## 2 held in ShopRite burglary

Taken in a break-in at Shop Rite Grocery in Carrizozo on Nov. 22 were cartons of cigarettes and a variety of other things. Larry Brinkley of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department is conducting the investigation and has taken fingerprints and photographs at the scene.

Entry to the building was gained through a back door. In addition to the broken door, other damage was broken water lines and broken merchandise.

Being charged in connection with the break-in are Paul D. Baca, 21, and Kirt Novotny, 18. Baca made a first appearance before Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr. on Monday; being charged with burglary of a commercial building and conspiracy. A trial date has not been set.

Novotny made a first appearance before Judge Dean on Tuesday; being charged with receiving stolen property. Trial date is pending.

Shop Rite manager Manuel Malone said that security officials from Furrs have been conducting an investigation into the matter this week.

## Sheriff flings gauntlet at county commissioners

"I, too, am concerned about the financial condition of Lincoln County; but, more directly, with the financial condition of the sheriff's office," Don W. Samuels, Lincoln County Sheriff, read from a prepared statement during the Nov. 24 county commission meeting.

Samuels had asked to be on the agenda at the start of the meeting, saying that he had an appointment in Ruidoso in an hour. His statement was in referral to the statement read by commission chairman John A. Hightower at the Nov. 10 meeting in which Hightower stated that the county has no excess cash balance to go to and that it is critical that the departments stay within their budgets.

"If you have an unexpected expense it will be necessary that you make cuts within your budget to cover it," Hightower's statement continued. "There is no general fund bail out."

After an executive session during the Nov. 10 meeting the county commission agreed to hold \$20,000 from the capital outlay line item of the sheriff's budget for possible litigation and attorney fees.

Samuels' statement on Nov. 24 continued: "The commissioners action, as a result of an executive session 11/10/87, to hold \$20,000 from the capital outlay line item of the sheriff's budget for possible litigation and

### Board members appointed

The Lincoln County Commission met Nov. 24 in a meeting rescheduled from Dec. 1. The meeting began with a statement read by Sheriff Don W. Samuels regarding the financial condition of the sheriff's department. (See sheriff's statement.)

In other business, commissioners appointed members to the Planning and Zoning Commission, the Lincoln Historic Preservation board and the Lincoln County fair board, approved the transfer of a liquor license and approved an amended lease agreement for New Horizons Developmental Center.

Re-appointed for a two-year term to the planning and zoning commission were E.J. Fouratt, Modesto Chavez, Ben Hall, Walton Wilson and La-Moyne Peters. Other members of the board are Sid Goodloe, Alton Whittaker, Betty Schrecengost and Mack Bell. The terms of these four will expire in December 1988.

Charles L. Smith was re-appointed as member-at-large to the Lincoln Historic Preservation board. Newly appointed members are Gary Morton and Kay Dennis. Other board members are Ira David Lee and Leota Pfingsten. These two terms will expire in December 1988. Ervin Aldaz

was appointed as first alternate.

Re-appointed to the Lincoln County fair board were Ralph Dunlap, Scott Shafer and Hoot Gibson. Newly appointed members will be Betty Lou Joiner, Hub Traylor and Linda Fuchs. Other board members whose terms expire December 1988 are Linda Ponder, Pete Gnatkowski, Preston Stone, Cal Cowden and George Lightfoot. Board members whose terms expire December 1989 are Inez Marrs, Denise Byrd and Mack

Transfer of ownership of the liquor license for The New Barn in Ruidoso was approved from Michael Janis to Helen E. and Victor P. Giancoletti.

The amended lease agreement for New Horizons Developmental Center to allow for the Human Services Department to be housed in that building was approved.

## Stench at Eagle Creek

### Ruidoso City Council spends money on ill-advised, unnecessary project

One gets a queasy feeling when listening to arguments by the Ruidoso City Council to construct a water transmission line and a roadway for the Eagle Creek Well Project.

Is it wise to spend \$768,000 on a transmission line and road where the facts support (1) the proposed project is unnecessary and (2) only \$500,000 is available from taxpayers funds? It has been demonstrated that when water is needed by Ruidoso the natural creek beds in the vicinity of the wells can be used without a pipeline.

The proponents of the transmission line claim that using the line will save the cost of purifying the water. This may be true if the water line is to operate continuously. To use the water line only when water is needed by Ruidoso does not support any savings, only a cost of \$768,000.

Are we spending this money to improve our water capabilities or to placate the Forest Service? You be the judge!

Here are the facts which, thus far, have been ignored by the Ruidoso Council, mayor, and the Administration.

The Eagle Creek wells were drilled in 1984. The drilling was a hush-hush affair and the reason for the secrecy came to light when the State Water Engineer rushed to declare the well area under his jurisdiction. Apparently the State Engineer did not consider the possibility of wells being drilled on Forest land and had not included this area under his control. How did Ruidoso obtain permission to drill these wells? Was a promise made to construct a road as a consideration for the well drilling? To lay an underground pipeline? Apparently the answer was "yes," although no one at the time knew the cost of what such a promise would involve.

If an agreement was made, what was the agreement? A handshake? A telephone promise? or a signed document?

For the past year the writer has attempted to discover in what form a promise, if any, had been made to the Forest Service. The answers were so hazy that it appeared that no such agreement existed. Then a document appeared on the scene. This document was reported to support an obligation by the city to build a road, construct an underground pipeline, with an underground utility system on Forest land.

What is this agreement and what does it say?

I have a copy before me and here is what it says: "This permit covers 2.8 acres and is issued for the purpose of: For four existing water wells, construction of four pump houses, a control room, and a water transmission line in accordance with the attached concept plan and specifications

## Carrizozo Board of Trustees

### Town audit approved; water contract signed

The Carrizozo Board of Trustees met for only one meeting in November on Nov. 19. Business conducted included receiving the audit report, approving the contract for water engineering services, approving the election resolution and discussing the purchase of a new police unit.

DeAun Willoughby presented the audit report with the only negative thing being that the town does not have a complete physical inventory. Town clerk Carol Schlarb said the inventory will be completed as required.

The audit report has been sent to Santa Fe.

Bill Zimmerman and Alan W. O'Brien, representing Wilson and Company, engineers and architects, answered questions about the proposed contract for engineering services for water system improvements.

Zimmerman explained that the water tank would need to be drained to allow workers to get inside the tank to inspect the sides and bottom. There will be a drop in water

pressure during the water tank inspection. When the date has been set, notices will be in the NEWS and posted around the town to notify residents of the drop in water pressure.

The contract was approved by the trustees. Phase I will include installation of a two-zone water pressure system and locating the possible obstruction in the lines. The contract contains a clause whereby the town can negotiate for further water system improvements.

Ordinance 80-102 was adopted adding wording to change the penalty assessment for traffic violations from \$5 to \$10.

Trustee Linda Haller announced new officers for 1988 for the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce; president Betty Howell, vice-president Rita Narvaez, treasurer Phyllis Schlegel, recording secretary Ruth Hammond, corresponding secretary Woody Schlegel, directors Danny Burnett, Pete King, Glen Ellison and Johnny Anderson.

Haller said she plans to at-

tend the RC&D meeting at Holloman Air Force Base on Dec. 1. The meeting will include a tour of the primate lab.

A discussion was held concerning the purchase of a new police unit. Trustees noted that the 350 c.i. V8s get six miles per gallon compared to the smaller engine vehicles getting 11 to 14 miles per gallon.

Chief of Police C.A. Morales said he preferred the big engine vehicle in case of a high speed chase. Mayor Bob Hemphill said he would prefer the town officers to not make high speed chases but to radio for assistance.

Trustees asked that prices be obtained on alternative vehicles before a decision is made as to which vehicle to order. They agreed they wanted a safe vehicle but the difference in gas mileage could amount to \$1,200 a year savings.

The Village of Ruidoso offered to give a non-directional loan beacon to the town of Carrizozo to be used at the Car-

attorney fees has left no doubt regarding the lack of cooperation and communication between the commissioners and the sheriff's office.

"This action was taken without knowledge or input of the sheriff," Samuels read. "I question if commissioners have the authority to put a hold on any elected officials budget that has been locally and state approved."

"To insure proper law enforcement for the citizens in Lincoln County, the sheriff's department has gone to outside sources, applied for and received grant monies for badly needed equipment and now \$20,000 from my budget has been frozen."

"The position this office must take is that the commissioners either pay the unexpected expenses from the legal line item from general fund, or provide each department with enough budget to cover an unexpected lawsuit. Since the current county attorney has taken the opposite side in any dispute that has occurred, and has not represented the county, only the commissioners, this has been an added burden that other elected officials have had to contend with."

"Since I was duly elected as sheriff of the people, I answer only to the public and not to the county commissioners, county manager or county attorney. Therefore, I want the public to know how their sheriff's department is being treated," Samuels concluded his statement and left the meeting room.

Before Samuels got out of the room, commissioner Bill Karn asked, "Don, do you want to talk about any of these things?" Samuels did not respond, but continued to walk out of the room.

"I guess he didn't want to talk about any of these things," Karn said.

Apparently the litigation referred to is for the grievances hearings requested by sheriff's employees during this year. A grievance hearing was held April 13 for deputy Lerry Bond, another hearing was held June 18 for sheriff deputy Jimmy Luna, the first grievance hearing for sheriff deputy Ronald W. Harrison was held Sept. 10 and the second grievance hearing for Harrison was held Oct. 30.

During the grievance hearings the sheriff was represented by attorney Dan Bryant. County attorney Gary Mitchell sat with the personnel board (grievance board) which consists of one elected official (Marian Schlarb), one county employee (Earl Krieg), and one resident from each county commission district (Barbara Duff, Israel Miranda and Patsy Sanchez.)

The personnel board was established in 1982 to allow county employees due process in grievances they might have against department heads and/or elected officials. The four grievance hearings this year are the only times the board has met.

When asked why he sat with the grievance board instead of representing the sheriff, Mitchell said, "Because my obligation is to the county; my obligation is to advise boards and commissioners and elected officials, EXCEPT in disputes; then to act in a neutral position, to see that everything is fair to avoid liability to the county."


"Specifically in personnel matters," Mitchell continued, "The important thing to the county is to make certain the elected official and the employee BOTH receive fair and impartial hearings in front of an unbiased board in a prompt and orderly fashion."

At the close of the county commission meeting Karn cited the fact that the sheriff said there was no communication between the sheriff's department and the commissioners.

Karn said, "I feel it was unfortunate that the sheriff, after delivering his statement, had a prior meeting to attend and couldn't discuss the statement at the moment."

Karn then requested that a meeting be arranged between the commissioners and the sheriff's department, possibly at the Risk Management meeting, with all department heads attending.

## School board denies request to store Nielson equipment

After a lengthy discussion at the Nov. 17 meeting of the Carrizozo Board of Education it was the consensus of the board that it would not be in the best interest of the school to allow Nielsons Inc. to store heavy equipment in the area around the ag farm west of Carrizozo.

A representative of Nielsons spoke to school superintendent Danny Burnett

\$17,895. County manager Suzanne Cox explained that the bill was for services from July 26 to Nov. 9, \$7,232 of the bill was for the Mescalero water suit, with the remainder being divided between litigation and county business.

Mark Sawyers, of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, explained the grant the county is applying for to replace the 70-year-old bleachers at the county fair grounds in Capitan. The grant will enable the county to replace the bleachers with semi-portable bleachers and to plant 10 mulberry trees which will aid in cooling the exhibit building in the summer.

Sawyers said work is being started on a master plan for the fairgrounds.

an agreement other than the Special Use agreement Ruidoso has no obligation to lay a pipeline, build a road, or lay an electrical line.

It is time we level with the taxpayers about the money already spent and planned to be spent on the Eagle Creek wells.

\$2,000,000 or more has already been spent without the expressed approval of the taxpayers and you are considering an additional \$500,000 or more for the Eagle Creek project.

Let's just call a halt. The wells have been drilled and whether we use the water or not is not the point. We don't need to sink any more funds into that project.

Someone goofed when Ruidoso paid \$1,328,000 as a "finders fee" to Atkins Engineering for locating water in Eagle Creek. Let's don't goof again.

Enough is enough.

and requested that the construction company be allowed to store 100 pieces of equipment in the acreage surrounding the ag barn. They offered to pay \$100 a month for a period of time not to exceed eight months.

The equipment is presently being used for Nielsons' phase of work on the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport that is being built on the Fort Stanton mesa. Nielsons will complete their work there this week.

School board vice-president Hoot Gibson was concerned about erosion problems from the equipment being brought in and taken out. "We at least have some ground cover in that area," Gibson said.

Board member Nat Palomarez remarked that the equipment was worth more than \$1 million and, "at \$100 a month for 100 pieces of equipment that is one dollar per piece of equipment for storage. They don't value their equipment."

rizzo Municipal Airport. The beacon will be available when the Ruidoso airport is closed and the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport is opened.

Hemphill has contacted the State Aviation Agency for more information because the beacon must be installed by certified FCC personnel.

Trustees agreed that the town should enter into a contract with the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County after wording has been changed in the bylaws. Hemphill was concerned that the EDC could encumber the town without its approval.

Master's Workshop notified the town that they are having trouble with funding for the business they plan to bring to Carrizozo. Wording is to be changed in the lease agreement.

The resolution calling for an election on March 1, 1988 to fill two council seats was approved. Candidates for the two positions are to file their declaration of candidacy on Jan. 5 and write-in candidates are to file their declaration of candidacy on Jan. 19. The state legislature has mandated that write-in candidates file a declaration of candidacy.

The lease-purchase agreement for the new fire truck was approved.

The New Mexico Diamond Jubilee/US Constitution Bicentennial Commission has approved \$900 for a plaque commemorating Governor William C. McDonald to be placed on a monument in the Governor William C. McDonald Memorial Park (formerly Spider Park, across from the post office in Carrizozo.)

The plaque is to include the words "Donated by the New Mexico Diamond Jubilee/US Constitution Bicentennial Committee" and if possible will include the logo for New Mexico's 70th anniversary of statehood.

An executive session was held for personnel.





schools as a whole, the public gave teachers an 80 percent passing rate opposed to 69 percent passing rate for administrators, the public indicated it wanted the federal government to have less control and the state and local governments to have more, drugs and alcohol were the worst problem facing education, and 73 percent felt eligibility requirements for participation in extracurricular activities were about right.

Burnett presented letters he had sent to the department of education and to State Representative Maurice Hobson regarding consolidation and students attending school out of district. The board suggested he send a copy of both letters to State Senator James Martin.

During the discussion on consolidation of schools Burnett stated that in 1987 there were 947 individual school districts. These were

consolidated to 103 school districts in 1983 and today there are 88 school districts.

"If the state shuts down half of the schools, I can't imagine any company, force or industry wanting to come to the state," Gibson said. The board asked members of the audience to help by letting legislators know of their opposition to consolidation.

"We need to show a massive amount of support against consolidation or they (the legislators) will think we are in favor of consolidation," Gibson said.

Burnett reported that Lincoln County had sent a letter stating the funding for the swimming pool would be cut from \$1,500 to \$1,125 the next fiscal year.

A letter from the Southwestern New Mexico Education Council listed positions they would take on certain issues: wanting to take out time limits on service contracts, excluding schools from mandated wage rates; excluding schools from law which mandates semi-monthly

paydays, revising Senate Bill 106 rule mandating class sizes as some schools cannot comply due to growth and continuing with the funding formula now used to determine the amount of money each school district gets.

The New Mexico School Board Association state convention will be held in Albuquerque Dec. 3-5.

The New Mexico Research and Study Council notified Burnett that the Carrizozo Vocational program received first place in the state and will receive the Quality Education Award. Gaines will receive the award during a luncheon banquet in Albuquerque on Dec. 11.

Burnett reported that the PFK (People For Kids) are sponsoring a student of the month for the elementary, mid high and high schools. Students will receive a certificate for the honor and are selected not only for academics but their participation in activities, behavior, good deeds, how they relate to others, etc. Students of the month for November are Nell Montez, Cheryl Hightower and Valeria Archuleta.

FEA chapter president Leah Patterson and secretary Marcia Hefker reported on the trip to the FEA convention held in Kansas City. Other students making the trip were Jeanna Sims, John Maxwell and Lisa Hightower. Four sponsors accompanied the students. Hefker and Patterson thanked the board for their help with money for the trip.

Burnett reported that the custodial vacancy had been filled and that Mike Morrison and Rae Dean Barre had been hired. The new employees will work six hours a day from 8 to 8 a.m. and again from 2 to 6 p.m. They qualify under the Job Training Partnership Act and half of their wages will be paid by JTPA until January. This will result in a savings to the district of \$3,700 for the year.

Burnett said a committee consisting of school personnel had made the recommendation as to whom to hire. On the committee are Peggy Frazer, Bob Hemphill, Mel Holland, Marianne Patterson and Mike Gaines.

The custodial program is also being re-assessed and the committee is looking at the staffing pattern. Holland is in charge of the maintenance list which is now five pages long.

Burnett said a new approach, new equipment and new methods will be used to remedy some of the problems noted in the needs assessment. The custodians will now have a checklist of things to do every day in every classroom.

# OPINION

Remember what you were thinking, talking and writing about five years ago? A newspaper editor can look back in his files and refresh his memory of what he wrote yesterday or 50 years ago. For this Thanksgiving I am reprinting an OPINION column in the Lincoln County News for Nov. 24, 1968. In it, the Thanksgiving turkey has been apportioned among newsmakers according to their merit. Observe the piece reserved for former Gov. Toney Anaya!

History is but a lie agreed upon, which may be why people regard history with suspicion and skepticism. We are in a history-making era where lives and events are being shaped and recorded that generations to come may understand not what happened but what we desired to have happen. For example, where is the Congressman who voted Martin Luther King Jr. a national holiday who does not know that he was a phoney, an apostle of violence, a lawbreaker and a close friend of known Communists? They all know his record, yet he is being sanctified and purged of all wrongdoing, the better to fit nicely into history books.

So it was with the first Thanksgiving in America. Our history books tell us that this was solemn, pious expression of gratitude to God for His bounty and goodness following the Pilgrims' first harvest. There is a sole eyewitness to this first Thanksgiving, Edward Winslow. Nowhere in his account does he mention any giving of thanks to God by the Pilgrims. James Deetz and Jay Anderson wrote of this in an article for Saturday Review of Science in 1972: "What took place on that fall day some three-and-a-half centuries ago is best understood as the first 'harvest festival' held on American soil, the acting out of an institution of great antiquity in the England the Pilgrims had left behind. It was a time for joy, celebration and carousing, far removed from any suggestion of solemn religious concern." The authors point out the Pilgrims did not choose "a solemn day of thanksgiving to formalize their thanks to God." Rather, they opted for a day of revelry, sports and feasts patterned after the Harvest Home celebration they had left behind in England.

The fact that Thanksgiving has been distorted does not lessen the need to have a day set aside where men of goodwill can express gratitude to God for the year's harvest. Those who did not sow, till and harvest crops may offer their gratitude to Congress for an abundance of food stamps, surplus commodities, subsidized bastardy, payments for not producing things and payments for not working at all. Anyway, let's get on with Thanksgiving greetings:

To the Arizona legislature which adopted a resolution sent to the US Senate Foreign Relations Committee in Washington which said, in part: That the United States Ambassador to the USSR convey to the government of the Soviet Union the recommendation of the Senate of the State of Arizona that the government of the Soviet Union be exiled to Siberia and thereafter, go straight to hell!

An anemic turkey to the US Congress which gave us the best Thanksgiving of all last Friday by adjourning to keep from doing even more mischief. Before retiring to thank God for their fat salaries, they raised the nation's borrowing power by \$101 BILLION, making our total national debt a mere \$1.49 TRILLION, and in so doing removed the turkeys from the tables of their constituents.

Happy Thanksgiving to Clarence Sparks, owner of Jake's Grocery in Denver, CO who has been ordered by the state's court of appeals to pay \$306,000 because he shot and wounded a man who was robbing his store. We must all be reminded that injuring a criminal in pursuit of his vocation is incompatible with American justice. ### Pat Robertson should withdraw, as a victim of Biden's Disease

Having used the Southern Baptist Ministry to acquire his own TV network and millions of fans and political workers, the Reverend Pat Robertson announced on Sept. 29 that he preferred to be removed from the ministry in order to run for President of the United States. He did not even have the grace to be present when the congregation which ordained him—the Freeman Street Baptist Church—voted to accept his renunciation of holy orders. Instead, he sent a message that he did so in order to counter any complaints that his candidacy was blurring the lines between church and state.

This casts a cloud on one of his fellow Republicans, Senator John Danforth of Missouri, who is an Episcopal priest. It also suggests that ordination to the Christian ministry requires abdication of that part of the right of citizenship which is the right to run for President.

What the Freeman Baptists might have done—for good cause—is to send back Brother Robertson's resignation, with a requested revision; that he resign from the ministry because of repeated instances of Joe Biden's Disease.

If Joe Biden withdrew from the presidential race for lying, literary thievery and cheating, so should the formerly Reverend Pat Robertson.

Robertson is the author of a book entitled "Answers to 200 of Life's Most Probing Questions," in which he wrote:

"A person who falsifies his achievements or age is lying. . . A person who covers up or exaggerates facts is lying."

In July, the Reverend Mr. Robertson told *The Washington Post* that he was married to his wife Adelia on March 22, 1954. But when the *Wall Street Journal* discovered that this couple was really married on Aug. 27 of that year, Robertson declared: "We have always considered March 22nd as the day we were married, because our son was conceived that day."

Was this conception without benefit of clergy regarded as some part of common law marriage? And if so, why did Robertson actually marry his seven months pregnant common law wife—and then lie about it, until caught by the press, which he has the nerve to denounce as "outrageous?"

"To us," he explains "it wasn't any big deal." Well, if the liar thinks that fornication and lying to cover it up is "no big deal" to the millions of religious people who are his political constituency, he is suffering from dangerous illusions. I use the word "liar" advisedly. Robertson lied in

claiming that he has been a member of the board of directors of the United Virginia Bank. When caught, he lied again, in saying he had never made this claim—which is on videotaped legal deposition.

By his own definition of lying, Robertson also claimed to be a Marine combat veteran in Korea, when he saw no combat. He also claimed to have had "graduate study at the University of London"—which has now been revised to read: "studied briefly at the University of London." For even though he told CBS "I've been in school, in graduate school at the University of London," what he actually attended was an introductory arts course for American students summering in London.

On the dust jackets of his books are claims that he was a tax lawyer and an economist. In fact, Robertson graduated from Yale Law School, but flunked the New York bar exam. He now explains the "tax lawyer" bit by noting: "My specialty was tax law at Yale."

In 1972, Robertson wrote a book entitled "Shout It From The Housetops," in which he revealed:

"I had become so sensitive to the truth, that I couldn't stand falsehood. When anyone made a misstatement of fact in my presence, I felt as if a knife had been twisted in my stomach."

Along with this Knife-In-Stomach statement, the Reverend Mr. Robertson revealed that God Almighty had personally ordered him not to get involved in civil politics—even to help his father's campaign for reelection to the US Senate.

"I have called you to my ministry," said God, (according to Robertson). "You cannot tie my eternal purposes to the success of any political candidate."

That was 1972. In 1986, when Robertson decided to consider running for president, this Shout-From-The-Housetops was reissued, by Robertson's Christian Broadcasting Network—with God's 1986 Message-By-Pat-About-Politics completely excised!

"It was highly stylized work," explained the Reverend Pat. "It's essentially accurate." (Essentially accurate. As in "slightly pregnant.") But, adds Robertson: "I have not lied about my marriage, or anything."

When this recurrent liar was caught, in all these lies and deceptions, he was at first stumped. "I have never had this kind of precision demanded of me before," he lamented.

Then, like a cornered rodent, he attacked those who exposed his network of lies, and who he denounced as "outrageous" and "reprehensible."

SANTA FE—Aspiring Democrats are beginning to line up again to vie for the challenge of facing US Rep. Manuel Lujan in the Congressional District 1 race.

### Pact could be fatal

EDITOR—Next Dec. 7 Ronald Reagan and Gorbachev intend to sign a pact that will for the first time eliminate a whole class of modern nuclear weapons.

The pact itself will not eliminate any nuclear weapons. Only the governments of the two countries can take the necessary steps to do that. Since the Soviet Union has broken more than a thousand agreements with other countries, including every treaty signed with the United States, how can anyone believe that they will keep this one. In the words of V.I. Lenin, "Treaties are like pie crusts, made to be broken."

According to Brigadier General Andrew J. Gatsis, the Soviets are pushing for elimination of medium range missiles because they are in deep economic trouble and fear the accuracy of the Pershing missile, which can reach their homeland from West Germany in three minutes. Gatsis said, "But the Pershing is the only weapon that would deter the Soviets from conquering Western Europe with conventional forces. The East has 4.8 million troops to the West's 2.1 million, and 27,000 tanks to the West's 7,000."

## SOUTHWESTERN LURE

The National Gallery this month in Washington opened the first major Georgia O'Keeffe show in 18 years. O'Keeffe, painter of New Mexico deserts and giant, close-up flowers with erotic overtones, would have been 100 years old on Nov. 15. She died at age 98.

The tribute to O'Keeffe is a selective survey of 120 works, one-third of them previously locked away in her estate. The exhibition is a group of abstract charcoal drawings known as "Specials" work from shapes she said she saw in her head and conveyed through the expressive power of music.

"I've been all over the world," O'Keeffe is quoted as remarking, "and nothing is as good as this," referring to

regular visits to New Mexico in 1929. She took up permanent residence after her husband died in 1946. Her husband was photographer and avant-garde dealer Alfred Stieglitz.

## INTELLIGENCE QUOTIENT

New research suggests that many people are smarter than we may think. A Harvard psychologist argues that there isn't just one kind of intelligence but several "frames of mind."

U.S. News & World Report (Nov. 23) featured an article, "Getting Smart About IQ" in which it reports that psychologists and educators are redefining what intelligence really is and devising ways to improve thinking skills once thought to be fixed for life.

A Yale University psychologist had this to say of the good old-fashioned IQ tests: "There are a lot of successful people who didn't do well on IQ tests. The tests put too little emphasis on practical and creative skills."

## GETTING SMART

The article describes seven ways to be bright.

(1) Linguistic. Language skills include a sensitivity to the subtle shades of the meaning of words.

(2) Logical-Mathematical. Both critics and supporters acknowledge that IQ tests measure this ability well.

(3) Musical. Like language, music is an expressive medium and this talent flourishes in prodigies.

(4) Spatial. Sculptors and painters are able accurately to perceive, manipulate and re-create forms.

(5) Bodily-Kinesthetic. At the core of this kind of intelligence are body control and skilled handling of objects.

(6) Interpersonal. Skills in reading the moods and inter-

What better time to send an emotionally upset and hysterical citizenry to Congress demanding that nukes be converted to food stamps!

## Capitan prepares for '88 election

The Capitan Village Council, meeting in special session Monday evening, adopted resolution 87-6 calling for a regular municipal election on March 1, 1988. The purpose of the election is to fill the following positions: One trustee for a four-year term and one trustee for a four-year term. Voters in Precinct 1 shall vote at the Fair Building in Capitan.

Voters in the absent voter precinct will vote at the office of the village clerk.

Persons desiring to register to vote in this election must register with the county clerk of Lincoln County not later than Tuesday, Feb. 2, 1988 at 5 p.m.

All declarations of candidacy shall be filed with the municipal clerk on Tuesday, Jan. 5, 1988 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

The second item on the agenda was the rain drainage problem on the west end of town. The state highway department has agreed to pay for 60 percent of the cost. The big question is how will the remaining 40 percent be split between the school and the village. A ball park figure for the cost of the project is \$25,300.

Some of those present got the impression that school officials believe that the drainage problem should have been attended to by the village years ago. Village officials believe that the flood problem on 4th Street, which became apparent after a cloudburst on Aug. 6, was caused by construction of the new football field and lack of attention to drainage. At least one trustee felt that architect Jim French should have paid more attention to this situation.

Trustee Dave Strickland made a motion which was approved by the council. This calls for the village to enter into a joint powers agreement with the Capitan Schools. The remaining 40 percent left after the state highway department pays 60 percent would be split evenly between the school and the village.

The concept is that the culvert on 4th Street would be blocked off and the water would run in a ditch parallel to the new football field, under 5th Street and into the arroyo just beyond.

The next regular meeting of the village council is Dec. 14.

## Motorists cautioned on holiday travel

John Fenner, chief of the state Highway and Transportation Department's traffic safety bureau, cautioned motorists to drive defensively when traveling over the Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

He advised using seat belts and child restraint devices, avoiding alcohol when driving and being alert for alcohol abusers on the road.

Accident statistics cited by Fenner support his plea for caution. During the 1986 Thanksgiving holiday there were five fatalities and 238 persons injured in motor vehicle accidents. In the four-year period from 1983 through 1986 the holiday has had an average

of six fatalities and 254 injuries. During all of 1986 there was an average of one fatality every 17.6 hours. During the Thanksgiving holiday a fatality occurred on the average of every 15.6 hours.

An increase in fatalities during the long holiday periods is attributed in part to the larger volume of traffic. People also travel long distances to be with family and friends and fail to allow sufficient travel time then speed to try and make up time.
