\$9 million county budget approved for fiscal '88-89

The county budget for the 1988-89 fiscal year in the amount of \$9,034,000 was approved by the Lincoln County Commissioners following a day-long preliminary budget hearing May 17.

Salary increases of 3 percent for all county employees were included in the budget.

The budget hearing included a request by county clerk Fran Siddens for a new line item and \$30,000 for attorney fees. The request was denied after a discussion concerning the litigation between the commissioners and Siddens and Sheriff Don Samuels.

Siddens stated that if the county attorney represented only the county commissioners

then every elected official needs a line item for legal services.

Commissioner Bill Karn remarked that in times past county attorney Gary Mitchell had helped the clerk's office and the sheriff's office. "I think it is covered in Judge Doughty's opinion," Karn said.

Doughty handed down his opinion last week that Mitchell

should not represent the commissioners in their actions against the clerk and sheriff. Doughty also said that the county did not have to provide an attorney for the clerk or sheriff.

Siddens said her attorney's fees were \$8,500 at this point and went on to say that she would appeal Judge Doughty's decision. "As Judge

Doughty suggested."

Mitchell explained that Judge Doughty's decision "seems to be that the county attorney represents all the elected officials unless there is a conflict between two elected officials." In the event of a conflict between two elected officials Mitchell would not represent either party.

Mitchell agreed that Sid-

dens argument had merit and that the commissioners argument had merit.

Commission chairman John Hightower praised Siddens for being in control of her budget at all times.

Samuels did not attend the budget hearing and did not submit a budget as requested. Estimates for his budget were prepared by the county

manager's office and included an overall increase in the budget of \$70,000 from last year.

The sheriff's budget will be \$630,567 for next fiscal year compared to \$570,567 for this fiscal year. Sheriff's deputies will receive the 3 percent increase in salary in addition to an annual increase for years of experience.

A request was received from the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County for \$42,623. EDC/LC president Buddy Bundick told the commissioners, "We feel this investment will bring returns."

"We (the county) obviously don't have the money," Hightower said. The budget as presented had a surplus of only \$18 after each department was funded.

Hightower suggested that Bundick talk with EDC members and consider asking for a mill levy election to let voters of Lincoln County decide if the entire amount of money needed by EDC could be raised that way. EDC plans to ask each entity for money for economic development for the county.

During the discussion of the treasurer's budget, Hightower suggested that Mike Hainer's position as chief deputy be re-classified because of the additional work he does on the Alto Paving assessment district.

Hightower suggested a 5 percent increase in Hainer's salary instead of the 3 percent. Hainer objected, saying that the reason he could do the extra work was because of the other workers in the office taking over some of his former duties.

"I feel that it is all the workers in the office who are responsible," Hainer said. His salary increase will be three percent.

The final budget hearing will be held June 10. Any changes in the preliminary budget must be made by then.

In other business the commissioners approved an agreement for public road easement with the forest service.

A request was received to vacate a portion of Cedar Creek Road adjoining lot #1 of Raven Ridge subdivision. A road review committee of Bill Rawlins, E.J. Fouratt, and Bill Jarratt with Howard Puckett

Jury can't agree in rape trial

The court declared a mistrial in the jury trial held in district court in Carrizozo last week. Charges of criminal sexual penetration were brought against Boyd Barlett, 25, of Ruidoso.

Assistant District Attorney Scot Key was prosecutor for the state in the case. Barlett was represented by Penni Adrian of Albuquerque.

The three-day trial was heard by a jury of six men and six women. After deliberation of eight hours the jury reported that it could not reach a unanimous decision in the case.

District Judge Richard Parsons asked, "Do you think you could reach a decision if you went home and rested and slept?" He was told the jury was at an impasse.

Key stated it was grounds for a mistrial and Adrian said, "Reluctantly I agree."

Barlett was released on condition he not leave the state, not break any laws and have no contact with the victim personally, by phone or other methods, or through friends.

A court date has not been set for a new trial in the case.

Dunlap named Inez Marrs superintendent of the open class, home economics, at the Lincoln County Fair. Margaret Lightfoot will be general superintendent in the junior division.

Decisions were made concerning various aspects of the stampede and the fair. Work day for the stampede will be June 20. Workers should report to the fairgrounds at 8:30 a.m.

The next meeting of the Lincoln County Fair Board will be July 26 at 7 p.m. The fair board meets at the fair building in Capitan.

Insurance agency changes its name

The Stearns Insurance Agency is the new name of the J.G. Moore Agency that has been located in Carrizozo since 1948.

Owner Bob Stearns said the name change became effective May 17, exactly 25 years to the day that the agency was bought by his parents, Johnson and Margaret Stearns.

Bob said when his parents bought the agency they chose not to change the name of the agency because the J.G. Moore name was well-known.

Moore and his wife came to Carrizozo in 1940 and Moore was manager of the Carrizozo Mercantile Company. He was

later elected to the office of the Lincoln County Clerk and it was during this time that he began the insurance agency, running it out of his home.

Moore went on to be elected to the state senate representing Lincoln County where he was noted for being instrumental in getting Fort Stanton turned back to the state. Moore died in 1959 but his legend lived on.

Will Harrison, writer of the Inside the Capital column in Santa Fe, said of Moore, "He was a diminutive senator from Lincoln County who stood 12 feet tall in the legislature."

The agency has been housed in various buildings in Car-

rizzo. The original office building, after moving it out of his home, was in the building that is now the Albert and Ysabel Hernandez secondhand store, next door to the senior citizens center on the main street.

The agency was later moved to the office space between what is now the Outpost Bar and Grill and the laundromat. It has also been located in the old school library building next door to ShopRite and was on the corner where United New Mexico Bank is located.

"We moved to this location in 1979," Stearns said. That was the year the bank bought

There is a Danish saying I read in a book: "The man who is afraid of asking is ashamed of learning."

DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that paper on which newspapers are printed is the chief product of Canada's great forests? About 80 percent of the newsprint made in Canada is exported to the US.

This and other facts were among interesting things I learned by becoming a first-time host parent for a student from Up With People (UWP).

Dominique Blanchet, age 22, a visitor in our home was born and raised in Ancienne-Lorette (Quebec) Canada and is of French-Canadian ancestry. She told us about her family, her country and her fascinating account of her tour of service with UWP. The international organization for more than 20 years has provided young men and women year-long opportunities for cross-cultural education, on-stage musical performance experience and extensive world travel.

MAPLE SYRUP FESTIVITIES

Canada has a dual cultural heritage that stems from the British conquest (1763) of the French colony of New France. French-speaking Canadians make up the great

majority of the population of the province of Quebec. About one million French-speaking people live in other parts of Canada.

The nation, whose emblem is the maple leaf, is noted for production of maple sugar and syrup. According to Dominique, spring-time in Ancienne-Lorette brings maple syrup parties or gatherings featuring delicious concoctions of maple syrup butter and maple syrup drizzled over snow for a tasty frozen dessert.

BEHIND THE SCENES

The UWP advance team of Holger Weissenberger and Kazuko Nagumo allowed me to spend the day observing the UWP preparations for the big show on Monday night. Nagumo from Japan and Weissenberger from Germany are well known to the community and surrounding area for "path clearing" for Cast E this year. They stayed over a week with host family Phil and Bunty Richardson in Nogal.

Approximately three hours were spent by the super-organized UWP cast and staff in unloading into the new gym 18 tons of stage, lighting and sound equipment. These include 84 lighting instruments, equipment for a 10-piece band, a computer for controlling light and music, and, of course the "mixer, the big one."

I used to think that a mixer was a kitchen appliance for making cake batter. In the music world a mixer is an instrument used to control volume and lights in a stage production.

The UWP mixer is a large box with 1,635 buttons, 1,104 knobs which control 72 faders, 72 lights and other numerous stage areas. The faders are used in increasing or decreasing sound volume. Twenty-two (22) meters or gauges help the technician keep tabs on the solo, sub-groups and group performances.

The tips I learned in a seminar "Intro to PR-101" for the education of advance teams who travel ahead of the cast could be of value to county and town club and service organizations in their public communications skills.

SMALL WORLD

Gabriel Sanchez of Mexico was the UWP visitor in the home of Johnson and Margaret Stearns. I met Gabriel as he went about his duties prior to show time. I told him I have a son named Gabriel; my maiden name is Sanchez and my neighbors are the Stearns.

I chatted with UWP alumni Mozaun McKibben of Belen who was visiting with UWP members. McKibben was a Corona resident when he joined UWP and toured in 1985-86. He recalled the half-

time performance in New Orleans at the Super Bowl. McKibben told me that his UWP tour was a rewarding experience.

the property for the new bank building.

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Carrizozo Board of Education

Math teacher retires; test scores evaluated

The Carrizozo school board of education accepted a letter of resignation from high school math teacher Wayne Mason during the May 17 school board meeting. Mason is retiring after 34 years of teaching.

In other business, Supt. Danny Burnett reported that the school is in compliance with federal regulations concerning asbestos testing. Through a contract with Cooperative Educational Services (CES) the required testing will be completed at a cost of three and one-third cents per square foot.

Burnett said the total cost to the school would be \$3,021.

This will include inspection, writing a management plan and training anyone who works with or near asbestos. The school will have no further problems unless asbestos is found in the school.

Landscaping at the campus was discussed. Several dead trees have been removed and the ground re-leveled prior to pine trees being planted. A total of 35 pine trees were purchased for the campus.

In addition, work will begin on fencing, putting top rails on fences and installing gates. Donations of railroad ties will be accepted to be used for further landscaping, flowerbeds, etc.

Burnett reported that the new all-weather track has been installed. The warranty on the surface is for five years.

Students of the month for May were announced. Victoria Sainz is elementary, Bret Barham is mid-school and Loren Patterson is high school student of the month.

Sophomore competency test results were presented to the board. The average scores were higher than the required passing score. Individuals who did not pass any of the tests will take the tests they failed during their junior and senior years.

Students must pass the competency examination in addition to meeting other requirements in order to obtain a diploma upon graduation. If a student does not pass the test a certificate of attendance will be presented to the student.

ACT test scores were presented to the board. The seniors and sophomores scores are lower than state and national average. Burnett said the sophomores scores were lower because the students have not had courses in several areas of questions asked. The junior class ranked well above state and national averages.

One senior student scored a 29 out of a possible 30. This is an exceptional score and only one-tenth of all students nationally achieve this score.

Recognition was given to students participating in the state track meet. The boys

were District 3A runnerup. A total of 15 boys and girls qualified for state.

OPINION

Our ubiquitous and clout-larded environmentalist have struck again. San Rafael, CA has prohibited cats from cohabiting in a 224-home housing development so an "endangered species" of mouse can be protected. The law means that residents are forbidden to have cats. The city council doesn't know how to enforce the ban. But they do agree that "we'll be the laughing stock of everybody." The "no cats allowed" law is defended by the Marin Conservation League as a means of preserving the salt marsh harvest mouse and something called a clapper rail bird, both of which live in the area and could be reduced in number by cats. Here I thought most people wanted to be rid of mice and rats, which is why everybody rushes to buy a better mouse trap, and why so many households retain cats to do away with mice. There is no use trying to convince environmentalists that nature itself dooms species to extinction. No? Then why did dinosaurs disappear when there wasn't a human being around to prey upon them? Species come and species go, yet the world keeps going round and round. If there had been environmentalists around 180 million years ago during the Mesozoic era we would probably be up to our collective asses today in dinosaurs, some of which weighed 40 tons and were 90 feet long. Look at the problem this way: If cats were forbidden to eat mice and birds, aren't cats liable to become endangered species? And wouldn't it be a terrible thing if cockroaches should disappear from the crevices of our kitchens?

To prove how much political clout environmentalists have, the US Defense Department has been forced to settle a lawsuit brought against it by two environmental groups. The settlement sharply curtails research in New Mexico into an electrical phenomenon known as electromagnetic pulse, a system scientists measure the effects of nuclear explosion upon aircraft electrical equipment. Environmentalists say the process poses a danger to humans or wildlife. So the Army just shut down its electromagnetic pulse generator at White Sands Missile Range and others at Woodbridge, VA and Redstone Arsenal, Alabama.

One of the environmental groups filing the lawsuit is the Foundation on Economic Trends headed by Jeremy Rifkin, president. The news article which appeared in Sunday's Albuquerque Journal failed to fully identify Mr. Rifkin. He has been identified as working closely with communist-supporters groups in the US, one of which was the People's Bicentennial Commission. Rifkin was head of its Washington offices, and is quoted as saying: "The revolutionary heritage must be used as a tactical weapon to isolate the existing institutions (of the United States) and those in power." In a book Rifkin wrote, "Entropy," he called for a return of mankind to cave-like conditions with only goods produced to sustain a Spartan life. Perhaps you can see why Rifkin is anxious to derail any modern technology that might be used to defend the country. If people like Rifkin, masquerading as environmentalists, can pull down the technology that could defend against enemy aggression, we're in a heap of trouble.

I couldn't have put it better than I did on July 26, 1973 when I took the following swipe at environmentalists:

Perhaps it isn't worth the effort, but I spend considerable time trying to find what makes the so-called environmentalist tick. I'm not talking about the kind that includes people in their list of "things to save." I'm talking about the lunatic fringe that wants predatory animals preserved at the expense of people and animals alike. I have just read a booklet put out by the US Environmental Protection Agency in Washington called "Let's Dump the Dump." On page 14 it says to "exterminate rats." How come they want rats killed and not coyotes, mountain lion, bears, chicken hawks and rattlesnakes? It's a safe bet that some of the environmental do-gooders have had their toes bitten by rats, so they're "agin'em." But surely the rat has as good and valid a place in our environment as the coyote and bear. Or did God err in putting them here?

The Department of Agriculture at Salem has issued a statement that should bring joy unrestrained to Environmental Do-Gooders. Predators killed 2,142 lambs during the fiscal year ending June 30. Along with 1,299 turkeys, 681 sheep, 414 calves, 31 goats, 842 chickens, 233 ducks, 110 geese, four cows, two peacocks, 15 pigs and 24 rabbits. While Do-Gooders are saving predators, how about a round of applause for farmers and ranchers who provide the food for them? They deserve something for setting the table for many coyotes.

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Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—How long will the honeymoon between Gov. Garrey Carruthers and Senate GOP leader Les Houston last?

Many political observers are predicting the unnatural relationship will end long before the next legislature begins.

The relationship is a tenuous one. Other than both being Republican and of the conservative persuasion, the two have very little in common to bind them.

They are aligned with different segments of their party. Houston supported one of Carruthers' opponents, former state Senator Joe Mercer in the 1986 governor's race.

Houston is a blustery, do-it-my-way, taskmaster. Carruthers is a much more laidback, congenial, upbeat compromiser.

A good indication of the strained relationship between the two occurred last week when Judge Martin Pearl of Grants issued an injunction

reinstating 15 trainers suspended by the state racing commission until their court appeal is decided.

Pearl also overturned Judge Frank Allen's previous ruling that out-of-state drug testing is permitted under state law. That ruling was also signed by the first jurist to hear the case, Valencia County District Judge Mayo Boucher.

When Carruthers was asked about the number of judges who have already served on this young case, he expressed some dismay concerning a new law passed during the 1988 legislature which had been used to move the case to a Valencia County court.

Carruthers said the intent of the law, as presented to him by the bill's sponsors, was to allow citizens to sue the state in their own community rather than have to travel to Santa Fe for the state's convenience.

The governor said he felt that was a good reason for the legislation when he signed it,

but he was a bit surprised to see the law being used in a somewhat different way, now.

The "different way" the new statute is being used is something lawyers call "judge shopping."

All lawyers are well aware of the practice because it has always existed. It is a maneuver used in representing the best interests of one's clients.

It works like this. Each party in a lawsuit is allowed to disqualify one judge. After a judge is assigned to a case, a lot of strategizing is done. Past decisions in similar cases by all judges within the district are analyzed.

A game of "what if" is then played to determine all the possibilities if both sides disqualified one judge. The factor that makes the game

A different viewpoint

Is the flap over county commissioners politically motivated?

It's a tendency in Lincoln County to attribute almost everything that happens to "politics." A lot of the time, there is some truth to this.

I feel that the grand jury investigation of the county commissioners, county manager and county attorney was politically motivated to influence November's elections.

You see, with only 289 votes needed on a petition to hold a grand jury investigation — 5 percent of the county's voting rolls — calling a hearing of this type was relatively simple. There must have been a number of signers, of course, who knew what they were signing and had conviction that they were doing the right thing.

You will also find that a large number of voters will sign anything presented to them. Why not? If people they perceive to be more knowledgeable than they are want something to happen, well, why not sign? No skin off their teeth, as the old saying goes.

The governing body of the county, the county commissioners, have discovered certain things going on in the sheriff's office that they feel is contrary to state law. This is their job. They are sworn to uphold the laws of the state and county, and budget analysis and personnel matters have to be closely scrutinized by them and the county manager.

For them to do less than pay strict attention is for them to not fulfill their obligations to us, the taxpayers of Lincoln County. The commissioners owe it to us to be as thorough as they can. So does the county manager, who is hired by the commission to bring these matters to their attention.

The sheriff's budget is public record, and I have copies of computer printouts of that budget at my office.

Anyone who wants to examine the budget—and not just the sheriff's budget, by the way, but any county budget—may see these figures in the county manager's office in Carrizozo.

If you have doubts about what you've heard or read about these figures, I advise you to drive down and check it out.

County budgetary figures are a lot like your checkbook. If you have a balance of \$100 in your account, and you write a check for \$150, you have overdrawn your account. It's that simple.

Elected county officials know exactly how much money they have to spend on their different line items, and they are expected, just like the rest of us, to stay in the black and not write "bad checks."

January marked the halfway point of the fiscal year. If an elected official has spent more than 50 percent of his or her line item budget, then it goes without saying that prudence must be expended for the last half of the year in order not to spend as much as was spent during the first half.

Suppose you do overdraw your checking account by \$50. Suppose then that you go to a friend and ask if you can borrow fifty bucks. "I overdraw my account for a real good reason," you say.

But your friend answers: "You might have the best reason in the world to overdraw your account, but I don't have the \$50 to lend you."

Commissioners and the county manager have recently been put in the position of this sympathetic friend in terms of dealing with the sheriff's budget, and it's making some local citizens angry.

A few of the sheriff's supporters think that the "friend" ought to lend money he doesn't have, or else they aren't "true friends."

Another aspect pertinent to this issue is present here as well. If a county mismanages the budget, the Department of the State of New Mexico will

come in and run the county, as they did in Mora County. Period. It's up to the commission and the county manager to keep this from happening.

Would you vote to have your taxes raised in order to support the sheriff's overdraft? That's what it would come down to if the county had to give that budget funding they don't have to give. Want another mil levy? Or would you like the county to be run out of Santa Fe instead?

The commission is protecting you from this by their careful scrutiny and—yes, criticism—of the way the budget is being handled in the sheriff's office.

Commissioners John Allen Hightower and Ralph Dunlap are Democrats. Commissioner Bill Karn and county manager Suzanne Cox are Republicans. We have a cross-section of political parties involved here, and regardless of their conflicting political affiliations, these four people have united in their commitment to see that the laws of Lincoln County are not broken, and that we, the taxpayers, will not have to pay for an elected official's mistakes.

I applaud these four people for setting aside their party differences to administer the county's business properly. I've lived in places where, by simple virtue of political party, all four would be at each other's throats. It's no small thing that Lincoln County has a united county governing body. There is a lot to admire here.

I am not saying that the petitioners are acting outside their rights as citizens of the state of New Mexico; it is always good when people exercise their rights and utilize due process. They got the required number of signatures on the petition and they are, therefore, entitled to a grand jury investigation of the commissioners, county manager and county attorney.

As a taxpayer, I feel as if this grand jury business has

been a huge waste of time and money. The last specially-called grand jury in the county cost \$45,000.

A lot of citizens of the county don't understand exactly what a grand jury's function is. I know this because they approach me daily and say: "I signed that petition because I think it'll be a good thing for all this 'sheriff stuff' to be out in the open."

This well-meaning intent is ill-informed.

A grand jury is an accusatory and investigatory panel whose job it is to find evidence of wrongdoing. However, there needs to be no evidence of any wrongdoing in order to call the jury. They are, in effect, looking for something but they don't know what it is. There are only implications of some vague kind of wrongdoing.

If you stand by the idea that we are all innocent until proven guilty, and these four people, plus their attorney, have not been accused of any wrongdoing, you will understand how unfair this grand jury procedure is in this particular case.

Consider the political ramifications to the individuals involved. Consider that the "findings" of the jurists will be released in May, and that elected officials will be up for election in the June primary.

If you have strong convictions or if you continue to stay educated about county commission proceedings, you already have your own concept of who you like, who you don't like and how you intend to vote.

A good number of voters in any community, however, don't have or take the time to demand to attend meetings or read newspaper accounts of the proceedings, much less actually study the budgetary printouts themselves. These are the people who simplify this situation by saying to themselves: "Well, if these people are being investigated,

they must have done something wrong."

This isn't necessarily true! You don't have to do anything "wrong" to be investigated as long as people who, for their own reasons, would like to see you out of office and care enough to get 289 people to sign their petition.

The words "grand jury" sound real official. Even if no wrongdoing is found in this investigation—and remember, these people are innocent until proven guilty—they will always have the stigma of having been before a grand jury, even though no evidence of any wrongdoing has been discovered.

In June and November, there are going to be a lot of voters in this county who will

fun is that no one knows which judge the court will appoint next.

The new law adds one more factor into the mix. It allows lawyers to "shop" around the state for a judicial district in which they feel conditions might be best for their client. The plaintiff must reside in that district, but with 15 trainers being involved, more than one judicial district could be considered.

Carruthers admitted surprise at the new law being used so quickly to benefit the horse trainers. Houston represents some of those trainers. When asked by a member of the press if Houston was the driving force behind the bill, the governor was quick to respond that Houston was not the

prime sponsor.

Houston has been careful to decline comment about the case. He realizes Carruthers' strong feelings on the issue and the productive but delicate relationship they have outside the court battle.

Others haven't been timid about accusing Carruthers of shooting his mouth off to intimidate the judges who have been assigned to the case. They have called his statements absurd, arrogant and irresponsible.

The problem in this case resulted from Houston and the trainers running into a Garrey Carruthers who, on the issue of gambling, is a committed fighter. He is determined to make racing clean and keep it that way. A primary reason for his vetoing other gambling legislation is his problem with making sure he feels he has our two present forms of gambling—horse racing and bingo—fully policed and under control.

At a press conference last week, Carruthers gave a telling insight to what Houston and others should expect from him on any gambling issue.

He said, "I think people misunderstand how strongly I feel about assuring that the horseracing industry is clean. People now feel that they are betting on horses that aren't drugged. They feel owners, trainers and jockeys make a difference when they bet on a horse. I don't want to destroy something we have worked so hard to build the last few months."

Our governor will be a tiger on this issue. And it could have the more far-reaching effect of deteriorating his productive relationship with Sen. Houston.

Goodloe seeks 2nd term as treasurer

Shirley A. Goodloe has announced her candidacy for reelection as Lincoln County Treasurer.

A member of the Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County, she is unopposed in the Republican primary.

"I have taken my oath of

office very seriously," she said. "As investment officer for the county, it is my duty to account for Lincoln County's money at the direction of the Board of Finance. All money available to be invested is done so on a pro rata basis among all lending institutions in the county in accordance with the laws mandated by the state."

"Our office policy is to deposit daily receipts within 24 hours, even during the busy tax season," she added. "This has resulted in the county earning more interest on investments, even though the interest rates are very low at this time."

Goodloe says she had made every effort to perform her duties as county treasurer in full compliance with state statutes. Monthly reports are prepared and submitted by the 10th of each month, as required by the Department of Finance and Administration of the state. Her office is also in full compliance with all recommendations of the county auditor from the most recent audit.

"All treasurer's records have been computerized and we are working on new computer programs which will add more efficiency to the work of the office," she said. "Our communication with the public has improved because additional phone lines have been installed. We also strive to respond to all mail inquiries as soon as possible."

Goodloe said the workload in her office has increased 25 percent since the addition of the Alto Paving Assessment

District. "Even with the additional work, we have not asked for an increase in staff," she said. She noted that Lincoln County is the first county in the state to have a paving assessment district, and the treasurer's office was responsible for designing the collection program for the project.

"The treasurer's office is a working office," Goodloe stated, and listed some of the duties: distributing tax money collected each month to school districts, municipalities, state levies to the state, and special districts such as sanitation districts and soil and water conservation districts; investing available money; working with title and real estate companies on special tax problems. "Currently we are addressing the problems that occur each year involving finance company tax payments." One of the major functions is the accurate accounting for all county receipts and disbursements.

"The banks and savings and loans in the county are prompt in mailing end of the month statements and other documents to us so we can close on time each month in order to prepare the monthly report. We have certainly appreciated this cooperation," Goodloe said.

Goodloe has been a resident of Lincoln County 32 years, and says that living in this area has been one of the great blessings of her life.

"It has been a pleasure to
