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Accidents in county injure 6

Six people were injured in three separate accidents in Lincoln County, five on April 15 and one on April 19.

Gary Worley was injured in a one-car rollover at mile marker 81 on Highway 380 west of Capitan at 3:30 a.m., April 15. The area is commonly known as "Dead Man's Curve." Worley was transported to Lincoln County Medical Center and released. He has been charged with DWI, careless driving and no seat belts.

Another accident five miles south of Carrizozo on April 15 at 5 p.m. left four people injured when a Ford pickup passed a semi truck and cut back too quickly. The pickup rolled at least twice, according to sheriff's deputy Larry Brinkley.

The driver of the semi and a passenger, plus a passenger in the pickup were treated at Lincoln County Medical Center and released. The driver of the pickup, Kurt Cholok of Cloudcroft, was transferred from LCMC to St. Mary's Hospital in Roswell and was released April 19.

Cholak was cited with careless driving and DUI.

A load of large rolls of electrical wire shifted on an 18-wheeler eight miles south of Carrizozo on April 19 causing the driver to lose control. After hitting a large culvert the cab of the unit separated from the truck. The driver received lacerations and a possible back injury and was transported to Gerald Champion Memorial Hospital in Alamogordo.

EDC directors lay plans to rejuvenate county economy

The Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County met in Carrizozo April 14.

Cindy Lynch reported that the executive committee met during the month and gave information about the Business Quarterly. She said EDC will have an office at 443 Mechem in Ruidoso, which is in Terrace Plaza.

Don Shaw explained requirements for EDC to obtain certification from the state. He said once the papers are sent to Santa Fe there will be a time limit of 18 months for EDC to become certified. Shaw is chairman of the prospect-contact committee.

Archie Witham said the budget committee will be approaching local governments for funding for EDC. All Class A members will be asked to contribute.

Dorothy Smith of the research committee reported that an inventory of the county is being made to establish buildings available, work force, etc. "It is surprising what you learn about your community when you do this," she said.

Dr. Bill Harrison, communications committee chairman, said much of the work of the communications committee would "hinge on the research committee results."

Witham noted that the business retention and expansion committee felt that this area should be a priority. He said EDC needs a survey of existing businesses, what is presently in the county, seasonal trends, and to have the survey focus on the retention of businesses currently in the county. The next step would be to talk to new businesses.

Roy Dow said the membership committee has been contacting people. Lynch announced there were two new members.

EDC chairman Buddy Bundick said the new brochures would have the names of all Class A members. Bundick was guest speaker at the April 12 meeting of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce and explained the purpose of EDC.

Bob Hemphill reported that the planning committee decided that the chairmen of each committee should meet and discuss ways to retain current businesses in the county.

Work days will be scheduled for members to help with moving into the new office in Ruidoso. Everything needs to be filed in a logical manner to make use of the resources the county does have. Donations of file cabinets, chairs, desks, bookcases, pencils, pens and office supplies will be accepted.

The May meeting will be held May 19 in Ruidoso Downs. EDC members will go to Corona May 12 to attend the Corona Village Council meeting to give them information about EDC and ask their support.

Ralph Dunlap reported that a large group from New Mexico State University in Las Cruces would be at Fort Stanton on April 18 to consider using a portion of that facility for the Heritage Foundation. EDC members voted to help with expenses of the group in the amount of \$200.

Ten Carrizozo residents attended the meeting and Carrizozo people are on each committee. The experience and expertise of all Lincoln County residents is sought to accomplish the rejuvenation of the economy in Lincoln County.

The Carrizozo school board hired certified personnel for the 1988-89 school year during the April 24 meeting.

Other business included presenting transportation and safety awards, awarding the bid for the annual audit and consideration of the budget for next year.

After an executive session, the board accepted the recommendation of Supt. Danny Burnett to hire certified personnel. Hired were Sharon Baker, Ronald Becker, June Caster, Patricia Cauder, Micheal Delesantro, Mercedes Epperson, Michael Gaines, Robert Hemphill, Douglas Jarard, Wayne Mason, Gerald Montes, Mary Nickless, Mariann Patterson, J.C. Richmond, Ginger Shafer, La Rue Wetzell, Wini Wilmore, Zale Woodward and John Wootton.

The board also accepted the recommendation of Burnett to not rehire teachers Jerry Dale Rice and Jim Gaddis.

Transportation and safety awards were presented to bus drivers Sam Roper, 13 years; Lois Roper, 17 years; Sharon Hefker, 10 years; and Linda Greer, 6 years.

Four bids were received for the school audit. The bid was awarded to the low bidder, DeAun Willoughby, for \$3,500.

Principal Mel Holland's contract was extended one year. Holland's contract was to expire in 1989.

Burnett discussed with the board the asbestos testing compliance situation. All schools are required to be tested with samples taken and an abatement program written by Oct. 12, 1988.

The budget contains \$20,000 that is set aside for the testing and another \$48,000 from SB 109 is not committed in the budget and is available if needed for the testing.

Burnett announced that a McIntosh computer and software has been purchased to manage all records for students including history of student, test grades and scores and program schedules.

The public address system has been installed in the new gym and the company will inspect the public address

system in the old gym to see if it can be improved. 'Blood battle' slated for Carrizozo Friday

United Blood Services, a non-profit corporation, will send a mobile team to Carrizozo with trained technicians to conduct the mini-physical and get current health information from each prospective donor. The technicians will draw the blood, approximately one pint, and take it to the laboratory for typing and testing.

All materials used during the donation process are sterile and used only once and then thrown away. A donor

The board approved the purchase of a sani-serv machine. This is a lease to own agreement at \$235 a month for 36 months. This machine serves a dessert which is a natural food with very few calories. This is in addition to well balanced meals already

being served in the school cafeteria.

Board members approved the purchase of a John Deere tractor from CJ's Equipment Company of Artesia for \$11,985. The tractor will be equipped with a rotary mower, blade, broom, cutter and snow blower.

An updated open meetings resolution was approved.

The school board adopted the "cafeteria" plans which deal with employee benefits and take home pay. This is approved by the IRS and the state attorney general. Supt. Scott Childress said that this would benefit the teachers as they will get only a very small raise this next school year.

Some of the board members may attend the regional meeting of the New Mexico School Board Association April 25 in Alamogordo.

A big change will be taking place at the high school level during the 1988-89 school year. Students will have an opportunity (choice) to participate in a full vocational track or an expanded college preparatory track. New courses will be offered such as auto mechanics, auto body repair, wood shop, welding and art. The board of education will have a special meeting in the board room on April 28 at 7 p.m. to go over this new curriculum.

The athletic schedule for the 1988-89 school year was handed out. The Tigers will open the football season on their new football field Aug. 26 against Eunice. Other teams on the schedule include Tatum, Texico, Hagerman, Springer, Dexter, Reserve, Cloudcroft, Loving and the Carrizozo Grizzlies.

Karon Petty in race for commissioner

Karon Z. Petty has announced her candidacy for the Republican nomination for county commissioner, Dist. 3, in the June 7 primary.

Author/historian Lynda Sanchez will be speaking the next two weeks to two organizations interested in education and history. It encompasses the history of the Apaches of Mexico from the Geronimo surrender in 1886 to the present time. She has worked on this research project for almost a decade. Two trips into the rugged Sierra Madre of Mex-

ico, innumerable interviews and visits with Mormon and Mexican ranchers have created a vast and fascinating mosaic of this unusual world that few realize exists.

Sanchez is currently employed by Ruidoso High School as a Spanish and history teacher.

Sanchez states that she enjoys teaching and writing. "I believe they go hand in hand. Many of the things I experience during my research trips, talks or interviews in other regions make me a better teacher and hopefully will inspire our young people to see what a fascinating world there is out there."

She is married to State Board of Education member James Sanchez. They live on a ranch near Lincoln and have one daughter Katherine, who often accompanies them on their research trips. She is enrolled at New Mexico State University, and is a graduate of Captain High School.

cannot contract any disease by donating blood.

Some of the donated blood is used in its "whole" state but most blood will be separated into different components to benefit as many as four different patients. The blood can be separated into red cells to be used for surgical patients, plasma for shock, burn and accident victims, platelets for leukemia and other cancer patients, and cryoprecipitate which provides a clotting factor for hemophiliacs.

The blood donated in Carrizozo will be used for patients in area medical facilities and a donation of blood will help insure that blood will be readily available for family, friends and neighbors when it is needed.

The Woman's Club has also challenged the Carrizozo school staff to donate more blood than the Woman's Club members.

The end result of both challenges will be a "Gift of Life" donation that could save the life of a loved one. The blood drive will be held at the Woman's Club building on Friday from 2 to 6 p.m. All donors in the area are encouraged to attend and donate blood.

Hightower will seek re-election

John A. Hightower has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Lincoln County Commissioner, Dist. II.

Hightower has served eight years as county commissioner through the years and has been on many committees in the county. He is presently on the Lincoln County Medical Center Board of Directors, Carrizozo Health Center Board of Directors and the New Horizons Developmental Center Board of Directors.

Hightower is a native of Lincoln County and he and his family own a ranching operation in the Ancho area. He served 42 months in World War II and attended New Mexico State University, the University of New Mexico and Cal Tech.

"As a county commissioner I take my oath of office very seriously," Hightower said and explained that the commissioners are responsible for conducting the county's business as it relates to spending tax money.

"It is our responsibility to assist and give guidance to the other departments of county government as needed," he said. "Budget preparation and spending control is a tremendous responsibility. With cooperation from all the departments it is relatively simple. If a department head either chooses to disregard the procedures or is incompetent about the budget procedures, the task becomes almost impossible.

"I've seen it both ways and know what I am talking about. Even as hard as we try to get compliance, the audit always faults the commissioners and their office for 'Lack of Control' for any violation by anyone.

"I have been accused of 'being out to get the sheriff.' This is absolutely false. My administration has never wanted anything but to assist the sheriff in bookkeeping procedures, budget control, and to avoid lawsuits from violation of the personnel ordinance. I have been in many hours of executive meetings with the other commissioners, the county manager and the county attorney. I have never heard a remark by any of them which could be taken in any way as an attack on the sheriff.

"Our main concern has always been 'how can we remedy the situation?' We have tried and very obviously have failed.

"As to roads," he continued, "I challenge anyone to show me a road which gives access to the Forest Lands which has been closed during any of my eight years tenure. On the contrary, I claim credit for the O Bar O road being open as per court decision back in 1984.

"My concern for the other small tracts of public land is that there is no way to control hunters on these tracts. I am deeply committed to the public having access to Forest Lands and large tracts of State and BLM lands. I am also concerned about respect for private property rights which is a

basic part of this free country of ours. I will defend this principle to my last day.

"My guiding principles are my intense belief in Jesus Christ as my personal Savior and from my parents I learned honesty, truth, fair play and hard work.

"We as commissioners have had some tough situations confront us in the past year and a half. We have met them head-on and defended the laws of this land the way our oath of office requires. If re-elected, I will continue to defend the laws of our land and hold to my principles."

SANTA FE—The Democrats held the first—and maybe last—of their Congressional Dist. 1 candidate debates last weekend.

Nobody (not anybody) lost, although William Orma didn't show. But with 10 candidates in the field, maybe no one noticed.

Nobody was happy. Nearly half the audience left before the debate was over. With a one-minute time limit, many candidates felt that they didn't have time to get their messages across.

Steven Kramer, a university professor, complained that it was impossible to discuss complicated issues intelligently. That's true. However, it's not what we voters are looking for in a race like this.

We just don't have time to listen to 10 candidates intelligently discuss a myriad of complicated issues.

It is a sad but true fact that in this race, more than any other, we will pick a nominee based on name recognition, money and media time. Candidate Patricia Madrid uttered that assessment following the debate and she is so right.

In a recent poll, Madrid heads a cluster of candidates who fall about 10 points behind former Land Commissioner Jim Baca. It will be difficult for Madrid to make up that ground but she has one advantage enjoyed by none of her opponents.

In a poll conducted by the Democratic Party in late January, likely voters were asked whether gender would make any difference in their vote. More likely to vote for a man were 13.9 percent, while 13.2 percent said they were more likely to vote for a woman.

In a two-person race, it would be a wash. But with nine men splitting the likely male vote, Madrid looks as though she might start about 12 points ahead of the field.

She may have noticed that statistic too, because she is spending a lot of time courting the women's vote.

Following close behind Madrid in the recent poll is another Albuquerque lawyer, Tom Udall. He has been sinking big bucks into media buys and it has worked. He gained the most between January and March polls.

Udall is taking every advantage he can of his family name. Uncle Mo is an Arizona congressman. Dad is former Interior Secretary Stewart Udall, who is currently writing a history of the 50 years of New World exploration from 1492 to 1542, much of which took place in New Mexico.

The third candidate in the pack of three trailing Baca is Bernalillo County Commission Chairman Lenton Malry. He was a state legislator for 10 years and left to run unsuccessfully for Lt. governor in the January poll. Malry ran second to Baca.

The remaining candidates not mentioned so far are Steve Gallegos, Manny Garcia, Fred Rael and Alan Reed.

And what about this guy Jim Baca who is way out in front of the pack? Can he sustain his big lead?

Madrid and Udall closed significantly on Baca between the January and March polls. They are likely to close more. But will it be enough?

It will be enough to make an exciting race. But I will pick, right here, today, hidden in the middle of this column, a primary election victory for Jim Baca.

Why? He is a proven vote getter. In his 1982 statewide race for land commissioner, Baca led the ticket with a 97,000 vote margin in the general election. That is the race Bill Humphries, a Republican, won the following election.

In the 1st Congressional District Baca won by 40,000 votes. During the same election, Democrat Jeff Bingaman, in his successful

campaign for the US Senate, carried the 1st district by only 12,000 votes.

Republican Congressman Manuel Lujan won that year by only 7,000 votes.

Yeah, you say, but isn't this the same Baca who lost to Ken Schultz for mayor of Albuquerque?

Same guy. But he had a couple of major factors working against him.

He was still land commissioner at the time. He wanted to be mayor but he agonized about whether this was the appropriate time to run for almost a year while Schultz was already running hard. Finally, with 10 weeks left, he jumped in. Some important politicians had already cast their lot with Schultz by then.

In addition, significant areas of Bernalillo County Baca strength in the land commission race are not in the Albuquerque city limits. If they had been, Baca might have won. He lost by 2,000 votes.

In a race which will have to be based largely on name recognition because of the crowded field, Baca started with 92 percent of the likely voters recognizing his name—far ahead of the rest of the field.

And with his well-organized staff, Baca will raise the money to buy the necessary media time and space.

It is his race to lose.


Tests have repeatedly shown that marijuana slows down drivers' reactions and impairs their perceptions, though they may feel they are driving especially well.
