## Mike Gaines One of Three at KC Event

Mike Gaines, Carrizozo vo ag teacher, returned Friday after a trip to Kansas City to participate in setting up new guidelines for the National FFA Meats Judging contest while working with the National FFA contest evaluation committee.

"It was an honor to be selected to go to Kansas City," Gaines told the NEWS. He was just one of three vo ag teachers in the United States to attend and the only one to work on the meats judging contest section.

"The changes we made in the contest will affect 435,000 FFA members in the 50 states," Gaines said. He explained that he helped set guidelines for the national contest that will in turn affect the state contests.

He worked with people in the meats industry in setting up and changing the meat identification section of the national contest to meet the current demands of the industry. The National Meats Judging Contest is part of the National FFA Convention that is held in Kansas City in November of each year. Only the 1st class teams from each state attend the convention.

Gaines recalled the first appearance at the national contest in 1971 when he attended as a freshman from Socorro. He won that contest even though it was unusual for lower classmen to win at the national level.

During his seven years as vo ag teacher at Carrizozo, Gaines has taken two different teams to the contest. He said, "We have a unique situation. Carrizozo had the first meat lab in the state and until last year when Goddard got a meat lab, we were the only meat lab in the state."

## Corona School Superintendent Clem Retires, Effective July 1

Corona School Board members accepted Superintendent John Clem's letter of intent to terminate his employment as of July 1 during the regular monthly meeting held last week. After reading the letter, Board President Ernest Copeland called for a vote to accept it. Members agreed to immediately begin advertising for a new superintendent. Applications are to be dated by March 15.

In other business, Special Education teacher Trish Faykus informed the board that the special education manual has been upgraded to bring guidelines into compliance with new state mandates. The board agreed to study the new manual before voting to accept it at next month's meeting.

Elementary Head Teacher Betty Ann Bell reported that 13 adults and two students participated in the Project Wildlife presented by Don MacCarter, Co-ordinator for the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish. She thanked the board and superintendent for their cooperation in bringing the project to Corona

and expressed her wholehearted approval of the interesting and worthwhile program.

In his superintendent's report, Clem suggested that the board consider lowering lunch room prices for senior citizens. The board agreed to lower the cost to \$2 for senior citizens during the spring semester.

## C'zozo Trustees Discuss Weeds

Both bids received for a street sweeper for the town of Carrizozo were rejected at the Jan. 13 town council meeting. The matter was tabled after a lengthy discussion about the need for a street sweeper at this time.

Reasons given for the removal of dirt and rocks that prevent normal drainage, leaving standing water to soak through cracks in the pavement, causing damage to the base. Other reasons: regular street maintenance, removal of rocks from the streets, not leaving the rocks in the middle of the street to be thrown up to break windshields, and to give the town a cleaner appearance.

In other business, trustees agreed to post the agenda for the meetings in the post office on the Friday before the meetings.

A map showing all the work planned by the state highway department will be posted in the meeting room in city hall.

A copy of all traffic violators will be sent to Santa Fe, as requested.

Public input was received concerning the proposed weed ordinance. Mayor Bob Hemphill was asked what effect the weed ordinance would have on the elderly, widows, and disabled persons unable to do the necessary work to keep the weeds cut. Hemphill answered that the town will work with the service organizations in town to get help for these people to not cause a hardship on them.

Hal Sims reported on the things discussed at the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce meeting at noon. He said the Carrizozo Woman's Club is looking for a beautification project, two possible projects are street signs and parks.

Trustee Patsy Sanchez was directed to continue the new beautification project application same as last year's application.

Trustee Albert Baca asked how a person would get a street light put in near their home. It was stated that the only way is to move a streetlight from an unused location or move one that has little or no value where it is now placed. Another solution is for the person to have their own security light installed at a cost of \$7.50 per month, this would be a contract between

the person and the Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc.

Review of the personnel manual was carried forward to next meeting.

Trustees directed City Clerk Carol Schlarb to publish the notice for the sale of the DC Caterpillar with a minimum bid of \$2,500.

Trustees agreed to delay any decision on a bond election until after the legislature meets. This may enable the board to find out if the town has qualified for a water construction grant before asking residents to pass a bond election.

A request was received from Mrs. Antonio Samora to change zoning to enable her to have a home child care service. The property owners within 100 feet will be notified of a public hearing. The notice is also published as a legal in the NEWS.

Hemphill reported that the tie downs have been installed at the Carrizozo Municipal Airport and the latest construction project at the airport can be closed out.

Trustees approved the holiday calendar for 1987 for city employees.

Trustees voted unanimously to request to be represented on the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission.

Betty Howell is the new president for the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce. The announcement was made at the Jan. 13 meeting.



The C of C agreed to have the names of the winners and dates since 1982 engraved on the traveling trophy. ## Low Interest Loans Available

A large crowd gathered in the Ruidoso Downs village hall on Jan. 12 to hear a presentation on Community Development Block Grants by Steve Massey of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District.

Most of the interested persons were owners of small businesses in Ruidoso Downs who had been invited by the village to attend the public hearing to find out if they might be eligible for low interest loans from the CDBG. The program that Massey explained is a little known portion of the CDBG whereby grants are made to municipalities for economic development.

The grants are made to specific businesses in the form of low interest loans which are administered by the city or village. Each proposal for a grant must meet certain criteria—chiefly it must benefit low to moderate income workers. Both new and existing businesses are eligible to apply for the grants.

If a specific project is approved the money is granted to the village which must then loan it to the business. The business must then use the loan for the intended purpose. Interest rates and payment schedules are negotiated between the village and the business. After the money is repaid the village may loan it out two more times to businesses that meet their approval. After that the money belongs to the village, to do with as they see fit.

If a loan is not paid back the village is not held liable, but the money would not be available to loan again, nor for the village treasury at the end of the program. The requirements for application appear to be very strict, but Village Trustee Conrad Buchanan said, "I believe that perseverance is the key to getting one of these grants."

Some of the persons in the audience were concerned

about the 'politics' of getting approval, both at local and state level. But the board of trustees all said that they would consider any reasonable request. Trustee Jacquelyn Branum said, "I can't imagine us turning down any application that looks good."

Mayor Jake Harris said, "Let's see if we can simplify this - The state would be setting us up as bankers." Massey explained that that wasn't the intention at all. "They don't want you competing with the banks. This is stop gap financing for people who are unable to get enough conventional financing to fill their needs. This money can also be used as risk capital," said Massey.

Massey added that the loans were usually handled by a local bank for a percentage of the interest, but that the village set the requirements for collateral and approved the loans after the initial phase.

## Home Ec Teacher Receives Certificate of Recognition

The Carrizozo Board of Education met in regular session Jan. 20 and discussed the use of the drug dogs in the school system. Board members stated that the reaction they have received from the public was in favor of using the drug dogs. No decision will be made until the February meeting.

In other business, home economics teacher Jodie Heckendorn was presented a certificate of recognition from the state FHA/HERO organization. FHA/HERO is Future Homemakers of America/Home Ec Related Occupations. Miss Heckendorn is the sponsor for the Carrizozo club.

The Carrizozo FHA/HERO club will host the district meet on Jan. 24. More than 100 members are expected to attend from the active clubs in Alamogordo, Capitan and Tularosa.

After many questions and discussion that lasted more than an hour, it was agreed to hold a workshop on Thursday, Jan. 22 at 7:30 p.m. at the village hall. All interested persons are urged to attend.

Village Trustees had already handled their regular agenda before the public hearing. Trustees agreed to publish for a hearing on ordinance 87-1, which would slightly raise building permit fees in the village. Administrator Charles Robinson had proposed the passage of the ordinance.

Robinson also proposed that the village retain building inspector Junior Berringer on a percentage basis. The village had recently laid off the inspector, and he now faces the prospect of losing his state license. Robinson suggested that the village split the

building permit fees with him 90-10 on permits for less than \$100,000. Such a permit would cost about \$200 at the new rates. Clerk Joann Jenkins said that she thought 10 percent would cover the cost to the village of handling permits.

The board agreed to retain the building inspector on that basis, commending him for his efforts at getting a state license. Mayor Harris said, "he went to a lot of trouble on that. It only seem right that we help him out." The mayor will negotiate with him individually on any permits over \$100,000.

The board also presented a plaque to Mike Teller, owner of Mex-Sea Restaurant, expressing its appreciation for feeding over 100 needy persons during the Thanksgiving holidays. Joe Vasquez was also presented a certificate for his part in helping the needy.

resignation of Gil Ortiz, elementary special education teacher.

The board instructed school superintendent Dennis Sidebottom to try to hire the best teachers possible for the students, regardless of where the teacher may live. Two positions are open, elementary special education and art.

Sidebottom announced that Carrizozo students' ACT scores are higher than the state average.

Members discussed the question that will be on the ballot of the school board election on Feb. 3. Voters in the Carrizozo district will be asked to continue the current 2 mil levy. This will not increase

## Remodeling Complete

# New Look for Four Winds

The Four Winds, a Carrizozo landmark, celebrated a milestone last weekend with the opening of My Di's Beauty Salon and Di's Video Rentals and completion of remodeling. Renovation of the 26 year old Four Winds included redecorating and expansion of the existing dining room, addition of a pizza parlor, beauty salon and video rental center.

The structure has undergone several changes since it was originally built during the winter of 1959-60. Mr. Frank Phillips and Mr. Frank Ball conceived the idea of a restaurant where US Highways 380 and 54 intersect at Carrizozo. Footings were poured on a sunny winter morning; but as the day wore on the temperature dropped, and the decision was made to build fires around the perimeter to prevent freezing of the newly poured cement. Story has it that Phillips' son, Johnny, got the job of staying up all night to tend the fires. It was during that long, cold winter night that young Phillips noticed the

wind blowing the flames in all directions, and the place was appropriately dubbed The Four Winds.

It was in 1965 that a young Willie Silva came to work at the establishment. Born in Fort Stanton, Silva moved with his family from their ranch to Carrizozo in 1945. In 1960, he joined the Marine Corps and after completing a four year tour of duty, he returned to his hometown where he plunged into the restaurant business. In 1971, Silva leased the place and two years later had saved enough for a down payment and was able to make The Four Winds his own. "Those were rough days - I worked seven days a week, many 16 hours days, for about two years," said Silva.

On November 3, 1973, The Four Winds burned - only the exterior walls were left standing. According to Silva, the fire started near the cash register in the lounge and quickly spread. Silva vividly remembers the heat, "Liquor bottles were exploding

everywhere!" Even though the structure was repaired and reopened for business only five months later, financial recovery was a long time coming. "We had just bought \$5000 more in stock, in anticipation of the hunting season. Business usually doubles during hunting season, and November 3 was opening day that year," said Silva. It took about two or three years to financially recover from the fire.

Through the years, many politicians have eaten at The Four Winds, as have every governor and numerous senators, Rotary and Lions Club regular meet there. It is a stop on the bus route and is

a crowded summer tourist and autumn deer hunter spot. Silva realized that extra space was needed and decided to expand and remodel. New furnishings have been placed in the spruced-up dining area to coordinate with the new enclosed sun porch. The restaurant continues to offer steaks, Mexican foods and real pit bar-b-que, and customers can now get a pizza at the new walk-up window.

Silva hopes the changes will better fill the needs of Carrizozo residents and tourists alike. "The people of Carrizozo need a nice place to eat; we tried to provide a better atmosphere with our remodeling," he said.

The Human Anatomy Class of Biology II learned how to determine the race, age and sex of skeletal systems using features and measurements of the skeletal system. This complete skeletal model is plastic, nicknamed "Gus" by the class. Gus (with cap on) silently watched as students made their determinations. "Gus" has now returned to UNM in Albuquerque.

## Students Obtain Necessary Information from Skeletons

Carrizozo Biology II students had a visitor to their human anatomy class last week that taught them how the knee bone is connected to the thigh bone and the thigh bone is connected to the . . . Gus, as the Carrizozo students called him, was a plastic skeleton that was on loan to the school in addition to several authentic skeletons, assorted bones, and mandibles (lower jaws). The bones were on loan from the University of New Mexico Anthropology Department.

The purpose of the visiting bones was to teach students how to determine the sex of a skeleton, race, stature during

life, and age at death.

Teacher Mrs. Mariann Patterson said the actual specimens would show the students how information is obtained from bones. The sex of a skeleton can be determined by cranial features and femoral measurements. Race can be established using the sacral index and stature determination. Age is determined

by teeth, the presence or absence of cartilage, and shapes and measurements of bones.

Gus and the other bones have been returned to the anthropology department of UNM in Albuquerque but not before Carrizozo students learned first hand an important lesson in human physiology.

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# Behind the Headlines

## Poverty, Piety and Politics

In their pastoral letter on economics, calling poverty in America "a social and moral scandal" the nation's Roman Catholic bishops have once again raised questions about the role of the church in political affairs. The 115-page letter, adopted by the bishops' National Conference in November by a vote of 225 to 9 after a five-year study, didn't mention President Reagan by name. But it challenged just about every major economic policy of his administration. Among other things, it urged more government intervention, not less, in the social sector; more government money for welfare and less spending on defense; and an increase in the minimum wage as well as new job-creation programs.

The pastoral letter complained that "Our economy is marked by a very uneven distribution of wealth and income." And turning to the world at large, it called for major policy changes in the World Bank and International Monetary Fund to provide "immediate relief" to debtor nations of the Third World. Multinational corporations, said the bishops, "should be required" to encourage "the equitable distribution of their benefits" among people in the countries where they operate.

The bishops' letter did endorse the right to own private property and acknowledged the value of private enterprise in creating "an unprecedented standard of living for most (Americans)." But it also asserted that "harsh poverty plagues our country despite its great wealth," and said "The American experiment in social, political and economic life has involved serious conflict and suffering."

Not surprisingly, there were expressions of dissent. The Lay Commission on Catholic Social Teaching and the US Economy, led by former Treasury Secretary William Simon, charged that the pastoral letter amounted to an attack on the free enterprise system. "Private economic initiative, and not the state, is the source of wealth in our country," said the Lay Commission. "In a world in which poverty is the rule and prosperity the exception, our bishops would do well to study the causes of poverty." Patrick Buchanan, director of communications at the White House, told an interviewer that while "the church speaks infallibly on matters of faith and morals, it does not claim to speak infallibly on economics. I hope," said Buchanan, "the bishops recognize that the greatest enemy of material poverty in human history has been the free enterprise system of the United States."

The bishops' letter on economics follows a 1983 pastoral letter on war and peace in which the leaders of the nation's 52 million Catholics called for a ban on nuclear weapons. And, as with the 1983 letter, the church will now spread the bishops' economic message to the general population, including members of Congress. More than half-a-million dollars have been allotted for that purpose.

Few critics question the bishops' sincerity or compassion for the poor. But they wonder whether the church is not becoming overly involved in the political sector. As the Rev. Edmund Robb, a Methodist clergyman, has written in his recent book, *The Betrayal of the Church*, "A growing percentage of Christian leadership has abandoned its role as spiritual shepherd. It no longer considers humanity's spiritual welfare its greatest concern."

## Colonel North and Congressman Crockett: A Devastating Comparison

WASHINGTON — The horde of Democrats, who are returning to Washington in happy anticipation of several months of Roast Reagan, may well be frustrated by two developments on Capitol Hill, which could provide no little help to Lt. Col. Oliver North.

The first is a little-known law, Public Law 87-733: The Cuban Resolution.

This resolution was first passed by Congress in 1962. It was affirmed in 1962 and 1984 and passed into law, largely due to the efforts of Idaho's conservative Republican Senator Steve Symms.

This law states that the United States "is determined to prevent, by whatever means may be necessary including the use of arms, the Marxist-Leninist regime in Cuba from extending by force or threat of force its aggressive or subversive activities to any part of

this hemisphere."

Since Congress, or a majority thereof, has repeatedly voted for military and humanitarian aid to the anti-Marxist resistance forces in Nicaragua, how is Col. North to be regarded as any sort of criminal? Was what North is alleged to have done, in reportedly funneling profits from Iranian arms sales to the Nicaraguan resistance, a violation of the Boland Amendment limiting US aid to the Contras?

If this was a violation of the Boland amendment, that amendment was killed by order of Congress by the vote to send military aid to the Contras. Therefore the Boland Amendment is deadlier than Prohibition.

Could it be said that Col. North was premature in implementing what was to become the will of Congress? In 1983, did the Feds go about arresting any of the former bootleggers, after the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment? After December 6, 1865, when the Thirteenth Amendment was adopted, which abolished slavery, was there any prosecution of those who had violated the Fugitive Slave Act?

The second development which should be of help to Col. North is the tremendous comparison between him and the Congressional lulu who has the seniority to take over chairmanship of the House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on Central America.

If you, by chance, are among those people who LIKED the solid Sandinista slant of the former chairman of this subcommittee, Maryland's ultra-liberal "Managua Mike" Barnes, you will LOVE Detroit's Congressman George Crockett.

This gentleman from Michigan is what might be described as the extraordinary opposite of Ollie North. In 1983, for example, when the Soviet Union's air force murdered 269 civilians, including Congressman Lawrence McDonald of Georgia, a resolution condemning this Russian barbarism passed the House by a vote of 416 to 0. But Mr. Crockett was absent.

Two years later, when the Congressman Crockett was one of only two members of the House who voted against it, because, he said, the major was "trespassing."

This absolutely outrageous and pro-Soviet distortion was typical of Crockett, who contended that Col. North waived his Fifth Amendment rights when he told the House Foreign Relations Committee that he is a patriotic American.

That anyone with Crockett's so frequently pro-Soviet mindset should be able to sit in judgment on a Marine

Corps hero like Ollie North will not go unnoticed by a great many of the American people. And the rather devastating contrast between North and Crockett will be even more striking if this Marine officer were, as an example of precedent there at the National Security Council, to cite the memoirs of Gary Sick.

Mr. Sick was a member of the National Security Council staff of President Jimmy Carter — the same Jimmy Carter who was twice nominated for our nation's highest office by Congressman Crockett's own Democratic Party.

Sick's memoirs recall in considerable detail the secrecy with which President Carter, on October 11, 1980, "approved the draft" of his offer to two of the Ayatollah Khomeini's relatives, Ahmed Khomeini and Sadeq Tabatabaee. This offer consisted of "A military package of about \$150 million that would be available on release of the hostages."

What would be really entertaining — even electrifying — is if Col. North were to be asked by some intrepid Republican member of the Crockett subcommittee to answer several questions about the secret dealings and signed correspondence of California Congressman Ronald V. Dellums with the pro-Marxist Bishop government of Grenada. This rather incriminating material was captured by North's fellow Marines when they landed in Grenada and liberated that nation, and some 800 US medical students. But Dellums' letters have all but been ignored by most of the Big Media.

Congressman Dellums is Congressman Crockett's fellow member of the racially segregated Congressional Black Caucus — and organization whose positions have generally been so far left that it is known in some quarters as "The Congressional Red Caucus."

There is also Michigan's Congressman John Conyers. Mr. Conyers has loaned his name to the "Committee in Solidarity with the People of El Salvador," a six-year-old support group for Central American Marxists. Illinois Congressman Henry Hyde, who is a member of the newly created committee to investigate the Iran-Contra affair, wants the mandate of Special Counsel Lawrence Walsh broadened. He wants to have Walsh investigate BOTH sides of the story — including the Conyers-endorsed organization's sending funds to the Sandinista dictatorship.

Let's let it ALL hang out. House of Representatives! Unless you do so, this will all be recognized nationally as a partisan scheme of almost unprecedented iniquity.

Help Wanted: Applicant must be able to do this job in addition to regular full time employment. Applicant must be willing to spend one evening a week and time on weekends as necessary. Applicant must also make arrangements with present employer to be able to leave work with no notice to be gone for an indefinite length of time. Applicant must be willing to spend hours (at no pay) out in the cold in the winter and out in the blazing sun in the summer. Yes, this help wanted ad states there is NO pay for the applicant. Applicant must also agree to take time away from family and friends with no notice and be gone for several hours. In addition, applicant must schedule vacations for training for this unpaid position.

Does this help wanted ad sound like the kind of job you would be interested in? Does it sound like the sort of job you would enjoy? It would take you away from your family, friends, regular employment, parties, and intimate moments with no warning. It would keep you away from special occasions when your presence was needed or desired. It would cause you to miss precious times that would never arise again. Your life would be in danger much of the time while working and the chance of being killed in the line of duty for this unpaid position is a definite possibility.

Any takers? Are any of our readers jumping at the chance to apply for this enticing sounding position? Are the spouses of any of our aspiring applicants willing to sit idly at home while their mate is defying death at any given moment? And just how many readers at this moment are certain that this writer has more than a screw loose, more like the entire shebang?

There are 23 people in Carrizozo who now hold the distinction of doing these duties. Many of the rest of you in Carrizozo not only do not realize what is involved in this position, many of you are eager to find fault with these workers. Many of you will openly criticize the effort spent by these workers and many of you insist that these workers are doing a less than perfect job.

These 23 people are volunteer firemen. Now before you decide that I don't know what I am talking about, please answer a few questions. While you gripe about the length of time it takes the volunteer firemen to respond to the fire siren, announce to the world how many times you responded to the fire siren in less time. How many times have you stood out in the freezing cold in wet clothing to fight a fire to save a person's home or business? How many times have you risked your life to move a potential hazard to keep it from exploding? How many times have you been willing to spend the hours cleaning up the equipment after a fire? How many times have you paid to replace burned clothing? And most importantly, how many times have you laid your life on the line to save another person from a fire?

Agreed that these things don't happen often but it only takes one life-threatening situation to get killed. Maybe you think our volunteer firemen would not be willing to risk their life to save you, and they have every right to do just that since you are a negative person who does not appreciate their sacrifices. Regardless of how you feel, I am certain that our volunteers would do everything possible to save your life or my life or anyone else's life. I am confident that our volunteers are dedicated.

Recently I watched one of our volunteer firemen in a life-threatening situation. A propane tank was in the midst of a fire and this volunteer fireman removed the propane tank to a safe distance away. At any given moment the propane tank could have exploded, causing bodily injury or death. Removal of the tank from the fire was necessary to keep it from possibly injuring someone and spreading the fire if it should explode in the middle of the fire.

Propane tanks exploding are vivid in my mind because I was one of the idiotic photographers taking pictures of propane tanks exploding in the air like sky rockets in Missouri in 1979. The larger tanks were propelled 35 to 40 feet in the air before exploding and the smaller tanks made their colorful but frightening display 75 feet in the air. A propane bulk plant was the target of arson. The massive bulk tank posed a threat to the citizens of the town and people were evacuated for nine blocks in every direction. The volunteer firemen in that situation knew something that most of us as residents did not know. The firemen knew that if the bulk tank would blow that it would not explode, it would implode, meaning that it would suck the air out of everything within a half-mile radius. It would have meant instant death for everyone in the area. Those brave men went even nearer to the bulk tank to place a monitor to spray water on the tank in an effort to keep it cool enough to not blow.

Yes, it was frightening. Very frightening. The volunteer firemen in Missouri were commended for their conscientiousness. Thank goodness they were there and thank goodness they did not let the common grumbling of inconsiderate, inconsistent, imbecilic individuals deter them from their self-designated duty. Thank goodness there are such people on this earth.

Our own Carrizozo volunteer firemen have been commended for their work in containing the fire at the Carrizozo Trading Company. They not only stayed out in the freezing cold all night to fight the fire and try to keep it from spreading to nearby buildings, many of the volunteer firemen had to go to their regular places of employment for a full day of work after fighting the fire all night.

There is no doubt in my mind that the Carrizozo volunteer firemen are dedicated. They not only give their time to learning new and efficient ways to fight fires, keeping the town's fire equipment in as good condition as possible, and fighting fires, but they also spend hours of time and many dollars in helping make Christmas a little more merry for many people. Last month the Carrizozo VFD filled 630 sacks with candy to be distributed to children, county jail prisoners, handicapped people and elderly persons. They also escorted Santa Claus to Spencer Park and throughout the town. Now, how many of the rest of you self-righteous people did the same thing?

Thank goodness we are fortunate to have people in the community who do care and are willing to spend the extra time to make this a worthwhile place to live. Let us appreciate the volunteers who are serving us. And let us all be more careful with fire so as to make it possible for these volunteers to have more time with their families.

## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—"How come," the prominent Democrat asked, "our party in New Mexico always seems to be in the hole by something like \$50,000? We hold lots of fund-raisers, which we are told have been successful, but we never seem to pay off our debt. I wonder where the money goes?"

Then he added, quietly, as though speaking only to himself: "No. Maybe it's better that I don't know where the money goes."

The gentleman makes a good point. When was the last time any state chairman of the Democratic party here came before us to announce that all the bills had been paid? Whenever it was, it must have been after the party had a lot of winners in a statewide election; it's remarkably difficult to talk people into throwing money on the drum when you're in a losing position.

STATUS TODAY: After last November's election, many people tended to think of the Democrats as having taken some wounds. It's true, they lost the governorship—or maybe we should say they blew it away by giving it to Toney Anaya four years before. After this term in office, it was not at all likely that any candidate of their party, no matter how worthy he might have been, could have taken that one back.

It's significant too that the other statewide offices the Republicans were able to snatch from them, that of Land Commissioner and that of Attorney General, were both being contested for by men who had been part of Anaya's Cabinet.

On balance, though, New Mexico Democrats did fairly well last November. They recaptured the state House of Representatives rather solidly, and they kept the other constitutional offices, such as that of Treasurer and Auditor.

With their margin in registrations, of course, they should be expected to keep taking it all, so to drop back as badly as they did is a hurt to their pride.

It's probably also a hurt to their fund-raising ability, which is the point at which this discussion began.

THE BUCKS: The feeling is strong here that Sam Pick, who assumed the state chairmanship of the Democratic party only during the closing months of 1987, Sam apparently wants to stay only long enough to try to put an end to that pesky debt we have been talking about, after which he will be more than happy to go back to being mayor of Santa Fe.

The party also badly needs, if it is going to begin a process of regrowth aimed at the 1990 elections, a paid executive of some sort who can work at the job full-time. Of course, paying such a person only means that more money than that required for debt-retiring has to be collected. Unfortunately, the only people likely to kick in for such purposes are themselves disillusioned with the party as a result of the Anaya years.

New Mexico Democrats will, of course, recover from their doldrums. They always do.

Somewhere out there—maybe even reading these words—are the new folks who will take over. Maybe they'll even get that perpetual \$60,000 debt paid off—someday.

### LIFESAVERS TAGS

Carrizozo's PFK (People for Kids) continues to support school students. The group recently had a bake sale with proceeds for the benefit of students. Field trips and equipment are among the things PFK provides.

Lifesaver tags is another project that PFK is interested in. Each year minors suffer more than 30 million injuries, 8000 of them fatal. Unless the child is in danger of dying, doctors often will not operate or treat injuries without the consent of a parent or legal guardian—that of a babysitter, day care worker, teacher or even a relative frequently does not count. Doctors prefer parental consent to avoid costly malpractice litigation. Thus, crucial medical treatment can be delayed while working parents or parents temporarily out of the home are tracked down.

When George Wager realized that his dog carried more emergency identification than his children did, he decided to do something about it. Wager came up with the tag

idea on May 27, 1983. The Wager Lifesaver is a piece of durable, non-erasable, water-proof material that can be sewn into a child's clothing or attached to shoelaces. It is no bigger than the washing instructions tag found inside most garments. Yet it has space for important information, including a parent's signature authorizing doctors to do "whatever is deemed necessary to insure the safety of the child."

Wager talked to firefighters, paramedics, police and emergency-room doctors, who all confirmed the need for some sort of children's ID tags. Since the one thing all children have in common is shoes, Wager concluded that was where the tags should be affixed.

To obtain free Lifesaver tags for your child's shoes go to the Carrizozo Health Center or Carrizozo High School office for some. PFK has made arrangements to have them distributed from these places.

### EASY RULES

Birdie's clippings include rules on how to raise a delinquent:

- 1.) Begin at infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe the world owes him a living.
- 2.) When he picks up bad words, laugh at him. This will make him think he's cute.
- 3.) Never give him any spiritual training. Wait until he is 21 and then let him "decide for himself!"
- 4.) Pick up everything he leaves lying around— toys, clothes, books; do everything for him so that he will be experienced in throwing all responsibility on others.
- 5.) Quarrel frequently in



his presence. This way he will not be too shocked when the home is broken later.

6.) Give the child all the spending money he wants and never expect him to account for it. Never let him earn it; why should he have things as tough as you had them?

7.) Satisfy his every craving for food, drink and comfort. Denial may lead to harm-

ful frustrations.  
8.) Take his part against neighbors, teachers, all authority. They are all prejudiced against your child.  
9.) When he gets into real trouble, make it clear that you are not to blame by saying, "I could never do anything with him."

**Variance Granted for Setback**

During a short session Jan. 13 the Ruidoso Village Council granted a setback variance which had been denied by the Planning and Zoning Commission and brought before the council on an appeal. John Howden, agent for owners Ray and Diane Vowel, asked that the variance be granted since no protests had been made and a variance had recently been granted only two lots down from the site in question.

Mrs. Vowel spoke to the council saying, "We would never propose an addition that would be detrimental to the neighborhood. The area has many eyesores but this will not be another one." Councillor Ray Carpenter moved that the council grant the variance, but Councillor Victor Alonso said that he would oppose it.

Alonso said, "For the sake of consistency I'm going to oppose it, but I hope that the council is also consistent and approves it, if it makes any sense. A while back we granted a variance in this same area and I opposed it, thinking that we might be opening up a can of worms. Now here it has come up twice in a short time."

Alonso added that he was soon going to have a garage built and get Howden to do it. Howden said that he'd be getting the best builder in town, and Mayor Lloyd Davis stated that he'd also probably get the best variance in town. The council granted the variance with councillors Alonso and Rick Davis voting against it.

The council also approved a request to transfer an on-premises beer and wine license from Don Victor's Restaurant, which is owned by Councillors Alonso and his wife, to a new corporation, Grandfather's Pizza, which is also owned by Alonso and his wife.

The councillors then heard discussion regarding a proposal to combine the Parks

and Recreation Commission and The Adult Recreation Advisory Board. Ray Nunley, Chairman of the Parks and Recreation Commission, said that both committees had agreed that the move would be beneficial. He also named a

group of persons now serving on one or the other of the committees that he felt should be appointed to the proposed seven-member commission. Councillor Jerry Shaw said that she agreed with the principle of the idea but felt

that the Mayor should make the appointments as he saw fit. She was also opposed to one of the suggested persons in particular, owing to the fact that he is a village employee.

This year the Forestry Division will offer for sale more than 169,000 seedlings to interested landowners who want to plant trees for conservation. For over 25 years the Forestry Division has offered a variety of seedlings to landowners to plant for reforestation, erosion control, windbreaks, or Christmas tree plantations.

Applications are now available for seedlings, which will be distributed in March and April, 1987. As in the past, there will be two varieties of seedlings available; containerized conifer and barefoot deciduous. This year the coniferous species available include Eastern red cedar, Afghanistan pine, Austrian pine, Colorado blue spruce, Douglas-fir, ponderosa pine, Scotch pine, white fir, Arizona cypress and pinyon pine. The deciduous species for sale are green ash, skunkbush sumac, native plum, Russian olive, narrowleaf cottonwood, Lombardy poplar, hackberry, Siouxland cottonwood and lilac.

"I don't think that employees of the village should be voting members of this commission. Nor do I think that councillor Rick Davis should be on it," said Shaw. Mayor Davis said, "Now wait a minute Jerry, you're on the Economic Development Board." Shaw replied that it was different since that was done by a village ordinance. It was pointed out that this would also be done by ordinance.

Councillor Shaw then said, "Well, it's just my opinion, if the mayor would let me finish. And besides I wish we'd just abolish that board." Councillor Rick Davis said that he felt it would be good to have members of the council serving on various commissions as it would keep them in touch with the committees. Shaw said that she felt the opposite was true. "Whenever I've come to the council with a report from the Economic Development Board the other members have not listened as well as they would to someone from the audience," she stated.

Mayor Davis said that he didn't think that the two committees would be congenial working together. "These two groups are engaged on entirely different missions," he said. Shaw stated that the efforts involved in planning activities were much the same no matter who it was for. Councillor Davis also pointed out that the two committees already are combined in the same department under the city's new organization plan.

Alonso said that the issue of combining the two committees should be handled separately from the question of who should or should not serve on the new commission. Shaw added that they wouldn't be changing something of longstanding since the Adult Recreation Board had only been in existence for a couple of years. She then moved that the council combine the two boards.

That approval was granted with councillors Carpenter and Elmer Pirelli voting against it. The mayor said, "You can forget about me appointing any village employees to this board." More discussion ensued with Shaw stating that the dissenting votes came from councillors who had never been to a meeting of either of the commissions. Assistant Village manager Frank Potter also had some comments regarding who should serve on the new board, but Mayor Davis stopped the discussion saying that discussion was supposed to come before the vote.

Village manager Jim Hine then reported to the council on revenues during the last six months of 1986. Sales taxes, which had been anticipated to fall 5 percent had actually decreased only 2.6 percent. Building permit fees were down, as were court fines. There was some question about the accuracy of the gasoline tax and lodger's tax figures, so no firm conclusion could be drawn.

Income from the airport was down due to bad weather most of the year and a delay in receiving funds from a state grant. Hine reported that the airport was cutting expenses as a result. He also said that the solid waste transfer system was saving money but that he was not sure about the new trash compactor.

Hine reported that water receipts were down but that sewer fees were up. Mayor Davis asked how sewer could be up and water down since sewer fees are based on water usage. Hine said that some water accounts had not been collected and also that quite a few new sewer connections had been made since the first of the year. Mayor Davis could still not understand how the difference occurred.

Animal control services which were projected to run \$3600 per month are actually costing \$4000 per month. But contractual road services which started out \$245,000 in the red are now all paid up. Alonso said, "This is all good but we really need to compare these figures with what we have budgeted for the year." He then proposed that the council hold a budget review workshop and it was agreed to do just that within the next 10 days.

In other business the council — agreed to publish a notice for a public hearing on a request by Village Clerk Leon Eggleston for an annexation ordinance that was approved in 1976 but never drafted and brought to the council for final approval.

—decided to have village attorney John Underwood draft a letter to Consolidated Energy Systems, Inc., to inform them that the village is unable to enter into an exclusive agreement with them for the construction of an electricity cogeneration plant.

The council was to have held an executive session, but due to the absence of the village attorney the meeting was adjourned.

## Choose the Correct Tax Form This Year

Now that the new year is here, it is time to think about filing your income tax. Even if you don't prepare your own taxes, you need to know what form you can use so you can compile the right information, according to the New Mexico Society of CPAs.

There are three forms that taxpayers can use to file their federal income tax return. The longest form is the 1040. On it, you can claim all your income and take all your deductions. With all of the required tax forms, it can be many pages long. Form 1040A is a simpler version of the 1040 and is used by taxpayers who meet certain criteria. The third form and the easiest to file is a 1040EZ.

Before you can decide which form to file, look at your financial records for 1986. The amount of income you earn and where it comes from will determine which form you can file.

1040: The 1040 form can be used to report any type of income including wages, interest, dividends and such. This form is actually a combination of forms — called schedules — which different taxpayers file depending on how they earn their income and incur their deductions.

You should use form 1040 if you have income from several of the following: salary, capital gains, taxable Social Security benefits, interest, rental property, your own business and other income.

You should also use this form if you take a lot of deductions. If you have mortgage interest payments, itemized deductions, moving expenses, Keogh or IRA contribution deductions and other deductions, you may need to file this form.

1040A: This form is less detailed than the 1040 and its schedules. Taxpayers can use this form if they meet certain criteria. First, your taxable income must be less than \$50,000 and consist solely of wages subject to withholding, ordinary dividends, interest income or taxable unemployment compensation. Second, your itemized deductions cannot exceed the zero bracket amount of \$3,670 if you are married filing jointly or \$2,460 if you are a single individual or a head of household, or if your itemized deductions are \$1,835 as a married person filing a separate return.

### Note

High school students who are interested in applying for \$1,000 college scholarships should request applications by March 16, 1987 from Educational Communications Scholarship Foundation, 721 N McKinley Road, Lake Forest, Illinois 60045.

To receive an application, students should send a note stating their name, address, city, state and zip code, approximate grade point average and year of graduation.

If your itemized deductions are greater than your zero-bracket amount or you have to itemize your deductions, then you have to file form 1040.

1040EZ: This is by far the easiest form for taxpayers to file. However, there are restrictions that make many taxpayers ineligible to use it.

The first restriction is that you have to be single. On top of that, your taxable income has to be less than \$50,000. Also, the only income besides wages (and tips) allowed is from interest and it cannot exceed \$400. The final restrictions are that you cannot itemize deductions or claim any credits when filing your return.

Meeting just one or two of these requirements is not enough. To be able to use this form you must meet all these requirements. If you don't, then you should consider using Form 1040A.

Letting someone else prepare your taxes. Depending on how complicated your income tax is, you might want to consider finding someone else to prepare your taxes. By using a certified public accountant (CPA), you can save yourself a lot of time and energy. Also, it is the CPA's job to know all of the tax laws and to make sure that you take every deduction and credit for which you are eligible. Especially now, with the new tax reform laws, it might be wise to consult a professional to plan new tax strategies for the future.

Whether you prepare your own taxes or have a professional do it for you, be sure to check your return for accuracy and make sure it is signed. Keep a copy for your records and be familiar with the information it contains. File it with your other financial information so that you have access to it if necessary.

## Hunting Regulations and Proclamation Available

SANTA FE, NM—Proclamations giving details about 1987-88 big game seasons and regulations are now available through offices of the Department of Game and Fish in Albuquerque, Roswell, Raton, Las Cruces and Santa Fe, according to John Crenshaw, in charge of game department publications. The proclamations are also being distributed to vendors, along with application forms for special hunts.

Application deadlines are:  
 \*Feb. 18, Valle Vidal turkey;  
 \*April 15, bighorn sheep and Valle Vidal bear;  
 \*May 13, public elk licenses, including those for handicapped hunters;  
 \*June 3, all antelope

licenses and most deer entry permits;  
 \*July 1, Barbary sheep and oryx;  
 \*Sept. 9, Siberian and most Persian ibex, Valle Vidal cougar and the C-6 deer entry permit hunt on McGregor Range and Soledad Canyon.

There is no deadline and no limit on the number of licenses for javelina and for Persian ibex off the Florida Mountains.

The State Game Commission set 1987-88 seasons in September five months earlier than in the past, to allow earlier publishing and distribution of the hunting proclamation. The earlier deadlines also give hunters more time to plan hunts and vacations, Crenshaw said.

**NOTICE OF PROPERTY TAX REPORTING REQUIREMENTS**

Property which was valued in 1986 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1987 or subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR:

1. mobile homes
2. livestock, and
3. land used for agricultural purposes

If for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's office.

All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claims to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1987 if the exemption was not claimed in 1986.

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land used for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.

If you made improvements to your real property and:

1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and
2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued,

you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by the assessor.

If you believe your property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report, on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement which:

1. describes the property decreased.

This statement must be filed with the county assessor no later than the last day of February.

All veterans who wish to claim veterans exemption should bring, or mail, their certificate of eligibility to the assessor's office each year for endorsement. This should be done before the last day of February of each year.

If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1986 no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1986 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

Beginning in the 1982 tax year, taxpayers are responsible for declaring their property classification to the assessor, as residential or nonresidential. When the declaration is accepted by the assessor, it shall remain as such and need not be made in subsequent years unless the classification changes. If a taxpayer has not declared their property to be residential in 1986 and desires that classification for 1987 they must complete a declaration of residential classification and return the signed declaration to the county assessor's office by the last day of February, 1987.

Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division of the State of New Mexico in Santa Fe. Information about property to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division can be obtained from the county assessor or the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division, Central Assessment Bureau, P.O. Box 850, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87509.

**Wet Describes NM Weather in 1986**

**LAS CRUCES**—The best word to describe New Mexico's 1986 weather is wet. State climatologist Dr. Ken Kunkel, New Mexico Department of Agriculture (NMDA) says every reporting location experienced above normal precipitation this past year. "A preliminary analysis using 30 representative locations around the state indicates that 1986 was the second wettest year on record with precipitation averaging 153 percent of the long term average. Only 1941 has been wetter," Kunkel says. This analysis was based on the period 1931-1986, Kunkel said.

The most abnormally wet months were June 1986, 270 percent of normal, wettest month on record and November, 375 percent of normal, second wettest on record. January, Kunkel says, was unusually dry with precipitation averaging only 20 percent

of normal and was the second driest month on record.

Kunkel says a significant event, weatherwise, occurred in New Mexico at Carlsbad Caverns in 1986. Carlsbad Caverns recorded the most precipitation in a single month that has ever been noted at an official reporting station in New Mexico. The total precipitation for Carlsbad Caverns in June was 16.69 inches.

Carlsbad, Roswell, Truth or Consequences and Tucuman all reported unusually high precipitation in 1986. Average annual precipitation in Carlsbad is 10.68 inches; 1986 Carlsbad precipitation was 25.18 inches. Average annual precipitation in Roswell is 9.70 inches; 1986 Roswell precipitation was 24.55 inches. Truth or Consequences average precipitation is 9.78 inches and the 1986 total was

18.78 inches. The Tucuman rainfall figures show an average of 18.40 inches and 1986 total of 23.96 inches. Other high rainfall areas were Deming, Socorro and Clayton.

Actually, Kunkel says, the past year is only the latest in a series of wet years beginning in 1973. Since 1973, every year except 1980 has been characterized by above normal precipitation. The last three years have been particularly wet. The five wettest

years, according to Kunkel, were 1984, 1985, 1981, 1986 and 1982. The five driest years were 1983, 1984, 1945, 1985 and 1944.

As far as temperatures, 1986 had no extended very hot or cold periods, Kunkel says but January was abnormally warm with an average temperature of 55.4 degrees F which is about 5 degrees F above normal. January 1986 ranks as the third warmest January on record.
