## Lincoln County Commissioners

### Mill levy approved to aid county economic development

Lincoln County property owners will pay an additional one-half mill on their property taxes for the 1988 property tax year. The money raised from the mill levy will go to the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County to be used for county-wide economic development.

The mill levy was approved by the Lincoln County Commissioners during the June 28 meeting. The villages of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Corona and Carrizozo, in addition to the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, passed resolutions in favor of the mill levy.

Buddy Bundick, president and chairman of the EDC/LC, presented resolutions to the county commissioners. He said that of all the entities contacted, only two trustees voted against the mill levy and that they were in favor of the mill levy but opposed the method used to get the assessment.

The levy will bring in approximately \$125,000 with the first distribution to EDC scheduled for Dec. 15. The first half of the property taxes are due Nov. 10 and will become delinquent on Dec. 10. The second half of the property taxes will be due April 10, 1989 and be delinquent May 10, 1989.

County Treasurer Shirley Goodloe said the money will be distributed to EDC on a monthly basis as it is collected, but not all assessed taxes will be collected during this time.

In other business, commissioners accepted the road review committee recommendation to vacate a portion of Cedar Creek road. Members of the road review committee were Bill Rawlins, E.J. Fourat and Bill Jarratt.

The portion of the road that is being vacated will be attached to adjoining lot 1 of Raven Ridge subdivision owned by Martha J. Harris. Cost of replat, survey and related costs will be applied to the fee charged for the property.

—Accepting the recom-

mendation of Goodloe, commissioners agreed to not waive the \$5 minimum penalty on delinquent taxes. The penalty has been in place for several years.

—Commissioners approved resolution 76-74 congratulating and thanking all who participated in the mock disaster drill that was held June 20. The resolution will be published and copies sent to all who participated.

—The county received a letter from the state department of finance administration giving interim approval on the proposed operating budget for 1988-89.

—The amended final budget was approved with two changes, the county received a refund of \$15,975.69 from IBM for the end of the preceding computer contract. This amount will be applied to the new computer system to lower the price.

The county also received \$15,001 from McCarty Construction for purchase of the Caterpillar. This money will be applied to the purchase of a new loader.

—The contract and notification of grant award

from the New Mexico Area Agency on Aging for funds for Zia Senior Citizens centers in Lincoln County was approved.

—County Manager Suzanne Cox reported that the IBM System 36 computer is being used by the county on a 90-day trial basis. After that time a new system will be installed that will cost less and be more efficient.

Goodloe stated that the new computer system had been a help in the treasurer's office.

—Commissioner Ralph Dunlap reported that the Water Defense Association is in critical need of \$31,000 to help with expenses of expert witnesses in the water suit. Hubert Quintana of WDA said, "some precedents have been set in a water case in Wyoming that might help the Lincoln County case."

After a discussion, commissioners agreed the county did not have any money to help with the case.

—An executive session was held for personnel and litigation. No action was taken after the 30-minute closed session.

## Four hurt in three accidents

Four people were injured in three separate accidents in the area this week.

Manuel Montano of Las Vegas, driver of a 1986 Ford pickup, was cited for failure to yield right of way in the accident at the intersection of Highways 380 and 54 in Carrizozo at noon June 28.

The pickup was traveling south on Highway 54 and was struck by a 1985 Ford Tempo driven by Charles Kenneth Litteral of Victorville, CA. A passenger in the small car, Mrs. Kitteral, was transported to Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso for treatment.

A single car accident June 24 north of Carrizozo at 9:20 p.m. occurred when the car left the pavement and rolled onto its top. Margaret E. Tripp, 47, of Deming, and her daughter Lillian Walsworth, 16, were transported to LCMC for treatment and released. No citations were issued. Investigating officer Larry Brinkley said speed was not a factor.

Two juveniles were cited for a two-vehicle accident in Corona at 1:20 p.m. June 24. One driver was cited for no driver's license, no insurance and improper backing and the other juvenile was cited for no driver's license, no insurance and careless driving. One of the youths was taken to LCMC for treatment and was released.

## Carrizozo Town Council

### Zoning change under study by trustees

Dale Goad attended the June 28 meeting of the Carrizozo town council to discuss the proposed zoning changes he had presented at the June 14 meeting. Trustees will look at sample ordinances with the additional A-2 zone at the July 12 meeting.

Goad's proposal would limit lot sizes in areas at the edge of town. Letters will be sent to property owners in zone A-1 for their input. Before the A-2 zone could be added to the ordinance public hearings must be held.

In other business, trustees agreed to allow a small trailer owned by Dumas Beaty to be parked at the rear of the property at 405 12th Street while Beaty proceeds with a variance request. Trustees granted the temporary status until Aug. 25.

Beaty is using the building, an old barber shop, for a warehouse and workshop. He plans to build a six-foot solid fence around the property that would screen the trailer from view.

The variance request to have the trailer permanently on the property will be advertised for public input in addition to all property owners within a specified area being notified.

Mayor Bob Hemphill presented the report prepared by engineers Wilson and Co. for recommendations on replacement of the recreation center roof. The roof is in five sections of varying heights with approximately 16,500 square feet total needing to be repaired or replaced.

The original roof was built in 1967 and at this time leaks, causing damage to the interior of the building. Wilson and Co. recommend that the entire roof and cooling system be replaced.

Jack Garrett requested the town vacate streets on the west side of Highway 380. He was advised to make a written request and get signatures of adjoining property owners. The town will proceed with the request at that time.

## Smokey Bear Stampede in Capitan this weekend

The 29th annual Smokey Bear Stampede will be held this weekend in Capitan.

There are four rodeos, two dances, a parade, crowning of the queen, horseshoe tournament, ice cream social and several other events planned.

Saturday events begin with the Smokey Bear Run at 8 a.m. The run begins north of Capitan and ends at the bank. Registration for this is in front of the bank at 6:30 a.m.

A horseshoe tournament is also scheduled for 8 a.m. at the fairgrounds. This event is sponsored by the Capitan Volunteer Fire Department.

There will be games for children between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. This is on west 1st Street on the lot east of the Margaret

Rench home.

Between 1 and 5 p.m. there will be an ice cream social at the senior center on the west end of Capitan, off the Ruidoso Highway.

The queen of Lincoln County will be crowned at 6:45 p.m. just before the evening rodeo at 7 p.m. The popular Hatch Brothers will play for the dance at 9 p.m.

The Sunday rodeo is scheduled for 2 p.m.

July 4 events begin with the parade at 10:30 a.m. Those participating in the parade should report to the west end of town in front of the elementary school by 9:30 a.m. The parade is sponsored by the Capitan Chamber of Commerce.

The barbecue, sponsored by the Lincoln County Fair Association, is set for 11:30

a.m. at the fairgrounds.

Ralph Dunlap, president of the Lincoln County Fair Board, said parade trophies will be presented to winners at 1 p.m. in the rodeo arena. Dunlap said that the afternoon rodeo would immediately follow.

The evening rodeo is scheduled for 7 p.m. with a dance in the fair building at 9 p.m. The Hatch Brothers will also play for this dance. There will be no dance on Sunday night.

There will be an arts and crafts exhibit all day Saturday, Sunday and Monday at the Cattle Country Art Complex. The Capitan Chamber of Commerce will also be open. This is located on 1st Street, next to the bank building.

## Mountain Bell becomes US West Communications as of July 1

Mountain Bell will begin doing business as "U S WEST Communications" July 1. At that time, telephone bills, building signs, public phone booths and company vehicles will begin bearing the new name.

In addition, U S WEST Communications employees will begin answering phones with the common name, along with a reminder that customers have reached the phone company.

"These are the primary changes customers will see," said Tom Garcia, assistant vice-president. "They will still call the same numbers for service and deal with the same people who have always delivered that service."

Garcia said consumers will get further reinforcement of the identity change through advertising. The television commercials feature employees with a message that U S WEST's three telephone companies have combined their strengths to serve customers more effectively, while the newspaper advertisements emphasize tradition.

The new name also will be

used by Northwestern Bell and Pacific Northwest Bell. Together, the three companies serve 14 states.

Garcia said the familiar Bell symbol will be retained and appear with the U S WEST Communications name. Also, the word "Bell" and the Bell symbol will continue to be used in the names of some products and services offered by U S WEST Communications.

"The value, effectiveness and quality associated with Bell are still here, and we'll take advantage of that," he said.

In addition to the three telephone companies, U S WEST owns units involved in directory publishing, real estate, cellular mobile communications and paging, computer software, financial services and business communications products and services.

Garcia said the change to U S WEST Communications is part of a restructuring of the three telephone companies around specific customer groups, rather than the traditional structure associated with geography.

## Mathematics teacher retires after 33 years on the job

Retiree Wayne Mason, who taught three years of high school mathematics in Carrizozo, graduated from Hondo High School in 1949. Mason grew up in the Hondo Valley and now lives in Capitan in property he purchased several years ago while still teaching in Deming, NM.

Mason retired this year and was recognized at this month's school board meeting for teaching 33 years, the last three in Carrizozo.

For the first 30 years of his teaching career, Mason taught at Deming starting as a junior high math teacher in 1955. He went on to teach high school math.

Mason received his bachelor's degree from Western University at Silver City in 1953. Following a stint in the army as a radar operator Mason married Mollie, a native of Maljamar, NM. Summer school and continuing education was obtained at Oklahoma State University, Colorado State University and Northern Arizona University at Flagstaff. He received his masters degree at New Mexico School of Mining and Technology in Socorro in 1973.

During his teaching years at Deming Mason served as that district's activity bus driver and also was in charge of the drivers education program.

The Masons have a married daughter living in Socorro and a married son in Texas, and have four grandchildren.

Wayne and Mollie make their home at a renovated former Capitan Baptist church building located at White Oaks Ave. and 3rd Street. The structure is over 100 years old and Mason says that the baptistry is still part of the house. (A baptistry is a tank in which new members are submerged during the baptismal rite.)

Mason has learned that the building also served as a school in years past. His retirement plans include researching the history of place of residency.



OPINION

I don't have any plans to forget the Fourth of July celebrations of my childhood. We began looking forward to July 4 as soon as school "let out" for the summer. Of course, the July 4 events were different then, as what wasn't? This was a day when children dreamed of growing up to become policemen, soldiers, teachers, railroad engineers and even mayors. Youth's greatest respect was reserved for those engaged in keeping the peace, manning the engines of industry, and those who were personally honored by being elected to public office.

In the early 1920s any town that could attract a state or national legislator to deliver the July 4 address was honored, and such appearance insured a large crowd. There was always the parade, and an important part of it was the group of uniformed veterans of World War I and Spanish-American War. They marched smartly, receiving the cheers of crowds that lined the street. The volunteer band played (loudly but not always in tune) the national anthem and "Stars and Stripes, Forever" and nobody felt embarrassed. Eyes went misty and hats came off as Old Glory went by. The best local orators were recruited to read the Declaration of Independence; every kid was proud to be an American; any slur on the national honor and it was avenged in a bloody fistfight.

The picnic was an essential part of any Fourth of July celebration. Long tables were laden with potato salad, watermelons, cakes, pies, fried chicken, and pink lemonade. There were games and races for children and adults, seemingly designed to insure that just about everybody could be a winner at something. It was a time when people spoke of Thomas Jefferson more as a living person.

Fireworks topped off the day's festivities. Kids, most of them, had been instructed in the proper use of fireworks. Sure, a few lost fingers by holding on too long to those giant firecrackers, but they bore their injury with humor, even with some pride, since the "wound" was incurred in the exuberance of the Fourth of July.

It was pretty late when we at last got home and tumbled into bed, exhausted but happy, over what we considered a proper celebration of the nation's birthday. Asleep, we were more likely to dream about becoming military heroes in the defense of our country than about acquiring a new catcher's mitt, a cellar full of stick candy, or a little encouragement from the girl down the block.

We didn't know that human nature, being what it is, was setting loose the greed and selfishness that might some day undermine the country whose birthdays we observed with so much dedication. We were unaware that writers and statesmen like Thomas Babington Macaulay had written in early 18th Century England that: "I have long been convinced that institutions purely democratic must, sooner or later, destroy liberty or civilization, or both." We wouldn't have believed him anyway. But we went right on converting, unknowingly for the most part, our republic into a democracy. A century after Macaulay, British Prime Minister Disraeli predicted what has happened to England, and that it would later happen to America. He told Parliament: "If you establish a democracy (government by the rabble), you must in due time reap the fruits of a democracy." Over here, Americans forgot that the Founding Fathers did their best to form a Republic, with enough safeguards to keep it from degenerating into a Democracy. We have never been able to differentiate between a Democracy and a Republic run democratically!

In 1977 the Washington Post published a sobering article by Peter Jay, economic editor of the London Times. It dealt with the tragic consequences of government's intervention to neutralize the evil effects of a previous government intervention. Mr. Jay concluded: "So we reach the depressing conclusion that the operation of free democracy appears to force government into positions (the commitment to full employment) that prevent them from taking steps (fiscal and monetary restraint) that are necessary to arrest the menace (accelerating inflation) that threatens to undermine the condition (stable prosperity) on which political stability and therefore liberal democracy depend. In other words, democracy has itself by the tail and is eating itself up fast!"

Mr. Jay was agreeing with Howard E. Kershner, professor of economics at Northwood Institute, who formulated what he calls Kershner's First Law: "When a self-governing people empower their government to take wealth from some and give it to others, the process will not stop until the last bone of the last taxpayer is picked bare." The whiteness of the bones is already beginning to appear. Transfer payments, a polite and disarming governmental term used to describe that money which is taken by force from some of our citizens and given to other citizens, were running at \$200 billion in 1976 and are now at \$600 billion per year. At this rate, the taxpayers' bones will indeed be bare, and the prophecy of democracy will at last have been fulfilled.

Ben Franklin knew all about this. When asked what the struggling Continental Congress had produced, Old Ben replied: "A Republic, sir, if you can keep it." We didn't keep it. We turned toward a democracy which the founding fathers both feared and hated.

John Winthrop, first governor of Massachusetts Bay Colony, said of democracy that it is "accounted the meanest and worst of all forms of government." During the American Revolution the word "democracy" was not in use. It does not appear in the Declaration of Independence. It does not appear in the Constitution of the United States. It does not appear in any of the first state constitutions. Thomas Jefferson feared it. Alexander Hamilton called it "our real disease." We didn't listen. We discovered we could vote things for ourselves out of the public treasury, and thus "transfer payments" were born.

SANTA FE—Are state lotteries a good deal?

Apparently not, judging from the numbers generated by the 28 state lotteries now in existence.

About the only positive indication is that more and more states are adopting lotteries every year. Five states did so in 1987.

Is it because lotteries are a good deal for these states? Is it because lotteries are so popular with the public? Is it because many states are desperate financially?

It appears to be more popularity and desperation than a good deal. Consider these statistics.

Lotteries represent a small source of revenue for state governments, even when aggressively marketed. In most states lotteries contribute about one percent to total state revenue.

That would add about \$15 million to New Mexico's \$1.5 billion budget. That figure also looks reasonable when approached from another angle. Residents of Vermont wagered about \$23 for every man, woman and child in the state in 1986. Massachusetts citizens spent \$240 on a per capita basis which would add around \$150 million to our state budget.

But New Mexicans have a much lower per capita personal income than do Massachusetts residents. We are much closer to being a state such as Vermont.

Besides, it would be tragic if every family of four in our state were to spend \$1,000 a year on the lottery.

Lotteries are an unstable source of revenue. As the director of California's lottery says, "Being a lottery director is a lot like being a movie producer. You spend a lot of time trying to guess the public's tastes."

Lotteries have to be aggressively marketed. When they aren't states have experienced big revenue declines after their newness wears off.

Lottery bureaucracies are forced to develop marketing strategies which may deceive the public about the true nature and objective of the system. Lotteries start being pushed as a way to get rich, rather than as an entertainment form which produces revenue for the state.

Pretty soon the lottery folks are making claims about the use of lottery funds to support worthy cause that have no resemblance to reality.

New Mexico lottery proposals have earmarked proceeds for every worthy cause with a big enough constituency to worry about. For about \$3 million, one lottery bill this past year hoped to gain the support of 25,000 school people with an outlay which would have raised their salaries less than one-half percent.

Perhaps you have done some arithmetic and are saying my figures compute to about two and one-half times the revenue I claim. One other disadvantage of the lottery is that the profit margin is less than 40 percent.

About half the receipts go to prizes. Another 11 percent or so goes to administration—dramatically greater than administering the normal array of state taxes.

And return of half the players' money is not good odds either. The ponies return over 80 percent of your money. The open gambling capitals of our country offer up to 96 percent return on some games of chance.

Surveys, thus far, indicate that lotteries are a regressive form of raising money. The poor spend a disproportionately high percent of their income on this wagering.

The dream of becoming a millionaire is to overwhelming for many poor to resist. There is nothing wrong with dreams.

They are about all some people have. But when the chance of realizing those dreams is next to nothing, it becomes a cruel hoax.

The effect of lotteries

upon illegal gambling activities is still unclear. It appears some forms of illegal gambling are decreased while others are increased.

And, finally, what about the moral dilemma of whether the state should use gambling to raise revenues when it prohibits gambling in general?

That is a conundrum which no statistics will ever answer. It will always be a topic of spirited and sometimes bitter debate.

The possibilities of lottery legislation being signed by our present governor range from slim to remote. Garrey Carruthers has strong feelings about the moral question and he isn't very likely to ever change those feelings.

It doesn't appear, however, that Carruthers' reluctance to sign lottery legislation is going to impact negatively on our state, because from all indications, state lotteries are not a very good deal.

Today \$600 billion a year are (in a democratic manner) being forcibly taken from one group of citizens and given to another. The cry is for even more democracy, democracy, democracy, as if this country were never a republic, and as if democracy as a form of government represents man's finest political achievement instead of one of its worst.

I love my country, but I can do it without loving some of its institutions. My heart can beat for America without also fluttering for the Environmental Protection Agency or the Internal Revenue Service. I feel compelled to place my hand over my heart when the flag goes by, but the thought of showing similar respect for the EPA or the IRS gives me an easily located pain. I believe that all men are created equal to the extent that they are born naked, all the while aware that the greatest inequality of all is in "ordering" unequal persons to be equal.

The Fourth of July should always be observed. Even if this country should cease to exist, July 4 should be observed worldwide as the birthday of mankind's most exalted experiment in human freedom and personal liberty. She's my country, right or wrong. And I'll never apologize for her, as if one mistake or a thousand should condemn civilization's mightiest force for individual freedom and dignity. But I can still complain that democracy is replacing republicanism, and that we stand to lose so much in the process. And I can still be thrilled by the Fourth of July.

Bob Orben is right. The Spirit of '76 is embodied in one drummer, a flag-bearer, and a fife-player. They had only one hit record—but it's still selling.

**CLEAR HEADS**

According to AAA World writer Francis C. Kenel in March of this year, when Wyoming passed its law, alcohol at age 21 officially became the law of the land in all 50 states.

The AAA magazine is devoted to travel and automotive concerns and is the official publication of AAA New Mexico, a division of the American Automobile Association.

Kenel, AAA's staff director of Traffic Safety, writes that several studies bear out AAA's longstanding belief that raising the drinking age significantly reduces alcohol-related traffic deaths. According to Sen. Frank R. Lautenberg (D-NJ), who sponsored the legislation that spurred states to raise their drinking age (they'd lose federal highway funds if they didn't), the age 21 laws will save 1,000 lives a year.

"In the broadest context, society must send a consistent message: driving under the influence of alcohol or any drug is unacceptable. For example, parents, the ultimate role model, must communicate, by their example, that only clear heads belong behind the wheel," says Kenel, who warns that young people must be educated about the effects of alcohol.

AAA has led the way with several alcohol awareness programs for schools: "Starting Early," specifically designed for kindergarten through grade 6; "Al-Co-Hol," for junior high school students; and "Alcohol

Countermeasures" for senior high driver education classes.

**HIGH-SPEED CHASE**

Rio Arriba County Magistrate Baltazar Archuleta, charged with DWI and six-misdemeanor-traffic counts, went to trial June 29 in Espanola Magistrate Court. The case was to be heard by Santa Fe County Magistrate Judge Isaac Romero.

According to the Rio Grande Sun, June 23, Archuleta waived arraignment on the charges and entered a not guilty plea in April. The charges, including reckless driving, speeding and DWI, stem from Feb. 22 incident outside Chama, where Archuleta was arrested by state police officer Dominic Pargas, who said the judge led him on a high-speed chase into Chama.

**ENFORCEMENT OR INSULT?**

Pargas, age 22, is caught in a debate over whether he is strictly doing his job or going above the law; cutting down drunk drivers in the Chama Valley or abusing the citizenry.

One of Pargas's most vocal critics is Archuleta, who claims Pargas, with help from state police officer Ted Branch, physically abused him when Archuleta was arrested on charges of drunken driving. The officers say force was necessary on the 56-year-old man because he resisted arrest, but they deny abusing him. They point out that after his arrest Archuleta registered .218 on a blood/alcohol concentration test, more than twice the legal limit.

In Tierra Amarilla, 12 miles south of Chama, a petition is circulating asking for the transfer or firing of Pargas and Branch, who have been stationed in the area since February 1987. Pargas and Branch shrug off the petition, saying their enforcement of speeding and drunk driving laws has put motorists on alert.

**TWENTY-ONE DWI ARRESTS**

State Police Chief Neil Curran said he wasn't going to transfer anybody because of a petition, "just because a few people resent the fact he's enforcing the law."

He is quoted as saying there is a lack of community support and the state police has assumed a heavier than normal workload because of staff reductions in the county sheriff's department.

Pargas said he made 21 drunk driving arrests in the past months. He believes most of the complaints are coming from people that are older

than he, and he feels they resent him having the authority as a New Mexico State Police officer; being the age that he is.

**TIMES CHANGE**

According to an Associated Press clipping for decades, Houston was largely owned and run by a circle of wealthy Houstonians, "an all-white, virtually all-male oligarchy" that was locally based. At one time, the owners of the biggest banks, newspapers and other key businesses met irregularly in a downtown hotel room (Suite 9-F of the old Lamar Hotel) to make major decisions for the city.

Times have changed, climaxed by this year's sale of the Houston Chronicle and the two biggest banks, Texas Commerce and First City National. The Lamar Hotel was torn down two years ago.

The Lamar club was started in the 1930s by Houston builder Jesse Jones, who owned the Chronicle and built Texas Commerce Bank. Also included in the group were owners of the Houston Post.

These and others in the group, who owned or controlled construction companies, oilfield tool plants, insurance companies or cotton brokerages "had real power," said Bill Roberts, a former newspaper columnist and Houston historian.
