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Attorneys submit bids for county services

Eight law firms and/or attorneys submitted bids to provide legal services for Lincoln County. The bids were opened at the county commission meeting Feb. 27.

According to the job description, the attorney is to provide legal advice at county commission meetings and other county meetings—planning and zoning, extraterritorial zoning commission, extraterritorial authority, ambulance service, senior citizens center, Lincoln Historic Preservation Board, Lincoln County Health Center, and to advise various county officials and members of their departments on legal issues.

Additionally, the attorney shall provide representation to county in any civil proceedings in which the county is a party and no other legal representation is provided to county through any insurance carrier, Risk Management, or other similar entity.

The proposals were to include all rates to be charged, information about the firm and support staff resources, a description of the firm's familiarity with Lincoln County government, and a sample contract.

Bids were received from Bert Atkins, district attorney for the 12th Judicial District, Sanders and Fandey of Las Cruces, O'Reilly and Wardlaw, Ruidoso, Harry G. Wilcox Jr., Nogal, Michael Wile, Albuquerque, Hawthorne and Hawthorne, Ruidoso, Parsons and Bryant, Ruidoso, and present county attorney Gary Mitchell of Ruidoso.

Atkins proposed the district attorney's office provide

an "in-house" representation that would entail the services needed, however needed, in the amount of 10 hours weekly for a yearly total of 480 hours.

The fees for DA representation would be "in kind" rather than monetary remuneration directly to the DA's office. Atkins proposed that one full-time support staff's position be taken over by the county and that full benefits for this employee be at the level that state employees enjoy. Supervision and control of the employee would be by and through the DA's office. Assumption of a support staff's salary would have to comply with the DA's and state employee's pay plans.

In kind remuneration would include taking over payments of lease agreements and billings for the telephone service currently being used in the Lincoln County office, and purchasing or leasing a new copy machine. All such financing would be through a joint powers agreement on each item.

Atkins would negotiate with the county the exact terms of the agreement with further agreement as to when and how the DA's office would ask the commissioners to hire outside counsel to litigate such matters as water rights suits and other lengthy litigation that the proposal does not contemplate. A sample contract was not included with the bid.

Sanders & Fandey of Las Cruces said a fair fee would be \$65 per hour and they are willing to charge a retainer of \$2,000 per month. Additionally, a fee of \$65 per hour would be charged for preparing complicated ordinances, resolutions or contracts and

for representation in pending or impending lawsuit or administrative proceeding including tax or assessment proceedings.

Mileage and per diem would be charged as authorized by state law for a non-salaried public officer. Court costs and expenses would be paid by the county. Xerox copies would be 15 cents per page, and phone calls would be charged at cost. Sanders & Fandey did not include a sample contract with the bid.

Wilcox would charge \$45 per hour for legal services in court, \$30 per hour for legal services other than in court, mileage would be at 22 cents per mile, travel time would be \$20 per hour, per diem at \$50 per day, photocopies would be 25 cents per page, computer legal research would be at actual cost plus two percent handling, long distance calls at actual cost, secretarial services at \$13 per hour, and para-legal and legal research assistance would be \$15 per hour.

Mitchell would charge \$60 per hour. Out-of-town county business would be charged at \$60 per hour for travel time and actual time working for the county. He would not charge per diem or expenses for out-of-town travel.

Mitchell does not charge for staff, secretarial or para-legal services as they are included in his hourly rate. He does not charge for long distance phone calls or photocopies unless the county asks that he photocopy lengthy documents. All the expenses are included in his hourly rate.

Puckett outlines plan for county's economic health

Members of the Capitan Chamber of Commerce were told at its Monday meeting that the state legislators had gotten the word "don't close Ft. Stanton."

George Puckett, executive director of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC), made a short presentation. Puckett said "we will begin with light assembly and electronics," and said something will be done about scheduled air service. The new executive director mentioned a four-year degree plan which would begin with television. It would move forward from this beginning.

Puckett will attract state funds. At one point he said "stand up, get ready to fight, and let's make this happen."

The chamber received 85 inquiries last month from its ad in the New Mexico magazine.

Chamber members discussed its scholarship program. The recipient from now on must go to a college or university in New Mexico. Mike Shanks, last year's recipient, attends college in Texas. He will get \$300 this year.

The Capitan Chamber of Commerce will present one \$500 scholarship each year. It will also present a \$300 scholarship to a past recipient of the \$500 scholarship. The chamber will decide who this will be. The scholarship fund is limited to \$800 per year.

The criteria for the scholarship is as follows: grade point average, 20 points; class rank, 20 points; ACT score, 20 points; extra curricular, 20 points; honors and leadership, 20 points. A student must make application for this scholarship by April 25.

Bomb scare at Capitan school

Students were evacuated from Capitan School Monday after a bomb threat was made on the school.

Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane reported his department assisted in the search but nothing was found.

McSwane said his department has been busy this month. Eight prisoners were housed in the Lincoln County jail after being transported from Alamogordo. The Otero County jail was overcrowded following a drug raid.

Other Lincoln County Sheriff's department activities included responding to an accident March 2 at mile marker 170 on Highway 54. An 18-wheeler was on its side. The two occupants were transported to Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso for treatment.

DA warns of chain letter scam in area

A chain letter scam being circulated in the Ruidoso area is illegal, according to District Attorney Bert Atkins.

Apparently the letter is in the form of a package that is sold for \$10 which guarantees the purchaser a return of \$40,000 in 13 days. The scam is called the "24 Hour Madness Dash" or the "Lucky 13 Plan."

The scam contains a letter with instructions and a list of 13 names, and states that it is not illegal since it is sold instead of being sent through the mail to unwilling participants.

Pyramid scams are illegal, Atkins said. The News Wednesday, and said cases will be prosecuted by the Attorney General.

Juveniles nabbed after wild chase through Carrizozo

Two juveniles were taken into custody after a high-speed chase through Carrizozo Monday evening. The youths were clocked at speeds of 90 to 118 miles per hour while being pursued by state police, sheriff's deputies and Carrizozo City Police.

The incident started five miles north of Carrizozo on Highway 54 when State Policeman Sainz recognized

the license plate number. A gas skip had been reported earlier in Vaughn and the license plate number matched the number given.

Sainz called the sheriff's department for assistance and followed the vehicle, a 1988 GMC crew cab 4x4 pickup.

Sheriff's deputies and Carrizozo city police joined in the chase which continued through Carrizozo. The sus-

pects did not go south on Highway 54 but went across the railroad tracks on E Street and on through the locked gate at the end of E Street.

The chase continued for six miles through the pasture until the suspects went through another locked gate at the Water Canyon road. The suspects then drove to

Sam Donaldson buys a ranch in Lincoln County

Sam Donaldson, anchorman for ABC-TV News, has bought the 7,300-acre Chaves Canyon Ranch near Hondo, formerly owned by Martha Proctor, Lincoln County Clerk.

The Donaldsons plan to establish a working cattle ranch.

Donaldson, born in El Paso, claims New Mexico as his native state. He graduated from New Mexico Military Institute in 1951 and from the University of Texas at El Paso in 1955.

After 12 years with the Washington press corps, he resigned to host a new program with Diane Sawyer as co-host. Currently, he co-hosts "This Week With David Brinkley" for ABC-TV.

Donaldson plans to spend as much time as possible at the ranch between now and August, when his new series

begins. A new ranch house will be built because the old one burned many years ago.

The ranch, located two and one-half miles north of the Hondo School, is all deeded property and consists of several parcels of land that were homesteaded.

United States Patents to the land were granted to different people through the years. The abstract shows that patents were obtained during the terms of President Benjamin Harrison, President Woodrow Wilson, President Herbert Hoover, President Calvin Coolidge and President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Other portions of the ranch were sold in 1885 during a sale of public lands. Joseph C. Lea bought more than four parcels of the ranch during the public lands sale

in 1885. He paid \$1.25 per acre and bought the land in parcels of 400.54 acres for \$500.68 and 561.60 acres for \$702.02 and \$701.63. He later deeded some of this land to the Lea Cattle Company of Lincoln County.

According to the abstract, "Portions of the ranch were leased for mining and operation for oil and gas and laying of pipe lines and building tanks, powers, stations and structures to produce, save and take care of said products in 1918."

Owners of portions of the ranch through the years include W. H. and Louise Cox, George and Lupe Kimbrell, Charles P. and Telisfore Fritz Jr., Bruce and Johnnie Moore, T.B. and Gladys Yates, P.G. and Mattie B. Peters, Placido T. and

Cream together first 5 ingredients until light and fluffy. Blend in dry ingredients. Spread in ungreased 15x10 pan. Sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes. Cut while warm.

For Ruidoso Commission-manager form of government proposed

"Ruidoso is big business. It should be run as big business," declared John Schuller as he addressed the Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County (FRWLC) at their regular meeting Feb. 28 in Ruidoso.

The retired businessman now living in Ruidoso presented a program comparing a commission-manager form of municipal government to a mayor-council form. The latter is currently in use in Ruidoso.

According to Schuller, a commission-manager form is more efficient because "there is no elected mayor and the enmity between the mayor and council is eliminated."

Instead, five elected commissioners hire a manager based on education and experience. The manager is then responsible for all administrative aspects of that municipal government.

Schuller compares the commission-manager arrangement to that of a corporation. "Voters are like stockholders who elect a board of directors who then hire a president to run the business. Ruidoso is big business and we should demand it be run like one."

Changing the form of existing municipal government is prescribed in state statutes. "First, voters must sign a petition. Twenty percent of the number of those

who voted in the last general election are required. Then a special election can be called so all voters can decide if they want a change or not."

Persons interested in signing a petition or in further information may contact Schuller directly.

FRWLC Program chairman Genevieve Sewell said, "Our purpose is to inform the community so that they can make their own decisions as to whether they want it or not. The better informed voters they are, the more intelligent decisions they can make."

In other business, legislative chairman Rhonda Johnston informed members of pending state legislation concerning pharmacies and Medicaid as well as an obscenity law. She also has information and applications for Project Close Up, an adult education program in Washington, DC.

FRWLC President Norma Page announced the appointment of Beryl Jones as yearbook chairman.

●The Silly Season kicked itself off this year with the convening of the New Mexico Legislature. It shows no sign of ending soon. The Senate has approved a measure that would close drive-up windows at liquor stores between the hours of 10 p.m. and 7 a.m. The vote was 38-1. Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (MADD) contend that the ability to buy liquor from drive-up windows contributes to the number of drunken drivers. The silliness is that the ability to buy liquor from any source at whatever hour, contributes to drunk driving. It would be interesting to see where MADD got figures to bolster such a preposterous posture. All the proposed new law requires is that a person buy his liquor before 10 p.m. instead of midnight. Not a difficult decision for one to make. But anyone has got to be nuts to believe that because a person has to buy liquor before 10 p.m. means that he will abstain, play gin rummy with the kids or go to mass instead. If MADD believes such nonsense, then it also believes that if all drive-up windows were eliminated there would be no drunk driving, and MADD would be out of business.

●The legislators' counterparts in Washington are also infected with the Silly Season syndrome. Congressmen were scheduled Monday to introduce legislation that would prohibit the export of cigarettes. Alarmed congressmen say we are "exporting death." Surgeon General C. Everett Koop says, "I don't think that we as citizens can continue to tolerate exporting disease, disability and death." On the other hand, there is no move to prohibit overseas sales of arms, munitions, fighter planes, tanks and bombs. There is no move to forbid export of liquor, which sometimes induces disability and death. Think about the fruit and vegetable we treat with deadly pesticides. We eat all of it we want, and nobody cares, but shouldn't we stop exporting it to other countries because it contributes to disease and death? And why don't we prohibit overseas travel by people with AIDS?

●Overlook not the Democrats in Congress who are fighting to the end over the confirmation of John Tower to be Secretary of Defense. Tower's qualifications for the job are not in dispute. But Democrats charge he drinks too much and indulges in womanizing. If members of the Senate held themselves and their fellows to the same moral standards to which they hold John Tower, there wouldn't be enough of them around to even vote on the Tower nomination. To Democrats and to most Americans, John F. Kennedy was a great president in spite of the fact that he was an habitual womanizer, even unto inviting them into the White House pool for peeing purposes. And, of course, there's Sen. Teddy Kennedy, a celebrated drunk who has been known to get a few female families during his long tenure in congress, and who, according to a Washington Post poll, is the forerunner for the Democratic nominee for president in 1992. Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—First-year lawmakers often feel it prudent to be seen and not heard from too frequently. But this year's class of rookies is an exception.

There are several reasons. Some of the first-termers were given nice committee assignments—such as to the finance committees. Several of the new Democrat senators were immediately installed in committee vice-chairmanships. Almost half the freshmen are either lawyers or former teachers—both professions requiring a large dose of verbosity. The 22 first-termers also include two former legislative staff analysts and two former lobbyists.

Of the 22 new lawmakers, two stand out as men to watch—or better yet, men to whom we will be listening.

Sen. William Davis from the Albuquerque Heights is a lawyer and a very learned man. Early in his first session, he became the Republican's designated filibuster.

In the only official filibuster this session—one that had to be ended by vote after the six-hour limit—Davis shouldered much more than

his share of the debate. What's more he did it extemporaneously. He did not use notes. He did not read out of books. He just stood there and talked. His point was that the Senate's action in rejecting Gov. Garrey Carruiter's appointment of Carla Muth as head of the Health and Environment Department was a violation of the separation of powers doctrine upon which our government is based.

In order to give his colleagues a perspective of the issue, Davis provided them with some background—in the form of a lengthy lecture on the history of constitutional democracies, dating back to the Magna Charta. Davis was frequently interrupted by Demo Sen. Manny Aragon with objections that the history lesson was not on point. Each time Davis deftly steered his comments back in the direction of the issue without ever losing a beat.

Twice since then, the GOP side of the aisle has staged what appear to be mini-filibusters on the floor of the Senate. Each time it was big Bill Davis carrying

the ball for most of the yardage.

Democratic Rep. Ramon Huerta, also from the Albuquerque Heights, is the other new lawmaker with a flair for loquacity. While guiding his first bill to passage on the House floor, Huerta had to be cautioned by two party veterans that he was filibustering his own bill.

Huerta didn't realize that being a member of the majority party and carrying a relatively non-controversial bill was a sure formula for success even if he made no comments in support of his measure. That didn't keep his colleagues from pulling their usual trick of all voting against Huerta's measure before switching their votes to "yes."

A few weeks later, Huerta found himself carrying a very controversial bill on the floor of the House. He was getting a great deal of heat from the GOP side of the aisle. After an especially grueling series of questions from Rep. Bobby Wallach of Hobbs, Huerta decided to

First atomic bomb site

Trinity Site open to the public April 1

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE—Trinity Site, where the world's first atomic bomb was exploded in 1945, will be open to the public on Saturday, April 1.

The National Historic Landmark is open twice a year, on the first Saturdays in April and October.

Trinity is located on the northern end of the 3,200-square mile White Sands Missile Range, NM, between the towns of Carrizozo and Socorro. For the upcoming Trinity Site tour there will be two ways of entering the restricted missile range.

Visitors can enter through the range's Stallion Range Center which is five miles south of Highway 190. The tour is 18 miles east of San Angelo and 53 miles west of Lordsburg. The Stallion gate will be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Visitors arriving at the gate between those hours will receive handouts and will be assigned to drive designated tour vehicles to Trinity Site. The road is paved and marked.

The guided way of entering the missile range is by appointment. A group of 15 to 20 people are also an option. It is

sponsored by the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce. The caravan forms at the Otero County Fairgrounds in Alamogordo and leaves at 9 a.m. Visitors entering this way will travel as an escorted group with military police to and from Trinity Site. The drive is 170 miles roundtrip and there are no service station facilities on the missile range. The caravan is scheduled to leave Trinity Site at 12:30 p.m. for the return to Alamogordo.

Concessions are allowed at Trinity Site but their use is strictly prohibited anywhere else on White Sands Missile Range.

Trinity Site consists of ground zero where the atomic bomb was placed on a 100-foot steel tower and exploded on July 16, 1945 and the McDonald ranch house where the world's first plutonium core for a bomb was assembled. The crater resulting from the explosion has been filled in and a small monument now marks the spot. The missile range provides historical photos and a 1945 movie showing the day of August 9, 1945, a group of 15 to 20 people are also an option. It is

Legislature okays obscenity

EDITOR—The hottest bill in the state legislature received a cold reception by the House Judiciary Committee, which voted 7-4 to table the controversial Obscenity Bill on Feb. 27.

Known as HB 118, it has been the most talked about bill among the 2000 submitted in this year's legislative session, and is still stirring emotions deeply. It is a model bill for general obscenity legislation which 44 states have adopted. It deals with hard core pornography, not "soft porn," nor does the bill reflect artistic expression, sex ed classes, journalism, etc.

If the public wants an effective and enforceable obscenity bill to protect their children and women, and keep New Mexico from becoming the porno-industry protected playground, it is urgent for them to contact their legislators immediately because, unless the Judiciary Committee is forced into further action HB 118 is dead in committee, through political manipulation.

New Mexico will remain one of the six states requiring a law calling for decency with restrictions upon some obscenities. Those voting to table the bill were: Chairman Thomas Foy, Bayard; Vice-Chairman Cleo M. Miller, Albuquerque; Pauline Eisenstadt, Corrales; Fred Luna, Los Lunas; Angie Vigil Perez, Santa Fe; Albert Shirley, Church Rock; and Ray M. Vargas, Albuquerque.

Those opposed to tabling the bill were: Richard Cheney, Farmington; Stuart Hill, Albuquerque; Gary King, Moriarty; and Delbert Sundberg, Los Alamos. Absent from the hearing and not voting were Richard Olson, Roswell, and Raymond Sanchez of Albuquerque.

In an earlier hearing the Consumers & Public Affairs Committee attached amendments to the bill. The most damaging was their tampering with the definition of obscenity to require that a sexual act must be of a "violent nature" to be considered obscene. That altered the meaning by which obscenity is classified under the standards established by the US Supreme Court in the 1973 Miller vs. California decision, and which makes the original HB 118 constitutional in all respects.

A second major amendment struck out an entire section prohibiting the sale of sexual devices. In both amendments they relied on Albuquerque City Council's Pornography Ordinance as a guide, which incorporates the "violence" criteria to describe what is obscene. It therefore, legalizes such acts as oral and anal sex, bestiality, homosexual and lesbian activities, group sex, "rape," sodomy, orgies, incest, and use of sexual objects in the sex act like guns, beer bottles, etc., as long as they can be pictured in a "nonviolent" manner, however that may be done!

All members of the committee voted for the amendments, while Gary King, chairman from Moriarty, who opposed the bill during the hearing, voted along with Patricia Baca, Albuquerque; Blake Curtis, Glavis; and Robert P. Wallach, Hobbs; to pass it along to the Judiciary Committee with no room for negotiations. Luis Sanchez, Fairview; and Leo Watchman, Navajo; voted against the bill. Henry Saavedra, Albuquerque, was absent from the hearing.

If any of their arguments against the bill are even partly true, then a professor from Ohio reveals a shocking fact when he says "if destructive material can do no harm, then constructive material can do no good—and everything conscientious parents have believed since the dawn of the family is wrong." What a terrifying thought!

turn the tables. He began a series of questions directed at Wallach.

House Speaker Raymond Sanchez immediately noticed that Wallach seemed very surprised at the counterattack. Several other lawmakers were reaching hesitantly for their microphones, wondering whether they should object to this unprecedented maneuver. When it was over, Sanchez instructed the body that Huerta's move was completely legal and, in fact, lent itself to good, healthy debate. He also gave Wallach a verbal pat on the back for remaining cool under the unexpected return of fire.

The old-timers will tell you never to say any more than absolutely necessary lest you give the opposition new material to turn against your bill. But Huerta is a fighter. We'll hear a lot more from him.

One of the more famous filibusters in recent history was that of former Republican floor leader Hoyt Hattison of Clovis. The issue was whether to divide New Mexico into two congressional districts or keep our system of rumping both at large. The latter system had worked well for Deans Tom Morris and Johnny Walker but the GOP by then had federal law on its side. Hattison took the floor in the 1907 session in Albuquerque until the Deans gave in. For awhile he was very appreciative that the Deans were still with him. He was well supplied with water. He soon learned it was a trick. The filibuster was a success—but a painful one.

for actual legal services in or out of town. Out-of-county travel time during working hours would be \$30 per hour which includes mileage, fuel, and wear and tear on vehicles. Overnight lodging would be charged at exact cost but not more than \$75 per night unless approved in advance by the county commission. There will be no charge for meals while traveling.

Reimbursable expenses: photocopies will be 10 cents per copy, exact charge for long distance phone calls, and filing fees, deposition charges, and other legal expenses will be charged at exact rate firm is billed.

Parsons & Bryant would charge \$70 per hour for attorneys, \$45 per hour for paralegals, up to \$20 per hour for secretaries depending on the nature of the project, mileage at the State Department of Finance and Administration's approved rate for Lincoln County personnel, copies at 15 cents per copy, long distance telephone charges at actual expense, and travel expenses, meal and lodging costs would be based on actual receipts.

Wile would charge \$90 per hour for legal services and routine clerical matters would not be billed. Paralegal time would be \$45 per hour, law clerk \$60 per hour, single expenses under \$10 are considered overhead and would not be billed, expenses billed to the county would be billed at cost, and mileage would be at a rate equal to that paid to county employees.

O'Reilly & Wardlaw would charge a minimum monthly retainer fee of \$300 which would cover compen-

sation for attendance at one evening county commission meeting regardless of length of time and additional evening meetings would be charged at \$300 per evening meeting.

Preparation of contracts, ordinances, resolutions, legal research, drafting of legal documents and other legal services including courtroom time would be \$125 per hour, para-legal services would be 50 percent of the hourly rate of the licensed attorneys, photocopies would be 25 cents per page, long distance phone calls would be \$3 each regardless of length, mileage would be at the New Mexico statutory mileage rates. Out-of-pocket expenses including but not limited to certified mail, special courier costs, motel, and airfares would be at actual cost. The firm would charge at the office rate a per diem for nine hours for out-of-town county business other than court, and does not charge for secretarial/clerical time without prior approval of the commissioners.

The proposals are to be evaluated on a 100-point scale with 25 points for rates charged, 25 points for general reputation and experience as attorneys, 25 points for experience in local government, 15 points for office facility and support staff, and 10 points for specific knowledge of Lincoln County.

The county reserved the right to reject any and all proposals and/or waive any technicalities. The bids will be analyzed and processed for 30 days in which time the county will negotiate terms with attorneys that have submitted proposals.

Trinidad Chavez, James M. Mauldin, Patricia Trujillo, Precipio Gustamante and Santiago Gonzalez.

A severe rain and hail storm is listed in the abstract. Apparently Jose G. Anala owned one-fourth of the ranch and had a herd of 1,500 goats. The abstract states: "On May 31, 1907, a cyclone accompanied by wind, rain, hail and water swept across the ranch where said goats were kept and all of said goats were killed with the exception of approximately 672 head and that the burden with said goats and lot was likewise killed in said storm, and that thereafter the remnant of said goats were sold under order of this court at 50 per head for \$1,900."

The goats were mentioned in an article in the

Lincoln County News dated June 4, 1937: "Monday's severe rain and hail storm near the Bonnell ranch resulted in the death of a sheepherder and his wife. A coroner's jury said they lost their lives in a hail and windstorm of tornado proportions."

A.F. 'Alke' Stever, Lincoln County Sheriff 1940-1943, was one of the owners of the property.

Wilbur L. McKnight, Lincoln County Commissioner in 1900-01, bought the ranch in 1905 from Floyd Childress. McKnight was the father of Lincoln County Clerk Martha Freeter. Martha said she lived on the ranch until she married in 1908 and returned to the ranch in 1923. It was her home until last year.

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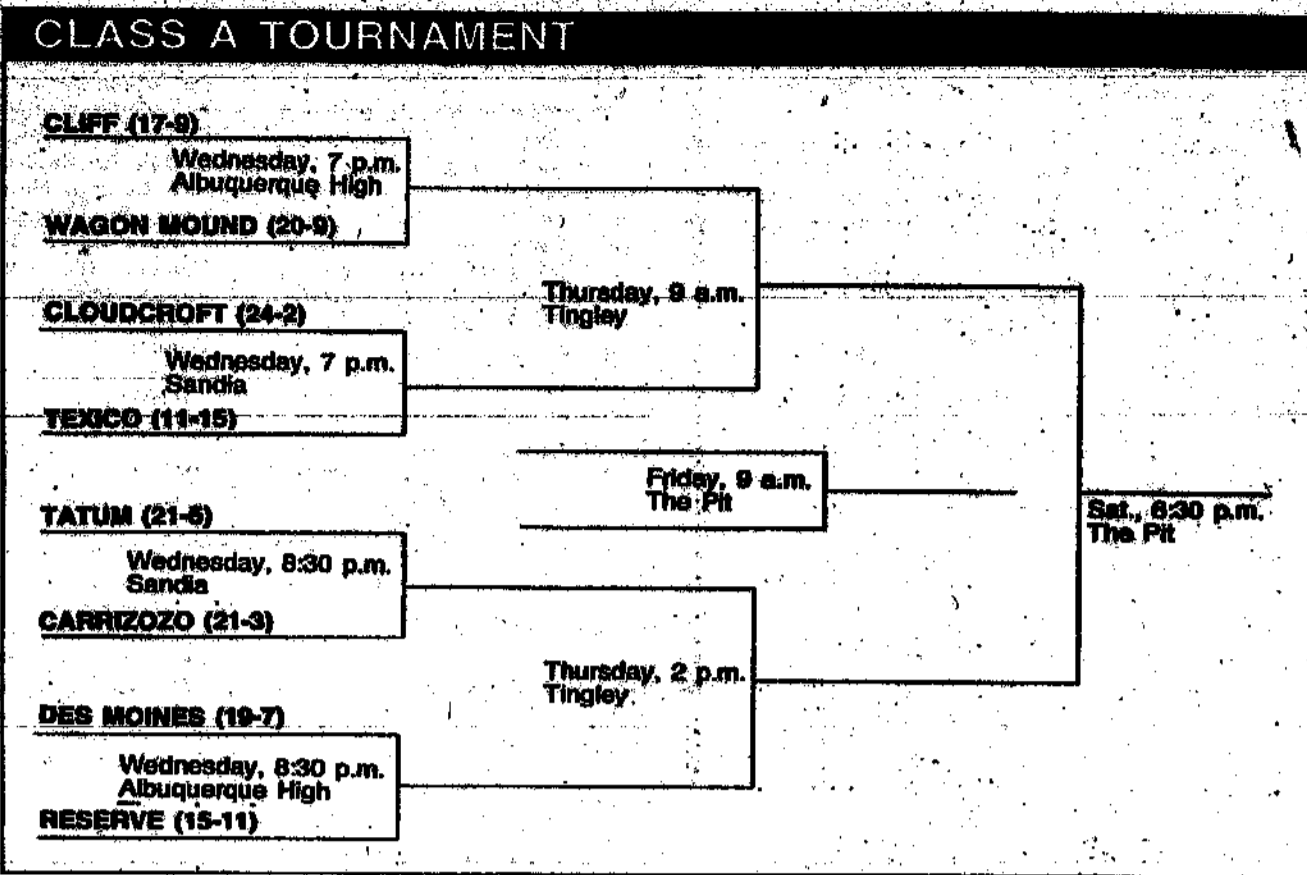
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Tatum beats Grizzlies
