Primary Election results

Samuels, Karn, Dunlap among Tuesday's losers

Lincoln County voters made their choices in the primary election Tuesday. Republican voters outnumbered Democrats with 61.4 percent of registered Republicans casting votes and 57.5 percent of Democrats voting.

Incumbent Sheriff Don Samuels was defeated as were incumbent county commissioners Ralph Dunlap in District 1 and Bill Karn in District 3.

Incumbent county commissioner John Hightower defeated his opponent Glen Ellison for the Democratic position for District 2. Former sheriff Tom Sullivan defeated his two opponents with 56.4 percent of the vote and will face Republican James McSwane in the general election in November.

Results of the election will be unofficial until the county commissioners conduct a canvass of the votes on Friday during the county commission meeting in Carrizozo.

The big Smokey Bear Stampede Parade on July 4 was the chief topic of discussion at the June 6 meeting of the Capitan Chamber of Commerce.

This year's parade theme is Frontier Times. Fill out the coupon in this issue of the News and send it to the parade committee, Box 441, Capitan, NM 88316.

Mildred Crocker, Bill Allen and Elmer Pirelli have accepted the invitation to be parade judges. Two more judges are needed. The parade's grand lady will be Lois Aldrich. The grand marshal will be Elfego Montoya.

Shriners will bring go-karts and mini-bikes from Alamogordo. The Lincoln County Fair Board will put on the barbecue at the fairgrounds after the July 4 parade.

Rodeo performances are

scheduled for July 2 at 7 p.m., July 3 at 2 p.m. and July 4 at 2 and 7 p.m. The Hatch Brothers will furnish music for dances on July 2 and July 4 beginning at 9 p.m.

In other business the chamber approved a donation of \$100 to the Lincoln County Fair Board to be used for a cover for the fair catalogue. The chamber will also donate a \$35 belt buckle to be used as award at the fair.

Dorothy Smith, a member of the Capitan Cemetery Board, told the chamber that an effort is being made to set up perpetual care at the cemetery. With this in mind the chamber donated \$50 to the cemetery board.

The Lincoln County News is printing 5,000 additional Capitan brochures. A brief story of Smokey the Bear by Dorothy Guck will replace a list of the Capitan chamber members that was on the back of the first printing.

Chamber members were

informed that this year's Lincoln County Fair is Aug. 16-20.

The Capitan Chamber of Commerce received an invitation from the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County. This corporation will celebrate one year of existence on June 9 at 7 p.m. The place is the Cree Meadows Country Club in Ruidoso.

Chamber members learned that the Village of Capitan had purchased 10 new pennant flags for various celebrations. The chamber decided to purchase two such flags. The chamber also approved the purchase of a \$20 ad from Capitan cheerleaders who are doing a football schedule.

Chamber members were advised that June 20 will be a workday at the fairgrounds. Volunteers are to meet at 8:30 a.m.

President Dick Beck called a special meeting of the chamber for June 13 at 11:30 a.m. This meeting will be at the Smokey Bear Restaurant.

Matt Surratt to stand trial as a juvenile

District Judge Robert Doughty ruled Friday that Matt Surratt, 17, should be tried in juvenile court for the murder of Katina Chavez, 15. The ruling came after a two-day hearing in Alamogordo.

Assistant District Attorney Scot Key argued that Surratt should be tried as an adult because of the severity of the crime.

Doughty's ruling means that if convicted, Surratt could receive a maximum sentence of two years at the New Mexico Boys School in Springer. If he had been tried and convicted as an adult he could have received life imprisonment, which in New Mexico is a term of 30 years.

Surratt, who has been in custody in the juvenile section of the Otero County Jail in Alamogordo since March 4, was released by Doughty following the hearing. Doughty ordered Surratt to stay with family out of state until the trial which is to be held within 90 days.

Surratt was a neighbor of Chavez in San Patricio. They were classmates at Hondo School where Chavez had received many athletic awards.

Chavez was reported missing Feb. 20 when she was not at home when her basketball coach arrived to drive her to an awards banquet. Her body was found near her home in the Rio Ruidoso on Feb. 21 after an all-night search.

Surratt was taken into custody March 4 and charged with an open count of murder. His attorney Gary Mitchell

has maintained that Surratt is innocent.

Mitchell was "elated" with the decision and said, "Obviously, I would much rather have my client in children's court than adult court because the penalties are less severe."

Mitchell also said the major thing was getting to see the evidence the state had. "I am hoping the state will see the light and dismiss the case," he added. He feels that if the state will let the four investigators work on the case it will be solved.

The four investigators he referred to were Paul Wersich with the sheriff's department, Leandro Vega with the district attorney's office, Charlie Cox with Mitchell's office and Manuel Lopez, private investigator hired by the family of Katina Chavez.

Surratt did not leave the state immediately after being released Friday. He was reported to have been seen in Roswell on Tuesday and Mitchell confirmed that Surratt had remained in the state, outside the county, at Mitchell's request.

"He is out of the state now at an undisclosed location in the state of Texas for his own safety," Mitchell said Wednesday. Apparently Mitchell had delayed Surratt's departure from the state "to get some things accomplished."

Louisa Salas, Katina's maternal grandmother, was concerned that Surratt was not taken out of the state immediately. "Where is the law?" she asked. "Why not take him back to jail to wait for the trial?"

Carrizozo Schools budget tops \$1.5 million for fiscal 88-89

The total estimated budget for Carrizozo Schools for the 1988-89 year will be \$1,622,028.

The budget was reviewed on May 25 by the Carrizozo Board of Education and Isaac Martinez and Michael Davis of Santa Fe. Martinez is financial management consultant for school finance division with the department of education and Davis is accreditation consultant for the state department of education.

Martinez explained the twofold purpose of the meeting was to have the school budget in Santa Fe by June 20 with the budget to be certified by July 1. Adjustments to the budget can be made on the 40th, 80th and 120th days of school.

Carrizozo School Supt. Danny Burnett gave a summary of the district's education program, accomplishments of students and staff and programs during the 1987-88 school year.

Burnett said the most significant thing the school did in making gains in capital improvements was adding the all-weather athletic track. He listed CTBS scores and ACT test scores and noted that one senior received a 26 on the ACT, one junior received a 29 on the ACT and another junior received a 25 on the ACT. The ACT perfect score is 30.

"These ACT scores are up

around the national merit range," Burnett said. He also listed scholarships seniors received this year, students' science fair activities, FFA participation and awards won, students of the month and athletic winners.

"We are glad to see the emphasis is on students," Davis said. He mentioned that the budget documents had four lines for administration and seven pages of information about students.

"Lots of things are happening in Carrizozo," Davis added. "It is a very good report." He discussed with Burnett the plan for Carrizozo to continue the seven-period day at school which gives students 28 chances to acquire the necessary 23 credits to graduate and also gives students viable options.


"I will recommend full accreditation in June," Davis said. He was impressed with Carrizozo having the "Biology Teacher of the Year, Mariann Patterson," and said the Write to Read program for kindergarteners and first graders is a good program and he considered the school dropout rate "interesting."

"I personally feel the dropout rate is less than it was a year ago," said school principal Mel Holland.

"Mr. Holland should be commended for going out in the community, door to door, living room to living room, trying to get these students back in school," Burnett said.

Martinez reviewed the budget and said 98 percent of the money comes from the state equalization guarantee based on student enrollment. This will bring \$1,142,009 to the district. Carrizozo has estimated there will be 271 students next year.

Included in the budget is a cash balance of \$108,067 from this year that was added to the total budget. This money was available due to the district being frugal and cautious with expenditures. The remaining money will come from local sources.

Martinez asked about increases in some line items for next year. He was told one increase is for Holland to attend leadership training, another line item is for funds for the school board election that will be held next spring and another increase is because different pay scales will apply for sharing a band teacher with Corona next year, providing one is hired.

All school employees will receive a 3 percent salary increase next year.

The total budget of \$1,622,028 includes all debt service, bond building for sale of bonds for critical capital outlay and the 2 mil levy money for capital improvements from Senate Bill 9.

Voters approve beef checkoff

Results of the beef checkoff referendum have been released by the Department of Agriculture, with voters approved continuing the program by 79 percent.

Lincoln County voters were 87 in favor and 9 against. Otero County voters were 84 for and 4 against.

Shirley Goodloe, chairman for Lincoln County in the New Mexico beef checkoff campaign, was pleased with results, which mean the Beef Board will continue to collect the assessment of \$1 per head of cattle sold. The money collected will be used to promote beef.

"It is evident the people realize the value of advertising, promotion and research for the future of the beef industry," Goodloe said.

The program began when Congress passed the Beef Promotion and Research Act of 1965. The entire beef industry worked together to change consumer attitudes towards beef in order to increase consumption and demand for beef.

Federal law mandated that no more than 5 percent of the money collected could be used for administrative costs. In addition, 50 cents of every dollar collected was controlled by each state's own local beef council.

More than 100 programs were operated by the checkoff, including re-educating American consumers about beef, research that looked at everything from cholesterol to product safety and microwave packaging, and national advertising.

The most popular television commercials stars James Garner promoting beef. Radio advertising featuring Paul Harvey was also a success. Print ads aimed at doctors, dietitians, homemakers and restaurant owners had an impact.

One survey showed that consumers who believe beef is an important part of a well-balanced diet increased from 51 percent to 56 percent in a six-month period. An independent study found that 13.9 million Americans who classed themselves as "light" beef users began buying more beef after seeing checkoff ads.

"Advertising is important," Goodloe added. "Beef producers have to compete with other meat industries and they have to deal with bad publicity beef receives."

The referendum was on the ballot May 10 with any person who owned cattle between Oct. 1, 1986 and March 31, 1988 being eligible to vote. The votes were counted May 24 and forwarded to the USDA for compiling of national votes.

The largest number of votes were cast in Texas where the results were 88 percent for. New Mexico was 82 percent for. Rhode Island voters were unanimous with 100 percent in favor of the program continuing.

Alaska voting was close. There were two votes for the program and one against.

Wisconsin was the only state where a majority of voters were against the program; 49 percent for the program.

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



Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Many of you have heard of the Mama Lucy Gang that controlled the House of Representatives for most of the 1970s.

There is increasing evidence of another gang that is slowly creeping into positions of power and influence around our state. It differs greatly in form and substance from the Mama Lucys but in some ways its roots are more real.

First, let's remember the Mama Lucys for a minute. The Gang was truly a phenomenon. There was a spirit of excitement that bound its members.

At the suggestion of Dick Carbajal of Belen, the group became known as the Mama Lucy Gang, named for Mrs. Lucy Lopez, a Las Vegas restaurant owner who played host to scores of politicians and would-be politicians in her Plaza restaurant and lounge.

Included among the would-be politicians was always a group of Highlands University students. These were young men, such as Carbajal, who lived on the nearby campus but chose, for economic or culinary reasons, not to eat college cafeteria food.

Mama Lucy let these out-of-town students run a tab and pay as they could. Whether it was caring generosity or good business on her part, it was the former attitude that stuck in the minds of the liberal-Democrat Mama Lucys.

The college crowd that hung on the periphery of wheelings and dealings at Mama Lucy's was always aching to get in and be a part of the action.

Las Vegas Rep. Sam Vigil, who has been in the House ever since the 1971 takeover by the Mama Lucys, was not a part of that college luncheon crowd because he lived and dined at home.

Vigil says the unwillingness to "wait for their turn" on the part of these college students began with the World War II vets and continued with vets of Korean conflict. These men had the attitude that they had already served their country for a greater cause and "no one is going to stand in my way now."

This same eagerness to take over the reins of power characterized the mostly young Democrats who name "Mama Lucy Gang" was most fitting.

liberalism was being rocked by Mama Lucy in Las Vegas, another gang was being spawned on the campus of the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque.

This gang gathered around the family-size lunch table at a fraternity house on Mesa Vista Rd. Since the fraternity name will not mean much to most of you, let's call this the Mesa Vista Gang.

Included in the gang were US Sen. Pete Domenici, Lt. Gov. Jack Stahl, US Sen. candidate Corky Morris, new Albuquerque Public Schools Supt. Jack Bobroff and former New Mexico state legislators George Shaffer, Mel Evans and Doug Michelson.

Unlike the collegiate luncheon crowd at Mama Lucy's, these were all local boys, who didn't have time for the long drive at noon in the big Duke City.

And that is not the end of the dissimilarities. In fact, the group almost appears to be the Republican answer to the Mama Lucy Gang except that politics and political

philosophies were never a topic of lunchtime discussion. Neither was this group eager to grab the reins of power. They were much more willing to wait their turn in the proper Republican way.

This was not the rich boys frat lodge, however. That was a block up the street on Sigma Chi Rd. That group never got its act together well enough to be called a gang.

In fact, it produced leaders of the rival factions that have contended for control of the New Mexico House the last 10 years—Gene Samberson and Raymond Sanchez.

The speaker's post jockeyed back and forth between the two on three different occasions.

Although the two gangs bear little similarity, they do share one common bond. Whenever college males gather around a table, there will always be food in the middle.

Summer jobs for teenagers; help for senior citizens

A program which will create approximately 280 part-time summer jobs for teenagers and benefit an estimated 1,000 senior citizens in more than 40 New Mexico communities is being sponsored again this year by U S WEST and its subsidiary, Mountain Bell.

Through U S WEST HomeChores, a teenager typically is matched up with two or three senior citizens who need help with such tasks as painting, yard work, washing dishes, and other chores around the home.

"The program was such a hit last year that we've decided to expand it this year to include more jobs, more communities and more senior citizens who receive assistance," said Wesley Lindsay, Carriazo spokesman for U S WEST. He said HomeChores is funded through a \$65,000 grant from U S WEST and the Mountain Bell Foundation.

Administering the program again this year are the three New Mexico Area Agencies on Aging: the Southwestern NM Area Agency on Aging, the Eastern NM Area Agency on Aging and the North Central NM Economic Development District Area Agency on Aging.

Senior citizens who need assistance from the youth will be identified through the help of ACTION, a federal agency that provides aid to seniors, and the New Mexico State Agency on Aging. Referrals are made by a number of individuals and organizations such as visiting nurses pro-

grams, senior citizens centers and senior companion

a four-state area will offer items for sale. Many have never been in shows in this part of the state before.


Since the Festival is always held on Father's Day weekend, the sponsors will present a free badge to each father. These badges will be available in the building where the food will be served.

WOMEN AND INDIANS

My readings this week included an article by Rio Grande Sun editor Robert Trapp "Women, Indians Get to Vote Tuesday." (Not so 101 Years Ago).

Interesting excerpts from Trapp's column "Asi Fue El Norte":

"Women and Indians will be voting in Next Tuesday's (June 7, 1988) primary election in Rio Arriba county and you can buy booze after the polls close but it wasn't so in New Mexico in 1887."

"Tuesday, the bars will open for business as soon as the polls close, allowing winners to celebrate and losers commiserate."

"Women, of course, never entertained a notion in 1887 that they should be voting—that was man's work. Next Tuesday, however, you will find the names of some female candidates on the voting machine when you go in to vote—some of them even running for judicial posts. One can imagine the consternation in 1887 had a woman attempted to vote, and to announce for political office would have earned the wretched woman lifetime banishment to the kitchen where she should have stayed in the first place."

"It was in 1890 that Wyoming abolished the male monopoly on voting in that state by granting women the right to vote, but it wasn't until 1920 that the 19th amendment to the United States Constitution was adopted guaranteeing women the right to vote."

"Indians were treated in the same cavalier manner as women, but whereby it was simply understood that women wouldn't vote, there was a specific statute on the books in 1887 that denied Indians the right to vote."

"It wasn't until an Isleta Pueblo Indian became convinced that since he was a citizen of the United States he should be allowed to vote, that the ban on Indians voting was

challenged, and the courts decided they were citizens and indeed entitled to vote."

Trapp concluded his column with: "And for conducting an election in 1887, judges and clerks were paid the princely sum of \$2."



**DESCRIPTION OF
PROPOSED ACTION:**

The Defense Nuclear Agency plans to conduct a series of high-explosive tests in the area west of the Oscura Mountains on White Sands Missile Range (Socorro County), New Mexico. These tests are a part of an on-going program which began in 1976 and is scheduled to continue thru the year 2006. This Environmental Assessment (EA) references earlier tests, EAs and assesses anticipated effects of planned actions. The test area, referred to as the Permanent High Explosive Test Site (PHETS), is southwest of Trinity Site, the location of the first atomic detonation. Part of this test site is within the Trinity National Monument.

The proposed testing over the next 20 years consists of small and large high explosive events. A small event is defined as one of 20 tons or less TNT equivalent. An estimated average of one 20-ton and five 1,000-lb events per year is planned, although as many as four of the former and 10 of the later could occur in any year. Large scale events up to 16-KT are envisioned. One large event of this magnitude, 1-KT (500 tons) to 16-KT (6,000 tons) is planned every other year.

Any event projected to result in more than 5.5 kPa (0.8 psi) overpressures on the McDonald Ranch house will require a relocation of the detonation area or additional protection to the ranch house. Any significant requirements in these areas will be covered in an Addendum or Revision to this EA. By reference, the MISTY PICTURE test in 1987 generated 5.68 kPa over-pressure at the house.

ALTERNATES CONSIDERED: Alternate locations for high explosive testing were discussed thoroughly in earlier EAs and are still an alternate for some tests. Expenditures necessary to duplicate facilities now present in the PHETS make alternate sites less feasible.

The use of blast tubes and no actions are considered as alternates to high explosive tests. Blast tubes may be used where possible but a need for high explosive tests is still recognized. No testing has been determined to be an unacceptable alternate due to its failure to meet Defense needs of the United States and its allies.

ANTICIPATED ENVIRONMENTAL EFFECTS OF PROPOSED ACTIONS:

Environmental effects are discussed under construction (pre-test), test execution and cleanup phases. Major environmental considerations are surface disturbance and attendant destruction of resources, potential effects on wildlife and plant communities (including endangered species), shock waves and noise and possible effects on air and water quality. Detrimental effects on historic and archaeological resources will be avoided.

Large areas of virgin soil have been altered and will be altered by on-going operations. Most of the plant/soil disturbances should not suffer significant long-term detrimental effects. A magnesium chloride soil stabilizer has been used to reduce dust and soil losses and its continued use is planned.

Wildlife in the immediate area will be disturbed by on-going operations and test execution phenomenon could result in a wide spread impact, including possible effects on the endangered Peregrine falcon should they be nesting along the face of the Oscura Mountains, east of the PHETS. Effects on wildlife are dependent on size of the test, meteorological conditions and season of the year. Large tests in the early spring and summer prior to June 1 will be avoided unless there are reasonable certainty that no falcon are nesting in the potentially affected areas.

Significant noise and shock wave effects should be primarily confined within the boundaries of WSMR unless a test oc-

curs when meteorological conditions are not satisfactory. Test requirements include avoidance of unfavorable conditions and significant detrimental effects from the noise and shock wave should not occur.

Moderate dust will occur during construction and cleanup with significant amounts of dust, debris and explosive pollutants occurring at test execution. Detrimental effects should be localized or of short term duration. Harmful amounts of residues are not anticipated.

Little effects on surface or subsurface water are anticipated. Surface water resources are at some distance and subsurface water tables are quite deep and not likely to be impacted.

Archaeological resources have either been located and avoided or mitigated on surfaces affected. Similar procedures will be in effect during future operations. Effects on the Trinity National Monument, and par-

ticularly the McDonald Ranch, shall be minimized and if any project activities shall be found to significantly impact on these resources corrective methods shall be implemented.

CONCLUSIONS:

The high explosive testing proposed in the PHETS area of White Sands Missile Range is required for the satisfactory defense of the United States and its allies. The PHETS are well adapted to the proposed testing and no reduction in environmental effects could be expected from use of other areas. The area contains significant facilities developed for testing planned which would require expensive duplication if tests were moved.

Planned conduct of construction, test execution and clean-up should result in insignificant, or short term effects on the environment, including natural resources (soils, vegetation and wildlife). Monitoring for

possible effects on endangered species and historic/archaeological resources will be conducted and significant impacts avoided.

Conduct of planned high explosive testing as discussed in this Environmental Assessment should result in no significant environmental impacts and is not environmentally controversial. It is therefore determined that an Environmental Impact Statement is not required. Any individuals, agencies or groups not in agreement with this conclusion are invited to submit written comments for consideration to the Commander, White Sands Missile Range, NM, within 15 days of this notice.
