return the cards.

A board of registration consisting of Dorothy Talley, chairman, Bill Elliott and Pat Hume, will meet on May 20 to make a final determination as to who has responded to the notice and who will actually be purged from the registered voter lists. Persons not returning the card will be purged and must re-register to be allowed to vote in any future election.

PFK sponsored a March 27 field trip for grades 1-4 to the Omnitheater and zoo in Alamogordo, and plans to fund a science class visit to Elephant Butte Dam to study hydroelectricity.

Earlier this year, PFK helped send the 4th grade class to the New Mexico Natural History Museum.

**"Takers" put it  
to "Givers"**

**SANTA FE**—The "takers" did well during this year's legislature, but they put it to the "givers."

Those of us whose part in government is more or less limited to paying our taxes got stuck once again. For the third time in the last 13 months, they put more burdens on us, in the evident belief that we will go on laying those golden eggs indefinitely.

**THE WINNERS:** Our shiny new governor, Garrey Carruthers, made out like a bandit during legislative session 1987. Lawmakers played games with him, appearing reluctant to give him what he wanted till it was almost time to go home. But then they handed over most of what was in his program to get him to go along with what they wanted from it all.

He now gives us his bright smile and says, "Well, since I got almost everything I asked for, I guess it's now up to me to

show what I can do with it."

You got that right, brother. We'll be watching closely—and some of us will be remembering how you told us tax increases would be considered by you, but only as a "last resort."

Before you were in office three months, that "last resort" was reached, and you didn't even make the pretense of blaming it all on those mean old lawmakers. Before they even hit town, you were already urging them to up our taxes.

They did, so you could have what you wanted and they could have what they wanted. Who cared about what we want?

**THE MENU:** Lawmakers and governor alike desired something that would at least look like they had cured the problems with workers compensation insurance. The

governor wanted his program, including some reorganization of government that was mostly cosmetic and some half-baked ideas like "merit" pay raises. The legislators, with almost no exceptions, wanted to avoid having to face the notion of cutting back the size of state government, while they got a share of porkbarrel projects to take home and wave like banners before their constituents.

So for 56 days, they all waltzed with one another, pretending to be enacting legislation but getting little or nothing of substance done. Then, in the last four days of the session they all fell into each other's arms and awarded themselves pretty much everything that was wanted.

**THE LOSERS:** Now to do all that, as was clear from the very first hour, they had to raise our taxes again, as they did during two preceding legislative sessions. They did that in a fashion few of us will ever be able to forget.

What they decided is that each one of us, from the youngest newborn to the governor himself, will be required to pony up something like 150 bucks more next year, on top of what we are already paying to keep state government operating.

"Why we didn't do badly" one lawmaker told me after the session ended. "We only upped government spending from the general fund by 3 percent."

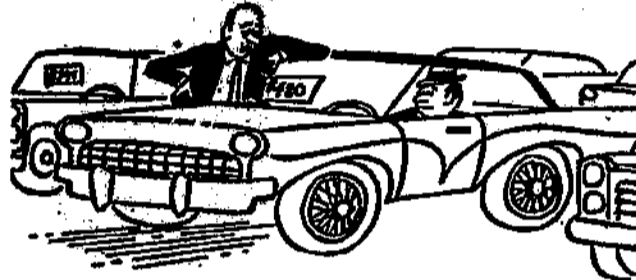
After all, this is just one more year in a continuing

series in which those appropriations to the general fund have continued to rise. Who of you out there can remember when the last major cut in overall state government spending took place?

The sad thing is that we hold still for this, year after year after year. Wouldn't it be nice if one year those on the public payroll took their turn as the losers?

## ALL'S FOOLS' DAY

Ever wondered how April Fools' Day came about?

In English-speaking countries, men, women and children play absurd but harmless jokes on April Fools' Day, the first day of April. The victim is called an April Fool. The observance originated in France after the adoption of a reformed calendar by Charles IX in 1564.

France was the first nation to adopt this calendar. Up to that time, the New Year celebration began March 21 and ended April 1. When New Year's Day was changed to Jan. 1, some people still celebrated it April 1. These people came to be known as April fools.

The custom of fooling friends and relatives on that day became popular in France, and spread to other countries. It was widespread in England by the 1600s. In France, the victim is called an April fish. In Scotland, he is called an April gowk.

## TWELVE MILLION

Marvelous Marvin Hagler and Sugar Ray Leonard fight for more than the World Boxing Council middleweight title in Las Vegas.

Hagler, defending champ and unbeaten in 11 years, is guaranteed a minimum \$12 million; Leonard, at least \$11 million.

The fight begins at 10:30 p.m. Eastern time from the sold-out 15,336-seat Caesars Palace arena. The bout will be shown via closed-circuit at more than 1,000 locations worldwide.

Hagler defends his undisputed world middleweight title in a 12-round fight against Leonard, former world welterweight champion.

Undeclared in 11 years, Hagler has a 62-2-2 record, with 52 knockouts, against Leonard's 33-1-0 record, with 24 KOs. Sugar Ray's last fight was on May 11, 1984—his only fight in the last five years.



OPINION

● I know it's no big deal, but I'm back at the Lincoln County News after a five-month hiatus. A lot of history sped past during that time, including the arms sale to Iran and diversion of money to the contras fighting a communist regime in Nicaragua. To the "useful idiots" serving the Kremlin in the US Congress, I hereby dedicate the words of the late Will Rogers: "We are the only nation in the world that waits till we get into a war before we start getting ready for it."

● It was equally disconcerting to miss some comment on the disposition of a questionable historic treasure, the wallet of Deputy Sheriff Bob Olinger. ● "Mr. Jim Galeway and Miss Georgiana Bentlow were married Monday at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alex Bentlow, the Rev. A. A. Deckett officiating. The groom is a popular young bum who hasn't done a lick of work since he got expelled in his junior year at college. He manages to dress well and keeps a supply of spending money because his dad is a soft-hearted old fool who takes up his bad checks instead of letting him go to jail where he belongs.

● "The bride is a skinny, fast little idiot who has been kidded by every boy in town since she was 12 years old. She paints like a Sioux Indian, sucks cigarets and drinks mean corn liquor when she is out joy-riding in her dad's car at night. She doesn't know how to cook, sew or keep house. The house was newly plastered for the wedding and the exterior newly painted, thus appropriately carrying out the decorative scheme, for the groom was newly plastered and the bride freshly painted. The groom wore a rented dinner suit over athletic underwear of imitation silk, and his pants were held up by pale green suspenders. His number 9 patent leather shoes matched his state in tightness and harmonized nicely with the axle grease polish of his hair.

● "P.S.—This is probably the last issue of this paper, but my life ambition has been to write up one wedding and tell the truth. Now that it's done, death can have no sting."

Small can be beautiful

The biggest is not always the best and brightest.

A tiny Massachusetts elementary school whose teachers are among the lowest paid in the state is one of the nation's finest.

Hawlemont School in the hill country of Charlemont, Mass., has 145 pupils. The highest paid of its 10 teachers (a nine-year veteran with a master's degree) receives \$17,300 annually, only \$200 more than the beginning-teacher salary in urban Boston. Yet, little Hawlemont is among the nation's 257 finalists in the U.S. Department of Education's program to recognize outstanding elementary schools.

How do you reconcile that? Commitment and dedication by the teachers? A sense of community? The capability of some children to learn better than others? A rural environment less stressful than an urban environment? Maybe it takes a sociologist to analyze the reasons why one particular school rates better than another, but one general conclusion can be reached: Higher teacher salaries and massive increases in educational funding will not necessarily assure better educated students.

THE BELL TOLLS FOR OUR MOST FRAGILE CITIZENS

Perhaps he was once a teacher or a miner. Maybe he was a friend of your next door neighbor, or your own son.

And, then there is her. Maybe she once studied art, or had her own business and family.

But we see him slumped on a steam grate. We listen to her scream in anguish, in terror.

These are a special group within that sad population we know as the homeless. These are the mentally ill, sad persons who we find sleeping in a doorway or huddled under a bench, their belongings piled in a cart.

Whatever they were, wherever they come from, however they look, think, or smell today, they are part of us. We are part of them.

In the 17th century John Donne wrote, "No man is an island, entire of himself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main; ... any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind; and therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee."

The bell tolls for us, as we struggle to improve the lot of our nation's homeless population. And the saddest fact of all is the high proportion — some say as high as 50 per cent — of these people who suffer from severe mental illnesses.

As a people of compassion, we can — and we must — reach out to help the street people, particularly those who suffer serious mental illnesses.

In an effort to lessen the problem, I have introduced a five-year plan to aid the mentally ill among the homeless. Called the "Services for Homeless Mentally Ill Individuals Act of 1987," my bill identifies five key principles of service needed to help these persons in despair.

Outreach—The mentally ill among the homeless, by definition, often lack the rationality to recognize their distress and enter a treatment program on their own. My bill will pay for outreach workers to seek out those who need help, seek them out

whether they are huddled in a park or slumped in an alley. Transitional Housing—Once we have found these sad people, we must give them shelter and a warm bed. My bill provides funds for housing. This would likely be a group house, where lives can be rebuilt, where people can receive treatment, and begin the transition from the grate back to self-respect.

Treatment—Of course, medical and psychiatric treatment will prove vital in rebuilding lives. We have made great strides in medication for mental illnesses, but each person will need special care and attention. My bill pays for this help.

Case Management—This service might be called the surrogate parent. Persons with mental illnesses need those daily reminders of life, reminders to dress warmly, take their medicine, to eat dinner. This assistance will also help the mentally ill among the homeless enroll in existing government assistance programs, such as supplemental income, food stamps, and Medicaid.

Training—Shelter staff, case managers, outreach workers, they will all need special skills and understanding for dealing with the mentally ill among the homeless. They need training in techniques to recognize and initiate treatment for serious mental illness. My bill will provide this special training on ways to

help a person who is hallucinating, suffering delusions, or is otherwise disoriented.

Such a long-term approach is vital. This fragile, needy population can't be returned to the sunshine tomorrow. Perseverance will be as important as dollars.

But dollars will be important, too. My bill provides \$200 million a year for five years, money that will go to those states and cities willing to provide a 25 per cent match. That money then must be used to offer the five principles of service I have identified. They can offer more, but not less.

The legislation also expands funding to the National Institute of Mental Health to assist with the program evaluation and local staff training.

In drafting this bill, I conferred with some of the nation's top experts on mental illness; they endorse my approach. These include the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill, American Psychiatric Association, American Psychological Association, National Mental Health Association, Mental Health Law Project, National Council of Community Mental Health Centers, and National Association of State Mental Health Program Directors.

Many things can and will be achieved to help that whole group of citizens we call the homeless. But our compassion, as well as our common sense, tells us that we must make a special effort for those who suffer debilitating mental disorders.

The bell tolls. The time to act is now.

# USDA Accepts 50,086 Acres of Highly Erodable Cropland

The US Department of Agriculture has accepted 50,086 more acres of highly erodible New Mexico cropland into the Conservation Reserve Program.

"In the latest signup, farmers submitted bids on 58,711 acres on 202 farms. These bids for annual rental payments ranged as high as \$120; however, the cutoff point for bid acceptance was \$40," said Ray T. Margo Jr., who

heads the department's Soil Conservation Service in New Mexico.

Land entered into the Conservation Reserve, as directed by the Food Security Act of 1985 (FSA), cannot be farmed for 10 years and must be planted to permanent cover.

Participants will receive cost-share payments of up to 50 percent of the one-time cost to establish grass and trees on the reserve acres.

Farm land signed up to date in New Mexico totals 450,974 acres. During the first three signups, USDA accepted bids to enter 400,888 acres on 1,176 farms into the reserve.

Margo said the next signup period will be July 29 through July 31.

"The Conservation Reserve Program offers an excellent opportunity for farmers to comply with the conservation provisions of the FSA, also known as the 1985 Farm Bill," Margo said.

The Farm Bill states that in order for landowners to maintain eligibility for most USDA commodity programs, highly erodible land kept in production must be included in a conservation plan by 1990, and those planned conservation practices must be completed by 1995.

"By enrolling highly erodible land into the Conservation Reserve Program, farmers will ensure themselves of income from that land for at least 10 years, and they will not jeopardize their eligibility for commodity payments or programs on their other land," Margo said. "It's as close to an everything-to-gain, nothing-to-lose program as you'll find."

All USDA programs are available to anyone without regard to race, color, creed, sex, age, handicap, marital status, or national origin.

## Lincoln County Sheriff's Report

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department has released the monthly activity report for deputies and the jail monthly log for January.

During January 1987 there were two accidents with injuries, seven accidents without injuries, 116 traffic stops, 16 citations issued, one citation for D.U.I. (driving under the influence), six traffic details, nine arrests, 32 motorist assists, four attempts to locate (check on older people, etc.), 48 offense/incident reports, 86 cases handled with no reports, 32 animal calls, and four special assignments.

The criminal investigation division reported 13 investigations cleared, 10 investigations active, five narcotic related cases, \$1,230 value of narcotics seized, stolen property valued at \$390 recovered, eight felony arrests, 21 calls handled, and three search warrants.

The administration report: 20 hours light duty, deputy, 62 civil papers served, \$3,067.13 in writs, money or property received, seven hours bailiff or court time, 12 prisoner transports, and 40 man hours of meetings/training.

# Lincoln County Long Ago

By RUTH HAMMOND

The Lincoln County Leader, Devoted to the Best Interests of Lincoln County and the Development of Its Resources, published in White Oaks, Lincoln County, NM.

Saturday, Dec. 19, 1891  
A letter from California from Mrs. Lane, dated Dec. 4, '91, and printed on the front page of the Lincoln County Leader.

Dear Major:  
"Sun, silence and adobe, this is New Mexico in three words," according to Mrs. Summers. "I am glad to see by your paper that the silence of White Oaks will be broken at no distant day by the whistle of the locomotive. The people there have listened for it a long time and have patiently "held the fort," not idly by any means, but working while they waited. Some have been called home to rest forever, not seeing during their lives, the fruition of their hopes. It is left for those who come after to reap the benefits of their self denial. "New Mexico is a terra incognita to most of our California people. I have been asked many strange questions about things there. A good many have, or have had relatives in New Mexico; but when you ask "where?" well, you find their ideas are very vague—it is a country lying off loose somewhere but when you get your R.R. then you will find people coming to White Oaks to spend their summers and enjoy its beautiful scenery. I think I shall go myself on the first excursion."  
(The rest of the letter tells of being on a steamer.)

Another front page item is this letter from Elkhorn Nov. 25th, '91

Editor, Leader—Thinking you would like to hear from the southern portion of Lincoln

County I will give you a synopsis of the doings here and hereabouts.  
The farmers are gathering their corn—the wheat is all threshed. Some cattle are being driven to Eddy and El Paso for butchering. They bring from \$15 to \$20 per head.  
Frank Garst got married and is now happy.  
The Elk Horn school house that the trustees have had built this fall was completed and the patrons met on Thanksgiving day and had the finest dinner you'd wish to sit down to. We would like to have Thanksgiving come oftener than once a year.

Is Lincoln County's School Superintendent dead. He has never visited this part of the county, and the people over here are ignorant as are those of Arkansas as to how he looks. Speaking of Arkansas, it is said that there was a family living in the mountains there that didn't know that Christ was dead 1800 years after His crucifixion. I am sure that if our School Superintendent were a Republican he would have been around. They are never ashamed to be seen.  
It is circulated around that the C.A. boys are going to build a flouring mill, which would help the county more than would the White Oaks R.R., and if J.F. Hinkle and J.B. Matthews set their heads to build a mill one will surely be built.  
If the White Oaks R.R. should be built we want a new County with County seat at Tularosa and the county named, Riley, and Riley County would bloom and blossom early in the season. Why, you can ride out of snow two feet deep down to town in 6 hours on a mule to find peaches in full bloom.

Saturday, January 9, 1892

better and richer today than at any previous time in her life history. This has caused other properties to be developed until it looks as though White Oaks would have such a rush of miners in the spring as she never had before. With the new bridge and the wagon road shortened, there is no reason why Socorro should not reap a rich harvest the coming year from the business of that thriving camp—Socorro Chief tan.  
From Nogal,  
Jan. 6th, 1892

Dear Major:  
There was a "tempest in a teapot" here on Saturday. Some soldiers came to Nogal and got into trouble with citizens. Which side commenced it I don't know—a good many shots were fired but nobody hit. Tom Henley is on the trail of the peace despoilers and you may expect to "hear something drap." He has sent a long communication to Governor Prince and I look for the State Militia to arrive

at New Orleans, and had several years' practice in the hospital at Richmond, Virginia. This celebrated hospital treated 65,000 sick and wounded soldiers, and the death rate was only six per cent. Dr. Lane received a vote of thanks from the Confederate congress for his work in this institution. The doctor is in full physical and mental vigor, and comes to Albuquerque to make his future home, and The Citizen extends him, on behalf of the people, a cordial welcome.—Citizen.

## New Mexico Game and Fish News

By BEN HANSON

April 1 marks the beginning of a new program aimed at improving habitat for wildlife in Southeastern New Mexico. At this time, a regulation requiring a new "Wildlife Habitat Improvement" stamp will become effective. Of course, when any new program is undertaken there are a lot of questions that need to be answered.  
First, who needs to purchase one of the stamps? The stamps are authorized under a federal law called the "Sikes Act." This act specifies that only hunters, trappers and fishermen need to buy the stamp. However, anyone who is interested in wildlife and wants to help provide a better place for them to live should consider purchasing a stamp. Why were hunters, trap-

pers and fishermen singled out? If you take a look at our federal and state lands, you will find that almost all "consumptive users" pay a fee for their use of the land. Timber harvesters, woodcutters, livestock grazers and other users all have to purchase a permit for taking something from the land, but until now, hunters, trappers and anglers have not. Hikers, birdwatchers, campers and backpackers don't take anything from the land and are considered "nonconsumptive" users.

Where will the stamps be required? The areas chosen for the Wildlife Habitat Improvement Stamp are Game Management Units 29 (Crow Flats), 30 (Guadalupe Mountains), 34 (Sacramento Mountains), 36 (White Mountains), and 37 (Capitan Mountains). All people who hunt, trap or fish on lands controlled by the US Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management or State Land Office within these units will need to have a stamp. Sportsmen who exclusively use private land in these management units are not covered by the regulation.

Why were these areas picked for the stamp? These units are used by a high number of sportsmen each year and therefore a small contribution from a large number of people will result in enough funds to accomplish more projects. In addition these areas need habitat enhancement programs to maintain or increase wildlife populations.

What will the money be used for? The funds from the stamp will go to the Department of Game & Fish. A committee will be established to determine the most needed projects. Already, projects totaling more than \$1.5 million have been proposed by the landowning agencies. These range from prescribed burns for improving browse species to putting in water units or riparian habitat improvement. The monies will all be used in these units.

What is the cost for the stamp and where can I get one? The stamps will cost \$5.25 and may be obtained from any place that sells hunting and fishing licenses or any game department office.

Will I need more than one stamp if I participate in more than one activity or if I use different areas? Only one stamp is needed for the entire license year from April 1, 1987 through March 31, 1988 no matter which area you use or if you hunt, trap and fish during the year.

For information contact your local conservation officer or call the game department office in Roswell at 624-6135 and ask for Ben Hanson.

**NOTICE OF INTER SESE PROCEEDINGS To: RIO HONDO STREAM SYSTEM WATER RIGHTS OWNERS**

To all unknown and previously unadjudicated claimants to the waters of the Rio Hondo stream system, please take notice of the following: (1) All unknown and previously unadjudicated claimants of interest to the surface or underground waters of the Rio Hondo stream system must file with the Clerk of the Fifth Judicial District and serve on the New Mexico State Engineer any water rights claims to that stream system, excluding groundwater claims for stock and domestic uses not exceeding 3 acre-feet per annum, by April 23, 1987, or be forever barred from asserting those claims. (2) Pretrial Order, governing all inter sese objections in the Rio Hondo stream system:

**PRETRIAL ORDER ON INTER SESE OBJECTIONS IN THE RIO HONDO STREAM SYSTEM**

This order shall govern all objections inter sese to all claims to the use of the waters of the Rio Hondo stream system. IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:

1. The State of New Mexico shall disseminate this Pretrial Order to all known water claimants in the Rio Hondo stream system before March 23, 1987;

2. All objections to this Pretrial Order of the time schedule contained herein must be filed with the Court and a hearing requested thereon by April 6, 1987;

3. All parties claiming water rights within the Rio Hondo stream system, have until April 23, 1987 to file and serve objections inter sese and set forth the grounds of those objections to any other water right claimant within the stream system.

4. Attorneys wishing to represent more than one water claimant in the Rio Hondo stream system who have filed challenges inter sese (other than challenges to the United States' claims) must file Waiver of Conflict of Interest statements signed by each of his clients.

5. By May 25, 1987, answers to objections shall be filed and served, and any objecting parties shall serve witness lists. Discovery may begin on the same day.

6. By June 25, 1987, the answering parties shall serve witness lists.

7. By July 24, 1987, the objecting parties shall serve exhibits and synopses of testimony of all persons who will be called to testify. The synopses will describe every area in which each witness will testify, the factual bases of their testimony, and the conclusions or opinions they will express.

8. By August 24, 1987, the answering parties shall serve exhibits and synopses of testimony of all persons who will be called to testify. The plaintiff State of New Mexico may file a witness list on rebuttal.

9. By September 30, 1987, all parties shall exchange rebuttal evidence and witness synopses. Discovery will be completed on the same date.

10. Pretrial motions and trial briefs shall be filed and served by October 29, 1987. Motions will be heard at the commencement of trial.

11. These inter sese objections shall be heard immediately following completion of trial on the defendants' objections inter sese against the United States' claims on behalf of the Mescalero Apache Tribe and the Mescalero Apache Tribe's claims.

12. Proposed findings and conclusions and posttrial briefs shall be submitted no later than 45 days after the conclusion of trial.

13. After due consideration, the court shall 1) issue a single decision resolving all objections heard, 2) enter a partial final decree on the Rio Hondo stream system, and 3) enter a final decree as to the United States' claims on behalf of the Mescalero Apache Tribe and the Mescalero Apache Tribe's claims to the waters of the Rio Hondo stream system.

**RESOLUTION NO. 87-2 (BOND ELECTION RESOLUTION AND NOTICE OF BOARD MEETING)**

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo (herein the "Board" and "Town", respectively) in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, has determined to submit to a vote the question of the issuance of its general obligation bonds in the maximum amount and for the purpose hereinafter specified, as permitted by Chapter 3, Article 30, NMSA 1978, and the Bond Election Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY (I.E., THE BOARD

**OF TRUSTEES) OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO:**

Section 1. A special election shall be held in the Town on Tuesday, May 19, 1987, at which there shall be submitted to the qualified registered electors of the Town and to the qualified, registered nonresident municipal electors as hereinafter defined, the following question:

Shall the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico, be authorized to issue its general obligation bonds, in one series or more, in an amount of not exceeding \$150,000 for the purpose of constructing and purchasing a system for supplying water for the Town, said bonds to be payable from general (ad valorem) taxes (except to the extent other moneys are available therefor), and to bear interest and mature and to be issued upon such terms and conditions as the Board of Trustees may determine?

Section 2. The polls for said election will be opened at 8:00 a.m. on the day of the said election and will be closed at 7:00 p.m. The Town of Lincoln County General Election Precincts located within the Town, i.e., Nos. 3 and 4, shall be consolidated for this election so that the entire Town shall constitute a single consolidated election precinct for such election and electors shall vote at the Town Hall, 100 5th Street, in Carrizozo,

New Mexico. Nonresident municipal electors shall vote at a separate polling place which shall also be located at the Town Hall.

Section 3. No ballot on the general obligation bond question shall be received by any precinct board unless the person offering to vote is a registered, qualified elector of the Town or a registered, qualified nonresident municipal elector as herein provided. A registered, nonresident municipal elector means any person who, on the day of election, is a qualified, registered elector of Lincoln County, but who is a resident of that portion of Lincoln County which is outside of the Carrizozo Town limits, who has paid a property tax on property located within the Town of Carrizozo during the year preceding the election, and has filed with the office of the Town Clerk of Carrizozo a certificate of eligibility announcing such person's intention to vote at such election on the question of creating municipal debt. A nonresident municipal elector also must file a certificate of eligibility with the Town Clerk not more than 60 nor less than 15 days before the date of the election, i.e., on or after March 20, 1987 but no later than May 4, 1987.

Section 4. The registration books of Lincoln County shall be closed by the County Clerk at 5 p.m. on April 7, 1987. Any person otherwise eligible to vote as a qualified elector or qualified nonresident municipal elector and not currently registered,

may register prior to such time at the office of the County Clerk, Lincoln County Courthouse, Carrizozo, New Mexico, or at the office of any deputy registration officer appointed by the County Board of Registration.

Section 5. Absentee voting shall be permitted in the manner authorized by Sections 3-9-1 through 3-9-16, NMSA 1978. Applications for absentee ballots may be obtained from the office of the Carrizozo Town Clerk, Town Hall, Carrizozo, New Mexico; but at 5:00 p.m. on May 14, 1987 the Clerk is required to destroy unused absentee ballots, so that completed applications must be returned to the Clerk prior to such time. The absentee voters' polling place will be located at the Carrizozo Town Hall, 100 5th Street in the Town.

Section 6. Voting machines shall be used for this special election except for the absentee voters' polling place and the

nonresident municipal electors' polling place; at which paper ballots shall be used.
