# McKnight wants defamation suit dismissed by court

Joe McKnight has filed a motion to have the defamation suit against him dismissed or, alternatively for a more definite statement.

The complaint was filed by Charlie Cox in February alleging that McKnight had made libelous and defamatory statements on television for the specific purpose of injuring the reputation of Cox. Further allegations included statements McKnight made to a co-worker of Cox's in the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

Cox was Lincoln County undersheriff from 1983-86 and helped with the investigation of the murders of Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight and his wife Judy McKnight. Joe McKnight is the father of Thomas McKnight.

The complaint filed by Cox stated that McKnight gave an interview with KOB television regarding his (McKnight's) beliefs as to the events that transpired during and after the murders. The interview was on or about Aug. 23, 1985.

McKnight stated on television that Cox was either the murderer or was withholding

evidence regarding the knowledge Cox had gained during his investigation.

Cox's complaint alleges that McKnight knew, at the time he made these statements on a statewide television network, that many people would hear these statements regarding Cox and the content of these statements would harm Cox both professionally and personally.

The complaint further alleged that McKnight, without any regard for Cox, made said libelous and defamatory statements on television for the specific purpose of injuring the reputation of Cox.

At the time Cox filed the complaint he filed a disqualification of District Judge Richard A. Parsons from presiding over the trial.

McKnight's motion was for an order dismissing Cox's complaint for failure to allege (a) in *haec verba*, or with reasonable exactitude, the actual defamatory words which Cox claims were published by defendant; (b) the defamatory meaning Cox claims was conveyed to those hearing McKnight's alleged statements.

Alternatively, McKnight requested the court for an order directing Cox to file a more definite statement as to the specific words Cox alleges McKnight published in the telephone call between McKnight and the co-worker of Cox; the identity of the co-worker; stating the defamatory meaning Cox alleges was conveyed to the listener by the language specified; stating whether the television interview was broadcast and, if so, on what dates and times; and stating the defamatory meaning Cox alleges was conveyed to listeners by the words employed.

In support of the alternative motion, McKnight states that Cox's complaint is so ambiguous that McKnight in a defamation action cannot reasonably be required to frame an answer thereto.

McKnight filed a motion of disqualification of District Judge Sandra Grisham to preside over the hearing.

District Judge Robert M. Doughty will hear the motion to dismiss or, alternatively for a more definite statement on May 16 in Alamogordo at 10:30 a.m.

# Bundick urges support for economic development

Buddy Bundick was guest speaker at the April 12 Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce meeting. Bundick is president of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County.

Bundick explained that the EDC/LC is a private non-profit New Mexico corporation formed to help the economy in Lincoln County. Officers were recently elected and several committees have been formed: membership, planning, communications, research, budget, prospect contact and business retention and expansion.

EDC will meet tonight in Carrizozo at 7 p.m. at United New Mexico Bank. Bundick invited everyone to attend and encouraged anyone in business or who resides in Lincoln County to become a member. Membership is \$200.

"We will try to go to each government entity and ask for funding," Bundick said. The funding will be for more economic development in the county. "When we get funded by the governments we should be able to hire a staff person to help with correspondence and other necessary work." The main expense will be for advertising.

"We want the whole county to work together," he said. Each community is now represented on the board except for Corona, and plans are being made to add it. Government entities have a representative on the board as class A members. Individual business will be Class B members.

In other business, Scott Shafer reported that the airport committee met April 11 and discussed insurance requirements for the annual Fly-In. The current insurance does not cover the Fly-In because pilots are invited to attend.

Shafer said the Fly-In has not been cancelled "yet." "We are working on it and will have the Fly-In if insurance coverage is obtained." The town will check with other airports about possible ways to insure the Fly-In.

Glen Ellison reported that the supply of Carrizozo brochures is being reduced and more may need to be printed before the end of the year. There were 7,500 printed in early March.

"Bruce King has confirmed that he will be a speaker at the Memorial Day celebration in Carrizozo, May 30," Ellison said. The community-wide celebration will be held to dedicate a plaque in the Governor William C.

McDonald Memorial Park.

Bob Watson, executive chairman of the Pony Express, told of plans for the Pony Express race this year. The race will be held Aug. 6 with the riders traditionally carrying mail that will have the special Pony Express logo on it.

The race will begin at 8 a.m. at the Capitan Gap turnoff and continue 35 miles to White Oaks. A rodeo will be held in White Oaks at 2 p.m. and a dance will be held that evening.

Willa Martin, co-chairman of the Pony Express event, asked for help repairing the rodeo pens and chutes. She said she hopes to have a fiddling contest in conjunction with the day's activities.

Phyllis Schlegel, Danny Burnett and Sophie Atwater will be on the scholarship committee. Deadline for the applications to be submitted is May 1.

Ruth Hammond announced a quilt show to be held May 14 in the Carrizozo school old gym. The show is being sponsored by the Carrizozo Woman's Club. Everyone is invited to bring quilts to exhibit.

There will be no competition and there is no charge for displaying a quilt. The show is for the purpose of seeing new techniques and old heirlooms. Quilters will be able to get ideas in color and design from other quilters.

Action was tabled on a request for a donation to help with the Grizzly Junior track and field invitational that will be held in Carrizozo June 11. The track meet is for girls and boys aged 8 through 13.

Carrizozo school superintendent Danny Burnett told of the new all-weather track surface that is to be installed by May 1 on the school track. He said the preliminary work is being completed.

"Next year we will try to restore the Grizzly relays," Burnett said. He also said the Grizzly Junior track meet "should be good for Carrizozo."

The chamber donated \$75 to the Carrizozo school band to help with expenses to attend the Greater Southwest Music Festival in Amarillo, TX later this month. The school will participate not only in the solo division but also as a band.

# Tractor purchase, police support on town agenda

Carrizozo trustees voted Tuesday night to award the bid for a new tractor and rotary mower to the low bidder. The Case 485 with a three-cylinder, 40 horsepower engine will cost \$12,700. This is \$3,500 less than the town had budgeted.

Estes International of Roswell submitted the low bid for the unit. After a discussion, trustees decided to order a bucket and canopy to go with the tractor. Cost of these two items should be less than \$3,500.

In other business, three members of the police support committee submitted suggestions to trustees during an executive session. No decisions were made following the meeting behind closed doors for one hour, 10 minutes. Members of the police support committee present were Rene Burton, Dale Goad and Paul Guevara.

The week of April 24-May 1 was proclaimed as Soil and Water Stewardship Week.

The month of April was proclaimed as Child Abuse Prevention Month.

Mayor Bob Hemphill announced that people have been responding to the offer of free dirt from the pile at the corner of 14th and Birch Street. The dirt is being removed from the corner nearest the intersection, making it safer for traffic.

Persons wanting dirt may have it delivered by calling city hall at 648-2371. There is a waiting list at this time but the city crews are moving it as quickly as possible.

A discussion was held concerning culverts on Drexel. One of the culverts is placed too high to carry water.

Trustee Albert Baca reported that Don and Joan

Means would be requesting a variance to place a mobile home on their property. There will have to be a public hearing concerning a variance.

Trustees discussed replacing or repairing the backboard at the tennis courts.

Hemphill reported there is no grant money available for the Rec Center roof but the town will continue to look for money.

The State Highway Department met with property owners on Tuesday to discuss proposed changes in streets entering Highway 380. Plans are to re-align E Ave. to enter the highway at a 90 degree angle. Other streets will also be re-aligned.

Negotiations are in the process for the state to acquire the necessary property for the re-alignment of the streets. The highway improvement project will end just past the long bridge at the edge of the Malpais.

Trustees will be considering a new franchise tax agreement with the power company for the town to receive poles and lights in lieu of the franchise taxes. The former agreement of 25 years has expired.

Trustees approved a line item change from capital improvements - building maintenance and repairs to capital improvements - maintenance and repairs. The \$2,500 will be used to repair the submersible pump at the wells.

Proposed changes in the golf course lease were discussed for lessee Ted Turnbow to maintain the park to the maintenance building and the town to continue to pay the electric bill for pumps to run the wells. An amendment to

the lease will be presented at the next meeting.

Hemphill announced that insurance does not cover the annual Fly-In held at the Carrizozo Municipal Airport. He is to contact Risk Management and other airports to find out if other options for insurance are available.

Airport Manager Mike Morrison will attend the Spectacular Air Show New Mexico in Roswell May 7-8 and discuss with the Roswell airport people possible ways to obtain the insurance coverage.

Town Clerk Carol Schlarb will attend the clerk's spring meeting.

Mayor Benny Coker kept the April 11 meeting of the Capitan Village Council moving as he completed business in an hour and 25 minutes. He was assisted by trustees Lee York, Dave Strickland, Norm Renfro and Dr. David Rouleau.

Coker said the four bids for the water filter system had been rejected. They were all above the engineer's estimate. Attorney Runnels will go over the paper work and a meeting could be called at a later date.

Pam Imhoff and George Beaudry, co-chairmen of the Capitan Neighborhood Watch, were present. Beaudry spoke briefly. Neighborhood Watch will not require car patrols.

Capitan Rodney Brooks of the New Mexico Security Patrol Inc., was also present. He offered his services to the Capitan community.

Brooks said his organization is now active in Ruidoso, Roswell and Artesia. He indicated he would like to patrol after midnight. Trustee Strickland said he would like to see a proposal on paper indicating rates, hours, etc. Renfro felt a problem is people gone from their homes for a period of time. Mayor Coker advised Brooks to leave brochures with village clerk Janet Keel so the public can look them over.

The demand rate for the new well is costing the village over \$1,000 a month. Coker was

to meet with Bill Mershon of Otero County Electric on Tuesday to see if Mershon can come up with some relief. This well pumps an hour and a half on the average every day.

Dorothy Smith reported that she had attended a meeting which would encourage retirees to retire in Lincoln County.

R.L. Van Norman will attend a cash management workshop. Dr. Rouleau may attend also. The village will pay their expenses.

Village clerk Janet Keel said she had attended a workshop in Albuquerque on workman's comp, safety counseling, and New Mexico

Coker appointed Bob Sims to the Street Advisory Board. Coker also announced that the clean-up day had been changed to April 23.

### CRISIS ALIVE AND WELL

A rural hotline used by farmers seeking help for problems such as emotional stress or lender mediation has been shut down. The Rocky Mountain Farmers Union began the network nine months ago with \$31,000 from Farm Aid, the Farmers Union and other sources. During that time, the hotline took 300 calls from farmers from across the state.

The New Mexico Rural Crisis Network had hoped to use up to \$100,000 from the state legislature and matching federal money to continue and expand the program. Gov. Garrey Carruthers vetoed the measure March 9, and the network shut down on March 15.

Chet Wyant, head of the program said, "The farm crisis is alive and well in New Mexico. Rural communities, churches, schools and hospitals are suffering right along with farmers and ranchers. We need rural development and assistance to help

end this struggle."

### OFFICIAL STATE INSECT?

Meanwhile, thousands of students across the state have sent their votes to Edgewood Elementary school, who will now ask legislature to make the Tarantula Hawk Wasp the official state insect.

The tarantula hawk wasp is described as large, up to two inches long, with bright orange wings and a metallic cobalt blue body. The female wasp lays its eggs in tarantula spiders, which are then eaten by the wasp larvae.

And what does Chuck Miltstadt have to say about the colorful and resourceful wasp? "Come on kids, wise up. Everybody knows that the cockroach has long been the New Mexico state insect, official or otherwise."

The New Mexico CowBelle District I Workshop was held in Carrizozo March 29 at the Carrizozo Country Club, with registration starting at 9 a.m. Chapters attending were Chuckwagon of Mountainair, Crown of Corona, Corriente of Capitan, Roadrunner of Santa Fe, Otero of Alamogordo and Canyon of Carrizozo.

Anne Ferguson, president of Canyon and District I chairman welcomed guests and introduced the CowBelle state officers: president, Viola Jeffers of Springer; 1st vice-president, LeAnn Smith of Roswell; 2nd vice-president Elizabeth Jones of Dell City and Alamogordo; secretary, Genora Moore of Santa Fe; and treasurer, Rita Witte of Rowe.

Jeffers presented a National Award Certificate to Canyon president Anne Ferguson for Canyon CowBelles having a 100 percent membership renewal in 1988. Canyon was one of eight chapters in the nation to receive this award.

The Corona FFA chapter presented a program on parliamentary procedure.

Paul Freed from the New Mexico Beef Council of Albuquerque was the guest speaker for the afternoon, and spoke on the research, marketing and advertising for the New Mexico Beef Industry. He showed a movie on the National Beef Cook-Off and the way some of the ads are made. Freed talk-

ed about the Beef Check-Off Referendum and the importance of all cattle people to vote for the referendum so the promotion of the beef industry can continue through coverage in the media. He said the "eligible voter is any individual who has owned a cow between Oct. 1, 1986 and March 31, 1988." They can vote in person during regular business hours at the Extension office of the county in which voters reside May 10. Of, if one cannot vote at that time, request an absentee ballot before April 29.

The program for the day was ended with a question and answer session on the Beef Check-Off Referendum.

## Vandals disrupt phone services

Vandalism at three different locations disrupted telephone service for 139 Centel customers in Angus, Nogal, Loma Grande and Bonito for over six hours, overnight in some cases, on April 5. Damage is estimated at \$5,000.

"We suspect this incident is connected with the vandalism which happened in Espanola last fall causing over \$21,000 in damage," said superintendent customer services John VanTussenbroek.

The damage was done within a span of 20 minutes, explained VanTussenbroek. The vandal began around 2:30 p.m. when padlocks were cut off the doors at a cable cabinet in Angus. The alarm sounded in

Bellevue, Washington's NeMAC, a network monitoring system, which alerted them something was amiss. Ten seconds later, the spans were down. The vandal had cut the cable.

Bonito Canyon was next, VanTussenbroek continued. Two bullets from a small-caliber rifle struck a cable a quarter mile from the main highway. Later, in the Loma

Grande area, a cable stretched over a canyon was also shot.

Both the FBI and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department are investigating the vandalism. "The FBI is involved because destroying telecommunications equipment is a federal offense," said VanTussenbroek. Local Crime Stoppers are offering a reward for information leading to the arrest of those involved. Anyone with information can call 257-4644.

## 41 screened for diabetes


Four children and 37 adults took advantage of the free diabetes screening sponsored by the Valley of Fires Lioness Club on Monday.

The club conducts the screening each year.



Even whites of differing language and culture have difficulty co-existing in the same government, as illustrated by the Separatist movement in Canada. Almost 20 years ago Belgium gave up any hope for a unified country. The population is predominantly French and Flemish, who find they cannot get along even though they have only two languages and two cultures to deal with. If Belgium can't integrate two languages and two cultures, how can the United States cope with 25 or 30 different languages and cultures?

One hundred and sixty-seven years ago Thomas Jefferson predicted racial turmoil in the United States. Writing in his autobiography in 1821 he outlined a project to deport blacks from the US, something Abraham Lincoln also proposed while he was president. Jefferson proposed that all blacks born of slave parents after the passing of the act were to be free, but to a certain extent were to remain with their parents, and were "then to be up at the public expense to tillage, arts, or sciences, according to their geniuses, till the females should be eighteen and the males twenty-one years of age, when they should be colonized to such place as the circumstances of the time should render most proper, sending them out with arms, implements of household and of the handicraft arts, seeds, pairs of the useful domestic animals, etc." Then, he proposed that the United States "declare them a free and independent people, and extend to them our alliance and protection, till they have acquired strength; and to send vessels at the same time to other parts of the world for an equal number of white inhabitants, to induce whom to migrate hither proper encouragements were to be proposed." His plan might have avoided the Civil War, and we would not today have a public policy of discrimination against whites.

On the Jefferson Memorial in Washington are engraved the words of Jefferson: "Nothing is more certainly written in the book of fate than that these people (the blacks) are to be free." Sounds noble, doesn't it? But those words were torn out of context, history was distorted and the world lied to. That one sentence was originally followed by another, which said, "the two races, equally free, cannot live in the same government." The attempt to accomplish such a feat, he predicted, would produce convulsions "which would probably never end but in the extermination of the one of the other race." Nobody paid attention to what Jefferson said then, or to what Lincoln said later, or to what is actually happening today.

The dream of America as a melting pot where the energies and genius of all races could be blended to produce a strong, free, and productive society is being lost. The melting pot theory isn't working in Canada, Belgium, India, England and, more recently, in the Soviet Union. And it is not working here. If the Rev. Jesse Jackson becomes the Democratic Party nominee for President or Vice-President of the United States you will witness a black/white power struggle that will only increase racial discord. But it will give a view of what is yet to come.

In Fort Smith, Ark., a US District Court jury has acquitted 13 white supremacists of charges of conspiring to overthrow the federal government. One specific charge was that the defendants planned to overthrow the government and start an all-white nation in the Pacific Northwest. What would the federal government have done had 13 black leaders sought to overthrow the federal government and establish a black nation inside the US?

The Nation of Islam (Black Muslims) has existed in this country for many years. Headed by Louis Farrakhan, its declared purpose is to overthrow the US government and kill all white people. The federal government raises no objection. While it tried desperately to imprison 13 white supremacists in Arkansas for overthrowing the government, it smiles on the Nation of Islam. While it charged the 13 whites with attempting to assassinate two federal officials, it remains silent on the Black Muslims who want to kill all white people.

Harking back to an item in this column on Aug. 5, 1981 I suggested that it didn't seem to bother the white population of the United States that there is a movement afoot, however foolish and untimely it appears to be, to carve a new black nation in this country. Louisiana, Alabama, South Carolina, Georgia and Mississippi are states chosen to become the "Republic of New Afrika." Quoting from that item: "The 'provisional government' of President Imari Abubakari Obadele has declared that 'all blacks are born citizens of the black nation, the Republic of New Afrika' which is to be made up of these five states. He has ordered elections to be held in October (1981). Only blacks will be allowed to vote or run for public office. Uh, do I detect racist and seditious overtones to this forthcoming event? Can you imagine the furor if white racists roped off five states and let only whites vote and hold elective office?"

The media at the time made little or no reference to this plan to create an all-black state inside the United States. The assumption appears to be that it is normal and good for blacks to carve themselves a nation in our midst; but by contrast, all hell broke loose when 13 whites wanted to do the same thing. The federal government acted quickly to try and put the conspirators in prison for long terms. But it never laid a hand on "President Imari Abubakari Obadele." The media that ignored the promise of a "New Afrika" state yelled themselves hoarse when 13 whites adopt the same seditious strategy. Methinks the white race is wrestling with a death wish.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Legislative Filing Day 1988 yielded some familiar faces in different places.

April 5 was filing day for all 112 legislative seats. There were some surprises and some predictions fulfilled. There were some retirements, some free rides and some disappointments.

The familiar faces in different places include two House and two state education board members trying to move into Senate seats; a former House member running from a different part of the state; a deposed cabinet boss trying to become a member of the body that caused his departure; a legislative employee trying to move into the elective ranks; and three legislators and two challengers running in the other party's primary for the first time.

The two House members attempting to move to the upper chamber are Republicans Bob Corn and Maurice Hobson. Both, although veterans with long service, are still young and eager to stick around the legislative halls a bit longer. You can take this as strong indication that their state party has promised them much assistance and that they feel their chances of winning senate seats are good.

Corn and Hobson are both leaving safe GOP house seats to run against incumbent Senate Democrats. Both districts are marginal—they could go either way.

The switch in races is evidence of strong Republican Party discipline. The GOP won several marginal races four years ago. Their strategy includes hanging on to those seats and picking up these two to give it a two-vote majority in the Senate. There are also other races in which the Republicans feel they have fielded challengers with a legitimate chance of victory over incumbent Demos.

Corn is completing his sixth year in the House. He will be taking on 12-year veteran Senator Tim Jennings in a Chavez County race. Neither has primary opposition.

Hobson is an 18-year veteran of House service. He is from Alamogordo, the home of the new GOP state chairman, John Lattanza. He'll challenge Demo Sen. Bill Vandergriff, a first-term who originally won as a Republican but switched parties in a feud with Senate Republican leader Les Houston.

Hobson has no primary opposition. Vandergriff must get by two primary opponents. Republican state Board of Education member Millie Pogna of Albuquerque is going up against two other Republicans, including Rep. Pat Baca's husband Ruben, to succeed retiring Sen. Bill Valentine. The race also includes former state Demo Party Executive Director Richard Kennedy.

Pogna still has two years remaining on her education board term.

Vacating the education board at the end of a term is Republican David McMann in order to run for the seat left by John Budagher. That race has

one other Republican and three Democrats running for the Albuquerque seat.

Former Republican Representative from Lincoln County Bill Shrecengost will challenge Santa Fe first-term Angie Vigil Perez. Shrecengost served throughout the 1960s alongside Chaves County Republican Max Coll, who made the move to Santa Fe where he was elected as a Republican in 1980. Coll later switched parties.

Even if Shrecengost isn't elected in the heavily Democratic district, it'll be fun to listen to radio announcers butcher his name just as House employees did back in the 1960s. The news reports of "Bill Shrieking Ghost's" candidacy have already begun.

It will be sweet revenge, if that is Nick Jenkins' cup-of-tea, should the former Economic Development and Tourism cabinet secretary beat incumbent Demo Rep. Bob Light of Carlsbad. Nick submitted his resignation midway through the 1988 Legislature amid reports that Demo House members lacked faith in his abilities.

R.T. Toliver, a former mayor of Bloomfield and bill analyst for Sen. Christine

Donisthorpe, is making a bid to become one of the gang. He will oppose Demo Rep. Charlie Winters in a district which flips-flops between the Rs and the Ds.

Prior to Max Coll's party switch in 1983, such occurrences were as politically rare in New Mexico as Democrat-Republican coalitions had been until five years before that. Since that time, they are occurring with much greater frequency.

Sen. Les Houston and Rep. Leonard Sheffield are running as Republicans for the first time in their political careers. Sen. Vandergriff will be making his first Democrat run.

Former Sen. Jimmy Rogers represented Las Cruces for four years and then decided not to run in 1984. This year he has switched registration to Demo and will try to win the seat back from Republican Harold Foreman.

And former Republican Al Lopez of Angel Fire, who tried to unseat Johnny Morrow of Capulin eight years ago, will try it again as a Demo in a crowded four-man primary.

Lots of old faces in new places. As they say, you can't tell the players without a program.



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


