

A visit with Katina Chavez' family

Katina Chavez loved life. "She was always smiling," said Louisa Salas, Katina's grandmother. Other family members and friends agreed, "Katina

was always smiling. She was always happy."

"If you knew her you loved her," said Katina's close friend Julie Pendergrass. "She was always happy and never down. She was always concerned about other people and tried to make everyone happy."

Now, just three months after Katina's tragic death, memories of Katina are all that family and friends have left.

Katina was a beautiful, athletic 15-year-old girl with a bright future. On Feb. 20 she was looking forward to receiving a basketball award. Her plans were never to be.

Katina's body was found in the Rio Ruidoso about 9 a.m. Feb. 21 after an all-night search. She had been murdered. Her death shocked and stunned the entire Hondo Valley area.

"We don't understand what she did to anyone to deserve to die in this manner," said Lillian Lopez, Katina's aunt.

Other aunts, uncles, cousins and friends met with Katina's parents at the home of Katina's maternal grand-

parents, Fermin and Louisa Salas, in Hondo on Friday to tell the NEWS about this remarkable young girl.

Katina was very athletic and enjoyed volleyball and basketball. She had twice been named All-District basketball player and dreamed of earning

a basketball scholarship to attend college.

"Katina had her whole life planned ahead of her," said her mother, Yolanda Chavez. "She knew exactly what she wanted out of life." There were tears in Yolanda's eyes as she spoke.

Katina's dad said, "I just know she was brought up in the right way."

Katina was active in her church, the Fountain of Living Water, a full gospel church in San Patricio. Her uncle and pastor Benjamin Chavez said of Katina, "She was always joking. She would try to cheer up anyone who was glum."

Katina's grandmother told of incidents where Katina would, "try to shock me by saying 'icehole' to see the look on my face." Louisa also mentioned the numerous times Katina would call on the phone and joke with her grandmother.

The Hondo High School sophomore was involved in school activities and school sports. She had received many awards for her sports activities and cheerleading.

Pendergrass considered Katina her best friend and often helped with the basketball team. "Katina would dribble the ball down the court and pretend to trip over the center line," Pendergrass said. "She liked volleyball and basketball. She had a lot going for her."

"Everyone looked up to her," Benjamin said.

But is it evident that at least one person, maybe more, did not share this view with the family. Katina's death has been ruled a homicide. The autopsy report indicated she had a crushed larynx and her head was held under water while someone choked her.

Matt Surratt, a 16-year-old from San Patricio, has been

Final plans made for Memorial Day program

Final plans are being made for the Memorial Day celebration that will be held in Carrizozo Monday.

The monument that will hold the \$1,000 commemorative bronze plaque is being erected this week in McDonald Park. When the plaque is attached, the marker

will be wrapped awaiting the official dedication and unveiling.

Activities will begin in the park at 9 a.m. with a number of different events to take place, including the Miss America 2000 contest, music, horseshoe pitching exhibition, cowchip chunk for men, frying pan massage for women, tug of war for children, a staged gun fight and a horned toad race.

A "meet the candidate" forum will be held from 12:30 to 1:30 for candidates to make speeches and hand out campaign material.

Assembly for the parade will begin at 1:30 p.m. between Texico and Tastee Freez. The parade is to start at 2 p.m. and will be led by the famed Holloman Honor Guard and

Drill Team. The parade route will be down the main street to the post office, where it will disassemble.

Former New Mexico Governor Bruce King will make the keynote address during the program that will be held at 2:30 p.m. The unveiling of the marker will be held at the conclusion of the program.

Organizing chairman for the event, Glen Ellison said, "We hope that everyone will pay their respects at one of the cemeteries during the day." No scheduled services will be held at either cemetery.

Tentative time for the free barbecue has been set for 3:45 p.m. The meat will be furnished and people are asked to bring salads, vegetable and desserts for the meal.

Judge Payne guilty on DWI charge

Bill G. Payne, municipal judge in Ruidoso, was convicted on a drunk driving charge in magistrate court in Ruidoso Monday.

Magistrate Court Judge John W. McLemore of Roswell heard the case, found him guilty and sentenced him to DWI school. He will also be required to pay court costs. No fine was imposed.

DWI school is a one-day affair conducted in Ruidoso.

The trial grew out of Payne's arrest for drunk driving on Dec. 5, 1987. Payne had pled not guilty to the charges.

Statewide repercussion seen Samuels, Siddens take their battle to Supreme Court

Lincoln County Clerk Fran Siddens and Sheriff Don Samuels have taken their battle against the county commissioners to the state Supreme Court.

Two separate writs were filed Tuesday asking the Supreme Court to overturn a decision handed down by District Judge Robert Doughty saying the county did not have to allocate funds for their legal expenses.

The case is scheduled to be heard in Supreme Court in Santa Fe at 9 a.m. next Wednesday, June 1.

The issues between the commissioners and the clerk and the sheriff began in January. The commissioners filed a writ of mandamus against Samuels to get him to comply with the county ordinances and later filed a writ of mandamus against Siddens to compel her to follow their instructions on recording the minutes of the county commission meetings.

Siddens and Samuels countered by filing writs of mandamus to disqualify county attorney Gary Mitchell from representing the commissioners in the actions and

asking for a stay of the proceedings until funds were allocated to pay their attorneys.

Doughty's opinion was released early in May. Mitchell was disqualified in the writ actions and the motion for stay and for allocation of funds was denied.

Considered a matter of first impression that will set a precedence and affect every elected official in New Mexico the case has drawn a response from the New Mexico Association of Counties.

NMAC has agreed to join the case "as a friend of the court," NMAC president Len-ton Malry said. "The issues be-

ing litigated are not of concern to the Board, the resulting financial disaster due to this ruling is of great concern."

Siddens said, "It is necessary for every elected official to be assured of legal representation in their official capacities. If we are not assured of this, no one can afford to run for public office in any capacity, whether it be school board, municipality or county, as few people are financially able to pay legal fees and court costs at any given time.

Heckman accuses auditor of Being on a 'witch hunt'

"When an auditor wants free access to rummage through the files then I think he is on a witch hunt," former Sierra Blanca Airport Commission administrator Fred Heckman said Friday during a meeting with auditor Don Wingfield.

Heckman had met with Wingfield and former SBAC members Benny Coker, Conrad Buchanan and Kenneth Nosker to discuss the audit. The airport records were not brought to the meeting.

Wingfield insisted he needed access to all the records to get the "flow of everything," and said, "In order to track things and get a complete picture I cannot be restricted in what I am looking at."

Heckman asked for a list of the items Wingfield wanted but said he would not release the records until the audit was complete.

"Why am I not given access to complete records?" Wingfield asked.

"We want to avoid obvious problems," Heckman answered. "We aren't going to let you go through the files." Heckman then accused Wingfield of being told by Lincoln County Manager Suzanne Cox to "find something."

"That is an outright lie," Wingfield stated. "I am an independent auditor and no one

all the files.

The argument between the two men happened after the others had left the meeting.

"I also need to know your definition of eligible and non-eligible items," Wingfield said, referring to items that qualified as being eligible for FAA funding.

"There should only be one," Heckman said. "You use the FAA definitions out of the manuals."

When Heckman offered to answer questions during the audit Wingfield said, "You don't even need to be here."

Even though the men disagreed during the meeting, later that day Heckman did give the six boxes of records to Ruidoso village attorney John Underwood to be given to the current airport commission.

Heckman said they were in his office in boxes. Heckman said Wingfield should make a list of the files he wanted. Wingfield countered by saying he wanted

Lightning sets fires on Ft. Stanton mesa

Another forest fire on the Fort Stanton mesa was prevented Tuesday afternoon due to the quick work of the Twin Mountain Rock construction crews.

TMR is building the access road to the new Sierra Blanca Regional airport.

Lightning struck a fence at about 1:20 p.m. and followed the fence for more than 500 feet, causing grass and small brush near the fence to catch fire. The worker who saw the lightning called for help on his radio.

More than 15 construction workers, armed with shovels and fire extinguishers, battled the small blazes. One operator drove a D-10 Cat one-fourth mile to use it to roll dirt over burning spots.

The small fires were contained before two fire trucks from Fort Stanton could reach the scene. The construction crews had returned to their work even before the fire trucks arrived.

"The fire could have developed into a major forest fire," said one construction worker. He said stands of timber were within three feet

of the fence.

The fire was located approximately 4 1/2 miles east of Highway 37 on private property in an area where there are no homes. This is also the general area of the last forest fire on the mesa.

school teacher, lives in Roswell. A brother is in Odessa, TX, a sister and his twin brother in Farmington. Billy graduated from NMSU in 1976 with a degree in animal science. He is married to the former Debbie Anderson of Alamogordo, and has a 6-year-old daughter, Amanda. Debbie drives the school bus from their home, picking up students along the route to the Capitan School, where she also substitutes.

Billy took his first EMT training in 1983 in Carrizozo, and after being inactive a time, again took the basic training in 1987.

"The second training session," Billy said, "was more comprehensive with lots of new and pertinent material to help give us better ways of serving the people. With our communication system and team work, help is always quick to answer a call."

The Bird Ranch is the farthest from the Capitan ambulance. Willa and Preston Stone and Billy are often on calls in their area together.

Billy said, "I hate to see people hurting. I'll do everything I can to ease their pain. I know all about pain. I've been bucked off horses many times, but while at school in Las Cruces, I was rodeoing and got bucked off and broke my back."

"I think rural folks understand the need to help each other, but more should take the basic training to learn the know-how not only to better help others, but also themselves."

Billy has been on first alert for several minor accidents and one major one, but feels especially grateful that he has been able to give aid at accident scenes on his trips to and from Roswell.

When asked about the future, Billy said, "Oh I'll just keep on working with the rest of my EMT mates to do the best job we know how in helping the hurting ones."

With the arrival of the summer session, emergency medical situations are apt to increase. Tourist attractions in Lincoln County bring more motorists and outdoor activities that may result in accidents.

The Lincoln County EMTs are on the alert and fully prepared to give life-saving medical service wherever needed.

The EMT chosen for May by the Lincoln County EMT Association is Billy Bird. He was born and raised in Roswell, and is the grandson of the late Buster Bird who for many years was the treasurer of the Nogal Mesa Ranchmen's Camp Meeting. Billy's father died and Billy now runs the ranch north and east of Capitan. His mother, a retired

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

charged in the death, Surratt lived near Arturo Chavez, Katina's dad.

Surratt is being held in protective custody in the Otero County juvenile detention center in Alamogordo awaiting a hearing on June 2 to determine if he should be tried as an adult.

Katina's family objected to newspaper reports concerning Surratt. "The papers try to make him sound so innocent," said one young cousin.

"People ask us if he is retarded. He was slow walking but he was not retarded." Several of the family agreed that Surratt definitely is not retarded.

"He is not retarded," Yolanda said. "He could pass his grades, not the highest scoring, but he kept his grades up." Matt was a sophomore in Katina's classes at Hondo school.

Katina's family gave a different picture of Surratt than has been published. They said he could drive a car and was often seen driving a mile or so to pick up his nephew; they said he drank and was once "thrown out" of a wedding reception for "getting crazy and bothering everyone"; they said he smoked marijuana; they said he and Katina were not as close friends as has been reported and that Katina did not call him.

"She was not the type to be calling him," Yolanda said. Everyone agreed the only time Katina would call Surratt's house was to see if her dogs were there.

"He (Surratt) had a bad mouth and he got in trouble in school," Katina's cousin said. She told of a teacher putting Matt in a closet as punishment and "Matt threw things out of the closet."

Another incident occurred at a pizza place in Hondo when Surratt was told by the manager to "control your mouth or leave."

Katina had told her mother that Matt and another boy were always "wasted." "Katina said Matt was gross," remarked Arturo. He told of once in school when a teacher told Matt to eat a grasshopper. "Katina said Matt was gross (when he ate the grasshopper). He had that green stuff running out of his mouth."

The teacher being mentioned was apparently Phil Stewart who recently resigned from his position with Hondo Schools. According to reports, Stewart had taught martial arts to students and taught them how to use a choke-hold to stun, but not kill, an enemy. When asked if anyone thought Stewart had anything to do with Katina's death, Yolanda said, "I think in a lot of ways he may have influenced these kids. He taught them how to choke someone."

Katina had told her mother that Stewart was "weird."

None of the family would say they definitely thought Surratt is guilty. They did agree that he could not have done it alone. "If it was just him and her, she could have fought him off."

The family believes that there were others involved in Katina's death. They are not satisfied with the sheriff department's investigation of the case.

Yolanda told of Sheriff Don Samuels and Deputy Paul Wersich coming to her home a day or so after Katina's funeral. She said Samuels and Wersich would not give her any information, "but they walked out of the house and told my

sister they were looking for a green car."

Arturo said he had gone to the sheriff's office and stayed 30 or 45 minutes and left a message for Rex Skellet to call him. He never received the call.

The case is being investigated by the district attorney's office and the family says assistant district attorney Scot Key and investigator Leandro Vega have been in contact with the family regularly.

"Leandro has been cooperative and he gave us some good reports," Louisa said. "They are working on it."

The family thinks there were probably three persons involved in Katina's death. They believe it was someone who knew her and watched her.

"I pray they can't sleep at night, knowing nobody stood up for a lovely innocent girl who was probably begging for her life," Louisa said. "She loved everybody. At the time of her need, who stood up for her?"

Louisa insists that Katina would not have gotten dressed to go get a trophy and then go out on the loose dirt to play basketball as has been reported. "She would not have had that long a wait and she would not have gotten her hands, clothes and shoes dirty."

The family has hired a private investigator to find out if anyone else was involved in the death. The insist that more people have information and are "scared to talk."

Anyone with information of any kind, regardless of how small it may seem, is asked to contact the private investigator, Manuel Lopez, day or night, at 505-293-8080. All information will be kept confidential.

Katina's death has touched on the lives of not only her family but on the lives of everyone in the Hondo Valley and neighboring areas. People are afraid to stay alone; people are not trusting of one another; and people wonder who could have done this terrible thing.

"I can't let myself be sad," one cousin said, "Katina would always say to me, don't be sad or I'll be sad."

The family was sad as they talked of Katina. Tears were in their eyes and more than once someone had to leave the room while they were talking.

Katina's grandmother said that maybe Surratt will get out and "help his grandfather take care of his two calves and goat. At least they know he's there and they can see him. We will never see our beautiful little girl. All we can do is think of her lovely smiling face and her loving ways."

Gilbert Salas, Katina's uncle said, "I'm not saying Matt is guilty but the paper says Matt talks to his mother through a little window. My sister and brother-in-law will never talk to their child again."

Perhaps Louisa Salas said it best, "Dear God, why did it have to be Katina? She was so good and so full of life. Although this valley will never be the same, it will help to know who could have done this terrible thing to her. Maybe then we can begin trusting each other again."

TMR superintendents and office personnel stayed at the scene until the fire trucks arrived. Firemen "mopped up" the area and made sure there were no embers that would flare up in the gentle breeze that was blowing at the time. TMR placed one of their water trucks at the location in case the fire trucks needed additional water for any of the clean-up work.


●Glen Ellison raised a good point last week at the county commissioners' budget hearing. He noted that Predatory Animal Control asked for a \$17,500 increase over last year's budget of \$3,375. Commissioners settled for a 48 percent increase, \$1,625, for a total of \$5,000. Ellison compared this with the treatment handed the White Mountain Rescue team. It's budget for last year was \$1,650 and it was asking for an additional \$2,200 this year. It got zero increase, and is stuck with \$1,650 for fiscal 1989. White Mountain Rescue is a volunteer group that furnishes its own vehicles, time, labor, and equipment in rescuing people lost, injured or stranded in the mountains and forests of Lincoln County. Since the county depends upon tourism for much of its income, Ellison thought it unwise to devote more money to hunting down coyotes than it does to rescuing lost or injured tourists. So Ellison addressed the commissioners: "I just want to keep Lincoln County's priorities straight. Here we have an increase in the budget of \$1,625 to hunt coyotes, but there is no increase in the budget to hunt people." Nice shot.

●The special Lincoln County Grand Jury has adjourned without taking action on a petition, signed by 10 percent of county voters, calling for investigation of possible wrong-doing on the part of county commissioners in their dealing with the sheriff and county clerk. The only reason this grand jury was called was for that specific purpose. Instead, it has handed down a few indictments that have nothing to do with the reason for its existence, and inspected the jail. Bully. According to our sources, the New Mexico Attorney General was asked to furnish a special prosecutor to guide the grand jury, who failed to provide one. As a result, it would appear that the grand jury just threw up its hands, backed off and went home. A grand jury does not have to have a special prosecutor from the attorney general's office. A grand jury is an autonomous body that can do just about anything it wants to do. "It is an independent investigatory body and can launch its own inquiry into crime whenever there is strong reason to suspect that its powers are being thwarted." This grand jury has simply failed to do its duty, for which citizens of Lincoln County should hold them responsible, individually and collectively. The whole procedure was a fraud and a sham. If the grand jury system has come to such a sorry pass, let us abolish it as a useless and meaningless adjunct of the judicial system.

●The price of justice is so high these days few people can afford it. Take the case of Eddy Mauzy of Corrales. The other day a man smashed a window of his new \$26,000 truck, wired it, and drove off. He spent the next hour and a half filling out stolen vehicle reports at the police station. On his way home, Mauzy saw a man and woman driving his truck. He pursued the truck and twice pulled up alongside it, ordering the man driver to stop—that the vehicle was his. His demands were disregarded. The third time he pulled up he slipped his .357 Magnum out of its holster and ordered the man to stop. He did. Mauzy told him he was making a citizen's arrest and to lean against the truck until police arrived. Instead, the man jumped Mauzy and wrestled him for the gun. It went off during the struggle, but nobody was hit. The thief then took off running, with Mauzy yelling for him to stop, and firing several shots over his head. He kept running. Twenty minutes later the police arrived, arrested Mauzy, threw him in the drunk tank, questioned him all night, then charged him with aggravated assault with attempt to commit a 20 violent felony, and let him free on \$2,500 bail. The thief and his wife accomplice were later arrested and charged with theft of a motor vehicle. Officer Frank Salerno of the Corrales Police Department explained the official rules: "The thing to do is follow him (the car thief) and then get word to a police officer. That's what we're trained for. He (Mauzy) isn't a trained police officer." Brilliant. First, it is legal and proper for any person to make a citizen's arrest when the culprit is caught in the act of committing a felony. Second, just how does one go about getting "word to a police officer" when he is chasing a thief down a highway at a high rate of speed? The official answer to that must be that he stop, find a phone and call police—while the thief escapes.

●It would have been more logical if Mauzy had killed the thief. Then the state could have been saved years of expensive court battles trying to send the thief to prison. There would be no endless hearings, trials, appeals, postponements and judicial hanky-panky. If the public is lucky, the man would finally be given a term in prison of which he would serve about one-fourth the time imposed. Or, he may gain the ear of some governor like Toney Anaya and get himself pardoned so he can continue his depredations upon innocent people. As the matter stands, victim Mauzy is almost certain to be charged and convicted of the serious crime of aggravated assault, illegal use of firearms and attempt to commit a violent crime (pulling a gun on a criminal). So much for law and justice in the Land of the Free.

●There is a saying that one can prove almost anything by statistics. For example, in the recent primary elections around the country for the presidency, 90 percent of blacks voted for black candidate Jesse Jackson—not because of his policies, some of which are repugnant to most blacks, but simply because of his color. On the other hand, polls show that about 20 percent of whites would vote for Jesse Jackson if they had the opportunity. So it appears that 90 percent of blacks practice racial discrimination as compared to 20 percent of the whites. If 20 percent of the whites vote for the black, and 10 percent of blacks vote for the white candidate, does it show that whites are twice as racially tolerant as are blacks? And if blacks vote 90 percent for Jackson regardless of the issues, is there a more blatant display of racial bigotry? Yet, in most other phases of American life, whites are almost always credited with practicing racial intolerance. Current voting trends indicate otherwise. Blacks, who profit most from racial confrontation, are prime purveyors of racial bigotry in this country.

SANTA FE—George Bush and Jesse Jackson paid their token visits to New Mexico during the past week or so.

Neither visit was much longer than the Harry Truman whistle-stop in Deming I can still remember so well, even though it was 40 years ago.

Whistle-stop campaigning had a lot going for it. Small-town residents got a chance to see national figures up close.

That morning in Deming the entire town, I'm sure, went to the station to wait for the president's train to arrive from its stop at Lordsburg, 60 miles to the west.

When the train arrived everyone crowded around the rear platform. I was in the Boy Scout color guard, which got to stand real close.

Within a minute of the train's stop, Pres. Truman walked out on the rear platform and gave a very brief version of his "Do-nothing 80th Congress" speech.

A few "Give 'em hell, Harry's" were shouted. Bess walked out and waved. And after much coaxing Margaret finally showed her face but declined to sing because it was too early in the morning.

And just a few minutes after the train arrived, it was on its way to a similar stop in Las Cruces, 60 miles to the east.

In today's jet-set, media-based campaigning, citizens rarely get to see major candidates in the flesh—and never close up unless they happen to work at the token plant, or go to the token school or be a member of the token service club.

The length of the Jackson and Bush visits were indicative of New Mexico's importance in the presidential nominating process. When you're little and last, a lunchtime stopover is all you rate.

New Hampshire showed us what happens when you are little and first.

We don't know any more about either candidate than we did before they came. We got to see a minute or two on the 6 o'clock news and that was it.

I was out of state when Jackson breezed through but I doubt it was any different than the Bush visit. Instructions for the media clearly noted that 50 feet was the closest we would ever be able to get.

I didn't bother. But both campaign organizations can say their candidate was in New Mexico—even if it was just a few hours in Albuquerque.

Bush's visit to the state didn't create much national exposure. Other than Bobby Knight, the big news that day was Pres. Reagan's anticlimactic endorsement of his vice-president's candidacy.

Unbelievably, he mispronounced Bush's name. He rhymed it with rush, which certainly doesn't describe the speed with which the president moved to endorse the lone candidate remaining in the race.

It seems Reagan just can't get excited about Bush. But then, why should he be different from anyone else?

On paper it would seem

that ethnic, multilingual Michael Dukakis from Massachusetts would be the perfect candidate to upstage Bush on every occasion. He stirs memories of Jack Kennedy and Zorba, the Greek and Melina Mercouri, but listen to him talk and all he reminds you of is George Bush.

The only thing that may keep us awake during Bush-Dukakis debates is caffeine injections. I think I'm going to be busy on those days. If anyone watches, please give me a call when it's over so I can turn the TV back on.

I'm trying to figure out what this choice of candidates says about the American people. Every other candidate seemed to be more interesting than the two survivors.

Maybe that's it—they're survivors.

Gary Hart played it too fast and loose to survive. Bob Dole was too quick

with his barbed remarks to survive.

But wouldn't it have been a ball following those two for the next six months on the campaign trail?

Sure, Jesse Jackson is a flashy candidate. But he has become very predictable. And with the excitement of a possible Jackson victory gone by the boards, he's just a guy who's hanging on.

The most exciting moment for either of the likely presidential candidates was the Bush interview by Dan Rather. Our veep survived the attempted ambush quite proudly and got in some licks of his own.

Maybe instead of debates, we should have Rather go one-on-one with each candidate for a few rounds apiece.

That is something I might watch.

Defending OUR country?

EDITOR—In 1983, then Navy Secretary John Lehman said this to the graduating class at Annapolis: "Within weeks many of you will be looking across just hundreds of feet of water at some of the most modern technology ever invented in America. Unfortunately, it is on Soviet ships."

Everybody knows that Moscow's agents steal valuable technology and secrets from the United States on a regular basis. What you may not know is that, on a massive scale, the United States has willingly and eagerly assisted in the Soviet military build-up. It ought to be a far bigger scandal than the Iran-Contra affair, but don't look for the major networks to make it so.

Former Texas Representative Ron Paul estimates that over the years a minimum of \$100 billion in credit has been extended to the USSR and its East-bloc satellites, all of it with approval, and sometimes at the direction, of our State and Commerce Departments.

Senator William Armstrong of Colorado has stated on the floor of the Senate that the United States has provided the Soviets with billions of dollars worth of technical equipment for steel plants, tractor factories, and hydroelectric installations. Even the standard spacesuit for Soviet cosmonauts was sold by NASA for \$180,000, though the space agency spent \$20 million on it in research and development. "It is difficult to overstate the extent to which we have contributed to the Soviet military threat that now endangers our very existence," Armstrong said.

Most of the trucks and armored personnel carriers which the Soviets used to invade Afghanistan were built at the Soviet city of Niberezhnyye. A dozen American firms, including Ford Motor Company and Swindell-Dressler, were authorized to supply the Soviets with technology and equipment needed to build and operate the plant. That's why you should be more than a little concerned that a major portion of the Soviet establishment could quite fittingly be stamped, "made in the USA."

Sheriff acted responsibly

EDITOR—After reading the issue of The Ruidoso News dated Jan. 14, 1988, I must say that I am surprised by articles printed about Sheriff Samuels. I am referring to page 2A of the Jan. 14, 1988 issue, and item 9 of Commissioner Dunlap's motion.

In regards to item 9, which reads: "Despite a request and a meeting with the Commissioners of the County of Lincoln, the Sheriff of the County of Lincoln did authorize certain radio work by another party when the County had a contract with an individual to do the work. The County could have possibly incurred liability for breach of contract but the individual who had the contract decided not to pursue the matter. The obligation incurred was one which was covered pursuant to the contract and cost the County extra money"

Commissioners, I am not going to mince words with you regarding item 9, you're WRONG!

Officers who did report to this facility for radio repair, stated that the faulty equipment brought to this facility, had been to the county's contractor a minimum of three times for the same complaint, and had still not received satisfactory repair service.

Let me remind the commissioners that along with the sheriff, the commission shares the responsibility for the safety and welfare of all county employees. Furthermore, the sheriff was right in sending his officers to another repair facility when repeated trips to the authorized contractor were fruitless, the equipment was returned without having been repaired, and had been mounted in a sloppy, careless manner, that not only reduces performance and service life, but endangers the life of the operator as well.

Let's face the facts; any law enforcement officer puts his/her "life on the line" every day their on duty, and an officer without reliable communications that has repeatedly reported to an authorized repair facility, and can't get proper service, does not possibly place the county in a liability situation. The county is in a liability situation that could result in the death of an officer. Is it not criminally negligent to knowingly put an officer on duty, in a possibly dangerous situation, without adequate, and reliable communications?

Sheriff Samuels was acting well within his obligations as the Sheriff of Lincoln County in sending his officers to an "unauthorized" repair facility in this case in order to insure the safety of his officers and the public, after the authorized contractor had failed to perform to standards set forth in his contract.

Sheriff Samuels and his staff should be applauded for their efforts to improve an aging and out-of-date communications system that does place the county in a daily liability situation, because poor communications causes poor service to the county, and its taxpayers.

After reading the allegations made against Sheriff Samuels, specifically item 9 of Commissioner Dunlap's motion, I can only wonder what other facts have been misrepresented, misinterpreted, and/or mismanaged by the commissioners, and their "fact finders." I am personally aware of the facts pertaining to item 9, since I performed the work at the request of the sheriff, after the authorized vendor had failed to make accurate and reliable repairs to county equipment. I really think the commissioners need to review their facts again, or find some more efficient and reliable "fact finders."
