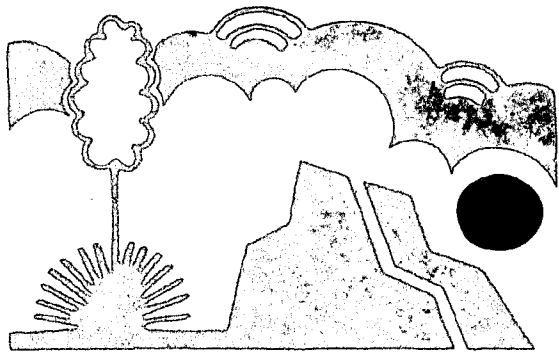

\$490,000 boost

Commissioners increase county property taxes

Lincoln County property owners will have an increase in their tax bills this year. County commissioners approved an increase of one and three-fourths mill during the July 24 meeting.

According to the resolution for the tax increase, three-fourths mill will be used for solid waste disposal, 13/16 mill will be used for the road department, and 3/16 mill will be for economic development for the county.

New landfill regulations will cause the cost of operating a landfill to increase substantially. The three-fourths mill is expected to bring in \$210,000 in revenue with the money to be used for the creation, operation, and maintenance of a sanitary waste system of collection and disposal.

The 13/16 mill for the road department is expected to yield \$227,500. This money is to be used to purchase new road equipment and for maintenance of the county road system.

The 3/16 mill for economic development will generate \$52,500 which will go for the ongoing operation of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDC/LC). Commissioners asked that an EDC representative attend commission meetings quarterly to answer questions the commission may have. In addition, the commission is asking for a quarterly financial statement from EDC.

The total one and three-fourth mill is expected to bring in an additional \$490,000 in revenue for the year.

In other business, com-

missioners Karon Petty and Rick Simpson said they wanted the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission to have the authority to accept or reject requests instead of the procedure used at this time. As it is now, requests go before the P&Z and once accepted by the P&Z the request goes before the county commission.

Petty and Simpson want P&Z to have the authority and to use the county commission only in the event of a request of an appeal of a decision made by the P&Z.

Former county commissioner Bill Elliott objected to the proposal. "They (P&Z) are just an advisory board to you," Elliott said. "You guys are elected to take the heat."

Petty and Simpson also wanted to eliminate the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority which is the board making final decisions in the

extraterritorial zone. Requests must be approved by the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission before going before the ET Authority.

Instructions were given to the county manager to proceed with checking into the procedure required for changing the ordinance and advertising for public hearings.

A certificate of appreciation will be presented to Robert Finley for serving on the Lincoln County Lodger's Tax Committee from March 25, 1986 to June 26, 1989.

Approval was given to minor changes in the joint powers agreement between Lincoln County, Chaves County and the Department of Finance and Administration for the Mescalero water suit.

Authority was given to the county manager to negotiate with an attorney to proceed with formal legal steps on delinquent properties in the Alto Paving Assessment District.

Treasurer Shirley Goodloe said letters of final notice have been sent concerning delinquent accounts asking for payment in full or arrangements for payments to be made.

Money received in any court action against delinquent accounts in the Alto Paving District will be used to retire bonds. Goodloe said the county is well ahead of the bond redemption schedule.

Negotiations may be with the county attorney or another attorney more familiar with the problems and may include a contract for the attorney to do the work for the legal fees that will be assessed.

The county landfill commission recommended the county negotiate to transport solid waste out of the county as a temporary solution while the county makes arrangements to meet requirements for compliance with the new landfill regulations.

The process to locate land suitable for a landfill and do the research necessary to comply with the new regulations could take three to five years. Dr. Bernhard E.F. Reimann, chairman of the landfill committee, presented the recommendations.

When asked why the long delay in receiving permits for landfills from the state, Gary McCaslin said the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Division office in Santa Fe has three people to process applications. McCaslin is the district manager of the EID office in Roswell.

Commissioners instructed the county manager to continue to gather

Upper Hondo SW&CD wins grand award

The Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District and the Sierra Soil and Water Conservation District are grand award winners in the 42nd annual Goodyear Conservation Awards Program.

The two New Mexico districts were among the 100 top prize winners in the competition sponsored by the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company in cooperation with the National Association of Conservation Districts.

An independent judging committee of state agricultural leaders selected the winners on the basis of the districts' accomplishments in soil and water conservation.

Each district will be represented by a member of the board on the grand awards tour, an all-expense paid vacation study trip in December to the Wigwam Resort in Litchfield Park, AZ. They will be joined by representatives of the other winning districts from throughout the United States.

Upper Hondo supervisors in the Hondo district voted to have Shirley Goodloe, chairman of the district, represent them in Litchfield Park. Goodloe was selected the "Outstanding Supervisor" for her hard work and dedication to the Upper Hondo district.

The grand award-winning districts will also receive plaques recognizing their achievements in presentations at a meeting of the New Mexico Association of Conservation Districts. In

addition, plaques will be presented to the outstanding cooperators selected in all of the competing districts in the state.

The Upper Hondo district was organized as a local unit of the state government on June 27, 1941 and covers more than 1 million acres of land in Lincoln and Chaves counties and provides services to more than 200 landowners.

Seven supervisors represent the Upper Hondo dis-

trict. Goodloe is chairman, Clem Weindorf is vice-chairman, Ernest McDaniel is secretary-treasurer, and members are Gabriel Sanchez, John Cooper, Fred Pfingsten and Paul Jones. Meetings are held the first Thursday of each month at the Soil Conservation office in Capitan at 7 p.m.

The district has given highest priority to stream-bank protection, brush and

Pony Express Race is Saturday, August 5

The annual Lincoln County Pony Express Race is Saturday, Aug. 5.

The race begins two miles east of Capitan at the Capitan gap road and ends at White Oaks, approximately 38 miles away. Starting time for the race is 8 a.m.

The White Oaks Bar has an auction and dance set for Friday night beginning at 7 p.m. A barbecue is scheduled for Saturday afternoon and another dance Saturday night.

The Ft. Stanton Post Office is responsible for a special cancellation for pony express letters.

The Lincoln County Pony Express committee has a special pictorial cachet envelope for sale for \$2. These envelopes may be obtained in Capitan at the El Paisano

Restaurant, Smokey Bear Museum and B&L Pizza Parlor. These envelopes may also be found at the Four Winds Restaurant in Carrizozo and Merle Normans in Ruidoso.

The envelopes must be dropped in a special box at the place they were purchased by the morning of Aug. 4 in order to be carried by the pony express. A special seal will be placed on these letters.

Those choosing to use their own envelopes should leave a dollar in their unsealed envelope and place this envelope in one of the designated boxes.

McSwane said Tenny was arrested as a result of surveillance at Bonito Lake. A search was conducted at Tenny's residence and other items were found that may lead to his involvement with 28 burglaries and larcenies at Bonito Lake between June 26 and July 22.

Judge Dean has set a tentative preliminary hearing date for July 28.

Mineral recovery lease not renewed

Carrizozo trustees agreed at the July 25 meeting to not renew the town's lease with American Mineral Recovery Inc. in the form the lease was presented.

Trustees had concerns about the lease when it was first presented in June. The matter was referred to attorney Don Dutton.

The town's lease with American Mineral Recovery for six acres of town property has been in effect since 1979 with annual renewals. Trustees researched the matter before deciding not to renew the lease in its present form.

In other business during the July 25 meeting, trustees discussed August meeting dates. The Aug. 8 and Aug. 22 meetings were cancelled. Trustees will meet Aug. 15 at 6 p.m. to conduct town business for the month.

David Pacheco asked trustees about purchasing two lots the town owns on Birch Street. Certain procedures are required by the state before the town can sell real property. The town will pursue the matter.

Agreement for grant of pipeline easement between the town and Stephenson Ranch, Inc. was approved to provide water services for the citizens of the town. The water lines from the water storage tank go across Ste-

phenson property and in return Stephenson has two domestic water taps for watering of livestock only. The matter is not to be used for personal, agriculture, farm or other personal uses whatsoever.

The town has renewed the contract with Waste Management for solid waste removal contingent on request for proposals being received in September for residential solid waste removal service.

range management, irrigation systems, and education. These projects are being accomplished through cost-sharing programs and "Project Soil."

Conservation practices applied by cooperators during the 1989 fiscal year include 56 cooperators assisted, 35 cooperators applying practices, 25 plans serviced, four long term contracts for 42,595 acres developed, four units of government assisted, planned grazing systems for 36,369 acres, proper grazing use for 39,166 acres, deferred grazing for 4,583 acres, 1,620 feet of irrigation pipeline installed, and reduced erosion by one ton or more per acre for 59,233 acres.

The Upper Hondo district works closely with the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission to provide assistance in reviewing subdivisions and has Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) with many local, state and federal agencies.

Among the agencies having MOUs with Upper Hondo are the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Bureau of Land Management, Capitan Schools, Army Corps of Engineers, US Forest Service, Lincoln County ASCS Committee, Lincoln County Commissioners, New Mexico State Forestry Department, State Land Office, Soil Conservation Service, and Department of Interior.

Highlights of the district for the fiscal year include nominating teacher Mary Shanks for the Deutz-Alliz award which she won, conducting a watershed inspection on Salado Dam, nominating teacher Mary Shanks for the Earth Team award which she won, signing cooperative agreements with six landowners, planned in depth the best ways to help as many landowners as possible receive the best conservation benefits with mill levy money, and supporting the South Central Mountain RC&D by sponsoring new project measures and attending meetings. Weindorf serves as chairman of the South Central Mountain RC&D.

Another highlight of Upper Hondo is winning the grand award for New Mexico in the Goodyear contest. Upper Hondo has also supported the conservation education project for elementary school students which is called "Project Soil," both financially and technically. Meetings were held with interested teachers, districts, and others to promote the project and kits were purchased.

information and possibly begin negotiations for interim transfer of solid waste from the county and to notify the state the county intends to open a landfill at a later date.

—It was announced Maggie Bohks was hired as the new Emergency Medical Services director and Evelyn McKnight was hired to replace Patsy Oaxaca in the manager's office. Oaxaca resigned and McKnight was one of the applicants for the position at the time Oaxaca was hired. County manager Nick Pappas said it was not necessary to advertise the position again.

—Road superintendent Tommy Hall asked if he could order materials to use on the state highway cooperative, county arterial program, and school bus routes. He was told the county receives the co-op money from the state on a reimbursement basis and often the money is slow in being sent to the county. The regular road depart-

Contrary to public belief, thousands of presidential pardons have been granted over the last 25 years. From 1981 to 1986, 374 convicted criminals have been pardoned by the President of the United States, an average of 62 per year for the six-year period.

But neither former President Reagan nor President Bush seem concerned about issuing a presidential pardon to Lt. Col. Oliver North whose "high crime" was acceptance of a security fence to protect his threatened family.

North lied to congress, Big deal. House Speaker Jim Wright lied to congress. For doing so he was rewarded with a handsome pension, plus several gratuities that will net him more than \$100,000 a year until he dies.

In January 1981 President Carter pardoned Peter Yarrow, a singer with the Peter, Paul and Mary group. His crime was seducing a 14-year-old girl in a motel room in 1970.

Another convicted communist, Liana Haberman, worked inside the US government as a communist agent. She was caught, convicted and sent to prison.

Other convicted criminals found worthy of receiving presidential pardons include Frederick Stiles, trafficking in machine guns; Huey Meux, white slavery; Walter O'Hearn, conspiracy and making illegal payoffs to union officials; Jimmy "The Greek" Snyder, interstate transportation of bets and wagering information; George Steinbrenner, illegal corporate political campaign contributions, and thousands of other scumballs.

For performing his sworn duties, Oliver North is not eligible for such generosity and compassion. All he did was serve as a White House aide in confronting terrorists who have murdered and held hostage American citizens.

There seems to be a conspiracy among communists, leftists, and liberals to malign anything connected with the military. Watch congress. When more money is needed for welfare and domestic programs, the military budget is cut.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Watch out for some of the candidates announcing for next year's political contests. They may be more than they appear—or less.

Candidates will sometimes announce for a high office, such as governor, and then drop back before the early March filing date and run for a lesser office. In 1986, Santa Fe attorney Frank Andrews spent a year running for governor and then dropped down to the attorney general race.

Andrews, by the way, has left the state, at least temporarily, to become a top executive with a Portland, OR firm that is on the leading edge of the computerized bank form business, nationally. It had been an Andrews speciality. He also took another promi-

nent New Mexican with him. Former secretary of state Clara Jones is now Mrs. Andrews and works for the mayor of Portland, who reportedly entertains gubernatorial ambitions.

There is much guessing around the Capitol that some of the mentioned governor candidates in both parties might end up in the lieutenant governor's race or another contest even lower on the ballot.

Another favorite maneuver for politicians is to file for an office that controls a number of jobs, such as governor, attorney general, secretary of state or land commissioner, and then drop out when there appears to be an obvious primary election winner.

The departing candidate then pledges his or her support to the eventual winner and often picks up a cushy job in the next administration.

Defense Department offers free vocational training

Students approaching graduation frequently wonder what they will do with their futures. There are thousands of jobs to choose from, but what is the individual best suited to do? What does he or she want to do? With all the possibilities, how does one decide?

A solution to discovering one's strong points and aptitudes is offered by the Department of Defense. It's called the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) of tests. The tests provide clear insight into one's talents. It requires about three hours to complete and costs the individual nothing.

The tests identify strengths and weaknesses, suitability for college programs or majors, and career areas for which the student is best qualified.

Although military members administer the battery of tests and act as proctors, there is no military obligation incurred by those taking the tests.

Why take the ASVAB? It's free, takes only three hours, and can point the way into the future. With the results of the battery in hand, a student can plan for the future with a firm grasp of his or her capabilities.

Along with the testing package, the student receives a workbook and an occupational chart. The workbook explains career areas and the occupational interests, educational opportunities, and the military option.

Once a student has completed the chart, some difficult questions regarding the future can easily be

answered. The chart is simple, easy to understand, and tells the student at a glance where his or her best choices are.

The ASVAB tests are offered at most high schools at least once per year. Testing is encouraged for juniors and seniors, although sophomores also are eligible. Seniors are, of course, the target audience, since their future may hang in the balance.

Students who leave school without having taken the ASVAB are not giving themselves the best chance to choose future occupations. With the ASVAB results in hand, one knows the avenues to pursue toward a successful future.

Since they have budgeted less money for per diem for the 89/90 year than a year would cost if they continued to meet at the current rate, I assume they believe that when they get the garbage problem in hand, it won't take as many meetings.

It is hard to argue the immediacy of the landfill issues and hiring a new manager, \$47 per meeting less per diem doesn't sound wasteful to me.

From the listing of activities I took out all the common items from the two commission comparisons. This leaves the activities that were unique to each one. The current commission's unique activities were: hired new county manager, radios installed, Lincoln County Medical Center Board meetings, rural addressing workshop and the landfill. The previous commission had unique listings of: SBAC meetings, grievance hearings, economic development meetings, personnel meetings, litigation update, court hearings. In my opinion, the current commission's list contain more constructive items.

I would like to publically thank our current commissioners and county manager for the dignified and professional manner they are conducting our county business. I believe they truly have the taxpayer's interest at heart.

Lesley Stahl is the White House news all-star for this year. TV Guide's judges included three woman media professionals: Susan Peterson, a former CBS and NBC correspondent who runs a media consulting firm in Washington, DC; Christine Craft, news anchor at KRBK-TV, Sacramento; and Linda Ellerbee, CNN commentator and syndicated columnist.

In his Quill report "While S&Ls were robbed, the press watch dogs slept," Cohen said that confronting a journalist or editor about the S&L story you would be told people won't read complicated stories.

Cohen notes, "Press historians and critics may puzzle over such attitudes. They may recall the journalists of yesterday, honored for exposing the Credit Mobilier railroad financing scheme, the Tweed Ring in New York, and the Teapot Dome oil scam. If yesterday's journalists could arouse semi-literate farmers, why should today's journalists, with all their training and technology, be ineffective with com-

plex stories?"

REQUIRED BY LAW

Will Lee in his Independent Free Press column "Cracker Barrel" says, "I've never really understood why a normal, intelligent, successful businessman can — when elected to public office — become a flaming idiot. It seems to happen at all levels of government — city, state, and federal — and the idiots so far outnumber the few who retain their common sense in these respective legislative bodies what very little good ever comes out of their collective activities."

high school. It was located where the fairgrounds is located today. It was composed of brick and native limestone and completed in time for the agricultural college of Las Cruces to hold normal school for teachers the summer of 1913.

The following schools are non-existent today but at one time were part of the Capitan School System—Lincoln Schools; Lincoln, Government Springs School, Chaves and Baca Canyon School. Capitan Schools—Capitan Gray District 28 proper, North-Coalora, Tucson, Capitan Gap and Ft. Stanton. Bonita Schools—Angus, Henley, Monjeau, Parsons-

Robinson and Negal Mesa. Alto Schools—Alto, Old Rhodes or Gámere, Little Creek, Jones Parochial School. North side or the Capitan Mountains—Meeks, Bethel, Spindle, Richardson, Encinosa, Deseo and Cressview.

The present school colors and mascot were chosen in 1927.

The first 12 students to graduate were Jenny Boone, Maude Bryan, Rosella Carleton, Dora Clements, William Peters, Eunice Skinner, Horton Spillers, Madie Carleton, Mary Fritz, Seth Smith, Ruby Bryan and Warney West.

TV documentary of Billy in process

Todd Robinson, scriptwriter/producer for the Wingspan Production Group, Los Angeles, in cooperation with Public Television KEDT, Corpus Christi, TX is working on a documentary of Billy the Kid, "AKA Billy the Kid."

Robinson, who first became interested in Lincoln County history in 1981, has been working on the project for two and a half years. He is taking a different slant than others have taken, chronicling in broad strokes as accurately as possible Billy's participation in the Lincoln County War.

The treatment of Billy and Pat Garrett by film maker Sam Peckinpah and actors Kris Kristofferson and James Coburn in the movie "Pat Garrett and Billy the Kid" made during the Vietnam War, have Billy representing the exuberance of youth and their lost inno-

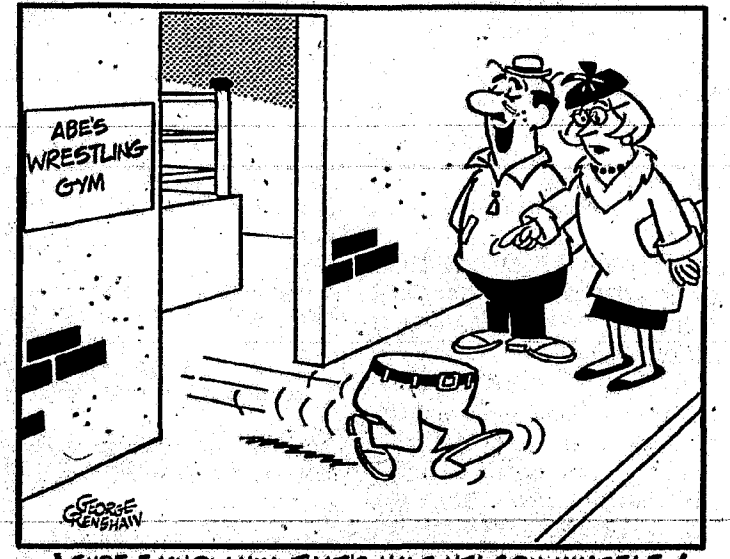

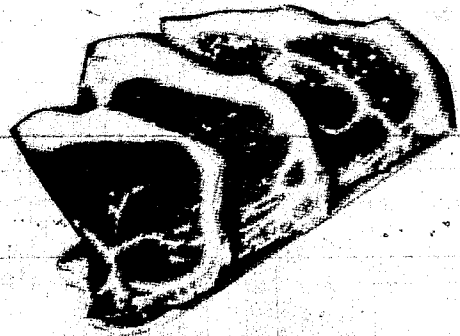

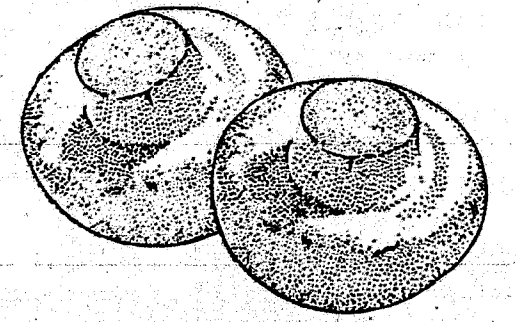
