Horse trails around Ft. Stanton to open May 5

Larry Woodard, state director for the bureau of land management, told a group of people at Fort Stanton Tuesday that the horse trails would be open May 5.

The only trails that will be open at this time do not go through the hospital complex.

The Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School is located on 1,280 acres of state land surrounded by 23.000 acres of BLM land. Woodard said the horse trails will all be on BLM land.

Hospital employees, parents and guardians of Fort Stanton residents, and county residents voiced their concerns about the problems that could occur with the increased traffic in the hospi-

tal area

Several people stated that the Fort Stanton masterplan had been presented as being allencompassing and that the brochure printed by the National Center for the Western Horse did not distinguish the state land from the BLM land.

Woodard said he felt the thing that could affect the hospital first would be the proposed "Boots and Saddles Tour" that has been presented in Congress by US Senators Pete Domenici and

Jeff Bingaman and US Representative Joe Skeen.

The study into the proposed tour is supposed to take a year. Woodard said the people could make their concerns known at public hearings that will be held before the tour becomes a reality.

"We want to make sure we work together for the safety and protection of the residents," said Fort Stanton Hospital Administrator Ervin Aldaz.

Woodard said scoping sessions would be held and all people would have the chance to be heard. He said he was glad that certain

When this civilization fell due to drought and inner strife, the people migrated from northwest New Mexico to find farming villages near the Rio Grande. There they



• Republicans are not usually regarded as humorous people. They are likely seen as sour people obsessed with exploiting labor and jerking homes from under widows and orphans. Or off starting wars somewhere However, the GOP Congressional Committee has introduced the "Quantum Theory of Automatic Legislative Multiplication," which attempts to explain some of the unexplained things that have happened during the past 30 years. It goes this way.

Approximately 25,000 bills are introduced into each Congress. Fortunately, few become law. But those that do produce other laws. Once enacted, these laws have more progeny than the fabled Father Abraham: Laws beget law-and changes, modifications, amendments, extensions, clarifications and interpretations. Rarely is an original law repealed outright.

 Let us suppose that some underworked liberal decides that the horse is an overlooked, overworked, underadvantaged segment of the American scene. First comes a pressure group, such as Help Our Sturdy Steeds (HOSS). The next step is to nag Congress. After a lot of horse maneuvers, let's say a bill is introduced: "The Horses Aspiration Act."

 After due Committee rumination and lengthy debate, opponents would bridle at the suggestion that horses need federal aid or protection, and suggest that such an act would be putting the cart before the horse. Proponents would be only grazed by this criticism, and claim the bill would stable-ize the economy. The bill finally passes after Amy Carter (with father Jimmy's approval) enteres a tearful plea on behalf of a vanishing chunk of Americana. Then what?

 Civil rights folks would demand an amendment banning discrimination against race, plow, livery, trotter, pacer or hobby horse-or horses of a different color. Environmentalists would call for a Horse Waste Act, and demand impact statements, particularly for mérry-go-rounds. Senior citizens would lobby for greener pastures for old nags, and a law prohibiting sending Old Dobbin to the glue factory.

 The Equine Footgear Assn. would try to nail down legislation establishing Federal standards for horseshoes, and a bill-would be introduced to impose stiff tariffs on imported footgear for ponies. Proponents would point out that the domestic horseshoeing industry has declined 78.3 percent since 1887 with a corresponding loss of jobs. This will be blamed on multinational corporations horsing around with spartheid in Africa.

 Labor groups would demand laws mandating barn-to-barn pay, more oats for weekends, holidays and overtime—and the right to buck off riders or kick the whiffletree. Women's rights groups would demand that female horses no longer be called mares or fillies, but be designated as Hs. The education lobby would ask for a bill that requires all country horses be trucked into the city so they could be exposed to the benefits of dealing with urban traffic.



Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE-Garbage turned out to be the most significant item considered by the 1989 legislature.

Statutoxy restrictions on the dumping of out-of-state garbage consumed 21 hours of House and Senate debate. This was honest-to-goodness debate in committees and on both floors, not the slow-down or filibuster variety of "debate" that consumed so much of the Senate's time this year.

Following Gov. Garrey Carruthers' veto of Sen. Roman Maes' Senate Bill 2, the issue produced the session's only veto override attempt. That effort failed on a 25 to 16 party line vote in the Senate after originally passing the body by a 36 to 2 margin.

After the veto override failure, Rep. Gary King of Moriarty led a frantic allnight effort to shape his garbage bill into an acceptable compromise. But it ran out of

Now it appears garbage dumping will either cause an expensive special session or else it will consume governmental time and hog newspaper headlines for the next grapple with whether to allow ourselves to become The Land of Enchanting Garbage Dumps.

Here's how the garbage issue got to where it is now.

Last December, Mace, a Santa Fe Democrat and a realtor, discovered to his dismay that New Mexico has the fewest garbage dump restrictions of any state in the nation. That made our wide open spaces prime candidates for garbage from all those East Coast dumps that have been closing. The efforts of some cities to find a place to get rid of their waste. Along." has attracted nationwide attention.

Mees didn't want that attention focused on New Mexico. As we know, most ont-of-staters don't have a very clear picture in their minds about what goes on outliers, If we become known as the nation's garbage pit, that will be the one thing that will stick in people's minds, Mass worries. Then, something that has been billed as economic development will result in economic undevelopment as industry and tourists stay away in droves from a state shown to be the nation's trash pile.

But when the bill reached Carruthers' desk, the state employees who had been following the measure, found their boss strongly disagreed with the legality of allowing cities and counties time to come into compliance.

Following his veto, Carruthers announced he would issue an executive order banning new dumps for a year. Democratic leaders contend that he does not have the authority to ban something which is legal under existing laws. They want a special session of the legislature to impose restrictions they hope would be so stringent orcostly that all out-of-state dumping would he discouraged.

And that is where the biggest disagreement between Carruthers and Demo lawmakers exists. Carruthers sees the need for environmentally sound regulations expected.

Reader challenges electric co-op

EDITOR—Although my preference is that we not confinue to discuss the Otero County Electric case in the newspaper, Mr. Mershon has misquoted me on several aspects, and I feel that I need to clarify those points. Before saying anything though, I will repeat that I

just want people to get the facts, Obviously, there is a disagreement as to the rate structure imposed by Otero County Electric. The facts of the case are public record. Anyone who wants to know the facts can contact the Public Service Commission directly—the commission is the consumer's avenue for

questioning any utility company.

In our country, we have this privilege, and it's one we should all take advantage of. Although I never envisioned that I would become personally involved in such a controversy. I am very thankful that we do have a governing body to which we can turn if we feel that a utility

company should be challenged.

In response to Mr. Mershon: 1. I did not go afield when I said that Otero County Electric is the only electric utility in New Mexico that imposes a demand charge on residential customers. It is! He mentions four other states that do—that's a total of 5 out of 50. He didn't tell you that at the last hearing we presented testimony regarding Ohio Edison's rate structure, which includes demand metering, but which is structured in a much more equitable way for the consumer. I personally have in my possession the rate structures from two utility companies in Colorado. Yes, they do have demand meters; but again, the rate structure is more acceptable. For instance, one of the utilities makes the demand feature optional, and their charge for kilowatt hours is in the neighborhood of \$.02 per kwh, with the demand charge being added to that. Cor base rate is \$.085, plus the demand charge. Yes, I know that we get 10 kw without being charged, but all you have to do is wash a load of clothes and throw them in the clothes dryer and you're at 10 kw. Then you begin to incur an additional charge of \$8 per kw over and above the charge for kilowatt hours. Don't dare go heat up some soup or dry your hair while your clothes dryer is on! That can of soup could cost you \$8 when the electric

2. Fact: Of the 10,000 Otero Electric consumers, approximately 2,500 have demand meters. On my calculator that comes to 25 percent of their customers who are affected by demand meters, not the mere 5 percent Mershon implies. Granted, not all of those customers incur a demand charge each month. Testimony from the previous hearing was that approximately 600 customers per month incur a demand charge, but they are not the same customers each month. Given our transient community, customers who incur the demand charge vary from month to month. Some of those customers have never incurred a demand charge, but their houses have been targeted as having the potential to go over 10 kw in demand, so the demand meter is there waiting for that occurrence. Some of the customers, such as my family, have changed certain appliances for gas usage, some have turned off electric heaters, and some have simply quit coming here in the winter. So, when Mr. Mershan tells you that 95 percent "either do not require that yolume of power, or are effectively controlling their load in order not to incur the added charge for capacity," keep in mind what those customers have done to achieve this ness people, does this help account for some of your lost revenue from the vacationers who perhaps used to come here every winter?) Back in the years when money flowed more freely, a high electric bill was an annoyance, but now, when our vacationers are hirting at home, why on earth would they come here to incur a \$500 electric bill for a few days of being in the mountains? That's lost revenue for Lincoln and Otero counties, no matter how you look at it.

3. Please go back and look at my first letter, Mr. Mershon. I said, "Proposal by the PSC would increase the rate of the same small consumer by 1-4 percent, and the majority of any increase in rate would be absorbed by the pari-time, recreational homeowner." So, when you say I completely overlooked the part of the PSC proposition that proposes an 18 percent rate increase of vacationers, you are very much mistaken. I can assure you that those part-time residents have been made fully aware of both proposals. From the very beginning, it has been my commitment to give tham all

the facts regarding this case.

4. Under Mr. Mershon's plan, I, as a consumer, have the ability to control a part of my costs." In the allelectric home which we built, my "ability to control" went something like this: Arrive home approximately 5:30 p.m. House is cold, no supper, clothes to wash. Which do you do first? Choose one of the three, because you simply cannot do all at the same time. Under this scheme, the average working person can accomplish household tasks by the hour of midnight, because you have to be so careful not to use any two major appliances at one time. But I can promise you that the money you . save by not incursing the demand charge could easily be spent at the doctors office getting treatment for the stress it places upon your entire household.

5. Thank you for your compliment, Mr. Mershon, I

will continue to be diligent and persistent, and detail driented-you can count on it!
