## Deputy Montes commended for saving a life

Lincoln County Sheriff Deputy Orlando Montes has received a letter of commendation from Sheriff James McSwane for helping save a life on March 9.

McSwane's letter to Montes states: "It has come to my attention that you, along with officers Bobby Angermiller and Bob Layher from the Ruidoso Downs Police Department, were instrumental in saving a life on March 9, 1989 by helping perform CPR on the individual until the ambulance personnel arrived."

McSwane said, "The importance of all departments working together can always have a positive effect on not only the officers but the departments as a whole."

The individual was transported to Lincoln County Medical Center and later transferred to a hospital in Albuquerque and is in stable condition.

## Mistrial declared

District Judge Robert Doughty declared a mistrial Tuesday morning in the jury trial of the state versus Robert Edmondson.

Edmondson was charged with two counts of forgery, third degree felonies carrying a sentence of three years imprisonment and/or \$5,000 fine, and 11 counts of issuance of worthless checks, carrying a special penalty of one year imprisonment and/or \$1,000 fine.

The mistrial was ruled during jury selection.

## Stone heads Capitan school board

The Capitan board of education was re-organized at its March 9 meeting. Preston Stone was elected president of the board, Tom Trost vice-president, and Kenneth Cox secretary.

Sworn in for four-year terms were Preston and Ron Roybal.

Karen Payton will begin work June 15 as a secretary in the superintendent's office. Frances Traylor will transfer to the business office.

The board approved a community based program for special education students from Ft. Stanton.

School will be dismissed at 12:30 p.m. March 17. This will begin the spring vacation. Classes resume March 27.

The afternoon of March 17 will be an in-service program for teachers regarding the English textbook adoption for the 1989 through 1990 school year.

Parent/teacher conferences are scheduled for April 4, 11 a.m. to 7 p.m.

## Zia kitchen to be closed for repairs

The Zia Senior Center at Carrizozo is making necessary repairs to its kitchen and will not be serving meals on Monday, March 21 and Tuesday, March 22. Meals will resume Wednesday, March 23.

The center will be open on those two days for other services.

## County Commissioners approve EMS fund act

The Lincoln County Commissioners approved the EMS fund act application during the March 13 meeting. The application was compiled by Lincoln County EMS Director Nancy Guck.

Money for the EMS Fund Act comes from the \$1 for Life amendment. The minimum amount of funding available to each local ambulance service is \$3,000. There are six county ambulance services in the county: Alto, Capitan, Carrizozo, Hondo, Fort Stanton and Corona.

In other business, commissioners agreed to send a letter of appreciation to Rust Tractor Company of Albuquerque for providing a six-hour heavy equipment class for county road department employees at no charge.

Road Superintendent Tommy Hall said the class was very well done, and, "I feel Lincoln County will save many dollars in the long run with proper preventative heavy equipment maintenance."

Commissioners scheduled a Board of Finance meeting and workshop to be held March 22 at 1 p.m.

Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDC/LC) executive director George Puckett presented information on activities of the EDC. He said the raw data from the labor survey would be compiled for later use by the EDC.

Following a public hearing for application for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Planning Funds, the application

was approved. The application is to be in Santa Fe March 17.

Commissioners held the first public hearing for the proposed fair housing ordinance.

Commissioners tabled action on the recommendation of the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission to approve a time extension requested by Bill Smith for completion of a low water crossing on the Stag Road, Mountain Lakes Subdivision.

The commission wanted further information and will invite owners of the subdivision to attend the next county commission meeting.

The contract with the state agency on aging was approved for two senior citizens centers to receive money. The Carrizozo and Capitan centers will each receive \$3,000 to upgrade heating and cooling systems.

Commissioners approved the Civil Defense/Hazmat requirements. Hemphill stated that Nancy Guck's salary was fully funded by the federal government through the state and one part-time secretary's salary was also funded by the federal government through the state.

Hemphill noted that Lincoln County was the first county in the state to pass the required mock disaster on the first try. The mock disaster drill is required of all counties.

Wes Grigsby, chief of the Lincoln County Volunteer Fire Department, asked if the Lincoln Fire Department could participate in the

volunteer firefighters retirement act. Permission was granted to apply.

Resolution 77-53 to apply for funding assistance to prepare a solid waste plan for the county was approved.

Hemphill announced that two people had sent resumes instead of applications for county manager as had been previously stated. Carl L. Davidson, Albuquerque, and Laura M. White, Roswell, did not submit applications but did send resumes.

An executive session was held for personnel. After the one hour-35 minute closed session there were no announcements. Commissioners stated they would schedule interviews for county manager and road superintendent between March 20 and 24. Four people are to be interviewed for each position.

## Counterfeit bills surface in area

Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane is warning all businesses in Lincoln County to watch for counterfeit bills. Two \$20 counterfeit bills were taken in by businesses in Carrizozo last week.

McSwane asked that anyone finding suspicious looking bills of any denomination to contact his office immediately. His department is investigating the incidents and the US Department of Treasury and the FBI have been contacted concerning the matter.

The sheriff's department is also investigating an alleged embezzlement in Carrizozo. The victim is a senior citizen.

McSwane is also asking county residents to be cautious when buying security alarm systems. Some security alarm companies are telling purchasers that the alarm will ring in the sheriff's office without giving the sheriff's office the location of the alarm or a proper description of the building where the alarm is installed.

McSwane said that without the exact location of the alarm it takes his officers longer to respond. Buyers should make certain the company has communicated with the sheriff's department.

Other sheriff department activities this last week include a one-vehicle rollover two miles south of Capitan on March 8. The two passengers were injured and transported to Lincoln County Medical Center. One person with a broken hip was later transferred to El Paso.

## Trustees deny zoning change; trash hearing set for March 21

Carrizozo trustees handled trash and zoning problems during the March 14 town council meeting.

Bob Means' request for a permanent zoning change at the location of the Little Store was denied. Six letters of objection to having a service garage at the location were read at the meeting.

Two letters from residents agreed to the zoning change if there were severe restrictions and enforceable penalties. Means asked what he could put in the building and was given a copy of the zoning regulations.

Trustees asked that the cars and other items pertaining to the garage be removed from the site by March 28.

Trustees discussed the garbage collection situation. Waste Management asked for permission to go to once a week collection of commercial garbage. Trustees decided to hold a public hearing before making a decision.

The public hearing will be held at 5 p.m. Tuesday, March 21, at city hall. All

persons may attend and voice their opinion.

Several options for refuse collection were discussed. The town may negotiate with Waste Management at contract time which is June 30, the town may begin collection of the town refuse and haul it to a landfill, or the town may put the services out to bid.

In other business, trustees approved the application for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds for street work in the town.

The fair housing ordinance was adopted.

Beulah Moore invited everyone to attend the benefit planned to raise money to send five Carrizozo senior citizens to the National Senior Olympics in St. Louis in June. A soup supper and old-fashioned melodrama will be held April 8.

Mayor Bob Hemphill said he had completed the EMS application for the town

to apply for funds for jaws of life and jump kits containing emergency medical supplies. The town qualifies for the EMS \$1 for Life money because several Carrizozo Volunteer firemen have completed the first responder course. The fire department gets credit for each run made to provide backup for the EMTs.

Hemphill said that Dr. Amy Barton was medical director for the first responder course. A thank you letter will be sent to Barton.

An executive session was held for personnel and property acquisition.

Following the 16-minute meeting, Hemphill announced no action was taken on the property acquisition.

Police officer John Northrop Jr.'s extended probation period will end March 15. Trustees agreed to offer Northrop Jr. a permanent position.

# New home for Capitan Village Council

The Capitan Village Council approved the purchase Monday night of lots 5 through 10, block 61, in the Village of Capitan for \$50,000.

The property, which includes the building formerly used by the Old Sagebrush

and Corral business, will be used as the new Capitan village hall.

Engineer Jack Atkins reported on the filter plant. Atkins, along with village employees Cox and Davenport, has been looking at the old filter, and getting estimates in such areas as sand-blasting, valves and baffle repair. An automatic backwash system is being designed and the trio is looking at a polymer pre-treatment. Atkins said plans are to recast the inside and outside of the filter vessel.

Bids were opened for the 1970 F 700 Ford dump truck and the 1978 D-200 1/2 ton Dodge pickup truck. The pickup was sold with a high bid of \$801 to Bob Smith of Lubbock. The dump truck was sold to Thunderbird of Roswell for a high bid of \$1,850.

The Capitan Police Department has received an allocation from the state for \$17,600. Police Chief Randy Spears said this is to be used for equipment, training and matching funds. Spears will use the money to replace the Dodge car he is driving, and for training equipment.

Hubert Quintana, executive director of the Water Defense Association, was present. The village trustees approved a contribution of \$2,500 to the association to help fight the appeal filed by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe. Mayor Benny Coker praised the Water Defense Association team.

Coker set up a team to aid with input for a budget workshop. Trustees Pogue will work with village clerk Janet Keel concerning village streets. Trustee Myrl Ray will work with Coker and Keel on water. Trustee Renfro and Coker will work on the general budget. Trustee Rouleau and Keel will work with the village police.

Capitan Chamber of Commerce president Dick Beck was assured that the insurance for the July 4 Smokey Bear Stampede Parade would be taken care of by the village.

Village employees Dan Davenport and Terry Cox

reported they had attended a water school in Albuquerque.

Volunteer fireman Jimmy Wright said he had attended a hazardous material school.

George Beaudry led a discussion concerning the old depot.

Beaudry and Dorothy Smith were present and represented the cemetery board. The cemetery board will purchase side curtains for the canopy from Eugene Andrews of Capitan. The bid from Andrews was \$745. The cemetery board meets the first Thursday of the month at 1 p.m. at the Smokey Bear Restaurant. Perpetual care will be discussed at its next meeting.

There was some discussion concerning opening and closing of gravesites. The village will be in charge of doing this except where Spanish tradition may call for digging by shovel.

A special meeting was held just prior to the regular meeting of the council. The Village of Capitan is applying for \$450,000 in a community development block grant (CDBG). This is to be used for a sewer treatment facility.

The village has two choices. One choice would be the same type system the village now has, but expanded. Another choice would be an innovative wetland area concept requiring 10 acres. The Village of Tatum is now doing one of these.

The cost of the system will be \$481,000. The village hall will spend \$25,000 on this project. The new system would be designed with future expansion in mind.

Former member JoAnn Jackson has received a 1989 Rural Student Scholarship. She is the special education teacher for Springer, NM schools.

It was voted to donate \$50 toward helping Dan Bell and Tina Aaron with expenses to the Citizenship-Washington Focus Week.

The Lincoln County Fair Board is needing assistance with the bank loan for fair-ground improvements. A decision will be made at a future meeting.

# Ernest V. Joiner's OPINION

For the first time an incoming president has been denied Senate confirmation of a nominee to a major cabinet post. On a partisan vote the Senate has rejected President Bush's nomination of John Tower for Secretary of Defense. It is humiliating to both Tower and the president, and it certainly intrudes upon the constitutional prerogatives of the Executive Department. But that is nothing new to congress, which has already taken over many functions of the Executive. Hence this open letter to George Bush, President of the United States:

Dear Mr. President. Now that you have been put in your place by Democrats in the Senate, I suggest a bit of tit-for-tat. No matter how this suggested plan comes out, you and the Republican Party will be winners.

So, Mr. President, I suggest you nominate the Rev. Jesse Jackson for the post denied John Tower. If the Senate confirms Jackson, you and the Republican Party win because the act will strengthen a growing conviction among Americans that the Democratic Party has become the party of blacks, homosexuals, liberals and loonies. White voters will withdraw from Democratic ranks and insure that party's defeat in 1992.

On the other hand, Mr. President, if the Senate does NOT confirm Jesse Jackson, the Democratic Party is in even deeper trouble. Black voters will see the rejection as a betrayal of black people by a white-dominated Senate, and as an insult to one of their idols who is already in the running for the Democratic nomination for president in 1992. To reject nomination of any black to high office would be fatal to the majority party in the Senate. If Jackson is rejected, black voters will leave the Democratic Party in droves to seek accommodation with Republican ranks, for the prevailing wisdom among blacks is that "nobody shoots down one of us and gets away with it."

If Jackson is confirmed the US Secretary of Defense, Mr. President, he can be given a plush office but no assigned duties. The department could be run by a "deputy" Secretary of Defense, to which John Tower could be appointed without being confirmed by the Senate. Tower could run the department on a cabinet level without actually being designated Secretary of Defense. If you don't think this possible, recall that Gov. Garrey Carruthers of New Mexico, after failure to get Carla Muth confirmed to a high office by the state Senate, put her in a "deputy" position that does not require Senate confirmation, but where she still runs the show.

So, Mr. President, whether Jackson is confirmed or not, you win. You would have carved off your pound of flesh, served notice on your political detractors to keep the hell out of the presidential arena, and killed off the Democratic presidential hopeful four years in advance of elections—all without the Republican Party having to raise \$100 million to do what President Bush can do by uttering only one sentence: "I nominate Jesse Jackson to be Secretary of Defense." I am monitoring your lips, Mr. President.

Would Jackson agree to the nomination? Considering that he is arrogant, egotistical, pompous, and power-mad, he would probably accept such a powerful office in an administration he would love to destroy. After all, it beats walking that Eastern Airlines picket line. Too, his ego needs boosting following defeat of his black candidate, Eugene Sawyer, as Mayor of Chicago by Richard Daley, a white person. Mr. President, you can help Rev. Jackson and the nation by nominating him for the post of Secretary of Defense.

Please let me know if I can be of any further assistance.

Sen. Teddy Kennedy is a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee that assassinated John Tower. Kennedy voted to reject the nomination on grounds that Tower is a "womanizer." A few weeks ago the Washington Times reported that Kennedy had been discovered during a Fall 1987 luncheon having sexual intercourse with a woman on the floor of a private dining room at La Brasserie Restaurant in Washington, DC. It was also reported in Human Events that a waitress accidentally walked in on Kennedy and his friend. Kennedy advised the restaurant owner, Raymond Campet, that the waitress be warned that she would be fired if she talked with reporters about the incident. Campet did not deny the incident, saying only that "We respect our patrons' privacy." According to Human Events, a Kennedy spokesman declined to discuss the matter on grounds it was a personal matter.



## Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE**—Bernard Baruch, the fabulously successful American businessman, once was asked for a stock market prediction. "The market will continue to fluctuate," replied Baruch. That is about the only safe prediction that can be made for the 1989 New Mexico Senate. It will continue to fluctuate.

Last Monday after hours of roll call votes on committee reports, in which both houses normally have trouble getting members interested enough to cast voice votes, the Senate leadership decreed that the body would meet in continuous session until the 1989 legislative ends Saturday noon. General Edward Baca of the New Mexico National Guard was ordered to deliver 42 cots to the Senate.

The cots arrived almost immediately and were placed just outside the Senate chambers, complete with pillows, sheets, olive drab Army blankets and sheets of half-inch foam rubber—a new addition since my days in the service. The sight may have shocked some sense into the solons because, soon afterward, the Senate adjourned for the evening and went into committee meetings.

Several committees announced their intent to meet all night but by 11:30 p.m. the last committee finished its deliberations. That was the Judiciary panel which has become the repository for so many bills, it is known as Fernando's hideaway, after the committee chairman Fernando Macias of Las Cruces.

By the time you read these words, many additional Senate fluctuations will have occurred—so many, in fact, this column may be completely out of date. The one sure bet is that the upper house will not gain any more stability this year than it had the past four sessions when there was an even split between Democrats and Republicans. That excuse no longer works. Demos now hold a 26-18 margin. Perhaps four years of turmoil, while both parties constantly maneuvered to form ruling coalitions, created an instability that will take more than a year to overcome.

Whatever the case, the Senate cries out for a strong leader to emerge, and take charge.

Another thing of which we can be sure, whether there is a special session or not, the 1989 regular session will end on Saturday. Just about 10 years ago, both houses agreed in a gesture called "rolling the clock" to end the session on the last day of the legislative session.

timepiece of each house—the watch worn by the majority floor leader—would stop at 11:59 a.m. The session would drag on for hours, sometimes into the next day, before the leadership of the two houses decided all the necessary legislation had been passed.

Many lawmakers complained, but it took a lawsuit challenging a bill passed after the constitutional deadline to get a state Supreme Court ruling that clocks can no longer be stopped on the session's final day.

That isn't to say, however, that the official timepieces of the House and Senate work flawlessly now. The clock is still monkeyed with every day during a practice called "rolling the clock." Everyone knows this session has 60 calendar days. But not everyone knows what "legislative" day it is.

The House and Senate have rules which require a legislative day to pass between the time a bill is reported into the chamber and the time it is heard by

the body. Early in the session, legislative days are saved for that time later in the session, when action becomes frantic and additional days are needed.

On Saturday, March 11, for instance, with exactly one week remaining in the 60-day session, neither house had officially reached its 30th legislative day. The "day" changes only when the majority leader says it changes. He does this by "rolling the clock," which is accomplished by the majority leader standing and saying, "It now being 11:59 a.m. of the 29th legislative day, I move we adjourn until 12:01 of the 30th legislative day."

Only by pure coincidence would that announcement happen to coincide with the clock on the wall. School children in the gallery always titter when it happens, wondering why the lawmakers didn't pay better attention in school.

## Skeen speaks out 'Now's the time to clean up our own backyard'

The Ethics Committee in the House of Representatives is poised to act next week on allegations of financial wrongdoing by House Speaker Jim Wright.

The investigation of Wright's financial dealings grew out of complaints that the Speaker may have violated federal laws by assigning a member of his congressional staff to do research on an autobiographical book. The ethics inquiry is also looking at a questionable deal that allowed Wright to receive exceptionally high royalties for his literary effort, plus allegations that Wright improperly intervened with government officials on behalf of energy and savings and loan interests.

The Ethics Committee, whose official name is the Committee on Standards of Official Conduct, is the only committee on Capitol Hill whose membership is equally divided between Republicans and Democrats. Any recommendation to discipline the Speaker must be passed by a majority of the committee membership. With the imminent conclusion of the Wright investigation, the issue of ethics in the United States Congress cannot be ignored.

The stress of power and procedure in the House are growing more numerous.

each day. Needless to say, this is neither a democratic nor an efficient way to run the nation's highest legislative body. Let me give you some examples and discuss how we can reform Congress to make it a better institution.

Recently, the House leadership planned to bring a certain piece of legislation to the floor for a vote without previous committee consideration. This particular bill has already passed the House in a previous session. And the House leadership hoped to send it to the floor without a committee hearing, thus denying members the opportunity to debate the merits of the bill or offer amendments to it.

Fortunately, the House leadership backed off this approach after minority members loudly voiced their complaints. But this tactic has been tried before and it will likely be tried again. Those members who attempt this are trying to cut other members, and those people they represent, out of the legislative process.

This frequent breakdown of committee authority is just one example of power abuse in the House. We have also seen the majority try to cut off or limit those powerful members who charge legislation and procedure have

## An open letter to all men: To whom are you married, and what does it cost?

Gentlemen, we are in a bad way and something has got to be done.

A young man contemplating marriage sees only visions of home cooking and communal bliss. He cannot be expected to recognize his fiancée as a financial parasite eager to sink her hollow fangs into his bankbook and suck it dry. He cannot be expected to realize her feminine pulchritude is in reality a clever disguise which may constitute illegal entrapment, or that the institution of marriage must soon be either abolished or subsidized by the federal government.

I remember my wedding as if it were yesterday. "for richer or for poorer—for better or for worse..." There was no mention of "for more or for less..."

The warning has been deliberately omitted from the vows.

All women spend six months of the year putting on weight and the other six months taking it off. I have watched the phenomenon for well over 30 years, each year wondering whether the American housewife is a loving helpmate or a financial disaster. Recently I put the statistics into the computer and confirmed my worst suspicions.

Conservative calculations indicate that in 30 years of putting it on and taking it off, my wife has cost me \$24,300—after taxes. True, one woman may vary from another by six ounces or so. But basically they all round out about the same. I will therefore present my wife's statistics. Others may add or subtract a few ounces as experience dictates.

I do not ask the unbeliever to count the irreparable damage done my alimentary canal during the "off again" times. Let him only consider the basic facts. And let us begin at a point of certain agreement.

In the course of a year every woman puts on and takes off 60 pounds. Not in a boom or bust operation, mind you. It is mostly a 10-pounds on, 10-pounds off, come and go cycle. But certainly we agree on 60 pounds on and off each year.

From certain agreement let us proceed to certain agreement. No matter where you buy your food, no matter what you eat, it costs \$2 to gain one pound. But the horrible fact is that in special foods and diets, it costs \$2 to shed every pound it cost \$2 to put on. Let us recapitulate.

50 lbs. per year gained at \$2 per pound — \$100  
50 lbs. per year lost at \$2 per pound — \$100  
————— \$200 per year

So, we proceed to more certain agreement. A 10-pound gain in weight for any woman necessitates the purchase of new clothing. What she needs cannot be managed for less than \$60. Conversely, the same is true for every 10 pounds lost.

50 lbs. on per year at \$60 per 10 lbs. clothing cost — \$250

In the course of 365, there are scattered perhaps 30 days in which a woman is at her "normal" weight. In the shucking of 1500 pounds from a diluted 1610 pounds, is there anything left of the original wife, or am I supporting a total stranger?

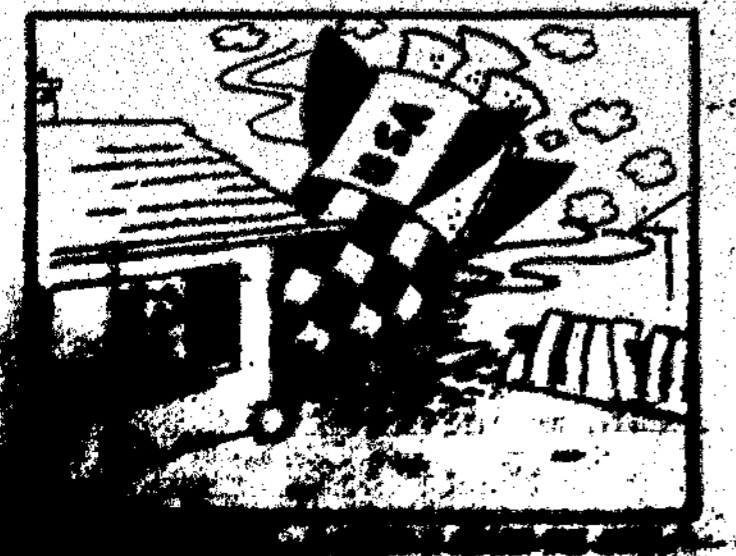
There is strong scientific evidence that after 3000 pounds of this put and take, the genuine wife has become a new woman many times over. Do my children have one mother or several?

## SO EASY COOKIES

Last week's cookie recipe was tested in this household and it passed the taste exam. The flavor extract should be creamed along with the first 5 ingredients, then the dry ingredients can be blended in. I baked the cookies in the 10x15 pan with high sides that I usually bake my other cookies on. rules in an effort to circumvent the official process.

Few in Congress would disagree that the House has lost touch with the notion of accountability. We regularly pass laws that employers must follow, but then we exempt ourselves from the very laws we write.

For example, did you know that the Civil Rights Act of 1964 does not apply to the legislative branch? The 25-old Equal Pay Act, which enacted the principle of equal pay for equal work, also does not apply to Congress. Congress also exempts itself from many other health, safety, and fairness laws that other employers must follow.

Now is the time for Congress to reform itself. There are a number of items on the congressional agenda that

would be a step in the right direction. Congress recently authorized the establishment of a Capitol Hill grievance committee. And we are looking at a proposal that would prohibit employees who leave the Hill from lobbying their former colleagues for a certain period of time.

As for the ethics investigation of Jim Wright, some argue that Congress should set up an independent prosecutor's office to handle charges brought against members of congress.

The lack of accountability in the House has serious implications for taxpaying citizens everywhere. I believe congressional reform is in everyone's best interest. The time is now to clean up our own backyard.

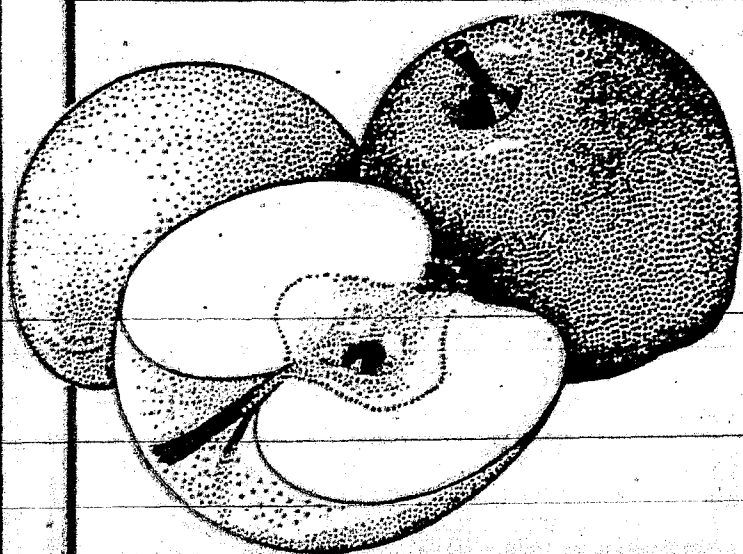

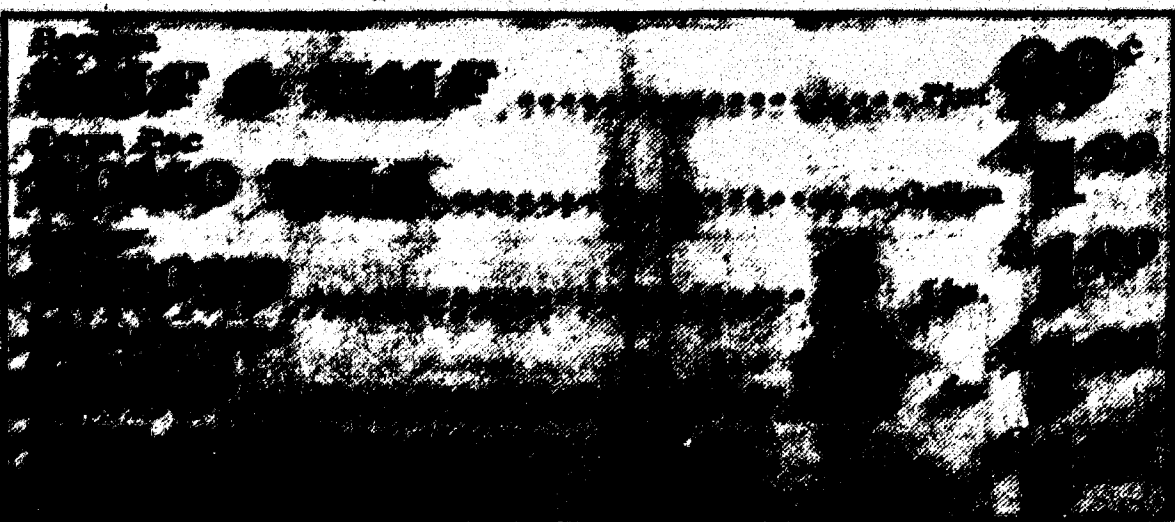
