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## Commissioners file writ petition against sheriff

The Lincoln County Commissioners, through county attorney Gary Mitchell, have filed a petition for declaratory judgment or in the alternative, application for issuance of writ of mandamus and complaint for damages vs Don W. Samuels, individually and as sheriff of Lincoln County, NM.

The inch-thick petition was filed in district court in Carrizozo on Jan. 14. The case has been assigned to District Judge Sandra Grisham but no court date has been set for Judge Grisham to hear the petition.

As of yesterday, Samuels had not been served with the suit. After he has been served with the summons he will have 30 days in which to serve a pleading or motion in response to the complaint.

penditures regarding overtime and comp time.

The request in Count I further asks that the court order Samuels to pay damages in an amount to be determined at trial and for such other and further relief as the court deems just and proper.

Count II contains 12 items and refers to the termination of Jimmy Luna and the refusal of Samuels to reinstate Luna to his position as a deputy sheriff. The request is for the court to issue a writ of mandamus ordering Samuels to comply and to reinstate Luna with all duties and responsibilities which he had prior to his termination and to pay damages in an amount to be determined at trial and such other relief as the court deems just and proper.

Count III includes: (2) Defendant Samuels, through his chief deputy and other of-

fering to due process, equal protection, and their right of access to the elected officials who have the duty to manage the monies and properties of the County of Lincoln, and to hear and determine violations of the County's Personnel Act.

The request for Count III is for the court to issue a writ of mandamus ordering Samuels to cease and desist and to order his deputy sheriff and ranking officers to cease and desist from any type of physical and/or verbal harassment of employees and their right of access to their elected officials, including the commissioners, and their rights to utilize the right to access and for such other and further relief as the court deems just and proper.

Count IV contains seven items and refers to invoices and expenses incurred by the sheriff's department. The request is for the court to issue a writ of mandamus ordering Samuels to comply with the ordinances and further, an order stopping him and ordering him to turn in his bills in a timely and proper fashion so as not to incur interest and late penalty

charges, check his invoices and not authorize monies for any amounts in excess of the invoices, and further comply with the per diem act and the rules and regulations and the directives of the county commissioners for the filling out of travel vouchers for individuals utilizing their personal cars, and for such other and further relief as the court deems just and proper.

There are four exhibits attached to the petition.

Samuels is at his home recuperating from surgery and expects to be back in his office within a few days.

## Garbage rates to be hiked in Carrizozo

During the special meeting Jan. 19, the Carrizozo board of trustees voted to increase rates for garbage service.

Residential rates will be

increased \$2 per month and commercial rates will be restructured according to the amount of refuse removed.

The motion to increase residential rates and restruc-

ture commercial rates was approved with trustees Patsy Sanchez, Albert Baca and Linda Haller voting aye. Trustee Eddie O'Brien abstained from voting.

The new rate schedule for commercial service includes a charge of \$3 per yard on the one and one-half yard container and \$2.10 per yard on the three-yard container. Commercial services will receive a 30 percent discount for the second pick-up each week and a 35 percent discount for the second bin.

Mayor Bob Hemphill stated that at the time the contract was signed with Waste Control to provide the service the commercial rates were set at 60 percent of the rates established by Tularosa.

Tularosa now has a rate structure similar to Carrizozo's new rate schedule but the rates are higher in Tularosa.

Four business people attended the meeting and voiced their opinions about the proposed increase before trustees voted.

"It is fantastic service and keeps the town a lot cleaner," said Hal Sims, owner of Family Pharmacy.

Pete and Debbie King, owners of Kings Food Mart, agreed that the new rate structure was "fine." Dale Goad said the new rates were "fair."

Hemphill stated that he expects businesses to be more conservative with their containers. Businesses have the option of going to smaller containers and/or reducing the times a week their garbage is picked up.

The new rate structure is available at city hall for people to see.

Trustees also agreed to increase the amount paid to Waste Control by \$400 per month. Kevin Smith, owner of Waste Control, was unable to attend the Jan. 19 meeting due to the bad weather but had presented his costs and expenses at the Jan. 12 meeting. Waste Control is losing \$1,600 per month by providing the service in Carrizozo.

## 5 file as write-in candidates

The municipal elections to be held March 1 have five more candidates for the various positions in the county, even though the names of the candidates will not appear on the ballots.

Write-in candidate filing date was Tuesday and three people filed for positions in Carrizozo, one filed in Ruidoso Downs and one filed in Ruidoso.

The three write-in candidates for trustee in Carrizozo are David A. Vermillion, Beulah H. Moore and William D. LaMay.

Joe T. Southard is the write-in candidate for municipal judge in Ruidoso Downs and Thomas B. McNeil is a write-in candidate for councillor for a two-year term in Ruidoso.

Voter registration books will close at 5 p.m., Feb. 2. Voters must be registered by then to be able to vote in the municipal elections.

## CPR saves man's life

John Jiron, Carrizozo, admits he was scared Friday night when his companion, David Swift, stopped breathing and turned blue.

Jiron began CPR, a life-saving technique he learned five years ago as a requirement for working at the Zia Senior Citizens Center.

While Jiron was administering CPR to Swift, the ambulance was called and EMTs Mary Crenshaw and Rosemary Zink answered the call and began emergency treatment. Swift was in fair condition when the ambulance arrived at the Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso. Doctors there said Jiron had probably saved Swift's life by his quick action.

Swift was released the next day and is recovering.

Jiron is also a volunteer fireman with the Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Dept.

officers who hold the rank of either Lieutenant or Sergeant, but in any event are superior officers, have made threats and/or condoned threats of violence to sheriff's employees who report violation of the county ordinances and/or violations of the law, to the Commissioners of the County of Lincoln, and the commissioner's attorneys, manager and/or agents.

## Carrizozo renews school Supt. Burnett's contract

Danny Burnett is completing his first year as superintendent of Carrizozo schools. The school board voted unanimously at the Jan. 19 meeting to renew his contract for two years.

In other business during the unusually short meeting, an executive session was held for 33 minutes regarding personnel. No decisions were made.

—Burnett announced that the students of the month for

January were Ute Wiezorak for high school; Amy Funk, mid-school, and Victor Parra, elementary. Each student receives a certificate in honor of the recognition and also receive a special gift from PFK (People for Kids), sponsors of student of the month.

—Burnett congratulated the Grizzly girl's basketball team for winning the Smokey Bear tournament. Coach Mel Holland expressed his congratulations also.

—The contract for speech services was approved for Jennifer Hinojosa to provide speech services for Carrizozo on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays for the second semester.

—Burnett reported that bids for the metal building for the ag barn were due Jan. 29. The contract will be awarded at the February school board meeting. The building will provide a covered "kill floor" for the facility. An open house will be held after the construction is complete.

—The board approved a mileage increase and budget increase for the school bus routes because remote location deadhead mileage was left off the original contract. The increase was for 60 miles a day at 22 cents a mile for a total of \$3,400 for the year.

—Burnett reported that he hired a person for campus security during the Christmas vacation to check all doors in all buildings after he found doors open. A total of 15 doors were found open during the school break.

## Petition calls for grand jury investigation of commissioners

A group of Lincoln County residents are circulating petitions calling for a grand jury to investigate actions of the Lincoln County Commissioners, County Manager Suzanne Cox and County Attorney Gary C. Mitchell.

A spokesman for the group said many citizens are weary of the continuing feud between the Lincoln County Sheriff on one hand and the commissioners, John A. Hightower, Ralph Dunlap and Bill Karn; Cox and Mitchell.

The petition reads: "The undersigned registered voters of Lincoln County hereby petition the District Court within and for the County of Lincoln to convene a Grand Jury for the purpose of investigating the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners, John Allen Hightower, Ralph Dunlap and Bill Karn;

the County Manager, Suzanne Cox; and the County Attorney, Gary C. Mitchell.

"The Grand Jury is hereby petitioned to investigate and report on the actions of the above referenced County Clerk's Office and other offices of Lincoln County, and to determine whether or not these individuals and entities have committed any capital, felonious or infamous crime with respect to their dealings with the above referenced County offices, and to determine whether they have committed a violation of any other State law."

State law requires that 5 percent of the county's registered voters must sign the petition in order for it to be implemented by the district court. As of Jan. 19, Lincoln County had 5,762 registered

individuals and entities in their official and individual capacities to determine their compliance with New Mexico law in their dealings with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, the Lincoln voters. At least 288 valid

signatures of registered voters must be secured by the petition advocates.

Verification of signatures by the county clerk's office is expected to get under way within the next 10 days.

At the Jan. 12 meeting trustees agreed to reduce the hours the transfer site is open which resulted in a savings of \$800 per month for Waste Control.

Waste Control will have a scheduled rate increase in August which will be the same as the increase in the consumer price index for the state as computed by the University of New Mexico. Previous rate increases by Waste Control have been less than 3 percent.

In other business, trustees received an update on the water system tests. Bill Zimmerman and Alan O'Brien of Wilson and Company, engineers for the water testing, and Don Childers and Gavin Strathee of the New Mexico Rural Water Association, had been inside the water tank to examine the tank.

The results were that the tank has a build-up on the inside of the tank that will have to be removed in order for the tank to be sand-blasted and recoated. This work will probably be scheduled in June because the temperature of the steel must be at least 50 degrees to do the work.

The tank is being filled again and water pressure in the town will go up. The engineers and RWA men will be in Carrizozo next week to conduct flow tests to determine if there is a blockage in the lines.

# Pastor John Torrison is 'EMT of the Month'

At the beginning of this new year I want to mention that I have been especially fortunate to have the privilege of being asked by the Lincoln County EMTs to interview and write stories of their chosen EMTs each month.

In 1987, the 12 I talked with had diverse and interesting life experiences, but all had a mutual quality—the Good Samaritan attitude toward their fellow man. Each one cared enough to volunteer for rigorous training and to donate his time and energies for the services he performed in saving lives.

For my enjoyment in meeting you all, thank you. I look forward to knowing your EMT choices for 1988.

The EMT chosen for January is John Torrison of Carrizozo. He was born in Omaha, NB. His family moved to Albuquerque when John was 6, and he lived there, graduating from Del Norte High School. His parents still reside in Albuquerque, as does one brother. His other brother lives in Virginia.

In 1970, John joined the

Navy for an 8-year hitch. He continued his education while serving a great part of that Navy time in submarine duty, then at Kirkland about two years, and finally in San Diego until his discharge.

In 1974 he married Trudy Weaver of Albuquerque. They have a 10-year-old daughter, Jamie.

John worked at several occupations, as a fast food dispenser, under a civilian contractor at Sandia, etc. until he found the right niche for his interests and talents. He entered the Southwestern Theological Seminar in Fort Worth and achieved an Associate of Divinity certification in June 1984. His first church assignment was at the First Baptist Church in Carrizozo, where he is the minister today.

"After living in big cities all our lives," John said, "Trudy and I are delighted to be in Carrizozo. We are in touch with all the people here. We've been welcomed as old friends, never treated as newcomers, and feel that Lincoln County is home country."

Trudy was the first to take the EMT training in her first year in Carrizozo. As soon as John learned that the church approved of his involvement in EMS, in fact, thought it a fine part of his services to the community, and knew how much he was needed, he took the EMT training in 1985.

"It started as a side-line to me," John said. "I enjoyed the training with the other EMTs. Then I experienced the dedication and all-out going giving-of-themselves that the EMTs put into their efforts, and I was imbued with the same avid spark to aid and support those who suffered.

"While I was a trainee, I went in the ambulance for the ride and observation. The patient had a cardiac arrest on the way to the hospital. I thought it almost miraculous

that life was sustained by continuous CPR, given by those knowledgeable EMTs. They never gave up. I knew then that it would never again be thought of as a side-line."

John and Trudy are very involved with all the community organizations that strive to better the lives of the people, whether it be the youths or senior citizens.

"Probably because of my religious training," John said, "I do not judge or criticize those patients who suffer because of the troubles incurred by alcohol, dope, abuse, or brawls that cause injuries. I have no right to judge. I am only giving service to alleviate their physical suffering, and supply their physical support. I can never look at a patient with disdain for the cause of his injury. He needs my technical help for his body and life.

"There is one problem that afflicts most of us at times. We can have a rash of accidents and ambulance calls, robbing us of sleep and relaxation, and taxing our nerves to the extreme, when there are too few EMTs to answer calls. We then suffer what we call 'burn-out.' Hopefully, with the new class of trainees and greater interest in volunteering, we'll eliminate this 'burn-out' situation.

"When I deal with a patient who suffers excruciating pain, the evidence of that suffering and fear completely exhausts me mentally and emotionally. I have to have time and space alone for solace after such an occurrence. The most frustrating case I was on, a person was pinned in the car suffering intensely. All I could do was try to ease the pain and fear until the patient was finally extricated."

As with so many services, the EMS could do more with greater funds, but they do have the full support of the community, the county commissioners and the directors.

His personal friends say of John, "He is even-tempered, never critical, and dependable." His church members say, "He listens to us, making us feel our thoughts and opinions are important. He never wavers in his concern despite our faults and mistakes."

Probably the greatest accolade John could receive as an EMT is from Rosemary Zink with whom he has worked so often for the EMS.

She said, "John has been a dedicated member of EMS. Because of his background of ministry and EMT, he has been especially helpful with older people. He plays a big part in keeping the elderly active so they can live at home longer. He checks on them and helps in their every day life. He is cool, calm, sensible, warmhearted, and supportive, always."

### DID YOU KNOW?

Who really invented basketball?

Yankee Magazine states that Dr. James Naismith, who, as every sneaker-clad player learns, invented the game, at the Springfield YM-CA, but that a Holyoke woman named Clara Gabler offers a different story.

Her father, George Gabler, was a physician and YMCA instructor who taught an exercise class for businessmen in the late 1800s. During the class, Miss Gabler says, the group divided into two teams and threw a round ball into peach baskets nailed up on the walls at either end of the exercise room. Stepladders were set by the baskets, and whenever the ball went in, someone would climb the ladder and retrieve it.

Miss Gabler says that her father was playing the game in Holyoke before Naismith came down from Canada. Naismith and Gabler were close friends from college and Gabler invited his friend to watch the exercise class on one of his visits to Holyoke. According to Miss Gabler, Naismith took what he saw to Springfield and came up with the idea of removing the basket bottoms.

Holyoke YMCA records were burned in a fire and Miss Gabler says that is the reason why there is no documentary evidence, but she remembers

the facts. Her father requested that nothing be said while he was alive because Naismith was such a good friend.

Miss Gabler thinks Naismith stole her father's glory of the place Naismith holds in history. She thinks Naismith should have said he changed an important part of the game.

A new \$1.4 million Basketball Hall of Fame opened in 1986 in Springfield, MA. The building is named in honor of Naismith.

According to Yankee Magazine it had been a long, hard and frustrating fight to get the women their due at the Basketball Hall of Fame. Sena Berenson Abbott's election to the Hall in 1985 came 93 years after she organized, coached, and officiated at the first women's college basketball game at Smith College in Northampton, MA.

She also organized the rules of women's basketball and spread them nationwide. Other basketball pioneers had long since been elected.

OPINION

The present congress may go down as one of the worst in the nation's history. In this space it is impossible to list the graft, corruption, treachery, and mischief of this Democratic congress. One item must suffice. It has just passed a funding bill for the 1988 federal government in the amount of \$603.9 billion. As usual, congressmen insert riders on such funding legislation to favor their family, friends, campaign contributors and pet projects. That item is Sen. Daniel Inouye's pet project which provides \$8 million to a school in France to help build a school for Sephardic Jewish children from South Africa. Questioned as to the validity and legality of providing US taxpayer monies to fund a school in France, Rep. David Obey of Wisconsin in a Senate-House conference defended the action saying, "It was a lousy \$8 million." Maybe so. But it's \$8 million that could be used by taxpayers from whom it was wrested.

It is interesting to note that the "lousy \$8 million" is the exact amount the same congress authorized for the freedom fighters in Nicaragua to help them keep a communist country from our doorstep in Central America. Is a French school for Jewish children of more value to our safety and welfare than having another Cuba to contend with?

Inouye's gift to France's religious school for Jewish children raises a constitutional question. What about separation of church and state? If that money had been given to an American religious school, the media, American Civil Liberties Union and secular humanist outfits would be out in full battle array. There is no protest from the ACLU that won't even allow a religious symbol on any government property. But its jolly and joyous to fund a religious school in a foreign country with tax money earned by the sweat of American taxpayers.

Last week Inouye said he pushed for the appropriation because the French government refused to fund the religious school. Real logic, no? The French government probably would not fully fund a Jesuit school in the United States, either. Will Dingbat Daniel prepare a rider to the next funding bill to provide the Jesuits with \$8 million to help their school?

This atrocity, and a hundred others contained in the funding bill, is made possible by Americans who deny the line veto so the president can knock this trash and corruption out of all congressional funding bills. In the 1988 funding bill there is approximately \$100 billion to be spent on nonsense like the Jewish parochial school in France. This money comes from our pockets, and we do nothing to stop these free-spending Democrats. On the contrary, we honor them by returning them to office at each election. If a gang of 435 thugs took guns and robbed American citizens of \$100 billion dollars, it would provoke a revolution. But let 435 congressional thugs do it with a stroke of the pen and that's just fine and dandy.

Reagan is going to ask congress for more funding for the Contras. If those funds do not at least equal the money congress has voted to build a religious school building in France, and other pet projects, the president should, as the Wall Street Journal suggests, immediately air-lift all Contras to safety in the United States on grounds he cannot allow them to be slowly cut to pieces. That would put congress on a limb where it should be already.

The US Supreme Court has ruled that school administrators have the right to censor school newspapers, plays and other school-sponsored activities when officials find their content inappropriate for immature audiences. Speaking for the majority, Justice Byron White said that a school has the right to "disassociate itself . . . not only from speech that would substantially interfere with its work or impinge upon the rights of other students, but also from speech that is, for example, ungrammatical, poorly written, inadequately researched, biased or prejudiced, vulgar or profane, or unsuitable for immature audiences." This was far too long in coming.

Schools are owners and publishers of student newspapers. The entire operation belongs to the school, not to the students. It is a fast rule that any private publisher has the duty and responsibility to "censor" any reporter's copy that reflects any or all of the situations listed by Justice White. All stories must be screened for libelous material, vulgarity, poor writing, grammatical error and general suitability. This applies to student newspapers as well as private ones. If the purpose of having a student newspaper is to train its staff how things are to be done in the real world, the right of a school official to censor it is exercising the same right any editor/publisher has. Not to exercise the right to reject or revise submitted stories invites financial disaster. Anybody who thinks the First Amendment gives anybody the right to publish anything, however untrue or offensive, is 100 percent wrong.

Trouble in Lincoln County

Lincoln County Sheriff hangs at dawn today; trial commences tomorrow!

Not since the Lincoln County Wars has so much heated rhetoric been exchanged between the warring factions, neither of whom is willing to negotiate an acceptable settlement to problems which most taxpayers conclude can be settled without a shootout at the OK Corral.

County officials are elected because voters consider them to be the best available individuals to handle the management of county affairs with expertise and with an atmosphere of mature judgment.

Presently, with the wide newspaper coverage, the county officials stand before the voters half clad and appearing, at times, to be incapable of accomplishing the job for which they were elected.

Should this situation be picked up by the national news network all of us will appear to be ridiculous whether deserving or not.

There are two actions in progress on separate fronts but, nevertheless, entwined in the basic cause of the bloodletting.

The sheriff's action is in the north section. The county clerk's action is in the south section. Both have a common adversary with the same area of engagement.

First, the case of the sheriff and the situation involving his responsibilities.

Sheriff Samuels won his office as a Republican and this fact did not sit well with his Democratic opponents. After the election, rumors were rampant concerning actions of those who opposed the sheriff who, in turn, felt that his performance as sheriff had been placed under scrutiny beyond the point of reason.

There is no argument that the county commissioners should not observe the performance of the sheriff. However, it appears that only in the area of the budget and the handling of county funds is this supervision well defined.

After a number of meetings with the sheriff the county commission finally decided to take legal action against the sheriff. Local newspapers reported a detailed list of 15 complaints concerning the sheriff's operation of his department. Several items dealt with departmental payroll/budget which appears to be within the prerogatives as set forth by state statute.

The list of alleged violations by the sheriff is very interesting. It was not prepared overnight nor does it appear to be the work of the commissioners, but instead by an expert in his field. It is simply too precise and complete to be

considered as a simple effort to get the sheriff into the courthouse. It has the appearance of the grand jury indictment.

The allegations, in the form of a motion, were printed in their entirety in the local papers, which was the proper course to follow. However, the effect was not in the interest of justice, as most readers, who did not attend any meetings, would conclude that there was the matter of guilt simply because of the weight of the allegations. All of this may be legal but a little heavy-handed to my way of thinking. A general list of complaints could have accomplished the same goal without appearing to convicting without due process.

Also note that the list against the sheriff was published without any opportunity on his part to answer the alleged charges. News deadlines are not important when fairness and accuracy are involved. It has been reported that there is some difficulty in setting up meetings with the sheriff. His recent surgery may have affected his availability. However, the taxpayers are entitled to the whole story and the elected officials are expected to live up to their responsibilities.

Court action is the last resort, not a remedy to improve a bad situation.

Now, to the case of the recalcitrant county clerk!

Attending the county commissioners meetings and reading the published reports of these meetings lead one to conclude that had not the sheriff's department become an issue for the commissioners the matter concerning the county clerk's operation would have not been raised. It would appear that the procedure for handling the minutes of the commissioners hasn't changed and has remained the same for a number of years, according to the county clerk.

The News report of Jan.

14, 1988 states: "Said record of the last meeting and/or special meetings of the Board of Commissioners of the County of Lincoln, shall be presented in written form to the Board of County Commissioners at the next regularly scheduled meeting for the Board of Commissioners review, correction, modification, and approval."

This request appears to be simple enough. However, an examination of the state statutes under the county clerk section and the section pertaining to the board of commissioners does not state the law as claimed.

The county clerk's problem with the county commission deals with how and when the minutes of the county commissioners are approved.

As the county clerk has done in the past, a working copy of the minutes are typed from notes and a recording. Within a few days the pending copy is presented to the three Commissioners who will question some points or approve the minutes as presented. If they do not agree with the minutes as presented, a check is made to see if there is an error between the recording and the minutes as presented. If the minutes agree with the recording the minutes stand as presented. The minutes are then typed into a permanent record which is presented to the commissioners at the next meeting for their approval.

One point of contention is the fact that the county clerk reports what "is actually said" in the recording while the commissioners want "the intention" of what was said as part of the minutes.

And so we come to the point of no return.

Everyone is the loser and the taxpayers are faced with an ever-increasing legal expense.

SANTA FE—Lt. Gov. Jack Stahl has been sharpening his sword in preparation for being the businessmen's knight in shining armor. But now he can't find any dragons to slay. Gov. Garrey Carruthers and Stahl ran on a platform which included the good Republican plank of deregulation. Everybody knows this world has too many regulations—especially state government regulations.

On the campaign trail, Stahl and Carruthers received a lot of support for their promises to lighten the yolk of oppressive regulations from around the necks of beleaguered businessmen. Immediately following their election, Carruthers appointed Stahl chief minister of deregulation—a post Stahl enthusiastically accepted. Here was his big chance to bash all those overregulating bureaucrats.

Stahl was commissioned to head a task force to gather information on state regulatory activities and goals; to advise the administration on regulatory relief targets; and to assist in developing regulatory relief implementation strategies.

The project is called RARE—Reduce Regulatory Excesses. It involves a task force named by the governor and chaired by the lt. governor, with the purpose of providing public input and recommendations to the regulatory relief effort of the administration.

Surprisingly, with all the gripes over the years about too much regulation and no relief, the RARE Task Force has been underwhelmed with response from the business community.

Stahl has developed some explanations for the disappearance of the regulatory dragons.

First, he feels changes in climate may have destroyed their food supply, causing them to gradually die out. Oh, no, that was his explanation about dinosaurs.

First, he feels there is no

You can be sure of this. If you don't report overregulation voluntarily, there is bound to be a bureaucrat somewhere in Santa Fe who is going to develop a regulation forcing you to report overregulation. Bureaucrats in charge of regulation don't want to reduce them because that would mean fewer jobs. The people businesses hire to deal with the world of regulation don't want them reduced for the same reason.

Second, he feels bosses don't know that much about all the regulations their businesses face because they have hired others to worry about the small stuff. And, besides, bosses may feel that if regulations are reduced, it could encourage more competition to get into the business—so it might be safer to just leave things the way they are.

Now, come on, excessive regulations. We know you're out there hiding somewhere. You always rear your ugly heads at the most inopportune times and we wish we could be rid of all of you. But now that we have our big chance, we can't find you. We can't even remember for sure what you looked like.

Anyway, there is currently a big push underway to get as much input as possible during the current legislative session.

NOTICE OF PROPERTY TAX REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Property which was valued in 1987 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1988 or subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR:

- 1. mobile homes 2. livestock, and 3. land used for agricultural purposes

If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's office.

All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claim to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1988 if the exemption was not claimed in 1987.

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land used for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.
