Commissioners decline to open SBA access road

The Sierra Blanca Airport access road will remain closed until completed by the contractor later this spring.

The decision to keep the road closed was made by the Lincoln County Commissioners during the Jan. 23 meeting of the county commission.

Commissioners had received a request at the Jan. 9 meeting to open the east end of the road temporarily. Bill Vreeke of Bohannon-Houston, engineers for the road project, said it would cost the county \$12,000 for temporary signs and temporary striping if the three-mile portion of the road was opened for traffic.

Commissioners agreed Jan. 9 to table making a decision until the Jan. 23 meeting to allow time for the commissioners to look at the road and visit with the Sierra Blanca Airport manager who

made the request to open the east end of the road.

When the matter was brought up at the Jan. 23 meeting, commissioner Karon Petty said she wanted the county to have core drill samples of the road tested at a private testing facility before the county accepted the road.

County attorney Gary Mitchell explained that testing is being conducted by the engineers and by the state highway department. He suggested the county not open a portion of the road as requested at this time.

"Has there been a request to open it?" Petty asked.

Further discussion was held before commission chairman Bob Hemphill said, "It is not our decision to make. It is not our road to open."

Other business included approving the contract between the Eastern New Mexico Area Agency on

Aging and the senior citizens centers for the centers to receive cash in lieu of commodities.

The senior citizens centers will receive an additional \$6,433.18 instead of receiving commodities.

Sheriff James McSwane presented his new department policy manual. The sheriff's department is the only department in the county that is allowed to have a separate personnel manual.

Mitchell said he had reviewed the manual and the only change he recommended was to remove references to polygraphs. The commission approved the manual by resolution.

The cooperative agreement between the sheriff's department and the forest service was approved. The forest service will pay up to \$20,000 for services provided by the sheriff's department.

Steve Keller, administrator of the Lincoln County Medical Center, requested the release of \$32,500 in hospital mill levy money to purchase X-ray equipment for the hospital.

Commissioners approved the request. The refurbished equipment would have cost \$100,000 to \$110,000 if purchased new.

Appointments were made to standing committees. Tommy Guevara was appointed to the Planning and Zoning Commission, Sue Stearns was appointed to the Carrizozo Health Center Advisory Board, Patsy Vallejos was appointed as the county employee on the Lincoln County Personnel Board, Suzanne Cox was reappointed to the South-eastern New Mexico Economic Development District, Rick Simpson was appointed to the Regional Waste Water Joint Use Board, Bob Hemphill was appointed to the Lincoln County Medical Center board, Simpson was appointed to the Water Defense Association board and Karon Petty was appointed to the Joint Powers Agreement Committee and the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC) board.

Deanna Wright was appointed to the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission. The News asked if the ET member was not supposed to be also a P&Z member.

Petty said the commission was restructuring the county's appointments and since Ben Hall was on both the P&Z and the ET, he would be able to communicate information between the two groups.

No appointments were made to the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board. Commissioners have asked that the county advertise for new nominations for the positions open. Appointments may only be made from the nominations received.

A short executive session was held for possible litigation.

Capitan, Alamogordo are deadlocked over water

An agreement between Capitan and Alamogordo concerning the water situation has not been reached at this time.

Capitan Mayor Benny Coker said a letter was sent to Alamogordo Monday and an answer is expected later this week.

Coker said that the terms offered by Alamogordo were

not acceptable to Capitan. Alamogordo proposed charging 75 cents for every 1,000 gallons of water transmitted through Alamogordo's water lines.

Alamogordo also gave Capitan an ultimatum to "get off the Alamogordo water line" in three years but will consider extending that to five years if Capitan is in the process of constructing its

own water line from Eagle Creek. Five years is the maximum length of time Alamogordo wants to allow.

Capitan has had an agreement with Alamogordo since 1957 concerning the water. Capitan has paid a transmission fee for the Eagle Creek water to go through the Bonito Lake water lines owned by Alamogordo.

The water was metered as it entered the pipeline and again when it left the pipeline near Capitan. Capitan received a credit for water not used and this credit was put toward higher water usage during other months.

The 32-year agreement was a "right of easement of flow" which is different than a contract. The agreement allowed Capitan to pay a transmission fee and not to pay for the water itself.

A problem arose last summer when Alamogordo sent Capitan a bill for the water used. In October Alamogordo completely cut off the Eagle Creek water supply to Capitan by removing a major valve. Capitan claims this damaged the filter facility.

Coker said the 75 cents per 1,000 gallons transmission fee is too high and Capitan is trying to work out some kind of agreement with Alamogordo. If an agreement between the two entities is not reached, Capitan has asked for some type of mediation to help the two municipalities reach an agreement.

Capitan has relied on the Eagle Creek water to supply water for the town until the new well was drilled and the storage tank was completed in 1987.

Alamogordo has claimed that Capitan uses Bonito Lake water in excess of the Eagle Creek water. The Bonito water and Eagle Creek water mix while in the line and the only record of the amounts of water Capitan has received have been through the metering systems.

Carrizozo school board

Input being received for evaluating superintendent

The Carrizozo Board of Education met in executive session Jan. 18 to take information from staff members for evaluation of the superintendent.

The closed session was held the hour before the regular school board meeting.

Input was received from teachers, one each from elementary, mid-school and high school, aides, student body, secretaries, and People for Kids (PFK). The information received will be compiled by the board for their own use.

During the open meeting, the board congratulated Leah Patterson for making a 30 on the ACT test. Less than one percent of those taking the ACT nationwide score 30 or better. The board will send a letter of congratulations to Patterson.

Supt. Danny Burnett reported the school will conduct a needs assessment that will be used by the state for an in-depth evaluation later this year. A consultant from Cooperative Educational Services (CES) will come to Carrizozo to do the needs assessment.

Burnett said the consultant will invite 50 to 75 couples from the community to participate by giving information. All oral and written information will be compiled. CES will charge \$400 for conducting the needs assessment and compiling the information.

The board instructed Burnett to proceed with the matter. Burnett said when completed, the needs assessment will be adequate for 10 years, with annual updates.

Burnett presented Section 100 of the board policy revision. The board will study the section and consider adopting it at the February meeting. Additional sections will be presented to the board each month for review.

EPA to involve public in waste problems

Ellen D. Greeney of the Environmental Protection Agency in Dallas, TX will be at the Lincoln County Courthouse Jan. 31 at 10 a.m. to answer questions on the Superfund study of the Cimarron Mill site near Carrizozo.

The mill site was added to the Superfund National Priorities List (NPL) because of potentially hazardous waste materials that were found at the site in 1984.

Greeney will explain the Superfund Technical Assistance Grant, who may apply, and when the applications are due. An understanding of the technical issues concerning the hazardous waste site helps citizens provide thoughtful, informed comments to government decision-makers considering proposed Superfund actions.

The EPA will make an attempt to involve the public in the investigation which could take 18 months to two years to complete.

Financial aid workshop for students

Carrizozo High School will be sponsoring a Financial Aid Workshop for seniors and their parents or guardians.

Purpose of the workshop is to provide information on the availability of financial aid for students planning to go to a college or vocational/technical school this coming fall.

Another aspect of the workshop is that help will be provided in completing the proper forms. Parents of students returning to college are also invited to attend. Students from other area high schools are invited also.

Any student who wants to pursue a college or a vocational/technical education and needs financial assistance should make every effort to attend this workshop.

Hazardous materials found in county

Five barrels containing a suspicious substance were discovered in a culvert 10 miles south of Corona Tuesday.

New Mexico State Police officer Dennis Brown was notified of the discovery at 7:15 a.m., Jan. 24. He said three of the 55-gallon barrels were leaking.

Initial tests conducted by the ITC team from Albuquerque showed that two barrels contained sulphuric compounds and the other three barrels contained a flammable oil-based material.

The personnel conducting the test wore protective clothing while handling the barrels and conducting tests.

Brown said there was no visible ground contamination but the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) from Santa Fe was to take soil samples Wednesday. The soil will be tested for possible ground contamination.

The barrels have been removed from the scene and the state police will continue investigation into the ownership of the barrels.

EPA representative to meet with trustees

Ellen D. Greeney of the Environmental Protection Agency in Dallas, TX will be at Carrizozo City Hall Monday, Jan. 30 at 4 p.m. to answer questions on the Superfund study of the Cimarron Mill site near Carrizozo.

Town trustees will meet in special session at 4 p.m. to coincide with the question-and-answer period. Greeney will explain the technical assistance grant, who may apply, and when the application is due.

The announcement of the Jan. 30 special meeting was made during the regular town council meeting Jan. 24. No business was conducted Jan. 24 because there were only two trustees and the mayor present.

Announcements: the town had written a job description for deputy clerk and will advertise for the position. Closing date for appli-

cations is Feb. 16. Trustees plan to take action on hiring a person at the Feb. 21 meeting or the March 14 meeting.

Mayor Bob Hemphill announced that Tommy Escamilla and Danny Culley have been installing house numbers in the town. Trustees agreed to reimburse them for the gas they have used in driving to install the house numbers.

Hemphill received a letter from the census bureau designating the town's boundary lines. The census will be conducted in 1990.

Capitan student invited to Special Olympics

Delaine Fredekind, a special education student in the Capitan Elementary School, will be going to Lake Tahoe in California to participate in the International Special Olympic Games. The event takes place in April.

Delaine's name was submitted 18 months ago and was chosen from a large list of students who applied. He

was selected on the basis of his skiing ability and participation in the local and state special Olympic program. Delaine and 27 other athletes will represent New Mexico. All of the 50 states and 70 countries will have participants.

Money is being raised to finance the trip. His father will accompany him and possibly Mr. and Mrs. Gary Daniel, his coach and teacher.

The A-Frame Ski Shop in Ruidoso will furnish skiing equipment for special education students. Those wishing to help finance this project can call 257-5046, see Mrs. Daniel at Capitan Elementary School or go by the A-Frame Ski Shop on Mechem in Ruidoso.

Mrs. Daniel told the News the administration and the board of education of the Capitan Schools had been very supportive of the special Olympic program.

Mrs. Daniel said six other Capitan students will be participating in the handicapped ski program at Ski Apache, and in the New Mexico winter special Olympics in February.

The News learned that the special education program at the Capitan Elementary School consists of 14 students with one fulltime teacher and one fulltime aide. There is also a program for 3- and 4-year-olds staffed by another teacher.

There are two fulltime teachers at the high school level teaching for the special education program.

The public hearing for input for the Community Development Block Grant program and suggestions as to what the town should apply for was held. One letter was received from Eugenia Vega, Hal Sims contacted the mayor, and one person in the audience gave input. All recommendations were for the town to apply for more street paving.

No decisions were made by trustees. The input was for information only. Public hearings will be held for more public input before the application is submitted.

The town received a letter from New Mexico Attorney General Hal Stratton stating that lease-purchase contracts create unconstitutional debts unless approved by the voters. This does not affect the town's current lease-purchase of the new fire truck but could affect future purchases.

Waste Control contacted the mayor and asked for changes in the contract. Hemphill will have further information at the next meeting.

Eight of the Carrizozo Volunteer Firemen attended the First Responder Class presented by the Emergency Medical Services (EMS). This makes the town eligible for state EMS Dollar for Life funding.

Crystal Lueras is EMT for January

Crystal Lueras of Corona is EMT of the month for January.

She volunteered to train as a first responder for the Corona Ambulance in 1986 and after further training was certified as EMT-B in 1987.

She works as a health aide at Corona Schools. Her duties include bringing health records of students up to date, conducting visual and hearing screening for the students, screening for scoliosis, and attending to small injuries and illnesses among students.

In addition, Lueras sits on the Corona Village Council and represents Corona on the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDC/LC) board.

Crystal grew up in Corona. She and her husband Charlie have two children, Russel and Angie.

"Crystal is a good example of what every EMT

stands for," said Lincoln County EMS Director Nancy Guck. "She cares, she is energetic and she receives EMT training regularly. She likes people and people like her."

An example of Lueras' giving personality was evident in a letter she received from one of the patients she cared for on an ambulance run. The letter states, "Thanks so much for all your kind ministrations to me after my wreck up in your neck of the woods. You and all your relatives never allowed a moment of doubt to enter my mind as to the proper care and consideration I was receiving, and I will love you forever."

Crystal said, "I wanted to be an EMT because I like helping people. It's even more rewarding than I thought it would be." She added, "Lincoln County has a good organization, and I am proud to be a part of it."

New Mexico leads nation in pedestrian fatalities

New Mexico led the nation in motor vehicle-pedestrian deaths during 1987, a state Highway and Transportation Department official said.

The state's rate was 6.27 per 100,000 population. The national rate was 2.77 deaths per 100,000 population.

The figures came from a report compiled by the National Fatal Accident

Reporting System (FARS), John Fenner, chief of the department's traffic safety bureau, said. The FARS report also included data on motorcyclist and bicyclist fatalities.

The report said that New Mexico ranked seventh in motorcyclist fatalities, with 2.33 deaths per 100,000 population compared to a national rate of 1.66. In bicyclist fatalities, the state fared slightly better, ranking seventeenth. The state's death rate was .40 deaths per 100,000 population while the national average for bicyclists was .39.

Each state has a FARS contract with the federal Department of Transportation. The states collect the statistics on fatal motor vehicle crashes and forward it to Washington, DC for consolidation and analysis, Fenner said.

The board approved adjusting the budget on bus No. 1 due to change from being school owned to contractor owned. Steve Gore bought the bus from the school and is now responsible for expenses of the bus.

The board approved accepting the low quote from Woodworkers Supply of New Mexico for new woodworking shop equipment. Vo ag teacher Mike Gaines explained the tools purchased will be reputable brand names and are used by most industrial arts programs in schools in the state.

The school board election will be held Feb. 7. The board will meet again Feb. 21.

After the meeting adjourned, the board met with staff members for more information for evaluation of the principal.

● **Bring Back The Pony Express:** The Dec. 23, 1988 issue of the Washington Inquirer, a newspaper to which we subscribe, was delivered to our post office in Carrizozo promptly on Jan. 13, 1989... only 26 days after it was mailed in Washington, DC.

● Last week blacks rioted in the Liberty City and Overtown communities of Miami. Buildings and cars were burned, stores looted, and heads cracked. It was the fourth such outbreak in the last decade. As a general rule, when blacks are frustrated and angry, they burn and loot their communities. The latest Miami outbreak was triggered when a Hispanic police officer shot a fleeing black motorcyclist. If the motorcyclist had been shot by a white police officer the same riot would probably have ensued. Had the motorcyclist been shot by a black man, it would not have mattered. Blacks are noted for killing their own. But for a member of another race to do so ranks with high treason. One might call that inbred racism, which it is.

● Refugees from Cuba, Haiti, Nicaragua, El Salvador, Honduras and other Hispanic countries have been fleeing to the US, and particularly to the Miami area, to escape persecution and hard times at home. They are hard workers. They take the lowest menial jobs, support their families, save their money, and are more likely to go into business for themselves.


● Blacks, according to one black woman state senator for Florida, won't take those menial jobs. She says they believe they deserve better, higher-paying jobs, and that they resent Hispanics coming in and "doing well" where they don't. They believe they are entitled to those better jobs because they have been here longer and regard Hispanic as interlopers taking over their territory. In short, they don't believe it's fair to have to work hard and start at the bottom any more.

● According to the same state senator, many blacks are unwilling to qualify themselves for those better jobs, whereas Hispanics realize that is the only way for them to survive in their new country. They see the opportunity and they seize it. They are found in night classes that teach English and basic skills. They literally exhaust themselves between work, caring for their families, and learning English and basic skills. Blacks, on the other hand, are seldom found in literacy classes and enrolled in basic skill classes—both of which are to be found in every community in the United States and which are paid for by government and private agencies. In other words, Hispanics take advantage of their opportunities for self-fulfillment and blacks do not. Blacks resent the effort of these Hispanics, especially when they see those efforts paying off. This resentment, according to the senator and others close to the issue, is what sparked the riot in Miami this time.

● Blacks, whites, orientals and Hispanics are not entitled to jobs simply by being here. There is no constitutional guarantee of any standard of living, no guarantee of housing, no guarantee of food. Further, there are no laws under the US Constitution that guarantee such basics. What we have is a monumental governmental effort to provide opportunity to all persons, regardless of race, to better themselves and thus provide for their survival. There is no right, only opportunity. Ignore the opportunity and one is dead in the water, regardless of race. If a black wants to be a brickmason, a journalist, or a bank president he does what all brickmasons, journalists, and bank presidents do. He seizes the opportunity to educate himself to the level required of each profession; he learns the skills necessary to each. Such training appears unacceptable to too many. They think they can achieve by rioting and looting rather than by sacrifice, dedication, study and hard work. It may take a long time for this to sink in, but until it does there can be no fully racially integrated society in this country.

● Gathered on the David Brinkley Show Sunday were George Will, Sam Donaldson, Carl Rowan, and other people generally credited with knowing what goes on in this country. The question was raised: "Will President Bush raise taxes?" It was unanimously agreed that Bush will raise taxes. Bush will NOT raise taxes. Bush CANNOT raise taxes even if he wanted to. Only Congress can raise taxes. Please, pay no attention to these pundits, or to me for that matter. Turn to Art. 1, Sec. 8 of the US Constitution: "The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes..." Now do you understand, the President of the United States has nothing to do with levying taxes, or spending the money collected. The president can only recommend; Congress takes the action, if it pleases to do so.

● **Worse.** Someone wanted the panel's opinion as to how Bush will handle the national deficit. They all agreed Bush would have to raise taxes (which he cannot) as well as trim domestic programs (which he cannot do because only Congress can do that). Then arose a question as to what kind of a budget Bush will present to Congress. Because Congress passed legislation forcing the president to submit a proposed budget, Bush will do that. Such a budget is merely an indication of what the president would LIKE to have Congress accept. But Congress is under no obligation to give the president anything he asks for in his proposed budget. Congress may, and will, offer any or all parts of that budget which it deems worthy. Then the Congress presents its own budget, which the president must accept in its entirety, or veto it totally. If the president vetoes the budget, Congress can pass it over his veto. Therefore, the president has no control over the budget, except to recommend it. The only responsibility of the president is to the people of the country.



Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—They must be testing us to see how many indignities we are willing to endure.

Sap citizen has been known for ages to be long-suffering. We have become so accustomed to being pushed around by all branches of government that we no longer even whimper. Finally, there must come a time when they go too far.

Two governmental entities are currently testing those limits. We are talking about the courts and the counties.

Last November voters allowed those two groups to hoodwink them right out of their voting booths. As a result of completely dishonest wording, we passed two constitutional amendments that we would never have approved had we understood the question.

It is currently fashionable in the legislature to place propositions on the ballot that don't mean what they say. Not having anything but a cryptic title to guide them, gullible voters have been approving constitutional amendments by the bunches. This time they may have gone too far.

To our discredit, we have approved amendments to "reform" the judicial system and "limit" terms of county officials. What we really did was extend terms of county officials and give away our right to elect all our judges at the state and local levels to the legal fraternity.

For the past month the lawyers have been providing an effort a week to the easily-deceived voters who gave them all this new power. One might think that a group of legal minds might have just a bit of concern

about complying with the requirements of New Mexico's Open Meetings Law as they apply to the commissions that have been created in each judicial district to choose our judges for us. But as panel after panel has met to do its business, the discussions have all been behind closed doors.

Finally, last week a panel member insisted the courage to ask if it might be proper for the newly-formed Bernalillo County judicial nominating commission to at least consider whether it was going to obey the Open Meetings Law. On the advice of panel chairman Ted Farnell, dean of the University of New Mexico Law School, the commission decided to ignore the question.

How far will we have to be pushed before standing up and insisting that government be conducted in public view? Proponents of the "reform" amendment answer that when we gave up our right to elect our judges we also surrendered the right to know why the lawyers are choosing them for us.

The second indignity of the week occurred when the New Mexico Association of Counties informed us that the "limited" terms they sold us on may extend all the way to the end of this century. It seems that not only did we agree to extend the limit on terms from two years to four, that wasn't the only catch. County officials decided that while they were at it they might as well take advantage of an uninformed electorate in a couple other ways.

The amendment says, "All county officers, after having served two consecutive four-year terms shall be ineligible to hold any county

office for two years thereafter." The amendment became effective immediately, unlike the one granting state officials two consecutive four-year terms, which had to be postponed four years in order to pass.

County officials' secret intent when they sold us the bill of goods was that it will apply to them even if they have already served the two consecutive two-year terms the previous constitution provided. That means that county officers who have already served four years can run again in 1990 because they will be under a new constitutional provision.

Further, the amendment provides that the secretary of state shall determine by lot which county officials will run for four-year terms in 1990 and which will have two-year terms in order to provide for staggering. In this case, a candidate will want to draw the short two-year term because he or she can run for two four-year terms after that.

Count it up. A county officer elected in 1986 can serve until the year 2000. The worst-case scenario, under the county officials' plot, is that a person elected in 1988 will be able to stay in office until 1998 if he or she is unlucky enough to draw a four-year term next year.

Did you hear supporters of those amendments talking about these things before we approved them?

Now that we know, do you think it might be time to fight back and ask your legislators to allow us to undo these indignities at the next election?

responsible for the national budget? Is there a conspiracy to lead the American people to hold the president the scapegoat instead of members of Congress? Probably.

\$172 million for area highway construction

Highway construction plans for southeastern New Mexico call for the expenditure of \$172,081 million over a five-year period from July 1989 through June 1994.

These projections are contained in the state Highway and Transportation Department's \$965,767 million Five Year Construction Plan approved by the New Mexico State Highway Commission at its meeting Jan. 20. Department Secretary Dewey Lonsberry said.

Eight counties are included in District 2 which is headquartered in Roswell. Construction expenditures by county are: Chaves \$16,597 million; Curry \$23,957 million; DeBaca \$2,000 million; Eddy \$37,968 million; Lea \$15,074 million; Lincoln \$38,100 million; Otero \$21,030 million and Roosevelt \$23,310 million. Lonsberry said.

The Five Year Plan is revised each year based on an annual review of road conditions in each highway district. The plan for the next fiscal year becomes the department's Annual Construction Program and newly proposed construction becomes the 5th year of the plan.

Construction detailed in the plan is contingent on realization of state and federal funding projections. Cost estimates are subject to inflationary factors during the five-year period, he said.

Young Readers' year begins

The Library of Congress had designated 1989 as the "Year of the Young Reader." This year-long event is designed to recognize young readers and the librarians and teachers who serve their needs.

Julia Hollis, Carrizozo School Librarian, has explained the program to the students and presented each of them with a "Year of the Young Reader" bookmark.

Hollis announced the RIF (Reading is Fun) program will begin early in February. Students in kindergarten through 4th grade will each receive a free book. The books are provided through joint funding from the school and federal government.

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RESOLUTION AND PROCLAMATION OF REGULAR SCHOOL DISTRICT ELECTION AND SCHOOL BOND ELECTION

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Captain Municipal School District No. 28 (herein the "Board" and the "District," respectively), in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, has determined that a Regular School District Election and School Bond Election, (herein, the "Election") be held on February 7, 1989, pursuant to Sections 1-22-1 through 1-22-19 NMSA 1978; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that two (2) positions on the Board are to be filled at such Election by submitting to the qualified electors of the District the names of candidates qualified to appear on the ballot for election to the positions to be filled; and

WHEREAS, the persons who desire to fill such positions on the Board shall be required to file declarations of candidacy or declarations of intent to be a write-in candidate, all in accordance with Sections 1-22-1 et seq., NMSA 1978; and

WHEREAS, the Board of the District has determined upon its own initiative to submit to a vote at said Election, the question of the issuance of its general obligation bonds in the maximum amount and for the purpose hereinafter specified, as permitted by Section 22-19-23 NMSA 1978, and the Bond Election Act; and

WHEREAS, neither the bond question herein submitted nor any other bond question has been defeated by the voters of the District at a bond election held within a period of two years from the date of the Election hereinafter set forth;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE CAPTAIN MUNICIPAL SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 28 CONSTITUTING THE GOVERNING BOARD OF SAID DISTRICT, IN THE COUNTY OF LINCOLN AND STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. On the 7th day of February, 1989, there will be held in the Captain Municipal School District No. 28, Lincoln County, New Mexico, a regular school district election for the purpose of submitting names of candidates for the positions to be filled on the Board to the qualified electors of the District and for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the District the question of creating a debt by the issuing of general obligation bonds.

Section 2. There shall be one Voting District for this Election consolidating all of the general election precincts in the District, with the polling place to be as follows: Lincoln County Fair Building Captain, New Mexico. In addition, there will be an Absentee Voter District established, as described in Section 10 herein.

Section 3. The polls for said election will be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on the day of the Election.

Section 4. At such Election, the following at-large positions on the Board shall be filled by the qualified electors of the District, to-wit:

Position 1: for a four-year term starting March 1, 1989; and Position 2: for a four-year term starting March 1, 1989.

Section 5. A declaration of candidacy for membership on the Board to be filled at the Election shall be filed with the County Clerk of Lincoln County, the proper filing officer, during the period commencing at 9:00 a.m., December 20, 1988, being the third Tuesday in December, and ending at 5:00 p.m. on the same day, pursuant to Section 1-22-7, NMSA 1978.

Section 6. In making a declaration of candidacy, the candidate for membership on the Board shall submit a sworn statement of intent in substantially the form provided in Section 1-22-8, NMSA 1978.

Section 7. A person who desires to be a write-in candidate for membership on the Board at such Election shall file with the County Clerk of Lincoln County a declaration of intent to be a write-in candidate before 5:00 p.m. on January 3, 1989, being the thirty-fifth day preceding the date of the election.

Section 8. At such Election, the following question shall be submitted to such qualified, registered electors of the District:

GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND QUESTION "Shall the Board of Education of the Captain Municipal School District No. 28, County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, be authorized to issue general obligation bonds of the District, in

one series or more, in the aggregate principal amount of not exceeding \$1,825,000, for the purpose of erecting a middle school and/or remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings and purchasing or improving school grounds or any combination of these purposes, said bonds to be payable from general (ad valorem) taxes and to be issued and sold at such time or times upon such terms and conditions as the Board may determine?"

Section 9. A person is a qualified elector of the District if he or she is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age on the day of the Election and a resident of the District on the day of the Election. In order to vote, qualified electors of the District must have previously registered with the County Clerk of Lincoln County in accordance with law. Any qualified elector of the District who is not now registered and who wishes to vote at such Election should register during regular office hours prior to 5:00 p.m. on January 10, 1989, being the twenty-eighth day immediately preceding the Election at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, at the County Courthouse in Carrizozo, New Mexico, or at the office of any deputy registration officer appointed by the County Clerk of Lincoln County (which may include the municipal clerks of all municipalities in Lincoln County).

Section 10. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner authorized by 1-6-1 et seq., NMSA 1978, provided, however, that pursuant to Section 1-22-19 NMSA 1978, qualified electors may also vote absentee in person at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County during the regular hours and days of business from 8:00 a.m., January 13, 1989, being the twenty-fifth day preceding the Election, until 5:00 p.m., February 3, 1989, being the Friday immediately prior to the date of the Election.

Section 11. Voting shall be by voting machine, except for absentee voting which shall be by paper ballot. At least one voting machine shall be used at the polling place for each Voting District.




