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Horse trails around Ft. Stanton to open May 5

Larry Woodard, state director for the bureau of land management, told a group of people at Fort Stanton Tuesday that the horse trails would be open May 5. The only trails that will be open at this time do not go through the hospital complex.

The Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School is located on 1,280 acres of state land surrounded by 23,000 acres of BLM land. Woodard said the horse trails will all be on BLM land.

Hospital employees, parents and guardians of Fort Stanton residents, and

county residents voiced their concerns about the problems that could occur with the increased traffic in the hospital area.

Several people stated that the Fort Stanton masterplan had been presented as being all-encompassing and that the brochure printed by the National Center for the Western Horse did not distinguish the state land from the BLM land.

Woodard said he felt the thing that could affect the hospital first would be the proposed "Boots and Saddles Tour" that has been presented in Congress by US Senators Pete Domenici and

Jeff Bingaman and US Representative Joe Skeen.

The study into the proposed tour is supposed to take a year. Woodard said the people could make their concerns known at public hearings that will be held before the tour becomes a reality.

"We want to make sure we work together for the safety and protection of the residents," said Fort Stanton Hospital Administrator Ervin Aldaz.

Woodard said scoping sessions would be held and all people would have the chance to be heard. He said he was glad that certain

Two dead in highway accident

A one-vehicle accident at 1:35 a.m. April 5 resulted in the first fatal accident in Lincoln County this year.

The car was traveling too fast to negotiate a curve at mile marker 297 on Highway 70 and went over the guard rail and down the mountain-side into a canyon.

The passenger was ejected and the driver remained in the vehicle, both were killed. Names of the victims were not available at press time. The accident is being investigated by state policeman Steve Standridge.

Suit against Don Samuels dismissed

The year-long court battle between former Lincoln County Commissioners and former Sheriff Don Samuels came to a close last week when District Judge Robert Doughty dismissed the case with prejudice, meaning it cannot be refiled on the same grounds.

The commissioners had asked that Samuels comply with county ordinances, and Samuels denied any wrongdoing. The suit was filed in January 1988 and was never heard in court.

County budget dates approved

The deadline for all requests for county money is 5 p.m., April 18. The 1989-90 fiscal year budget calendar was approved by Lincoln County Commissioners during a special meeting Tuesday.

The budget calendar calls for county manager Nick Pappas to meet with department heads April 11-14 to prepare department requests. Pappas is to make his recommendations April 20-28.

The commissioners will hold a budget work session May 3 at 10:30 a.m. for discussion and revisions. The preliminary budget is scheduled to be announced at the commission meeting May 22. The final budget hearing and

approval will be at the June 10 commission meeting. Publication of the budget will be July 27.

During the special meeting, commissioners discussed forming a county strategic planning committee. Duties of the committee would be to list priorities for capital needs and future programs for the county.

Legal services for the county were also discussed. Pappas recommended the county hire a firm to represent the county through June 30 which would give the commission a few months to decide how to utilize legal services in the future. A decision may be made at the April 11 county commission meeting.

Suzanne Cox named new Tucumcari city manager

She is the former Lincoln County Manager, having held that position from 1982 until she resigned Feb. 20, 1989.

Cox has had 22 years experience in local government. She was elected county treasurer for Sierra County for two terms, worked in the Sierra County assessor's office for two years, was administrative assistant for the Sierra County Commissioners for one and one-half years, and worked for the school district for eight years.

According to the Quay County Sun published in Tucumcari March 11, Cox was one of two finalists for the city manager position from the 11 applications received. The position was left vacant when Kenneth Neal, who was appointed in November, resigned the first of the year because of health problems.

While Cox was Lincoln County Manager, she served under five separate sets of county commissioners.

Capitan Chief of Police Randy Spear is asking motorists in Capitan to be extra careful while stop signs are being replaced.

The state highway department and Capitan village workers are working to get the signs back in place as soon as possible.

Juvenile offenders will go to Roswell

"We will have to transport juveniles to Chaves County in Roswell," Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane said Wednesday.

He referred to the fact that Otero County was notified Monday by the New Mexico Corrections Department that the Otero County juvenile jail facility status was being reduced from long-term to short-term.

Lincoln County juvenile facilities had already been reduced from long-term to short-term, and all juveniles could be held for no longer than six hours before being transported to a juvenile facility. Juveniles were usually taken to the Otero County facility in Alamogordo.

"It will be more expensive and there will be 30 minutes more driving time," McSwane said about taking juveniles to Roswell.

McSwane said his department received two fire calls last week. Lupe's Fruit Stand in San Patricio burned to the ground March 31 and an underground house in Oscuro burned April 1. The fire marshal has been notified and is investigating both fires.

GOP legislators disgusted with legislature's antics

"This is the Daily Bill Locator," explained New Mexico Rep. Ben Hall, Dist. 56, as he thumbed the pages of a half-inch thick booklet. "Look at this—all these are bills that were supposed to be acted upon on the last day!"

Hall, Rep. Paul Harrington, Dist. 52, and Sen. James Lee Martin, Dist. 39, gave their impressions of the recently-concluded 60-day legislative session to members and guests of Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County (FRWLC) at their March 28 meeting in Ruidoso.

"We were faced with over 1600 bills," said Hall, displaying the bill locator. Senator Martin touched on the Senate's failure to confirm Gov. Carruthers's appointment of Carla Muir to his cabinet, and HB-2, the budget.

Harrington gave a freshman's view of the Merry Roundhouse. He was proud of House Bill 360 dealing with erroneous tax distribution but bemoaned the time spent "naming the state

insect and state cookie—and then arguing about how to spell it!"

When asked about the obscenity bill, Hall replied, "I received more calls from constituents on that bill than on any other legislation, but the Speaker wouldn't let it out of committee." The controversial bill, therefore, never came to a vote.

A similar fate befell right-to-work legislation. "Every time this bill is brought up, it dies in committee," the legislators explained.

Questions from the audience dealt with seatbelt use in pickups, the use of a single pharmacy per community to fill Medicaid prescriptions, physician's assistants writing prescriptions, lodgers being required to furnish AIDS information in rooms, and other topics.

As FRWLC program committee member Rebecca Wardlaw introduced the speakers, each explained which part of Lincoln County he represented.

Harrington's portion is Alto, Carrizozo, Corona precincts plus all of Sierra County.

Hall represents Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, and Hondo precincts, plus parts of Eddy and Chaves Counties.

Martin is the only one who represents all the county, plus Socorro and portions of Otero county.

When asked why their districts were so oddly divided, they replied in unison, "Gerrymandering."

WIC, a federally funded national nutritional program, is available in Lincoln County for pregnant women, breast-feeding women, infants, recently pregnant women, children up to 5 years of age, low income families and those at risk for nutritional problems. ANOTHER VICTIM

"You've never been to Santa Fe? Really?"

That is the response I would get when I would mention that I had never visited the "City Different," as Santa Fe is commonly called.

I now boast that I spent several days there and am another victim of Santa Fe style fashion and art. Known as one of the top five art centers in the country, Santa Fe reflects the unique tri-cultural heritage of Pueblo Indians, Spanish Colonial and Pioneer Anglo settlers.

World renowned Santa Fe offers events such as the Santa Fe Opera season and features a diversity of music, theatre and art. It is sprinkled with many museums including the Palace of the Governors, built by the Spanish in 1609-1610 and is the oldest public building in the US. It houses the Museum of New Mexico with exhibits on the Spanish, Mexican, and American periods of New Mexico's history. Most visitors are surprised to know that New Mexico had a capitol before the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock.

FIRST PEOPLE

The first people to come to this land were prehistoric hunter and gatherer bands. The Pueblo peoples moved into the area in prehistoric times, reaching the peak of their civilization 1000-1800 A.D. in the Anasazi Culture. When this civilization fell due to drought and inner strife, the people migrated from northwest New Mexico to find farming villages near the Rio Grande. There they

grew into many different pueblos or communities. They were discovered thus, living in the Santa Fe area and surrounding region, when the Spaniards came to New Mexico with Coronado's expedition in 1540-1542.

One of the museums that I toured included the Museum of Indian Arts and Culture which focuses on the traditions, history and contemporary culture of the native peoples of the Southwest. Exhibits, workshops, and demonstrations highlights the contemporary as well as the historic and prehistoric cultures of this region. The museum interprets history and contemporary lifeways of the Pueblo, Navajo and Apache Indian cultures.

MULTI-CULTURAL CONFERENCE

The main reason I was in the oldest capitol city in the US was to attend the New Mexico Art Education Association spring conference for three days. "Inspirations in Multi-Cultural Arts Education" was the theme of the event sponsored by NAEA, who keep art instructors in the school, the district or county abreast of art curriculum, facilities, art materials and motivation, art standards, design, classroom management, gifted students, and art scholarships.

There were awards, workshops and museum tours for conference participants which included artists, art educators, performers and others interested in art education.

ON MY OWN

On my own I strolled through the plaza, the heart of the city since 1610. Santa Fe Plaza has been the site of countless historical cultural and social events. I stopped to rest in the park, the perfect spot for "people watching" anywhere in the Southwest. It was there that I decided to remove the camera hanging around my neck (a clear sign of an outsider) and take out my pencil and pad instead.

The Santa Fe style of fashion which I usually favor was displayed in most store windows. I pencil sketched clothing designs to use in my sewing machine creations. A ruffled, gathered, belted dress was selling for \$285. (The belt was made of matching cloth, not gold, turquoise or silver.) A simple, elastic waist skirt costs \$145.

FLUENT SPANGLISH

I wandered into St. Francis Cathedral, begun by Santa Fe's first archbishop, Frenchman Jean Baptiste Lamy in 1869. The Cathedral and the archbishop himself were the inspiration for Willa Cather's famous novel "Death Comes for the Archbishop." The Romanesque cathedral houses the oldest representation of the Madonna in the US. The statue, La Conquistadora, which accompanied Don Diego de Vargas on his peaceful reconquest of Santa Fe, can usually be seen in the North Chapel.

Following my viewing of the spacious church, I attempt to leave only to be confused on which door I came in from the direction of the plaza.


I interrupt a cleaning lady to say, "Excuse me, I forgot which door I came in."

She asks me, "No habla Espanol?"

"Si, I do," I tell her and in fluent Spanglish I explain my predicament.

SUNDAY DRIVE

Following the conference on Sunday, I was treated to a Sunday drive to El Santuario de Chimayo by my daughter and her husband, who live in Albuquerque. The church was built between 1813-1816. The church contains art objects and is an ideal subject for artists and photographers. The paintings and carvings (bultos) were done by local native people. The church is one of the most picturesque, decorated and historical churches in the Southwest. Many health seeking pilgrimages are made to the church each year, and because of this is quite popular.

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
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
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
