Landowners see proposed zoning as a threat to their property

"Ruidoso is not concerned with what happens to Lincoln County," said Carl Ducept, a county landowner and visitor at the regular meeting of the board of Lincoln County Commissioners in Carrizozo Monday.

Ducept and Howard Puckett, both landowners in

the Eagle Creek area, expressed their concern about the proposed three-mile expansion of the Extraterritorial Zone (ETZ) during the audience participation segment of an otherwise routine county meeting.

The men said they chose to live in the county, not Ruidoso, and are concerned the village will use the ETZ as a step to annexing the

properties in the three-mile zone. Eagle Creek falls within the proposed expansion area.

Ducept was mainly concerned the expansion proposal will go through due process without the public being well enough informed about what might happen to their properties if it is accepted. He accused the local media of presenting "propaganda"

supported by special interest groups and not what affects Lincoln County as a whole.

"We don't know what is happening," Ducept said.

Board chairman Karon Petty told Ducept the county directed Ruidoso to write an ordinance and prepare maps which will indicate which areas are to be included in the expansion. After this is accomplished the county will

conduct public hearings to collect opinions about the proposal.

"I have people who like the idea," Petty said.

Petty further recommended the men talk with Cleatus Richards, Ruidoso's planning director, about the proposal.

County manager Nick Pappas said the men's concern has been a battle for a

number of years in other counties, but counties have no legal power to stop municipal annexation. "The county has no veto power," he said.

"People in the affected areas have the right to challenge," Petty said.

The men also questioned the annexation of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport into the Village of Ruidoso. Petty replied the county "gave the

airport away" last year to relieve any fiscal responsibility of the airport operation.

County treasurer Shirley Goodloe supported the media which she found accurately report on the proceedings of county meetings.

Ducept replied the articles may be accurate but "sociological aspects" of the reporting reflect partisan feelings promoted by certain newspapers.

Petty cut the discussion short when she said "there is a better time to discuss" ETZ and she told the men to keep up with Ruidoso's actions.

Commissioners Petty and Bob Hemphill, Rick Simpson was absent, also approved a remodeling project at the county jail upon Sheriff James McSwane's request. He said the communications area of the jail was badly designed and in need of improvement to give extra space for attorney-prisoner conference rooms and to better provide security to his dispatch officers.

After Petty questioned if the sheriff and deputies could do the remodeling as they are not licensed contractors, McSwane said he wanted to keep his costs to a minimum by using his deputies' volunteer labor but he would contact the building inspector to assure the job is performed properly. He said there are enough funds in the jail line item to remodel.

County attorney Bob Beauvais agreed the sheriff's department needs space reorganization and said there are no restrictions on the construction when it does not concern jails which do not incarcerate juveniles. "It is not a very good situation," he said about the current space.

McSwane said the jail currently does not comply to state penal regulations.

"I feel capable to supervise and meet the standards," McSwane said.

Commissioners approved the request provided the remodel meets the standard building code for penal institutions and falls within the budget.

"It's long overdue," Hemphill said.

Also Monday, Pappas said the search for a new landfill remains a priority. He contacted the state land office and found acreage appropriate for another landfill near the existing site on Fort Stanton mesa. Pappas favored the site because of its proximity to Ruidoso.

Without Ruidoso's support of the landfill, Pappas said the project will not succeed.

Petty was not worried about Ruidoso as the village will do what is most economically sensible. She encouraged securing the site before that village makes an agreement with Roswell for solid waste disposal.

At Petty's direction, Pappas will contact county engineer Joe Shain to research the site and seek permission from the state land office to make core drills to determine whether it will meet BID standards.


Pappas also reported the need for a courthouse annex is vital as he fears Judge Richard Parsons might sue the county for additional space for the district court. He requested permission to meet with the Carrizozo Village Council to discuss rental of the old municipal building located south of the county courthouse for the additional space.

Petty suggested the county offer \$1 a year lease, and improvements, which may be utilized later by the senior citizens center located

Lore denies involvement

George and Nancy Lore, whose Glencoe home and business were searched by Drug Enforcement Agency officers for information about possible connection with two alleged cocaine ring leaders, recently said reports of their involvement with the ring are untrue.

According to a published report, the Lores said they were not involved or aware of any illegal activities. The two were questioned by DEA agents about their involvement with Hector and Carlos Tapia Anchonda. Lore said he knew the Tapias because of his business dealings with the men who allegedly were linked by the DEA to the largest cocaine bust in US history. Hector Anchonda was arrested in Las Vegas,

In drug money laundering

NV after DEA agents discovered tons of the white powder in a suburban Los Angeles, CA warehouse in September.

Lore said he met the Anchondas three and a half years ago when he was contracted to do several construction jobs for the men. He also said the Anchondas led him to believe they were successful businessmen with Mexican ranching and farming interests who also inherited a large estate from their grandfather.

Lore was in Kimo Bay,

Mexico supervising a multi-million construction job for Carlos Anchonda when DEA searched his Glencoe home. Lore and the office staff working on the Kimo Bay project were detained by Mexican authorities after Hector Anchonda was arrested in Las Vegas, NV. Although 11 people were arrested by Mexican police, Lore and his wife were detained for several days and never charged. Lore said the DEA drove him and his wife home from El Paso, TX after they were released in Mexico.

Although DEA searched his business and home, Lore said very few things were confiscated. The gun found in one of his trucks and

Officer charged with harassment; plans made to clean up the town

The Carrizozo Board of Trustees concluded its regular meeting Tuesday with a closed session which lasted two hours and 15 minutes to conduct an official police hearing concerning a formal complaint of harassment by a village policeman.

A formal letter of complaint from attorney Gary C. Mitchell on behalf of Carrizozo resident Sandra Morales stated Carrizozo policeman Rick Emmons and Lincoln County Deputy Gilbert Archuleta consistently tailed her vehicle for no apparent reason. The letter requested the officers stop tailing Morales.

While in closed session, the trustees, all of whom were present for the session, but did not make a quorum when the meeting began, heard from Emmons, Police Chief Choncho Morales and village attorney Bob Beauvais.

When the group returned to the open meeting at 10:30 p.m. Mayor Bob Hemphill said Emmons followed Morales blue and gray pickup with dark tinted windows as the vehicle was known to be operated by a fugitive on a felony warrant. The dark windows prevented Emmons from seeing who was driving

the vehicle, requiring him to drive very close to see who was inside.

Hemphill also said Emmons' police car had unusual headlight settings which made them appear brighter than normal. Emmons reportedly corrected these.

Beauvais read a memo he prepared establishing officers' responsibilities. Officers are charged to uphold the laws of the state and the Town of Carrizozo. Power comes from the police chief, or the officers' own initiative in only two situations: when there is probable cause and an on-going investigation.

If the officer makes a stop it has to be part of an on-going investigation or have probable cause. Unless the officer is under the direction of his supervisor or within the scope of duty, any harassment charges may hold the officer or village liable, Beauvais said.

There is no choice but to conduct an inquiry, Beauvais said.

From information received in the closed session, Hemphill concluded Archuleta was not involved as he works the day shift. While he apologized for Morales' "inconvenience" he saw

no other alternative for Emmons but to inspect the vehicle of the fleeing suspect.

"I believe he operated under proper police procedure," Hemphill said.

Morales replied her brother Johnny, the felon in question, never drove the truck and Emmons also followed her in a different vehicle and while in a friend's car.

Hemphill then instructed Emmons to be very careful not to infringe on the civil rights of any citizens of Carrizozo, but for citizens to expect officers to stop them if there is probable cause of breaking the law.

"Not at any time are you to harass any citizen," Hemphill warned.

Emmons acknowledged

the statement and Chief Morales agreed to the warning if Emmons follows the chain of command.

The trustees began their meeting at the regular time with only Albert Baca, Dale LaMay and Mayor Hemphill present. The two did not constitute a quorum, but Hemphill began the meeting as he said trustee Harold Garcia would arrive later.

After trustee Harold Garcia arrived at 7 p.m. the board began to take action. Kevin Powers of the bonding company of Eppler, Guerin and Turner presented information concerning the sale of bonds based on gross receipt tax revenues, in order to purchase solid waste removal equipment.

Hemphill said he inquired about the bond because of the steadily increasing fees from the private "solid waste removal contractor."

"We feel we're at the mercy of the contractor," Hemphill said. He did acknowledge the contractors' services were excellent.

Powers said the bond is the most common way New Mexico municipalities finance capital improvements.

The Carrizozo Concerned Committee waited until the board finished their business to present their proposals.

Committee member Joe Hooten said the town and business people of the community need to be aware of the impression created as

visitors drive through the town. He warned the town could lose its most valuable assets, the school and county courthouse, if villagers and business people do not take interest in creating a better image.

Hemphill said he met with Hooten and agreed the first place to start on village improvements is along 12th St. and Central Avenue, the main business section of town.

Beauvais said this would not constitute discrimination if it is a part of an overall plan for town improvements. "It is a logical place to start," he said.

Hemphill asked the committee to contact the businesses on those streets to get opinion before any punitive action is taken.

"You want us to prepare the way for you to take legal action," committee member Dorothy Forsythe asked.

But Hemphill did not commit the town to such, except in the case of the burned Prehm building, about which the first legal steps are being taken. He added he is in the process of getting main street improvements from the state highway department. The improvements will be similar

to those in Estancia, which were financed without that village's funds.

Garcia suggested the village crews take one property a week during their off time to assist the clean-up.

Hemphill complimented the committee for receiving an excellent response, which Forsythe said was about 10 percent of the surveys mailed.

The committee has a list of names who will volunteer time and also said Hooten's business will offer certain building supplies at a lowered cost and Gary Lovelace also will do sidewalk improvements at a lowered cost.

In other business the board:

—Heard Hemphill proclaim Saturday, Oct. 28, as official Halloween Day in Carrizozo, for better protection of children involved.

—Proclaimed the week of Oct. 29 to Nov. 5 as Pornography Awareness Week. Participants are asked to wear a white ribbon available by calling 648-2968 or 648-2107.

—Approved a cooperative agreement with Lincoln County for improvements to 18th St. The town will pay for all work done by the county.

—Approved payment of a bill incurred by the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce for Buzzard Days. Garcia suggested guidelines be drawn about such expenditures.

—Appointed Harold DesJardon to replace Jerry Tucker who resigned from the Lodgers' Tax Committee.

Students 'cotton' to new computer program

Members of the Capitan Board of Education were told Oct. 17 that the new computer program is working well.

Elementary school principal Jerry Newsom said some students have gained as much as a year and a half after only five hours working with the program. One 2nd grader did 19 arithmetic problems in 10 minutes. Students are exposed to various concepts before they reach these concepts in school. Students know what level they are working on and are motivated to go higher.

Newsom said "we're" the only school this size in the state doing this type of program.

Section 3 of the school board policy was approved. Teachers will be informed within 10 days of the close of school if they are not to be re-employed.

The job descriptions of the high school principal, head coach and assistant coach were approved. High school principal Bill Stowe will be responsible for eligibility. Board president Preston Stone complimented Stowe for the smooth operation of the high school this year.

Bus substitutes James McDaniel and Brandy Flanagan were approved. Flanagan will also be a substitute activity bus driver.

Board members Preston Stone, Kenneth Cox, Hollis

Fuchs and Tom Trost also approved section XVI of the school board policy. This deals with drug abuse policy and procedures. A substitute teacher's handbook was also approved.

It was reported that teacher Sandra Bean is in a Roswell hospital as a result of an auto accident. Bean is expected to be away from her job for at least a month.

School superintendent Dr. Scott Childress reported on the New Mexico Town Hall meeting he attended in Ruidoso. The topic this year was education.

Childress said the 100 people in attendance were primarily from the business community. There were six groups. Each group was to develop a consensus.

One business lady from Ruidoso was concerned about students who can't read, write or calculate.

Childress said Capitan doesn't have the problems that Albuquerque, Alamo-gordo and Roswell have. All recommendations should go through the state board of education before going on to the state legislature.

Teacher Mary Shanks and her soil program again received praise.

Ken Cox, Clayton Allen, Jack King, John Fish, Mike Long and Mark Starnes were approved as youth football program volunteers.

Cox reported that 38 boys report out for practice every day. Jack King and Clayton Allen received praise for their work with the boys.

The resignation of cafeteria worker Charlotte Fish was approved. Custodian Dinah Roybal was transferred to the cafeteria.

It was reported that the drop in enrollment will amount to \$100,000 to \$110,000 that the school will not receive. The school will "tighten its belt."

Mrs. Tom Sullivan

received a plaque for outstanding service as a teacher between 1978 and 1989. Sullivan now teaches in Ruidoso.

The Capitan Board of Education approved the monthly financial reports and decided next month's meeting will be Nov. 9 at 7 p.m. This meeting will be in the old elementary

Parole denied for convicted murderer

Convicted murderer Robert Elton Cox will remain in the New Mexico State Penitentiary in Santa Fe, at least for another year.

Cox, convicted of murdering Lincoln County Deputy Tommy Bedford in Nogal Canyon in 1979, went before the New Mexico Adult Parole Board Oct. 18 for a hearing to determine if he was eligible for parole.

According to parole board director Eduardo C. Lucero, the board denied Cox parole partly because of the seriousness of the offense, the use of

a weapon and his lengthy criminal record.

The board found a parole at this would depreciate the seriousness of the crime and would not be in the best interest of the community. They also found Cox poses a substantial risk to the community.

Cox will remain in the state pen until next year when he again is eligible for another parole hearing.

Lucero said his office received numerous letters and calls requesting Cox be denied parole.

The parole board consists of Governor Garrey Caruthers, Cres C. Baca, Doug Brown and Patrick Lopez.

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Halloween: she's not what she used to be

Trick or Treat! This year, Carrizozo will observe Halloween Saturday, Oct. 28.

Make sure the treats don't turn into tricks with a few safety precautions.

Don't allow children to carry a pumpkin lighted by a wax candle and don't set a candlelight pumpkin on the doorstep near where children will walk. If a child's costume brushes the pumpkin, a fire could easily start. Also be careful about setting a candlelight pumpkin indoors near curtains or table decorations.

When selecting costumes, avoid flimsy materials and excessive yardage. A touch of flame could ignite them easily and children could trip on costumes which are too long. Make sure costumes are light in color so they can be seen by motorists. Reflector tape on the front and back also gives better visibility.

Make sure masks have eye holes large enough for children to see through. Better yet, encourage masks made by painting faces with makeup specifically designed for such.

Unless ready-made costumes, which are flame-proof, are selected, consider making home-made costumes flame-proof with 12 ounces of diammonium phosphate to two quarts of water. Dip all cotton or cotton blend fabrics in the solution and allow to drip dry.

Small children should always be accompanied by an older person as they make their rounds on Halloween night.

Before children go out, make sure they eat. Instruct them not to eat treats before coming home and having parents inspect them for tampering. Wash fruit and eat in small pieces to make sure nothing has been placed inside.

Encourage children to eat some candy, suggesting they eat one or two pieces a day. Instead of sweets for treats consider giving small toys, pencils, plastic rings, whistles, noise makers or snack coupons to food stores.

Teach a child the importance of brushing teeth or rinsing the mouth with water after eating sweets. This will help prevent tooth decay.

The American Dental Association recommends such treats as popcorn, peanuts, crackers or chips in unopened packages, as well as small cans of juice or decorated hard-boiled eggs.

In other business commissioners:

—Approved financing for a fire truck for the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department through Municipal Leasing Corp. at chief Howard Puckett's request.

—Tabled award of the bid for base course gravel. The bid specifications required the vendor to list the price at the gravel stockpile. In the past the county has purchased gravel based on the location of the stockpile, often awarding bids to two separate vendors. Pappas will contact the lowest bidder about the split bid and will report at the next meeting.

—Approved a cooperative agreement with the Village of Carrizozo to furnish equipment and labor for upgrading a portion of 18th Street. Carrizozo will reimburse the county for the actual cost of work done.

—Awarded radio commu-

nication services to Lincoln Communications of Ruidoso.

—Approved the vacation of the southern portion of unused county road E-001 on the Robinson ranch north of Capitan as recommended by the county road review committee. After discussion, the commissioners agreed to vacate the portion and to advertise the vacation of the remaining portion of the road, to be acted upon at the next meeting.

—Approved an amendment to the senior citizens contract for heating and cooling equipment for the Carrizozo Senior Citizens Center, to extend it to the end of the 1990.

—Rejected a proposed cooperative bridge replacement project with the New Mexico State Highway Department due to the high cost of the bridge and to negotiate for another, less costly bridge across the Hondo River at Hondo.

—Approved a proposal that Nancy Guck retain her emergency radio, although she is no longer a county employee.

—Approved payroll and accounts payable registers.

—Heard Goodloe report the 1989 tax bills will be printed Oct. 31 and mail Nov. 1. Also Goodloe and Beauvais discussed the tax sale and properties in foreclosure by the county.

—Heard road supervisor Tommy Hall report on road projects.

—Noted problems with the new Airport Scenic Drive as pointed out by Pappas. The next county meeting is scheduled for Nov. 13.
