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Forest fire rages near Ruidoso

Emergency fire equipment from all over the county helped battle a forest fire north of Ruidoso on April 21. Discovered at 2 p.m., the fire was brought under control by 4:30 after 2,000 gallons of fire retardant slurry was dropped from an air tanker from Alamogordo.

Danger to homes in the area was of concern because of the 40 to 60 mile-per-hour winds threatened to whip the fire out of control. Suspected as cause of the fire was a controlled burn of slash near the construction of the access road to the new airport.

Assisting in battling the blaze were fire departments from Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Mescalero, Bonito, Fort Stanton, Carrizozo, Capitan, State Forestry, Bureau of Land Management and the US Forest Service.

Construction workers with Twin Mountain Rock Co., contractors for the access road, used heavy equipment to cut a fire break around the fire and provided water trucks in addition to other equipment and manpower.

The fire area was watched closely until 1 a.m. Friday.

Archery club to organize

Bow hunters and target archers are invited to attend a meeting May 8 to organize an archery club in Lincoln County. The meeting will be held at 1 p.m. at the home of Ken Kirkland on Indian Divide.

Families are especially invited to attend and bring children interested in archery. Hamburgers and hot dogs will be provided, and those attending are asked to bring their own beverage.

Once the club is formed members will choose a name for the club and begin making plans for building an archery range. The range will have 14 field archery targets and 14 field hunter targets. The National Field Archers Association will send a representative to inspect the range, once it is built, and ap-

Commissioners approve new computer purchase

County commissioners have approved the purchase of a new computer for the courthouse.

The decision was made during the April 25 meeting after county manager Suzanne Cox reported that the current computer needs to be upgraded because the amount of data in the computer is causing it to work slower.

It now takes two hours to do the required daily back-ups. The new computer will do them in less than 45 minutes. In addition the computer terminals can be used while the daily back-ups or department back-ups are being conducted, which is not possible at this time. Additional terminals will be placed in each office.

The unit will be purchased through state contract eliminating the need to put it out for bid. The purchase price will be discounted 30 percent through the state contract. Delivery date will be after July 1.

In other business, commissioners discussed with Ron Becker the screening of Becker's satellite dish in accordance with requirements of the Lincoln Historic Preservation ordinance.

Becker stated that he thought all antennas should be screened from view and that the law should be the same for everyone. County attorney Gary Mitchell explained that some of the items had been "grandfathered in" meaning that if they were there before the ordinance went into effect.

Becker objected to using a board type of screening method and asked if he could plant poplar trees to screen his "satellite receiving antenna." He was told that he should present his proposal to the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board at the May 2 meeting for their ruling on the matter.

The bid for printing of brochures was awarded to the low bidder, Quick-Print Express in Ruidoso.

Change order #9 for the Alto area paving district was

approved. Sand seal was deleted from certain roads; fog seal will be applied to all roads with asphalt surface in the project whether or not they received a sand seal; and the contractor was authorized to commence work on May 23 as specified. Deletions in the contract will result in a decrease of \$55,188 in the project costs.

Through a resolution the county designated the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County to represent the county for the purpose of participating in the New Mexico Partnership Program. The program is designed to help communities become prepared for industrial and related economic development.

May 6-15 was proclaimed National Historic Preservation Week. Landmarks such as Fort Stanton, Lincoln, White Oaks and Jicarilla contribute to the economic, social and cultural well being of the county and National Historic Preservation week provides an opportunity for people of all ages to get involved with the political process to help preserve the heritage for future generations. "The People's Choice" is the theme.

April 24-May 1 was proclaimed Soil Stewardship Week to promote wise and proper management of soil and water resources.

Cooperative agreement between the sheriff's office and the Forest Service was approved for the sheriff's department to continue to enforce laws within the National Forest system and for the Forest Service to reimburse expenditures according to the schedule provided.

After a public hearing, final adoption was made to the Lincoln County Lodger's Tax ordinance, Lincoln Historic Preservation ordinance and the Lincoln County Subdivision regulations.

Budgets for the Bonito, Fort Stanton, Hondo, Lincoln, Nogal and Glencoe fire districts were approved. The

fire budgets are to be in Santa Fe April 30. Each budget was based on the amount of money to be received from the fire protection fund allotment for 1987.

Commissioner Ralph Dunlap reported that 13 of the 15 member committee from Las Cruces toured Fort Stanton to make a recommendation as to using Fort Stanton for the Ranch Heritage Center. The decision has not been made at this time.

"It would be another tourist facility," Dunlap said and stated there was a "good chance it would be located at Fort Stanton."

Notification of grant award, amendment number 3, was received from the Eastern New Mexico Area Agency on Aging to increase the amount of money to be received for the Zia senior citizens center in Lincoln County.

May was proclaimed as Older New Mexico Month to urge all citizens to publicly recognize and acknowledge the debt of thanks owed to all older citizens.

Commissioners discussed a letter from Risk Management Division (RMD) offering to reinstate civil rights coverage for the county at a premium of \$70,000 per year with a deductible of \$5,000 per claim on most claims. The premium last year was \$4,950.

Mitchell remarked that the county was being placed in a high risk category even though RMD has not paid on any claim against the county to date.

The new premium will be in effect from July 1, 1988 to Jan. 1, 1989 with a cancellation clause and no guarantee that coverage would continue beyond Jan. 1.

Two executive sessions were held for litigation. The first closed meeting was held for an hour in the morning with county clerk Fran Siddens and her attorney Dan Bryant (see accompanying article) and another session in the afternoon.

Feud flares between clerk, commissioners

The on-going feud between the Lincoln County Commissioners and Lincoln County Clerk Fran Siddens has flared again with another confrontation during the county commission meeting Tuesday.

The meeting began quietly enough when Siddens' attorney Dan Bryant asked for an executive session with commissioners to discuss the pending lawsuit with the county clerk.

Bryant stated that the meeting would be short, but it lasted for an hour. After the executive session there was no announcement.

At the close of the day-long meeting and after another executive session for litigation, commissioner Bill Karn made the motion to have county attorney Gary Mitchell meet with Bryant and work out a final draft of the agreement that had been reached with Bryant and Siddens concerning the pending lawsuit.

Karn said that Bryant needed to explain something in the agreement.

"Perhaps I can explain it to you," Siddens said.

She was told that the settlement terms were confidential and that the matter should be discussed by the attorneys.

"Gentlemen, that is totally unacceptable to me," Siddens said. "This has gone on for four months. Tomorrow my attorney and I will file a motion to compel and ask the judge to render a decision as quickly as possible on the motions presented March 14."

The battle between the commissioners and clerk began earlier this year when the commissioners objected to the preparation of minutes of the county commission meetings. The commissioners, through Mitchell, filed a writ of mandamus in January asking that Siddens amend the designated minutes according to their specifications.

Siddens countered by filing a motion to disqualify Mitchell from representing the county commissioners and another motion for stay of proceedings until the county commissioners allocated funds to pay for her counsel.

The matter was heard in Carrizozo before District Judge Robert Doughty on March 14. No decisions have

been announced in the matter. "I should never have been in court anyway," Siddens said. "As county clerk, I have never wanted to have this discussed in executive session. I feel the public should hear what I have to say."

Siddens said the motion to compel would be filed late Wednesday or early this morning.

Carrizozo Town Council

Street paving grant rejected; Belco to get \$200,000 loan

Carrizozo Mayor Bob Hemphill told the board of trustees at the April 26 meeting that there was good news and bad news concerning Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) applications submitted by the town.

The bad news was that Carrizozo would not receive a CDBG grant for paving of streets. The town had applied for \$500,000 to use for street and intersection reconstruction to alleviate problems caused by deterioration of the streets and to help with drainage designs.

The good news was that the town should receive funding of \$200,000 to be loaned to Belco Industries, Inc. for operating capital and debt restructuring. The loan would be provided at low interest.

The loan will enable Belco to continue operations in Carrizozo and possibly expand its facility in the coming years. Belco currently employs 11 workers and it is proposed that they will hire nine to 14 new employees with the help of the loan.

Hemphill said State Representative Ben Hall was helpful to the town in getting tentative approval for the \$200,000 grant. The paperwork is to be completed this week. In other business, May 21

was set as the date for the town's annual clean-up day. Trustee Linda Haller and Albert Baca will co-chair the event and have asked that people contact them concerning the project. Donations of money, plastic bags, tools, pickup trucks, manpower and refreshments are needed. Further information will be in the News.

A lengthy discussion was held concerning the annual audit for the town. Trustee Harold Garcia preferred that the audit not be conducted by the same person two years in a row.

Two proposals were received for the audit; Frank M. Olmstead's proposal was for \$2,925 and De'Aun Willoughby's proposal was \$2,600. Willoughby conducted the audit last year.

Trustees Baca, Haller and Dale LaMay voted to award the contract to Willoughby for the low bid and Garcia voted nay. The motion carried.

Hemphill signed a proclamation that the week of May 8-14 be Small Business Week.

Baca reported that he had received complaints from people about the cars being parked near the corner at Shop Rite grocery making it difficult to see around the corner.

Instructions were given to Police Chief C.A. Morales to issue warnings and citations to cars parked in the yellow zone.

In addition, a "No Parking Here to Corner" sign is to be installed.

City clerk Carol Schlarb reported that she had attended the clerk's spring meeting in Las Cruces, April 20-22. She informed trustees of proposed changes that will take effect soon in city governments.

The new town tractor will be delivered next week. The price of the bucket will be \$2,900 instead of \$3,000 and the price of the canopy for the unit is \$300 instead of the estimate of \$350.

Trustees approved modifying the contract with Wilson and Company to include inspecting the roof of the Rec Center. Wilson and Co. has a contract to do the work on water improvements for the town.

An engineer and architect will physically investigate the existing conditions of the Rec Center roof and cooling system and make recommendations as to what new roof and cooling system should be installed. The cost for the investigation will be \$1,500.



JALAPENO LOLLIPOP

The Terlingua cookoffs that draw some 200 chile chefs to the mercury-mining ghost town 300 miles southwest of El Paso aren't the biggest in the world. The Texas Chile Championship in San Marcos draws 300-400.

April 23 the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal reported that a federal judge says the faction formed by the Terlingua event's founder has no right to call itself the Chile Appreciation Society International Inc.

US District Judge Lucius Buntun refused to decide who can claim sponsorship of the official cookoff of the chile world; the lawsuit-winning group headed by Ray King of Poteet or the camp founded by the late Frank X. Tolbert.

The ruling will have little effect on the cookoffs, though, said "Jalapeno Sam" Lewis, a San Angelo armadillo-race promoter, jalapeno lollipop seller and long-time Tolbert-group backer. "We don't have a lot of rules. The King group say you have to have chile a certain color (red), a certain type (no beans). "That creates clone cooking," Lewis said.

Goat Gap Gazette editor Jo Ann Horton of Houston agreed: "One guy puts Crackerjacks in his and wins, they all put Crackerjacks in theirs." Horton described her newspaper as the "clarion of the chile world."

She said most chile cookoff winners stick to the KISS recipe: Keep It Simple, Stupid.

SMALL TOWNS

Jean Gray publisher of the Haxtun Herald in Colorado compiled a history sketched from memories for the occasion of the 100th year anniversary of the Haxtun Post Office. Much of what has been recorded came from writings of persons now gone, or from those

who have pulled memories from the "far reaches of the past."

Gray ended her story with a note about small towns and how they are alike in one respect:

"Junk mail crowds our lives and those ever present bills haunt us. But the ritual of going for the mail reaches far beyond those tons of papers carried now by mail trucks rather than train. Especially in a small town, the post office gives a place to meet neighbors, if only for a short greeting, a chance to make daily contact, and offers the security of knowing that we remain a community, intact and bound together by at least one tradition passed through time."

REMEMBERING TEACHERS

In her May 1988 issue of McCall's magazine, editor Elizabeth Sloan recalls her 6th-grade teacher who taught her that there was more to history than Christopher Columbus, introduced her to ballet and started her reading the newspaper each day.

remember my child's teacher and enjoyed visiting with her. The following was penned by a teacher. It reminds me of Mrs. Ryan's kindness:

"I've come to a frightening conclusion that I am the decisive element in the classroom. It's my personal approach that creates the climate. It's my daily mood that makes a child's life miserable or joyous. I can be a tool of torture or an instrument of inspiration. I can humiliate or humor, hurt or heal. In all situations, it is my response that decides whether a crisis will be escalated or deescalated and a child humanized or dehumanized."—Haim Ginott.

It took 43 years to do it, but the Japanese finally won World War II. Last week the US Senate voted 69-27 to pony up \$1.2 billion to give 60,000 Japanese-Americans \$20,000 each, tax-free for having been removed from the West Coast War Zone following Pearl Harbor.

The American people deserve what the spend-thrift Democratic congress is saddling them with. They have sat on their hands and given tacit assent to this give-away of the national store to a bunch of undeserving, whining, greedy and vindictive racists who call themselves Americans.

SANTA FE—Rick Montoya, the attractive Republican US Senate candidate from Las Cruces, continues to chase the impossible dream.

Congressional candidates had to file a campaign contribution and expenditure report with the federal Elections Commission on March 31. The Albuquerque Journal ran a story last Sunday listing contributions claimed by each of the candidates.

Montoya continues to lead his three GOP primary election opponents in contributions received. In the first three months of 1988, Montoya reports \$58,608 in contributions received—more than the total of his three opponents combined receipts.

The former federal Interior Department assistant secretary overseeing US territories is making quite a hit with some important special interest groups. Montoya enjoys strong support from farming and ranching groups and from oil and gas interests.

His popularity with the rural community comes despite hailing from Las Cruces, the second largest city in the state, and having spent a number of years in Washington, DC. The phenomenon becomes understandable when one realizes his three opponents are all from the big Duke City.

The FEC reports are usually filed with the Secretary of State's office for informational purposes but none have been received as of this time. It will be interesting to see if Montoya continues to receive two-thirds of his con-

tributions from the trust territories which were once under his aegis.

Even though it is somewhat unusual to see a candidate receive so many contributions from outside our country's borders, it is a tribute to Montoya that many inhabitants of our US trust territories see him as a friend.

These folks have to be overjoyed that someone they actually know might get into the US Senate, where they have no representation. Support of a successful Senate candidate would give territorial interests a friendly ear and possibly one of their few advocates with a true understanding of their situation.

Corky Morris and Bill Valentine trail Montoya with \$21,204 and \$17,742 respectively in campaign receipts. Joe Carraro, who didn't get into the race until February, reports raising between \$4,000 and \$5,000.

Valentine still leads in total campaign spending as a result of a \$60,000 loan he made to his campaign.

Last week, the former state Senate Republican floor leader released his 1986 and 1987 federal income tax returns and a financial statement. The strategy was likely designed to put at ease the minds of any voters who might still remember some unfortunate business relationships Valentine found himself involved with many years ago.

Valentine's financial statement shows a net worth of \$903,765 with most of his assets in Albuquerque real estate.

His 1986 tax return shows a large capital gain from the



sale of his dental practice. His 1987 return shows an income of \$34,065 from investments and interest while he campaigned for the Senate fulltime.

Valentine, of course, called on the other candidates in the US Senate race to release their tax returns and financial statements. The state senator says he feels the people of New Mexico have a right to know the net worth of elected officials and candidates, as well as the source of their income.

Montoya's \$58,000 raised during the past three months approximately equals the \$56,000 he reported for the last six months of 1987. Valentine's and Morris' contributions are significantly less. They are in the same range as the receipts of most of the first district congressional candidates for the same period.

And that might be the real problem. The three Duke City US Senate candidates are having to go to the same well for donations as the congressional candidates. Be glad you are not an Albuquerque Republican being hit from every side right now.

All totaled, the four Republican senate candidates raised about \$100,000 in the last three months. That figure pales in comparison with incumbent Jeff Bingaman's \$333,341 during the same period. That is about what the four Republican challengers have raised since the beginning of their campaigns.

Bingaman has raised \$1,837,959. That sounds like a lot now but he will spend every penny of it once the general election campaign folls around. It is too bad the GOP primary candidates don't have bigger warchests to get their views before the public. But few people want to donate until a primary election winner is determined.

Avid followers of the political process are eagerly awaiting release of polls that will be paid for by some of the large Albuquerque media outlets.

At least a couple polling firms will be conducting two polls apiece during the next six weeks.

Brace yourself for total media saturation by the candidates in anticipation of these polls.

Court ruling is good for government

The New Mexico Court of Appeals recently issued a ruling important to all those interested in good government.

The case involved the Clovis City Commission and its refusal to make public its job applications for city planner.

The Clovis News Journal went to court contending that the applications are public records.

The Court of Appeals ruled that the applications were indeed public records, citing a previous case stating, "the promise of confidentiality standing alone would not suffice to prevent disclosure. The promise would have to coincide with reasonable justification, based on public policy, for refusing to release the records."

Furthermore, the justification would have to be articulated by the custodian for the record.

The court found, "respondents presented no evidence linking a promise of confidentiality to the applicants with reasonable justification based on public policy."

states in a broad sense that the public's business ought to be conducted in public. In specific, the ruling also goes a long way toward discouraging cronyism and nepotism in city hiring. It promotes the hiring of the most qualified people to run local government.

And that is well worth the full public disclosure of job applications.—Alamogordo Daily News, March 8, 1988.

May is Older American Month

May, as happens each year, has been designated Older Americans Month by the President and Governor Gary Carruthers of New Mexico.

The administration on Aging will be encouraging communities to respond to older citizens by implementing the theme, "Make Your Community Work for Older People."

The Zia Senior Citizens began in 1978 and was originally sponsored by the American Legion although the Corona Seniors had an informal group. Then, the sponsorship of these two centers moved to the Carrizozo Woman's Club which worked hard for the benefit of the Senior Citizens by securing a federal loan and creating a federal loan and creating the Carrizozo Senior Center.

The Woman's Club should always be applauded for efforts toward the elderly in Carrizozo, Corona and Capitan.

The Capitan Senior Center began in 1961 and it has taken a number of years to develop that center into the service organization. Many seniors in Capitan dedicated their time and effort to help develop the Capitan Center. All three centers are now sponsored by the County of Lincoln with the help of past commissioners and the present commission.

Programs are mandated by federal law to provide services to senior citizens age 60

and above. However, because the State Senior Olympics designates the age to be 55 and above, we endeavor at all times to invite those individuals and their spouses to join in the activities of the three centers.

We act as a referral group helping seniors find solutions to their problems with emphasis on "wellness," which includes exercise and proper nutrition. With the help of various groups such as the local Lionesses and Mountain Bell, we conduct "wellness" clinics offering such help as hearing tests, eye examinations, diabetic screening and all sorts of preventive health measures, including the taking of blood pressures.

Carrizozo has a meals program in Carrizozo for some time and through the good graces of the State Agency on Aging and the Area Agency on Aging in Clovis it is developing a meals program for the Capitan Center. The suggested donations for the meals is \$1 at both centers, but with the nature of the program those seniors who can donate more will be helping other seniors who are unable to make the full donation.

These are federal mandates and since the programs are not charitable, everyone participating in the programs is reminded that there is a required match in order to receive the funding.

In all three communities there are individuals who are considered shut-ins and constant contacts maintained with the seniors in an effort to keep them in their own home setting.

Services that are offered have emphasis on the frail elderly and low income minorities involved in these programs as well as services that combat isolation. "Wellness" also means endeavoring to have seniors maintain social activities.

The programs receive federal, state, county dollars as well as assistance from the Villages of Capitan, Corona and the Town of Carrizozo. As a result physical improvements to the centers have

The next quarterly meeting will be held in July.

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
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

Ace Griego, Capitan, is EMT of the month

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," a trite proverb, but true.

Learning rules of safe living and practicing them is sure to waylay many occasions where an emergency arises, giving rise to panic and irrational actions.

At the top of the list of precautions, is knowing which phone number to call for help and posting that number in instant view to adults and children, at your telephone. It will give contact to police, fire, and accident assistance quickly.

Ace Griego, EMT, chosen for April, was born, schooled, and still lives in Capitan. "The emergency number to call in the Capitan area is 354-2909," he says. "It will connect you to the sheriff's department where our dispatchers will process your call to secure the help you need. They are so efficient and caring. They will quell the panic or uncertainties you may have when making the call."

Ace (Henry), graduated from Capitan High School in 1975. He worked a short time at the Wortley Hotel in Lincoln before taking a 9-month vocational course in meat cutting in Roswell. Then he worked for Bennett's in the meat department in Ruidoso, next for 2 1/2 years at Albertson's in Carlsbad. In 1982, he returned to Capitan to become a correctional officer at Camp Sierra Blanca, where he still works.

He met Cathy Dobbs while working at Bennett's, and they were married in 1978. She is presently enrolled in a cosmetology course in Roswell. They have two children, daughter Andi 9, and son Patrick 3. Both Cathy and Ace are from longtime Lincoln County families.

In 1986, Ace took his EMT

basic training, which earned him an award as rookie of the year of 1987, and the vice-president post of the Lincoln County EMT Association for 1988. He also received the special life-saver award in 1987 for saving a person's life.

The veteran EMTs say of Ace, "he handles people well, is firm, but gentle. He is an enthusiastic very adept responder one the association is proud of, and cherishes as a dependable friend."

Ace takes excellent care of the Capitan ambulance, seeing to its maintenance and readiness. He was a bit shy about telling of his first run. "We picked up a patient having labor pains, and worried that we might have to deliver the baby. I was driving on that run. We made it to the hospital on time. After returning to Capitan, we were congratulating ourselves that we had worked the way we were taught, quickly and well. I backed the ambulance into the garage—but failed to lift the

sliding door up high enough, and crumpled it with the loud crash of metal. Boy, did my ego take a slump!"

There are only three EMTs in Capitan, Ace, Freddy McSwane and Frank Romero (recently from Fort Stanton), with Jimmy Luna an emergency driver. Ace is on call in all his off-hours from work at Sierra Blanca. "I could be earning wages meat cutting during those off-hours, but the volunteer EMT work is far more rewarding, knowing we are needed," Ace says. "I've given CPR, been on accidents, and many local medical emergencies. I hope to be an IV technician some day, but meantime, the paramedics of Ruidoso will answer any call we give for that technical help. They usually overtake our ambulance on the way to the hospital, and just transfer their technicians to our ambulance for treatment of the patient. They are tops!"

Not only does Ace have accolades for the paramedics,

but also for the EMT director, physicians, teachers, and all his county medical co-workers. He enjoys being on duty at sports events as he is vitally interested in athletics, and gives congratulations to all players who perform well, regardless of their school.

He would like to see more CPR and First Aid training among school children and adults, and more Capitan volunteers for basic EMT training.

"I never want to leave Lincoln County," Ace says. "Best people here, and best country in the world. But please, everyone, remember that emergency phone number, 354-2909. It may save a life."

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS OF LINCOLN COUNTY PROPERTY TAXES DUE

Notice is hereby given that 1987 property taxes became due November 10, 1987 and will become delinquent December 11, 1987. Taxes may be paid in full by December 10, 1987, or in two equal installments, with the second half becoming due April 10, 1988 and delinquent if not paid by May 10, 1988.

Pursuant to Section 7-31-50 of the New Mexico Property Tax Code, a minimum penalty of five dollars (\$5.00) or one percent per month must be charged on all delinquent taxes, and pursuant to Section 7-31-49, one percent per month must be collected on all delinquent accounts. Owners of personal property such as mobile homes or office equipment, who have allowed taxes to become delinquent more than two years will be served with a demand warrant for collection of these delinquent taxes, pursuant to Section 7-38-53 of New Mexico Statutes Annotated 1978, if delinquent taxes are not paid in full.

Pursuant to Section 7-38-53, property taxes are the personal obligation of the owner of the property and the sale or transfer of property within that tax year does not relieve the former owner of personal liability for property taxes in that year. Failure to receive a bill is not sufficient cause to ask to have penalty and interest waived.
