Grand jury indicts seven

Seven people were indicted by the Lincoln County Grand Jury Feb. 22. Galloway Millage of Alamogordo was indicted on trafficking cocaine, a 3rd degree felony punishable by nine years in prison and/or \$10,000 fine, and conspiracy to traffic, a 3rd degree felony with a penalty of up to three years in prison and/or \$5,000 fine.

Alvaro Galiano Perez of Alamogordo was indicted on eight counts, including trafficking cocaine and trafficking heroin, conspiracy and distribution of marijuana, all second, third and fourth degree felonies.

Milton Norris, Ruidoso, was indicted for criminal sexual contact of a minor under age 18 but at least 13 years of age, a third degree felony.

Floyd L. Hess Jr., Colorado City, CO, was indicted on six counts including embezzlement over \$250 but less than \$2,500 for attempting to convert to his own use a 1982 Subaru station wagon with a market value over \$250. The penalty is up to one year imprisonment and/or \$1,000 fine. Hess was also indicted on charges of issuing worthless checks.

Christine Breuninger was indicted for fraudulent refusal to return a leased vehicle, a charge that carries a basic sentence of 18 months imprisonment and/or \$5,000 fine.

David Earl Swift, Carrizozo, was indicted on two counts for transporting and/or possessing a firearm while having been convicted of a felony within the preceding 10 years. The charge carries a basic sentence of 18 months in prison and/or \$5,000 fine.

Enrique "Rickey" Porras was indicted for conspiracy to distribute marijuana, a 4th degree felony with a penalty of up to 18 months in prison and/or \$5,000 fine.

Residents testify for HB 400

Ralph Dunlap, Dan Bell and Marcia Hefker testified before the House Taxation and Revenue Committee in Santa Fe Feb. 24.

Rep. Paul Harrington introduced HB 400 asking for \$270,000 for improvements to the Lincoln County fairgrounds.

The committee asked why this could not be financed through general obligation bonds, the county gross receipt tax or property tax. The answer was commitments have already been made for these monies.

HB 400 was tabled along with other money bills until the end of the legislative session when the amount of money available will be known and its distribution made.

Dunlap, president of the Lincoln County Fair Board, feels there is good chance for receiving the funds.

County job applications are under consideration

Applications for county manager, road superintendent and legal services were accepted by the Lincoln County Commissioners during the Feb. 27 meeting.

The 20 applications for county manager were from Greg S. Leaf, Pecos; Tom L. Crespino, Truth or Consequences; Joe B. Buchanan, Ruidoso; Noel B. Mauldin, Williamsburg; Virginia A. Spall, Ruidoso; Wilma L. Webb, Ruidoso Downs; Randolph James Forrester, Raton; Robert S. Bell, Roswell; Harold Ray Mansell, Ruidoso Downs; James Stuart Neblett, Aztec; Faustino Abila, Dexter; James T. Alston, Ruidoso; Deanna M. Wright, Ruidoso; Charles F. Kafka, Fort Stanton; Wray L. Simmons, Albuquerque; Lawrence Wayne Brinkley, Capitan; Nick J. Pappas, Roswell; Carl L. Davidson, Albuquerque; Laura M. White, Roswell; and Daniel K. Baker, Tempe, AZ.

The nine applications for road superintendent were from present county road superintendent Tommy Hall, Ruidoso; Frederick Serna, Carrizozo; Fred J. Payton, Capitan; Dennis LeBeau, Roswell; Walter C. Hjalquist, Ruidoso; Jimmy L. Dunn, Lake Arthur; Rodney J. Smith, Roswell; Kenneth D. Staple, Alamogordo; and LeRoy Jack LaMay, Capitan.

The eight applications for legal services were submitted by Bert Atkins, district attorney for the 12th judicial district; Sanders and Fandey, Las Cruces; O'Reilly and Wardlaw, Ruidoso; Harry G. Wilcox Jr., Nogal; Michael Wile, Albuquerque; Hawthorne and Hawthorne, Ruidoso; Parsons and Bryant, Ruidoso; and present county attorney Gary C. Mitchell,

Ruidoso.

Commission chairman Bob Hemphill thanked those who applied for all three positions and said the applications would be taken under advisement and the commission will proceed with interviews as published.

Commissioner Karon Petty said interviews would be held between March 8 and 16 as was stated in the ads. She asked about scheduling a special meeting but no decisions was made for a special meeting.

The News found that the advertisements published for the three positions did not give information about the interviews. The interview information was in packets at the county clerk's office listing general job description and application forms.

No explanation was given as to why the prices for legal services were not announced. The proposals for legal services were to contain the hourly rate for legal services for attorneys, together with a description of the method for charging for fractional portions of an hour, the method for charging for out-of-town county business other than court, the method for charging for out-of-town county business other than court, the method of charging for expenses, i.e., photocopies, long distance calls, mileage, and other such items commonly called expenses in the legal profession, and the hourly rates, if any, charged for staff, secretarial or para-legal services, if any.

Legal services proposals were also to contain a description of the firm's experience in local government, the firm's overall experience and practice, office facilities and support staff resources, familiarity

with the workings of Lincoln County, county government, and a sample contract.

Proposals will be considered on a 100-point scale with 25 points for hourly rate, 25 points allowed for general reputation and experience, 25 points for experience in local government, 15 points for office facility and support staff, and 10 points for specific knowledge of Lincoln County.

County manager applications will be considered on a point basis on education, experience in administration, personnel, budget and fiscal administration, purchasing, civil defense administration, legal, past elected county official, past elected municipal official, state government, business, county government, insurance securities and successfully writing grants and contracts.

According to the packets at the county clerk's office, four applicants will be chosen to be interviewed between March 6-17.

Road superintendent applications will be considered on a point basis with points given for education, experience in administration, personnel, budget, purchasing, equipment maintenance and repair, preparation of road projects and county or state highway work.

Four applicants for road superintendent will be chosen to be interviewed between March 6-17, according to information in the packets at the clerk's office.

In other business, Hubert Quintana, executive director for the Water Defense Association, asked for and received \$5,000 from the county for legal expenses for the final stages of the case

Carrizozo Trustees

Town faces dilemma because of garbage collection costs

Garbage and collection of solid waste was the main topic of the Carrizozo town council meeting Feb. 28.

Sam Sasser, operations manager for Waste Management of Alamogordo, told the council that his company is losing money each month coming to Carrizozo to provide service.

The town is currently paying \$4,190 per month. Sasser asked for an increase of more than \$3,000 per month plus gross receipts tax. In addition to the increase, Sasser said service would be reduced to two pickups per week instead of the present three pickups.

Two of the trips the company makes for Carrizozo each week are for commercial services while the other trip is for residential service.

"Like any other business," Sasser said, "We can't operate at a loss." He offered options to the town that will reduce the cost to the com-

pany. One option is for the company to change from the side-load commercial containers to front load containers and provide commercial pick-up service once a week.

Concerns expressed by the council were that there could be health problems with the overflow and wet garbage sitting for a week. Sasser said that bagging wet garbage would take care of the odor problem. He also said that a handful of moth crystals in the large commercial containers would cut down on odor and help eliminate flies.

Sasser asked for a decision Thursday night about changing to the front-load system and changing containers. The council declined to make a decision until the commercial users were contacted. The matter will be discussed at the March 14 meeting.

Last year the town increased rates for residen-

tial service \$2 per month and changed commercial rates to reflect the size of container and number of times the container was emptied each week.

Mayor Bob Hemphill stated that municipalities with less than 3,000 population are not required to provide garbage service or a landfill.

The council will consider changing from the poly karts for each residence and going to a large container that will hold refuse for six households.

Another option is for the town to purchase equipment and hire another employee and do the refuse pick-up and manage the landfill. This would be expensive since the town will have to include employee benefits and maintenance costs.

Sasser is to furnish further information for the council to consider in making a decision at the March 14 meeting.

Other business included a discussion about the proposed permanent zoning change for an auto repair service and sales trailer court/RV park at the location of the former Little Store at the corner of E Avenue and 8th Street.

The public hearing will be held at 6 p.m. March 14. People in the community can make comment concerning the proposed zoning change during the public hearing. Comments can be made in person or by letter. Letters must be signed to be considered.

Property owners with 100 feet of the property were notified by certified mail as required.

Action on the personnel policy discussion was tabled.

Sheriff's posse searches for evidence in Dudley case

The newly formed Lincoln County Sheriff's Posse was given 16 hours notice for a search north of Capitan, held Feb. 26.

Sheriff James McSwane requested assistance in retracing the tracks left by the Dudley pickup. There seems to be persistent interest in something not found in early searches.

Sixteen men gathered at the Smokey Bear Restaurant in Capitan for coffee then went on to the search area. The sheriff and his group went horseback along the track while others moved the pickups and trailers to the farpoint of the search. Riders spread out and searched carefully over some 30 miles, but nothing new was uncovered.

Assisting McSwane and his three deputies were the

State Police, land owners, and the sheriff's posse. The search ended about 3 p.m. The sheriff stated that although nothing was found they did become better acquainted with the actual scene which will aid them in evaluating past and future information.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Posse was formed Feb. 25 at the Elks Lodge in Ruidoso. Officers were elected and a set of bylaws adopted. Forty-four people paid their dues and became charter members. It is hoped the new service oriented group will become a 100-member organization.

The posse is composed of four units; a parade unit, officer assistance unit, search and rescue unit, and an auxiliary unit. It is open to

any lawabiding resident citizen of Lincoln County, 18 years old and older.

The membership fee is \$10. The general assembly will meet in odd numbered months, first Sunday at 3 p.m. The next meeting will be held Sunday, March 5, 3 p.m., at the sub-station in Ruidoso. Later meetings will be held in different communities around the county.

McSwane said he was deeply appreciative of so much help on such short notice and expressed hope that other folks will give thought to becoming involved with the newly formed sheriff's posse. He said having people from all the communities would keep him in closer contact and would also offer a system of being more currently advised.

infrastructure-streets as the project to apply for in the 1989 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. The priorities will be the same as in the application last year except 5th Street will be deleted because it is being completed this year on a highway co-op project. The intersection of 8th Street and E Avenue is also on the co-op project to be completed this year and will not be listed as a priority on the CDBG application.

—Appointed to the citizen's advisory committee for the CDBG project were Paul Guevara, Patsy Vallejos and Paul Ortiz.

The town will ask the engineer for input to develop the scope and sequence of the project for the proposed CDBG application. The application is due in Santa Fe at 5 p.m. March 17.

—The town must have a fair housing ordinance in place prior to being awarded a CDBG grant. The public hearing for the fair housing ordinance will be held March 14.

—Trustees approved asking for bids for the co-op project for 5th Street and the intersection of E Avenue and 8th Street. Pajo Technical Services is the engineer for the project.

—Hemphill reported that about one-fourth of the house numbers have been installed. Volunteers who were installing the house numbers have other employ-

ment and will be unable to complete the project. Town crews may take one-half day a week to continue the project.

—With concurrence of the trustees, Hemphill appointed trustee Harold Garcia as police commissioner.

—The town received a letter from the school thanking the police for night patrols of the school.

—The school wrote to the town and asked for a letter to be sent to the railroad about hazardous conditions when the trains are stopped on the tracks. Recently the train blocked the tracks and several students crawled under the stopped train on their way to school. The matter will be on the agenda for the March 14 meeting.

—The town received a letter from the state fire marshal stating it is time for the fire budgets.

—Hemphill is to pursue grants that are available for energy assistance for the town. One possible application is lighting for the Little League baseball field and another is the lake at the golf course.

—Janice Christopherson was appointed to the Carrizozo Lodger's Tax Committee and James W. Silva was reappointed to the committee.

—Ruth Hammond read a portion of the State of the State Address made by Gov. Carruthers pertaining to the \$200,000 CDBG grant that was awarded to Carrizozo. The money was loaned to Belco Industries in Carrizozo to help the business. When the money is repaid it will go into the state fund to be re-awarded.

Garcia asked the town to send a letter of congratulations to Capitan Mayor Benny Coker for being elected president of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SENMEDD).

—An executive session was held for pending litigation, real property acquisition and personnel. The town received 24 applications for assistant clerk.

preparation for the quantification phase of the Mescalero section in the water case.

The county will enter into a joint powers agreement with WDA for the services provided. The money will come from the professional services line item in the county budget.

—Barbara Ward of the Zia Senior Citizens Center in Carrizozo, Dorothy Bradley from the senior citizens center in Corona and Frank White and Fred Giesler from the Eastern New Mexico Area on Aging, presented information about the senior citizens centers.

—During the public hearing for input for the county application for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program funds, Hal Sims withdrew his request for funds for a feasibility study for a tourist information center to be built in Carrizozo.

Commissioners agreed to apply for funds for a feasibility study regarding the many aspects related to the recycling of solid waste in the county. The request submitted by Monica O'Reilly representing Environmental Action Group Loving Earth (EAGLE) was the only other request the county received during the first public hearing Feb. 13.

Jerry Wright of Ruidoso asked if someone had opened a recycling center since the request was submitted. Hemphill said the recycling center was opened prior to the request and proceeded to go on with other business when former county commissioner Bill Elliott asked the result of the last motion.

Later in the meeting Elliott questioned a resolution approved for prior year bills. Hemphill and the other commissioners did not know what the bills, amounting to \$22,727.72, were for or if they had been paid.

E.J. Fouratt asked if the county had to pay any penalties or repay any discounts for paying the bills late. The commissioners did not know the answer to either of these questions.

Hemphill told Elliott he would get the information about what the prior year bills were for during a break in the meeting. The information was not presented during the meeting.

—The county will establish a complete count committee comprised of volunteers to help with the 1990 census. Funding cycles are based on the census and it is important for the correct census to be taken.

—A joint powers agreement with the Economic Development and Tourism Department was approved. The county will receive \$886 that will be passed on to the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDC/LC) for economic development in the county.

The money came from House Bill 2 in the 1988 legislature and is distributed to eligible counties according to a funding formula based on population.

—The all-hazard response agreement, was signed between the county, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona and the Mescalero Tribe. All entities have signed the agreement except for the Mescaleros.

—Mike Hainer was appointed to the Lincoln His-

toric Preservation Board as a property owner and Monroy Montes was appointed member-at-large.

—Commissioners approved assessing the soil and water conservation districts 4 percent for administration fees for collecting the assessment and other costs related to the assessment, and distribution of the assessment.

—The amended mid-year budget was approved.

—An executive session was held for personnel and pending litigation.

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

● You had to have been ecstatic at learning in this column last week that the New Mexico Legislature will be designating the tarantula hawk wasp as the state's official insect (aside from certain members of both houses.) Still another surge of intelligence has surfaced. Last week both houses of the legislature, after heated debate, approved the "bizcochito" as the official state cookie. The House version of the bill said the name could be spelled with either a "z" or "s"—bizcochito or biscocchito, according to one's taste. This was unacceptable to the Senate, which amended the bill to allow only one spelling—bizcochito. No one was injured in this struggle, but the outcome is probably the only bipartisan vote to come out of the current session.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—If only our 112 lawmakers could spend the time sitting in their visitors galleries that some of us have logged over the years. Oh, the things they would hear and learn.

Uninitiated, first-time visitors offer some refreshing observations about what needs changing with our system. Some attention to their comments might provide a real boost to legislative public relations.

There is a notion among many that all we've got up here is a bunch of jokers who don't know what they're doing. Nothing could be further from the truth. The problem is that lawmakers are operating under an antiquated system that was designed at statehood.

The invention of copy machines has done marvelous things for the speed and efficiency of the legislature. Before the days of fast copiers, bills had to be read in their entirety before being debated on the floor of the legislature. Obviously, that is no longer necessary. But the rules never got changed.

The casual visitor to the Capitol wonders why so many actions require unanimous consent. Rules are constantly having to be suspended even for the most routine activities. The folks make themselves sound like a bunch of law breakers instead of law makers. The phrase "I ask unanimous consent that the rules be suspended" is uttered dozens of times every day.

There is a solution. The rules could be modernized. It wouldn't be easy. The lingo by which our legislature is run now has a familiar and comfortable ring to lawmakers. The changes to straighten forward legislation through the legislature would be a difficult task. It would require a lot of time and effort. But it is a task that must be undertaken if we are to have a legislature that works for the people.

from the gallery and it obviously doesn't hold lawmakers attention. In fact their inattention to this needless exercise causes great dismay, especially to the many school children in the galleries, who know they would be sent to the principal's office if they were as unruly in school.

This solution might be for the chief clerks of the House and Senate to publish daily lists of bills that have been approved by committees. Reading committee action on every bill serves no useful purpose.

Points of personal privilege also need some clarification. As a freshman senator recently admonished the body, there is no such item in legislative rules. These are points of order and points of parliamentary inquiry. The misuse of points of personal privilege was carried to its extreme recently by the colorful Billy McKibben of Lovington. When Senate President Jack Stahl inquired, "For what purpose does the Senator rise?" McKibben admitted, "To make an inflammatory statement, Mr. President."

Evidently New Mexico's laid-back informality allows a lot more rule breaking than in other state legislatures. Recently a bill to increase cigarette and insurance premium taxes was pulled from committee and passed on the floor of the Senate long before the bill was scheduled for its first committee hearing.

Tobacco and insurance lobbyists staved all evening working up the courage to call their clients and try to explain the amazing thing that had just happened. One of them returned the next morning to his national headquarters and reported that he had just been told that the bill had passed.

It is time to take a hard look at the rules of the legislature. The rules are antiquated and do not reflect the needs of the people. It is time to modernize the rules and make the legislature more efficient and more responsive to the needs of the people.

The lobbyists knew exactly how to posture that stroke of good fortune with their clients. They fell all over each other getting to phones so they could announce they had personally intervened with the governor to get his promise of a veto.

Oh well, maybe we don't want a lot of rules anyhow. It's so much more interesting this way.

Gasoline tax hike would be highway robbery

\$73.6 million project Large Blast/Thermal Simulator to be built at Stallion Site

US Senator Pete Domenici, Senator Jeff Bingaman and Congressman Bill Richardson have announced that the Defense Nuclear Agency (DNA) has given the final go-ahead for development of the Large Blast/Thermal Simulator (LB/TS) at the White Sands Missile Range Stallion Site.

Construction of the LB/TS is expected to employ approximately 110 workers, with peak employment of up to 200 people. The two-year construction project will cost \$73.6 million, with an estimated \$30-\$35 million to be spent in the local economy.

The Army previously announced that the Stallion Site was its preferred site for the LB/TS. The Defense Nuclear Agency has agreed with the Army assessment and planned to begin construction in March 1991. This follows publication last month of the finding that the LB/TS would have no significant environmental impact on the environment.

Domenici said, "I am delighted that DNA has accepted the Army's recommendation to build the LB/TS in New Mexico. This will provide jobs locally, and further develop the Rio Grande corridor as a high technology center."

The LB/TS will be located on a 50-acre site in the northern portion of White Sands. It will consist of a long tube, 20 meters in diameter, with a built-in test chamber. Compressed gas will be released at one end of the tube, then travel its length to the test chamber, exposing the test object, anything from a helicopter to an armored vehicle, to the blast waves associated with a nuclear blast. A thermal radiation source will be installed to simulate a thermal pulse, as well as the blast wave.

Bingaman cited the need for this simulator, and said that the Department of Defense planned 100 to 150 tests per year when the facility is completed. "This is a vital national resource that will help us save money in the

long run by replacing the expensive and time consuming method we currently use for this sort of testing. This facility also fits well with the on-going work at New Mexico Tech, and hopefully will offer new research opportunities for the university."

According to Richardson, the selection of Socorro County for the hi-tech facility reinforces the Pentagon's strong commitment to New Mexico's defense industries. "This facility is a natural addition to the type of work already being performed in New Mexico. I am especially pleased this particular project will create many jobs and pump millions of dollars into the local economy."

The president's fiscal year 1990 budget request contained \$9.6 million for design of the simulator, with the remaining \$64 million projected for the fiscal year 1991 budget.

who commutes to work on a federally subsidized rail system at a cost of 80 cents a ride. It will cause no great hardship to the Manhattan executive whose Wall Street office is a short cab, subway, or limousine ride away.

But how fair and how painless would a 10 to 50 cents-a-gallon tax hike be to a Wyoming retail clerk, who, to earn a living, must drive scores of miles each day? On average, a citizen of sparsely populated Wyoming uses 913 gallons of motor fuel a year while his or her counterpart in urbanized New York consumes only 370 gallons.

The fact is that data on gasoline use by state from the Federal Highway Administration reveal that a 50-cent increase in the federal gasoline tax would cost the typical family living in Wyoming \$719 a year. That is about triple the amount the average household in Washington, DC, would pay.

The burden of increasing the gasoline tax, would be greatest in the generally rural Southern, Rocky Mountain, and Great Plains states and be lightest in the industrial states of the Northeast and Midwest.

It is not surprising that national politicians who have not raised gasoline prices, but have raised other taxes, have been criticized for their failure to address the issue of a gasoline tax hike.

There's no need to read President Bush's lips regarding the fairness or effectiveness of linking budget deficit reduction to the raising of federal taxes on motor fuels. He has spelled it out loud and clear.

In the president's own words "The problem with the deficit isn't that we tax too little, it's that we spend too much. A gas tax increase to balance the budget would particularly hurt lower wage earners, families with both spouses working, and farmers and residents of Western states who have to drive long distances."

The question of fairness aside, do you really think a gasoline tax hike is the formula for deficit reduction? Apparently the tax-and-spenders do. They claim that every penny increase in the federal gasoline tax would raise \$1 billion a year for deficit reduction. Simple arithmetic and even simpler thinking.

Simple arithmetic ignores the myriad, complex, negative effects that a huge motor fuel tax would have on the national economy.

According to a recent study by Data Resources, Inc., higher gasoline taxes would raise pump prices, reduce consumers' disposable income, and increase the operating costs of American industry.

Spending already 22% above average

Business owners oppose tax hike for education

SANTA FE—New Mexico's small-business community adamantly opposes raising taxes to increase public school funding, according to survey results released today by the state chapter of the National Federation of Independent Business.

The survey, conducted earlier this year among the small-business advocacy group's more than 3,000 members, found nearly three-quarters (73 percent) of the respondents rejected higher taxes as a way to pump more money into the public schools. Only about

one in four (23 percent) approved the idea of higher taxes earmarked for education.

"Business owners believe current funding levels reflect a strong commitment to the public schools," said Jerry Walker, legislative director for NFIB/New Mexico. Walker noted that New Mexico ranked fourth highest among the states in per capita spending for education.

"In the 1985-'86 school year, state and local education spending amounted to \$1,068 for every citizen in New Mexico. That's 22 percent above the national spending average, so how anyone can question New Mexico taxpayers' commitment to the schools is beyond me," Walker said.

"Current state and local spending for education equals 10 percent of the total personal income in this state," Walker said. That spending/income ratio is the fourth highest in the country and nearly 60 percent above the national average.

Walker said, "Most New Mexico taxpayers are not wealthy and can ill-afford a bigger tax bite. Many taxpayers—small business owners and others—are already at that breaking point under the current tax load."

He suggested that state legislators should concentrate on how to target current education spending more effectively, rather than debate how to raise additional tax dollars.

Walker said small-

business owners had no enthusiasm for any of the education tax proposals currently being floated in the legislature. He said owners were "most distressed," however, by proposals to generate additional education funds through property tax increases.

"There's a big disparity between residential and commercial property tax rates. To go to that particular tax wall again would squeeze many businesses quite hard," Walker said.

He said state-by-state comparisons of education funding "show we already have enough tax money in the till. Lawmakers need to make sure it is spent more wisely, so taxpayers get a bigger bang for their education buck."

mology contest while seed analysis rounds out the crops contest. Professors in the botany and entomology department at New Mexico State University official the contest which will be held in the mid-school.

Wildlife contests test basic knowledge of different game animals and their habits through identification and problem solving techniques. Students participate in a "practicum" assembled by the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish and identify slides as well as life size mounts of wildlife native to New Mexico. Area Fish and Wildlife officers assemble and supervise this contest in Clegg Hall.

In land judging, students identify soil structure, depth, permeability, slope, surface runoff, texture and erosion factors and couple these to classify types of land according to it's best use. In addition they determine mechanical and chemical factors which can help develop the land for the most intensive use. Steve Harkey is contest superintendent and Javier Ruiz, soil specialist with the Soil Conservation Service, is contest official.

Wool judges learn to appraise wool for quality and yield as well as place classes and defend their placing by giving oral reasons. Students actually place a grade on the fineness and usefulness of the fibers within the fleeces and are able to assess the quality of a line of fleeces.

The tabulation room is supervised by Wally Ferguson, a local rancher and president of the Board of Education at Carrizozo Schools. Over 12,000 tests, placing cards, and quizzes are graded and tabulated in one day. Computers are used to store data and a special Scantron Computer Grading system is used to make grading efficient and accurate. Over 20 qualified Carrizozo grading specialists fill the room to grade, sort, enter, and rank data collected throughout the day.

Carrizozo FFA alumni members hope to serve over 1,000 hamburgers in an eight-hour period. The awards assembly will be held in the New Gym following completion of tabulation. Outstanding students and schools will be recognized for their achievements. The top three teams in each contest area will receive plaques and individuals will be awarded medals. The school with the best overall performance will receive the "Sweepstakes Award" and a check for \$100.

In addition to the regular contests there will be a special welding contest this year. There will be two divisions: adult and student. Plaques will be awarded to the participants with the highest overall score in welding. This contest is open to everyone.

The Carrizozo FFA Invitational Contests are co-hosted by Carrizozo FFA members and Alumni members from Carrizozo and the surrounding area. Everyone is invited to attend. For more information contact Carrizozo Municipal Schools at 648-2346.
