Tuesday, Jan. 9, is the only filing date for persons wishing to run for office in all the communities. Anyone who desires a position on the ballot must file the appropriate forms during regular working hours at the appropriate municipal hall.

The information on the voter registration must match that on the declaration of candidacy.

On Jan. 11, the clerks will post a list of names of persons who are certified as candidates and persons who are not and why. Carrizozo Clerk Schlarb said candidates will draw names on that date to determine what position they will have on the

Capitan Village Clerk Keel said potential candidates may request the certified voter registration affidavit from the county clerk through the mail. The county clerk's office charges 65 cents for processing and mailing the voter registration affidavit.

Each candidate may ryn for one office only.

Write-in candidates must file during regular working hours on Jan. 23 only. Schlarb said the same procedures apply to write-in candidates as for declared candidates with the additional following information required: the name of a declared write-in shall be written in the slot provided for each designated office. A write-in vote shall be counted and canvassed only if:

-the name written in is the name of a declared writein candidate and shows two initials and last name; first name, middle initial or name and last name; first and last name, or the full name as itappears on the declaration of write-in candidacy and misspellings of the above combinations that can be reasonably determined by a majority of the members of the precinct board to identify the declared write-in candidate.

—the name is written in the proper slot on the voting machine or on the proper line for write-in votes on an absentee ballot.

—the name written in is not a vote for a person who is on the ballot for that office.

—the name written is not imprinted by rubber stamp or similar device or by the use of preprinted stickers or


The above requirements are the same for all municipalities.

# A year's look at the county commissioners

meeting Nov. 13. Bob Hemphill and Rick Simpson have grappled with the solid waste issue for months.

As for the commissioners, 1989 was a mixed bag of changes: from leaving the old meeting schedule which had been followed for years to night meetings, at the objections of reporters and others, to having to face the growing cries of where to put county trash and how to get it there.

The three commissioners came to their office with little or no previous public office experience-all but Hemphill who had been elected as Carrizozo mayor three years before and had served as trustee before that. And the trials and errors they faced were often the contest between moving ahead, then falling back to recover

ground. Among the first actions taken at their first meeting was to "open" the county manager, attorney and road supervisors positions, so they could "hire these people who work for us," Petty said.

Immediately, thencounty manager Suzanne Cox submitted her resignation, to be effective April 1.

The commissioners met for a lengthy closed session, another thing which was to become a hallmark of the group. Hemphill was selected as chairman, to be served for eight months, after which another commissioner would take over the chair.

A week later the commissioners met with representatives from county, state and federal agencies in a special workshop, to acquaint themselves with those agencies. A meeting Jan. 9 familiarized the commissioners with road improvement requests, which they tabled to personally inspect.

Hubert Quintana of the Water Defense Association explained the lawsuit with the Mescalero Apache Tribe and the joint powers agreement between Lincoln and Chaves Counties and the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration local government division which appropriated \$225,000 for hydrological studies, legal and technical services in preparation of the appeals case on the water rights decision. Various roads were closed and the commissioners learned the county maintains 1,380.29 miles of roads, 304.52 in subdivisions.

## P & Z grapples with cemetery, illegal subdivisions, roads

When is a cemetery a subdivision?

When it comes before the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) for approval.

P&Z grappled with that question, a request to vacate a non-existing platted road in the townsite of Nogal and illegal subdivisions at their regular meeting Thursday night, Dec. 28.

Fox Cave area resident Stormy Edwards and surveryor Tim Collins approached P&Z for approval of a preliminary plat for a proposed perpetual-care cemetery and asked for variances to regulations which apply to subdivisions.

Collins asked commissioners Modesto Chavez, LaMoyne Peters, Ernest Lueras, E.J. Fouratt, James Sanchez, Ben Hall and chairman Patsy Sanchez how he and Edwards could develop the cemetery without calling it a subdivision.

After considerable discussion, P&Z approved the preliminary plat and called for the next step in the "subdivision" approval—public hearings at 6 p.m., Jan. 11. The early date was set so Hall, a representative in the state legislature, could attend the meeting.

County manager Nick

Pappas called the situation an "authority" to insure the unique, because it was a subdivision in the sense of platting, but does not meet the formal idea of a subdivision because there is no need for roads, utilities and other requirements for a subdivision where people live.

"So call it what it is—a cemetery," Pappas said.

County attorney Bob Beauvais said the cemetery could be dealt with as such if the 1988 zoning ordinance was in affect, since it is not, the development must be treated as a subdivision.

Beauvais expressed his concern about possible deterioration of the site if it is not maintained, a guaranteed trust fund and long-term endowment for perpetual care, a feasibility study on the cemetery as a business and especially, payment of ad valorem taxes and liens.

P&Z member James Sanchez questioned the roads, and possible future need for the county to maintain them, and water.

Edwards explained the cemetery will be an endowment care cemetery with a percentage of lot sales to go into a perpetual trust to keep the grounds and private road maintained. He also, as required by state law, placed \$20,000 into a trust fund for the state also inspect annual-

maintenance.

Edwards, who lives adjacent to the cemetery, plans to maintain the grounds himself.

The road. Edwards said, will be wide enough to accommodate vehicle parking and passage and the entrance to the cemetery from Highway 70 is an existing roadway. He said he does not want the county to be obligated to maintain the road or anything within the cemetery boundaries.

The 4.2 acre cemetery will be watered with 3.8 acre feet of water rights, which Edwards owns. A sprinkler system and fence are already in place. The cemetery will be plotted on a 100-foot grid similar to the Ruidoso Cemetery, Collins said.

The water rights were adjudicated in 1878 and were recently transferred from Tommy Perteet to Edwards.

Answering Beauvais' 'vision of messes of artifical flowers on the graves," Edwards said restrictions will limit gravestones to six inches high and will allow all religions or sects.

The long-term endowment will not be available to the developer, as required by state law, Edwards said and

Edwards detailed how he came to consider a cemetery on his property. He was on a committee in Ruidoso to study sites as that town's cemetery has about two years left before it is full. The committee orginally considered a site on the old airport land, but since the new project that proposal was thrown out. Which led Edwards to consider the cemetery on his property, an idea which has him "enthused."

"I'm only running two old fat horses out there, I want to make something pretty,' Edwards said. "There's a

P&Z also questioned the one-mile notification rule, a requirement in the zoning ordinance, to which Edwards answered his two neighbors like the idea.

Beauvais requested Pappas research the questions to make recommendations to P&Z at the public hearings.

P&Z also grappled with a problem in the Nogal townsite, where property owner Ned Pieters discovered his home was in the intersection of two platted streets. However the streets were never constructed and only appear on paper.

In 1985, Pieters requested a road closure from Lincoln County Commissioners Bill Elliott, Ken Nosker and A.W. Gnatkowski which they approved.

Banker Archie Witham. who approached P&Z for Pieters, said one problem with road closure is it does not give title to the land in question. To obtain a title, Pieters would need a partial vacation of a plat.

The 1985 action was based on recommendation by road review committee Bud Payne, Ed Siddens, and Bob Stearns,

The problem of nonexistent roads also was dealt with in 1983, with road closures then. Road closure only deals with the taking of a road off the county maintenance program, Beauvais

Chairman Sanchez questioned the loss of the value of the property to the county if the partial vacation gives the land to Pieters.

Beauvais said the value is a "moot point" as it is a smæll dollar amount. Taxes on the land in question would only bring small amounts to

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Sanchez was adamant about the county gettng compensation for the property, which currently has no public access.

"She sounds like a realtor." Witham said.

Witham got involved with the situation when Pieters came for a loan at the bank where Witham works.

To determine if the county wants to give up the right to ever build roads in the subdivision in Nogal and okay the partial vacation, P&Z approved a road review committee look at the property in question. Commissioner Fouratt voted against the motion because the 1985 committee made recommendations on the same properties.

Beauvais also asked the county manager to draw up a policy concerning such subdivision problems, with thoughts given to whether the vacations will be detrimental to the development of the townsite.

Chairman Sanchez said White Oaks and Oscuro have problems similar to Nogal.

From the Nogal subdivision problems, P&Z moved to discussion about "illegal" subdivision. About 12 or 14 subdivisions in the county do not comply to regulations, mostly in roads.

"Previous commissioners were very lax to allow no sureties," Beauvais said.

He listed the subdivisions: Agua Fria, Alto Vista, Cedar Creek, Deer Park Meadows, Deer Park Woods. Fox Run, Mountain Lakes, Pines of Gavilan, Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates (which is currently being worked upon) and the worst-Vera Cruz Estates on O-Bar-O Ranch.

After discussion of how different subdividers' posted securities to assure proper development and the bankruptcy of various developers, Beauvais suggested the county "red tag" questionable subdivisions to stop future sales.

At that time. spoke up, "I think you're just batting at shadows. We did the same thing with Gary Mitchell (former county attorney). We told subdividers to get in shape or vacate."

He also suggested P&Z no longer discuss the subdivisions as "it's all been done before." He then said the legal steps should be done between Pappas and Beauvais.

"Go out and do what needs to be done," said P&Z member Hall.

"Sieze the assets and get" the roads done," Fouratt said.

"My county commission feels the same way," Pappas replied.

Pappas will report to the P&Z at the next regular

meeting. At the end of the lengthy meeting, Beauvais briefly reviewed a letter received from the EID about county permitting of landfills. The letter, from Dennis Boyd, secretary of New Mexico Mexico Health and Environment Dept., states the Environmental Imprevement Board regulations do not preempt county regulatory authority, in fact it encour-

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ages it.

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
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## Smokey Bear Classic

A request from the county commissioners to cease processing the village of Ruidoso Downs' landfill permit was not granted. The permit will be approved only after the EID is satisfied all applicable requirements are

The department does agree the facility should not be allowed to operate until all state and local requirements have been satisfied, "including the obtaining of any necessary permits from Lincoln County."

Beauvais also said the decisions from two appelate courts in New York and Virginia make the county permitting or landfills constitutionally allowable.

In other business:

-James Sanchez questioned Beauvais on the status of the airport annexation by Ruidoso, to which he and other county residents have concerns as to how the village could consider the airport contiguous to the town.

Beauvais, who sympathized with the concerns, said the government land between the town and the airport is, by statute, what allows the action.

"County government can't do anything about it," Pappas said. But the county has a "great deal to say about the (proposed) three-mile extension (of the Extraterritorial Zone, ETZ)," Pappas said. If the extension is approved ETZ will encompass properties with about 80 percent of Lincoln County's population.

A group of landowners has already consulted an attorney for potential action if the extension is further considered, P&Z learned.

The current one-mile ETZ immediately took affect when the airport was annexed.

Pappas said Ruidoso approached the county commissioners about concurrence with the three-mile extension: however, commissioners were hesitant,

"They're (Ruidoso) stretching the intent of the law to stretch over 18 miles over federal land," Hall said.

P&Z will conduct public hearings at 6 p.m. Jan. 11 to consider the cemetery and additional landfill permitting criteria.

### Judges hand down sentences to wind up the year 1989

Richard A. Parsons sentenced three people last week to wrap up court activities for

Jose Gerardo Marquez Jr. 17, Ruidoso was found guilty on a charge of allowing himself to be served and not guilty on the charge of battery, to which he received two years probation on Dec. 29.

Filbert Raymond Herrera, 25, Ruidoso Downs, pled no contest to negligent arson, a fourth degree felony, on Dec. 28. He also pled no contest to arson, a third degree felony. He was given one year on the negligent charge and two years on the arson charge to run concurrently for a total of two years. The judge suspended the sentence and placed Herrera on probation

for two years. Kristen R. Rangel, 26, Ruidoso Downs, pled no contest to six charges on Dec. 29. She was charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon (a motor vehicle), resisting or evading an officer (a misdemeanor), driving while intoxicated (DWI), driving on the wrong side of the road and reckless driving.

She received a deferred sentence and was placed on probation for two years.

Elma, Silva, 39, Ruidoso Downs, will appear for a preliminary hearing before Magistrate Judge Jim Wheeler on Jan.. 18 on the charges of criminal sexual penetration in the first degree, robbery, kidnapping and an open charge of

District Court Judge attempted murder. Silva is currently serving time in the Western New Mexico Correctional Facility in Grants on a former charge of manufacturing meth-amphetemine. He was out on appeal of that charge when the alleged rape took place in the Ruidoso area.

> -According to Assistant District Attorney Scot Key's office, Silva is a prior felon.

In Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr.'s court, three persons were charged with driving while intoxicated over the holiday weekend.

Dale McDaniels, 29, Claunch, pled not guilty to the charges of DWI, driving on a suspended or revoked license and careless driving on Jan. 2. McDaniels was arrested by state police officer Danny Kiper on Highway 54. Dec. 29. He failed three field sobriety tests and refused to take the sobriety test in Ruidoso. He was later booked into the Lincoln County Jail.

Two men were arrested and jailed in the Lincoln County Jail by Deputy Lerry Bond on Highway 54 on Dec. 31. Mark Hicks, 24, Los Lunas, pled guilty to the charges of DWI and careless driving before Judge Dean on Jan. 2. He was fined \$300 for DWI and \$100 for careless driving and \$68 court costs.

His companion, Paul Cherino, 27, Los Lunas, was charged as a party to the crime and pled guilty before Judge Dean on Jan. 2 also. He was fined \$400 and \$68 court costs.

### **OPINION**

 What with all the problems we're having in Panama, I think it timely to refer to a 1979 column I did on the Panama Canal problem. The US purchased the Panama Canal by treaty in 1903 and by a supplementary one in 1936. It gave the use, occupation and control of the Canal to the US "in perpetuity." It was no gift. We paid \$10 million down and \$250,000 a year in gold beginning in 1913. Ownership was not only validated through treaty, but by cash payments. What the Canal was, before congress gave it away, by treaty, was a US government-owned reservation, totally governed by congress and by executive order of the president. If all that isn't an outright, airtight, legal transfer of property ownership then there is no way to purchase any property. President Carter and congress gave the Canal to Panama, effective in 1992. Carter said the Canal Zone always belonged to Panama! Here is what this column said in 1979 about the Canal. See how it flies a decade

• Byron Snyder spoke to Lions Club members last week on aspects of the Panama Canal at the very time it was being given back to Panama by the US Senate. Snyder, retired from a career in the US Foreign Service, was once stationed in Panama. He believes, as Congress apparently did, that the Canal belongs to Panama. He presented two reasons why he thought so. First, he said, that a child born in the Canal Zone does not acquire US citizenship merely by being born in that territory. US citizenship is gained in two principal ways. By jus solis - meaning a child born in the Canal Zone of noncitizens does not automatically become a US citizen. That condition, he thinks, indicates that the US has never considered the Canal Zone to be "American soil." The 2nd question he raised deals with the US's annual payments to Panama on behalf of the Canal Zone and Canal. If we actually owned the property, he said, why are we continuing to make these payments, which can be construed as rent or lease? Both principles seem a bit thin to me. The question of citizenship rules for children born in the Canal Zone may have been a bureaucratic oversight or blunder, and could hardly indicate (in view of other and more substantial claims) lack of ownership. As for the payments to Panama, it seems they could be a condition of ownership, not just rent or lease. After all; Americans acquire ownership and title to their homes even though they make monthlymayments on them for 20 or 30 years! No one questions that ownership and title — except when the payments stop or the taxes aren't paid.

"Candidate" Carter, he who pledged himself never to lie to the American people, said Nov. 23, 1975: "I would not relinquish actual control of the Panama Canal; I would retain actual political control." But ...

 "President" Carter said in his fireside chat: "The Canal Zone has always been Panamanian

 In 1907 the US Supreme Court in the case of Wilson v. Shaw unanimously ruled: "... It is hypocritical to contend that the title of the United States (to the Canal Zone) is imperfect, and that the territory described does not belong to this nation." No subsequent Supreme Court ruling, or any lower federal court ruling, has failed to recognize and uphold Wilson v. Shaw. For three quarters of a century every American, from the man in the street to the men on the US Supreme Court, knew we owned the Panama Canal and the Zone. It took one man. Sen. Omar Torrijos, head of a cocaine/heroin smuggling family, despoiler of human rights, to persuade us differently.

 Whatever guided the Senate in giving up the Canal is now moot. But I would like to point out that most of the peoples of the earth regard such generosity as signs of weakness; that we would rather surrender than fight. Nowhere is this feeling more ingrained than in Latin and South America. The very fact that General Omar Torrijos had threatened terrorism and guerilla warfare to destroy the Canal if the US failed to "give in" will be interpreted all over the world as capitulation in the face of threat. Our troubles, particularly in Latin America and Panama, are just beginning. No nation can compromise with terrorism. They can't do business with blackmailers. The Colossus of the North has been whittled down to assailable size by a leftwing despot. who took Panama by coup in 1968. The friend of Allende and Castro will be back for more. And other nations ruled by despots will also be submitting their "demands." Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Uruguay and Ecuador, who supported Torrijos for return of the Canal, will be among them. The only thing "settled" in the Canal giveaway is that we have made no friends, in Panama or anywhere else.

SANTA FE-What do the '90s hold for New Mexico? There are a few knowns and a lot of unknowns.

We know that New Mexico, along with the nation, will struggle with solutions to the drug problem, to solid waste and nuclear waste disposal, to spiraling health care costs and to the plight of so many who live in poverty. We know much less about

solutions to these problems. We do know there will be a lot of uncontrolable external events that will shape our future but these events take place almost too rapidly

to predict. Every good American predicted, for instance that communism and Marxist philosophy would eventually topple as unworkable economic and political systems, but who would have thought a year ago that nearly all of Eastern Europe would give up within a four-month period? Who would have thought a year ago that something like cold fusion was even possible within anyone's wildest

Both these events will entire world, and especially on New Mexico.

The probable decline of the Soviet military threat is likely to have a significant bearing on New Mexico's national laboratories. Will it be possible to redirect dollars from any discontinued military research projects in our state to other purposes? Can New Mexico facilities be used to find answers to nuclear waste storage, disposal and clean up?

Will cold fusion possibilities be real enough to bolster the sagging Los Alamos research activities? Might superconductivity be another field that could give our labs some much-needed iobs? Can the Los Alamos cancer research efforts be expanded?

The fall of the Iron Curtain is certain to have farreaching effects, especially economic. Will it mean a whole new set of countries with cheap labor to take jobs away from our nation? What will be the effect upon the new European common market scheduled to go into

effect in a couple of years? Will the threat of aggression from the Soviet Union and its allies be replaced by hostile actions from the Middle East and Central America? Will the rapid changes in Russia and Eastern Europe continue along a course toward democracy and cooperation with the West or will Gorbachev and other reformers discover they have moved too fast and be deposed?

As the answers to these questions unfold, our state and national decision makers must be prepared to respond decisively for the good of our citizens. As they do this, some short range predictions are possible.

Handling of solid waste will occupy the next several legislative sessions. Funding of municipal and county landfills that meet evironmental standards will be a major and continuing problem.

Keeping the Land of Enchantment from becoming the nation's garbage dump will occupy considerably more legislative attention. Federal regulations will probably keep us from flat closing our borders. New forces will emerge advocating out-of-state waste disposal in New Mexico as an economic boost to the state if it can be done safely.

Recycling efforts will increase. The paper recycling program started by the Carruthers administration was a start. The key will be in finding markets for the more laboratories. expensive recycled products. tive to soaring waste disposal presidency.

Health care costs will be a subject of future legislatures. Astronomical medical liability insurance premiums will be addressed through attempts to place limits on that liability. Workers' compensation insurance rates will continue to be a heated subject. The medical component of those rates will receive the majority of attention.

The quality of education will continue to be debated with new ways sought to provide the best service on the most cost effective basis.

In the area of economic development, we will seek ways to recapture gas and mineral markets, increase tourism and take more advantage of our national



tions about payment of the prior years bills, to which the commissioners had no knowledge. March:

Following another closed session for personnel the commissioners stated four people would be interviewed for manager and road superintendent each. They also approved a resolution to apply for funding assistance to prepare a solid waste plan for the county.

March 18, friends and associates of Suzanne Cox gathered for a dinner to honor her many years of service to the county.

March 23, the commissioners hired Nick Pappas as manager and Tommy Hall asroad superintendent. They also reviewed the 1988 zoning ordinance which was approved Nov. 22, 1988.

The following Monday, the commissioners heard of a rural addressing system with their new manager Pappas. County Treasurer Shirley Goodloe objected.

Again the commissioners met and approved a budget calendar in preparation of the preliminary budget. Pappas recommended a legal firm be hired to serve through June 30.

April 10, the commissioners hired the firm of Parsons and Bryant in Ruidoso with lead attorney Bob Beauvais to serve as legal counsel until June 30. And they met in closed session to discuss the contract and litigation.

Budget action included corrections and increases for the sheriff's department and other requests at the April 24 meeting.

May: The commissioners met in a special meeting May 3 to discuss joining other counties in a lawsuit opposing the implementation of landfill regulations by the New Mex-ico Environmental Improvement Division. Beauvais warned the regulations would be costly and other counties planned to file a restraining order before May 14, the day the new regulations were to take effect.



At the May 8 meeting Pappas announced the county will close the Fort Stanton landfill on May 14. The commissioners again meeting in two closed sessions.

Beauvais filed a restraining order in district court May 12 which would keep the EID from enforcing the new regulations for 10 days. A hearing before District Judge Robert Doughty was scheduled May 19. The commissioners met with Ruidoso village council to discuss the problem May 12. During the

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two-minute county commission meeting, they adopted a resolution to officially close the landfill on Fort Stanton Mesa. An action which later was to haunt the commissioners and residents of Hondo Valley.

May 23, the News learned the commissioners approved the landfill lawsuit was consolidated with a larger suit filed by 85 New Mexico governments. The News asked Pappas when the action was taken, to which Pappas replied maybe the county attorney had canvassed the commissioners singly about the matter. When questioned, Hemphill said it was an "administrative decision." Also at the May 23 meeting, News reporter Ruth Hammond questioned the commissioners abut "informal meetings." A question which lead to

call to the New Mexico Attorney General's office about the legality of "informal" briefings. Hammond was told by Scott Spencer, director of the civil division in the AG's office, that any time the county commissioners met to discuss business. it was a meeting. When questioned about the legality of phone conferences, which Pappas said were legal when 24 hours notice was given, Spencer said the conferences were not legal and commissioners must be in physical attendance at meetings.

County employees received a salary increase beginning July 1, an action approved by commissioners during the preliminary budget hearing. The budgeted expenditures were \$4,736,697 and revenues were \$5,068,486. The commissioners also approved hefty increases for 10. employees because of new pay scales, job classifications and/or titles.

The Fort Stanton Landfill opened again and was to remain so until Sept. 6.

The commissioners faced the largest and most emotional audience yet on the issue of Physicians' Assistant Ernie Gonzales at the Carrizozo Health Clinic (CHC).

The group and the CHC board requested the commissioner uphold the promises of a \$38,000 salary, housing allowance, vacation, sick leave and moving expenses to Gonzales to "keep Ernie." EMS director Nancy Guck said PAs starting salaries nationwide are \$50,000 a year. "Ernie is not replaceable," she said. The commissioners agreed to pay.

Robert Beauvais was employed as county attorney for up to six months at the last meeting of the month of June. Beauvais had been with the law firm of Parsons and Bryant in Ruidoso, bût reported he had resigned June 30.

The first hint of trouble came in the June 26 meeting when commissioners heard the county needed a contract with Ruidoso Downs by June 30, or the county could not allow that village to use the county landfill. Complaints were received about blowing trash at that landfill. The sheriff was to be asked to have patrols in the area.

Another sign of trouble at CHC was hinted when Petty wanted the county reimbursed for Southwest Health Services for services pro-vided at CHC,

July: July: It is summarized in the News the county commissigners met on an average once a week during their first half year in office. They met

29 times: 14 in special meetings, 12 regular meetings. two budget workshops and one proposal workshop.

The commissioners announced June 10 they wanted to increase taxes with approval of a 3 mill levy to help pay for sanitary landfill costs, road department and economic development. August:

Commissioners met in s special session and approved a resolution to petition Otero County Commission for Lincoln County to dispose of solid waste in Otero County from Nov. 1, 1989 to May 31, 1990. The commissioners took the action because the Fort Stanton Landfill was expected to be full by the end of October and the Fort Stanton Hospital Landfill will be closed to the county. A study to determine where to place transfer stations and a compactor was okayed.

Commissioners also were ordered Aug. 9 by District Judge Richard Parsons to find adequate storage space for court files. By the order, the court took the courtroom foyer as a storage area. The storage question is still unanswered.

"I am convinced we need a landfill in Lincoln County, Petty said during the Aug. 14 commission meeting. Commissioners agreed to write specifications for a compacting truck and 34 new sixyard dumpsters.

They learned Ruidoso Downs has not paid tipping fees for using the county landfill on Fort Stanton Mesa before July 1. Commissioners also learned the county was working on arrangements to transport solid waste to the landfill in Dog Canyon in Otero County. And another closed session for litigation and personnel.

The commissioners heard the options to landfills are recycling centers for the more than 70 percent paper in solid waste. New Mexico State University dean of engineering offered help with studying the problems concerning a landfill operation in Lincoln County.

September: "This is the biggest can of worms I've ever seen opened because of lack of documentation." Lincoln County Commission Chairman Hemphill said at the Sept. 11 meeting about the salary promised to CHC PA Ernie Gonzales. Again the commissioners were in closed session to discuss the salary, which the former county commission approved at \$38,000 annual plus benefits. Petty rebutted the total pay would amount to about \$61,000. "I am not convinced that was the understanding when Ernie was hired," she said and cast the only nay vote.

Hemphill resigned as chairman and Karon Petty took over the chair. History was made when they flipped a coin to determine who would get a contract to strip Gavilan Canyon road. And the joint powers agreement with Ruidoso and the county for a proposed three-mile Extraterritorial Zone was tabled

The draft copy of the Lin-coln County Employee handbook was first revealed to the public, with some questions.

The ETZ would come up again at the next commission meeting when Ruidoso's Planning and Zoning representatives claimed Ruidoso goes from Fox Cave to Angus Hill." Again the commissioners tabled the agreement until they had more information,

Landfills crop up again and Petty reinstated the landfill study committee and sent Pappas to check on state lands for a possible site.

At a meeting between the county Planning and Zoning and the county commissioners they discovered the county zoning ordinance is unenforceable until it is fully completed.

October:

Commissioners approved the use of a sealant on county road CO47 or 17th Street near Carrizozo, The approval was done in a phone conference, with Simpson listening on the speaker phone in the county manager's office while the clerk and Hemphill and the reporter from the News were present.

Some landowners showed up at the first regular county meeting of the month and expressed their dislike of the proposed threemile ETZ extension. They accused certain media of presenting "propaganda" for special interest groups. The sheriff got approval to begin a jail office remodel.

County officials met with legislators at a social function in Ruidoso. Legislative Day, to offer their input and to hear what may be coming in the next legislative session : November:

"Our whole term has been solid waste," Petty said at the Nov. 13 meeting after a large group of Ruidoso valley residents complained of an unwanted landfill in their area—the first time the comthe Ken Nosker dump-and all solid waste. not the last time.

A special meeting was held to discuss the landfill and valley residents learned they did have the legal rights. to file a complaint with Solid Waste Ordinance 85-3. Ruidoso Downs Mayor Jake Harris rebutted and said the county is discriminating against him because his village had no place to dump trash when the county landfill closed.

A workday meeting, as they called it, established the dire need for additional courthouse space for district court records and clerks' records the question was, where was the space to be?

On Nov. 30, the landfill problems multiplied after the commissioners discovered they could not use the site on state lands because it was too near the new Sierra

Blanca Airport, so said the Federal Aviation Administration. And it was back to the beginning for the landfill question. December:

Carrizozo Health Cliic again was scrutinized and the contract with Southwest Health Services was to be renegotiated.

The remaining weeks of the year were filled with discussions about the landfill situation and the illegal Nosker dump. Sheriff James McSwane dug for trash at the Glencoe property which belongs to former county commissioner Ken Nosker and on which Ruidoso Downs dumped garbage.

Commissioners, left with no real site for a landfill, went back to the original collection idea and decided they wanted out of the garbage business-at least for a year.

Commissioners Petty, Hemphill and Simpson ended their year with good marks on the mid-year budget review but still in the dark about where to put the county's trash. Happy New Year!

2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued;
you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by that assessor.

If you believe your property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report, on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement which:

1. describes the property affected,

2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and 3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased.
