

# Commissioners advance plans for growth, economic development

The Lincoln County Commissioners were asked to consider a renovation project to create more county space, a long-range economic development plan, an industrial park for the Village of Capitan and fairgrounds improvements at a public hearing for application of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Monday before the regular county commission meeting.

Petty, Bob Hemphill and Rick Simpson considered input from county manager Nick Pappas to request funds to renovate the old Carrizozo municipal complex which now houses the Zia Carrizozo Senior Citizens Center and the Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department. Pappas proposed to remodel the structure to include the senior citizens, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) the Extension Service and Health Department, and an auditorium for training purposes.

The space cleared in the

courthouse would allow for storage of county records, not for any extra court purposes, Pappas said, because the county is pursuing state funds for extra courtroom and court-related spaces.

CDBG funds, an "off-shoot" of urban renewal, Pappas said, have criteria that requires the applicant to have at least 51 percent of the population at low-to-moderate income levels. By excluding Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, the county has a low-to-moderate income rate of 52 percent.

George Puckett, executive director of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC) suggested a long-range economic development plan for all county communities. Puckett said communities with populations under 1000 have difficulty in attracting economic development projects, so a part of the study should emphasize those small municipalities.

Puckett also suggested exploring the development of an industrial park near Capitan. Carrizozo presently has

a park which has "not paid off yet, but will," Puckett said.

Lincoln County treasurer and member of the Lincoln County Fair Board Shirley Goodloe requested an application be made for funds to improve the fairgrounds, including insulation of the exhibition hall and a cover for the rodeo arena.

One application from each local government will be accepted. To further take public input for the CDBG the commissioners will conduct another public hearing at the Feb. 13 meeting.

After a closed session to discuss personnel early in the meeting, chairman Petty made a motion to place the road department back under the supervision of the county manager and establish procedures for road work. Under the previous county manager, the road department was supervised through that office. When the current commissioners took their places on the board, that job was taken from the county manager's office and put under direct authority of the county commission, specifically

Simpson. This has created problems in contacting the county about road needs, Petty said.

"It's my opinion complaints or needs should go through the county manager's office," Petty said.

Hemphill declined to second the motion, because he needed more information and did not want to create more problems.

The commissioners were questioned, how they could justify the closed session if they were discussing management alterations and not just personnel. Petty replied the session was regarding personnel and the action to resolve the problem was made during the open meeting.

After the attempted management shift, Puckett gave the quarterly report of EDCLC, which is financed with commission-imposed mill levy funds.

EDCLC was responsible for recruiting Alto Engineering of California, an electronics firm, to Lincoln County. Warp Speed Light Pen Company and Alto Engineering also were attracted to the area because of EDCLC.

The transportation committee is pursuing an air service to Sierra Blanca Airport. A proposal to the state for a manufacturing productivity center in Lincoln County was completed and research about the group's non-profit status led to information that contributions are not (tax deductible as) a charitable cause, but can be considered a business promotion expense.

An open house in December attracted more than 300 people who got to see an exhibit of the Warp Speed light pen.

EDCLC is working with the developers of Rancho Ruidoso who want to include a research park in their development.

Puckett continues to work with the Carrizozo and Corona prospects.

At the annual certificate holders meeting directors and officers were elected. Buddy Bundick is president, Scott Shafer vice-president, Frank Shafer treasurer and Cindy Lynch secretary. Directors are Bundick, Ronnie Paulger, Pat Huey, Ernest Luceras, Lynch, Shafer, Bob Hemphill, Frank Potter, Don Shaw, Hal Sims, Dorothy Smith, James Hobbs, J.C. Harris and Ron Wall.

The projected 1990 budget indicates EDCLC will have a shortfall of \$27,632.47, Puckett said. Little success with private funding will leave EDCLC out of money in September and Puckett asked the commissioners for guidance on budgeting.

"We need to know if the county is not in favor of the continuation of the economic development effort," Puckett added. EDCLC projected its budget from the county funds allocated when EDCLC first approached the commissioners.

Goodloe said some funds will be available after all county property taxes are collected. "We never collect 100 percent," she said.


Pappas suggested Puckett become involved with the county zoning map process to identify areas proposed for industrial parks.

### Carolyn Lietzman wins IRS battle

A major battle in the war between the widow of Lincoln County rancher and businessman Robert Lietzman and the Internal Revenue Service was won over the O-Bar-O Ranch in US District Court.

Carolyn Lietzman has been battling the IRS over whether she had to turn over the ranch to satisfy her late husband's tax debt. Lietzman was killed in a helicopter crash near Carrizozo in May 1985. Since then, the IRS has been trying to get the ranch.

In US District Judge E.L. Mechem's court in Albuquerque, both sides of the controversy submitted their own version of the truth, called findings of fact, before the Sept. 21-22 non-jury trial. The judge adopted Lietzman's findings that while Carolyn and Robert owned the property jointly because it was purchased after their 1973 marriage, the debt was entirely his because it was created before they married.

A formal judgment is expected within days. IRS still has a tax lien against Robert Lietzman's interest in the property and the battle will shift to how that property should be divided.

Lietzman's attorney Jack Campbell said the court

found there was a tax lien but it only covers Bob Lietzman's one-half community property interest in the ranch. Carolyn has the other half free of the tax lien. She also does not owe any further taxes to IRS since the taxes owed were Bob Lietzman's.

Carolyn Lietzman could not be contacted for comment.

### Emergency loan applications being accepted

Lincoln County was declared eligible for Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) disaster emergency loans on Dec. 22, 1989.

Generally, this means that farmers who have lost at least 30 percent of their production due to drought which occurred between Jan. 1, 1989 and Aug. 1, 1989, are eligible for FmHA loans. Proceeds from crop insurance are taken into account when determining eligibility.

FmHA County Supervisor Dale A. Woods is urging farmers who are interested in receiving an emergency loan to get their applications to FmHA as soon as possible.

## Write-in candidates file in municipal elections

Carrizozo municipal candidates will have competition at the polls as three persons filed as write-in candidates Tuesday, Jan. 23.

Eileen Serna filed as a write-in for the office of Mayor of Carrizozo. Sandra E. Morales and Angelo I. Vega filed as write-ins for trustee. According to Carrizozo town clerk Carol Schlarb, the write-in candidates have no choice of position for trustee and are voted in at large.

Declared candidates who will appear on the ballot are Cecilia Kuhnelt for mayor, Gilbert E. Archuleta for four-year trustee and Patsy Vallejos for the other four-year position.

No one declared as a write-in for municipal judge. Judge candidates in order as they will appear on the ballot are David A. Vermillion, S.M. Ortiz and Johnnie L. Johnson.

In last week's issue of THE NEWS problems with Johnson's address were reported. According to Johnson, the address he used was assigned by US West for telephone hookup from the city map.

"I did not willingly or knowingly file for office of municipal judge with an error on the address," Johnson stated.

He went on to state he checked with a district judge, representative from the district attorney's office, Municipal League information service director and a staff attorney and determined he is still a certified candidate for the office of municipal judge of Carrizozo.

He also stated his true and correct address is 1011 13th St.

Capitan village clerk Janet Keel reported no write-in candidates declared Tuesday.

Corona village clerk Beatrice Chavez said Janet Stewart declared as a write-in candidate Tuesday for the four-year councillor position. The village still has an opening for the two-year councillor position.

In Ruidoso, village clerk Tammie Maddox said Dave

Joe Parks declared as a write-in candidate for municipal judge. Candidates in the order selected to appear on the ballot are: for mayor, Daniel "Hoss" Garbey, Daniel Barrow, Lloyd David and Victor Alonso. For councillor three positions are open and the list of candidates as they will appear on the ballot are: William Karn, Bill Hirschfeld, Jerry Shaw, Kenneth Shockery, Barbara Duff, Larry Simon, Joseph Mulqueen, John White, Tom

McNeil and Ron Andrews. For Ruidoso municipal judge, in order as they will appear on the ballot are Charles Hawthorne, Robert Beauvais and Bobby Thompson.

Ruidoso Downs deputy clerk Leann Weibrecht said no one declared as a write-in. The candidates for the village, in the order they will appear on the ballot are: for mayor, Jake Harris, C.L. (Bones) Wright, Rex

Vaughan and Bill Smith; for four-year trustee are Jacquelyn Branum, Marion Addy, Travis Hicks, LeVerne Cole, Wilma Webb, Ray Frederickson and Tony Parker; and for two-year trustee Ben Jeffery and Jim Rehmelt.

All candidates' declarations will be reviewed and names of those who qualified will be posted at the respective municipal halls (Con't. on P. 2)

## Council orders removal of old Girard Hotel

In a move to clean house of any old business at their meeting Tuesday, the Carrizozo's Town Trustees passed a resolution calling for the demolition of the old Girard Hotel to begin within 10 days.

Trustee Albert Baca, who is not running for the office again, said the town was responsible for protecting its citizens from unsafe, dilapidated property and referred to the notice sent to Cecilia Kuhnelt about the demolition of the old Girard Hotel.

The "mechanism for removal" of the building was based on the menace to health and safety and the ruined, dilapidated condition.

Trustee Harold Garcia said the resolution gave the process a "firm start," but wanted some time frame set on the resolution for Kuhnelt to complete the demolition project.

Mayor Bob Hemphill said he thought Kuhnelt had a contractor in town looking for disposal sites for the demolition debris.

With Hemphill's statement, Garcia said it appeared both sides were prepared for the final event of tearing the building down.

"In my mind getting a contractor with a goal to dismantle the building she is willing to comply," Garcia said.

He continued to press for a completion date, "Six months is not too long or short."

Baca was insistent the council pass the resolution because Kuhnelt was given 120 days to take the building down. "No weed was even pulled there."

Hemphill told the trustees the action could be "construed as bad publicity" to prevent Kuhnelt's election. Kuhnelt has filed as candidate for mayor. "We put up with six years of bad publicity from her," he added.

"There was nothing personal during the whole process," Garcia said. "We owe it to the people of Carrizozo to proceed." But he advocated to give her as long as possible.

The trustees also referred to another problem building, to which Baca replied the trustees should be prepared to deal with anyone with hazardous buildings. "Let's not back off from her; but finish the steps."

"The town bent over backwards considering the eminent danger and the town's liability," Garcia said.

Again Hemphill said the demolition has begun, to which Baca replied to go ahead with the resolution to keep her in the process of the demolition. "I've not seen any tearing down."

Even after the trustees approved the Resolution

90-01, Garcia wanted a conclusion date set on the resolution. However, the village attorney Robert Beauvais was ill and unable to attend the meeting.

The trustees also spent about an hour discussing the contract for the lease of the Carrizozo Golf Course to Ted Turnbow.

Turnbow's lease expires June 3, 1991, but the trustees wanted to extend it to five years since he had fulfilled all lease agreements on maintenance and so on.

Garcia wanted the lease to provide more benefits and an extension to Turnbow and wanted the contract to be revised before the current board leaves office.

Hemphill asked Turnbow to upgrade the physical fitness trail on the perimeter of the course to include barriers such as those in the park in Alamogordo. Hemphill also wanted tables and barbecue stands installed around the park area and lake, with the town purchasing the equipment and installing it, perhaps with Outdoor Recreation Grant funds. The municipality will pick up the electric bill for the water used at the golf course and park, which is currently the policy.

ture last week to appeal for additional funding for a center in the San Patricio area.

"We shook up the whole state agency on aging and how they budget. It was beautiful!" Ward said and thanked Simpson for his help.

To help fix the roof now, the commissioners approved Ward's request to take funds out of a \$15,000 grant for remodeling and improvements at the center to have the roof fixed. Hemphill added the repair job must comply with the procurement code.

The Solid Waste Disposal agreement contract with Southwest Disposal, Inc. of Alamogordo, approved contingent of contract finalization at the last commission meeting, is in the attorney's hands, Pappas said. The contract is for 20 six-yard dumpsters located at certain county areas and shipped to Otero County for \$4000 a month for six months, with an option to renew.

The six months will give the county time to study waste generation and to look at a compacting station to reduce the volume taken out of the county. The Ft. Stanton pits will be left for contractor trash.

In other business, the commissioners:

—Directed county attorney Robert Beauvais to research the liabilities involved with the leaking water pipes from Bonito Lake which are damaging the county-owned Bonito Lake Road.

Simpson said various meeting with Alamogordo resulted in no agreements. Since, Simpson learned the city of Alamogordo owns the lake and waterand Holloman Air Force Base owns the pipelines. A severe leak recently has caused part of the road to collapse after an attempted line repair was covered with mud.

"They talk well but that's all," Simpson said.

—Approved a demonstration project enjoined with Transwestern Pipeline in which \$8000 will be provided by Transwestern to purchase Staybond, a stabilizing chemical, for three miles of the Transwestern Road.

—Oked amendment two to the contract with the Eastern New Mexico Agency on Aging and the Commission on behalf of the Zia Senior Citizens Center.

—Accepted four bids for a used tractor truck and low-boy trailer and will award the bid at the next meeting.

—Accepted five bids for a new and unused articulated motorgrader and will award at the next meeting.

—Tabled a next meeting bridge replacement agreement with the state highway department until the next meeting.

—Approved a New Mexico Litter Control and Beautification Grant application which, if approved, will provide five summer jobs for county youth.

—Approved budget adjustments for Bonito and Fort Stanton Fire Departments as requested by the respective fire chiefs.

—Approved resolutions for the Open Meetings Act, Payroll register and accounts payable.

—Heard Pappas say the affidavits for inclusion in the disclosure statements of "illegal subdivisions" have resulted in several calls from attorneys and landowners.

Pappas also reported on the zone map process, which has involved surveyor Tim Collins, Beauvais and Albert Baca of the assessor's office. The county will be mapped on a grid of 12-mile squares. Once state and public lands, subdivisions and municipalities are taken out of the map, they will look at the growth pocket around Ruidoso,

which will require the most time to zone.

Another draft of the county personnel policy handbook was completed last week, Pappas said. A completion date for the handbook is July 1.

Pappas complimented the personnel committee, elected officials and commis-

sioners who contributed to the "in-house" effort.

—Heard new Planning and Zoning Commission member Mike Randle question the environmental safety of the road stabilizer, which road supervisor Tommy Hall said was OSHA approved.

three years he has leased the course.

The original contract for a \$1 annual lease with an option to renew to five years provided all conditions of maintenance were met.

"We want to help anyway we can to help Ted stay out there," said Trustee Dale LaMay.

"I'll take any help I can

get," Turnbow said.

The contract was tabled until attorney Beauvais could review it and to give him time to find ways to spend recreation funds for the park improvements.

Other old business taken care of Tuesday included an amendment to Ordinance 72-100 with US West. Carrizozo is the only state municipi-

pality to receive telephone service for utility access.

Instead US West wanted to pay Carrizozo a percentage of the revenues collected in the town. Hemphill said the amount would be about \$1869 annually. Currently the services are worth about \$1200 annually.

The trustees approved the amendment which now must go through the public hearing process and will be on the agenda of the next town meeting.

Another old business item, the personnel policy, will be reviewed in a draft form at the next meeting also.

The water tank inspection, scheduled for last week

was tentatively postponed until Feb. 6. Hemphill joked and said every time the engineer came to check the tank while it was being constructed it would snow. The inspection last week was postponed for inclement weather.

In other business, the trustees:

—Tabled the discussion of the Scott Tex Mill with the new owner as he did not come to the meeting.

—Approved the audit report, which listed no problems with the village books, by auditor De'Aunn Willoghby. See next week for a more complete audit report.

—Approved business registration, all renewals.

Voters still have until Jan. 29 to change their party affiliation and persons wishing to register to vote in the March 9 municipal elections can do so. However, in cases where the voter registration books close because of school district elections, Lincoln County Clerk Martha Proc-

tor instructed the county voter registrars to register persons. The books at the clerk's office will be re-opened at 5 p.m. Feb. 6 and any registrations received by the county clerk will be entered and the books will be closed immediately after the entries are made.

April 3 is the filing date for any person wishing to declare candidacy for legislative, judicial district offices, state board of education and all county offices. Those candidates must have a declaration of candidacy forms available at the county clerk's office. To qualify, each candidate must have qualified signatures on the nominating petition. Republican candidates must have at least 51 signatures and Democrats must have at least 29. The numbers are based on a percentage of total votes cast in the last governor's race. There is a \$50 filing fee.

## Lincoln County policy handbook being debated

Lincoln County employees, elected officials and commissioners are working on a new personnel policy handbook.

Wednesday, Jan. 17, commissioners Karon Petty and Bob Hemphill met with members of the county personnel board and representatives of each county department, including the sheriff's office, to review another draft of the handbook initiated in September.

The handbook, which was first drafted by county manager Nick Pappas, has changed during the review process, including 25 strikes of the words "county manager." The finished copy will include job classification charts, which will require salary adjustments and up-to-date job descriptions, as well as duties expected of county employees and their rights.

Pappas said the personnel handbook now in process was approved by county commissioners Cotton McKnight, Ben Hall and John Hightower on Dec. 3, 1982. Since then the handbook was amended three times and had become very hard to read and understand, Pappas added.

Some of the things suggested and questioned Wednesday were the amount of overtime pay for employees who work on legal holidays and other overtime questions, disciplinary action and

dismissals, closure of county offices in severe weather, time off for vacations and other instances, and medical examinations and special problems in the sheriff's office.

Full-time employees will be paid for legal holidays and that eight-hour day will be added to the rest of the 40-hour week for computation for paychecks. County assessor Julia Samora questioned why employees were paid for the legal holiday plus the overtime pay for holiday work of two times the regular pay.

The point was argued and county attorney Robert Beauvais who reviewed the draft Wednesday, said any decision must be made very



clear in the handbook. The sheriff's office time sheets will be kept differently to allow for irregular schedules of the employees in that department. Dismissal policy was debated and has been since the first draft which included dismissal at will. Since that first draft wording was added that states dismissals because of disciplinary action require an oral or written reprimand. In the case of written, the employees must sign the reprimand to insure a copy was given. If the employee refuses to sign, he can be terminated for insubordination. The handbook will spell out the employee's rights and responses and what constitutes the need for disciplinary action such as intoxication or felony conviction. Petty suggested the handbook include a section

about termination on the spot in the first part of the handbook. "Reading as an employee, it will take a lot to get rid of me, due to the grievance process," Petty said. Probationary employees can be fired at will and have no grievance process, Beauvais said. Closures of the county offices has been "thrown about quite a bit," said Beauvais, "giving this more importance than it is worth." The clerk's and sheriff offices cannot be closed totally. Petty requested inclusion of any administrative decision to close will be coordinated through the county manager's office. Vacation time cannot be accrued and Sheriff James McSwane questioned if a man could be given paternity leave. Special types of leave will be at the discretion of the department heads. Medical examinations will be required of all potential employees, with the county to provide a \$75 reimbursement. All records will be released only with the employee's written approval. This will keep out potential employees with medical problems who could make medical claims on insurance once qualified. Personnel board member Jack Page said employees should get insurance immediately after being hired and 30 days after termination. Other problems will be explored as the policy handbook is again drafted with revisions. Pappas told commissioners at their meeting Monday, Jan. 22, the final policy handbook is scheduled for completion and approval by July 1.

# Dad

He was born on May 5, 1900. I always thought there was a certain amount of mysticism about being born in a century year. I'm not sure why, but it always sort of intrigued me. I remember him telling us stories about growing up in New England; Vermont and New Hampshire mostly. He used to show us pictures of himself at prep school - Choate as I recall.

Somewhere along the line he got the wild idea that he wanted to be a cowboy. So he packed his bag and headed west. He worked on a ranch called "The Four Drags" up in the mountains near the border of Arizona and New Mexico. It was here that he came to love this part of the country. I think somehow he knew he would return one day.

He spent some time in Morenci, Arizona working in the mines. He told me it was here that he learned how to work. The Mexicans he said taught him how to pace himself through a twelve (12) hour day breaking rocks with a sledge hammer. He used this knowledge all of his life.

He returned to the East to finish his education, a business degree from Harvard, and started a 30 year career in advertising that took him all over the world - Sweden, Denmark, France, England, and of course all over the United States. To his credit is the first ad campaign for ARRID EXTRA DRY, a product still on the market today. He developed the market for CORNING GLASSWARE when it first came out; there must be one of those pots in every home in America. He was the first to televise the NATIONAL FINALS RODEO; we still have that film in a chest of drawers at home. And he helped create what is today the RICHEST HORSE RACE in the world.

One day he decided he needed a summer home and came west to New Mexico. The rekindled love for this country was so strong that he quit his job, "retired" I guess is the right word, packed up his second wife and two young sons, and moved out here for good.

My earliest memories of him are when we would travel while he was working on the newspaper he created called the "New Mexican Horse Bulletin". He used to go to ranches, horse shows, rodeos, and all the race tracks. Sometimes, as a young boy, he would let me come along.

He only spanked me once that I remember - for playing with matches as I recall. It sure was a good one though. He gave my brother and me horses instead of bicycles. Not too much difference you might think, but those bicycles don't have to be fed every night or early in the morning for that matter. Seems like those horses were a little harder to take care of. Well worth it actually. He taught us a lot about responsibility while we were growing up.

He sure did like to watch us play football. He spent many a Friday night pacing up and down those sidelines watching me run the ball and my brother block. He sure was proud of us. I knew when I went to college that it didn't make any difference what I became, he'd back me all the way. And he did.

It was an incident in 1985 that marked the beginning of the end. He lost his way one night walking home, down a steep ridge after high centering his car. They found him at 4 o'clock that morning. He never did seem to get his confidence back after that. He was content to work in his garden with the flowers and sit in the sunshine on the patio reading the magazines. He sure did like to go to the horse races; boy, he couldn't wait for summertime.

He died on January 11, 1990, almost a full century after he was born. We buried him on a hill that looks up to the house and the country he loved. The headstone reads very simply, "Mr. Phil, he never had a SMALL effect on anybody."

I know that sure is true for me. But I guess that really shouldn't come as much of a surprise. After all, he was my DAD.

● Mayor Marion Barry of Washington, DC, the crime, murder and corruption capital of the nation, has been busted for smoking crack cocaine. A black he claims he was set up and is a victim of racism. In Los Angeles Mayor Bradley, a black, is in deep trouble because of some questionable machinations he has performed while in office. He says he is a victim of racism. In Oakland, CA Joseph Robinson Jr., a black, and Superintendent of the Oakland Unified School District, is under fire by a grand jury and the state auditor for stealing money and goods from the district, hiring felons and unqualified contractors, giving preferential treatment to selected employees, and criminal negligence—including paying an employee \$1000 in sick leave when he was actually in police custody. He is quoted by the Oakland Tribune: "I'm saying it's (the charges) racially and politically motivated. . . I'm being singled out to be made an example of." In Albuquerque, NM, University of New Mexico regents face criticism and possible lawsuits from militant Hispanic groups because no Hispanic was seriously considered for appointment as president of that university. LULAC and other Hispanic groups say it is racist and discriminatory not to have encouraged Hispanic applicants for the job. Any racial minority member who is caught with his hand in the cookie jar, or who has been accused of wrong doing, has the best defense possible—just scream "racism!" Then stand back and watch the Anglos run for cover!

● The next time somebody exercises his "constitutional right" to privacy, hit him with this fact: nowhere in the US Constitution or its Amendments is there a right to privacy. Dr. William Eaton, an attorney, is author of a new book, "Who Killed the Constitution?" In it he quotes the late Justice William O. Douglas who wrote the majority opinion of the US Supreme Court in the *Griswold* case, as conceding "that the right to privacy is nowhere mentioned in the Constitution or its Amendments." Then how did we get the right to privacy? According to Eaton, the court *invented* the right to privacy by quoting *itself* in previous cases (but *not* the Constitution). When the court wants a law that doesn't exist, it quotes itself and presto! a new constitutional law is unleashed. Thus the Supreme Court usurps the constitutional right of the legislative branch, and is today the prime origin of laws the Court wants, and to hell with the congress. Have a nice day.

● The News is considering a new feature to be called "Rumor of the Week" or perhaps just "Rumor-monger." The best news in Carrizozo come off the rumor line. Actually, everybody knows what's going on in and around town without ever seeing it in print. In fact, great effort is made to ensure that such "news" does not appear in the newspaper. For example, if a person is carrying on an extramarital affair, it won't appear in print. But everybody in town will know who's in bed with who, and even why. It makes us feel obsolete and useless. So I thought we might give a preview of an item that qualifies for the rumor column.

● It concerns county road C0-47 which runs from the cemetery in Carrizozo south several miles, all east of the railroad. The road was recently resurfaced, and the deal was that Lincoln County would pay half the cost and the New Mexico Highway Department would pay the other half. However, when the road work was completed, highway inspectors refused to approve the work, the cost of which approximates \$150,000. Therefore, the state highway department refused to pay its half of the project because, it is charged, the gravel used was not up to standards because of too much sand mixed with it—which has caused the road surface to deteriorate. So, instead of Lincoln County taxpayers having to pay half the cost of the road, they are now faced with paying the full amount, about \$150,000, for an inferior roadway. If any taxpayer is saddened by this development, check it with the road superintendent or the county commissioners.



## Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—The University of New Mexico Board of Regents appears to have made a popular choice for its next president.

Arizona State University provost Richard Peck was unanimously selected by the regents present for the meeting at which he was hired. He had received endorsements from graduate and undergraduate students as well as faculty and staff groups.

The only blemish on Dr. Peck's selection was controversy over no Hispanics or in-staters being among the finalists. A coalition of Hispanic groups unsuccessfully sought an injunction from state district court to halt the selection process claiming it was discriminatory.

The group was joined by an applicant, Alex Mecure, who did not make the final cut. They alleged the search committee had been asked to present five and 12 candidates to the regents. Instead, only two contenders were recommended. The group said it felt a number of minority candidates would have been included in a larger field of finalists.

Mecure has been a major player on the state's political scene for years. He was involved in a much-publicized confirmation battle seven years ago when former Gov. Toney Anaya nominated him to be cabinet secretary of Economic Development and Tourism. That skirmish left resentments among some Democrats that emerged last year during the rejection of Carla Muth's nomination as secretary of the Health and Environment Department.

Mecure was an undersecretary of the US Department of Agriculture during the administration of Pres. Jimmy Carter. He left a position as vice-president at UNM to accept the Carter appointment. He also had served as president of Northern New Mexico Technical Vocational school in Espanola.

In addition, strong feelings exist about another prominent New Mexico His-

panic who was not considered. Although he didn't apply, former New Mexico Highlands University Pres. John Aragon was nominated. Somehow the nomination did not go through the screening process despite a Dallas firm being contracted to handle the search in order to prevent such occurrences.

Peck and the regents feel confident they can overcome these initial difficulties. Dr. Peck reportedly has successful experience in the recruitment of minorities and women. He also is said to have an outgoing style that made him the leading candidate in most people's minds. If that style is combined with a healthy amount of substance, he may be just what UNM needs at the Capitol to communicate the university's message to lawmakers.

News stories identifying Peck as being from Arizona should not necessarily be taken to mean he has a deep understanding of the southwest and its needs. He was only an Arizonan for 18 months. Prior to that, he was at the University of Alabama.

For New Mexico's sake, let's hope Peck is not a job jumper. If he works out, UNM would be greatly helped by a lengthy tenure of its president.

Now, if Western New Mexico University could only do as well in its selection process. After easing out its last president, the board has rejected all finalists to replace Dr. Rudy Gomez. Sources tell me Gov. Carruthers has become concerned to the point he plans to attend the regents' next meeting in Silver City.

In other news from New Mexico's higher education system, Republican gubernatorial candidate Frank Bond of Santa Fe has announced he will be stepping down as chairman of the Commission on Higher Education.

Bond had stated when he announced for office that he

planned to guide some major higher education funding formula changes through the Legislature before sitting down with Gov. Garrey Carruthers to discuss whether it would be appropriate for him to continue his service on the Carruthers-appointed board while running for the top state office.

It appears Carruthers thought the resignation should come even sooner than Bond had anticipated. The next 25 days will tell whether Carruthers' decision will help or hurt the ambitious higher education proposals.

## The lips have been read; here are your new taxes

Beginning in 1990 agricultural employers must begin to withhold income tax from cash wages paid to farmworkers.

The Internal Revenue Service has sent a notice to employers explaining how to comply with the new law.

The new withholding rules for farmworkers—required as part of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1989, recently passed by Congress—apply to all cash wages paid after 1989 that are subject to social security taxes.

The IRS sent Notice 907 to over 400,000 agricultural employers along with the December mailout of Form 943, "Employer's Annual Tax Return for Agricultural Employees." The notice explains that agricultural employers should ask each farmworker to submit a completed Form W-4, "Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate," so the employer can determine how much to withhold each payday.

The IRS said that many farmworkers will also need Form SS-5, "Application for a Social Security Number Card," to get a social security number. Form SS-5 is available from Social Security Administration offices.

The IRS explained that if a farmer hires a crew leader as an independent contractor to provide farmworkers, the workers are considered employees of the crew leader for purposes of withholding. Farmers and crew leaders

On the 20th day of March, 1990, there will be held in the Corona Municipal School District No. 13, Lincoln, Torrance and Socorro Counties, New Mexico, a special school district election for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the District the question of creating a debt by the issuance of general obligation bonds.

Section 2. The Voting Districts for this election shall be as follows:

In addition, there will be an Absentee Voter District established, as described in Section 6 hereof.

Section 4. As such election, the following question shall be submitted to such qualified, registered electors of the District: GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND QUESTION

"Shall the Board of Education of the Corona Municipal School District No. 13, Counties of Lincoln, Torrance and Socorro, New Mexico, be authorized to issue general obligation bonds of the District, in one series or more, in the aggregate principal amount of not exceeding \$300,000, for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings or purchasing or improving school grounds or any combination of these purposes, said bonds to be payable from general (ad valorem) taxes and to be issued and sold at such time or times upon such terms and conditions as the Board may determine?"

Section 5. A person is a qualified elector of the District if he or she is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age on the day of the election and a resident of the District on the day of the election. In order to vote, qualified electors of the District must have previously registered with the County Clerk of Lincoln County, the County Clerk in Torrance County or the County Clerk of Socorro County in accordance with law. Any qualified elector of the District who is not now registered during regular office hours prior to 5:00 p.m. on February 20, 1990, being the twenty-eighth day immediately preceding the election, at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, at the County Courthouse in Carrizozo, New Mexico, or at the office of the County Clerk of Torrance County, Estancia, New Mexico, or at the office of the County Clerk of Socorro County, Socorro, New Mexico or at the office of any deputy registration officer appointed by the County Clerk of Lincoln County or the County Clerk of Torrance County or the County Clerk of Socorro County (which may include the municipal clerks of all municipalities in Lincoln, Torrance and Socorro Counties.)

Section 6. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner authorized by 1-6-1 et seq. NMSA 1978, provided that qualified electors may also vote absentee in person at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County during the regular hours and days of business from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., February 23, 1990, being the twenty-fifth day preceding the election, until 5:00 p.m., March 16, 1990, being the Friday immediately prior to the date of the election.

Section 7. Voting shall be by paper ballot. PASSED AND ADOPTED this 12th day of December, 1989.

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Carrizozo Municipal School District No. 7 (herein the "Board" and the "District", respectively), in the Counties of Lincoln and Socorro, has determined that a special school district election be held on April 3, 1990, pursuant to Sections 1-22-1 through 1-22-19 NMSA 1978; and

WHEREAS, the Board of the District has determined upon its own initiative to submit to a vote at said special school district election, the question of the issuance of its general obligation bonds in the maximum amount and for the purposes hereinafter specified; as permitted by Section 22-18-2B NMSA 1978, and the Bond Election Act; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 22-25-3, NMSA 1978, the Board has determined, and does hereby determine, that there should be submitted to the electorate at said Election, the question of whether or not a property tax of \$2.00 per each \$1,000.00 of net taxable value of property allocated to the District under the Property Tax Code should be imposed for the property tax years of 1990, 1991 and 1992, for the purpose of capital improvements in the District.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE CARRIZOZO MUNICIPAL SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 7, CONSTITUTING THE GOVERNING BOARD OF SAID DISTRICT, IN THE COUNTIES OF LINCOLN AND SOCORRO AND STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. On the 3rd day of April, 1990, there will be held in the Carrizozo Municipal School District No. 7, Lincoln and Socorro Counties, New Mexico, a special school district election for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the District the question of creating a debt by the issuance of general obligation bonds and for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the District the question of whether or not a property tax should be imposed for the purpose of capital improvements in the District.

Section 2. The Voting Districts for this election shall be as follows:

Voting District	General Election Precinct Nos.	Polling Places
1	1, 2, 3, 4, & 5 Lincoln County within the District and Precinct 15 of Socorro County within the District	Carrizozo School Carrizozo, New Mexico

In addition, there will be an Absentee Voter District established, as described in Section 6 herein.

Section 3. The polls for said election will be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on the day of the election.

Section 4. At such election, the following question shall be submitted to such qualified, registered electors of the District:

### GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND QUESTION

"Shall the Board of Education of the Carrizozo Municipal School District No. 7, Counties of Lincoln and Socorro, New Mexico, be authorized to issue general obligation bonds of the District, in one series or more, in the aggregate principal amount of not exceeding \$540,000 for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings purchasing or improving school grounds, or any combination of these purposes, said bonds to be payable from general (ad valorem) taxes and to be issued and sold at such time or times upon such terms and conditions as the Board may determine?"

At such Election, the following question shall also be submitted to such qualified, registered electors of the District:

"Shall the Board of Education of Carrizozo Municipal School District No. 1, Counties of Lincoln and Socorro, New Mexico, be authorized to impose a property tax of \$2.00 per each \$1,000.00 of net taxable value of the property allocated to such District under the Property Tax Code for the property tax years of 1990, 1991 and 1992 for the purpose of the following capital improvements in the District, i.e. erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for and furnishing school buildings, improving school grounds, and maintenance of public school buildings and public school grounds exclusive of salary expenses of employees of the District and purchasing activity vehicles for transporting students to extracurricular activities?"

Section 5. The tax contemplated by the capital improvements tax question shall be in addition to the tax contemplated by the bond question and to any tax imposed to pay debt service on the bonds or for any other purpose. Such capital improvements tax shall be authorized pursuant to the Public School Capital Improvements Act, i.e. Sections 22-25-1 through 22-25-10 NMSA 1978 (being Chapter 5, Laws of the New Mexico, 1975, Special Session, as amended and supplemented).

Section 6. A person is a qualified elector of the District if he or she is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age on the day of the election and a resident of the District on the day of the election. In order to vote, qualified electors of the District must have previously registered with the County Clerk of Socorro County and the County Clerk in Lincoln County in accordance with law. Any qualified elector of the District who is not now registered and who wishes to vote at such special election should register during regular office hours prior to 5:00 p.m. on March 6, 1990, being the twenty-eighth day immediately preceding the election, at the office of the County Clerk of Socorro County at the County Courthouse in Socorro, New Mexico or at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, at the County Courthouse in Carrizozo, New Mexico, or at the office of any deputy registration officer appointed by the County Clerks of Socorro County and Lincoln County (which may include the municipal clerks of all municipalities in Socorro County and Lincoln County).

Section 7. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner authorized by 1-6-1 et seq. NMSA 1978, provided that qualified electors may also vote absentee in person at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County during the regular hours and days of business from 8:00 a.m. March 9, 1990, being the twenty-fifth day preceding the election, until 5:00 p.m., March 30, 1990, being the Friday immediately prior to the date of the election.

Section 8. Voting shall be by voting machine, except for absentee voting which shall be by paper ballot. At least one voting machine shall be used at the polling place for each precinct.
