

Capitan renews contract of school superintendent

The Capitan Board of Education extended the contract of Supt. Scott Childress through the 1990-91 school year.

Board members James McDaniel, Preston Stone. Kenneth Cox, Tom Trost and Hollis Fuchs decided to set the superintendent's salary at a later date.

Other action at the Jan. 12 meeting included a final payment of \$2,388 to Ballard & Sons concerning the new football field and track. A also approved.

County road priorities final payment of \$886 to set for co-op agreements

The Lincoln County Commissioners met in special session Jan. 11 to designate road priorities for the state highway agreements.

The state highway department will pay up to 100 percent of the costs for approved school bus routes. The commissioners listed Magado Creek Subdivision in the Capitan School district as priority number one and County Road A-010, the Alamo Canyon Route in the Hondo School district as priority number two.

The county arterial program (CAP) priorities are (1) Schlarb Road in the Carrizozo School district and (2) County Road B-022 west of Baca Canyon northwest of Hondo. The state provides 75 percent funding for CAP projects and the county pays 25

Cooperative agreements with the state are funded 60 percent by the state and 40 percent by the county. Priorities are (1) County Road B-018 approximately two miles west of Hondo and (2) County Road C-047 in the Carrizozo area which is the

Upgrading of fairgrounds underway

Ralph Dunlap, president of the Lincoln County Fair Board, called a special meeting for Jan. 9 to consider a contract for purchasing bleachers.

The fair board approved a bid of \$13,498 by Sturdisteel of Waco, TX.

The \$7,500 recreation grant will be supplemented by local borrowed funds.

This initial purchase calls for one 24-foot section of galvanized steel which will seat 240 people. This includes an access ramp for the handicapped. Members of the fair board also approved the application for \$270,000 in state funds for fairground improvements.

The next meeting of the Lincoln County Fair Board is Feb. 8. The meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. at the fair building in Capitan. This is an open meeting and the public is invited.

Lincoln County Treasurer Shirley Goodloe announced that 69 percent of the 1988 tax schedule had been collected by Dec. 31,

Goodloe said all mail received is opened, receipted and deposited within 24-hours after being received. She gives credit to her staff for getting the money in the bank quickly, which allows the county to receive more money in interest.

A total of \$7,420,714.97 is the amount charged for 1988 and \$5,112,024.75 of this amount has been collected. Taxpayers have the choice of paying their taxes in full before the delinquent date Dec. 11 or paying half their taxes by Dec. 10 with the, other half being due April 10, 1989. Taxes must be for more than \$10 to take advantage of paying half.

The 69 percent collected is normal for the treasurer's office. Past year collections on Dec. 31 were 69 percent in 1987, 70 percent in 1986, 70 percent in 1985, 64 percent in 1984 and 69 percent in 1983.

Property taxes in Lincoln County have increased \$1,089,305 in 1970 and \$1,819,783 in 1975 to \$3,068,767 in 1980 and \$6,451,566 in 1985.

Residential rates inside municipalities range from 12.79 in Corona, 20.65 in Carrizozo, 26.75 in Ruidoso Downs and 31.67 in Capitan to the high of 32.05 in Ruidoso.

Tax rates are calculated by the state department of finance and administration to collect the budgeted funds needed for each entity which is a taxing authority in the county. The tax rate is commonly called a mill rate and is equal to the dollars of tax for every \$1.000 of net taxable value on property.

Taxing authorities in the county include municipalities, schools and special assessment districts such as sanitation and soil and water conservation districts. The county commissioners and state are also taxing authorities.

Money collected for the state from livestock levies goes to pay cattle indemnity, dairy indemnity and sheep sanitary.

School money collected is distributed for operational, debt service and Senate Bill 9 for capital improvements. Corona School is the only school in the county not having a debt service to pay.

Municipality distribution of collected taxes is used by each entity for operational or general fund, and debt service. Ruidoso has an additional three mill levy for capital improvements for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Alpine Village and Sun Valley have sanitation districts that are also taxed. water systems and solid and liquid waste removal.

Treasurer reports 69%

The soil and water conservation districts in Lincoln County are Carrizozo, Upper Hondo and Chaves. Only the portions of these districts that are in Lincoln County are collected by Lincoln County.

The money assessed for the hospital goes for capital improvements such as construction of the addition to the Lincoln County Medical Center. The money is also used for the Carrizozo

Health Center. Other taxes include predatory animal control money coming from livestock only; the county road levy of 10 cents per front footage in county subdivisions with this money to be used for roads in the subdivisions; the county general fund or operational

budget; and the one-half mill

levy for the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County.

Of the \$7.4 million taxes due, the 1988 tax schedule provides for distribution of \$2,243,494 to the village of Ruidoso, \$1,473,417 to the county general fund, \$323,037 for state debt service, \$165,301 for Ruidoso Downs, \$111,269 for Capitan, \$24,340 for Carrizozo and \$8,559 for Corona.

The road tax of 10 cents per front footage brings in \$111,403 and \$710,946 is collected for LCMC and the Carrizozo Health Center.

In addition, the treasurer's office began collecting the one percent reappraisal fee from all taxing authorities in 1988. This money is used for expenses incurred by the assessor's office in reappraising all property as required by state law.

Homicide suspect died of exposure

James McSwane announced an arroyo near Encinosa. that the investigation of a Dec. 28. possible homicide has been concluded with the autopsy report that the man died from exposure.

McSwane began his term of office facing the possible homicide investigation because of suspicious circumstances surrounding the location of the body of Tony Dudley of Houston, TX.

Dudley had been reported missing Dec. 10 and his family offered a \$20,000 reward for anyone who found him. A search was called on the north side of the Capitan mountains after Dudley's

Lincoln County Sheriff pickup was found wrecked in

Dudley's body was discovered by his brother, Don Dudley of El Paso, during a search from an aircraft on Dec. 30. Charles Bella of El Paso piloted the aircraft.

Small amounts of a substance suspected to be marijuana were found in Dudley's pickup, but test results are not completed at this time.

The pickup has been turned over to US Customs and the sheriff's office will continue the investigation involving it, in conjunction with customs.

30 persons jailed on outstanding warrants

The Lincoln County Jail housed 30 prisoners last week after Sheriff James McSwane acted on outstanding misdemeanor and felony warrants.

This has been reduced to 23 as seven people have bonded out.

McSwane said his department also served two writs of execution last week.

Three people from Capitan were arrested and charged with receiving stolen property in connection with stolen Blue Gramma Grass seed. Richard "Yogi" Culhane was an sted Jan. 17 and is held on \$5,000 bond, no 10 percent allowed. Sharon Hobbs and Steven Woods were arrested Jan. 13 and released on their own recognizance.

Christine Breninger of Mescalero was arrested Jan. 12 and charged with fraudulentrefusal to return a leased vehicle or other personal property. The Avis rental car valued at \$12,000 was to have been returned Nov. 25. 1988. Breninger was released Jan. 17 on \$2,500 bond.

The sheriff's department assisted the Carrizozo Police Department in an investigation of vandalism at the Carrizozo Golf Course.

Lease renewal for Wortley Hotel

Glen Dennis and Ralph Dunlap, representing the Lincoln Pageant and Festival Committee, were in Santa Fe Jan. 11-12 negotiating for renewal of the lease on the Wortley Hotel and Dining Room.

The lease will not be completed until capital improvement funds are provided by the state legislature.

STEAM ERA

A miniature version of Carrizozo, Alamogordo and Vaughn as they looked in earlier times is featured in a mini-railroad museum known as Toy Train Depot. Located in Alamogordo, the building housing the exhibit is the former Torrance depot. Torrance is north of Corona, where the New Mexico Central Railroad used to start on its journey to Lamy.

The 1/87th scale models in the Alamogordo museum recreate miniature versions of towns as they looked in the steam era. The Toy Train Depot is operated by a nonprofit organization.

20 YEARS AGO

Seems like only yesterday.

The Jan. 16, 1969 issue of Lincoln County News reported that the former Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo had undergone some changes and all the improvements and moderization paid off well when a flu epidemic struck the community.

During one month, December 1968, 110 people made use of the hospital. Alton Whittaker, hospital administrator, said that about 50 percent of cases admitted had the flu.

The hub of the county hospital was the medical department under the direction of Dr. A.N. Spencer. A courtesy staff of three medical doctors were permitted to use the hospital facilities.

Two operating rooms were at their disposal.

Including Whittaker, 19 people made up the hospital staff: Clarence H. Millegan, lab and x-ray technician; Marjorie R. Whittaker, director of nursing; Carolyn R. Harman, Mary H. Flores, and Sibyl E. Hubert, all

The nurse's aides were Rosa R. Chavez, Doris L. Davenport, June Straley, Natalia M. Vega, Irene Brazil, Ruby Jackson and Mary Ann Schlarb.

Then there were Lucinda Silva, Josie Rodgers, Josefita Lopez, cooks; Dominga Monrreal, dishwasher; Nacha Verdugo and Alfred Hogg, custodians: Virginia Curtiss was the bookkeeper. Mary Ann Schlarb helped in the office in addition to being a nurse's aide. Ella Sidwell was the hospital's dietician.

DAYS GONE BY

January of 1969 was also the time that Carrizozo Mayor Johnson Stearns presented the key to the town to Maria Lucia Dessen of Belo, Horizonte, Brazil. As a participant in an educational program she spent a week in Carrizozo and was a house guest at the Paul Ortiz home.

In January, Gov. David Cargo and family visited Jackie Silvers at her "House of Old Things" in Ancho.

The Lincoln County Development Ass'n met at Tinnie and voted to sponsor

plans for the county's centennial year. (Lincoln County was designated a county on Dec. 11, 1869.)

It was in early 1969 that directors of Lincoln County Memorial Hospital voted unanimously to employ the services of an architect and proceed with plans for construction of a nursing home in Carrizozo. Board members were Mrs. A.N. Spencer. Johnson Stearns, William Edgar, A. P. Sitton and Dimmit Bond.

And editor and publisher Paul Payton had this to say in his column in 1969: "One columnist we read this week said that the Kennedy-Johnson brand of 'cure all ills with a big dose of money has not cured anything and American people are ready for a more work-and-eat type of solution."

BACK TO 1989

Carrizozo was the site in past years of a passenger train stop, a county fair, a hospital and a home for the elderly. Where are they now?

The hospital, nursing home and the fairgrounds are now in other parts of Lincoln County.

OPINION

- Industries Inc. of Carrizoza complaining that we snubbed them on their 15th anniversary in the community, and by inference suggested the town itself may have done so. It is true that Mrs. Carolyn Cantrell of Belco called the News and asked that a photographer attend one of its events and take a photograph of about 40 assembled people. It was explained to her that the newspaper did not have photographic equipment to take a good picture of so many people. We assumed she would make other arrangements for the photo, and that we would be given the opportunity to publish it in the News. We heard no more of the matter.
- This is not to denigrate the importance of Belco to this community. It has been, and remains, an important factor in the town's economy. It is the town's biggest employer aside from government. If Belco was making some kind of observance of its 15th year in Carrizozo, and we had been informed, we would have given the occasion publicity. Maybe we should have followed the call up and pushed for details. But this is a one-reporter newspaper, and she has plenty to do.
- While Belco has been in business in this community for 15 years, the Lincoln County News is entering its 84th year as the official newspaper of Lincoln County. At no point was there any anniversary celebration. In fact, no one to this date has even congratulated us for "hanging in" here on a 15th, a 25th, a 50th or a 75th anniversary. We do not feel snubbed.
- The community has never assisted this newspaper when it was in financial difficulty. We just worked things out on our own. But Carrizozo has done some favors for Belco. Last year it played a vital role in obtaining a \$200,000 loan from Community Development Block Grant Funding for Belco, which it would not have gotten otherwise. On another occasion, Belco borrowed money from the Carrizozo Industrial Development Corp., a private, non-profit group of Carrizozo business people who put up their own money to assist a worthy, needed industry for the town. There have been other benefits and favors from which Belco has profited, such as leasing town property at very low cost. All this hardly jibes with the charge that this newspaper, and its trustees and citizens, are out to snub Belco.
- A Instead of the letter, we feel it would have been more appropriate had Belco gone ahead and hired a professional photographer to take the picture of its activities, then used it in an advertisement in the News to note its 15th anniversary, but primarily to thank the town trustees and its businessmen for their a moral and financial support during those years. Belco is not a non-profit organization, and neither is the Lincoln County News. We still congratulate Belco on its 15th anniversary, and wish it every success.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—As the 1989 session of the New Mexico Legislature draws near, rumblings can be heard in the hallways of the Capitol.

There are rumblings that our lawmakers are becoming buckpassers. The California Legislature learned about buckpassing several years ago. Despite their big salaries and year-round sessions, California legislators have found that they can dodge the controversial issues by referring them directly to the voters.

In the 1988 general election, the Golden State had propositions on its ballot that were three-digit numbers. It was Proposition 108 that lowered automobile insurance rates. California is becoming a government by propositions.

New Mexico lawmakers appear to be smitten by the idea. There is a proposal making the rounds to give school districts some local taxing authority by allowing voters to decide on an additional property tax levy. There has been talk of referring the controversial

obscenity bill to a public vote since its purpose is to determine community standards.

For years there have been suggestions that the touchy issue of right-to-work be sent to the public for a decision.

New Mexico has no provision for public referenda other than by putting a proposal in the form of a constitutional amendment. Maybe that cuts down on some of the buckpassing but it clutters our state constitution with garbage that has no business being in a constitution.

Lawmakers are elected to represent us in Santa Fe. They should carry out that responsibility.

Lawmakers dodging the tough decisions may not be our higgest problem however. In the last two general elections we have seen constitutional amendments pass by means of deceptive wording on the ballot.

If lawmakers increase the number of constitutional amendments they propose and combine that with wording that causes us to vote the way they desire, it will be the ultimate in buckpassing. There are other rumblings about needing a citizens' lobby for the little guy. Special interests are always taken care of by high-priced lobbyists but the little guy

When lawmakers first went after a solution to sky-rocketing workers' compensation rates, they began with the littlest guy in the equation—the worker. Benefits were cut. But rates kept going up.

Next, lawmakers decided trial lawyers were the culprits. They put limits on legal fees and set up an administrative procedure for adjudicating cases. And rates kept going up.

There are two more factors in workers' compensation rates and they comprise about three-quarters of the total cost. We're talking about medical costs and the insurance company take. Insurance companies have some of the top lobbyists in Santa Fe so you can expect their costs to be scrutinized last.

The subject of the increases may become unexpectedly exciting during the next 60 days. Gov. Garrey Carruthers says he is not going to propose any new taxes. The legislature's interim committee on taxation was not charged with recommending any increases—and is son't.

That does not mean there will not be any tax proposals however. Several individual lawmakers have put tax hikes into the mill. The most interesting of them is enathat may come from the Senate Democrat leadership. Reportedly President Pro Tempore Manny Aragos is working on a plan that will eliminate all property taxes completely. The elack would be taken up by another penny of sales tax.

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
