

School Elections Tuesday

In compliance with the election code of the state, the regular school district elections are to be held in each school district on the first Tuesday of each odd-numbered year, which will be Feb. 3 this year.

Person's wishing to apply for an absentee ballot must do so before 5 p.m. Friday, Jan. 30. At that time the county clerk will record the number of all unused absentee ballots and shall publicly destroy all unused absentee ballots. Friday is also the last day a person may apply and cast an absentee ballot in person in the county clerk's office.

Each of the five-school districts will be filling two vacancies on their respective school boards. Candidates for are:

Each school district election will be conducted using voting machines. Each voter should be familiar with the voting machine and may ask the precinct board members on duty if there are any questions.

Voting machine sample ballots are available for voters. The directions for voting are on the sample ballot and include the following information: Move the red handle completely to the right ('til the bell rings). This closes the curtain and unlocks the machine for voting. Turn down a voting pointer over each candidate's name you wish to vote for.

After completion of voting, you should move the red handle completely to the left. This records your vote, clears the machine and then opens the curtain. No one outside the machine can tell how you have voted.

Voters in Carrizozo and Ruidoso will have a question on their ballots in addition to the candidates for the vacant school board seats.

The question will ask voters if the two mill levy should be extended. Voters in Carrizozo will be assured of an additional \$32,413 contribution from the state if the two mill levy is passed. This money will be spent for maintenance of school buildings.

Voters should make sure they have answered the question in addition to making their choice for the school board before moving the red handle to the left and opening the curtain.

Tuesday, Feb. 3 is school district election day. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Please Vote!

Lincoln County EMT Holds Annual Awards Ceremony

Saturday, Jan. 24, the Lincoln County EMTs held their annual pot luck supper and Awards Ceremony in Carrizozo.

Gwen Jones of Fort Stanton, president of the Lincoln County EMT Association, opened the ceremony with these remarks: "The success of a good Emergency Medical Service system depends on a lot more than good EMTs in the field. The goals of the dedicated volunteers in our association to provide the best emergency medical services to the citizens of the County and to all people who travel through the area, needs the support and cooperation of many people who are not active in, but are vital to our organization."

Plaques were presented to past Commissioners Bill Elliott, A.W. Gnatkowski, and Ken Nosker. They were acknowledged as being 100 percent supporters. Ken Nosker was the only past commissioner present. He accepted his plaque, saying, "Lincoln County EMS is the best in the state. I enjoyed working with all of you. This is not a Road Department meeting, but in view of the

travel difficulties brought on by this last big snow, pass the word along to our road crews, they have my thanks for a super job done with all the long hours of hard cold work."

The next award was presented to Tom Sullivan for the training of the Sheriff's Office dispatchers and deputies to give the greatest assistance possible to the EMT's. Gwen said, "When the sheriff first took office four years ago, he attended one of our local EMT meetings. He gave us the message that his entire department and staff would assist us in any way possible. He has certainly lived up to his word."

The Sheriff's deputies at the scene of EMT calls often directed traffic, assisted with extrication and loading of patients, even driving the ambulance if needed. They respected the directions of the EMT's who were considered skilled and trained professionals.

The fifth award was presented to Charlie Cox. Gwen said, "He has gone above and beyond his scope of duties by giving us a part of his heart with his care for the EMT's and the patients."

Probably the most important contribution of Charlie Cox was his efforts to enlarge the communications system for the EMS. This was especially crucial in the remote areas of the County. Now, 2-way radios insure quicker and better service by the EMTs.

One EMT told of Charlie, "He was not a friend, but a darn good listener even at two in the morning, when we had an especially tragic mishap. He was always compassionate

with solid advice and comfort."

Nancy J. Guck, Lincoln County EMS Director, acknowledged Don Means, Byron Yancy, and Kathy Williams for being with the service so long and going beyond the call of duty. She also noted that Nancy herself had been active with EMS since 1973, and felt that Ben Hall, John Allen Hightower, and Bill Elliot had been instrumental in EMS progress without ever waiving from the onset.

Nancy told the group, "In the early years, when we first started developing the system, we were green and enthusiastic. We stepped on a lot of toes. None of us understood grants and funding demands.

"We always provided quality patient care, but sure didn't understand administration. We prayed for guidance. Our prayers were answered in the person of Suzanne Cox. She listened to us, believed in our sincerity and won our respect.

"Then, she turned us into professionals, gained our necessary grants and funding, and led us on to statewide recognition, including a governor's award. She is the one person who can take credit for putting it all together. EMTs have a firm belief that the patient comes first. Suzanne agrees with that. We respect and love her."

Suzanne Cox was given a resounding standing ovation. She was presented a brass pitcher of silk roses. The EMTs felt it was a more personal gift than a plaque, and better symbolized their feelings for her.

Lincoln County Declared Disaster Area

Lincoln County was declared a disaster area on Jan. 22 during a special meeting of the Lincoln County Commission. Excessive snowfall and winds up to 50 miles per hour caused conditions severe enough to warrant the disaster declaration.

The special meeting lasted long enough for two resolutions to be signed. Resolution no. 75-35 stated the need to declare Lincoln County a disaster area: inability to open roads preventing persons to leave their homes for necessities, including medical; and inability to open roads to agricultural areas to get feed to livestock.

Resolution no. 75-36 designated Lincoln County Manager Suzanne Cox as the local agent to file an application in the appropriate state office for the purpose of obtaining state financial assistance under Chapter 6.

Two helicopters provided by the Army National Guard were in Corona on Friday flying over the area hardest hit by the winter storm, which was the northeast corner of the county. Snow depth was measured at three to four feet with drifts up to 11 and 12 feet. The drifts were caused by the 50 mile per hour winds.

In addition to taking food and necessary items to snow-bound ranchers, the helicopters were filled with feed for livestock. The crews checked out reports of dead animals, made emergency stops for isolated persons, and helped county road crews locate which roads needed to be opened.

A Chapter 6 disaster declaration entitles the county to disaster funds from the state to help cover the costs of snow removal, etc. For more information, call the county offices at 648-2337.

ACT Scores Are High in Carrizozo

Carrizozo School Superintendent Dennis Sidebottom reports that Carrizozo High School students took the American College Test on Dec. 11, 1986. This test is used by colleges and universities to assess a high school student's potential for success on the college level. This test is also used to determine eligibility for scholarships.

Carrizozo students had a composite average of 18.7. This compares very favorably with the state average of 17.7. Carrizozo students did well in all areas including Math, Language Arts and Social Studies and extremely well in Science where they scored a composite average of 24.4, the state average is 20.1. Mr. Sidebottom stated that, "we are extremely pleased with the special results we are getting in Science. For the last two years, the School Board has targeted Science for special attention.

Our teachers have done a superb job and next year we intend to target Language Arts while still maintaining our gains in Science." Mr. Sidebottom also stated that it is very important for a college bound student to score above 15 on the ACT. A score below this level could require a student to take remedial classes in college.

Hays Resigns; to Leave Capitan Schools Feb. 27

The Capitan Board of Education met in special session Tuesday evening and accepted the resignation of Superintendent Leonard Hays. Hays has accepted a position as Director of Curriculum in the Alamogordo School System. He is currently in his fourth year at Capitan. His final work day will be Feb. 27. His final contract day after using vacation leave is March 13. Hays was praised by three board members and received a standing ovation at the Candidates meeting later that night.

The Capitan Schools now begin a search for a new superintendent. The application deadline is April 15. A minimum of three years administrative experience is desired. The starting date is July 1. The salary will be between \$39,000 and \$42,000. Applications must include transcripts, three current references, a brief statement of the candidates' philosophy of education and management, and a letter of interest. Capitan school people are also looking for someone to fill the superintendent's position during the interim.

The next stated meeting of the Capitan Board of Education has been rescheduled for Feb. 26, 1987 in the board room located in the old elementary school building.

Bid Specs Due on Roads in Cedar Creek and Alpine

Lincoln County Commissioners discussed county roads at the Jan. 20 meeting. They decided to have the county manager write bid specifications for the work to be done on Cedar Creek Road and in Alpine Village. The commissioners asked that the bid specs be worded so the bids can be accepted or rejected.

The bids should also state that the work is to be completed by June 15 with no exceptions. The work must be completed by then for the county to receive the coop money from the state.

In other business, the commission discussed county bridge 8046 which is west of Picacho. The bridge needs to be replaced. The commission requested county manager Suzanne Cox to look into all possible bridge replacement plans for funding for the bridge replacement.

—Resolution no. 75-29 was signed, declaring Lincoln County a disaster area from

the abnormal rainfall, flash flooding and flood damage caused by the rains from June 21, 1986 through July 6, 1986. The purpose of the declaration was to make it possible for the county to apply for state assistance and relief programs available from the state.

—Resolution no. 75-30 was signed, designating county manager Suzanne Cox as the local agent to apply for state disaster assistance.

—Barbara Duff was appointed to the Lincoln County Personnel Board for District III.

—Mike LaFayette was appointed to the Carrizozo Health Center Advisory Board.

—Approved the time frame schedule for the \$25,000 grant for the Fort Stanton historic review study.

—An executive session was scheduled with district attorney James Weldon.


Joe Shain, engineer for the paving project, has asked that people please share the information they may have about drainage problems. The crews

Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe's challenge to claim 91 percent of the water from the Rio Ruidoso.

There were 500 prints of

Dire Straits could be called a "rags-to-riches" band. In seven years the group has gone from being poor club musicians to being one of the top bands in the world.

Knopfler, the group's founder and leader, plays guitar and sings. He writes songs, produces records and composes music for movies.

Knopfler, 37, grew up in Scotland and Newcastle, England. As a child, he dreamed of being a pop guitarist. He got his first guitar at age 15. He took voice and piano lessons.

The other band members are John Illsley (bass), Alan Clark (keyboards), Terry Williams (drums), Jack Sonni (guitar), Guy Fletcher (keyboards) and Chris White (saxophone).

Dire Straits' album, "Brothers in Arms" was a top seller. The single "Money for Nothing" was a Top 10 hit.

Are We Asking For Another Oil Crisis?

Those economists who have been insisting that the world's oil glut will continue indefinitely and there is nothing to worry about had better take a new look. The way things are now going, say knowledgeable industry experts, in 3 to 5 years we could be hit with another oil supply and price crisis worse than in the 1970s. What's more, they warn, much of the trouble may be of our own making.


For example, on the same day in December that a Presidential Task Force on Regulatory Relief proposed abolishing US fuel-economy standards, the price of gasoline jumped more than a dollar a barrel. The hike came in response to an agreement by OPEC to cut crude-oil production to a new 26-year low in order to drive prices up. Led by Saudi Arabia and Iran, 12 of the 13 cartel members agreed to reduce output to about 16 million barrels a day, or some 7 percent for each country. And starting on February 1, OPEC will impose an \$18-a-barrel minimum price on its oil, in an attempt to break the free-market trade that at one point had driven prices to below \$10 a barrel.

Although the OPEC price-rise promises some relief for the depressed oil industry and its dependents, the cartel's action could threaten a new round of inflation, especially in Europe, just as many long-stalled economies had begun to benefit from lower oil prices.

At the present time, US environmental groups are gearing up for a battle in Congress to block a bid to open a 1.5 million-acre coastal plain in Alaska's northernmost Arctic Wildlife Refuge to oil and gas exploration and development. The area, which adjoins the big Prudhoe Bay oilfield, constitutes less than half of 1 percent of Alaska's huge land mass. But geologists estimate it contains up to 30 billion barrels of oil and more than 64 trillion cubic feet of natural gas — one of the largest such untapped reserves in the world.

Naturalist lobbies, however, contend that opening the area to development would, among other things, disturb the migratory habits of a prized herd of 180,000 caribou. The same argument delayed for years the building of the Alaskan oil pipeline. But as it has turned out, the caribou have largely ignored the special walkways designed to facilitate their migrations and, instead, seem to enjoy hanging around the pipeline.

In any event, there is no disputing the fact that crude oil production in the US is falling. Indeed, exploration for new domestic fields has virtually stopped. As a consequence, our dependence on imported oil to meet steadily increasing consumer demands has been growing by more than a million barrels a day. As Charles DiBona, president of the American Petroleum Institute, warns: "We're falling into the same trap of vulnerability. The less oil we produce, the more we'll have to import, and the less control we'll have over both supply and price." Interior Secretary Donald Hodel has an even sterner warning. Our complacency about oil supplies, he says, is putting OPEC "back in the driver's seat, constituting some form of national security threat to the United States."

Tyranny in Zambia: Prosperity in the Ivory Coast, Black Power vs Interracial Cooperation

WASHINGTON—From Associated Press reporter John Edlin, the world has received a firsthand report on conditions inside Zambia, that southern African nation whose president is chairman of the six-nation "Front Line States" presently confronting South Africa.

Reporter Edlin, who is based in nearby Zimbabwe, dared to report the widespread rioting over food price escalation in Zambia. President Kenneth Kaunda's government has more than doubled food prices, when the average unskilled workers earns about \$7.00 a week.

Dr. Kaunda, who is known as "The Weeper" for the lachrymose reaction he frequently manifests during negotiations, did not, reported,

ly, weep at the sight of upwards of 1,000 hungry rioters. Instead, he sent in troops, who opened up on the crowd with their automatic weapons. Two dozen were killed and more than one thousand jailed.

Dr. Kaunda, whose political party is the nation's only party allowed, took a very dim view of having this reported by the AP. So reporter Edlin was seized and imprisoned for nearly a week in Kamwala Prison.

Inside the prison, which is just one mile from Kaunda's State House, this AP reporter found the following conditions:

"Kamwala is a colonial prison, built when the land was Northern Rhodesia, to accommodate 60 prisoners. But the Zambian government has imprisoned 500 there.

"Inmates slept on lice-laden blankets spread on the concrete floor. They are fed twice a day with such dishes as boiled beans, which Edlin found infested with cockroaches.

"Inmates included some two dozen boys, some as young as seven, who were routinely sodomized by trustees — convicts designated as cell captains — after lights went out at 9:00 p.m."

"These cell captains regularly beat other prisoners and commandeered what beef was delivered to the prison, trading it to Kaunda's prison officials for cigarettes and marijuana."

Another reporter, Peter Youngusband of *The Washington Times* reports:

"Scores of Kaunda's political opponents are in detention — some in death row awaiting execution."

"Most of Zambia's 7 million people have been reduced to paupers as a result of the 200 percent increase in the cost of living with no parallel rise in wages."

"At independence (1964), Kaunda inherited a healthy economy based on copper exports. Instead of diversifying into agriculture, which has been done only in recent years, he depended mainly on mineral exports. But world copper prices plummeted 60 percent between 1974 and 1984 . . . One seventh of Zambia's export income was spent on costly food imports each year."

"That there is really no excuse for Kaunda's black-power, one-party system is seen in the striking contrast between Zambia and dozen of other black autocrats like it in Africa on the one hand as compared to the West African country called the Ivory Coast.

President Felix Houphet-Boigny, who was elected to his sixth four-year term of office last year, has led in the creation of what is known as "The African Miracle," whose principal port city of Abidjan is known as "The Paris of Africa."

Abidjan has more French residents today than at the time of independence from France in 1960. Houphet-Boigny has encouraged foreign investment and welcomed foreign expertise rather than going in for black power xenophobia, with himself as one more clone of Idi Amin.

More than 40 percent of the people of the Ivory Coast are literate and 75 percent of the children attend school, which, *The Los Angeles Times* notes, "is unmatched elsewhere in developing Africa."

Dr. Houphet-Boigny was born in a grass hut, the descendant of a tribal chief. He studied medicine in Dakar, Senegal, and represented the Ivory Coast in the French Na-

tional Assembly. He was the first black African to have held ministerial posts with the French government. As such, he was a welcome exception to the company of ex-sergeants like Amin and Liberia's Sgt. Doe, who have seized power so often, throughout black Africa's many coups.

Houphet-Boigny is 81 years old and is known affectionately as *Le Vieux* (The Old Man). His popularity as well as his astonishing economic success have made him strong enough to say the unmentionable; that sanctions against South Africa will only make the situation worse; and that the problem of apartheid would long since have been solved were it not for communist influence in the anti-apartheid movement.

Yet Houphet-Boigny has been given almost no attention by American Big Media, compared to what they have given

Archbishop Desmond Tutu. This Anglican prelate and Nobel Prize winner has now been exposed by *The Boston Jewish Times* as having declared:

"The Jews are the biggest exploiters of blacks in South Africa. In terms of the New Testament, the Jews must suffer. Therefore we will put it in practice if we will be in charge. There will be no sympathy for the Jews when the blacks take over."

This did not go down very well in all quarters of Australia, where Tutu was taking one of his innumerable triumphant tours (with occasional visits to his archdiocese.) Sir Bruce Ruxton, president of a Victoria veterans' organization, described Tutu as "A witch doctor dressed up in archbishop's clothes, who has suggested that black servants in South Africa poison white children."

Domenici Seeks Help

Senator Pete Domenici (R-NM) today questioned Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng about the problem of Mexican cattle imports into the southwestern United States.

At today's Senate Budget Committee hearing on the President's fiscal year 1988 budget, Domenici told Lyng, "Cattle imported into the United States from Mexico have increased substantially over the past year — from a little under 500,000 head in 1985 to more than 800,000 in January through November of 1986.

"December is expected to be another strong month — possibly taking total Mexican cattle imports to more than one million head for 1986.

"Cattlemen in the southwest are getting very concerned about these unprecedented levels of imports from Mexico. They wonder why the Mexicans can market their cattle in this country during our peak marketing period — September through November — and drive down the domestic market.

When Domenici asked the Secretary Lyng if he had the authority to restrict the timing of when cattle can be imported into the country, The Secretary replied he does not have the specific statutory authority, but he would see what he could do to alleviate the situation to help our cattlemen in the southwest.

Inside the Capitol

Conservative or Liberal?

SANTA FE — Sometimes it's hard to tell a conservative from a liberal, at least in Santa Fe.

It's almost certain that many of those who voted so blithely to send Garrey Carruthers into the game to replace Tony Anaya thought they would see a major change in the attitude toward taxation when they made that change.

To put it in its simplest form, they probably believed they were electing somebody who would try to settle the state's problems in some way other than by laying a heavy tax burden on them.

It turned out that was not exactly true.

THE HEWS: Now that Governor Carruthers has been duly sworn in and has gotten everything straightened out on his executive desk, he has had a chance to study what needs to be done with the state. What he apparently decided when he got through doing that is that the best way to solve everything is to up revenue, rather than to cut expenses.

That sounds remarkably like the way a liberal, which he didn't think Carruthers was, would approach things. In fact, it's more or less the way Tony Anaya would have gone if by some chance he had another year in the chief executive's office.

What's more, the Carruthers plan would hit hardest those of us who can least afford it. To some of us, that doesn't sound like such a good idea.

CATEGORIES: Carruthers' own Department of Taxation and Revenue says this is what would happen if the Legislature were to accept all his suggested tax raise exactly as he has given them to us:

A family of four making only \$7500 a year would find their tax raises adding up to an additional \$87 a year, which is 1.16 percent of their total annual budget. A family of that same size that makes \$15,000 a year, however, would pay only \$30 more per year in new taxes, which means the extra bite on them would come to only two-tenths of one percent of their annual income.

In the category of families of four making \$24,200 a year, the additional tax would be \$81, or .33 percent of their annual takehome; and in families of that size making \$35,000, the extra tab would be \$121 a year, or .35 percent of what they have to spend.

Only in families making \$60,000 a year or more would the total take add up to anything like that paid by the very poorest members. Here, the additional tax paid would total \$442 each year, which is .74 percent of their annual income.

SUGGESTIONS: Now, we all know that the proposals of a governor in his first term in office are cobbled together in a great hurry during his first year, and maybe we oughtn't to take them too seriously. You can be sure the Legislature won't. They'll give us the kind of program they think we need, and the Governor will most likely go along with it.

Still, to have a man tell us this is his proposition does suggest the lines along which his mind works.

In this case, that hardly seems to be the grove most conservatives occupy. It's got to be embarrassing to them to have their "New Beginnings" guy sound so much like the man who held the job before he took it.

Maybe we'd better go back and take a look at the meaning of those "liberal" and "conservative" labels we tend to put on one another.

Emergency FmHA Loans

Otero County was declared eligible for Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) disaster emergency loans on January 9, 1987. Generally, this means that farmers who have lost at least 30 percent of their production due to excessive rains, hail, and flash flooding are eligible for FmHA loans. Proceeds from crop insurance are taken into account when determining eligibility.

FmHA County Supervisor, Woods, is urging farmers who are interested in receiving an emergency loan to get their applications to FmHA as soon as possible. Mr. Woods said, "We hope farmers will get their applications in early rather than waiting until near the deadline which is September 9, 1987. The longer they wait, the more chance there is for long delays in getting their checks. If the applications come in early, we can avoid backlogs and speed up the process."

County Commissioners Bill Karns and Ralph Dunlap met at the County sub-office in Ruidoso in a special meeting. They declared Lincoln County a disaster area due to the road conditions caused by snow and high winds - up to 50 mph. John Allen Hightower was unable to attend as he was busy breaking ice and taking care of his livestock.

Ben Hall, state representative, was notified, as was Tom Clausen, CPO coordinator/State Highway Department representative to the Governor and Col. Larry Lujan, Adjutant General of New Mexico National Guard, and personal representative of the Governor and by Friday morning Lincoln County was eligible for state and federal aid.

The three to four feet of snow combined with winds up to 50 miles an hour creating drifts up to 12 feet high had caused a life threatening situation to both humans and livestock. The snowpacked storm center was Eve

Latham's ranch. The storm covered approximately 1 million acres of land. As one helicopter personnel said, "I didn't know there was this much country."

Due to the lack of proper snow removal equipment, the Lincoln County road department crew was not capable of clearing the roads. The wind would cause snow to drift in faster than they could clear the roads. Five miles a day was good with the road crews working night and day but with 300-400 miles of roads to be cleared, it was an impossible task.

The disaster declaration made it possible for Lincoln County to receive snow removal equipment from other areas.

The NM National Guard sent in two helicopters which landed at the New Mexico State Highway Department yard in Corona at 10 a.m. Friday. Road department crew Mike Points and Joe Joe Vega and County Commissioner Ralph Dunlap had gathered all the vital information on the stranded ranchers and older people who needed to be checked.

On the first run Mike Points and Joe Vega acted as spotters to locate the various ranchers and residents. Vega had to be left at Eve Latham's on the return trip as the helicopter was running low on fuel. The helicopter can fly 2 1/2 hours before needing to re-fuel.

While the helicopters were being refueled, everyone had lunch, some of the crew shovelled the Corona school students the helicopters and feed and groceries were loaded for delivery. Brent Sultemeier was one of the spotters on the second trip.

The road crew by acting as spotters were able to locate roads needing to be opened.

The road crew, county manager Suzanne Cox, Ben Hall and state officials and all volunteers did a tremendous job.

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

George D. Wallace, Captain, 7th Cavalry, killed in action with Sioux Indians, at Wounded Knee Creek, South Dakota, Dec. 29th, 1890, aged 41 years and 4 months.

Deceased was born in South Carolina; appointed from South Carolina; graduated from Military Academy, West Point, N.Y., June 14, 1872; 2nd Lieutenant 7th Cavalry same day; 1st Lieut. June 23, 1876; Adjutant same day and served as such until June 6th, 1877.

He was specially mentioned for gallant services at the battle of Little Big Horn with Reno's command.

Capt. Wallace was a son of Lieut. Col. Geo. Wallace, U.S. Army, who died October 12, 1888. His widowed mother lives at Short Mills, N.J. Capt. Wallace leaves wife and children.

The only man we've seen looking down at the mouth in White Oaks for many a day was Dr. Bearup, the dentist, this week.


